

Citrus Heights Police Celebrate Tenth Anniversary

CITRUS HEIGHTS, CA (MPG) - It was ten years ago, June 26, 2006, that Citrus Heights Mayor Jeannie Bruins says the city "created something out of nothing." It was on that date that the city started their very own police department. For the first six years following Citrus Heights' incorporation, the city contracted with the Sacramento County

Sheriff's Department for law enforcement services. Hundreds of police, family members, volunteers, interns, explorers, and citizen supporters

packed the Citrus Heights Community Center auditorium to observe the decade milestone and to honor those who contributed to the success of the department.

The youngest attendee was two weeks old. The oldest was, . . . well, . . . old.

A good portion of the Citrus Heights community turned out to honor what Chief Christopher Boyd described as "the greatest men and women law enforcement has to offer."

Promotions were announced and medals were presented to those who performed outstanding acts of heroism or selflessness.

Seized in Search SACRAMENTO REGION, CA (MPG) -The California Attorney General's Tax Recovery and Criminal Enforcement (TRaCE) Task Force served seven search warrants in the capital region turning up hundreds of boxes of foreign pharmaceuticals and thousands of articles of suspected counterfeit

U.S. Immigration and Customs Enforcement's (ICE) Homeland Security Investigations (HSI), the California Department of Public Health's Food and Drug Branch, Franchise Tax Board, and Department of Justice eCrime Unit assisted in the June 21, 2016 operation that involved more than 50 agents and investigators.

"The trafficking of counterfeit goods poses a triple threat," said Ryan Spradlin, the special agent in charge who oversees HSI operations throughout northern California. "Such activities deliver shoddy and often dangerous goods into the economy, rob Americans of good-paying jobs, and generate proceeds that are often funneled back into other criminal enterprises. HSI will continue to work with its enforcement partners to combat the distribution of counterfeit products, like those seized in Sacramento yesterday, that could put unwitting consumers at risk.'

to the underground economy in Northern California, and that makes yesterday's raid a win for our whole state," said Board of Equalization Chairwoman Fiona Ma, whose district includes West Sacramento, one of the communities where the raids occurred. "I want to thank the hardworking agents and investigators who spent months of painstaking work in shutting down these illegal operations."

"This action was a big blow

"Illegal activities hurt legitimate businesses and inflict unfair costs on law-abiding Californians," said Board of Equalization Member George Runner. "Law enforcement deserves a huge thank you for their ongoing efforts to fight the underground economy." This warrant follows months

of investigation into the sale of illegal foreign prescription and over-the-counter pharmaceuticals and counterfeit clothing by a couple and their adult son. Inside the family's homes and three area businesses - Fashion Moda in North Highlands, Victoria's Health Products in Citrus Heights, and Elena's Health Products in West Sacramento – investigators discovered and confiscated the foreign pharmaceuticals, clothing, and more than \$10,000 in cash.

The Tax Recovery and Criminal Enforcement Task Force (TRaCE) is comprised of public officials from the California Department of Justice, Board of Equalization, Franchise Tax Board, Department of Alcoholic Beverage Control, Employment Development Department, Department of Motor Vehicles, Federal Bureau of Investigation, U.S. Immigration and Customs Enforcement's Homeland Security Investigations, and the Santa Ana Police Department.

The Explosive Dangers of "Honey Oil"

What Sounds Like An Organic Food Supplement Puts Lives And Property At Risk

SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) -California Fire Departments, the Firefighters Burn Institute and burn prevention organizations in the state, are hoping to publicize the growing danger of so-called, "Honey Oil."

Honey Oil, (also called BHO/ Butane Hash Oil, Weed Oil, and Dab among other names) is a residue created when parts of the marijuana plant are soaked in a solvent, or blasted with butane gas. The result is a substance consumed by smoking, eating, or vaporizing. It produces an extremely potent high but the process of making it is extraordinarily dangerous.

The solvents and gases used to produce Honey Oil are extremely flammable. Clothing becomes saturated with the vapors and can easily ignite, causing severe and fatal burns. Only 300 milliliters of ignited butane vapors can reach 3,500-degrees Fahrenheit. About 10-ounces has enough explosive force to blow up a room. Fumes from the processing can cause a blast capable destroying a 3-bedroom home. Neighboring homes are obviously at risk.

While the health and safety

risks of smoking marijuana are debatable, there is NO safe method for producing Honey Oil. Unfortunately, the paraphernalia necessary to create it are legal, and easily obtained.

In Colorado, in 2014, there were 32 explosions from the manufacturing of Honey Oil. The Sacramento Bee reports that Shriners Hospital for Children in Northern California has treated nearly 70 victims for Honey Oil related burns and the average child was burned on nearly 30-percent of their body. Reports tell us in one recent 14-month period, some 20 "cooks" and bystanders were treated at burn centers in Southern California for catastrophic injuries, a toll worse than from meth labs.

The public needs to be aware of the risks, and be on the lookout for materials that indicate Honey Oil manufacturing. For example, 300 ML cans of refined butane in any quantity. These are marketed for the refilling of cigarette lighters. Look for canisters in bedrooms, and E-cigarette vapor pens which are used to smoke Honey Oil. A missing turkey baster could be a clue.

Along with PVC pipe and glass tubes, it's used for extraction. A Pyrex dish is used to capture the product.

Even if family members are not involved, someone close by could be. Laws have been proposed that would make manufacturing the drug in residential neighborhoods an aggravated felony. Butane is odorless; a requirement to add a smell could tip off residents that it's being made. Limiting its sale and possession could help stall manufacturing. Unfortunately, legislative efforts have stalled in Sacramento. Public pressure on the Governor's Office, State Senate and Assembly could help turn that legislation into

Bera Calls on Scott Jones to Reverse **His Position on Terror Watch and Guns**

ELK GROVE, CA - Today, (June 15, 2016) the Bera Campaign called on Sheriff Scott Jones to immediately reverse his dangerous opposition to legislation that would ban those on terror watch and no-fly lists from purchasing guns.

Jones stated his opposition to closing the loophole that allows suspects on the FBI terror watch list to buy guns during a January interview, where he claimed the bill has "numerous faults" and would only "make a few people feel better."

"Scott Jones' radical position against limiting gun sales to those on the terror watch list is dangerous, and puts him at odds with California law enforcement, the gun lobby, and even some Congressional Republicans," said Congressman Bera's campaign manager, Jerid Kurtz. "Taking steps to keep guns out of the hands of terrorists is a no-brainer, so Jones should immediately reverse his position and stop playing politics with commonsense gun safety reforms."

The Bera campaign's call to Jones comes as members of the United States Senate filibuster in support of the "no-fly, no-buy" terror watch list gun reform bill, and the National Rifle Association (NRA) announces that they believe "that terrorists should not be allowed to purchase or possess firearms, period."

"I've been a strong supporter of preventing suspects on the FBI's terror watch list from buying guns, and I've co-sponsored legislation in Congress to do just that," said Representative Ami Bera. "I'm proud to co-sponsor the bipartisan bill to close the 'no fly, no buy' loophole, and it's a common-sense step forward in keeping our families safe that is long overdue."

Republicans other than Jones, including Donald Trump, Senators Pat Toomey, Angus King, Susan Collins, and John Cornyn, have recently indicated a willingness to discuss efforts to close the gun loophole. Also, Republican Representatives Peter King, Robert Dold, Jr., and Daniel Donovan are sponsoring the no-fly, no-buy bill to close the terrorist watch loophole that Rep. Bera has been working to pass.

Today in a release, even the NRA stated, "Anyone on a terror watchlist who tries to buy a gun should be thoroughly investigated by the FBI and the sale delayed while the investigation is ongoing. If an investigation uncovers evidence of terrorist activity or involvement, the government should be allowed to immediately go to court, block the sale, and arrest the terrorist."

If so many people and groups can see the need for commonsense action to keep guns out of the hands of terrorists, why can't Scott Jones?

official statement on the terrorist attack in Orlando was an extremely weak press release that labeled it a mass shooting, not an act of terrorism. Bera's lack of leadership and apparent lack of understanding of the threat that our nation faces from Islamist jihadist ideology is one of the main reasons that community leaders came to Sheriff Jones and asked him to enter the race for Congress," said Jones consultant Dave Gilliard.

"Today, (June 16, 2016) Sheriff Jones sent a letter to Congressman Bera, challenging him to a debate on the issue of National Security and Counter-Terrorism. Congress will soon leave Washington for their annual summer recess, so there should be no problem finding a date when Congressman Bera will be in the district and available to debate," said Gilliard.

Oldest Living Female Veteran Honored by American Legion and American Legion Auxiliary

CITRUS HEIGHTS, CA (MPG) - Lynn Balmer is 108 years old, going on 109. She was recently honored as the oldest female veteran still alive in the United States, and the oldest living female member of the American Legion in the country.

Balmer was a Lieutenant in the US Coast Guard, working Intelligence during WWII. She was a high school math teacher in 1942 in Albany, CA when she answered the call by her government for mathematicians able to read and interpret weather maps and charts. She worked out of a secret base in Connecticut helping to safely navigate US ships on the least dangerous route from the United States to England. Upon discharge in 1945, she moved to Seattle, Washington where she met and married her husband, Charles Balmer.

Balmer was honored in April by American Legion Post 709, Rancho Cordova where she is a member, as the oldest living member of the American Legion. She is also the oldest American Legion Auxiliary member in the United States, receiving a lifetime membership from Auxiliary Unit Citrus 637. Niece Brenda Hicks of Citrus Heights describes her great aunt as still being "as bright as can be."

Lynn was also a professional ice skater, performing in the

Ice Capades before and after WWII.

Balmer's nephew, Ken Hicks of Citrus Heights, describes his aunt as "an extremely sharp woman."

She now resides in a care facility in Chico, CA. As

a graduate of Chico State University, Balmer also holds the distinction of being the oldest living graduate of any of the California State Universities. She will be 109 in September.

The Medal of Valor was presented to Sgt. Jason Baldwin, Officer Chrystal Battaglia, Officer Nathan Culver, and Officer Kyle Shoberg. The Distinguished Service Medal was presented to Sgt. Nineteen newer officers were officially sworn in, although the rite was strictly ceremonial, since most have already been on the job for the past year.

In 2006, the first order of business had been to hire a police chief. Christopher W. Boyd answered the call and has headed the department since the very beginning. Chief Boyd noted at the anniversary celebration that they launched the original recruiting effort even before they had the materials to equip the officers they hoped to hire. "We had to convince recruits to join a department that had not even been created yet," he said. It was a scramble to gather the gear to

arm and mobilize the new hires and put them to work for the community.

It took six months to hire the first 90 sworn officers. That is the current number, as well. In all, 140 people make up the department today, from the person who answers the telephones to the officer who shows up at the scene of some unpleasantness.

The result of the Citrus Heights Police Department's community involvement concept has had a measurable benefit. "The crime rate has gone down year by year," Mayor Bruins said of the ten years since the police

department was created.

Now, a decade later, Chief Boyd told the audience, "there are no people of greater character than the officers of the Citrus Heights Police Department." He stressed that the job of a cop goes beyond the hazards they often face. It includes relating to the community on an everyday basis. It is the diplomat behind the badge worn by the men and women of the department who are "working to make Citrus Heights a better and safer community" that has endeared them to the citizens they are sworn to

imposing their own unconstitutional decrees.





Invest in Chandler

I'm 19 years old, and I'm putting myself through college debt-free. I usually work part time during the semesters, but right now I'm working full time. I have about \$2,000 in mutual funds, and I was wondering if I should add my full-time work income to that or save it all to help pay for school.

Wow! Great job, man! I appreciate that you're looking toward the future with your investment, but right now I want you to invest in you. I want you to make sure, first and foremost, that you graduate college debtfree. So, if I'm in your shoes, I'm piling up the cash to pay for

You're in a season of your life where things are more hectic than you probably ever dreamed they could be. My advice is to keep that money liquid. Keep it available and on hand, and don't tie it up in mutual funds at the moment. You'll have plenty of time to continue investing once you graduate.

It's best for you to concentrate on finishing school, then landing a job and finding a place to live after college. Even if you end up living in the same place for a while, starting life in the real world takes money, so let's make sure you can make that happen. In other words, Chandler, as long as you do something with your education and that education is in an area that's useable, you are a better investment than mutual funds right now!

Unless there's some sort of disability that's prevented your son from working part time over the last few years, I've got to agree with your husband on this. Your son needs a car, but he also needs to get off his butt and work for it. If you get this car for him, you're just teaching him that mommy and uncle will take care of everything. When you and your husband first started out in life, I'm guessing you didn't start out rich. Am I right? It's not really the car deal that's the problem here; it's the lesson that will be learned. At his age, it's silly for him not to want to work for a car, and you and your husband need to be up in his face about that. Then, if he chooses not to work for a car, he can walk. He shouldn't be rewarded for showing no desire to go earn things and make stuff happen.

When my son was around that age and wanting a car, he was working his tail off around my office packing boxes and painting stairwells. That's how you learn about the benefits of hard work. Are you looking to start a news business? Maybe you want to turn a hobby into a payday. But money is scarce, right? Well, I spoke with Roberto Fiebig, President and CEO of Tigre Capital on POPPOFF, and he shared six effective way to raise money for your venture.

1) HOW MUCH CAPITAL DO I NEED? Although many resources provide information on starting a business with little or no money in the bank, remember that if something sounds too good to be true, it probably is. Don't be misled by the popular literature. Having little or no capital is a primary reason why businesses fail.

2) HOW DO I RAISE NEW CAPITAL? The most common source of startup capital is the business owner him or herself in the form of credit card advances, home equity loans, and loans from family members. Federal and state governments sponsor numerous subsidized loans and grants for startups through the Small **Business Administration and its** counterparts on the state level.

3) WHAT IS THE VALUE OF MY **COMPANY?** The value of a company is important because it is the basis for determining the "cost" of the new capital when seeking equity additions to the capital structure. Simply explained, a company with a \$1 million valuation and no debt seeking a new capital of \$1 million would be worth \$2 million after the investment. The old owners would own 50% of the new \$2 million company (for their contribution of the old company with a \$1 million value), while the new investors would also own 50% interest for their contribution of \$1 million cash.

4) WHO MIGHT BE INTERESTED IN INVESTING IN MY **COMPANY?** As the amount of the funds needed increases, you will be required to access an increasingly sophisticated investor seeking maximum return for assuming the risk of a new venture. Family and friends are typically the first group sought by business owners seeking capital. They are less discriminating than professional investors, and are more likely to invest due to the relationship than the economics of the business proposal. On the other hand, family investors bring their own set of problems, including the possibility of strained relations if the investment fails.

5) WHAT ARE MY LEGAL RESPONSIBILITIES TO **POTENTIAL INVESTORS?**

Generally, business owners seeking funds from individual investors are required to provide forms and specific factual information in understandable language to potential investors so they have the ability to evaluate the investment and determine whether it is right for them. Offerings and continued legal obligations of companies to their investor owner are regulated through the US Securities Act of 1933 and the Securities Exchange Act of 1934.

6) HOW DO I NEGOTIATE A WIN-**WIN AGRREMENT?** A funding event, whether for a startup or an ongoing operation, involves two parties: the investor and the company. In some cases there is a single investor; in others, multiple investors. In the latter case, such as a crowdfunding event, the investors participate as a unit, each sharing a portion of the same investment. In some cases, funding is takeit- or-leave- it; in others, there is intense negotiation. In each case, the parties strive to reach

Sacramento County DA Reports

Defendant Convicted of Attempted Rape, Assault, Robbery of Elderly Woman; Defendant Convicted for Series of Rapes; Defendant Sentenced for 3-Month Crime Spree

The Honorable Richard Suevoshi sentenced Carlton Beard to 15 years in prison. On February 24, 2016, a jury convicted Beard of two counts of

On July 17, 2015, the victim rented a motel room for Beard, who was homeless at the time. He asked the victim to help him rent a room so he did not have to sleep on the streets. After checking into the room, Beard forcibly raped the victim two times.

DATE: April 22, 2016 CASE: Mitchell Leahy PROSECUTOR: Deputy District Attorney Megan Eixenberger, Career Criminal Prosecution Unit

The Honorable Donald Currier sentenced 35-yearold Mitchell Leahy to 17 years, 4 months in prison. On March 14, 2016, a jury convicted Leahy of firstdegree robbery with use of a firearm, first-degree burglary, and grand theft of a firearm.

On August 29, 2013, Ryan Yarbrough returned to his Folsom home and saw that his sliding glass door had been taken off the tracks. Mr. Yarbrough discovered he was missing a .45 caliber semi-automatic handgun, a .40 caliber semi-automatic firearm, and his grandfather's retirement ring from the Oakland Police Department. Fingerprints lifted from the sliding glass door matched Leahy.

On September 2, 2013, Vickie Lovingood returned to her Orangevale home and noticed her French doors were open. When she entered one of the bedrooms, she saw a man rummaging through her dresser drawers. He was also holding one of her tote bags that appeared to be full of items. When confronted, the man reached towards his waistband and pulled out a gun. Mrs. Lovingood backed away and the man fled. Fingerprints lifted from the French doors matched Leahy.

On October 25, 2013, Mrs. Lovingood contacted the Sacramento County Sheriff's Department to report a man she saw in a news report of a burglary in Granite Bay looked like the man she saw in her house. The Granite Bay burglary took place on October 23, 2013. A 14-year-old girl was home alone at the time and called 911 when she realized a man was attempting to enter the house through a sliding glass door. Leahy was located nearby. Detectives found burglary tools, a firearm, jewelry and other property belonging to multiple victims in his truck.

DATE: June 24, 2016 CASE: Joseph McKeever **PROSECUTOR:** Deputy District Attorney Bruce Chang, Adult Sexual Assault Prosecution Unit Joseph McKeever was convicted by a jury of attempted rape, assault to commit rape during the commission of a residential burglary, and home invasion robbery. The jury also found true the

crimes were committed against an elderly victim.

McKeever saw the 72-year-old victim walking her dog in the Foothill Farms area of Sacramento. He followed the victim to her home and forced his way into her residence. When the victim tried to escape, McKeever punched her in the face, grabbed her arms, and threw her on the ground. McKeever then got on top of the victim, choked her, and sexually assaulted her. McKeever also took \$900 in cash from her purse.

When McKeever's mother recognized a composite sketch she saw on the news as her son, she called the Sacramento County Sheriff's Department to report her son was the suspect.

McKeever faces a maximum potential sentence of 14 years to life in prison. Sentencing is set for August 19, 2016, at 10:00 a.m. in Department 41 before the Honorable Helena Gweon.

DATE: June 24, 2016 CASE: Jose Gomez-Garcia PROSECUTOR: Deputy District Attorney Matthew Chisholm, Adult Sexual Assault Prosecution Unit

Jose Gomez-Garcia was convicted by a jury of six felony counts of forcible rape, two felony counts of forcible sodomy, and one felony count of forcible oral copulation. The jury also found true a multiple victim enhancement on eight counts.

From June 2002 to October 2002, Gomez-Garcia raped three women by force. Each victim was taken to a deserted warehouse parking lot and violently raped. Two of the victims were sodomized. Gomez-Garcia controlled each victim by grabbing them around the neck and making threats. All three victims immediately reported the sexual assaults to law enforcement. DNA recovered from each of the victims was analyzed by the District Attorney's Crime Lab. The three cases were linked to each other, but not to a suspect.

In 2004, Gomez-Garcia was arrested for illegal re-entry after deportation, which resulted in a federal felony conviction. While in custody, federal authorities collected Gomez-Garcia's DNA. In 2010, there was a DNA hit to Gomez-Garcia, who by that time had been deported to Mexico. Extradition proceedings were initiated and he was returned to Sacramento in 2014 to face these charges. Gomez-Garcia has a prior 1998 strike conviction

for shooting into an inhabited dwelling.

He faces a maximum potential sentence of 261 vears to life in prison. Sentencing is set for August 18, 2016, at 9:00 a.m. in Department 24 before the Honorable Shelleyanne Chang.







Tale of Two Rallies

In 1978, I stood in line for six hours to be among the first to ride the Colossus at Magic Mountain amusement park. In 1980, I arrived to an Orange County cinema six hours early to be the first to see "The Empire Strikes Back." In 1984, on a movie set near Hollywood, waiting six hours beside a talent trailer scored me an autograph from Clint Eastwood.

So when it was announced that Donald Trump and Hillary Clinton were coming to Sacramento to hold political rallies last month, I knew exactly how early I'd need to get in line. If six hours was the sweet spot for a rollercoaster, sci-fi movie and A-list celebrity, then that strategy to optimize a bucket list experience should be sound for the Republican and Democratic presidential candidates. And it was. For Trump's rally at the Sacramento Jet Center and Clinton's at Sacramento City College, I was among the first 25 regular people to brave the elements – near-100-degree heat, profane protesters, line-cutters, etcetera – in hopes of getting as close as

possible to the next president of the United States.

Considering how polarizing the two candidates are, it could very well be that my youngest son and I were the only people outside some of the local media and police to attend both rallies. Doing so guaranteed seeing a future president, and being able to share the dual experience with my youngest voting in his first major election was beyond special. My wife, a social studies teacher at Gold River Discovery Center, was bummed to miss Trump's Wednesday rally due to commitments, but she did make Clinton's Sunday event.

Having attended both, and making observations while wiling away the hours in both lines, I feel qualified to do a compare and contrast of the two political rallies. With no bias, here are my takeaways:

Crowd

Trump: Estimated at 9,600. Standing in the scorching sun caused one person

Clinton: Estimated at 1,500. Two people needed medical attention inside the sweltering gym.

Punctuality

Trump: The Republican candidate spoke 15 minutes early.

Clinton: Clinton took to the stage 70 minutes late. No one, including the tardy Democratic candidate, offered an apology.

Protesters

Trump: Dozens of dissenters showed up at Trump's, screaming accusations of bigotry. One guy wearing a hate-mongering sandwich board walked up and down alongside the lengthy cue with megaphones that amplified recorded messages that called Trump's supporters "idiots and a**holes." I heard a little girl, one of many young children in line, ask her mom, "What is that man saying?" I never heard a discouraging word from a Trump backer; the only hate came from those professing love. A young woman held up

a sign that read, without asterisks, "F**k Trump – Vote for Hillary."

Clinton: One man quietly held signs saying "BILLARY IS A FRAUD" and "STILL LIKE OIL WARS?" No pro-Trump protesters were spotted.

Warm-Up Speakers

Trump: Former Congressman Doug Ose and Scott O'Grady, the U.S. Air Force pilot who was shot down over war-torn Bosnia and survived by hiding alone in the woods for seven days in June of 1995 before being saved by American forces.

Clinton: Congresspeople Doris Matsui and John Garamendi, Sacramento Mayor Kevin Johnson and his successor, Darrell Steinberg. A new graduate of St. Francis High School, a private institution with yearly tuition of \$17,000, declared Clinton as "the voice of the little people" before telling the audience that she's bound for Santa Clara University, where tuition is \$43,000. Service Employees International Union Local 1000 President Yvonne Walker also spoke, telling the mixed-gender crowd, "If you want to get things done, always go with a woman."



wearing a hate-mongering sandwich board walked up and down alongside the lengthy cue with megaphones that amplified recorded messages.

As supporters went wild, I imagined the barbs Trump would get if he ever said, "If you want to get things done, always go with a man." Last I checked Clinton hadn't disavowed Walker's sexist comment and no men's group has asked for the union leader's resignation.

Patriotism

Trump: An advance speaker led the crowd in the Pledge of Allegiance, which

the thousands did to a large American flag hung especially for the event on the inside back wall of the hanger. Live and recorded patriotic music played for hours before Trump's dramatic arrival by personal jet.

Clinton: No Pledge of Allegiance, no patriotic music, but Mayor Johnson led the crowd in a chant: "... One state, no sweat; two states all set; three states she's our bet; California, better yet!"

Veteran Support

Trump: Two rows of seats at the very front were reserved for veterans. Waiting for them on their chairs were a Trump sign and T-shirt. Once seated, they were offered cold water by volunteers. During the rally they were also recognized for their service.

Clinton: Clinton asked if any veterans were in the crowd and four raised their hand.

osters

Trump: Besides what was held up by the confrontational and oftentimes vulgar anti-Trump protesters, seen among the crowd were posters that read, "LATINOS 4 TRUMP" and "FBI INDICT CROOKED HILLARY."

Clinton: Homemade signs were not allowed per Hillary for America rules on the invitation and at the door. However, dozens of campaign-made posters written in red, white and blue paint were handed out by Clinton's staff to members of the crowd standing on risers behind the stage. Campaign staff seemed to match each poster to a desired demographic; e.g., an "I'M WITH HER!" sign went to a man, another reading "RISE TOGETHER" went to a woman. Two young girls behind the podium, perfectly positioned for the cameras, were handed a poster that said "FIGHTING FOR US." Moments later a staffer took that sign away from the girls and gave it to a man three rows up. Based on how choreographed the sign distribution and people placing were, I wouldn't be surprised if someone was concerned about children condoning any type of "fighting."

Despite the hours of investment and standing like veal calves with virtually no mobilization once inside the baking venues, I'd do it all again. And with Clinton's double-digit lead narrowing in the California polls, chances are good that both major candidates will return to the Sacramento area before the November general election. When they do, the sparks will surely fly and I'll be there to see them six hours early.

FBI Announces \$50,000 Reward to Identify East Area Rapist/Golden State Killer

40 Year-Old Cold Case Unites Law Enforcement Agencies in the Hunt for Subject Who Stalked Citizens in Multiple California Counties

SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) -The Federal Bureau of Investigation, Sacramento County Sheriff's Department, Sacramento County District Attorney's Office, and Contra Costa Sheriff's Department held a press conference to announce the launch of a reward and national campaign to help identify the East Area Rapist/Golden State Killer, a violent serial burglar, rapist, and murderer who terrorized multiple communities in California throughout the 1970s and 1980s.

The digital media campaign includes the launch of a webpage, www.fbi.gov/EastAreaRapist digital billboards throughout the country; social media outreach on Twitter, Facebook, and YouTube; and audio broadcasts via podcasts and radio PSAs. The public can play an active role in helping law enforcement find the subject by sharing links to the website and official social media content.

Law enforcement asks the public to consider the following information when reviewing information about the case: Did they live in one of the areas of criminal activity and remember someone in the area who matches the physical description of the subject or may have been known to spend a considerable amount of time in the areas? Have they discovered a hidden collection of items among the belongings of a friend or family member notably coins and jewelry—as described on the FBI webpage about the crimes?

The subject, who may be 60-75 years old now, was described as a White male standing approximately five

feet, ten inches tall, with blond or light brown hair and an athletic build. He may have had an interest or training in military or law enforcement techniques as he was familiar and proficient with firearms.

People who know the subject may not believe him capable of such crimes. He may not have exhibited violent tendencies or have a criminal history.

Detectives have DNA evidence from some of the crime scenes which can either positively link or exclude a suspect. This enables investigators to quickly exclude innocent parties and the public should not hesitate to provide information—even if it is the name or address of an individual who resided in the areas of the crimes—as many parties will be quickly excluded by a simple, non-invasive test.

Between 1976 and 1986, this single subject committed 12 homicides, approximately 45 rapes, and multiple residential burglaries in the state of California. All of the crimes have been linked by DNA and/or details of the crimes. His victims ranged in age from 13 to 41 and included women home alone, women at home with

their children, and couples. The subject was active in the greater Sacramento area from June 1976 to February 1978. Burglaries and rapes began occurring in the Sacramento area during the summer of 1976. During these crimes, the subject would ransack the homes of his victims and take small items such as coins, jewelry, and identification. These cases include the homes of families, couples, and single women; burglaries in a neighborhood tended to precede

clusters of sexual assaults. On February 2, 1978, Rancho Cordova couple Sergeant Brian Maggiore and his wife, Katie, were on an evening walk with their dog, chased by the subject who overcame the couple, and shot at close range.

His activity continued primarily in the East Bay Area of Northern California in 1979 and, by October 1979, his activity escalated into rapes and homicides/attempted homicides along the California Coast with homicides in Goleta (October 10, 1979, December 3, 1979, and July 27, 1981), Ventura (March 16, 1980), Laguna Niguel (August 19, 1980), and Irvine (February 6, 1981 and May 5, 1986). During the commission of the homicides, the subject tied up both victims, raped the female victim, and then murdered the couple.

After July of 1981, no associated incidents are known to have been reported for five years. In 1986, an 18-year-old woman was raped and murdered in Irvine. No additional crimes have been connected to the subject after this incident.
