

- A federal court decision has ruled that illegal camping ordinances are unconstitutional and that local governments cannot cite or arrest anyone sleeping on public property.

On September 4, 2018, the Ninth Circuit Court of Appeals ruled on the case Robert Martin v. City of Boise, stating that enforcing anti-camping ordinances when adequate shelter beds are unavailable is unconstitutional.

Because of that ruling, the Sacramento County Department of Parks stopped enforcing the

SACRAMENTO REGION, CA (MPG) City of Sacramento's anti-camping ordinance and the County ordinance prohibiting camping without a permit.

> Since January 2018, Sacramento County rangers have issued 1,834 citations for unlawful camping under the County ordinance, and 224 citations for unlawful camping under the City of Sacramento ordinance.

The County is currently evaluating enforcement options under existing laws and regulations and will provide information to the Board on next steps.

Sacramento County Rangers will continue to enforce ordinances including but not limited to campfires, littering, dogs off leash, possession of a shopping cart and environmental degradation.

"As soon as I found out about the ruling, I suggested our board meet to discuss its implications, especially for my constituents who rightfully demand a clean and safe Parkway," said First

District Supervisor Phil Serna, who represents the lower reach of the American River Parkway.

"I have many questions, including why County Counsel advised that park rangers not enforce the illegal camping ordinance without notifying or coordinating with board members," he continued.

- Sacramento was overrun by superheroes on Saturday, September 22 when the DC Wonder Woman Run Series 5K and 10K run through Capitol Mall. Sacramento was the first city in the United States to participate in this race.

The event was produced by SON Events in conjunction with Warner Bros. and DC Entertainment. Sarah Ratzlaff, director of marketing for SON Events, said, "The race has a strong overall theme of women's

empowerment. Wonder Woman embodies strength, bravery, and power. The goal of the event is to show that there's a Wonder Woman in all of us. That's why we're using the hashtag #IAmWonderWoman."

The festival area was decohosted its inaugural event with a rated with giant balloons and lined with an array of fluttering Wonder Woman flags. Area streets were blocked off by police cars, flashing their red and blue lights. Approximately 1,300 people participated in the 5K and 10K runs. The first-place finishers were Sandra Khounvichai with a time of 20:26 in the 5K and Stephen Harms with a time of 48:43 in the 10K.







Local Area Centurion Genevieve Sinclair Honored by General John A. Sutter Chapter, NSDAR

RANCHO CORDOVA, CA (MPG) - The General John A. Sutter Chapter, Sacramento, National Society Daughters of the American Revolution (DAR), is pleased to honor 58-year chapter member Genevieve Glock Sinclair as she celebrates her 100th birthday this October.

Genevieve joined DAR in 1961 in her home chapter in Columbus, Platte County, Nebraska. Encouraged by her father to join DAR, Genevieve traced and documented her lineage to American Revolutionary Patriot Peter Bobb who served under Captain Andrew Stewart and Colonel Robert Elder in the Lancaster County, Pennsylvania 10th Battalion Militia. Genevieve's sister, Naomi Ficke, was also a member of DAR.

Born in the small farming community of Rising City, Nebraska, Genevieve grew up with two siblings: one brother and one sister. Upon graduation from high school, she graduated from Midland University in Fremont, Nebraska, earning a degree in both commerce and English. After teaching for a time in Bristow, Nebraska, Genevieve decided to move to a larger city, Torrington, Wyoming, where she worked as a teacher, and eventually held the position of secretary to the school district superintendent.

Genevieve met her husband, Kenneth Sinclair, in Nebraska where he was working for her uncle. Kenneth had grown up in an orphanage and was eventually invited by her uncle to work on his farm for a summer church project. Upon graduation from high school, Kenneth returned to work on her uncle's farm for a short time prior to enlisting in the United States Army during World War II. It was at this point that Genevieve and Kenneth made the decision to write to each other, which blossomed into a classic tale of World War II romance. Prior to

his being shipped overseas to serve, Genevieve and Kenneth were married in South Carolina on 4-4-44, a date she noted was one that was always easy for her husband to remember.

After the war, the couple resided in Nebraska until their move to Rancho Cordova in 1966. Genevieve transferred her DAR membership to the General John A. Sutter Chapter in 1968 where she held the position of Chapter Recording Secretary prior to serving a two-year term as Chapter Regent from 1973 to 1975

During their 54 years of marriage, the couple raised four children at their Rancho Cordova home: David, Philip, Kay and Kent. Genevieve has also been blessed with five grandchildren, thirteen great-grandchildren, and four great-great grandchildren. Kenneth passed away in April of 2000. Of all her lifelong accomplishments, Genevieve is most proud of her family.

When asked what advice she would give to young people in this day and age, Genevieve stated that she would remind them to listen to their parents,

and to seek God and have communication with Him.

On the subject of her 100th birthday, she attributes her longevity to good genes and heritage, noting that she had an Aunt that lived to the age of 104, and a Grandmother who lived to age 103.

"Faith in God is paramount. Faith combined with positive attitude is also a major component for a long and productive life," Genevieve stated when asked what advice she would give for healthy living. "Genes and clean living do play a part but you also have to have a sense of humor, good attitude, and always look for the best in people," she added. Genevieve continued by quoting one of her mother's favorite sayings. "There is a little bit of good in the worst of us, and a little bit of bad in the best of us," a very wise mantra for all to consider.

Genevieve Sinclair is truly an inspiration and a special gift to all who have had the pleasure of knowing her.



DELING PROPER AND THE COMMUNITY WITH

Through the generosity of the Gold River Messenger, this column serves to provide an update about matters affecting the unincorporated community of Gold River.

In 2014 California passed Proposition 47, which reduced the classification of most nonviolent property and drug crimes from a felony to a misdemeanor. This policy resulted in a surge of automobile and petty theft crimes throughout the state of California, and the effect of this was seen in businesses and on the streets of Sacramento County almost immediately. Since our jails are overcrowded and we do not have room to jail people for misdemeanor crimes, Sacramento Sheriff's would arrest someone for something like theft or drug dealing, only for them to be released that same day, skip bail, and get arrested soon after for something new.

There was a person committing crimes in Orangevale who was the poster-child for this behavior. He was unofficially referred to as the "Mayor of Orangevale" and was locally

drunk in public and wreaking havoc on the community. In a period of eight days he was arrested six times, and each time he would be right back in the community the same day he was booked into jail. Another person in the County had around 1600 arrests accumulated through his lifetime (and no, that is not a typo).

In response to these, and similar criminals who act with complete disregard for the law, in 2016 Sacramento County implemented something called the "Chronic Nuisance Offender Program". It is a program I take pride in, and I want to explain to you how it works.

Whenever our Deputies notice someone who is getting arrested over and over again, they keep track and as soon as they have been arrested for the tenth time in a one year period, they notify the District Attorney's office. A District Attorney then offers the criminal a choice, they can either spend 120 days in jail, or they can spend 90 days in a drug or alcohol treatment program (90% of the people in this program are addicts). This produces one of two outcomes:

If they reject the treatment and spend the 120 days in jail, at a minimum the community can be at peace for a four month period. But in many cases, we are seeing a much greater impact than that. Since these criminals are used

notorious for always being to being able to get back onto the street the same day they are arrested, a four month stint in jail is a huge shock. Upon release, many times they either leave the area or clean up their

If they enter the drug/alcohol treatment program, we are getting the same benefits as the jail option since they are off the streets for 90 days, but with the added benefit of being able to attempt to treat one of the root causes for their criminal behavior. This only heightens the likelihood that we can positively impact their lives.

Neither I nor the majority of my district supported Proposition 47 because it makes it more difficult for our local law enforcement to keep us safe, but I am proud of what Sacramento County has done to think outside the box and work with what we have got.

The 2018-19 Live Your Dream and Ruby Award application window are open now and both close on November 15, 2018. Both applications may be





- The most common criticism of major big-budget video game studios is their reliance on repetitive, unoriginal

has become synonymous with their game-world maps filling up with copy-and-paste icons, each indicating a meaningless collectible or busywork sidequest. To complete these tasks, so goes the classic critique, is to be reduced from elite soldier, ancient assassin, or (insert video game avatar here), to little more than an errand runner for wealthy studio executives

filler. Ubisoft, in particular,

who care only about writing "50 hours of gameplay!" on the back of the box. Quality, the gaming community screams, is always preferable to quantity.

But as my life has progressed from middle schooler (when I first started writing this column), to high schooler, to now college student with a job, these filler distractions in bigbudget games have begun to take on increasing value. I find myself struggling to progress through God of War, the newest blockbuster extravaganza (and likely universal Game of the Year winner), instead returning again and again to Mass Effect: Andromeda, a mediocre 2016 release, to complete a few of the menial tasks that for so long I despised.

As I slowly shift into the world of adult commitments, I simply have less time and less mental energy to invest in a sprawling, dramatic, tightlyconstructed cinematic story like God of War. Though the dynamic between that game's two main characters (a father and a son) is irrefutably engaging, I prefer to spend my limited relaxation time exploring Mass Effect: Andromeda's familiar planetscapes than investing in God of War's emotionally heavy intra-family drama.


As such, these pieces of busywork drivel that I have, for so long, seen as a blight upon otherwise competent games have taken on new meaning and new importance. The value in games, now, has shifted from their immense storytelling potential to simple escapism, a way to temporarily project my brain out of the worries of this world and occupy it with the trivialities of another. The simple ability to exist in these spaces, even for short spurts of time, is what matters, especially

because the multi-hour blocks of free time necessary for storybased experiences have become increasingly rare.

As a result, I finally understand why Ubisoft-esque games are so popular with adult gamers whose tastes, supposedly, are refined enough to know what they're missing. As the gaming hobby slowly gives way to other commitments, quantity is as good as quality when it comes to the primary reason why most people play video games: to, for a short time, inhabit another body and visit another world.

The Two-Year Globalist War on President Trump

SACRAMENTO REGION, CA (MPG) -

The most vicious elections in our history were that of Jefferson in 1800, Lincoln in 1860, Lyndon Johnson in 1964, Ronald Reagan in 1980, but none of these were more contentious than that of Donald Trump in 2016 who was opposed by both political parties. "Never Trumpers" (mostly Republicans) did not resort to street riots but "Not my President" (mostly Democrats) did following his election in many cities throughout the land

In 2016, Most Americans knew that something was wrongreally wrong. Independents, those refusing to align Democrat or Republican, were about 40% stronger than either party. Most Americans felt lied to by both parties and the media. Most Republicans felt betrayed when they elected politicians to restore the Constitution and the economy and these same politicians appeared to join the other side as soon as they arrived in Washington D.C. Many had wondered the value of their vote outside "the lesser of two evils" philosophy.

Enter Donald Trump who mostly said what others were afraid to say, beginning with illegal immigration. Our Mexican friends have indeed invaded our country and taken, not just the jobs Americans did not want, but the ones they did want as well. They entered every field and their illegal children, being bilingual, are now favored in most other jobs. When politicians say they will build a fence to help preserve American jobs almost no one believed them. Trump was a builder, building magnificent structures, and was believed.

Simply put, the media, the establishment, and the political parties had lost their credibility. The more the establishment or media ganged-up on Trump the more his following grew. He even identified the establishment media as "fake news." His bravado was

somewhat refreshing from the Bush's, Clinton's, Boehner's and McConnell's "no real change" rhetoric.

The establishment opposition to Trump certified another factor in his favor. He was not one of them. He would not be controlled by them, as were his predecessors from both parties. Nor did any special interest group control him. This may have been the first time in 120 years that this was so. Only the Constitution should guide and restrain him—not the moneyed establishment.

Another factor in his favor, also not mentioned by the press, was that most Americans believed that the economy was on a crash course. No country can long endure when more money is spent than taken in. No candidate understood the economy better than Trump, having worked successfully with it for decades. He had the most incentive to get it back to a sound base more than any other candidate, or even you or I; we lose hundreds when it blows, he loses billions.

The Trump phenomenon was essentially a rebellion against the establishment by a population tired of being manipulated every four years into staying on the road to bankruptcy with the same failed internationalist foreign policy presented by establishment candidates of both parties.

The establishment media attempted to show candidate Donald Trump as, a joke—certainly not a serious candidate, not a real conservative, a flip-flopper on the issues, anti-women, anti-immigration, insulting to everyone, least likely to beat Hillary Clinton, only attractive to white males, and not in touch with reality and more.

What was very different from previous brutal elections where such rhetoric ended after the election, was that, for Trump, it never ended—indeed it amplified his first two years in the White House. Opponent sympathizers largely financed by CFR member George Sores, took to the streets before the inauguration with signs "Not my

president" while Republican opponents joined the "Never Trump" movement.

The intelligence community with Obama Administration holdovers, now referred to as the Deep State, targeted a duly elected president with what is now known as the "Russia Hoax." Finding no evidence of Russia/Trump collusion after a two year Special Council Mueller probe; all in an effort to impeach their hated president as a traitor. CFR member and Obama CIA Director, John Brennon had called Trump a traitor. This while completely ignoring, even covering up, a real Russian/Clinton collusion story and the Russian Uranium One deal giving Russia 20% of America's uranium profiting the Clintons by millions. This, with the bleach-bitted 35,000 Hillary Clinton emails so attesting to this deal, many of which were classified documents sent over her unsecured server.

While the Deep State fabricated collusion was ongoing the establishment press worked at getting Trump Administration personnel to turn on their boss from within, through anonymous sources showing Trump unfit for office. They hoped to "prove" incompetence, and thus exercise the 25th Amendment to remove him from office. But the Trump staff held firm

Excepting Lincoln, no president should fear an assassination attempt more than Trump and many still fear that end; he is so hated by the establishment. Why? Anything is Possible

Ainsley's Angels Inspires Hope

SACRAMENTO REGION, CA (MPG) - Ainsley's Angels is a national nonprofit organization aimed at servicing the special needs community through their race series, consisting of athlete riders and runners who participate in races across 30 states and over 60 cities.

The inspiration for all this is Ainsley, the daughter of Marine Corps Major Kim and Lori Rossiter. Before turning four, Ainsley was diagnosed with Infantile Neuroaxonal Dystrophy (INAD), an extremely rare terminal illness that slowly causes global paralysis. Most children diagnosed with INAD pass on before reaching ten years of age, as there is no cure or treatment to help slow down this very progressive and terminal disease. Ainsley passed away in 2016 at the age of 13, but not before she completed over 100 races, including nearly 20 half-marathons.

Sacramento's chapter of Ainsley's Angels is in its third year, founded and directed by Russ Howell – the organization uses the title "ambassador" rather than chapter president.

Howell identifies as a lifelong endurance athlete. He undertook his first 100 mile bike ride at 12, ran track in high school, and stayed in shape in his adult life through a stint in the Army where he was a member of a COLT team deployed to Kosovo. In 2010, Howell and his wife had a son born with serious medical complications and he stopped participating in endurance activities. When his son passed away shortly before his second birthday, Howell got back into running as form of escape and therapy. Running helped him keep centered and deal with grief.

A year later, Howell's second child was born. As a baby shower gift, his family pitched in and got him a very nice running stroller. From then on,

Howell, now an accountant, put in twenty to thirty miles a week with his son. Time passed, and eventually his son grew too big to fit in strollers, but Howell was eager to keep up with his running. One day, Howell came across an article on Ainsley's Angels in Running World, and sent an email to the president of the organization. Sacramento has a vibrant running vibe, with many races in the area, he told her. It would be a great area for the organization to expand and a perfect way for him to take his running to the next level and give something back.

Howell started the new Sacramento chapter from ground zero and began fundraising, recruiting members, reaching

out to race directors, and getting the Ainsley's Angels name out to local hospitals and care centers. Thanks to Howell's connections within the racing community and the people he met while caring for his first son's health complications, the group was immediately accepted and progress quickly snowballed. Today there are close to 200 members, ranging from as young as five years old to two adult riders who are in their thirties. The group has also raised enough money to purchase eleven racing chairs for its riders to keep and use with their families.

"Ainsley's Angels taught me that you don't need to run, or even walk, to be an athlete," says adult rider Emily Crosgrove. "What's more important is having the will to get out there."

The organization provides a 100% free service to the disabled community, which is no easy feat – racing chairs can coast nearly \$5,000. There are three levels of chairs which vary depending on the age, size, and disability of

the rider. Every chair has three wheels and a fixed front wheel, which provides stability and keeps the chairs from going off

"The smiles, the celebration, the joy, that's what it's all about," says Howell. "To see that level of excitement for people that would never be able to experience a race, showing up to the something like the California International marathon (one of Ainsley's partners) surrounded by 10,000 amazing athletes. It takes them out of their world."

Sacramento's Angels are set to run their first ultra-marathon in November, the 200-mile Napa RAGNAR relay that runs from SF up the coast and back down to finish in Napa. Six athletes and two riders will participate.

"There's no better feeling than the wind in my hair as I glide through a sea of fast moving bodies, encouraging stagers to never give up," Crosgrove added. "If myself and my team could be out there on the road, then anything is possible."
