

Connecting the visual image of the poppy with the sacrifice of service made by our veterans has been an important goal of the American Legion Auxiliary Poppy Program since its inception in 1921. During the month of May, prior to Memorial Day, millions of red crepe paper poppies — all hand made by veterans as part of their therapeutic rehabilitation — are distributed across the country. Auxiliary members gather and spend hours each year opening and preparing hundreds of poppies for their unit's fundraising programs. 

Founded in 2011 by local college student Courtney Hvostal in honor of her brother who was severely injured in Afghanistan, the Wounded Veteran Run has quickly become a favorite annual Memorial Day event for the community. In 2012, Aerojet Rocketdyne joined as the run's title sponsor. Last year's event drew more than 4,000 participants and supporters, raising more than \$75,000 for the veteran support groups. Sacramento Jazz Society Supports the Blind Community

SACRAMENTO AREA, CA (MPG) - It is well known to most Northern California residents that every Memorial Day weekend since 1974 the Sacramento Traditional Jazz Society (STJS) has brought four days of musical talent to Sacramento. This year the festival will be held May 27th through May 30th.

What few residents know is that the STJS has supported the local blind community in enjoying this event for over 30 years. They have worked hard to bring the low vision and blind into the world of music, including providing free tickets to the event — now known as the Sacramento Music Festival — and by creating and providing free festival programs in Braille.

Citrus Heights resident Elena Thomason is a longtime member of the Valley of the Blind, a social group for blind Sacramento area residents that meets monthly. She is president of Equal Access and Associates and works with STJS to make the music experience a good one for members. She wants the *Continued on page 3*

Amgen Tour Brings Overall Finish to Sacramento

SACRAMENTO. CA (MPG) - Sacramento County is proud to host, for the very first time, the overall finish stage of the 11th annual Amgen Tour of California, the largest cycling event in the United States. On May 22nd, Sacramento will be abuzz with both the men's and women's finishing stages of the tour.

The final stage comes after the riders' cycle throughout California, kicking-off in San Diego May 15, ending at the Capitol building on May 22nd. The nearly 800 mile tour will end with an 84-mile Final Stage highlighting the beauty of the Sacramento region. The riders will travel along the Sacramento River through the delta and cross the iconic Tower Bridge twice before crossing the finish line around the Capitol building.

"Sacramento County is proud to welcome the 2016 Amgen Tour of California back to our capital region. We're excited to showcase the most beautiful areas of the County and celebrate the tour finale here in California's capital." said Supervisor Roberta MacGlashan, Chair, Sacramento County Board of Supervisors.

Sacramento County is also home to Stage 6 of the men's race and Stage 2 of the women's race. Both events will ride through the City of Folsom on Friday, May 20th.

public to know how STJS has been making a difference for this often ignored segment of society through this open letter previously shared with her members.

"When I first moved to Sacramento in the late '70's I was amazed at how the entire community seemed to get so excited about the annual Sacramento Jazz Jubilee. It was all over the community, on T.V. and radio, and folks talked about it everywhere I went. I didn't share in this excitement as I didn't much like jazz and couldn't imagine spending four days immersed in it.

"In 1984 some colleagues of mine invited me to go to the Jubilee with them. Since I really liked this group of friends, I decided to go check it out and if nothing else, I'd enjoy my time with them. I have never missed a Jubilee since that year!

"The following year I went to the Jubilee with another blind friend. I found it very confusing as there were bands playing all over town at all different times. I realized that the event would be far more enjoyable if there was a Braille program available.

"I contacted the STJS and in 1986 the first Braille program was made available free of charge to any blind person requesting one. Also, realizing that blind people might need another ticket (for a guide) to get from one part of town to another, STJS provided two-for-one passes. Buy one and get two.

"A few months ago I again contacted Tom Duff, Executive Director of the STJS and told him about the Valley of the Blind and all the things we do in our community. I asked him if they might provide free passes for us. Just last week Mr. Duff delivered 40 free passes to my office. Also, I have received the (music festival program) files online and am working on convert them into Braille again this year.

"The Jazz Jubilee is now called the Sacramento Music Festival but it is still sponsored by the STJS. Along with the name change, STJS has expanded the event to include other forms of music such as the blues, country and rock. There's

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
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Condos Are Fine, But Do Your Research Dear Dave.

I know when it comes to investing you like mutual funds and paid-for real estate. What do you think about using condominiums as investment properties instead of singlefamily homes? -Jason

Dear Jason,

I don't really have a problem with condos as paid-for investments. I own a couple of them myself. When it comes to making this kind of investment for the first time, however, I would advise that you keep a few things in mind.

Based on equal price and equal neighborhood, the average single-family home will probably increase more in value over the years. Now, a nice, well-placed condo will obviously go up in value faster than a traditional house in a lesser neighborhood. So speaking in an overall sense, they're not bad investments if you do your homework.

You have to think about what you're getting into and also take into consideration a number of variables. What are the HOA dues or condo fees going to be? Is the condo association being managed well? That and the neighborhood are the two biggest concerns I have when buying a condo. A lot of condo associations are very poorly



managed. And if they don't provide proper maintenance or keep a certain percentage of the complex owner-occupied versus rental, the condo association or complex can lose the ability to get normal permanent financing. If they can't get FHA, VA or conventional financing, the values are going to drop like a rock — because you've only got cash buyers and investment buyers at that point.

Research on these kinds of things doesn't take an awful lot of work. Just call the management company, and the realtor who's involved if it's listed, and ask for the documentation. Most of the time this sort of stuff is public information, so it's not hard to access. Some other questions you might ask are: What are the reserves for the roof? What are the reserves for paint and the parking lot? Are they collecting enough to pay their bills, and are they actually paying their bills?

Then you start looking at things from a buyer's perspective. Would I want to live in here and have my wife and children here? Would a normal, reasonable person want to live here? If the answers are yes, then you've probably got a good, solid condo complex. —Dave

The Church's Emergency Fund Dear Dave,

I pastor a small church that is debt-free. I'd like for us to save an emergency fund for the church, but I'm not sure what would be considered an expense. Can you help? -David

Thank A Veteran Today

Dear David,

In terms of mathematics, I would advise looking at it the same way you would a small business. The goal, first and foremost, is to keep the doors open in case something bad happens. The secondary goal could be to pay bills on time for the sake of the church's reputation, and the third goal would be to do all this without putting a strain on the organization. In business, we would call this fund "retained earnings." Technically, a church doesn't have earnings, but they do have income. You'll want to retain some of that on a regular monthly basis.

For a church, basic things like payroll, utilities, insurance and taxes would need to be covered under an emergency fund. Coffee and donuts, new hymnals, and mission trips aren't necessities. You should already be running a monthly and annual budget on the church, so separate the necessities per month and multiply that by a three to six month figure.

There's a huge level of wisdom involved in a church being debt-free, David. Congratulations!

2) SHOWER OR BATHE TOGETHER EVERY DAY. Jenkins and her husband do it at least twice a week and it's a great time to plan and discuss matters outside of the hearing of little ears. It's also a great tine to unwind from a busy schedule, and it's something private and special you share.

- It will keep you connected. 3) NEVER STOP HAVING SEX. One common characteristic in many divorcing couples is they stopped having sex a long time ago. It is the one thing you share together. Even if you are tired, not in the mood, or not even attracted to your spouse in that moment, make sex a regular part of your relationship. You need to depend on one another to meet that need. Vow to make love at least once a week.
- 4) DON'T ALLOW FAMILIARITY TO BREED CONTEMPT. Start your marriage with the idea you will both work together on "being married" every day. Being married is not a state of being. It's a work in progress. Treat your spouse like a date every day. Notice the little things that attracted you

to begin with and enjoy them every day. Don't take them for granted.

5) CUDDLE AND MORE CUDDLING. Maintaining a strong relationship takes time together. Stay in bed together one day a week and talk. No agenda. If there's any agenda, it's just to cuddle. 

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

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

Citrus Heights Native Serves Aboard Motorcycle Collision Results **Guided Missile Destroyer in Spain**

ROTA, SPAIN (MPG) - A 2008 Casa Roble High School graduate and Citrus Heights, California native is serving in the U.S. Navy aboard the guided missile destroyer, USS Ross.

Petty Officer 2nd Class Amber Kochishan is an information systems technician aboard the forward-deployed Arleigh Burke-class guided missile destroyer operating out of Rota, Spain. Ross is one of four destroyers home ported in Rota.

A Navy information systems technician is responsible for maintaining communications while out at sea with computers, network, and radios.

"I like working with people," said Kochishan. "Information system technicians are always around the ship on trouble calls when people have issues with their computers. We also get to work with different commands and ships out at sea."

Commissioned in June of 1997, the Arleigh Burke-class guided-missile destroyer, Ross, measures approximately 500 feet and is powered by four gas turbines that allow the destroyer to achieve over 30 mph in open seas. It was named in honor of Medal of Honor recipient Capt. Donald K. Ross. He was awarded the Medal of Honor for his heroism during the attack on Pearl Harbor.

This ship has been fitted with the Aegis ballistic missile defense (BMD) capability that enables the ship to conduct long-range surveillance, tracking, and engagement of short and medium-range ballistic missiles.

According to Navy officials, destroyers are tactical multi-mission surface combatants capable of conducting anti-air warfare, anti-submarine warfare and anti-surface warfare, as well as humanitarian assistance. Fast, maneuverable, and technically advanced, destroyers provide the required warfighting expertise and operational flexibility to execute any tasking overseas.

Assigned to U.S. 6th Fleet, sailors are on watch throughout the European region and are important assets supporting the European Phased Adaptive Approach to enhance the security of that area of the world from ballistic missile threats originating in the Middle East.

In addition to Ross, three other BMD capable ships are forwarded deployed in Rota: USS Porter, USS Carney and USS Donald Cook. Having four destroyers based in Rota gives the U.S. 6th Fleet flexibility to send these ships to a variety of locations for a range of missions, while at the same time providing a large umbrella of protection for European allies.

Approximately 30 officers and 300 enlisted men and women make up the ship's company. Their jobs are highly specialized and keep each part of the cruiser running smoothly, according to Navy officials. The jobs range from washing dishes and preparing meals to maintaining engines and handling weaponry.

"I really enjoying being underway and get a lot of opportunities for that on this ship," said Kochishan. "There are great learning opportunities and camaraderie."

Challenging living conditions build strong fellowship among the crew, Navy officials explained. The crew is highly motivated, and quickly adapt to changing conditions. It is a busy life of specialized work, watches, and drills.

As a member of one of the U.S. Navy's most relied upon assets, Kochishan explained that she and other Ross sailors know they are part of a legacy that will be last beyond their lifetimes.

"I think it's important to serve your country and contribute to society and your nation," added Kochishan.



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Governor Brown Issues Order to Continue Water Savings as Drought Persists *Executive Order* permanently prohibit waste- acre-feet of water a year in must plan for droughts lasting at districts quantify their customers' To ensure compliance with these

Executive Order Aims to Make Water Conservation a Way of Life in California

SACRAMENTO REGION, CA (MPG) - Moving to bolster California's climate and drought resilience, Governor Edmund G. Brown Jr. recently issued an executive order that builds on temporary statewide emergency water restrictions to establish longer-term water conservation measures, including permanent monthly water use reporting, new permanent water use standards in California communities and bans on clearly wasteful practices such as hosing off sidewalks, driveways and other hardscapes.

"Californians stepped up during this drought and saved more water than ever before," said Governor Brown. "But now we know that drought is becoming a regular occurrence and water conservation must be a part of our everyday life."

Californians have responded to the call to conserve water during the drought by dialing back sprinklers, replacing lawns, fixing leaky faucets, and installing more efficient toilets and washing machines. Between June 2015 and March 2016, Californians reduced water use by 23.9 percent compared with the same months in 2013 — saving enough water to provide 6.5 million Californians with water for one year.

While the severity of the drought has lessened in some parts of California after winter rains and snow, the current drought is not over. For the fifth consecutive year, dry conditions persist in many areas of the state, with limited drinking water supplies in some communities, diminished water for agricultural production and environmental habitat, and severely depleted groundwater basins. The executive order calls for long-term improvements to local drought preparation across the state, and directs the State Water Resources Control Board to develop proposed emergency water restrictions for 2017 if the drought persists.

California droughts are expected to be more frequent and persistent, as warmer winter temperatures driven by climate change reduce water held in the Sierra Nevada snowpack and result in drier soil conditions. Recognizing these new condipermanently prohibit wasteful practices, such as hosing off sidewalks, driveways and other hardscapes, washing automobiles with hoses not equipped with a shut-off nozzle, and watering lawns in a manner that causes runoff. These temporary prohibitions have been in place since emergency water conservation efforts began in July 2014.

The State Water Board and DWR will take actions to minimize water system leaks across the state that continue to waste large amounts of water. DWR estimates that leaks in water district distribution systems siphon away more than 700,000

acre-feet of water a year in California – enough to supply 1.4 million homes for a year. Audits of water utilities have found an average loss through leaks of 10 percent of their total supply.

Strengthen Local Drought Resilience

In consultation with urban water suppliers, local governments, environmental groups and other partners, DWR will strengthen standards for local Water Shortage Contingency Plans, which are part of the Urban Water Management Plans that water districts must submit every five years. Under new strengthened standards, districts must plan for droughts lasting at least five years, as well as more frequent and severe periods of drought. These plans must be actionable, so that districts can turn to them to guide their drought response.

For areas not covered by the Water Shortage Contingency Plan, DWR will work with counties to improve drought planning for small water suppliers and rural communities.

Improve Agricultural Water Use Efficiency and Drought Planning

DWR will update existing requirements for Agricultural Water Management Plans so that irrigation

districts quantify their customers' water use efficiency and plan for water supply shortages.

Current law requires agricultural water districts serving 25,000 acres or more to file such plans. The executive order increases the number of irrigation districts who must file water management plans by lowering the threshold to irrigation district serving 10,000 acres or more. DWR will check the plans to ensure they quantify conservation efforts and adequately plan for water shortages.

DWR will work with the California Department of Food and Agriculture in seeking public input on the updated standards, with a public draft made available by the end of this year. To ensure compliance with these new targets and water management plan requirements, DWR, the State Water Board and the California Public Utilities Commission will work together to develop methods which could include technical and financial assistance, regulatory oversight and enforcement mechanisms.

tions, the executive order directs permanent changes to use water more wisely and efficiently, and prepare for more frequent, persistent periods of limited supply.

These new actions will help achieve a top priority in the Governor's Water Action Plan — to "Make Conservation a California Way of Life." The administration will seek public input in the coming months on new water conservation and efficiency standards called for in this executive order.

The following is a summary of the executive order issued by the Governor today:

Use Water More Wisely

The Department of Water Resources (DWR) and the State Water Board will require monthly reporting by urban water suppliers on a permanent basis. This includes information regarding water use, conservation and enforcement. Through a public process and working with partners such as urban water suppliers, local governments and environmental groups, DWR and the State Water Board will develop new water use efficiency targets as part of a long-term conservation framework for urban water agencies. These targets go beyond the 20 percent reduction in per capita urban water use by 2020 that was embodied in SB X7-7 of 2009, and will be customized to fit the unique conditions of each water supplier.

The State Water Board will adjust emergency water conservation regulations through the end of January 2017, in recognition of the differing water supply conditions across the state, and develop proposed emergency water restrictions for 2017 if the drought persists.

Eliminate Water Waste The State Water Board will
