A Day to Be a Superhero

Citrus Heights Family to Raise Funds for Low-Income Pregnant Women

citrus Heights, ca (MPG) - Their neighbors know them as the Lucas family, but on May 14th, this Citrus Heights family will don superhero costumes for Sacramento Life Center's Heroes Walk for Life at Maidu Park in Roseville. Nancy Lucas, who is heading up the team Supers, is hoping to recruit more Citrus Heights residents to help raise funds for the Sacramento Life Center's services for low-income pregnant women and teens.

"Anybody can join our team and help get the word out that this wonderful organization is here," Lucas said. "I love the work the Sacramento Life Center does with women and babies. Everything they provide is free and they are so vital to our community."

Lucas first became involved with the Sacramento Life Center 20 years ago. For the first time, she will not be walking in the center's fundraising walk — she will be running. She started running in December at age 56 and can now run almost three miles.

"I've never in my life been a runner, and now I can run 30 minutes," Lucas said. "I always hated running, but now when I'm out there it's very emotional for me because I'm thinking of all of the people who come into the Sacramento Life Center and the difficult

Memorial Day at Sylvan Cemetery: All Gave Some, Some Gave All

CITRUS HEIGHTS, CA (MPG) - Memorial Day will be celebrated on May 30 of this year at the Sylvan Cemetery at 7401 Sylvan Blvd, Citrus Heights beginning at 10:30 a.m.

Memorial Day, not to be confused with Veterans Day, is a day of remembering the men and women who died while serving in the United States Armed Forces. Veterans Day on the other hand celebrates the service of all U. S. military veterans. Memorial Day, formerly known as Decoration Day, originated after the American Civil War in 1868 to commemorate the Union and Confederate soldiers who died in the Civil War.

The end of May seemed to be appropriate since many spring flowers were available. By the 20th century Memorial Day had been extended to honor all Americans who have died in all wars in the past 240 years.

Every year, Sylvan Cemetery in Citrus Heights honors those who gave their lives in the defense of their county. As is tradition the morning begins at 10:30 a.m.

According to psychiatrists, the fear of public speaking is caused by the fear of ostracism, the fear of standing out, the fear of criticism, the fear of ridicule, the fear of being an outcast. The fear of being different prevents most people from seeking new ways to solve their problems."

For those haunted by this fear who would like to find a way overcome it, there is a fun, easy, painless answer to improving their business and personal speaking presence. Sunrise Center Toastmasters, a part of Toastmasters International (TM), has been changing the professional and personal lives of its members for 40 years. Three members have been active for almost that long.



Sunrise Center Toastmasters members come in all ages, walks of life and interests, making for many, many interesting and informative speeches each week.

Steve Beede, an attorney says, "Today, 37 years later, each Toastmaster meeting still inspires and challenges me with new

ideas and new information that make me want to build a better me and gives me the tools and forum to do so."

TM is a non-profit organization which develops public speaking and leadership skills through practice and constructive

feedback in local clubs.

Every Thursday morning at 6:30 a.m. a dedicated group of men and women from every walk of life ranging in age from 18 to 70 plus years, gather for a fast moving, entertaining 90 minutes. They practice speaking with confidence on topics of interest to members, develop listening skills, and practice giving constructive feedback in a non-threating atmosphere.

TM clubs continue the original format of meeting in social settings, with members practicing different skills during each meeting. Besides giving prepared speeches and other presentations, "Table Topics" gives members a chance to practice speaking off the cuff, which translates easily into responding well when called upon to communicate in a spontaneous business or personal situation.

SACRAMENTO REGION, CA (MPG)

- Saturday, May 14th marks the 24th anniversary of one of America's great days of giving: the National Association of Letter Carriers Stamp Out Hunger Food Drive.

Letter carriers walk through the community every day, often coming face to face with a sad reality for too many, hunger. So each year on the second Saturday in May, Letter Carriers across the country collect nonperishable food donations from their customers. These donations go directly to local food pantries to provide food to people in Sacramento who need their help.

Last year they collected over 71 million pounds of food nationally, feeding an estimated 30 million people. Over

the course of its 23-year history, the drive has collected well over one billion pounds of food, thanks to a postal service universal delivery network that spans the entire nation, including Puerto Rico, Guam and U.S. Virgin Islands.

The need for food donations is great; currently 49 million Americans (one in six) are unsure where their next meal is coming from. Sixteen million are children who feel hunger's impact on their overall health and ability to perform in school. And over 5 million seniors over age 60 are food insecure, with many who live on fixed incomes are often too embarrassed to ask for help.

This food drive's timing is crucial. Food banks and pantries often receive the majority


of their donations during the Thanksgiving and winter holiday seasons. By springtime, many pantries are depleted, entering the summer low on supplies at a time when many school breakfast and lunch programs are not available to children in need.

Fight the Bite

Health Officials Urge Precaution During Mosquito Season

SACRAMENTO REGION, CA (MPG) -

Mosquitoes are much more than a nuisance. They are also a very real threat to health and, on too many occasions in recent years, a threat to life.

The Sacramento-Yolo Mosquito and Vector Control District is launching its annual "Fight The Bite" campaign to make the public aware of the dangers of mosquitoes and to provide tips on how they can protect themselves. The district's information and education effort is coupled with an aggressive mosquito control program to protect the public's

Field Technicians in the twocounty district set out traps to monitor mosquito activity. They locate potential breeding locations and treat trouble spots. But that effort is not enough. The public has a role to play, as well.

Officials urge homeowners to check their properties at least once a week and empty out stagnant water from old tires, birdbaths, cans, and even dog dishes—anywhere there is standing water.

"There are 24 species of mosquitoes in the district," District Public Information Officer Luz Robles said. "Only two of those transmit the West Nile Virus." But those two are carriers of what is still a potential killer.

West Nile struck fear in the hearts of area resident as recently as last year. As often happens, the public forgets and it is the job of the control district to keep reminding the public about the continuing severity of the problem.

"When it hits the news it really resonates," said field tech Kenny Harris. But the public has become desensitized to the threat. West Nile is still very much present in the region and every bit as dangerous as it has always been.

Harris travels around his 88-square-mile zone taking water samples from ponds and other places with standing water to see if there is mosquito larvae present. If so, he will release tiny larvae-eating fish.

A new concern that is getting a lot of publicity is the Zika Virus which has devastatingly

impacted some Central and South American countries. The most frightening fact to make the news is that infected pregnant women have delivered babies with small heads. That has the American public alarmed, but Robles said, "Zika is not here yet. The closest it has been detected is San Mateo and the Fresno-Madeira area." Zika has permanently established itself in Southern California.

Even if Zika were here, Luz Robles said, "West Nile is a more devastating virus; especially when Zika is compared with West Nile and malaria." West Nile, she said, is a far more immediate threat and the public needs to take precautions against it.

Among preventative measures recommended are: wear long-sleeved shirts and long pants when outside, especially in the evenings around home and at campouts and outdoor concerts. Also, always use an insect repellent that contains either DEET or Picaridin. They are available as lotions, sprays, and wipes that are available over the counter in drugstores and supermarkets.

The district also provides homeless shelters with wipes to hand out to those living on the streets and along the rivers.

The mosquito season is almost here and Kenny Harris said, "It is not too early to start taking precautions."



Sacramento County **DA Reports**

Defendants Convicted of Human Trafficking, Insurance Fraud, and Sexual Assualt

CASE: Quoc Pham & Amro Farhat **PROSECUTOR:** Deputy District Attorney Sonia Satchell, Human Trafficking Unit

Twenty-eight-year-old Quoc Pham was convicted by jury of human trafficking, pimping a minor, and pandering a minor. Twenty-eightyear-old Amro Farhat was convicted of pimping a minor, pandering a minor, two counts of oral copulation of a minor, child pornography, and unlawful sexual intercourse with a victim more than three years younger.

The 16-year-old victim was a runaway from Contra Costa County. She came to Sacramento with a friend, who introduced her to Pham. Pham forced her to work as a prostitute on the stroll. He then took her to meet his friend, Farhat. Farhat took pictures of the victim and posted a prostitution advertisement on a website. Farhat also booked a room at the Travelodge so the victim could do dates. The victim was able to call her mom, who contacted law enforcement.

Pham faces a maximum potential sentence of 14 years, 8 months in prison. Faraht faces a maximum potential sentence of 8 years in prison. Sentencing is set for May 26, 2016, at 4:00 p.m. in Department 14 before the Honorable Donald Currier.

CASE: Timothy Sean McCrystle **PROSECUTOR:** Deputy District Attorney Kelly Mulcahy, Insurance Fraud Unit

Forty-nine-year-old Timothy Sean McCrystle pled no contest to misdemeanor insurance fraud and misdemeanor reckless driving. He was sentenced to 30 days in county jail and 3 years probation. He will also be required to pay a \$250 fine plus penalties and fees.

On August 15, 2015, the victim drove past McCrystle, who was driving unusually slow with his two children in the vehicle. McCrystle sped up to catch the victim and then abruptly braked and slowed his car to match the victim's speed. As they continued to drive, McCrystle remained driving alongside the victim at the same pace for several blocks. Suddenly, he edged into the victim's lane causing them to collide. He hit the victim's car a second time before exiting his vehicle. He then stood directly in front of the victim's car, blocking her way, and proceeded to yell at her and slam his hands on the hood of her car. McCrystle eventually let the victim leave when he became aware the incident was being videotaped with a dash-mounted video camera in a nearby

McCrystle returned home and called 911 to report a hit and run. When interviewed by CHP, he stated the victim flipped him off as she sped up and passed him. After the collision, McCrystle admitted trying to block the victim's car and stated he was unable to get her license plate number. He also gave a recorded statement to USAA insurance and repeated the same false version of facts. McCrystle obtained the dash camera video of the evidence and provided it to his insurance company. After viewing the video, the case was turned over to the District Attorney's Office, Auto Insurance Fraud Unit.

CASE: Miguel Ramirez


PROSECUTOR:Deputy District Attorney Matt Chisholm, Adult Sexual Assault Prosecution Unit

Thirty-three-year-old Miguel Ramirez was convicted by jury of 12 counts of sexual assault including continuous sexual abuse, committing lewd acts upon a child, unlawful sexual intercourse with a victim more than three years younger, oral copulation of a person under 18, and attempt to commit sodomy with a person under 18.

Ramirez molested a friend's daughter starting from when she was 13 years old until she was 16 years old. The victim's mother discovered the abuse when she returned home

Ramirez faces a sentence of 22 years, 8 months in prison. Sentencing is set for May 13, 2016, at 8:30 a.m. in Department 21 before the Honorable Steve White.

Cruz vs. Trump: Comparing their Tax Proposals

As Donald Trump and Ted Cruz battle to become the Republican nominee for president, it is time to closely consider their policies. Although both propose cutting taxes, the details of their plans are very different. Ted Cruz is proposing a drastic revision of the tax code that would replace the progressive income tax with a flat tax. Donald Trump's proposal, though it would lower the top tax rate, preserves higher rates on the rich. In terms of sound principles that should guide discussions of future tax policy, Cruz's proposal is better than Trump's.

Cruz's plan, which includes a 10-percent flat-tax rate on income and a value-added tax to replace the payroll tax, would reduce overall taxes paid by almost everyone. He proposes repealing the corporate-income tax, the payroll tax, estate taxes, and gift taxes and replacing those taxes with a 16-percent value-added tax. By altering incentives to work and save his plan could have a large positive effect on economic growth.

Trump's plan would also low tax rates for most Americans, reducing top tax rates to 25 percent. Trump proposes a flat corporate-income tax rate of 15 percent and would also repeal federal estate and gift taxes. It would not change the payroll tax, which is used to fund Social Security and Medicare.

Trump's plan would reduce government revenue by more than Cruz's plan. It cuts middleclass taxes by more but reduces rates less for those with high incomes. The Tax Policy Center estimates that Cruz's plan would reduce revenue by \$8.6 trillion over 10 years, while Trump's would reduce revenue by \$9.5 trillion over ten years.

Cruz's tax plan also has some other positive features that are worth noting. It effectively exempts savings and investment income of the middle class from taxation. This incentivizes greater savings and investment, which are important for promoting economic growth.

Because each plan substantially reduces the amount of revenue collected by the federal government, it would raise the federal deficit unless Congress has the political will to enact similarly large spending cuts. The Tax Policy Center estimates that by 2025, the annual reduction in revenue from either plan would exceed the entire military budget.

Both candidates' plans are consistent with the view that people can make better decisions than the government about how to spend their own money. Both also are based on the premise that lower tax rates on the rich increase their incentives to save, invest, and create business. But in proposing a flat tax, Cruz goes one step further than Trump. With his plan, the wealthy get to keep the same percentage of each additional dollar they earn by working harder, as do the middle class. Those with more income would pay proportionally more, but would have the same incentive as everyone else to earn more.

The Tax Policy Center may be overestimating the revenue lost from each plan because it fails to account for all the ways that lower tax rates increase incentives to work longer hours, take risks, and start businesses. These effects will be particularly pronounced for high-income

earners, who are the most capable of starting businesses and investing in business expansions that can lead to more employment opportunities for low- and middle-income workers. By promoting faster economic growth, tax cuts may increase the amount of income earned before taxes, partially offsetting some of the revenue lost due to lower tax rates. Tax cuts are more likely to promote growth if they are financed by cuts in government spending rather than by increases in the deficit.

The problem with past cuts in federal income-tax rates, such as those implemented by Presidents Reagan and George W. Bush, was that they were not accompanied by comparable reductions in spending. If spending is not reduced by the same amount as revenue is reduced, tax cuts may do more harm than good. It is much easier for a candidate to propose large tax cuts than it is for Congress to enact even modest cuts in federal spending.

Of the two proposals, Cruz's is better because it is simpler and because it treats additional income earned by the wealthy the same way as income earned by everyone else. Either Cruz's or Trump's plan would improve incentives by reducing personal income-tax rates and reducing or eliminating the corporate-income tax, which is much higher in the United States than in other countries. If one of them is elected, the large tax cuts he is proposing should only be implemented if Congress approves drastic cuts in spending. Otherwise, we won't have to wait very long before the federal government can no longer pay the Medicare bills and send out the Social Security checks it has promised.

Cruz's plan is the preferable of the two, particularly if it is used as a starting point for a discussion about principles to consider in fixing the federal government. But cutting spending also needs to be a part of that discussion. ★





Thriving as a Team, Focusing on Greatness

SACRAMENTO REGION, CA (SPORTSTARS/MPG) - Practice can't necessarily make perfect, particularly in golf. But, practice can make permanent — and that kind of consistency on the course is what makes players great.

Jesuit senior David Laskin has been practicing and playing since he was 6-years old, and that dedication is paying dividends as his final high school season begins to wind down. Laskin is among the Sac-Joaquin Section's top golfers and his steady game gives him a chance to do great things at the Section Masters tournament and beyond.

"The strength of my game is consistency," he said. "A lot of junior golfers can shoot 64, 65, 66, but then they might shoot in the 80s. I generally don't shoot in the 80s and stay around par all of the time, but I can go low."

Earlier this week, Laskin shot a season-best 66 at Wildhawk Golf Club in Sacramento to earn individual medalist for the second time in as many Delta League Tournaments, helping the Marauders take top team honors after Davis won the first league tourney at El Macero. He shot a 70 in the first Delta League tournament and currently leads the points race for Delta League MVP.

But, despite the individual honors that he earns in high school and junior amateur competitions, Laskin's primary focus right now is the Jesuit team. Under the direction of first-year coaches Pete Baichtal and Father Aaron Engebretson, the Marauders rely on Laskin for more than just his low scores.

"He is obviously a very good golfer, but what we have been most impressed with is his leadership," Baichtal said. "He has embraced his role as a leader, and he is a team-first guy." While some junior golfers cruise through their final high school season after accepting a college scholarship, Laskin has been more focused on his team than ever, according to his coaches.

"He embodies what we want in a leader at Jesuit," Engebretson said. "He is humble; he gives himself to his team; and he is a solid student. He finds a way to fit this in and makes it a priority to help the younger guys."

When the Jesuit golfers were asked to list their goals for the 2016 season, Laskin's top three goals were team goals, and he has never wavered on those priorities despite signing to play golf at the University of Arizona next year.

The process of earning a Division I golf scholarship goes through junior amateur tournaments rather than high school matches, but Laskin wants to enjoy his final season as a Marauder with his teammates.

"As a team, I want us to make it as far as we can," he said. "We have had some good finishes of late, and I think that maybe we can make a deep run in the postseason. I want to make it to state, but I would love to make it there as a team."

Laskin has his own team at home that has played a huge role in his success on the course. His parents, Alan and Julie, have guided both David and his older sister Emily—a 2014 St. Francis-Sacramento grad who is playing at the University of San Francisco—through the trials—and tribulations of junior golf with impressive success.

"My wife is amazing with the organization and coordination to get them everywhere they need to be," Alan Laskin said. "I'm more concerned with how he handles himself as a gentleman on the golf course than I am if he shoots 62 or 82."

That support has helped David thrive as a student-athlete, and allowed him to spend the needed time practicing and refining his game. Laskin practices or plays four days during the week with Jesuit, and then practices with either private coach Phil Dawson or on his own for about six-to-eight hours a day on weekends. Well, weekends when he is not competing in junior amateur tournaments.

"He is a determined player," said Dawson, who coaches numerous high school, college and amateur golfers. "He puts in the time to be great, and that's what separates him from

the pack."

Laskin has always strived to separate himself from the rest of the field, admitting to first dreaming of playing on the PGA Tour — and especially at The Masters — before he even turned 10. But, it was not until he started high school that

he realized his dreams could come true with plenty of hard work and sacrifice. The senior still finds time to succeed in the classroom and give back to the community. Laskin has fulfilled community service hours required by Jesuit by volunteering at a South Sacramento after-school

program, serving meals to the homeless and less fortunate, and to helping rebuild homes destroyed by Hurricane Katrina in New Orleans this past Summer. He believes that his friends and family understand his need to give lots of time and energy to golf.

"To be the best, you have to work hard and make (golf) your focus," Laskin said. "I think that my friends understand that and know that's what I need to do to achieve my goals." If he does not achieve his goals of individual and team recog-

nition as a senior at Jesuit along with success at the collegiate and professional level, it will certainly not be for a lack of work. Because Laskin is determined to practice to make permanent and to realize his golf dreams.

"David is redundantly good from tee to green all of the time," Dawson said. "This game is all about organization and discipline. He takes a holistic approach to the game that makes him a highly proficient player."

The Sacramento Life Center's mission is to offer compassion, support, resources and free medical care to women and couples facing an unplanned or unsupported pregnancy. The Sacramento Life Center's licensed Sac Valley Pregnancy Clinic includes a primary clinic and two Mobile Medical Clinics that provide all services for free, including pregnancy testing, STI testing, ultrasounds, advocacy for men and women, education and resource referrals. The nonprofit also offers a school-based teen education program, a 24-hour hotline and a program for women seeking support after having an abortion. 
