Citrus Heights HART Providing Local Solutions to a Local Issue

CITRUS HEIGHTS, CA (MPG) - Homelessness is a large and complicated challenge nationwide and especially here in the state of California. Per the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development, there are approximately 113,000 homeless individuals in California - 20% of all homeless people in the United States. California has the highest rate of unsheltered homeless -67%. 'Sacramento Steps Forward' reports that the 2015 Point in Time Homeless Count revealed 2,650 homeless persons experiencing homelessness.

Citrus Heights HART (Homeless Assistance Resource Team) a group of nonprofits, street ministries, service and government organizations, churches and others formed in 2015 to develop solutions on a local level. The group's

mission is to provide resources that will enable at-risk people and those experiencing homelessness in Citrus Heights and adjacent areas to become independent, self-sustaining and participating members of the community.

Surveys indicate that Citrus Heights homeless prefer to stay in the Citrus Heights area and this is most likely true of other areas as well. CH HART is one of three HART groups which includes Rancho Cordova and Elk Grove HART. Each HART focuses on its own programs to address local issues associated with homelessness.

Citrus Heights HART focuses on a few programs: Homeless Outreach Navigator, Stand Down event for homeless veterans and Winter Sanctuary. CH HART has worked with the City of Citrus Heights to develop and activate a homeless outreach navigator program. The Navigator assists homeless individuals in various ways by connecting them with available services. Most social and judicial services are in the urban core/downtown which presents a challenge and obstacle to homeless and at risk populations in the outer core (suburbs).

"In 2017, we plan to advocate more aggressively for County services to more conveniently and effectively address issues in the areas outside of downtown core," said Kathilynn Carpenter, founding member and Chair of CH HART.

CH HART held its first Stand Down event on March 30 of this year and assisted approximately 80 veterans with

Veteran's Affairs issues, legal services, medical, hair-cuts and showers, clothing, pet services and more. The second annual event is planned for April 18, 2017.

This past winter, CH HART participated in the Rancho Cordova Winter Sanctuary program and hosted a one week shelter at Holy Family Church. This winter, the group is hosting its own program and currently committed to four weeks beginning December 26.

The group has recently formed a Housing Committee to explore ways they can help with housing opportunities in more tangible ways through master leasing programs, transitional housing and other options.

Fire in Orangevale Home Displaces Family of Four

SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) - Just after 8:30 on November 18, Metro Fire crews were dispatched to the 9200 block of Lostwood Lane in Orangevale for a report of visible flames from the roof of a house. First arriving crews reported a working fire and immediately initiated fire attack. Firefighters located the fire, which had started in the chimney and spread to the attic, and extinguished it, while searching for victims, and ventilating the structure.

While first-in crews were putting out the fire, other firefighters focused on protecting

Firefighters, Sheriff's Officers and CHP Rescue 46 Year-old Woman

FAIR OAKS, CA (MPG) - Just after midnight on November 21, Metro Fire crews were dispatched to a home in Fair Oaks for a report of an overdose. When firefighters and Sheriff's officers arrived, the patient was no longer there. They attempted to locate her, but were unable to. After searching nearby streets, the officers pinged her cell phone, which showed it to be on the north side of the American River, near Hazel Avenue. Officers then requested the help of a California Highway Patrol helicopter, who used infrared technology to locate the woman, lying on a ledge above the river, in slippery terrain. As fire crews were en route to the new location, one of the officers climbed down the slope to make sure the woman didn't fall off the ledge.


The victim, a 46 year-old female, appeared to have rolled nearly 70 feet before stopping on a ledge a few feet above the water line. She had a decreased level of consciousness, not responding to verbal communication. Metro Fire's Rescue Task Force, with assistance from Folsom Fire, set up for a low angle rescue, using a second ambulance as the anchor. Once the rope system was in place, two rescuers were lowered to the ledge, where they quickly assessed her injuries and placed her in a rescue stretcher, so she could be safely hauled up the slope. The patient was then transported code 3 to a local trauma center.

"This rescue, with all its unique aspects, demonstrates how our public safety agencies work together to benefit the community," stated Metro Fire Battalion Chief Mark Repetto. "Sheriff's





Think about this too. If you buy a complex and live on the property, you'll have to set down and enforce some strict renter's guidelines. Living with renters can be tricky, because they'll have access to you 24 hours a day, and some of them will abuse the privilege. Then again, you'll have that kind of access to them as well. Not exactly a bad thing when Dave Says

you have people living in a complex you own.

Here's an option. What if you just bought a nice, inexpensive single family home for yourself? You wouldn't have the cash flow, but you will have the appreciation and a better chance of reselling down the road. Plus, if you want to invest further, there are always mutual funds.

Real estate plans work out just like you want them to only about half the time. Don't discount the risk and expense either! —Dave



Something came over me. To this day I cannot explain what in the world made me do what I did. But I did it and there it is.

I could tell the person who asked the question was in a hurry to get into the grocery store but I did it anyway. He asked me how I was and so I stopped him and told him how I was.

"I'm glad you asked," I started, "because I'm not feeling very well today." I noticed he was trying to get beyond me, but I was going to have my say no matter what.

"I hurt my big toe this morning, I think I broke a toenail. I've been limping all day long and I'm getting rather tired of it."

He looked at me and then glanced at the grocery store, but I pretended as if I did not see.

"I got up this morning," I continued as though I had nothing else in the world to do, "with my back hurting so much I could hardly get out of bed. I'm not so sure what happened, but boy does it really hurt."

He looked at his watch and then looked at the grocery store entrance again, but I continued to pretend I did not see it.

"My day hasn't gone very well," I complained to him, "I just seem to be late for everything. I missed my appointment at the doctor this morning and I'm not sure when I'm going to get back to see that doctor."

I could see he was getting very nervous and borderline agitated. He tried to interrupt me, but I pretended I did not notice.

"I don't know what I'm gonna do with my car. There's a big noise rattling in the engine and I'm not sure if I should take it in or what I should do with it."

"Well," he said rather anxiously, "I gotta get into the store." With that, he briskly walked away muttering.

I am sure he talked about that all they long to his friends. He probably thought I was crazy. Sometimes it is good to be crazy. After all, he is the one that asked me how I was. If he did not want to know how I was, why did he ask me how I was?

I chuckled to myself and then I got thinking about my prayer life. I wonder how many times I do that in my prayer life. I pray about something, but I really am not that interested in it.

I wonder if Jesus had this in mind when he said, "And all things, whatsoever ye shall ask in prayer, believing, ye shall receive" (Matthew 21:22).



FTB Responds To Gaines' Call to Help Victimized Veterans

SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) - Senator Ted Gaines (R-El Dorado) reported that, per his request, the Franchise Tax Board (FTB) has put into place a dedicated study team to evaluate the taxation of California National Guard Bonus repayments.

"I called on the FTB to create a special task force to aid California National Guard veterans who may need to file amended tax returns resulting from the resolution of this bonus scandal and am pleased to hear they are moving forward," said Senator Gaines. "I want these veterans to have FTB staff specifically dedicated to their plight so they are not mired in bureaucracy when trying to resolve their tax status. I appreciate the FTB working with these service men and women to ensure our

veterans are being honored for their service and not suffering from this betrayal at the hands of the Pentagon."

The FTB reports that they have reached out to the Internal

Revenue Service (IRS) requesting information on the IRS interpretation of the federal tax consequences of the bonus repayment and are awaiting a response.

The FTB is also awaiting the final decision from the Department of Defense regarding the repayment of bonuses. Once the appropriate information is received, the FTB will take action to notify taxpayers and tax professionals of the appropriate tax treatment.

Memories of Pearl Harbor Decades Later

CITRUS HEIGHTS, CA (MPG) - As the years pass the men that survived the attack on Pearl Harbor on December 7, 1941 dwindle. But there are those who were younger who remember it and it affected their lives in different ways. Betty Detri and Dorothy Phillips, volunteers at the Citrus Heights Veteran's Center share their memories.

Betty Detri, a junior in high school, had just turned 18 when Pearl Harbor was attacked. She lived in the city of Erie, Pennsylvania. Coming home from school that day, people were on their porches saying, "We're at war, we're at war". At home her family heard on the radio that President Roosevelt was already signing papers (to go to war) at the same time as the bombing was going on. The next day at school

teachers explained what was happening. Roosevelt had announced that men 18-55 years of age could be drafted so all the girls were upset. Many of her classmates enlisted in the Navy to avoid being drafted into the Army.

One older brother, Frank, was drafted into the Army at 18 years in 1941. He was serving at a base in Alaska when he became ill. He was returned to the U.S. where he died from cancer at age 20. Another brother, Sam joined the Navy and returned home safely following his service. Detri's husband Robert was drafted into to the Army in 1946, He served for a short tour, left the Army but then returned in 1950 until he retired in 1960 when they moved to

office of Bucyrus-Erie, one of the many defense plants on 12th & Cranberry Street in Erie. Bucyrus built 20 plus ton shovels sent overseas to construction units. She retired in 2008 after working this and many other jobs in Pennsylvania and California.

Detri's son, Thomas continued the family military tradition when he joined the Navy in 1978. serving for 28 years on several ships, including the USS Nimitz during the Iran and other Middle East conflicts. After one break in his service, he retired in 2006 as a full commander.

Dorothy Phillips was 15 years old in 1941, living in Springfield Missouri. Being too young to serve at 15, she had to wait until she graduated high school.

Her father had been a World War I veteran at 17 years old, having fought in France. She had watched so many of her high school friends join the service and she also wanted to be doing something worthwhile. Her 20th birthday was in March of 1945. With her parent's permission, Phillips joined the Navy WAVES (Women's Reserve) in June of 1945. She was in her boot training at Hunter

College in New York when the end of the war with Japan (VJ Day) was declared on August 14. The Navy asked new recruits if they would go to Hospital Corps School to work with the wounded returning home following the war. She agreed and following her six month training was sent to Jacksonville Naval Hospital in Jacksonville, Florida. She served there for one year.

Recently Phillips visited two monuments honoring Americans who had served and died for their country. She visited the USS Arizona in Hawaii and the U.S. Cemetery in Normandy, France. She was touched by the many granite crosses marking the thousands of graves of 'unknown soldiers' in Normandy. The crosses read, "Here Rests in Honored Glory a Comrade in Arms Known Only to God." Phillips said "it's just the most beautiful sight". \star

Arrests Made in Child Death
