"The initial \$33 billion total cost estimate has already ballooned to more than \$60 billion, and the story is about to get worse. The California Rail Authority is facing potential cost overruns of \$400 million dollars on just the first 29 miles of the 500+ mile project. And this is on the flat and sparse Central Valley. What will the cost overruns be in the infinitely more crowded and complex Bay Area, Los Angeles, and San Diego? "I'm incredibly disappointed that during today's oversight hearing, where legislators and bullet train representatives went back and forth on the new timelines, routes and funding proposals, there was zero opportunity for anyone in opposition to speak. On a project this big, the critics should be more than a





Switzerland's Unique Travel System Is the Best in the World

You can set your clocks by Swiss trains, along with its postal busses, lake steamers, and city bus lines. All are connected in a dense travel system that is synchronized for amazingly easy and prompt connections that is an unforgettable experience.

Although Switzerland's unique paradise is only 216 miles from north to south and 137 miles from east to west, it encompasses four diverse cultural regions where the people speak different languages: German – 64%, French – 23%, Italian – 8%, and Romansch – 1%.

After landing at Zurich's airport, it's an easy walk to the airport's own train station. From here the route travels through eastern Switzerland to the Europe's largest Rhine Falls and the city of Schaffhausen, with its landmark Munot fortress.

You pass Lake Constance which shares its shoreline with Germany and Austria, and in about an hour arrive in the university city of St. Gallen, founded in the seventh century. A popular attraction is the Abbey Library, which houses some 170,000 rare books and manuscripts.

The best way to discover all the delights of Switzerland is by taking its "Grand Train Tour" — eight inter-linked rail routes which bring together the highlights of Swiss public transport,

placing the emphasis on mustsee attractions. This wonderfully diverse journey will whisk you through spectacular scenery as you lean back, rest, and relax in comfort.

One of the most popular train routes is the famous Glacier Express which links the Alpine resorts of St. Moritz and Zermatt that is surrounded by snow-capped mountains and the majestic Matterhorn. The train crosses no fewer than 291 bridges, passes through 91 tunnels and travels along seven valleys. The journey from Canton Valais to the Engadine takes about eight hours, winding

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past glistening glaciers and crystal clear lakes.

The Glacier Express travels through the glorious Goms region with its typical timbered dwellings. The sunny valley of the Upper Goms is one of the most beautiful landscapes in Switzerland.

It then continues through the rugged splendor of the Rhine Gorge (the "Grand Canyon of Switzerland"). From Chur, the route extends to the famous holiday resort of St. Moritz which became the birthplace of Alpine tourism in 1864.

The "Grand Train Tour of Switzerland" also includes three

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taking views of the Morteratsch Glacier, Lake Bianco, and the Poschiavo Valley in Italianspeaking Switzerland. The Bernina Express Bus, the Palm Express, runs year-round

The Golden Pass Line links German-speaking central Switzerland with the French language part of the country. This route passes countless lakes and waterfalls, including worldrenowned destinations such as Lucerne, Interlaken, Gstaad, and Montreux on Lake Geneva.

And then there is the William Tell Express, which takes travelers to sun-kissed Canton Ticino with its Mediterraneanlike magic. The first part of the journey is by boat across Lake Lucerne, followed by the first class train trip in panoramic railcars along the wonderful historic Gotthard route, an outstanding engineering achievement that was opened in 1882.

The Swiss Travel Pass, valid for 3, 4, 8, or 15 days, is a single all-in-one ticket that covers travel by the Glacier Express, Bernina Express, Golden Pass Line, and William Tell Express. The only extra is the surcharge for a mandatory seat reservation (not required on the Golden Pass Line.) For more information and to purchase a pass, visit www. swisstravelsystem.com

The Swiss have also created a perfect system for baggage transportation. Visitors from abroad can hand in baggage at any departure airport worldwide and have it delivered directly to their Swiss destination. With selected airlines, the system operates in the opposite direction when travelling back from Switzerland. 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Local Doctor Provides Care for Future Service Dog

GOLD RIVER, CA (MPG) - Henry Schein, Inc. and Canine Companions for Independence, Inc. have partnered with Dr. Kulwant Bindra, a veterinarian who treats local animals at the Gold River Pet Hospital, to provide the essential products and care for Habit, a puppy being raised by a local volunteer to eventually serve as a highly trained assistance dog for a child or adult with disabilities.

Dr. Bindra contributed to the puppy's health and development when he presented a "Henry Schein Cares-Canine Companions Puppy Raiser Care Package" to Habit's volunteer puppy raiser, Abby Johnson of Rancho Cordova, California. The care package contains items essential to caring for the puppy during its first 18 months of life. of no higher calling than to provide for the health and safety of animals," said Dr. Bindra. 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How to Fix America's Failing **Cybersecurity Capabilities**

Barack Obama just became the first U.S. president to write a line of computer code. The gesture is part of a national push for computer science education. In fact, the White House recently announced a \$4 billion "Computer Science for All" initiative that will help educate the next generation of coders.

It couldn't have come soon enough. In addition to playing an increasingly central role in business, computer science know-how is vital to America's economic and national security. 2015 was the worst year ever for cybercrime, with nearly 1,000 major data breaches.

These attacks included the theft of 21.5 million records from the federal government's Office of Personnel Management and a T-Mobile breach that exposed the names, addresses, and Social Security numbers of 15 million customers.

Efforts to bolster cybersecurity all face the same obstacle: a shortage of talent. Protecting our citizens requires a largescale effort to attract talented people to the cyber workforce and then train them to meet and thwart modern, unexpected threats.

There are currently 209,000 unfilled positions for cybersecurity workers in the United States, according to a Stanford University report. Worldwide, the figure totals roughly 1 million.

With cybercriminals growing

more sophisticated each day, we need a long-term strategy to close the cybersecurity talent gap

To start, computer science must become a central component of our education system.

According to a recent Gallup survey commissioned by Google, less than one third of K-12 teachers and administrators say that computer science is a top priority for their school. In a survey commissioned by defense contractor Raytheon, 82 percent of millennials reported that no teacher or guidance counselor had ever mentioned the possibility of a job in cybersecurity.

Thankfully, some policymakers are attempting to change the status quo. On top of President Obama's national initiative, New York Mayor Bill de Blasio has committed his city's school system to offering computer science classes to all students within 10 years.

Efforts to ignite a passion for cybersecurity careers should give special attention to young women. According to that same Raytheon survey, men are five times more likely to consider a career in cybersecurity than women. Research from a study I'm conducting with colleagues from Cisco and the wider tech community for an upcoming book called The Internet of Women, supports Raytheon's findings.

Another valuable step would be the creation of a cybersecurity scholarship program. The National Science Foundation already offers funding for

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degrees related to cybersecurity, provided recipients work for the government upon graduation.

What's needed is a more ambitious scholarship program, similar in scope to the GI Bill.


Private-sector businesses such as technology firms and military contractors should establish related initiatives, offering to pay off education loans for students who accept in-house cybersecurity positions.

But it won't be enough to simply encourage more Americans to earn degrees in computer science. Students also need access to tech immersion programs to see the practical implications of their studies.

My own university, New York Institute of Technology, has worked with industry leaders to create internships and other real-world experiences and opportunities. And we've dramatically increased our cybersecurity course offerings, hiring expert faculty in biometrics, swarm intelligence, cryptography, data mining and forensics, and network security. We've even added a cybersecurity concentration for undergraduates and a master's program.

America faces mounting cyber threats. Only through better funding incentives and hands-on immersive training can we hope to attract more young people to the cybersecurity field.

Speeding ticket emergency

I would advise looking at the situation this way: what is the amount of the ticket in relation to your income and overall financial health? If the ticket is \$100 and you make \$200,000 a year, then stop worrying and pay the ticket. But if you got slapped with a \$300 ticket and you only make \$20,000 a year, then that could be an emergency.




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Lessons Learned On a Date

I truly have so much fun exploring and writing about my discoveries for the Gold River Messenger. The stories that begin with just an inquiry about how someone gets started as an entrepreneur or what is the process that brings something delicious to our table is always a stimulating adventure.

On a recent mini-vacation to Palm Desert I was determined to visit a date farm. Dates are wonderful by themselves and I love to use them many ways including a very easy appetizer. However, I did not know how they got to my plate. My wish was granted by the Pato's Dream Date Gardens located in the Coachella Valley.

Guinea hens announced my arrival at this five acre farm which was fairly obscured by Palm trees. Douglass and Debbie Adair, have owned and operated this organic farm since 1977. As we walked and talked about date farming, I realized I was meeting with an individual that has a very interesting life. Mr. Adair joined the United Farm Worker's Union of America in 1965 at 22 years old after graduating from UC Berkeley. His up bring was academia, but his love of the outdoors and the hard physical work of farming brought him to the fields where he picked peaches, plums and grapes. He was beside Gilbert Padilla and Ceasar Chevez during those years of strikes and organizational struggles. After my visit I could not wait to google him to find out the story and realized I had the good fortune to meet with a man who walks with history.

Douglass purchased the farm with nine palm trees. His intention was to grow grapes, but a friend offered to help him with the date trees and 40 years later "we grow our dates as they were grown in the times of the Bible and Koran". Dates have a sex life — there are male and female trees and no figs will happen unless the two should engage. The female tree flower must be pollinated by the male tree pollen. On Pato's farm this is done by a professional Pollinator which climbs the female tree and distributes the pollen by hand. There are spikes on the trees which can make this a very sticky endeavor. The water source is the Colorado River and when irrigation is required, Douglass orders the water and then regulates it



between the farmers above and below his property to provide for his trees. Palm trees are prolific and develop shoots that are cut from the mother tree and then replanted. The clone of the mother Medjool is thought to be the great, great grandchild of a single oasis in Morocco. Because they use no pesticides or artificial chemicals, the Pato dates are completely natural.

Today, the farm is almost fully populated by date palms. Douglass only sells his dates at farmer's markets and direct through the mail. Medjools, Halawis, Khala, and Mariana's are all available at harvest time. It is possible to purchase a frond with dates and have them hang in the kitchen and pluck at will as they become softer over time. They also sell the tall palm to landscapers that will need a tree of a certain height. They come to the farm, measure the tree for the exact requirement and then dig it up for a future at a resort or home driveway.

It was great day to not only learn about dates, but to meet Douglass Adair also known as Pato.

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Game **Plots** When New York Falls, So Does the Division

The Division has one of the best videogame titles of the generation. Rarely before has the simple name of a game so completely embodied its problems, and so perfectly illustrated what it feels like to play. Because ultimately, The Division is a game divided, attempting to combine two different experiences into one and creating something contradictory in the process.

United we stand, but in The Division, we fall.

The Division takes place in a ruined NYC after a biological terror attack causes many of, America's largest cities to collapse. You play as a Division agent, an elite sleeper soldier sent in by the government to restore order by any means possible. And by "any means possible," they really mean, "filling people with lead." Options for real humanitarian aid, which is clearly what the city needs most, are limited to maintaining a base/refugee shelter and handing out sodas on the streets.

Undoubtedly the New York streets have numerous deathdeserving characters, be it the gang of flamethrower-wielding maniacs or the power-hungry mercenary goons. But things are more complicated when the game asks you to kill "Rikers," escaped convicts that are all somehow deserving of the death penalty even though the game acknowledges many of them were locked up for drug offenses, and "Rioters," a group of unorganized looters that, it seems, are just trying to survive along with everyone else.

In an era of increased awareness of police violence, the idea of playing as a governmen agent killing nonviolent criminals and New York civilians is obviously problematic. To be fair, these Rikers and Rioters are programmed to shoot you on sight, but because The Division's enemies usually take at least a full clip of ammo to take down, the design of the game encourages you to shoot first to get a leg-up. From 300 yards away you can take your sniper rifle and eliminate a group of Rioters who are not visibly armed, have not yet threatened you in any way, and whose only crime is showing up red in your targeting reticle.


This has led many to ask the question, why are Division agents any better than the people they fight? They attack violence with violence, they kill with as little account for the justice system of our country as the "criminals" themselves. Oftentimes they will shoot someone in the back for looting a body, and then loot the body of the person they shot. However, The Division makes little to no effort to address this

moral conundrum, and demonstrates little awareness of the actions it pats the player on the back for performing.

Some have pointed out that similar actions have been encouraged in almost every shooter; every Call of Duty in recent memory has a sniping level where you take out assailants without them ever knowing your location. But there's a difference between shooting enemy combatants on a battlefield, and killing Americans on American soil on behalf of the American government.

It's not that the developers at Ubisoft were being actively malicious. It's simply clear that, in their effort to craft a world with so much visual and mechanical detail, they failed to zoom out and look at the bigger picture. Nevertheless, The Division should serve as a lesson to other developers: make sure you know what your work implies in the context of society, or risk dividing your audience as well.

You've passed by it countless times, but I'll bet my fully punched Yogurt Monkey loyalty card that most of you have never stepped foot in it. It's called the Gold River Community Center, and it's run like no other community center I've ever known.

"A building or group of buildings where there are classes and activities for the people who live in a community" is Merriam-Webster's simple definition of "community center," and that's been my experience with similarly named complexes before moving here. Gold River's facility qualifies, but with a big, discouraging asterisk. Except for official village and GRCA activities, the Gold River community is discouraged from using the Gold River Community Center. Walk into the GRCA office to request use of the clubhouse for, say, a neighborhood social or a meeting of Gold River Discovery Center parents and you'd swear there's a flat-out ban on usage by residents outside of conducting official association business. Out of curiosity, I've gone in a few times over the years and have always been told "sorry."

But there's one group that never hears that word if the clubhouse calendar is open. The Gold River Villagers, a vibrant and wonderful club that recently celebrated its 30th anniversary, is given exclusive use of the beautifully appointed meeting space for its members to play mahjong, bunco and bridge, among

other social activities. This benefit is even in writing — on the GRCA Community Center Use Policy that identifies the club as the only entity outside GRCA and the 25 villages to which the facility is available: "GRCA-sanctioned groups (currently The Villagers only).'

Now, I'm not proposing that anyone mess with the good thing The Villagers have going. Give them first dibs on calendar dates into perpetuity for all I care. They were here first and that should be respected. But this is a matter of principle. It's about fairness. It's also about at least considering ways to make better use of a GRCA asset we homeowners have bankrolled through dues since it opened in 1990. Maybe start with weekend rentals as a pilot. Except for a couple of hours on one Saturday morning for a GRCA "Coffee & Chat," the clubhouse was completely dark on weekends in April. Looking back further, the facility was unused nearly every Saturday and Sunday for months.

Which begs the question: Why? The Gold River Online community asked that very question back in June 2010 after it was learned that Carly Fiorina, a non-resident, was allowed to book the community center to drum up local support for her U.S. senate election campaign. The former HP CEO, who would eventually lose to a reelected Barbara Boxer, even made campaign calls from the clubhouse. Based on GRCA rules, this was a big, fat no-no. Among the criteria for an event to be sanctioned by the GRCA board is that it cannot be political. Whoops.

I'm not advocating an investigation of this clear rules violation, especially since it happened 6 years ago by a different GRCA board, but I can completely understand the cries of double standards, favoritism and hypocrisy from dues-paying residents back then. A subscriber who goes by "selder" on Gold River Online shared his or her experience trying to introduce a candidate for county sheriff to Gold River voters. "I was told that the GRCA does not allow homeowners to use the facility at all," the post read. "It could be used for village meetings but for nothing else.

I offered to pay a fee for usage as well as cleaning fee and was still told no! I was very surprised to see on the news that another candidate was able to use the facility. Does not seem fair that some are allowed and others are not."

'Fool's Gold'

Putting 'Community' in 'Community Center'

"Bloomer" chimed in with, "Why don't we charge and make some money, defray costs for homeowners? I don't get why we let that place sit empty not earning money." 'Cynthia" fathomed an answer: "I think it is just pure laziness on the part of GRCA and staff."

The thread died after "GRGuy" wisely suggested to those upset over the policy to confront the GRCA directly. If anyone ever did, the outcome was never shared online. So I went to a GRCA board meeting the other week to pick up where things left off in 2010. During the open forum, I asked if members can rent the very room we were in, and if not why not. The five board members were respectful and congenial, but didn't give me the impression they would champion any new group using the clubhouse.

"It's not meant to be used that way," said one board member. Others reasoned that it would require GRCA office staff to put in overtime and risk the community center's pristine appearance. I totally get all of that, but those concerns could be easily quelled by setting rental fees that include staffing costs and require a large

security deposit. Heck, put a lien on event-sponsoring homeowners if there's damage, just as GRCA does for other violations that can't be resolved. Just don't give a flat-out "no" because despite what the community has been led to believe, that would be against policy.

Rules clearly state that "GRCAsanctioned groups" are allowed facility use. So what does it take to get sanctioned? The organization requesting the meeting space must prove to the board that it has "broad-based community interest" and is open to all members of the GRCA. Policy, as we know was violated by the board in 2010, also states that their purpose of assembly cannot be of a political nature.

The current board seems like good people, and there's no reason to believe that the elected officials being installed this month won't be the same. So here's to being hopeful that when requests come in to use of our community center in the future, residents are met not with an immediate "no" like from a parent who thinks he or she knows what's best, but given fair consideration. It's in the rules, after all, and we've paid our dues long enough.

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Registering Women for the Draft: A Charade, Not a Necessity

The Armed Services Committee (ASC) recently approved a measure requiring American women aged 18 to 26 to register for the draft and sent it to the full House for consideration. If this measure becomes law it will do nothing to enhance gender equality in the Department of Defense that recently lifted a ban on women serving in combat.

The ASC's action typifies the inanity extant in the legislative branch. Although the measure passed by a vote of 32 to 30, Representative Duncan Hunter, the Republican head of the committee who submitted the measure, voted against it. If it becomes a bill and makes it to the White House, President Obama will sign it. Why is it inane?

First, it has been 43 years since anyone has been drafted. Over those years the Army shrank from over 1,000,000 active duty soldiers to half that number and is on track to dip to 420,000 by 2017. Additionally, the Department of Defense claims the all-volunteer force works well. Indeed it does.

Second, modern conscription of citizen soldiers began with the French Revolution's Levee en Masse in 1793 to raise a citizen's army to oppose European monarchial armies marching to crush revolutionary France. Conscription also was used during the American Civil War—though unpopular on both sides. North and South allowed bounties for substitutes and many Confederate states refused to support the draft.

Washington and Richmond turned to conscription because Civil War battles were deadly confrontations between armed masses where the latest technological advances like rifled musketry and rifled artillery fostered previously unimagined slaughter.

Third, by 1914 the Industrial Age factories and transportation systems made it possible for major powers to raise, train, equip, feed and then transport immense armies. Further advances in military technology to include machine guns, rapid-fire rifles, chemical weapons and combat aircraft escalated the carnage. Conscription heightened by nationalism and driven by competing ethnic and ideological dispositions drove armies into battles that consumed humans at a rate that made the first half of the 20th century the world's bloodiest. In 1945, at end of World War II, the atomic bomb and later the proliferation of nuclear weapons made that kind of warfare almost impossible for the handful of powers able to raise and sustain such armies because using them was no longer necessary or desirable given that the ultimate ridiculous conclusion would be mutual nuclear annihilation.

Fourth, while North Korea, China, and to some extent Russia still field modified examples of large Industrial Age armed forces, the United States does not. North Korea chooses to have an army of 1,000,000 (twice the size of the U.S. Army) because its sole reason for being is to overwhelm South Korea. The armed forces of China and Russia are much more sophisticated but also large because these countries are major land powers sharing the same Eurasian continent.

The armed forces of the United States are transitioning to Information Age and Cyber Age warfare. The United States can use smaller forces to dominate battlespaces extending from space to the ocean's depths. These forces rely on speed, stealth, information dominance, and precision munitions to find, fix, and annihilate opposing forces. Even if needed, the United States could not generate a millionperson Industrial Age armed force because America lacks the heavy industrial capacity and the wealth to do so. Given the cost of modern weapons, purchasing enough to support a force a quarter the size of our Industrial Age armies would be prohibitive. Beyond that, being nearly \$20 trillion in debt means that the United States cannot afford a massive military buildup. In any case, Beijing is unlikely to lend Washington the money to fight it.

As for gender equality, current policies allow women who want to serve to do so in any military capacity for which they physically and mentally qualify. Furthermore, given the size of the modern battlespace, female service members have been in combat since Desert Storm, when two were captured, neither of them at the time involved in what would be considered a "combat" operation. Today's battlefield is multi-dimensional, not linear with the "front" and "rear" areas that

previously existed. Ultimately, the issue of conscripting women is a political charade. Republicans support it to avoid being accused of starting a "war on women." Democrats do so as a matter of social justice and social engineering and not national security. Either way,
