New San Juan High School Gets a Facelift into the 21st Century By Elise Spleiss

CITRUS HEIGHTS, CA (MPG) - A monumental task was set before the architects, planners and builders of the 'New' San Juan High School, beginning in 2007.

The mission was to use architecture along with other elements to create a new approach to education, while maintaining historical continuity within the renovation.

Preserving the historical look and feel of this classic centuryold high school, while moving forward to reinvent it to meet the challenges of education is the 21st century would prove a rewarding assignment.

Ninety-two years earlier, in 1915, the newly formed San Juan High Unified School District built the first high school to serve the Fair Oaks, Orangevale, San Juan (later known as Carmichael), Roberts (between Orangevale and Fairoaks), and Sylvan elementary school districts.

Until then classes were held in temporary quarters in Fair Oaks, beginning on September 22, 1913. A newly elected school board accepted the design for the new school building submitted by architects George Sell and Charles F. Dean. The November 19, 1915 Folsom Telegraph reported:

The building is of Mission type of architecture and presents a very pleasing appearance..."The

rooms are commodious and well lighted, and the entire arrangement and plan of construction conforms fully to all the modem ideas of school building." A bond for \$35,000 was issued for construction and other costs.

The land on Greenback Lane was free, donated by the Trainor-Desmond land company.

The first class of 1913-1914 graduated with 46 students, with 92 students graduating the next school year. The original

building was expanded in 1938, when work was completed on the "A" and "B" wings of the school. Two years later enrollment has increased to 400 students. The older portions of the school had fallen into disrepair, but were

being used again. More wings were added after World War II, along with a shop wing and gymnasium.

posed project which would call for the demolition and relocation of the present Citrus Heights City Hall campus and the building of a new three story, 68,727 square foot medical office building at its location, was the topic of a lively meeting at the Citrus Heights Community Center on January 15, 2014.

Over 150 members of the community, local businesses, Citrus Heights city staff, city council members and Dignity Health (Mercy/San Juan) representatives attended the public meeting.

Prior to the presentation, visitors could view renderings of the proposed medical office building with parking and landscaping, and photographs of the existing city hall complex showing multiple problems including mold, structural damage, and recent plumbing and sewage problems.

The Citrus Heights City Hall, located at the corner of Greenback and Fountain Square consists of two wooden structures built in 1977 designed to temporarily house the former Fountain Square Nursery, including an outdoor rose garden, restaurant, shops, and offices. It was not built to withstand the demands of a government building.

The tightly run meeting, facilitated by Wendy Hoyt, Urban Planning and Communications, gave representatives of both projects equal time to present information to the audience. A question and answer period allowed for questions and concerns for and against both projects. All comments were

recorded and a summary will be made available to the public

Proposed Medical Building

and City Hall Relocation

Brings out Community in Force

Dignity Health has been aggressively searching for a site for a new medical facility for over five years. All other locations investigated have proven too expensive to consider, (including the 'most logical' site located adjacent to the post office), or too small to accommodate the growing medical needs of Citrus Heights.

If approved, Dignity Health would build the new facility at the Fountain Square site, but the city would own it. The city would lease the building back to Dignity for at least \$5 million over 15 years.

According to Hoyt, "This revenue stream would help to fund a substantial portion of the new city hall, and eliminate the immediate need for \$5 million in capitol repairs. Citizens will have an opportunity to help design their new city hall, which will consist of an all-inclusive building and will have considerably lower operating and maintenance costs.'

If approved by the city, plans would be for the new medical office to open by the end of

Objections to the proposed project ranged increased traffic, the loss of sense of community with a large office building so prominently situated, to adequate parking and other possible negative effects on surrounding residents. Visual impact of the proposed project including how it would blend with its surroundings was questioned. Will the new sight replace the trees and plants removed? The fate of the existing rose bushes and

fountains were also of concern. It was promised plans would be made for their preservation. Environmental and traffic studies are still scheduled to be performed.

Some positive outcomes of the projects cited by Dignity and City representatives (besides expansion of increased access to medical care in the area), include an influx of construction jobs for both projects, and increased revenues for local businesses in the surrounding area including Sunrise Mall and the Marketplace at Birdcage. Demand for restaurants, stores, and personal services will also increase as medical center employees and visitors to the medical center continue to patronize these businesses.

Not everyone left happy with what they heard. Some in opposition to the plan suggested the medical center should find a different locating rather than having to move city hall.

The next community meeting will be an interactive workshop to begin planning the new city hall and be held on Wednesday, February 19, 2014 from 6:30 p.m. at the Citrus Heights Community Center at 6300 Fountain Square. A site for the new city hall is still to be deter-

new concept in education, both architecturally and academically. Besides the traditional basic education, five

"career pathways" would give students a head start in the working world with immediately applicable experience and skills.

The five Career Technical Education (CTE) courses are: Hospitality Management & Culinary Arts; Construction Technology; Engineering

Design; Transportation Technology; and

Media Arts, TV and Theatre Production.

The five programs are open to us by any

school in the district. According to a previous article in this paper by San Juan Alumni President Dick Cowan, "A new Culinary Arts building features commercial grade kitchen equipment and training spaces. The automotive shop was given state-ofthe art equipment and training facilities. The auditorium has been outfitted with lighting, sound and set equipment to allow its use as a teaching facility for media production. The Construction and Engineering and Design programs have new classrooms with equipment for digital design as well as hand-on execution of construction projects."

Voter-approved school district bonds paid for the approximately \$33 million project, with the City of Citrus Heights sharing some costs of the streetscape.

An important challenge in construction was the process of identifying which buildings were structurally sound from the inside out, and which had sections that needed to be torn down and rebuilt due to asbestos and other dangerous materials within the walls.

In a project of this age and size workers never knew what surprises they would find behind walls and in attic spaces. When they did face a potential setback, solutions had to be found

With these issues remedied workers finally had the luxury not afforded to many school renovation projects. Instead of being forced to fit programs into the parameters of already existing buildings, most classrooms were built to meet their needs.

For this reason the term 'vocational education' from 50 years ago is no longer used to describe these training programs. The same equipment was brought in and used that would be found in these five industries.

As in the 'real world' of business, tables are also set up to encourage teamwork and collaboration, and technology can be used to allow teachers to instruct from anywhere in the room. Teaching is no longer dependent on rows of desks facing a teacher and whiteboard.

To preserve the outward historical style of the school, the architectural firm of Williams and Paddon Architects and





Planners studied photos of the original Spanish Colonial school building that served as the high school until it was torn down in the late 1930s. Arched forms and gabled roofs help to maintain the Mission flavor.

In the end, the project's unique approach to construction won a spot on the Sacramento Business Journal's list of 'Best Real Estate Projects' for 2011-2012, under the category of 'Renovation'. Judges were impressed by the transformation from an assortment of old, flat-roofed boxes to a tribute to the California Mission architectural style. ★



PROSECUTOR: Deputy District Attorney Tim Carr, Special Assault & Child Abuse Unit

District Attorney Jan Scully announced today that the Honorable Eugene Balonon sentenced John Faljean to 80 years and 4 months to life in prison. On November 27, 2013, a jury convicted Faljean of 12 felony counts of child molestation and two felony counts of taking lewd photographs.

The victim was between the ages of 8 and 13 when the crimes occurred.

CASE: Kevin Marcus Johnson (01/07/14)

PROSECUTOR: Deputy District Attorney Alan Hengel, Insurance Fraud Unit

District Attorney Jan Scully announced today that 38-year-old Kevin Marcus Johnson (who is no relation to Sacramento Mayor Kevin Johnson) was sentenced to one year in jail and placed on five years felony probation after pleading to felony charges of receiving stolen property and filing a fraudulent document with the Department of Motor Vehicles (DMV).

In April 2010, Johnson purchased a 2002 Cadillac Escalade for \$8,500. Unknown to him, the vehicle's registered owner owed \$28,000 on the vehicle to SAFE Credit Union. As part of an insurance fraud scam, the owner falsely reported his Escalade had been stolen to the Sacramento Police Department and his car insurance company.

Johnson figured out that he had been scammed and asked the California Highway Patrol (CHP) about getting the title to the vehicle. Since the vehicle was legally owned by the credit union, the CHP told him that it was considered stolen and that he needed to allow the CHP to inspect the vehicle. Johnson refused to allow an inspection.

Over the next few months, Johnson spent thousands of dollars replacing the Escalade's frame and body with a GMC Yukon frame and body he had bought at a salvage yard. He reassembled all of the Escalade's parts onto the salvaged frame and body. Johnson then filed a fraudulent vehicle inspection certification with the DMV in order to get the vehicle registered as a salvaged Yukon under his girlfriend's name.

In August 2011, Johnson was stopped by Sacramento police officers when he tried to evade a DUI checkpoint. Upon inspecting the vehicle, it was determined that the vehicle was a stolen Escalade, and Johnson was arrested.

CASE: Jermaine Barnes, Fitima Goodman, Alexander Lewis & Laquwon Warr (01/03/14) PROSECUTOR: Deputy District Attorney Jeff Hightower, Homicide Unit

District Attorney Jan Scully announced today that Jermaine Barnes, Fitima Goodman, Alexander Lewis and Laquwon Warr were convicted by jury for the first degree murder of Fernando Vichez with the special circumstance of committing a murder in the commission of a robbery. The jury also convicted the defendants of second degree robbery and found true the allegation that Jermaine Barnes personally used a firearm and caused the death of Fernando Vichez.

Mr. Vichez was walking home from the Casino Royale when Lewis, Warr and Chelsea Washington, a former defendant in the case, panhandled him for money. The trio then called Barnes and Goodman out to rob Mr. Vichez. During the course of the robbery, Barnes shot Mr. Vichez seven times, killing

CASE: Ramces Orellana (01/03/14)

PROSECUTOR: Deputy District Attorney Timothy Carr, Special Assault & Child Abuse Unit

District Attorney Jan Scully announced today that 40-year-old Ramces Orellana was sentenced by the Honorable Trena Burger-Plavan to 32 years in state prison. On April 10, 2013, a jury convicted Orellana of 13 counts of committing lewd and lascivious acts on a child under 14.

Orellana was the live-in boyfriend of the victim's mother. He molested the young girl when she was between the ages of 11 and 12.



LONE SURVIVOR (Rated R) A Film Review by Tim Riley

The brutal realities of war in the rugged terrain of Afghanistan, as told in "Lone Survivor," hits the audience right in the gut in this unvarnished tale of heroism and courage under the harsh light of Peter Berg's direction.

The director brilliantly captures the unforgiving essence of a Navy SEAL operation that went horribly wrong when a reconnaissance team of four brave soldiers became trapped under fire in the mountains of the remote Hindu Kush region of Kunar province.

Based upon the first-person account of Marcus Luttrell, "Lone Survivor," at least as a title, downgrades the element of suspense, but not enough that the ill-fated mission is relieved of all sense of shock and trepidation.

The opening scene is a fitting prologue that explores in excruciating detail the rigors of the intensely grueling training process, where only those with the greatest mental and physical toughness emerge as full-fledged SEALs.

The point of this exercise is to set the stage for what follows in 2005 when Marcus Luttrell (Mark Wahlberg) and three of his battle-ready fellow soldiers are dispatched on a mission to capture or kill a top Taliban leader responsible for slaying U.S Marines.

The other elite soldiers include commanding officer Lt. Michael

BRUTAL WAR FILM "LONE SURVIVOR" A SOLID TALE OF COURAGE

Murphy (Taylor Kitsch), gunner Danny Dietz (Emile Hirsch), and sonar technician Matthew "Axe" Axelson (Ben Foster), all of whom report to Lt. Commander Erik Kristensen (Eric Bana).

Character development is somewhat limited by the circumstances of the wartime setting. We get a glimpse of the camaraderie between the men at the base camp, mostly the usual male bonding and joking around, but not a lot of perceptive insight.

On June 28, 2005, the fourman surveillance team of Operation Red Wings boarded a helicopter so that they could be dropped into a remote mountainous area with the mission to identify Ahmad Shah, a highlevel Taliban operative that the American military was most anxious to neutralize.

The four SEALs arrive safely on the ground, but soon discover that their radio equipment and satellite phone are not functioning regularly, leaving them isolated when having to make key decisions or relay vital information back to headquarters.

Another immediate problem is that three goat herders grazing their flock stumble upon the men's hiding place, plunging the mission into immediate jeopardy. The SEALS are forced to make an urgent life-and-death decision – how to treat the intruders under the rules of engagement.

In one of the film's most compelling scenes, the soldiers debate the choices facing them. Instantly, they know that protocol dictates they must release civilian noncombatants, but these guys look more sinister and

suspicious than simple farmers. Still, killing the unarmed prisoners so that they could not alert the Taliban was morally objectionable, to say nothing of how the soldiers could be crucified by public opinion and the offi-

cial rules if they killed innocent civilians. Ultimately, the goat herders are cut loose, and the SEALs began an arduous climb to what they hoped would be safety. Soon,

hellfire rained down on them. The Taliban, bolstered by more than a hundred fighters, launch an assault that results in an intense firefight from machine guns, mortars and rocket-propelled grenades. The Americans are seriously outnumbered and outmatched in firepower.

But the hardy band of Navy SEALs hold off the enemy hordes for quite some time, a blood-splattered affair that puts the Americans in a courageous last stand that offers no way out since help is not imminently on the horizon.

Even when the cavalry arrives, in the form of an assault helicopter, the Taliban have already gained the upper hand and blast the rescue team out of the sky, killing another 16 Marines.

Even after falling down mountainous hillsides, pummeled by rocks and falling debris, Luttrell, badly wounded, miraculously escapes to small village where he's hidden by a tribe willing to stand up to the Taliban thugs.

For a war movie that seeks to put the audience in the thick of the action, "Lone Survivor" has adroitly accomplished the mission. Director Berg delivers an unflinching look at the brutality of warfare.

"Lone Survivor" is a significant war movie, and much like "Saving Private Ryan," it highlights the heroism of our soldiers. But it is also much like "Black Hawk Down" insofar as recalling very tragic circumstances of grueling combat.

It is a word of affirmation, comfort, agreement, and relief. It is a word that completes vows, promises, blessings, and all of our prayers. It is a word of release - signaling the end of far too lengthy worship services – and it is the "Get ready...Get set...Go!" when we have gathered around the dinner table to eat. The word, of course, is "Amen."

At its most basic definition "Amen" means, "Let it be." Thus, when we say "Amen" at the conclusion of our prayers, we are not saying, "the end" (though I've heard many children finish that way); we aren't finishing our prayers at all. We are actually beginning, for we are confirming and confessing our trust in the God to whom we have just prayed.

"Amen," then, is a sort of faith signature that we sign to our prayers. "Let it be," we are declaring, "as God wills it." So, every time we invoke this familiar word, we are saying "Yes" to God's perspective about the world and about us, and we are saying "No" to all other perspectives.

Every "Amen" becomes an argument to convince ourselves, over and over again, that God knows us best and knows what is best for us. And speaking of "God

knows," God knows we tend to argue with ourselves, don't we? Late in the day, quietly in the dark; early in the morning before we've had our coffee or medication; driving alone with only the hum of the tires on the pavement: We have these conversations with ourselves that those in recovery have learned to call, "Stinking Thinking."

We create these stories inside our heads about who we are; how we have failed; how ashamed we should be of ourselves; how unworthy we are; how utterly useless our lifework has been; how we are a lousy father, mother, parent, business owner or whatever. I'm convinced that many people can't be quiet, and they can't still their minds because they can't bear what they say to themselves in the quiet moments.

So, they have to keep the volume of life turned up to earbleeding levels and they keep the pace of life at breakneck speed. These people aren't busy, they are suffering, and I can't blame them for wanting to smother the voices in their heads, because a majority of the time that self-guided narrative they are feeding themselves is erroneous, untrue, and downright destructive.

Obviously there are those who do not have the voices of shame and inadequacy screaming in their brains. There are those who have, shall we say, more narcissistic tendencies. Their thinking is about how great they are; how overlooked and persecuted they have been; how they are so much better than that other guy and why can't everybody see that. It's a

line of thought on the other end of the emotional spectrum, but it is "Stinking Thinking" all the same.

This, then, is one of the great benefits of prayer – and I don't think it matters if that prayer is guided by means of a rosary, prayer beads, meditation, a daily repetition of a favorite Scripture, or some other spiritual practice. People who pray aren't simply memorizing a repeated litany of words or practicing religious rituals. They are, in a real sense, reprogramming their software. They are overwriting the faulty components of their thinking.

They are experiencing the transformation of their hearts and minds, for in learning to listen to God's voice in prayer (and listening is a learned art form) they can turn down the cacophony of voices around them. And yes, these other voices include the "Stinking Thinking" inside their own heads.

Those who learn to truly pray are empowered to say, "Amen, let it be!" to God's voice, and to shout in protest, "No, absolutely not!" to all other pretensions especially those pretensions that are manufactured from within. Such praying may not get one everything he or she asks for, but such praying may lead one to getting what he or she needs; and to that, I must say, "Amen."

California's infant mortality rate (IMR) has reached a record low, state health officer and director outcomes." of the California Department of Public Health (CDPH). In 2012, California's IMR was 4.5 infant deaths per 1,000 live births, lower than the rate of 4.8 in 2011.

Infant mortality is defined as the number of deaths in infants less than one year of age. In 2012, there were 503,788 births in California and 2.247 infants died that year. The leading cause of infant death in 2012 was congenital malformations, followed by short gestation and low birth weight.

"Optimal infant health outcomes are influenced by a woman's health even before she becomes pregnant, including avoidance of tobacco, alcohol and drugs, maintaining a healthy weight, and taking folic acid supplements," said Chapman. "Early entry into prenatal care,

genetic testing to identify health risks at birth, breastfeeding, childhood immunizations, and continuing proper nutrition through a baby's developing years all conannounced Dr. Ron Chapman, tribute to improving infant health

> While the African American Infant Mortality Rate decreased from 10.5 infant deaths per 1,000 live births in 2011 to 9.8 in 2012, racial/ethnic disparities in infant mortality persist. African American infant deaths occurred 2.6 times more frequently than Caucasian infant deaths in 2012. The Caucasian Infant Mortality Rate decreased from 4.1 infant deaths per 1,000 live births in 2011 to 3.8 in 2012. The Hispanic Infant Mortality Rate also decreased from 4.9 infant deaths per 1,000 live births in 2011 to 4.7 in 2012.





Are You Getting Too Much Health Care?

Is it possible that the real health problem in America isn't so much the lack of access to quality care as it is too much access? According to a recent article in The Atlantic, this may very well be the case, at least for some of us. But it's also possible that as we begin to unpack this largely unacknowledged problem, we'll discover some compelling and truly health-inducing solutions.

In 2011, a team of physicians headed by Brenda Sirovich, a research associate at the VA Medical Center in Vermont, published a survey in which 42 percent of American primary care physicians said that their patients were getting more care than necessary. While that may sound odd after all, how can more of a good thing be bad? - Sirovich points out that all health procedures include potential upsides and downsides.

"Any time you have an intervention for a patient, no matter how small," she's quoted as saying, "there is also the chance that it's going to do some harm."

The reasons for such overreach are numerous and well want to be sure they are providing the best care possible for their patients; the fear of legal challenges from those who feel their doctors did not do or are not doing enough; patients who are being urged to have treatment that provides a direct financial benefit to their care provider.

Solutions, on the other hand, seem to be fewer and farther

For instance, the recently enacted Affordable Care Act includes a provision to encourage doctors and hospitals to come up with ways to increase quality, reduce cost, and eliminate waste in the health care system. Another effort, spearheaded by the American Board of Internal Medicine Foundation, promotes conversations between doctors and patients about effective care and avoiding unnecessary tests and treatments.

But perhaps the most intriguing and potentially lasting solution can be found in an increasingly popular approach to health care that recognizes that it's not just the patient's body but their mind that deserves consideration.

Evidence that such an approach is gaining traction can be found in the abundance of books being written on the subject, including OB/GYN turned mind-body medicine guru Lissa Rankin's best-seller, Mind Over Medicine: Scientific Proof That You Can Heal Yourself. The book draws on hundreds of scientific studies, all supporting the idea that it's not diet, exercise or even our DNA but what's going on in our thought that matters most, including our spiritual outlook.

One of the most compelling of these studies deals with the health.

A group of researchers in San Diego compared the death records of almost 30,000 Chinese-Americans with those of more than 400,000 randomly selected Caucasians. What they discovered was that the Chinese-Americans died as much as five years earlier than the rest, if they were not only sick but also happened to be born in a year that Chinese astrology and Chinese medicine consider ill-fated.

"The researchers concluded that they died younger, not because they had Chinese genes, but because they had Chinese beliefs," writes Rankin.

This makes you wonder if there are any other beliefs that might be having an adverse impact on our well-being. It also makes you wonder whether the remedy lies in simply changing what the human mind believes or, as Rankin discusses, being open to a more spiritually inspired or Mindbased solution.

Of course, tackling the problem of too much health care will likely require more than one fix. But any approach that decreases the potential for harm and increases the opportunity for healing is a good one and deserves further exploration.

With LENS, Offender Data Quickly **Reaches Officers on Beat**

SACRAMENTO REGION, CA (MPG)

- A police officer on a DUI stop, logs into the online Law Enforcement Notification System (LENS) and finds that not only is the driver under federal supervision for a prior drug offense, but the conditions of release stipulate no alcohol use.

By statute, following release of a prisoner convicted of a drug trafficking crime, crime of violence, or sex offense, the U.S. Probation Office must notify the chief law enforcement officer of the state and of the local jurisdiction when an offender moves into their jurisdiction. All 94 probation offices nationwide are now using LENS to make these notifications easier and more efficiently. And because LENS notifies local law enforcement at the beginning of supervision, it also promotes greater public safety.

For years, notification meant that paper documents with the prisoner's basic information and criminal history, plus their conditions of supervision, were compiled, and then mailed to law enforcement offices. This process was time consuming and the information varied some districts included photos,

others just basic descriptions with height, weight, and eye color. Once the information reached its destination, there was still the problem of how to get it to the people who really needed it— the detectives and patrol officers on the street.

LENS was developed by the federal Judiciary to change all that. LENS pulls information already in the Probation and Pretrial Services Automated Case Tracking System (PACTS) database, and populates a website where local law enforcement officers can use a secure log-in through their smartphone, tablet or computer to see a photo slideshow of certain offenders or as points on a map, showing where they live. They can see the name of the offender, a description, criminal history, aliases, conditions of supervision, and the contact information for his or her probation officer. In addition, the information for the offenders in the system can be searched across multiple jurisdictions and filtered by offense and demographics.

Following a bank robbery, suppose an eyewitness gives a description of one of the perpetrators. Detectives log into LENS, filter offenders under supervision in the area for the type of offense—in this case,


bank robbery—and by the basic physical description provided by the witness. The search produces a list of offenders fitting the description with photos, allowing for a virtual lineup.

LENS also is a time- and cost-saver for probation office staff. LENS can pull the necessary information from PACTS in a fraction of the time it takes staff to compile the documents by hand. And if the local law enforcement agency has signed up for an email account, notification is at the click of a button. It's immediate and there are no postage costs. Even in those instances where a law enforcement agency is still receiving paper documents, LENS still creates the documents more efficiently for the probation

Recently LENS was expanded to begin automated deployment of FBI Flash Notices, alerting the FBI and other law enforcement agencies running a criminal records check through FBI when a subject is placed on supervised release, pretrial diversion, or probation. Thirtytwo districts now are live on Flash.

SBA Economic Injury Disaster Loans Available to California Small Businesses

SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) - Small, nonfarm businesses in 35 California counties and neighboring counties in Arizona and Nevada are now eligible to apply for low-interest federal disaster loans from the U. S. Small Business Administration (SBA). "These loans offset economic losses because of reduced revenues caused by the drought that began on January 1, 2014, in the following primary counties," announced Tanya N. Garfield, Acting Director of SBA's Disaster Field Operations Center-West.

Primary California counties: Alameda, Alpine, Amador,

Calaveras, Contra Costa, El Dorado, Fresno, Inyo, Kern, Kings, Los Angeles, Madera, Mariposa, Merced, Mono, Monterey, Sacramento, San Benito, San Bernardino, San Joaquin, San Luis Obispo, Santa Barbara, Santa Clara, Stanislaus, Tulare, Tuolumne and Ventura;

Neighboring California counties: Orange, Placer, Riverside, San Mateo, Santa Cruz, Solano, Sutter and Yolo;

Neighboring Arizona counties: La Paz and Mohave;

Neighboring Nevada counties: Clark, Douglas, Esmeralda, Lyon, Mineral and Nye

"SBA eligibility covers both the economic impacts on businesses dependent on farmers and ranchers that have suffered agricultural production losses caused by the disaster and businesses directly impacted by the disaster," Garfield said.

Small, nonfarm businesses, small agricultural cooperatives, small businesses engaged in aquaculture and most private, nonprofit organizations of any size may qualify for Economic Injury Disaster Loans (EIDLs) of up to \$2 million to help meet financial obligations and operating expenses

which could have been met had the disaster not occurred.

"Eligibility for these loans is based on the financial impact of the disaster only and not on any actual property damage. These loans have an interest rate of 4% for businesses and 2.625% for private, nonprofit organizations, a maximum term of 30 years, and are available to small businesses and most private, nonprofits without the financial ability to offset the adverse impact without hardship," Garfield said.

By law, SBA makes EIDLs available when the U. S. Secretary

of Agriculture designates an agricultural disaster. Secretary Tom Vilsack declared this disaster on January 15, 2014.

Businesses primarily engaged in farming or ranching are not eligible for SBA disaster assistance. Agricultural enterprises should contact the Farm Services Agency (FSA) about the U. S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) assistance made available by the Secretary's declaration. However, in drought disasters nurseries are eligible for SBA disaster assistance.

Applicants may apply online using the Electronic Loan

Application (ELA) via SBA's secure Web site at https://disaster-loan.sba.gov/ela

Disaster loan information and application forms are also available from SBA's Customer Service Center by calling (800) 659-2955 or e-mailing disastercustomerservice@sba.gov.
