Citrus Heights Resident Helps Others through Vision Challenges

CITRUS HEIGHTS, CA (MPG) - Paul Gray of Citrus Heights started losing his vision at age 16, but that did not stop him from being named Junior Prom King. In fact, the born athlete remembers his whole football team getting into trouble together at the hospital as he was dealing with his diagnosis. He also remembers being the "fun blind guy at the party" and his friends playing good-natured pranks on him.

"My mom and dad are tough folks and taught me I had to get over it," Gray said. "I could dwell on it and waste life or I could learn to move on and figure it out. So I kept my sense of humor and my friends kept taking me to parties. I continued to play football, baseball, and basketball as long as I could."

Gray was born with a genetic disease called Leber hereditary optic neuropathy, which normally begins affecting men's central vision when they are in their 40s and 50s. Women carry the gene, but only men experience the would get fixed eventually," Gray said. "My vision loss. Men also cannot pass on the gene. Doctors believe Gray began losing his vision at such a young age because he underwent chemotherapy for a year and a half at age 11 to beat cancer, and stress triggered the disease to kick in.

"We had no idea this gene was in our family," Gray said. "Now we know all of my brothers have it, but they can still see."

He remembers playing basketball one day as a junior in high school and he could not see a player's jersey number. The next week he could not see the scoreboard. The following week, he started missing the ball. He thought it was wind, sweat in his eye, or a football injury. Many tests later, Gray realized he would never be able to go to college on a sports scholarship as he had planned.

"At that point, I realized something I was passionate about had been taken from me, but I'm such a positive person that I believed it

family and friends really helped me with that transition. I still worried about all of the things I had taken for granted, though, like being able to play catch with my future son and support a

But he found a way to pour his passion into athleticism. He moved to San Diego and became a certified personal trainer, building a successful business doing boot camps on the beach. Eventually he made his way to Oregon, where he met his wife and later moved back to

Sacramento.

He knew building a personal training business would be much more difficult in the Sacramento area than in San Diego, but he was determined to find a career that he was passionate about, so he began taking classes at the nonprofit Society for the Blind in Sacramento. His instructors noticed that he had a talent for working with technology and computers. He volunteered for seven months and one day Continued on page 9

A Lifetime of Dedication

Local Resident Carol Spiker Wins Prestigious Award from Heifer International

CITRUS HEIGHTS, CA (MPG) - Carol Spiker, a resident and past president of the Citrus Heights General Federation of Women's Clubs (GFWC), recently received a prestigious award from the nonprofit Heifer International, which helps people in underdeveloped countries lift themselves out of poverty.

Since its founding in 1944, Heifer has been able to assist over 22.6 million families in 125 countries around the world to become

self-sufficient as a result of monetary donations to fund the gifts of animals and other resources to these families. In 2014, Heifer celebrated its 70th anniversary and partnership with GFWC by creating an award, the Linda Dennis Heifer Hope Award. Spiker was the recipient of this initial award that was given out at the 2015 GFWC International Convention in Nashville, Tennessee on June 15th.

When baby boomers across America heard their parents say "Clean your plate; there are starying children in China," many

children did just that and never thought more about it. Spiker asked her parents, "Can we send our food to them, even the stuff I like?" Later, when she learned about how Heifer helped people in underdeveloped countries make a living and feed themselves through farming and other avenues, she was

Spiker's official involvement with Heifer began after a 2009 presentation by Heifer International at one of her club meetings. When she heard the percentage of people Continued on page 10

citrus Heights, ca (MPG) - Each year, on the Saturday following the Fourth of July, a popular tradition—a bit of 1970s Americana—is revived on Wooddale Way in Citrus Heights. A colorful banner on a garage announcing "Block Party Here" welcomes former, current, and new neighbors to a block party held in the backyard of Lamar and Van Fullmer, the backbone of this caring, tight-knit neighborhood.

Those arriving follow the sound of conversation and laughter through a side door. Guests carry their favorite potluck side dish and favorite non-alcoholic beverage. This is a family affair! The sixth annual Fullmer backyard block party is in high gear. This annual homecoming brings together those from 10 or so of the 45 invited homes in the immediate area.

Right away, old friends reunite and greet each other. Gathered near and around tables set up throughout the well-kept yard, a mix of repeat guests and new additions to the tradition share their lives with family and friends. Those who have moved from the area return when they can for the camaraderie and to catch up. Following the meal and fellowship, there will be over 60 men, women, and children posing for the annual block party photograph.

The large "family reunion" group photo captures the residents

of a typical neighborhood. Families with babies, toddlers, tweens, and teens; college students; working singles; a working parent or parents; and retired seniors all attend.

The difference on Wooddale Way is that these neighbors almost all know each other or soon will. They have created an unofficial neighborhood watch and they appreciate and care for each other.

A wide variety of ages are represented on Wooddale Way, from seven weeks to 90 years. There are single people, couples, and families with anywhere from one to six children. The six boys are from one family whose own grandparents live in Romania. The boys have adopted the Fullmers as their surrogate grandparents and mentors.

The two newest neighbors have just moved into the community from Placerville with their two children. They said they were "so excited about being a part of this neighborhood."

Wooddale Way is a community where neighbors are aware of needs as they arise and make sure those with special needs are helped. The Fullmers, both 73, are working to bring back neighborly relationships often lost to the hurried lifestyle of modern living.

This year has seen neighbors with back surgery, knee surgery, cancer, and a shoulder replacement being helped through their recovery. Depending on the need, other neighbors banded together to sign up to provide ongoing meals as long as needed and transportation for appointments and errands. Vacationing families can also relax while away, knowing that their pets, plants, and mail will be taken care of.

The Fullmers offer ongoing hospitality throughout their neighborhood year-round. Last Christmas, Lamar toured his street offering a choice of homemade fudge or popcorn balls to whoever answered their door.

Lamar has had a heart for Citrus Heights his entire life. As a child, he and his family lived in a home on Greenback Lane at Sylvan Road in the 1940s. His parents owned the C&M Fountain at 7535 Greenback Lane, next door to San Juan High School. He attended kindergarten at the old Community Center (now the Citrus Heights Veterans Community Center). He also went to Sylvan Middle School, San Juan High School (from 1956 to 1960), and American River College for two years.

The Fullmers have lived on Wooddale Way since 1975, with the July get-togethers happening since 2010. The Fullmers retired in 2004 and did volunteer work with the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints.

It seems that the Fullmers' goal to help "bring back neighborly relationships often lost to the hurried lifestyle of modern living" has been a great and ongoing success. ★

CITRUS HEIGHTS, CA (MPG) - The Citrus Heights Chamber of Commerce, Education Committee recognized Barron Cox, school resource officer, for his outstanding work with the youth in our schools at the Chamber's August 11th luncheon, held at the Crosswood Oaks Retirement Community in Citrus Heights.

Officer Cox attended San Jose State University, where he earned a degree in journalism and mass communications with a concentration in advertising. He worked in marketing until 2002, when he joined the Santa Clara County Sheriff's Office. He is a founding member of the Citrus Heights Police Department and has 13 years of law enforcement experience. Officer Cox is one of the original members of the Domestic Violence Response Team. He served as field training officer and is currently the school resource officer. In his spare time, he is a role model to young people as an active den leader and assistant cub master for the Boy

The activities of Officer Barron Cox vary, and his duties include much more than what is considered as a standard patrol officer. Officer Cox is Citrus Heights Police Department's first line of defense against school violence and would be the first to run toward gunfire

or another violent event should it ever occur at a Citrus Heights campus. Courts recognize him as campus administrator, so he is empowered to enforce school rules and take actions on behalf of the principals and teachers in order to keep campuses safe.

Officer Cox serves as a role model for students and provides informal counseling and guidance to encourage Citrus Heights youth to make good choices and prepare for adulthood. In addition, he is a board member for the Police Activities League and is responsible for organizing and assisting with league events.

In a typical day, Officer Cox may deal with juveniles using cell phones inappropriately, track down truants, follow up on crimes against students (on or off campus), and respond to disturbances in and around campuses.

He provides additional security at school events and monitors students who committed crimes and were diverted to the Juvenile Diversion and Education Program. During the past year, he made arrests for assaults, threats and bullying, alcohol and drug use, gang activities, and weapon crimes. He has developed ongoing trusting relationships with students that have resulted in students reporting peers who are engaging in serious gang crimes and other criminal activity.

Jacking Up the Cost of Democracy

SACRAMENTO REGION, CA (MPG)

- Following August 17th's lively debate on the Senate Floor regarding Assembly Bill 1100 (Low-D), which proposes to increase the fee required to submit a proposed state ballot initiative from \$200 to \$2,000—a 900% spike, Jim zen's right—a cornerstone of the Nielsen (R-Gerber) issued the following statement:

"California's early reformers created the Initiative,

Referendum, and Recall processes as the only opportunities for citizens to make or repeal laws or recall elected representatives. This bill is all about discouraging citizens from initiating and repealing laws.

"Direct democracy is a citichecks and balances of democracy that have been protected passionately.

"Increasing the filing fee from

\$200 to \$2,000 is an extreme attempt to discourage voter participation."

Passed (23 ayes to 14 noes) over significant bi-partisan opposition, AB 1100 goes back to the Assembly for concurrence, where it is expected to pass, and will head to the Governor's office for his consideration.



Spiritual maturity is neither instant nor automatic. It is a gradual, progressive development that will take the rest of your life and will not be complete until the day you see Jesus face to face.

Some of you think that God will only love you once you get to a certain stage of spiritual maturity. Once you get all the bugs worked out. Once you get to a certain state of perfection. Wrong! God loves you at every stage of your Christian development. When my boys were little, 5, 6, 7 years old, I'd play baseball with them in the backyard. I would pitch and they would hit maybe 1 out of 10 pitches. Afterwards I would say, "Wow you did great today!"

What was I saying? That they were better than Babe Ruth? No. That they're All-Stars? No. I was saying you did great for your stage of development. I was not waiting for them to bat 1,000 before I started loving them. I love them at every stage of their growth and I realize they will never bat 1,000.

That's the way God loves you. He loves you at every stage of your development and He knows you will never bat 1,000. He loves you "in the process" of growing more and more mature. God will never love you any more or any less than He does right now. Don't get me wrong, He wants you to change and grow. Just realize He loves you in the process.

You do your best and forget the rest. When you make mistakes, get up and go on and don't let that stop you from being your best for God. Don't get on the sidelines. Don't quit coming to church. Don't quit serving or being involved. Go on like never before. The Apostle Paul said, "Not that I have... already become perfect... but one thing I do: forgetting what lies behind and reaching forward to what lies ahead, I press on toward the goal for the prize of the upward call of God in Christ Jesus..." Philippians 3:12-14 Pastor Ray







- •Update your browser to the newest version.

POPPOFF! Big Steps for Pedestrian Plan

Story by Julia Baum

CITRUS HEIGHTS, CA (MPG) - Ideas became clearer for a more pedestrian-friendly future in Citrus Heights at the city's second public workshop in 2015. The workshop was dedicated to citizen outreach and feedback on walker transit and safety issues and goals.

Inside the Citrus Heights Community Center, the July 29th workshop was sparsely attended. However, those present were full of thoughts on how to improve and create safer options throughout town for travelers on foot. Some of those improvements and possibilities were based on recommendations from the last master pedestrian plan workshop held in January, including adding or widening sidewalks as well as planting trees between car lanes and sidewalks for both safety and beautification. Since then, the project's focus has been on fleshing out those improvement plans, according to Jennifer

Donlon-Wyant, consulting project manager with Alta Planning and Design. In addition, the improvement plans outline the community's priorities, which helps the project team.

"Pedestrian plans require finer detail of information," said Donlon-Wyant.

"This helps us with prioritizing where we should be applying for grants," said Casey Kempenaar, senior planner for the city of Citrus Heights.

Project members said it was too early to give an estimate for what the project would cost, but that they will have priorities and cost estimates completed by the third workshop in early fall. Despite a lack of numbers, some community members are still not convinced that the project is necessary and think that it may be a waste of money.

"I believe what they're endeavoring to do is very costly, to change a lot of sidewalks that already exist," said Citrus Heights

resident Teri Bullington. "In my opinion, you won't see that many people using them to go shopping.'

Bullington said that some roads like Old Auburn Road and parts of Auburn Road need sidewalks, but widening the sidewalks, as proposed for parts of Greenback Lane and Sunrise Boulevard, would be a disruption to traffic that would ultimately not amount to much.

"People won't use them the way the city envisions," Bullington said.

Bullington's husband, Mike, said that the plans wouldn't affect them much because they only walk in their neighborhood, but the plans would help others.

"It touches the needs of the community where we need it the most," said Mike Bullington. "It's going to impact their ability to get to essential services."

The next master pedestrian plan workshop is to be scheduled in



Continued from page 1 walked into the office and asked what he would have to do to work for the Society for the Blind.

Gray is now coordinator for Society for the Blind's Access News program, which provides information, news, entertainment, and reading material to the blind through the telephone. People who are blind can call up and listen to recorded articles, stories, or information through their telephone any time, any day of the week. Volunteers come into Society for the Blind's recording booths to record themselves reading newspapers, grocery ads, magazines, and more, and callers can choose from a menu of options.

"I like seeing people able to do things they couldn't do before," Gray said. "Technology is so great right now for blind people. When I first started losing my sight, they had these horrible tapes. Now we

have iPhones that talk and can another way." download books, and we have mobile GPS systems for walking directions. There's a lot out there to help people have new experiences and to give them hope that they can do anything.'

When he is not coordinating the Access News program, Gray teaches mobility skills to people who come to Society for the Blind—walking three to four miles a day—and also teaches computer training.

"People change and things happen, and you can either make it a good thing or a bad thing," Gray said. "I definitely have a very happy life. I think I was meant to be blind to encourage and help other blind people. Just because you lose your vision doesn't mean you stop living your life. There is so much blind people can do, it's incredible. You just have to do it

Celebrating its 60th anniversary this year, Society for the Blind in Sacramento has created innovative ways to empower individuals like Gray who are living with low vision or blindness to discover, develop, and achieve their full potential. Society for the Blind has grown from a dedicated group of volunteers that included the Lions Clubs of America to a nationally recognized agency and the only rehabilitative teaching center for a 26-county region of Northern California. The nonprofit provides low-vision eye care, life, and job skills training, mentorship, and access to tools to maintain independence for 6,000 youth, adults, and seniors experiencing vision loss. New Regulations Do Away with Regulatory Permits for Brew Pubs and Taverns

Citrus Heights City Council recently approved amendments to the zoning regulations that allow brew pubs and taverns to locate within the City's commercial areas without regulatory permits. Any brew pub meeting the below definition can locate in any of the City's commercial areas by right, no use permit required.

The amendment updates the definition of a brew pub to be mean the following:

• Brew pubs produce their own beer on-site

• Production is limited to 5,000 barrels annually (this equates to 155,000 gallons and would be considered a very small operation)

Operating hours are restricted to close no later than 10 p.m. Sunday through Thursday and 11 p.m. Friday through Saturday

May or may not serve food

"With the popularity of craft beer, brew pubs are the most

popular trend to introduce locally brewed beer to a community. We wanted to encourage new and expanding breweries to make Citrus Heights their home and become part of our vibrant community," said Alison Bermudez, associate planner for the City of Citrus Heights.

State Announces \$30 Million in Rebates to Help Replace Old Toilets and Turf

Rebates Will Help Save Millions of Gallons of Water During Drought

SACRAMENTO REGION, CA (MPG)

- The California Department of Water Resources (DWR) has announced two new rebate programs to help Californians replace inefficient toilets and tear out water-guzzling lawns, further conserving water during the state's historic drought.

The "turf and toilet" rebate program is financed by the Proposition 1 water bond approved by voters in 2014. The program will help carry out Governor Brown's April 1st Executive Order on drought to further reduce water use in homes by replacing more than 10 million square feet of lawn and upgrading more than 60,000 water-wasting

DWR will oversee the two rebate programs, which provide a \$100 consumer rebate to replace one old toilet per household and

up to \$2 per square foot for lawn replacement. Californians can visit www.SaveOurWaterRebates.com to apply for the rebates.

With \$24 million in Proposition 1 funding, the turf replacement program will rebate \$2 per square foot of turf replaced, up to \$2,000 per household through state or local turf replacement programs. Consumers are eligible to replace turf that is living or dead at the time of the rebate application. (Bare earth areas with no sign of turf are not eligible for a rebate.)

The turf rebate program is estimated to benefit more than 10,000 homes, with a focus on disadvantaged communities hardest hit by the drought. Of the lawn removal funds, \$12 million is targeted for residents in disadvantaged communities in areas with depleted groundwater basins. The turf program will be monitored by DWR and administered by the Electric & Gas Industries Association (EGIA).

The \$6 million toilet rebate program, also funded through Proposition 1, will help Californians replace approximately 60,000 old, inefficient toilets by offering a \$100 customer rebate per household to replace with a high-efficiency toilet.

California has been dealing with the effects of drought for four years. in the world who go to bed hungry every night, she knew she had to get involved. In 2010, as Sutter District's new president, Spiker's signature project was Heifer. She invited the same speakers to present a program at the district convention. The response from members was overwhelming.

Following Spiker's term as district president, she requested to be the CA State Chairman of International Outreach. Heifer International had just been accepted as a Partner. Holding this chair from 2012 through 2014, she traveled to state meetings, boards, conventions, and gave workshops to spread the Heifer message. Members again responded and GFWC's International Outreach Partnership projects and programs took top honors at the state convention both years, along with recognition from Heifer International.

In October of 2014, in

appreciation for her continuing work with GFWC, Spiker was invited to attend Heifer's local 70th birthday celebration. There, she accepted an award on behalf of the club members who worked so hard during her chairmanship. This award was then passed on to state board members at their February 2015 meeting in Sacramento.

Her passion had also become a family affair, as Spiker honored her family members by donating chickens, goats, trees, and honeybees to Heifer in their honor. As a token of those donations, she would give the honorees salt and pepper shakers and other knickknacks representing the farm animal or gifts she had donated in their name.

Spiker's dedication to Heifer also involved her church in Fair Oaks, California. When the children of the Sunday school challenged the adults to match their offerings, with Spiker's help, the students and church members raised \$5K, which was enough to purchase one ARK (four pairs of animals plus much more). In 2014, Spiker urged church members to make donations in honor or in memory of their loved ones. She donated figurines of farm animals to those who contributed. As a result, they again raised enough to donate a second ARK. An entire community can be slowly transformed as the offspring of a flock of geese, a herd of cows, or other animals are passed along to others.

This story is another example of how one person can make an important difference in the world. Spiker's life has epitomized and continues to epitomize the intent of this award by empowering not only the women around her to work toward a more hopeful world, but those around her during every stage of her life: the past, present, and beyond.
