sleeves and convened for a twopart brainstorming workshop at city hall in September to begin crafting the bones of a final report city officials will use as they prepare to begin Phase II. Roughly 20 ABBA members, guided by city-funded facilitator, broke out into workshops focused on the four core issues of concern identified at previous ABBA meetings, concerns they view as having a direct impact on their bottom lines: blight and safety, homelessness, a lack of cohesiveness and brand for the area, and the widespread number of vacant storefronts. "This is the beginning of the future of ABBA," said Hale. 'We are going to have a say in how we shape what happens next on Auburn Boulevard and we are very glad you're all here.' Reported STD's

Reach an All-Time High

SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) - Rates of sexually transmitted diseases (STDs) continue to increase in California, according to new statistics from the California Department of Public Health (CDPH). These diseases are reportable to the state and local health departments. The data are presented in CDPH's 2016 STD Annual Report: a summary can also be found on CDPH's website.

Over a quarter million cases of STDs were reported in 2016, a 40% increase compared to five years ago including, 198,503 cases of chlamydia, 64,677 of gonorrhea, and 11,222 of early syphilis. Particularly concerning to health officials, 207 cases of congenital syphilis were reported. If not caught early, syphilis during pregnancy can result in congenital syphilis leading to stillbirth or permanent, lifelong disabilities. Syphilis can also cause permanent loss of vision, hearing and other neurologic problems in adults. If left untreated, STDs can increase the risk of HIV infection and lead to lifelong reproductive health problems.



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a finger down the list of businesses dominating the stretch of Auburn Boulevard from roughly the entrance to Rusch Park to Interstate 80 and you'll find it dominated by a somewhat incongruous offering of service-related outfits, many long-standing vibrant business, while others, suffering from aging signage, dingy parking lots, blight and empty storefronts within feet of their entryways.

Auto repair shops, a veterinarian hospital, tire stores, a printing business, a smattering of gas stations, a few hamburger stands, one new restaurant and a couple of long-standing cafes, as well as several industrial firms, one in business on the boulevard for more than 80 years—all vying for customers in an area struggling for identity as age and a lack of visual cohesiveness, fueled by the growing number of retail vacancies, blight, graffiti and a swelling homeless destination, but in order to make that happen we need to address the issues that are turning customers off," said Richard Hale, owner of Walt's Auto Service and founder of the Auburn **Boulevard Business Association** (ABBA), a group of roughly two dozen local business owners from the area, formed in 2016 to represent the businesses in the corridor from Sylvan Corners to Interstate 80.

Armed with a grant of \$25,000 from the city, ABBA's goal, says Hale, is to work alongside officials as they begin to craft their plan for completing the second phase of the Auburn Complete Streets Revitalization Project, which would continue with the improvements completed in Phase I in 2014. Phase I covered the stretch of the boulevard running from Rusch Park to Sylvan Corners. Phase II, which remains unfunded at this point,

will address the boulevard from roughly Grand Oaks Boulevard to Whyte Avenue.

ABBA would like to see all of Auburn Boulevard obtain a "destination" status and attract new, relevant businesses to the area, such as a big box retailer or two, new restaurants and customerfriendly experiences, anything that would help define and revitalize interest by the community in the area, which will include improvements but also a plan for addressing the growth of homelessness in the area.

With nonprofit status, a board of directors and funding in place, ABBA members rolled up their

"The number of reported STDs in California is increasing at a concerning rate," said CDPH Director and State Public Health Officer Dr. Karen Smith. "This is the third year in a row that we have seen increases in chlamydia, gonorrhea and syphilis."

These three diseases can be prevented by consistent use of condoms, and they can be cured with antibiotics, so regular testing and treatment is very important, even for people who have no symptoms.

Chlamydia and gonorrhea rates are highest among people under age 30. Rates of chlamydia are highest among young women, whereas males account for the majority of syphilis and gonorrhea cases.

Regular screening for STDs is recommended for people who are sexually active. STD services also provide opportunities for further prevention of HIV through testing and pre-exposure prophylaxis, or PrEP.

"All Californians need to know how to protect themselves and their partners," said Smith. "Getting tested regularly is one of the most important steps." A directory of where to get tested can be found at the Centers for **Disease Control and Prevention** webpage.

CDPH is collaborating with the California Department of Education and community groups to implement the newly enacted California Healthy Youth Act, which mandates comprehensive STD/HIV prevention education in schools. Studio Movie Grill Eyeing Kmart Site

CITRUS HEIGHTS, CA (MPG) - While the city has yet to receive an official application from the company, officials and some local business owners say there is serious interest by Dallas-based Studio Movie Grill to occupy a portion of the 90,000 square-foot Kmart building on Auburn Boulevard.

Devon Rodriguez, development specialist with the city said there is nothing yet to share publically about Studio Movie Grill, but confirmed they have come forward as an interested tenant that would share the site with Big Lots, said to still be interested in taking up a portion of the site.

In late July, Rodriguez confirmed that Rebounderz trampoline fun center had pulled out of talks with the city to share the space with Big Lots. Rebounderz was set to take

up approximately 55,000 square-feet on the site, with plans to bring in a 24-hour, extreme fun center and a goal to open alongside Big Lots sometime in 2018.

With those plans off the table, Big Lots remains the only confirmed tenant to be in negotiations with the city.

Studio Movie Grill is considered an innovator in the in-theater dining movie concept, with roughly 24 locations across nine states, including California. Studio Movie Grill offers movie-goers an in-theater dining experience with classic cocktails, beer, wine, burgers, chicken fingers, pasta dishes, salads and of course popcorn.

Rodriguez also said previously that the property owners are unable confirm whether Big Lots was still a contender as a future tenant, but there have been no announcements about its departure, yet. Previous attempts to reach the company were unsuccessful and as vacancy rates seemingly rise at steady pace on the boulevard, there are concerns about that space taking so long to lease.

The site is viewed as a huge eyesore to many business owners on Auburn Boulevard and in the center itself, many of whom have jointly formed the Auburn Boulevard Business Association (ABBA), and are currently collaborating with the city to craft a vision for revitalizing the boulevard, which will, no doubt, carry heavy weight with city officials as they also move toward the completion of Phase II of the Auburn Boulevard Complete Streets Revitalization Project.

Phase II includes the stretch of the boulevard from Rush Park to the Roseville Boulevard and is not currently funded, according to city officials, and is not set to begin until 2019. ★

SMUD Exploring New Ways to Keep Vehicles from Hitting Power Poles

Sharp Rise in Incidents Can Jeopardize Safety and Power Reliability

SACRAMENTO REGION, CA (MPG) - SMUD is evaluating several measures to reduce the number of incidents that involve vehicles crashing into the electric utility's infrastructure, especially power poles. The five-year pilot program aims to increase public and worker safety, and reduce the number of associated power outages.

SMUD data shows an increasing trend of these incidents annually. In 2006 for example, there were 153 "car-pole" accidents. In 2016, there were 271. Increased traffic volume, distracted and unsafe driving, as well as other factors are to blame, but the end result is the same: increased potential for public and worker safety hazards and more power outages.

The pilot program will focus on power poles and electrical equipment that's been crashed into multiple times over the years. Measures include removing and relocating power poles; redesigning them; installing higher-visibility reflective strips; and installing large, high-visibility protective barriers, known as "Raptor" technology, around the power poles.

The Raptor is big and yellow. It is easily installed at the base of the pole and is designed to absorb the impact of a vehicle crash, sparing the power pole and preventing a power outage for SMUD customers. The Raptor has been used by other utilities and SMUD wants to see if they are a possible solution to improve safety, while making power poles more visible to motorists and more resilient to being damaged if a vehicle collides with the pole.

The main goal of the pilot is enhancing public and worker safety. SMUD takes public safety very seriously. Power reliability is also key. While car-pole accidents comprise about five percent of all types of SMUD outages annually, they account for about a quarter of the overall average duration

of outages for SMUD's customers. SMUD's Board of Directors, elected by SMUD customers to set policy, has made reliability one of SMUD's core values, so it's a priority for SMUD staff to fulfill it.

In addition to compromised reliability and safety, power outages caused by car-pole accidents cause loss of revenue to SMUD and increased costs for labor and materials to repair and replace damaged electrical infrastructure. For example, a pole replacement can cost more than \$11,000 for the pole, the five-man crew to replace it and other associated expenses for each incident. Beyond SMUD's costs,

pole replacements can take eight hours or more and cost the community's businesses lost revenue from power outages and associated traffic jams due to lane closures to make the repairs.

SMUD is doing its part to increase public and worker safety and reduce the frequency and duration of outages due to these traffic accidents. SMUD also urges motorists to do their part by driving safely, obeying traffic laws and avoiding anything that may cause distractions. owners and the community at large. But he reminded them the plan will take funding and time, likely two to three years.

"I think we have some of the greatest opportunities on the boulevard," Boyd said. "Our objective is to finish the second phase and we need federal grants in order to make that happen by 2019. We are at a point now where we need to be very focused. The city can't just do this as a local government. We need the businesses involved."

Sketching out a vision for the corridor, ABBA members said they want to see their portion of the boulevard, part of the original Transcontinental Highway stretching from Reno to Atlantic City, not only attract customers and new businesses, but also deliver a renewed sense of community pride. Asked to consider the boulevard and not just their own business, ABBA were asked to comprise a list of desired of aesthetic, as well as cultural changes. What they came up with was a long list of things ranging from new boulevard signage reflecting the corridor's historic relevance, a retro-inspired architectural theme with cohesive paint, fencing, signage and graphics for all the businesses in the area, a marketing and branding campaign for the boulevard to attract new business, community-focused events, such as a weekly farmer's market, street closures for family festivals, and a neighbor-to-neighbor approach to building up interest in the area as a local destination, not just a

Over and over again the group came up with adjectives to describe a revitalized Auburn Boulevard, adjectives such as "inviting," "appealing," and "secure." They say they want it to be both industrial-friendly, but modern, contemporary and convenient. And, above all, it needs to be safe.

Realizing that vision will require a delicate balancing act between the city, business owners and local law enforcement as, many agree, the growing homeless population is at the root of many of the areas of concern. Vacant buildings are prime real estate for homeless encampments and transient behavior, which in turn, leads to blight, crime, drug and alcohol related problems and are a significant deterrent to companies scouting new locations.

"A lot of the concerns we all have are tied to the homeless population," said Hale. "But we are working on how to address it and we have a plan to work with the city and law enforcement to figure out first, why they are here, and then how we take care of it."

While the city's Activate Auburn grant program offers funding to small businesses to refurbish storefronts, signage and make other aesthetic improvements, the homelessness issue and related problems seemingly continue to work against those efforts in some instances.

Martin Garcia, co-founder of Crepes & Burgers, which opened on the corridor in February, said although he received a grant to refurbish the building and that business was slowly building, he and his staff frequently deal with transients and a frequent presence of police activity involving the homeless, both of which are impacting operations and customer loyalty.

and screaming and customers won't stop to come in.

Police officers assigned to the city's Crime Prevention Through Environmental Design program (CPTED) are working nonstop with business owners on ways to deter the homeless from sleeping in their doorways, congregating at night and vandalizing their shops, encouraging them to install better lighting, surveillance systems and fencing, and cautioning them to ensure there is no access to public Wi-Fi or outlets for charging phones.

The City's Homeless Assistance Resource Team (HART), comprised of representatives from local non-profits, churches, the San Juan Unified School District, and Sunrise MarketPlace has received support to coordinate efforts with a city appointed Homeless Outreach Navigator, one individual, who acts as a case manager, connecting homeless individuals with city and county resources.

Despite the challenges, there is momentum. Roseville resident Ben Aibuedefe announced plans earlier this year to bring in a Checkers Burgers on the vacant corner lot at Auburn and Grand Oaks boulevards. Maita Mazda set up shop in a new 40,000-square foot facility in May and is upgrading another Mazda dealership at 2410 Auburn Blvd.

And, while perhaps representing one of the starkest examples of vacancy related concerns, there is a move afoot to bring in a Movie Studio Grill to share space alongside Big Lots, which is tentatively slated to take up a portion of the long-shuttered 90,000-square-foot Kmart building.

The city also is said to be courting the San Juan Unified School District to potentially purchase the surplus chunk of land that housed the former Sylvan Middle School for a future development project. Although he declined to specify details, Mayor Jeff Slowey told ABBA members at the first of the two meetings that the city was vigorously pursuing the parcel for "great things."

ABBA's vision for revitalization is now on paper and part of a working "action plan," a first big step toward a formalized report to be crafted by the consultants and delivered to the city and ABBA members at the group's next meeting November 14. "We'll be taking everything we have worked on here in the two sessions and drafting a very thorough and detailed report that reflects the vision for the future of Auburn Boulevard as the business owners have laid it out." said the firm's founder, Lucy Eidam Crocker who facilitated the workshops. 

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mainline for the highway.

"We want to see more restaurants and big retailers that people want to shop at come in because they will entice more businesses to come in," said Linda Finn who manages Aba Daba Rentals' Citrus Heights location, which benefited from some upgrades under Phase I. She is currently planting flowers in front of the business, which is dominated by cement mixers and heavy equipment, guarded by a wrap-around, wrought iron fence.

"I'm planting flowers in the planter in the front, I've been getting out and talking to other business owners in the area, and, so far, being a representative on ABBA has really been inspiring. We all want to see the area get better."

"The city offered to help me bring my business here," said Garcia, whose previous restaurant, Crepe Escape in East Sacramento burned down in 2015. "This building was a complete disaster but the city told us they were working on a plan to make this area nice. But often at night we have a lot of homeless people congregating around the area and a lot of times there are a lot of police and sirens coming around to deal with it. We have to close at 9 p.m. now because after 10 p.m., we see the homeless out there walking around

Cyber-Security. The Crime Prevention through Environmental Design (CPTED) results have been impressive; in some communities, criminal activity has decreased by as much as 40 percent. What is the secret to CPTED? Design that eliminates or reduces criminal behavior and at the same time encourages people to "keep an eye out" for each other. These are just a few of the ingredients that go into creating an effective CPTED for a safer and livable community.

The

The Sunrise Marketplace hosted the CPTED event, offering three sessions throughout the day. Their presentation highlighted low cost solutions to some common problems shared by many business owners.

Officer Garing of the Citrus Heights Police Department shared the four key concepts of CPTED. Natural surveillance – a design concept

directed primarily at keeping intruders easily observable using features that maximize visibility of people in and around business locations.

Territorial Reinforcement – Using features that define property lines and distinguish private spaces from public spaces using landscape plantings, pavement designs, gateway treatments; Natural Access Control - decreasing crime opportunity by designing streets, sidewalks and building entrances to discourage access to private areas using structural elements.

Target Hardening – accomplished by features that prohibit entry or access: window locks, dead-bolts for doors, interior door hinges, etc. For more information about CPTED, contact Citrus Heights Police Department POP Unit at (916) 725-2845 or email pop@citrusheights.net

<u>Cyber-Security for Small Businesses</u> was presented at the monthly Brown Bag Breakfast forum in City Hall. A Sacramento FBI Special Agent covered how to protect businesses from cyber threats, gave case examples and suggested preventative measures to the participants. Cybercrime will reach \$2 trillion in losses by 2019 with an average cost-per-stolen record of approximately \$150-\$200. More than half of the breaches in security are due to a lack of safety measures for businesses. Most common types of hacks for small businesses are:

- 1.) Business email compromise
- 2.) Point of Sale breaches (hijacked credit card information)
- **3.)** False tax return filings
- 4.) Ransom Ware & Extortion (loaded with malware and on the increase)

Protective and preventative measures include; good back-up systems that occur daily or at least every other day, implement a 2-step process for accessing IT, business and financial transactions and simply turning off your computer. In addition to, turn off SSID broadcasting and use caution when accessing public Wi-Fi networks and finally, always change default passwords.

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


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Where do I put the money?

Dear Laura,

For the time being, you can leave it all in a traditional savings account. But if he's not going to use it for many, many years you could move it into a conservative mutual fund. In



fact, you started when he was at such young age, a nice, conservative mutual fund might be a really good idea.

When he gets a little older, he can start adding to it himself from the money he makes from odd jobs and chores and such. After 15 years or so, thanks to your foresight and his contributions, he'll probably wind up with a pretty nice chunk of cash.

Debt snowball reasoning

Dear Dave,

Why do you recommend paying off debts from smallest to largest when doing the debt snowball? - Michael

Dear Michael,

Lots of people think paying off the debt with highest interest rate first is the best approach. This seems to make sense mathematically, but I realized a long time ago if those people could do math they wouldn't be drowning in debt.

Debt is not a mathematical problem, it's a behavior problem. Personal finance is 80 percent behavior, and only 20 percent head knowledge. The reason the debt snowball pays off debt from smallest to largest — even though it may be mathematically incorrect — is that modifying your behavior and inspiring you to get out of debt is more important than the math. Your probability of becoming wealthy has a lot more to do with your behavior than any sort of financial sophistication or academic degree.

When you pay off a small debt you experience success, and that gives you hope. Then, you move on the next largest debt. When you pay that one off — and you've wiped out two debts — it energizes you. At that point, you really start to believe in yourself and the fact that you're on the road to becoming debt-free!

Bullies Beware Family Tae Kwon Do Plus Plans Anti-Bullying Workshop

CITRUS HEIGHTS, CA (MPG) -Family Tae Kwon Do Plus is gearing up for its bi-annual Citrus Heights Hyper Bully Defense workshop, part of a world-wide movement against bullying in schools and elsewhere by participating martial arts instructors, taking place simultaneously across the nation throughout October in recognition of "Anti-Bullying Month."

Family Tae Kwon Do will host a free, two-hour, age-specific defense workshop for kids, teens and their family members, exploring the nature of bullying, ways to recognize it and how to put an end to it. The workshop will be held on Saturday, Oct. 14 from 11 a.m. to 1 p.m. More than 100 participants are expected.

The anti-bullying and educational event, held twice annually in spring and fall, will teach participants how to defend themselves against bullying, especially bullying in schools, which, according to Hyper Bully Defense, a worldwide network of martial arts professionals and schools working in tandem to spread the word that bullying is a life-threatening, serious and growing epidemic.

"Bullying is becoming an epidemic in our country, no question about it," said Family Tae Kwon Do founder, Professor Dominic Cirincione. He said Hyper Bully Defense statistics on bullying show that roughly 100,000 kids miss school every day in the country because they have been bullied

or are in fear of being bullied by someone once they get there. "It's real. And some cases are even leading to suicides. We have to take this very seriously."

In fact, Hyper Bully Defense has some rather startling statistics to consider. For instance, roughly 34 percent of children in America report being bullied on a regular basis. Also, every seven minutes a child is bullied by another student somewhere in the country, equating to roughly nine kids an hour. Finally, close to 85 percent of bullying incidents happen in secret with no intervention and a vast number of victims do not tell anyone out of fear of reprisal by the bully and or shame.

"Bullying is a serious and we are going to teach kids and their parents how to do their part to make it stop," said Cirincione.

The workshops will offer participants physical and mental tools for quickly assessing their surroundings, recognizing a potential bullying scenario and, perhaps most importantly, for carrying themselves with confidence in order to disarm a bully.

Representatives from the Citrus Heights Police Department also will be there to provide educational information about bullying, as well as gun violence and drugs in schools.

"Nationally the campaign will involve some 800 schools across the country and roughly 12,000 kids," said Cirincione. "Our workshop will involve reaching out to all Citrus Heights schools and roughly 3,500 students."

The event is free, open to all, and there will be pizza. If you can't make the event but want to learn more, go to Citrus Heights Hyper Bully Defense online, sign up and link to the download for a free, 32-page handbook called "The Parent's Guide to Bullying."

Former Teacher Convicted for Sexual Acts with Student

DATE: September 12, 2017 CASE: John Young (Case #17FE007685) **PROSECUTOR:** Deputy District Attorney Kevin Jones, Adult Sexual Assault Prosecution Unit John Young pled no contest to committing a sex-

ual act with a person under 18 years of age. John Young was a teacher at Sheldon High School where the 17-year-old victim attended

school. Young began an inappropriate relationship with the victim, culminating in a sexual act between the two of them. The relationship was discovered when a victim's family member found text messages between the two, which referenced the inappropriate relationship and sexual conduct.

Young faces a maximum sentence of 3 years in prison. Sentencing is set for October 16, 2017, at 8:30 a.m. in Department 8 before the Honorable Lawrence Brown.

Defendant Convicted for Murder at Carmichael Party DATE: September 13, 2017

CASE: Kenyatta Brown & Keyon Brown (Case #15F05786)

PROSECUTOR: Deputy District Attorney Casey Newton, Homicide Unit

Kenyatta Brown was convicted by a jury for the second-degree murder of 18-year-old Joslynn Sovenski. The jury also found true the allegation that Kenyatta Brown personally discharged a firearm causing death. Keyon Brown was convicted by a separate jury of accessory after the fact. Both defendants were also convicted of possession of an assault weapon.

On the night of September 18, 2015, brothers Kenyatta and Keyon Brown and the victim were at a party in Carmichael. Keyon Brown brought several guns to the apartment. The victim and her friend took videos of themselves handling and waiving the guns around while in the company of Kenyatta Brown and Keyon Brown. At 2:45 a.m., the Sacramento County Sheriff's Department received a 911 call reporting someone had been shot. Responding deputies found the victim on the apartment floor with a single gunshot to the chest. The victim died at the scene.

Initially, Keyon Brown repeatedly claimed that an unknown male shot the victim and fled the scene. He later admitted there was no unknown male shooter and that Kenyatta had been at the party, but left before deputies arrived. He also admitted to hiding one of the guns under a mattress. Based on Keyon Brown's new statement, several witness statements and videos from that night, Kenyatta was identified as the shooter.

Kenyatta Brown faces a maximum sentence of 41 years to life in prison. Keyon Brown faces a maximum sentence of 4 years county jail prison. Sentencing is set for October 6, 2017, at 9:00 a.m. in Department 26 before the Honorable Curtis Fiorini.

Habitual Sex Offender Sentenced for Child Sexual Assault

DATE: September 25, 2017

CASE: Lionel Phillip Jacques (Case #16FE001361)(Case #16FE009607)

PROSECUTOR: Deputy District Attorney Bruce Chang, Special Assault & Child Abuse Unit

The Honorable Emily Vasquez sentenced Lionel Phillip Jacques to 240 years to life in prison. On August 25, 2017, Jacques pled no contest to three counts of committing lewd and lascivious acts on a child under 14 years of age. Jacques also admitted to five prior lewd acts upon a child strike convictions and to a habitual sex offender allegation.

In 1986, Jacques was convicted of five child sexual assault charges in San Diego County. In that case, Jacques was a youth minister and victimized a member of his congregation for several years. Starting in 1996, Jacques sexually assaulted male relatives in multiple counties, including Sacramento County. Those assaults were discovered when Jacques dropped a memory (SD) card at his place of employment. When security workers examined the SD card to determine ownership, they found multiple images of child pornography and turned the card over to law enforcement. Detectives with the Sacramento County Sheriff's Department Internet Crimes Against Children Unit searched Jacques' digital devices and found images of Jacques sexually assaulting a victim.

Former Coach Pleads Guilty to Having Sex with Minors

DATE: September 25, 2017 CASE: Michael Martis (Case #16FE011239) PROSECUTOR: Deputy District Attorney Maria Wilson, Adult Sexual Assault Prosecution Unit

Michael Martis pled guilty to unlawful sexual intercourse involving two minors.

One of the minors, age 15, played on a softball team Martis coached between 2006 and 2007. The other minor, age 16, was also a player on a separate team he coached in 2013. That relationship began with flirtatious text messages and developed into a sexual relationship.

Martis faces four years in prison and will be required to register as a sex offender. Sentencing is set for November 20, 2017, at 1:30 p.m. in Department 20 before the Honorable Michael Bowman.

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


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Madoff's Among Us We've all heard horrible sto-

ries of folks who got taken by Bernie Madoff's fraud and scams, including friends and family. Just because Madoff is behind bars doesn't mean other scams aren't going on. If intelligent savvy people can get taken, what about you and me? Bill Francavilla knows about these scuzzy types. He's had some thirty years in the world of finances and he told me on my POPPOFF Show that there are scams going on as we spoke. These bad guys push greed and fear buttons to make the scam look good. Bill is author of "The Madoffs Among Us" and he hopes that he can help us make better financial decisions to protect our future. Would you believe each year over \$100 billion dollars is stolen from unsuspecting people? Studies have suggested that because there is a source of much embarrassment

for people who got taken, it is grossly under estimated and unreported. Some suggest that only about 20% is reported. So let's get to some suggestions on how not to be taken by financial advisors.

- There are five questions you should ask your present or prospective advisor.
- 1) "Tell me about your experience in the financial services business." That means, how long and with how many firms.
- 2) "Do you have any industry credentials? CFP? ChFC? Etc?"
- 3) "Tell me about your approach to financial planning." Does this person buy and sell securities. Does this person have a comprehensive, holistic approach? How often will we speak? Do you have an investment policy statement? Will you put together a financial plan?
- 4) "Will I be working with you personally or with another member of your team?" 5) "How much do you charge for your services?" Not just how much but "how?" There are many platforms, fee based, fee only, and commission.

According to Francavilla, if Americans took three small steps to protect themselves, they could

greatly minimize the possibility of being scammed.

- 1) Look in the mirror and tell yourself, "I can be scammed!" No one is impervious to being scammed or defrauded.
- 2) Resist the temptation to buy with emotion. Financial decisions have hard lines to them but when you buy out of greed or fear you are asking to be disappointed.
- 3) Remember in school when our teachers told us that "Knowledge is Power?" It was then and it is now. Bill knows that not everyone understands finance or even cares to understand financial planning, but he strongly encourages people to have at least a cursory understanding and appreciation for some of the language of financial services and some of the concepts. One need not be expert, but certainly conversant.

Naturally, there are many knowledgeable and honest advisors. But take the advice of someone in the know before you find yourself taken to the cleaners by the unscrupulous. Check out Bill Francavilla's website at wwwBillFrancavilla.com and his book goes into great detail on avoiding the risks. Just remember "The Madoff's Among Us" and BEWARE!

Through the generosity of the Citrus Heights Messenger, this column serves to provide an update about matters affecting the community of Citrus Heights.

On Wednesday, September 6th, the Board of Supervisors adopted our final budget for the 2017-2018 fiscal year. This was the first Sacramento County budget that I have participated in, so I wanted to share with you my thoughts. In short, I am pleased that we were able to fund so many vital programs and departments, but remain fearful that we lack the longterm vision for how to make us more fiscally responsible.

I believe we can improve our fiscal health by using a threetiered approach.

First, we need to focus on the most critical things that we provide and have the bravery to reject new programs and services that are of less vital importance. Earlier this year when I issued a survey of Citrus Heights it came back to show that the number one most important issue was public safety, closely followed by transportation (the number three issue, which was a distant

third, was business development). So let's put a heavy emphasis on funding our cops and our roads.

Second, we need to slow the growth of county government employees. Not only do county employees cost us money in terms of salary and benefits, but every employee we hire raises our unfunded pension liability, which is currently at a staggering \$1.2 billion. When the great recession hit, our reserves weren't high enough and we had to make massive cuts to the number of employees we have and significantly cut the level of service we provide. But now that we are climbing out of the recession, departments are trying to get back to their prerecession levels of employees. It seems obvious to me that our pre-recession levels were too high, and that we should make do with what we have. We currently have over 11,000 fulltime employees – I believe we can provide excellent service to Sacramento County without the need to greatly increase this number.

Last, we need to make a far greater investment into our reserves than we currently do. We have the lowest reserves out of any large county in California – so low that the second worst county is in six times better shape than us. If we had to rely solely on reserves, we would only have enough money to last us eight days. Unfortunately, our current policy of investing 10% of

our general fund increases will solve our problem in about 80 years. I propose we increase our investment to 40% each year, which will fix things in about 20 years.

Focusing mainly on critical programs, slowing the growth, and investing in reserves are incredibly difficult things to do. It is easy to agree to these in principle, but when it comes to actually making tough decisions, most elected officials cave to the pressure of wanting to make everyone happy. But in my opinion, making tough fiscal decisions like these is something regular citizens of Citrus Heights have to do on a daily basis – and so too should your elected representatives.

Finally, I want to invite everyone to my next Citrus Heights community meeting on October 27th at 7:30 am at Coco's Restaurant (7887 Madison Ave). It will be an opportunity for you to get an update from me, and to ask me any questions you may have.
