Phone in One Hand. Ticket in the Other

- (MPG) The Citrus Heights Police Department has teamed up with The California Office of Traffic Safety (OTS), the U.S. Department of Transportation's National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA), the California Highway Patrol, and 36 other law enforcement agencies across the greater Sacramento region to eliminate motorists' hand-held cell phone use and texting. The effort is a special federally funded pilot program using the region to test tactics that may be employed nationally in the future.

Through December 9, the Citrus Heights Police will be out in force to issue tickets to drivers using hand-held cell phones or texting. Additionally, we will be working with the cities of Elk Grove, Rancho Cordova, Sacramento, and West Sacramento on saturations patrols in each city.

Nationally in 2010, 3,092 people were killed, and an estimated 416,000 others were injured in motor vehicle crashes involving a distracted driver.

Because too many drivers still don't get the message, that using a cell phone while driving can be dangerous and deadly, this initial distracted driving crackdown marks the first of many enforcement waves taking place over the next year. California's distracted driving law bans all drivers

from using hand-held devices and texting while operating a motor vehicle. Yet, in 2011, the California Department of Motor Vehicles reported 460,487 handheld cell phone convictions, up from 361,260 in 2010.

Distracted drivers in Citrus Heights talking on a hand-held cell phone or texting will receive a first-time ticket costing a

minimum of \$159, with a second offense costing \$279. But the goal of the special enforcement operation is not to issue tickets, but to raise awareness of the dangers of distracted driving.

Preventing Storm Repairs From Becoming Costly Headaches

SACRAMENTO, CA -(MPG) The Contractors State License Board (CSLB) is urging California home owners to be vigilant when it comes to contracting for clean-up or repairs from this weekend's heavy rain and high winds. Sometimes what appears to be the cheapest solution to repair flood damage, remove a fallen tree, fix a downed fence, or patch a leaky roof may not be the best choice.

"Anyone who needs to repair post-storm damage should be looking for a legitimate, qualified tradesperson—especially

in an urgent situation," said CSLB Registrar Steve Sands. "A licensed contractor who is skilled in the specific trade you're seeking is insured and bonded, and is not likely to leave you in the lurch when it comes to properly completing the job at a fair price.

"Consumers can use CSLB's online resources, available at www.cslb.ca.gov or CheckTheLicenseFirst.com, to review the license status of a contractor they plan to hire, and to get tips on the best approach to home repair projects. Any construction job valued at \$500 or more in labor and materials must be done by a state-licensed contractor. California Business and Professions (B&P) Code requires licensees to carry workers' compensation insurance coverage for their employees,

and to be bonded. For tree trimming and removal jobs where the tree is 15 feet or higher and the job is more than \$500, the contractor must be state-licensed. The B&P Code allows a gardener who does not have a state license to work on incidental tree pruning if the

tree is less than 15 feet and the job costs less than \$500.State law requires all Roofing (C-39) contractors to carry workers' compensation insurance, even if they do not have employees, to ensure that consumers are protected in the event of an accident or injury on the homeowner's property.

CSLB urges consumers to follow these tips when soliciting bids from any home improvement contractor:

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
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Sue Frost, Newest Member of City Council Living and Work in Citrus Heights

CITRUS HEIGHTS, CA (MPG) – Born Susan Price (aka: McCormack), Sue Frost the newest member of the Citrus Heights City Council comes to her new job with a lifetime of experience and knowledge of her city.

A resident of Citrus Heights as a child and a large portion of her adult life, Frost paints a very different picture of Citrus Heights than we know today. She remembers, "When I was young there were rolling hills, old oak trees and cows grazing in the fields we now know as Sunrise Marketplace. My current home is the home I grew up in. It backs up to Madison, which then was a two-lane country road with a chain link fence and a rare car passing by. Now it is a main thoroughfare." Frost also notes that she will be the only city council member from the South side of Citrus Heights.

Frost's mother, Gloria McCormack worked as a Folsom police dispatcher and later spent 20 years in Teletype with the Sacramento County Sheriff dept.

Her late stepfather, Edmund McCormack raised her. He was part owner and property manager for over 60 years of the Sacramento Produce Terminal, the midpoint for produce coming from the farm on its way to local supermarkets.

Frost's first aspirations were not towards politics. As a youngster she was a majorette and a member of the drill team at San Juan High. Pacific Union College athletics drew her attention, as a runner, basketball player and summer camp lifeguard in Lake Tahoe. Developing early life skills of persistence and resourcefulness she would bring to adulthood, Frost remembers getting up in the dark to swim a mile every morning, and finding that a good game of pick-up basketball would help her get through a tough test.

Frost graduated in 1976 from

Pacific Union College (a private college in St. Helena near Napa) and worked for 8 years as a Registered Nurse. She specialized as a California Certified Emergency Nurse.

Eventually, her career path took her into the field of mortgage lending. She is now a 29-year veteran and still active as a mortgage broker in Citrus Heights, Her company is Alliance Mortgage and Marketing where she specializes in Residential Lending.

Lending. Along with her career, Frost is actively involved in her community. Presently she is a past Vice President of her Birdcage Heights Neighborhood Association, and served on the Marketing Committee with the Sunrise Marketplace, a ten-block area with hundreds of stores, services and eateries. She was involved in the creation of the Citrus Heights Green Team of which she is president. Their goal is to "provide leadership and engage the community in order to facilitate sustainable principles that promote lifestyles which enhance quality of life".

Local politics came onto Frost's radar only recently when a present council member and several members of the community, noting her passion for the welfare of her community, suggested she consider exercising her talents and dedication as a member of the Citrus Heights City Council. Once she decided to 'go for it', Frost says she "never looked back".

Frost sees and appreciates the generosity and resourcefulness of the people of Citrus Heights. She reflects, "Citrus Heights is like a modern day Mayberry where you can pick up the phone and ask for help and the Community will be there for you".

She sees as most important for our city today and for her upcoming term on City Council, the city's ability to thrive during the country's economic decline, with more economic development and strong public safety services, transportation and schools that will attract young families to build lives here. This includes a diversity of businesses

that will attract more people who will live work and shop within our community.

One of Frost's proudest undertakings to date is her involvement with the Citrus Heights Green Team. She believes recent legislation will impact cost of utilities and she hopes to help homeowners identify cost effective energy wise lifestyle solutions. Says Frost, "Our Green Team members are extraordinary. Each member brings skill and passion. Together we are working to enhance quality of life for our community members. We are concerned about home energy; regional transportation, healthful living and we always want to support our local businesses. Our goal is to grow our membership and promote innovative cost saving solutions for modern

Each year we host a community fundraiser. Our fundraiser for 2013 will be held on April 27th at New San Juan High. The 'Modern Living Fair' will be a part of New San Juan's Centennial celebration and proceeds will be dedicated to the school. At Risk Missing Adults

Citrus Heights Police Department Special Report

CITRUS HEIGHTS, CA (MPG) – On 11/30/2012, Citrus Heights Police Department received a report of two missing adults. The subjects identified as Roderick Paul Clifton (44 years old) and Paula Lane (46 years old) both of Gardnerville Nevada, were last seen leaving a relative's home in Citrus Heights on 11/29/2012 at approximately 2:45P.M. The two were supposed to return to their home in Nevada on the same date. However, neither party has been heard from since nor are they answering their cellular telephones. Relatives are fearful due to the current roadway conditions in the mountains.

The report was categorized as missing at risk due to the details of the incident and no prior history of being missing. A Critical Reach TRAK Flier was created with photographs of the subjects and distributed to all California and Nevada agencies. Please reference Citrus Heights Case# CH12-12148.


They are driving a Dark Blue, 1989 Jeep Cherokee, Lic # 4VPB789. Their usual route is HWY50 into Tahoe, then onto HWY89. The California Highway Patrol and El Dorado County Sheriff's Department has been notified of the missing adults. Anybody with information regarding the missing subjects is urged to call the Citrus Heights Police Department at (916)727-4785.

12/3/12 UPDATE:

Roderick Clifton and Paula Lane, as well as the vehicle they were driving, remain missing. Roderick Clifton is a Citrus Heights resident who stays part time with Lane at her home in Nevada. Citrus Heights PD will continue to coordinate the investigation into their disappearance at this time while working with allied law enforcement agencies.

Throughout the weekend ground officers from El Dorado Sheriffs, Alpine Sheriff's, the California Highway Patrol, and the Douglas County (NV) Sheriff's department as well as families and friends of the missing parties have searched their route for them. Today the El Dorado County Sheriff's Search and Rescue Unit coordinated an aerial search by a CHP Helicopter and snow machine search of roads in the Sierras closed due to snow. The CHP air crew searched the routes most likely taken by Clifton and Lane through El Dorado and Alpine Counties. Citrus Heights Police Department Investigators have found no evidence the missing parties are involved in criminal activity or have met with foul play. A search of credit card and cell phone activity has not produced any leads on their whereabouts. All information points to some unintended event occurring during their drive between Citrus Heights and Gardnerville. Family reports their couple's normal route is Highway 50 to 89, to 88 into Gardnerville, NV.

Search operations have concluded for the day and we are evaluating continuation of searches tomorrow based on recommendations from allied agencies. Any persons with information should notify Citrus Heights PD Dispatch at (916) 727-5500.

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
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A Film Review by Tim Riley

RED DAWN (Rated PG-13)

During the height of the Cold War, at a time when President Ronald Reagan identified the Soviet Union as the "evil empire," director John Milius tapped into the 1980s zeitgeist with the original "Red Dawn."

The 1984 film became a cultclassic that showcased young actors Charlie Sheen, Lea Thompson, C. Thomas Howell, and Jennifer Grey, along with a slightly older Patrick Swayze.

The original premise of "Red Dawn" involved the Soviets invading the United States, followed by the resistance movement that arises when a group of heroic teenagers band together to repel the occupying force.

Fast forward to 2012, and the principal foe is now North Korea, launching a full-scale attack on the Pacific Northwest. You'd think that China would be the more likely invaders, but they are probably waiting to see if we'll repay our national debt first.

The face of the enemy has changed, but the tactics employed by the guerrilla insurgency are pretty much the same. Once again, it's up to a bunch of kids to be the frontline of freedom fighters.

A few minutes pass after the obligatory introduction of the primary teen characters, and "Red Dawn" kicks into high gear with a most unexpected aerial attack of North Korean paratroopers descending on Spokane, Washington.

A murderous, cruel Captain Cho (Will Yun Lee) moves his troops so quickly through town that barely a handful of teens make a getaway to the woods outside town, while most others are rounded up like concentration camp victims.

Jed (Chris Hemsworth), an Iraq War veteran, and Matt (Josh Peck), the high school quarterback, are brothers whose father, Tom Eckert (Brett Cullen),

is a ranking police officer.

The Eckert family has the natural instinct to fight back. As such, Jed, as the result of his military training, becomes the de facto leader of a budding rebel group that includes mostly Matt's high school pals.

As the quarterback of the high school football team, Matt enlists classmates and friends, including Robert (Josh Hutcherson), the tech geek, and Daryl (Connor Cruise), the mayor's son.

Other members of the core group include Danny (Edwin Hodge), the star receiver and Matt's best friend, and Toni (Adrianne Palicki), a pretty girl with a major crush on Jed. Meanwhile, Matt's cheerleader girlfriend Erica (Isabel Lucas) is incarcerated in an internment camp.

As a battle-tested Marine on leave, Jed knows what it takes to live off the land while improvising effective insurgent attacks upon the unsuspecting North Koreans who may be growing complacent after the ease with which they conquered the Pacific Northwest.

Early on, the North Korean invaders prove themselves to be murderous villains, randomly killing civilians for the slightest infractions and generally terrorizing the population into subservience.

Bonding as a team, the rebel youth take on the moniker of "Wolverines," in honor of the football squad. That Jed's younger brother is a hothead results in some complications, considering that he's fixated on liberating his girlfriend from a heavily guarded prison camp.

Nevertheless, the Wolverines gradually become more efficient in carrying out random acts of violence against the symbols of foreign occupation, going so far as to wipe out command posts, patrol unitsss and fortified areas.

"Red Dawn" becomes the fantasy revenge picture it was intended to be. The idea of North Korea successfully invading America is farfetched, to say the least, but the

audience nonetheless delights in well-orchestrated action sequences that involve plenty of explosions and gunfights.

During the course of the insurgency, the young fighters are joined by a trio of grizzled retired Marines led by the spirited Tanner (Jeffrey Dean Morgan), just in time for a major vital assault on the occupier's main communications center.

"Red Dawn" is solid for its action, which mainly requires the insurgents to take their fight to the streets in a gripping attempt to outwit and overcome the intruders, causing major disruptions with nicely timed explosions and gunfire ambushes.

Notwithstanding the wickedness of the communist enemy, "Red Dawn" seems so implausible that if the lunatic Kim Jong-Il were still alive, even he would probably have a difficult time accepting the premise. But the little creep would be thrilled with the notion.

The bulk of "Red Dawn" is all about the action, thereby becoming the type of contemporary action thriller that is, simply put, satisfying popcorn fare.

DVD RELEASE UPDATE

A gangster film that plays more like a Western, "Lawless" captured the brutality of a Prohibition-era battle between moonshiners and corrupt lawmen. Now it's available on DVD and Blu-ray.

Inspired by the biographical novel "The Wettest County in the World," the film version of the adventures of the Bondurant Brothers follows a quest for a piece of the American Dream, albeit an illegal one.

The three brothers (Shia LaBeouf, Tom Hardy and Jason Clarke) fight to maintain their hold on the bootlegging business that is under attack from urban gangsters.

The youngest brother aspires to become Public Enemy No. 1, reaping the benefits that go along with the trappings of a dangerous criminal.

A mysterious woman named Maggie (Jessica Chastain) enters the picture, working in the family business and becoming the girlfriend to the oldest brother.

Living up (or is it down?) to its name, "Lawless" has plenty of brutal violence, with guns blazing aplenty. Special features include "The True Story of the Wettest County in the World."

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

According to the Pew Research Center's recently released report, a full one-fifth of Americans are now unattached to religion, and the Protestant majority is no longer that; Protestant Christians now make up less than 50% of the population.

Where Love Begins

They are simply uninvolved. Why? Some of it is demographic, related to the age of our transitioning generations. Some of it is the natural evolvement of a Western society, and the result of an increasingly diverse nation. But frankly, and this cannot be ignored, the church has earned this decline all by its institutional self.

The Pew Report confirms that the religiously unaffiliated think that religious organizations are "too concerned with money and power, too focused on rules, and too involved in politics." As one deeply committed to the Christian faith, I could not more heartily agree; I say, "Amen."

Combine this study with the respected statistics of the Barna Research Group (which is an evangelical think tank), and the situation becomes clearer still. According to Barna, those unaffiliated with religion use several primary words to describe Christianity, words that include: "Anti-gay, judgmental, hypocritical, and insensitive."

I know not every Christian behaves harshly toward others. The most gracious, caring, and welcoming people I have ever met are Christians, fixed firmly within the institution. But I admit that the most obnoxious, hateful, and critical individuals I have ever met are also religious people. This has to change.

"Change," you ask? "Are you saying we should change our beliefs just to salvage our fleeting market share?" No. Market share has nothing to do with it, but how we treat others has everything to do with it. How can we who follow the loving, open-hearted, redemptive Christ be anything but loving, open-hearted, and redemptive people?

The longer I do this kind of work, and the longer I see these kinds of recent statistics, the more strongly I feel that the last thing most communities need is just another religious institution: An institution that pounds the pulpit and its parishioners with unyielding dogma; that points fingers, condemns, and excludes others from the love of God: that can never confess its shortcomings, admit when it has been wrong, or meet people where they are rather than demanding that people come to it.

No, communities don't need more hardened, inflexible places like these; but every community needs simple, uncomplicated, receptive places. Every community needs launch pads of empowerment and liberation. Every community needs a communion of friendship, freedom, and faith that will build bridges of grace to the world, not boundaries of separation and marginalization. Simply, every community needs a place of radical hospitality and attraction that welcomes all to know a loving God.

I call these places "church." Yes, I know, some churches are far better at being judgmental religious institutions than being living bodies of service and compassion, but my hope endures. My hope endures because where hardened institutionalism ends, love can begin, and the love of God is the most attractive force in the universe.

In the end, may we all say to God be all honor and glory! May God be with you!

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

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
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Why You Shouldn't Cash Out

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

Fig, Beef and Olive Empanaditas

Makes 28 to 30 empanaditas

- 1/2 pound lean (15 percent fat) ground beef 1/3 cup finely chopped green bell pepper
- 1/3 cup finely chopped yellow onion cloves garlic, finely chopped or pressed
- cup chopped stemmed Blue Ribbon Orchard Choice
- or Sun-Maid Figs
- 1/3 cup finely chopped pimento-stuffed olives 2 tablespoons tomato paste
- 1 1/4 teaspoons ground cumin 1 1/4 teaspoons dried crumbled oregano
- 1/2 to 1 teaspoon hot sauce
- 1/4 teaspoon salt
- refrigerated piecrusts for 9-inch pie (1 1/2 packages, 14.1 ounces EACH)

1 egg, lightly beaten with 1 tablespoon water

Heat large nonstick skillet over medium heat. Add beef, bell pepper, onion and garlic. Cook, stirring often and crumbling meat into small pieces, until meat is browned and cooked through. Remove from heat and stir in figs, olives, tomato paste, cumin, oregano, hot sauce and salt. Blend well. Cool.

Preheat oven to 375°F.

Let dough rest at room temperature 15 minutes. Working with one piecrust at a time, unfold dough on lightly floured surface. With 3 1/2-inchround cookie cutter, cut out 8 dough circles from each crust. (Save dough scraps; combine and roll to cut out 6 additional dough circles.)

Brush rim of each circle with beaten egg. Place 1 tablespoon filling in center of a circle and fold to make a half-moon shape. Press edge to seal; flute edge if desired. Place on a lightly oiled baking sheet. Brush tops with egg mixture.

Bake 1 sheet at a time for 15 to 20 minutes or until golden brown.

Fig and Toasted Nut Roll

Makes 28 to 30 servings

- 14 ounces Blue Ribbon Orchard Choice or Sun-Maid Mission Figs (2 cups) teaspoons finely grated lemon
- or orange zest cup toasted, blanched whole almonds.
- toasted walnut pieces, roasted marcona almonds (without skins) or roasted mixed nuts without peanuts Remove and discard fig stems. Cut figs into quarters.

Place in bowl of food processor with lemon or orange zest and process until figs are finely chopped and form a paste, stopping to scrape bowl once or twice

Turn fig mixture out of bowl onto a piece of parchment paper. If nuts are large, cut into halves or quarters. Work nuts into fig mixture, distributing evenly and covering nuts completely with fig mixture. Form mixture into a compact 8-inch-long log. Wrap parchment paper around log, folding in ends to seal. Place in a plastic bag and seal bag. Chill for 12 to 24 hours.

To serve, unwrap and cut with sharp knife into thin (about 1/4-inch) slices. Serve with cheese.

Stuffed Fondue Meatballs with Fig Honey Balsamic Glaze

Makes 18 meatballs

- 1 large head garlic
- tablespoon olive oil large onion, peeled and sliced into
- 1/2-inch rings tablespoon olive oil
- tablespoons sweet Riesling wine (or balsamic vinegar)
- teaspoon EACH salt and pepper 1/2 pound EACH ground pork sausage and
- ground beef tablespoon Fig Honey Balsamic Glaze mixed with 1/2 teaspoon EACH salt, pepper and
- allspice (or nutmeg) 1 1 1/2-ounce piece of Jarlsberg, cut into 18 1/2-inch cubes

Make Fig Honey Balsamic Glaze (recipe follows). Preheat oven to 375°F. Cut across the top of garlic head, then place cut side up in heavy aluminum foil. Pour olive oil over exposed cloves, before enclosing garlic in foil, and place in oven to bake 45 minutes.

Place onion rings in a baking dish. Toss with 1 tablespoon each olive oil and wine (or balsamic vinegar); sprinkle with salt and pepper and bake 45 minutes at 375°F. At 1/2-hour mark, toss onion rings with



1 tablespoon more wine (or balsamic). When garlic and onions are cool enough to handle, remove garlic cloves from skins and combine with onion in food processor, pulsing to coarse-chop to produce 1/2 cup. Reserve 1/4 cup for another use.

In large mixing bowl, gently combine pork sausage and beef with glaze plus 1/4 cup roasted garlic/onion mixture. Using 1 tablespoon measure to scoop meat (a 1-ounce portion), place Jarlsberg cube in center before shaping into 1 1/4-inch-sized meatballs.

Place meatballs about 2 inches apart on foil-lined baking sheet and bake at 375°F for 15 minutes. Transfer meatballs into small servestyle baking dish and drizzle with remaining glaze.

Fig Honey Balsamic Glaze

1/2 cup honey

1/2 cup water

1/4 cup balsamic vinegar Calimyrna dried figs, stemmed

and quartered 1 tablespoon light brown sugar

1/4 teaspoon allspice (or nutmeg)

sprig fresh rosemary 3 sprigs fresh thyme

In saucepan, mix honey with water, vinegar, figs, brown sugar and allspice. Simmer on very low heat about 45 minutes — adding rosemary and thyme for last 15 — until liquid is reduced to half (the consistency of molasses). Remove herbs before separating liquid glaze from figs. You should have generous 1/4 cup.

Note: Process figs until smooth and, if you'd like, add reserved 1/4 cup onion/garlic mixture. Use as a spread, or add to stews and sauces.

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For the First Time in My Life God had 100% of My Attention

A true Story: Written by Mike Williams, while homeless at the Salvation Army Shelter.

After taking care of my in-laws with Alzheimer's for six years in my home, losing my home and land to foreclosure, my kids finding my wife with another man, and then losing millions in a money scam, how was I to recover late in life? No matter what I did I couldn't stop it!

In less than two years my world just crumbled to nothing. I'm still in shock and keep asking God, "Why? I'm a good man, what did I do to anger You so much?"

I'm a proud father of three beautiful kids and grandfather to a five year old girl and loved my wife and life to the end. I'm a giver and freely gave to needy families, our church, friends and family. I prayed everyday thanking God for my blessings. I served my country and have never been arrested for anything.

As a seasoned educated business man, and a world famous medical / dental technology inventor, I would have never imagined that this kind of loss and destruction could ever happen to me and my family. Looking back on everything now I know that I had no control over the events that put me in the streets. It could happen to

My name is Mike Williams, the second oldest of four kids. I was born in San Diego in 1952 and we moved to Pollock Pines in 1959 after my father was killed in a construction accident. We all lived in a small 32ft. pink trailer and were raised very poor and didn't know it. I loved hunting and fishing and sports of all kinds. I graduated the 8th grade at Pine Wood School and high school in 1971 at El Dorado High in Placerville. It was the best time to be a teenager. All my friends and I loved to go on road trips to the lake or drive-in in my 1955 Chevy listening to Wolf man Jack on the radio.

I was very famous at one time. I'm the guy who invented all the tiny video cameras for dentistry and for viewing inside the heart and body. At one time I was worth millions! As a famous inventor and business man I the world teaching doctors how to use my products. During my travels I saw allot of poverty and stories. and started helping the poor and feeding the homeless whenever I could. It was nothing for me to give \$1000's of dollars away to

people and families suffering in the streets.

But the tides have turned. Never in a million years did I think that someday I would be the homeless guy asking for help just like they did. It still seems like a bad dream I can't get out of. When I went homeless I was tired, broke, depressed, and heartbroken from losing my wife, my beautiful ranch and life's work in the blink of an eye.

I learned how to live in my car and survive on food stamps and doing odd jobs for cash that no one else wanted. I learned how to be homeless and asked a lot of questions from other homeless people I met along the way. Living in the streets and camping by the river in a survival mode, I suffered many hardships and got involved in some strange situations because of my innocence as a new homeless person.

To stay occupied when I wasn't looking for work I kept notes on my laptop so someday I could tell everyone my story. I learned that homelessness is an awful life and never understood how dangerous and lonely it could be until it happened to me. I cried allot and gave up many times and even thought about ending it all but I couldn't do that to my kids.

After a while I gave up my car because I was 5 months behind on my payments and didn't need any further troubles. This is when reality really set in! I'm alone with just a few things, scared dirty and weatherworn. I was constantly being moved by the park rangers and police day and night. I never could relax and was always on guard and never imagined how hard this kind of life could be. I was beaten-up and stomped upon at night in the streets many times but somehow made it through day by day.

My last beating wasn't so kind. Late at night in the State Capital Park I was resting under the rose garden fountain where I liked to sleep and smell the roses. On this night I was woken up at about 1 am by two guys kicking me as they tried to take my computer and back pack. I fought as best I could but they stomped me and kicked me in the stomach so many times I passed out. I remember waking up in gut wrenching pain only to find that traveled and lectured all over I had lost everything, even my laptop with all of my notes and pictures of over a year's of work

> I laid there and just broke down for at least an hour. I didn't care anymore and just wanted to die. I kept thinking about my

kids and asking God, "Why are you doing this to me?" In a great deal of pain, and with no help or place to go, I decided to get up and started walking in the dark to check into Sutter Hospital emergency room.

After I got there I went to the window and told the nurse that I was beat up and robbed in the streets and had no medical insurance and was in a lot of pain. She asked me a few questions and gave me some forms to fill and told me to have a seat. After returning the forms I sat down and waited, and waited, and waited to see the doctor.

The nurse was getting upset with me because I kept asking for help, was in severe pain and needed to be seen. I think they we're waiting for me to give-up and just leave! After nineteen hours of waiting I soon realized that I was someone they didn't want to see. But refusing to leave the nurse and doctor finally checked me out and ordered some tests. They discovered that I was really hurt and needed a hernia surgery as soon as possible and after further blood work and tests also discovered that I had walking pneumonia. They had no choice but to admit me. After a full day of waiting and tests I was finally admitted for three days and then released back onto the streets.

the park in midtown. I remember not sleeping for over a week, suffering and I couldn't take it waited to see Mrs. Flowers. I gery on my prostate was painless

anymore. I decided to go to the ER at the Mather VA hospital for more help. I was a veteran I had never used any of my VA benefits. During my exam at the ER the Doctor told me that I that I was very sick and needed surgery right away and to go over to the out-patient clinic and ask to see a surgeon, which I did.

As I waited in line holding myself from the pain, the man at the desk finally checked me in and then told me to come back in ninety days. Ninety days? I couldn't believe it! I think I went nuts and started to cry. I had no place to go and not knowing what to do next I decided to sit down to rest and make a new plan. I remember sitting in the corner crying in pain and asking God to forgive me for all of my sins and forgive me for all of my shortcomings. FOR THE FIRST TIME IN MY LIFE GOD HAD 100% OF MY ATTENTION.

As I was sitting and waiting to calm down, an old veteran sitting next to me asked me if I was there to get into a shelter? I said no and asked him why? He told me that he was homeless for over three years and finally got off the streets with help from a VA case worker named Kristine Flowers and she was going to be in all afternoon, but I needed an appointment.

I thanked him and told him I was still very sick and in a that I will wait all day to see her

noticed that she had many other people waiting to see her, so I just waited and waited until the end of the day.

I was the last one waiting, so as she was leaving and walking by me I stopped and told her my story and right in the middle of everything she grabbed my hand, sat down and told me not to worry any longer because I she had one more bed at the Salvation Army Shelter available. I started to cry and so did she! Don't tell me that God isn't real... Angels do exist you never know when God uses one to answer your prayers.

I never did get the name of the Veteran who told me about Mrs. Flowers but whoever you are I want to thank you for saving my life. I know now that God asked Mrs. Flowers to step in as part of His miracle to showing me His power. I'm not alone anymore. God is my Father and my best friend who really loves me.

Now let's see why I was saved?

I'm out of the streets now for one hundred days living at the Salvation Army Center of Hope. I finally got my hernia surgery at Mercy Medical center four weeks ago and was starting to feel better only to find out that I had a swollen prostate and needed another surgery.

I wish to thank Dr. Jong Chen for doing my prostate surgery lot of pain and had no place to if need be because I had to get and all of the staff at his office go and just walked and rested in off the streets and get my surger- and Sutter Medical Center for ies or I was going to die. I kept fixing me and loving me when I praying to God to help me as I needed it the most. The laser sur-

More to the story: A few weeks ago Dr. Chen called me at the shelter and asked me out to breakfast. I was surprised and had no idea what was on his mind, and of course I said yes. On the call he told me to bring some of my past work and patents because he wanted to talk to me about something. I told him I would bring everything I had and also wanted him to see my new invention and business plan about a system to house and shelter the homeless.

During the meeting I showed Dr. Chen my most famous patents and we talked about all of the famous doctors I used to work with that he also knew. I think he was surprised and impressed as to my knowledge about engineering everything from lasers to medical scopes and couldn't understand why I was homeless.

As I told him my disaster story I noticed a special look of concern of wanting to help me in his eyes, so with nothing to lose I thought I would show him my plan and ideas. As I started to fill him in, as he was reading my plan I noticed a calm peace filled the room like God was sitting at the table with both of us. I said nothing, and let Dr. Chen read and think! Then he looked up and asked me if he could be involved and partner with me?

I was shocked and lost my breath as I took a slow drink of my coffee. After about a minute of silence I looked at him shook his hand and said YES!

Little did I know that all those days ago when I was being beat up and robbed and left for dead, that it took those events requiring surgery in order for me to meet Dr. Jong Chen. Within a week Dr. Jong Chen and I became partners in a new company called Steps Housing Systems Inc.

On the 10th of October he took me out of the shelter and got me a new place to live down town. By the grace God, and His angels, I'm now the CEO and founder of a new company to build my new homeless sheltering housing survival POD.

Thank you for reading my story. My hope is that I can keep all of vou updated as to our mission to shelter and care for the homeless grows. May God bless everyone during this holiday season!

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
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
