


Detectives Seek Information on **36-Year-Old Double** Homicide Cold Case SACRAMENTO COUNTY, CA (MPG)

- On Saturday, July 26, 1980, a married couple was brutally murdered in their home located in the 8100 block of Donnawood Way in Orangevale. The victims, John and Christoria Bilkei (66 and 69-years-old respectively), each died as a result of numerous stab wounds. The crime scene indicated there had been a violent physical struggle between the victims and the suspect(s) prior to their murder. Detectives also believe items of personal property were taken from the couple's residence.

On behalf of the children and grandchildren of John and Christoria Bilkei the Sacramento County Sheriff's Department's Cold Case Team is asking for the public's help in solving this decades old case by identifying the suspect(s) who committed this senseless double murder thirty-six years ago.

Plastic Bags are OK!

CITRUS HEIGHTS, CA (MPG) -Sacramento County recently passed a couple new ordinances regarding the use of plastic bags and shopping carts in stores. There has been some confusion for our Citrus Heights businesses and we wanted to clarify that these new Sacramento County ordinances do not apply to Citrus Heights.

Sacramento County recently enacted a Single-Use Carryout Bag Ordinance. Starting July 1, 2016, businesses located in unincorporated Sacramento County must charge 10 cents per bag. This ordinance does not apply to Citrus Heights businesses located in the City's boundaries. Businesses in Citrus Heights may continue to

use plastic bags and not charge customers for their use. For further information, you may refer to an article on the Sacramento County's website (http://www. saccounty.net/BYOS/Pages/ default.aspx), which specifically states that the ordinance only applies to the unincorporated areas of Sacramento County.

In addition, late last year Sacramento County approved a new regulation aimed at reducing the nuisance and blight of abandoned shopping carts. The County now requires business owners who provide shopping carts for customers to submit an Abandoned Cart Prevention Plan outlining measures to be taken to eliminate the removal of carts from their premises. Although Citrus Heights is located in Sacramento County, we are an incorporated city.

Therefore, again, this ordinance only applies to areas in unincorporated Sacramento County. Citrus Heights stores are expected to manage and retrieve their shopping carts, but no specific plan is required to be provided by all business owners.

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Women's Empowerment Gains Grant from US Bank Foundation

Funds Will Help Sacramento Women And Children Break The Cycle Of Homelessness

SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) -Women's Empowerment has received \$26,500 from U.S. Bank Foundation's Community Possible program through a \$1,500 sponsorship of its recent gala and a \$25,000 grant to help homeless women in Sacramento find homes and jobs that support their families.



Women's Empowerment's initial eight-week program for women who are homeless in Sacramento provides women with free onsite child care in the group's child development center and transportation assistance. Each woman works with a master's level social worker to address her root causes of homelessness, attending classes on

job-readiness, confidence and empowerment. She receives health services, focuses on job readiness with her employment specialist and volunteer career mentor, and learns financial literacy. When she graduates after eight weeks, she can access Women's Empowerment's graduate services at any point in her life, which include certifications, counseling, GED preparation, access to a professional clothing closet, financial literacy, and paid job training through the group's Get A Job Kit Training and small business.

"Women's Empowerment provides the most comprehensive solution in Sacramento for women and children who are homeless," said Jessica Cook, district operations manager with U.S. Bank and a Women's Empowerment board member. "At U.S. Bank, we believe all people deserve the opportunity to dream, believe and achieve, including having a stable job and a home to call your own. 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
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Private school is busting savings Dear Dave,

Our three kids are enrolled in a private Christian school. It's a great place, and we truly believe our kids are getting a wonderful, faith-based education, but the tuition is pretty expensive. We've already had to start digging into our savings to make this happen, and the kids are only in elementary school. Should we keep them enrolled, or should we transfer them to public school?

- Maureen

Dear Maureen.

I understand wanting your kids to get the best education possible. Private schools can provide some advantages academically, while a good Christian school might offer spiritual advantages. But the bottom line is this: If you can't cash flow it, you shouldn't do it.

All of my kids went to public schools, and they are good,



moral people and strong Christians. In the process, they learned how to interact with people of all faiths, no faith, and how to display their faith and beliefs adequately in their personal lives and in the marketplace.

The truth is, you'll find great things and bad things in any school, private or public, Christian or not. And no matter where your kids go to school, as parents, you still have to teach them about the world — the good and the bad, the right and the wrong. Life can't be lived inside a protective bubble. —Dave

What's the deal with deferred comp? Dear Dave,

I work for a fire department in Mississippi, and I've been trying to get information on the state's deferred comp plan. No one here seems to know a lot about it, so I was wondering if I should keep looking for information or is it not worth the bother? - Brandon

Dear Brandon,

Deferred comp simply means you are electing to defer and receive a portion of your compensation at a later time or date. People who use these types of plans have a portion of their compensation withheld and directed into an investment of some kind instead, and you aren't taxed on it immediately. It's sort of like a pre-tax investment, but it's not transferrable to an IRA or 401(k).

I would only do deferred compensation after I've done everything else in terms of saving 15 percent of my income for retirement, including a Roth IRA. These are funded by after-tax dollars, but they grow tax-free. But I wouldn't do any of this until after I had paid off all my debt, except for my home, and had an emergency fund of three to six months of expenses in place.

Charisma. Do we really know what it is? We do know some people have it and let's be honest, others lack the "it" factor. cool, heavy, empowering, experienced, self-assured, level, predictable, intellectual, steady, fixed, competent.

DONALD TRUMP-Orange Charisma (Matches Einstein's type) Eccentric, unconventional, flexible, spontaneous, inspired, open, intelligent, skillful, unique, strange, different, odd, wild, unfixed, free, genius, risk-taker, novel, big-thinker, visionary, creative, careless, instinctual.

Need to include a couple of additional politicos who have influence this election like...

BERNIE SANDERS-Red Charisma (Matches Martin Luther King Jr's type) Revolutionary, authentic, radical, responsive, real, courageous, contrary, passionate, fearless, direct, forward, all-in, uncompromising, bold, willful, convinced, firm.

BARACK OBAMA-Blue Charisma (Matches Marilyn Monroe's type) Cool, charming, enchanting, smooth, receptive, attractive, magnetic, reserved, modest, enjoyable, hypnotic, melodic, nurturing, calm, responsive.

County Budget Balances Reinvestment, Fiscal Stability

SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) -During final budget hearings on September 7th, the Board of Supervisors reviewed and approved the Adopted Budget Documents for Fiscal Year 2016-17.

"The nearly \$4B budget, including \$2.4B in General Fund, is a good balance between investing in critical Health and Human Services and shoring up fiscal stability," said Chair of the Board Roberta MacGlashan. "We're also making a much needed General Fund investment of \$1.4 million towards a phasedin plan for improving roads in the unincorporated County."

The Health and Human Services areas slated for increased funding include Mental Health, Public Health, Child Protective Services, Alcohol and Drug Treatment, and Senior and Adult Services.

The fiscal stability funding includes meeting the Board's directive of placing 10 percent of the Available Fund Balance into a savings account for a rainy day, repaying transfers made at the height of the recession, and setting aside funds for major projects required in the coming years, including the mandated replacement of the Voter Registration IT system, and replacing the Assessor's Property Tax IT system. "Funding for these investments comes from a variety of discretionary, federal and state funds," said County Executive

Nav Gill. "In addition to putting aside prudent funds in reserves, we're making enhancements to key County services, including 72 positions in the Department of Health and Human Services, 40 of which are dedicated to Child Protective Services."

There's no such thing as a problem free life. As soon as I get problem A solved, problem B gets a promotion. Life is a school and problems are the curriculum. Every trial teaches us; every difficulty develops us. Many times when we have problems we think that God is punishing us or that we must be out of God's will because nothing is going right. The Bible teaches that God's will often include a positive use of problems in our lives. (1 Peter 4:12.19)

You are probably going through some problems right now that are really tough. What do you do when a problem is about to pull you under? There are four things you ought to remember. If you don't have a

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
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City of Citrus Heights Buries Time Capsule at New City Hall

CITRUS HEIGHTS, CA (MPG) - The City of Citrus Heights held its first city council meeting in its new chambers on September 8, 2016. The first order of business was the ceremonial burial of a 12'x 9'x4' time capsule holding decades of historical papers and other memorabilia.

The five pound stainless steel time capsule was initially purchased from Future Packaging and Preservation. It is scheduled to be opened in 2047, as part of the city's 50th anniversary celebration.

Prior to its interment, Management Intern and project manager Haley Reed, gave a Power Point presentation explaining the purchase of the time capsule and its contents preservation process. Reed explained how the contents were gathered, showing the long list of items included. The project was a collaborative effort with involvement from members of the History and Arts Commission, city staff and members of the community

Reed, who began the project in February, is a member of the History and Art Commission, and is

working on her Masters in History at Sacramento State.

Following the presentation, council member Sue Frost and Citrus Heights Police Lt. Jason Russo lowered the capsule into a space inside a corner of the counter in front of city council chambers. The heavy granite counter top was then placed over the capsule, which will be permanently sealed in at a later date.

A plaque to be attached in front of the capsule reads, "City of Citrus, January 1, 1997 - Time capsule to be opened January 2047 celebrating the 50th anniversary of the city of Citrus Heights."

Items included in the capsule reflect the first 20 years of the history of Citrus Heights plus the decades prior to its incorporation in 1997. Included are 'letters to the future', written by Mayor Jeannie Bruins, Police Chief Christopher Boyd, and City Manager Henry Tingle, to be read by the people of Citrus Heights in 2047. Bruins and Tingle also donated previous employee ID badges to the collection.

Two bricks from the former city hall complex are included. A small piece of a brick will also be presented to each city council member.

Important history from the beginning of Citrus Heights pre-cityhood will be found in signed copies of "Images of America" by James Van Maren, and "Ladies in White". Jim Van Maren's book, published in 2011 as part of the 'Images of America' series goes back over 150 years to the town's roots. Written in 2013 by historical archivist Teena Stern and Alice Fellos, "The Ladies Auxiliary" and "The Ladies in White" highlights the contributions of the women of Citrus Heights volunteer fire fighters during World War II, many continuing to work as emergency response volunteers until 1986.

Of her experience working on this project, Reed said in a text, "Working on the time capsule project has been a delight. At times I felt as if I was putting together an intricate historical puzzle which future Citrus Heights residents will piece together revealing a proud sense of community which has been deeply engrained in our past."



Clearly, the Fun Ship 2.0 upgrades Carnival Cruises has been making fleet-wide since 2011 are just a tease for something bigger and better. That something, the freshly christened, bar-raising Carnival Vista, comes to America in November.

It's indeed bigger; Carnival's first new ship in four years is the largest in the fleet for both passenger capacity (3,954) and tonnage (133,500). As for better, subjective as that descriptor is, the Vista makes a strong case having on one ship all the Fun Ship 2.0 refurbishments being added to the older vessels, ranging from concept bars and upgraded dining options to inventive entertainment offerings, along with industry firsts among the many new features on board.

At Carnival's invitation, I checked out the bright, shiny ship one sail after its maiden voyage. Exploring and observing from bow to stern, starboard to portside, here are observations made during the 10-day Mediterranean cruise:

First Impressions: Disconcerting as it was to walk onto a Carnival ship and not be awestruck by towering glass elevators, the three-story, vortexshaped DreamScape is a grand replacement of the atrium's signature piece. The HD LED tube changes graphics several times during a cruise, and is just

gorgeous. True to its name, the Vista was designed with views in mind; several dining venues have indoor-outdoor seating. Carnival's fun for all ages reputation is bolstered by new offerings for often underserved older teens and the cruise line's first-ever raft and watertubing adventure called Kaleid-O-Slide.

"America Rocks!," the third new show on the Carnival Vista, invigorates well-worn cruise show favorites from the likes of Bruce Springsteen, Kiss and Lynyrd Skynyrd. Even if the songs are tired at least the technical aspects and high-octane energy of the singers and dancers are mind-blowing.

Unique Accommodations: Carnival debuts two nifty "neighborhood" concepts with Vista. Family Harbor on Deck 2 offers staterooms that sleep up to five people and an exclusive lounge stocked with large-screen TVs, games, refreshments and a concierge. Carnival marketing says the new Havana Cabana suites (for guests 12 and older) on Deck 5 will make you feel like you're staying on an island resort. Believe the hype. The sense of going tropical is complements of special décor, a private lanai and exclusive access to the lively indoor-outdoor Havana Bar that serves complementary Cuban-style food during the day along with specialty coffees and cocktails.

Development Areas: For a new ship with the latest systems available, ventilation inside the casino is surprisingly poor. Exacerbating the problem is the inability to walk around the cloud of smoke when heading from the lobby to key food and entertainment venues on Deck 4. I can't recall another megaship that doesn't have an alternative path to circumvent the gaming area. Also, opting against traditional stadium seating in favor of individual chairs, the design of

tures. SportsSquare, already on the Breeze, Magic and Sunshine, is a fresh and colorful take on such shipboard recreational mainstays as basketball, mini-golf, foosball and ping pong. The equally all-ages SkyCourse, also on those other three ships, is an elevated ropes course featuring two levels of challenge. The best of the Fun Ship 2.0 upgrades are all present and accounted for. Branded bars specializing in rum and tequila drinks, and a cocktail "pharmacy" called Alchemy Bar are popular watering holes, and the best burgers on the high seas come off the grill at Guy's Burger Joint, created in partnership with celebrity chef Guy Fieri.

The Food: Nothing

on the ship beats those burgers, not even the surf and turf at the steakhouse, but if your heart is set on trying other fare, newer choices include Seafood Shack, serving up New England-style dishes for an upcharge at lunchtime. On the menu until its gone are fish caught on port days in indigenous waters, and you can even have that fish prepared for that night's dinner wherever you decide to dine. Dishes representing the region you just visited are part of nightly "Port of Call" specials in the main dining room,

That's Entertainment: Playlist Productions-branded shows, coming out of Fun Ship 2.0, put an end to cheesy stage shows with dazzling use of LED screens, contemporary choreography and actual music from this decade. Playlist's newest production, the movie-themed "Flick," had a triumphant world premiere


the 1,400-seat Liquid Lounge where the big production shows are staged is problematic. Without stationary chairs, people were configuring rows that essentially created barricades, removed natural aisles and gave some folks no leg room - a potential fire hazard. Also, only the two back rows are tiered and fastened, so line of sight was lousy for all but the very tall and those in the first rows.

Bon Voyage: Carnival's new flagship will spend the remainder of her inaugural season cruising the Mediterranean before embarking on a 13-day repositioning voyage to New York on Oct. 21. With the ship's second cruise out of the Big Apple in November, Carnival Vista will
