SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) -Animal shelters around the country are gearing up for what is known as "kitten season," when cats begin to give birth to countless

kitten litters. Typically beginning in late spring and continuing throughout summer, kitten season stretches the already-thin resources animal shelters and rescues have when the influx of unwanted kittens and cats crowd shelter and kennel space.

The Bradshaw Shelter's Foster Care Program helps save lives and space during this hectic season

"Fostering animals provides a second chance at life for animals who are too young, sick or injured to be available for adoption," said Dave Dickinson, Director, Sacramento County Bradshaw Animal Shelter. "Fosters provide a safe, loving, temporary place to live where the animals can thrive until they are ready to be adopted to their forever homes."

Residents interested in becoming fosters should submit a foster application to FosterRescueProgram@ saccounty.net. The shelter provides all food, bedding, supplies, toys and more at no cost to the foster. Fostering is a great way to help alleviate the impact of kitten season at your local shelter and can provide temporary companionship for those still working from home.

However, working outside of the home doesn't need to be an impediment to becoming a foster; most animals in foster care do not require constant monitoring. Typically, most animals who need fostering are kittens and puppies less than two months old.

As far as space for fostering, a bathroom, laundry room or spare bedroom is typically appropriate. The time commitment for fostering can be anywhere from one to six weeks, depending on their size at the time of fostering. Additional foster needs include caring for sick or injured animals, nursing mothers and litters, animals who need a break from the shelter, and more. Continued on page 3

5 Things Retirees Will Wish They Had Known Sooner

Many people planning for retirement anticipate those post-working years eagerly, ready to veg out after a life of toil. Others plan with greater anxiety, unsure whether they even have an identity without their jobs.

But it may be that retirement these days is far different from what either point of view envisions.

"We all have made decisions based on the information we had at the time, but later realized we would have planned differently if we knew then what we know now," says Patti Hart, co-author with her husband, Milledge, of The Resolutionist: Welcome to the Anti-Retirement Movement.

"That's definitely true when it comes to planning for retirement."

The Harts don't even think of themselves as retirees, but as "resolutionists," constantly challenging themselves to improve.

"I'm busier now than I've ever been," Milledge Hart says. "I'm using this time to be a better me than I could when my days were structured and my time was spoken for."

With that said, the Harts share five things future retirees may wish they had known sooner: Retirement isn't what it used to be. Most people's vision of retirement is built on what the people around them did, but that vision is outdated. "Many of us watched our parents or grandparents settle into a quiet, nondescript life," Milledge Hart says. "We've seen the stereotypical portrayal of aging and irrelevant 'retirees' on TV shows and in the movies." But many retirees today are much more vibrant than those stereotypes and have no intention of sitting quietly on a front porch while the world passes them by. People have more time in this phase of life than previous generations. Anyone who expects retirement to be a few short years tacked on to the end of their working life could be in for an awakening. In actuality, this period could last 20 to 30 years or more. The average 65-year-old man can expect to live another 18 years and the average 65-yearold woman nearly 21 more years, according to the Social Security Administration. And those, remember, are averages. "Some people could spend more years in their postcareer life than they did building their career," Patti Hart says. "Knowing and understanding what that means will help you plan better." It's important to constantly prepare for the next phase. The Harts acknowledge they should have been planning earlier than they did. Instead, time slipped by. "The horizon is closer than it looks," Milledge Hart says. So, when should you get serious about planning for those post-career years? "Right now would be a good time," he says. "But definitely, the sooner the better." Retirees need to redefine their metrics. The Harts say it's important for people to redefine how they measure success in this phase of life because it's different from how they likely measured success in their career days. "The goals are likely to be more qualitative than quantitative," Patti Hart says. "For example, one of our metrics one year was to enhance our celebrations. We found that many holidays and special events were filled with unnecessary stress and were too materially focused. We decided to eliminate eventdriven gift giving." That simple change, she says, improved their lives substantially. Being a resolutionist is fun. If someone had told the Harts when they were in their 30s that their "retirement" years would be filled with so much fun, laughter, and fulfillment, they would have been skeptical. "We laugh more now than we've laughed at any other stage in our life," Milledge Hart says. "This phase is instilled with so much adventure, and it's a feeling that comes from within rather than the happiness of achieving a certain stock price."

"I wish I had known sooner that I could say goodbye to the corporate world and still be interesting and relevant," Patti Hart says. "I wish I had known that retirement is yours to define. I successfully defined my role in the business world, but it didn't dawn on me that I could also reinvent retirement. I don't know why. It seems perfectly obvious now."

Patti and Milledge Hart, co-authors of The Resolutionist: Welcome to the Anti-Retirement Movement, spent more than 30 years as executive leaders in numerous technology and investment banking businesses. In what they refer to as the "Resolutionist" – rather than retirement – phase of their lives, they are applying their resources and skills in new ways to advance philanthropic and corporate activities around

SMUD Announces its 2030 Zero Carbon Plan

SACRAMENTO REGION, CA (MPG) - The SMUD Board of Directors approved the most ambitious carbon reduction plan by any large utility in the nation, in a Board meeting on Wednesday, April 28. This comes after the Board adopted a Climate Emergency Declaration in July 2020 and asked staff to develop a plan to expedite carbon reductions due to the growing threats of climate

"The threats to our region are real and unacceptable," said Board President Nancy Bui-Thompson. "Sacramento consistently ranks as one of the dirtiest air basins in the country and it disproportionately impacts our most disadvantaged residents. Although we have had one of the most aggressive carbon-reduction plans must do more."

Over the past eight months, staff has worked with customers and a variety of stakeholders to develop a plan that relies on:

Proven renewable technologies like wind, solar, hydroelectric, geothermal and biomass energy, and customer demand response. The plan triples renewable resources and battery storage and expands customer-owned resources such as rooftop solar and battery storage. Today, these resources help SMUD deliver power that is about 50 percent carbon free;

Exploring and pursuing new and emerging technologies like biofuels, thermal/battery hybrid, pumped hydroelectric storage, carbon capture and storage, power-to-gas, hydrogen and methane, long-duration batteries and compressed air storage;

business models to pursue emerging technology such as virtual power plants, vehicle-to-grid projects and more to leverage our customers' investments in clean energy to offset the need for energy from conventional gas power plants;

Aggressively support electrifying buildings and vehicles, because these are the two largest carbon emitting sectors in the state;

Retiring, repurposing or repowering SMUD's natural gas power plants, including the retirement of McClellan and Campbells gas-fired plants by 2025. The 2030 Zero Carbon Plan includes a road map for retiring or refueling our remaining plants by 2030, and SMUD will complete a robust reliability study to finalize the schedule.

"We're setting the stanin the nation, we realized we dard for utility carbon reduction," said SMUD CEO and General Manager Paul Lau. "While we have a long history of being leaders in sustainability, this ambitious goal is inclusive and collaborative to align resources across the region to ensure all communities benefit. We'll be working with our regional partners to ensure that we fully maximize the potential for carbon reductions in this region and show the world how it can be done."

> The plan provides 90 percent of our power from renewable sources, including up to an additional: 1,500 megawatts (MW) new local utility solar; 700 to 1,100 MW local batteries; 300 to 500 MW wind; 100 to 220 MW geothermal; 100 MW regional solar

New partnerships and show customers will invest extensively in carbon-free energy resources, including 500 to 750 MW of rooftop solar and 50 to 250 MW of customer-owned battery storage.

> SMUD's plan demonstrates its commitment to finding innovative ways to reach its zero-carbon goal and will do so without impacting reliability or the low rates SMUD customers enjoy. To pay for new technologies and make them available to customers in an equitable manner, SMUD will pursue partnerships, investors and grant funding, while keeping rates below inflation.

> "Our customers are at the forefront of everything we do," said Bui-Thompson. "Our goal of zero carbon will improve the lives of ALL our customers by providing cleaner air, better health outcomes, clean energy jobs and a thriving green economy."

> SMUD has a long history of environmental leadership, helping to pioneer renewable energy programs and standards. In 2018, SMUD successfully reduced greenhouse gas emissions by 50 percent from 1990 levels, the equivalent of removing 377,000 vehicles from the road. SMUD has reduced the carbon intensity of its power mix, which is now about 50 percent carbon free, and also partnered to plant more than 600,000 shade trees throughout the Sacramento region to improve air quality, sequester carbon and reduce customer bills.

SMUD helped grow the local solar market by providing \$130 million in customer incentives to install solar on over 15,000 local rooftops.

CC&Rs: Where's the Law and Order?

Are you also noticing a growing number of CC&R violations throughout Gold River?

Some rules being broken pertain to aesthetics, like a garden hose left on the side of the house or an erect basketball apparatus visible from the street. Others probably have an interesting backstory; three homes in my own village suddenly ceased work on gate and fence projects. Not sure who's to blame for the many weeks of unsightliness.

Other violations are legitimate health and safety issues – garage doors neglectfully left open for hours, cars parked in driveways beyond the period allowed, and from the C'mon People! Department, dog waste disposal bags left filled on the side of the trails. That

Eight years ago, for a story in this paper, I did a ride-along with Gold River Community Patrol. I swear that the number of abuses observed then were a fraction of what it is now.

Why is that?

Upper-middle-class anarchy is one theory, or perhaps the Gold River Community Association and the various village boards are relaxing the rules during the pandemic. Or maybe some villages don't have an effective rules committee or one at all. I mean, considering how seldom people step up, I can see subdivisions having difficulty finding anyone to volunteer as the local sheriff of covenants, conditions and restrictions. When I served on my village's board, I recruited a rules committee chairman who was absolutely wonderful, and enforcement was done compassionately and consistently during those two thankless years.

That gentleman is long gone, sadly, and also sadly, his kind and kindness went with him.

Long-time residents should know better than to abuse the rules, and if anyone has a problem with them, either start a grassroots campaign for change or do what should have been done in the first place and move to a less restrictive community. But when it comes to new occupants, a little bit of slack can be applied if they aren't being handed a set of association and sub-association CC&Rs at the same time as the keys. I was told by a GRCA staff member that residents are provided with the CC&Rs during the title process. I'm too cynical to believe that's always the case, but supposing it is, it's anyone's guess whether these neighbors actually read up. And, no doubt, some villages do a better job orienting newbies to the lay of the land than others. I do recall our Realtor giving us a thick binder with the rules, but that was in 2000 when paper documents were still in vogue.

Today, this vital information is

available online at GRCA.info, albeit outdated as they lack addenda approved over the past several years. Dusty as these docs may be, having immediate access to the CC&Rs - providing the URL is shared - gives no excuse for new neighbors to claim ignorance over the very rules that make Gold River such a desirable place to live.

While we're discussing theories that can explain the apparent rise in rules violations, here's another one: People are scared. The Japanese have a proverb about the nail that sticks out gets hammered down. Few of us want to be that nail, and there's lots of good reasons. Number one is things can backfire on you. Who winds up being the jerk when someone complains about a loudmouth at the movie theater? Not the one who can't stop yapping. Who gets sent home on ABC's "The Bachelor" and "The Bachelorette" after complaining about a vile housemate who isn't there for the right reasons? Not the bully. None of this is fair, but it's a fact of life.

Let's test this by playing out some likely scenarios.

"Hi Bob," says the man seeing his neighbor getting the mail. "Hey, love that you got a new dog, but you're letting him run around the front almost every day. Per the CC&Rs, could you mind making sure your pooch is on a leash from now on? That would be super-dee-duper."

"Go (blank) yourself, neighbor!" Bob responds, before giving the bird and slamming the front door behind him.

And so begins a feud that will last until one of the neighbors moves or dies. Clearly, that strategy didn't work. Let's see if a different approach to a different situation bears better results.

The note left on the front porch reads, "Dear Nancy. It's your neighbor Barbara and I thought a polite note would be better than a call. Because of COVID, I thought it best not to knock on the door. I want to let you know that I can see your portable basketball hoop from over the fence and it hinders my beautiful view from the kitchen window. Don't get me wrong – I love the sound of children merrily playing, but I also like being able to watch nature unobstructed. Whenever your kids and their friends aren't shooting baskets can you be a dear and put away the equipment? I'd

really appreciate it, as would my husband who you may not know is dying of cancer and has less than two months to live."

"Stick it, Barbara, and your husband, too!" reads the note Nancy threw over the fence.

Instead of trying to work things out directly, maybe it's better to let GRCA or the village board handle such issues. Easier said than done, unfortunately. If any official action is taken up, it won't be until after the next board meeting, meaning the problem will go on at least another month or two. And there's no guarantee that the concern will be handled discreetly or effectively.

Another wrinkle: There's no anonymity between neighbors. Rule breakers will figure out who filed the complaint, making for awkward existence through eternity. Not helping matters, at least based on my experiences, few wrongdoers ever take responsibility or handle authority maturely. In their eyes, they're the ones being harassed by meddlesome, zero-tolerant troublemakers who need to get a life.

Never mind that the garage left open all night is a welcome mat for burglars. So what if a vehicle parked overnight in the driveway makes that house and the entire street more vulnerable to theft. As the security officer told me on my ridealong, a car in the driveway makes for a great hiding spot when community patrol does a drive-by. Not that this ever crosses the mind of a homeowner who stores boxes and junk where the second or third car should be.

What a wonderful world it would be if everyone abided by the rules of a homeowner association, and if any are excessive or outdated there's always the opportunity to change it by taking it up with the board. My position is if you don't like something in the CC&Rs, try to change it by taking it up with the board. Just don't take it out on your neighbors. To quote the late, Sacramento-born Rodney King, "Can't we all just get along?" Then again, Mr. King might have never lived in a community with an HOA.

A Showdown Over Crime and Punishment Looms

Should California continue to reduce punishment for crimes large and small, or has it gone too far and implicitly allowed criminals to prey upon Californians without fear of imprisonment?

The question has reverberated throughout the state over the last half-decade, ever since former Gov. Jerry Brown lunched a personal crusade to scale back the lock-'em-up laws that California enacted - including some that he signed - in the 1980s and 1990s.

California voters will answer it next year by either giving newly appointed Attorney General Rob Bonta, a fervent believer in the softer approach to crime, a full term or replacing him with someone with a tougher attitude toward lawbreakers.

The conflict jelled on Monday when Sacramento County District Attorney Anne Marie Schubert declared her candidacy, saying, "The California criminal justice system is in chaos" due to laws and policies that value rehabilitation over punishment.

Schubert devoted much of her announcement to denouncing Los Angeles District Attorney George Gascón and San Francisco District Attorney Chesa Boudin as "rogue prosecutors," criticizing state legislators for ignoring crime

punishments, and tying Bonta to them.

"Rob Bonta has no regard for crime victims," Schubert told the Sacramento Bee in a pre-anouncement interview. "I think Rob Bonta is similar, if not identical, to the district attorney in San Francisco and Los Angeles."

In Schubert, the state's criminal justice traditionalists probably have their strongest challenger to Bonta, a state legislator who was selected by Gov. Gavin Newsom as a successor to Xavier Becerra after the latter joined the Biden administration in Washington.

While moderate Republican Nathan Hochman, former assistant U.S. attorney in the Bush administration, also is running, he is little known while Schubert, a former Republican who is not registered with a political party, achieved statewide and even national attention for recently prosecuting serial rapist and murderer Joseph James DeAngelo Jr. Dubbed the Golden State Killer, DeAngelo, a former policeman, was tied to the decades-old crime spree by a novel use of DNA evidence.

Schubert can expect support from all but a handful of the state's other local prosecutors and police organizations which have opposed efforts by Brown and like-minded legislators to soften punishment. She surrounded herself with families of crime victims as she announced her candidacy.

Bonta, on the other hand, will be backed by the national criminal justice reform movement that a few of those years has been working state-bystate and county-by-county

victims in their rush to soften to replace traditionalist prosecutors with those favoring rehabilitation over incarceration. Billionaire investor George Soros has been one of the major drivers behind the movement.

Schubert, in fact, had overcome such a challenge in winning re-election three years ago. When Gascón, who had been San Francisco's district attorney, moved to Los Angeles and unseated District Attorney Jackie Lacey in 2020, it marked a new intensity in the philosophical clash.

He, Boudin and two other like-minded district attorneys have battled with the California District Attorneys Association over policy issues and formed their own group, the Prosecutors Alliance of California, to push for criminal justice reforms

The next big California battle for the contending factions was to have been in Orange County, where District Attorney Todd Spitzer, a former Republican legislator, will be facing Peter Hardin, a Democrat and former prosecutor, next year.

However, Becerra's resignation, Bonta's appointment and Schubert's declaration of candidacy create an even more intense showdown over crime and punishment in the nation's most populous state.

Should Schubert prevail next year, it would not only be a big win for criminal justice traditionalists, but also make her a potential candidate for governor or U.S. Senate thereafter.

Through the generosity of the Gold River Messenger, this column serves to provide an update about matters affecting the unincorporated community of Gold River.

This summer the Sacramento County Board of Supervisors will have a big decision to make regarding whether or not to implement "Laura's Law." I want to take this opportunity in my monthly article to explain to you what this law is, why this is coming before the Board of Supervisors, and why it is such a big deal.

Laura's Law is named for 19-year-old Laura Wilcox, who was a college student working in a Nevada County mental-health clinic in 2001, when she and two others were shot and killed by a man with untreated severe mental illness. After the incident Laura's parents chose to advocate for assisted outpatient treatment (AOT) for individuals who meet strict legal cri-

access community mental health services.

Since then, California counties have the option to "opt in" to the program, and that has been done so far in most of the larger counties. To date, Sacramento County has been one of the few larger counties who has not opted in and has never held a public hearing at the Board of Supervisors regarding whether or not to implement the program.

This process changed however with the passage last year of AB 1976, which requires counties like Sacramento to hold public hearings at the Board of Supervisors about whether we will "opt in" or "opt out", and if we choose to "opt out" we have to provide specific reasons for this to the State. The deadline for Sacramento County to have this hearing and formally decide will be July 1st of this year.

Earlier this month a mentally ill homeless man assaulted a child on Freeport Blvd. in Sacramento, only to be released back into the public in less than 24 hours – and this was after teria and who, as a result he had been captured of their mental illness, and released previously are unable to voluntarily for assault and battery

of another woman. As a former emergency room nurse, I understand firsthand that there are people living in our community who cannot take care of themselves, and they desperately need help.

People like this should be able to get help before more crimes are perpetuated in our communities - it's the compassionate and safe way to move forward. I do not know how I will vote on this issue when it comes before me as I want to have an open ear to both sides as well as be able to fully comprehend the fiscal impacts, but I do know this is a growing problem and we should be handling this problem better than we are right now.

Does Medicare Pay for A Gym Membership?



Two of my neighbors told my wife that they get free gym membership through Medicare.

Any truth to that, as I never heard about this before?

Regards, Sammy from San Diego

Hi there...Sammy:

Sammy the answer is NO! Medicare Parts A and B do not provide a gym membership for those who are enrolled in Medicare. It would be logical if they did because exercise does keep you healthy.

In the Medicare & You handbook under "What's NOT Covered by Part A & Part B?" It states... "Original Medicare does not cover everything and if you need certain services that Medicare doesn't cover, you will have to pay for them yourself unless you have other insurance to cover the costs unless...

- You have other coverage (including Medicaid) to cover the costs.
- You're in a Medicare Advantage Plan that covers these services.

Some of the items and services that Original Medicare doesn't cover include:

- Most dental care.
- Eye examinations related to prescribing glasses and eye wear.
- · Dentures.
- · Cosmetic surgery.
- · Acupuncture.
- Hearing aids and exams for fitting them.
- Long-term care. See more information about paying for long-term care in the Medicare & You handbook.
- Concierge care (also called concierge medicine, retainer-based medicine, boutique medical, platinum practice, or direct care).
- Covered items or services you get from an opt-out-doctor or other provider (except in the case of an emergency or urgent

An extra benefit that helps to enhance Medicare Advantage Part C plans is that when one enrolls, they are offered Silver Sneakers or other types of memberships

which provides a gym benefit. The Toni Says® Medicare team always advises those new to Medicare or changing their Medicare plan to discuss if their primary care doctor or specialists are in that Medicare Advantage plans network.

Since Original Medicare does not cover dental, I would recommend that you talk to your dentist and see which dental insurance plan he/she prefers.

There are 2 different types of dental plans:

- 1) Traditional or indemnity dental insurance plans which is generally higher in premium and the preventive services are usually covered at 100%, basic restorative is generally covered up to 80% and major procedures at 50%. Many of the traditional/indemnity dental plans may have a wait for services such as fillings, root canals, bridges, crowns, etc.
- 2) Discount dental plans are generally less expensive than traditional dental plans. These plans provide a discount for services, but your dentist must be part of the plan and agree to give the dental discount.

Medicare and You handbook discuss eyeglasses (after cataract surgery) which is a limited benefit because Medicare will cover one pair of eyeglasses with standard frames (or one set of contact lenses) after cataract surgery that implants an intraocular lens. The Medicare Part B deductible will apply for the cataract surgery and you will pay the 20% of the Medicare-approved amount.

Medicare defines glasses as an elective. I am not sure why glasses are considered elective (not covered), since we do need to see to drive, but it is.

Hearing aids are also considered elective. "Medicare covers the exams if your doctor or other health care provider orders them to see if you need medical treatment. You pay the 20% of - the Medicare-approved amount and the Part B deductible applies."

The occupants of the home on Discovery Village Ln. in Gold River were






