Suspect in Gorilla Mask Sought in Robbery Case

CITRUS HEIGHTS, CA (MPG) - Citrus Heights Police Detectives recently found digital evidence that revealed a possible strong arm robbery may have occurred on April 20th at approximately 1:54 p.m. The digital evidence shows a victim confronted by a suspect who robbed him of his bicycle. The suspect's identity was concealed by wearing a gorilla mask, which is pictured below. The video and still images indicate there were multiple unknown subjects who were present during the robbery.

There have been no reports made with similar circumstances to the Citrus Heights Police Detectives or surrounding agencies. Detectives


are seeking the help of the community to locate the victim of the indicated bicycle robbery. They are also requesting the public's help in identify-CHPD detectives

Detectives believe the masked suspect and additional unknown subjects may be responsible for additional robberies in Citrus Heights and surrounding areas. The suspect seen in the image is described as white male adult, approximately 5'11" tall, with a medium build. As seen in the image, the suspect was wearing a white t-shirt and a gorilla mask during the robbery. Violent crime cannot be tolerated and places our community at unnecessary risk. Family and friends of the suspect may already be aware of the crime or recognize the individual in the photograph. There are 22 veteran suicides a day, with over 90,000 since the current wars began. Today, we are looking at the most deadly killer that our troops will face: life after military service. Our Heroes' Dreams (OHD) is a nonprofit organization sponsored by the Wounded Soldier and Family Relief Fund Inc., based in Hanford, California. It is OHD's sole mission to improve the lives of warriors and their families by helping them accomplish dreams that they wouldn't otherwise be able to fulfill because of their disabilities. In order


The military trains people to be warriors, but nobody trains them to be veterans. Kids right out of high school are sent to combat to carry the weight of freedom on their shoulders at the ages of 18, 19, or their early 20s. They are taught to be warriors, with our military now averaging four combat tours.

When these soldiers return home, they know what it feels like to be a warrior and need an adrenaline rush, but they often just sit on the couch and self-medicate with alcohol and "VA candy": OxyContin, Vicodin, and pain pills. They self-destruct, checking out of society and eventually life as they try to cope with the *Continued on page 2*

Fire Camp Lets Kids Be Firefighters for a Week



Campers are grouped in "strike teams" of eight campers, and each strike team is mentored by two Metro Firefighters. Campers learn valuable life safety skills while discovering what it means to be a firefighter.

To attend Fire Camp, applicants must be 11, 12, or 13 years of age, with preference given to those living within Metro Fire's boundaries. Applications are processed in the order in which they are received, so apply early for a better chance of securing a spot. The deadline to apply is Thursday, June 4th.

In order for the accepted camper to attend, a parent or guardian must attend a Mandatory Orientation Meeting on June 18th at 7:00 p.m. The fee to attend Fire Camp is \$100 per camper.

Fire Camp will be held at Fire Station 21, located at 7641 Greenback Lane in Citrus Heights near Sunrise Mall, on Tuesday, July 7th and Wednesday, July 8th from 9:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. and on Thursday, July 9th and Friday, July 10th from 8:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. (end time for Friday is flexible). In order for any child to attend camp, he or she will require daily transportation to and from the camp


Continued from page 1 nightmares and thoughts about

what they have had to do or have seen during their combat service. Eventually, they see a coun-

selor who tells them why they feel the way they do. The veteran wonders why they are taking advice from someone with no combat experience who doesn't understand what they have experienced. Soldiers are often branded as heroes and excel at their job, but once they leave service, they feel broken. So, the veteran will check out and refuse to work with the counselor, going back to old habits and feelings.

Our Heroes' Dreams has been 100% successful at getting warriors off suicide watch. To begin with, OHD uses Vietnam, Korean War, and other seasoned veterans to come in and break the ice with the veteran. They start out around the campfire at the Healing Safari in Monterey County, CA getting to know each other. Soon, the returning veterans realize they are not alone and someone understands what they have been through. Seasoned veterans tell the returning veterans how to make it to tomorrow, next year, 10 years, and even 40 years from now.

Next, they are evaluated for all their needs. OHD has partnerships with many nonprofits already in place throughout the country to meet those needs. Home Depot is donating \$80 million in three years to fix up veterans' homes throughout the country. To date, they have renovated over 180 homes nationwide. Chase Bank is fixing up and donating 1,000 foreclosed homes in three years. OHD has groups that help with car repairs, finances, mortgages, credit scores, marriages, relationships, family issues, spiritual guidance, and any type of counseling needed to relieve stressors so veterans can get their lives back. While they are at the Healing Safari, all of these items

are implemented during their stay at the ranch.

Elephants play a huge part in the healing of these special guests at the Vision Quest Ranch in Monterey. An elephant delivers their breakfast each morning. The vets and their families can ride the elephants, swim with dolphins, and interact with monkeys, kangaroos, baby tigers, zebras, and many more animals. They can go skydiving and scuba diving, showing them they can still get back that adrenaline rush they were missing.

This is where this program is unique for veterans suffering from post-traumatic stress disorder (PTSD). If the vets were to return home at that point, the program would be no different than many others. The veteran's experience would have just been a bandage on their wounds. What OHD does next is the most important part of rehab. They help the veterans find a new mission in life to replace their former work of defending America.

New missions discovered in this process include veterans starting their own nonprofits or

joining the Our Heroes' program. Some may use their intimate knowledge and experience as veterans to face homelessness by working at shelters seeking and rescuing other homeless veterans who are at risk of suicide. Veterans that haven't left their home in three years are now out maintaining trails with the forest service and even have their names on trailheads. One thankful wife says, "He is only home three or four days a week because he is volunteering instead of self-medicating."

All of this works because it addresses the needs of the veteran who was on the couch self-medicating and spiraling out of control. If veterans can find a new mission, they cannot dwell on past problems and they can dedicate their time to a new purpose in life. This formula has been 100% successful. These veterans now have a reason to wake up in the morning.





Walt Disney hates your mother, and the evidence is shockingly conclusive. Exhibit A: Bambi. Before the poor boy can celebrate his first birthday, his mother, who Walt Disney didn't even name because he knew she wasn't going to last long, is shot and killed.

Exhibit C: Cinderella. Her mother is dead, obviously. So to assuage the pain of her missing mother, Cinderella's father remarries, creating a blended family that is nothing short of dysfunctional. And while the story ends well - with glass slippers and all - she must suffer terrible humiliation at the hands of her wicked stepmother and her repulsive stepsisters.

Exhibit D: Snow White, a variation of the theme, but further proof of Walt's war on women. Here is this naïve, beautiful teenager - "the fairest of them all" - at the mercy of who? Her wicked stepmother. Her mom is as dead as a hammer, and Snowy's behavior proves as much.

She runs away to the woods, not a safe place first of all, and once there moves into a fraternity house with seven men, their sweet and innocent sounding names notwithstanding. Then,



she takes candy from a stranger and finally she runs off with the first man who kisses her. If she had a mother providing appropriate instruction, none of this would have happened.

Mowgli. Tarzan. Lilo. Nemo. On and on I could go. If Walt Disney were alive today he would need a mental health intervention, and though he's been dead now for half a century, his studio continues his long campaign to eradicate mothers as if the species were some horrible disease.

Some have tried to explain his films by stating that Walt Disney, who had a marvelous mother from all accounts, is trying to show that a traditional family (whatever that might mean to whoever is defining "traditional") is not necessary for happiness. Families come in all shapes and sizes and the individual can thrive in the worst of home situations.

Going further, people like feminist Amy Richards believe that the elimination of the mother figure in so many Disney films is simply for dramatic effect. If Cinderella, Snow White, Bambi and Mowgli had loving, involved, present moms in their lives, there wouldn't be much of a plot left would there?

So, by this logic, Walt Disney isn't trying to push your mother off Space Mountain, but in his own way, he is providing instruction for raising resilient, adaptable, successful children. People need to struggle to become strong, and protecting

our kids from all adversity is not an act of kindness. It is a crime against their futures.

Case in point, observe the parent who is over-involved in his or her child's life. These parents have good intentions (they want to safeguard and nurture their child), but they cross all boundaries with their micromanaging and uber-protecting ways. They hover, physically and emotionally, robbing their children of the maturity to live in this world.

Hence, when parents make a child feel that he or she should never suffer pain, rejection, or be deprived of anything asked or demanded, it doesn't create maturity, it creates monsters. So beware of those for whom everything has come easy. Beware of those who have never suffered or struggled, who have always had someone else clean up their messes. It's hard for such people to develop any depth of character.

To succeed, yes, we need instruction and guidance, but not so much that it ruins us. The key is "minimum protection and maximum support," to quote the late William Sloane Coffin, and I think Walt Disney understood this. He knew that when one must wrestle against the "slings and arrows of outrageous fortune," this does more than make great movies. This makes for a great life. Do not take that away from your children.



Out of step with the Baby Steps

Dear Dave.

My husband and I have been following your plan. We just paid cash for our new home after selling the old one, so we're out of the Baby Steps. But we've still got about \$50,000 in student loan debt hanging over our heads. We make over \$100,000 a year combined, so how would you suggest handling this? Stephanie

Dear Stephanie,

Whoa, hang on a minute! I think you're a little confused about the steps in my plan. You're not out of the Baby Steps quite yet. You just got Baby Step 6, which is pay off your mortgage, done ahead of time.

Go back to Baby Step 2, which involves paying off all your debt except for your house, and take care of the student loans. You guys make good money, so it shouldn't take long at all. After that, if you haven't already, move to Baby Step 3 and set aside a fully loaded emergency fund of

percent of your income for retirement, and Baby Step 5 means putting aside money for the kids' college education — if you have kids. The seventh Baby Step is building wealth and giving.

I hope that helps straighten things out. The good news is you won't have to fight through a house payment while you're paying off the student loan debt. So for now, just get into attack mode and make it disappear. Then, move on to the other steps. Other than getting the sequence a little mixed up, you guys are doing great!

I'm returning to school to finish my degree this year, and I'm going to ask my girlfriend to marry me. We both have decent jobs, but I also have some previous student loans that I could put into deferment. Do you think I should pay off the debt before getting engaged?

Dear Colton,

More Upgrades of Citrus Heights Streets and Roads

CITRUS HEIGHTS, CA (MPG) -

Residents and motorists can look forward to another active road and street construction season. There will be three main projects going on this summer.

One is Phase Three of what's called the "complete streets" project for Sunrise Boulevard, which covers Antelope Road to the north city limits along the west side.

"We will be constructing sidewalks all the way up to Placer County," said Public Works Management Analyst Regina Cave, and "stormwater improvements, safety lights, and landscaping." Resurfacing and restriping is also featured. The cost is \$4.3 million.

A second major project is a \$1.3 million upgrade of the Sylvan and Stock Ranch roads intersection. Cave said it features "construction of sidewalks along the east side, to connect from behind where the Water District building is to just before the church, south of Woodside Drive."

The third main project, costing about \$500,000, features installation of sidewalks on the north side of Antelope Road, from just west of Auburn Boulevard toward I-80.

It's all part of Citrus Heights' Five-Year Capital Improvement Program, which is updated each year to reflect on-going changes.

Cave said the focus of the program is not necessarily to improve traffic flow but on walkability and traffic safety. "There are a lot of people who use our corridors to either get to retail centers or bus stops," she said. "And these locations lack accessibility and safe, wide sidewalks."

A huge upgrade of a major portion of Auburn Boulevard, between Sylvan Road and Rusch Park, was completed last year, taking two construction seasons instead of the more typical one season. Cave said it was slowed by underground utility work that often turns up ancient deterioration that is more laborious to remove, including old concrete.

Cave said there should be economic benefits too. "We hope they will do some redevelopment or re-investment," she said. "It was out-of-date, old infrastructure, falling apart. It was pretty impossible. It did not promote walkability. Lots of opportunities for people to walk to businesses. We've got schools over there. It was not safe. We also updated our traffic signals; all the timing is now coordinated."

The next segment to be upgraded for Auburn Boulevard will be from Rusch Park to the north city limits. It's in the design phase. Residential

streets are also not forgotten. This year's re-surfacing covers 24 streets, with a \$1.6 million dollar price tag.

While major traffic corridor improvements can be covered with federal funding, Cave said that's not the case with residential streets. She said a significant cut in the state gas tax will reduce funding by around \$650,000 for the 2015-2016 fiscal year.

"It reduces our ability to do some bigger projects," she said. "Or it might just put off a project for another year. We have been pretty successful the last couple of years for our arterials, Sunrise and Auburn Boulevards. We're also starting design on our next segment on Sunrise, along the west side from Locher Way down towards Syanara Drive, to provide a continuous sidewalk."

Cave said they get a lot of suggestions from the public through meetings with the Neighborhood and Resident Empowerment Associations.

"We're also working on a pedestrian master plan, which identifies a lot of deficiencies throughout the community that's been brought to us by neighborhoods," said Cave. "The hope of the plan is to be able to leverage our local funding at a later date with some other federal funding to be able to complete some of these infills."

San Juan Water District Responds to Mandatory Reductions

SACRAMENTO REGION, CA (MPG) - Recently, San Juan Water District released a press statement responding to the announcement that they must reduce water use by 36% in comparison to 2013, printed below:

"During this unprecedented drought, everyone must make tough decisions. The State Water Resource Control Board recently announced San Juan Water District must reduce water use by 36% compared to 2013. Our board and staff are working diligently to make sure our customers have the tools necessary to meet that target.

"Our district has higher than average per capita water use. While part of that is due to the region's hydrology and population density, the district is committed to sustainably reducing water use. The board has met twice since the governor's emergency declaration on April 1st. They will quickly be announcing the district's drought response

plan to meet the new state mandates.

"At the direction of the board, staff is working with customers to reduce their use through public outreach and education. They are also looking into options such as conservation rates, fines and increasing staff, all in an effort to meet the required 36% water use reduction. The district obtained a 22% reduction for June 2014 to February of this year.

"Staff is implementing new programs and services to help customers continue to conserve. One program is the WaterSmart software that tracks water use and finds new ways for customers to save water indoors and out.

"In February 2014, the district entered into a mandatory water conservation stage requiring 25% cutbacks. They were among the first agencies in the state to enact mandatory water conservation measures. After entering this mandatory stage, San Juan's reductions for the year averaged 32%.

"The district is prepared to continue heightened conservation efforts to meet the State Water Resources Control Board's 36% mandate."

HOW TO CHECK FOR FLEAS AND TICKS

Adult ticks are often visible to the naked eye, so you may be able to spot them on shorthaired pets. But with longer haired pets, it's best to do a thorough inspection with a finetoothed comb.

Signs your pet may have fleas can include flea dirt (small dark flakes), excessive itching or scratching, redness and inflammation, hot spots and pale gums. You may also see adult fleas on your pet's coat and skin.

SMILE: Research has shown that the easy tool of laughter can reduce symptoms of depression and anxiety. Take a quick break to get some giggles in. Check-out a short comedy clip on YouTube to calm those jittery nerves.

WORRY: That's right. Give into it, completely freak out, but only for a limited time. When you think something terrible will occur, commit yourself to only allowing that worry for 20 minutes. During that time think of all the possible outcomes and write down game plans, then quit thinking about it after 20 minutes. Set a timer so you keep to the time.

MAINTAIN STEADY So Jeanne said you can take back **BLOOD SUGAR LEVELS**: control with a few pointers. Here It's the key to stabilizing your moods. Stress throws your body

completely out of whack. You might crave foods like carbs and sugar. Research shows eating sugary and processed foods can increase symptoms of anxiety. Give your body the support it needs. Eat foods that contain nutrients like Vitamin B and Omega-3s. Make sure you have a small meal or snack every 2-3 hours that contains protein like a hard-boiled egg, a small organic chicken breast, and seasoned brown rice. Studies have shown that Omega-3s help reduce symptoms of depression and anxiety, while Vitamin B has links with good overall mental health.

MAKE PLANS: Fend-off anxious thoughts in advance by preparing for potential pit-falls. Help yourself develop habits that will increase your productivity. Trying writing-out-a to-do list or schedule. You will easily learn how to "un-think" your anxiety, producing beliefs by being prepared even before they pop-up.

Game Plots Movie Games Resurge

Video games are one of the few genres that have been used frequently in the past as a standalone advertising medium. Video games based off of movies swarmed the market during the early 2000s until it became routine for kid and teen films to release alongside a corresponding licensed videogame. The problem with this was that most of the time these games had small budgets, small teams, and an incredibly strict release date to coincide with the film they were supposed to be endorsing. As a result, quality became secondary; development teams had to worry about getting a product out the door.

That trend has thankfully lessened in the past eight years as children grew up and started to catch on to the low quality of the games they were buying. The movie game market shrunk away dramatically from consoles, and apart from a small resurgence on mobile, we haven't seen it since.

That is, not until recently. Mad Max and Star Wars: Battlefront are set for release this year to compliment the release of the new films Mad Max: Fury Road and Star Wars: Episode VII. Unlike their predecessors, these two games are hardly lacking in team members or funds. Instead, time is what poses the greatest threat to these titles.

Delays have become commonplace in the past two years. As games become bigger and more complicated to match the increased power of the Xbox One and PS4, they often become overambitious in what they intend to accomplish and in how much time they plan to accomplish it in. Most of the major

titles coming out this year, like The Witcher III and Batman: Arkham Knight, are carryovers originally set for release in 2014.

That's not to say that delays are bad. If a developer needs more time to make their game everything it can be, then the consumer should tolerate the extra wait in order to get a better final product. We've already seen games that have been pushed out for the holidays, like Assassin's Creed Unity, emerge unfinished and half-baked.

Battlefront and Mad Max, however, don't have the luxury of being able to push their release dates back six months whenever they feel like it. A few weeks? Sure, but in order for them to serve one of their primary purposes-to drive hype for their corresponding films—they have to come out somewhere near the movie's release date.

However, both Battlefront and Max seem to have found a way to dodge this pesky requirement. For Max, it's aiming ahead of the target. Max was originally slated for a 2014 release (well before its corresponding movie), but has since been rescheduled to September 1st of this year. As seems the new norm in blockbuster game development, Max's game director said that the whole game had to be "reset," and that the Playstation 3 and Xbox 360 versions had to be scrapped. By scheduling as conservatively as possible, developer Avalanche Studios built themselves a failsafe in case unforeseen work had to be done.

Battlefront's development has been so mysterious, long, and disorganized that it achieved a sort of infamy until Electronic Arts picked up the creative reigns from developer Free Radical in 2013. Before that point, Free Radical co-founder Steve Ellis said that the game was already "99% done." By giving themselves two whole years (Battlefront will release in November) to work on a title already so complete, EA ensured that any roadblocks can be punctually overcome.

The worst genre in gaming history, licensed movie games, is now setting an example for responsible game creation. We now know that big-budget developers should expect delays. Mad Max's "aim ahead of the target" approach and Battlefront's "over-prepare" approach seem like polar opposite solutions to the same problem. Nevertheless, more developers should start reevaluating their strategies and possibly looking toward movie spin-offs for help.





Essential Screening Tests for Colon Cancer

Dear Savvy Senior,

Are there any easier alternatives to a colonoscopy to check for colon cancer? I'm in my sixties and would like to be tested, but hate the idea of drinking all that laxative solution, and being sedated for the procedure. - Squeamish Jim

Dear Jim,

It's a great question. While a colonoscopy is considered the gold standard screening test for detecting colon cancer and is widely recommended once adults reach age 50, only about half of Americans who've passed that milestone ever get tested.

Why? Because most people, like yourself, dread the all-day laxative prep and sedation, not to mention the procedure itself. Fortunately, there are some easier alternatives, but be aware that if these tests uncover any suspicious results, you'll still need to undergo a colonoscopy.

Take-Home Tests

There are two different types of tests on the market today that you can take in the privacy of your own home that requires no laxative-taking/bowel-cleansing preparation.

The best option is the new FDA approved Cologuard test (see cologuardtest.com), which has a 92 sensitivity rate for detecting colon cancers. With this test you simply take a sample of a bowel movement, and mail it in to the lab for analysis.

The lab looks for both blood and cancer-related DNA cells in your stool.

The Cologuard test, which is recommended every three years, requires a prescription from your doctor, and costs \$599 but is covered by Medicare and many private insurers.

If, however, you find that the Cologuard test is not covered by your insurer, and you can't afford or don't want to pay the \$599 fee, the other option is the fecal occult blood test (FOBT) or the fecal immunochemical test (FIT), which detects 74 percent colon cancers.

These tests, which are also provided by your doctor, check for traces of blood in the stool that could indicate cancer or large polyps that can develop into cancer, but they don't look at the DNA. You simply send a stool sample to the lab.

Recommended annually, both of these fecal tests cost only around \$25 and are covered by Medicare and most insurers.

Less Invasive Tests

Two other tests to consider that are less invasive then a colonoscopy but more entailed than the take-home tests are the virtual colonoscopy and the sigmoidoscopy (both tests are recommended every five years).

A virtual colonoscopy uses a CT scan to view your colon instead of a scope in the rectum, so it's a less invasive procedure than a traditional colonoscopy

and doesn't require sedation. But, it still requires the same bowel-cleansing prep. It's also more expensive, typically costing between \$400 and \$800 and is not covered by Medicare or most insurers.

A sigmoidoscopy exam, which is covered by Medicare and most insurers, uses a short, flexible scope inserted in the rectum like a colonoscopy to look at the lower colon only. This is a much faster and less involved procedure than a colonoscopy and one that doesn't require sedation. You follow a clear liquid diet the day before the exam and take a laxative or enema the morning of.

Colon Cancer Numbers

Colon cancer, which develops slowly over several years without causing symptoms especially in the early stages of the disease, is the second largest cancer killer in the U.S., killing around 50,000 Americans a year.

The U.S. Preventive Services Task Force – an independent panel of medical experts that advises the government on health policies - recommends colon cancer screening to all adults, ages 50 to 75. Earlier screenings are recommended to people who have an increased risk due to family history or other factors.

Experts believe that as many as 20,000 lives could be saved each year, if the screening rate went up to 90 or 95 percent.
