# **City Council Approves Employment** Contracts for Police Chief, **Community Development Director**

DIXON, CA (DIV) - The city council approved an Employment Agreement for Police Chief, Robert Thompson, authorizing the City Manager to execute and enter into the agreement on behalf of the City and approving a 2018-2019 budget amendment.

Police Chief. Mr. Thompson has served in the role of Police Chief since March 1, 2017, and has received satisfactory evaluations since then. The City Manager negotiated a new employment agreement with the Police Chief ("Agreement").

The Agreement retains several provisions from the Police Chief's current employment agreement, but also contained changes to the Police Chief's, term, and other benefits. The Agreement, as proposed, will take effect on March 1, 2019. These are:

- The Agreement shall expire on March 1, 2022, which shall be three (3) years from March 1, 2019, his employment anniversary date.
- The Police Chiefs salary shall increase by 15% to \$184,000 the first pay period following March 1, 2019. The first pay period following March 1, 2020, his salary shall increase by 5% to \$193,200 per year. The first pay period following March 1, 2021, his salary shall increase by an additional 5% to \$202,860 per year.
- The City shall contribute a five

percent (5%) match of the Police Chiefs base salary into a deferred compensation plan.

- Beginning March 1, 2021, the Police Chief shall accrue 180 hours of vacation leave per year.
- The Police Chief shall receive the same uniform allowance that is provided to the members of the Dixon Police Officers' Association. Once a year, he may elect to receive the uniform allowance on a bi-weekly basis or have the uniform allowance paid to the City's uniform vendor in order to purchase uniforms pre-taxed.
- If the Police Chief receives the **Executive Development Certificate** through the Peace Officer Standards and Training Commission ("POST"), then he will receive 5% of his base as an education incentive.

The city council also approval an Employment Agreement for Community Development Director, Dina Tasini. On February 28, 2017, the City of Dixon City Council approved a three-year employment agreement with Dina Tasini. Ms. Tasini has served in the role of Community Development Director since March 20, 2017, and has received satisfactory evaluations since then. The Community Development Director Agreement contains a salary increase falling within the newly approved salary range. The Agreement includes the

following key provisions:

- · The Agreement expires on March 20, 2022, which is (3) years from March 20, 2019, her employment anniversary date.
- The Community Development Director's salary increase to \$153,000 the first pay period following March 20, 2019. The first pay period following March 20, 2020, her salary shall increase by 5% to \$160,650 per year. The first pay period following March 20, 2021, her salary shall increase by an additional5% to \$168,682.50 per year.
- •The City shall contribute a three percent (3%) match of the Community Development Director's base salary into a deferred compensation plan.
- The Community Development Director accrues 160 hours of vacation leave per year.

Both employees are at-will employees under their contract with the city.

The City Council approved submission of grant applications to the Cultural, Community, and Natural Resources and an Urban Greening Grant applications for funding for Phase of the Pardi Market Plaza project. Both grants are administered by the California Natural Resources Agency and are funded with revenues generated by voter-approved Proposition 68.

Each entity representative will be asked to explain any criteria for their programs and requirements that must be met in order for people to access them. Examples include income limits, family make-up, age, documentation requirements and others.

There are many people in need of basic human services in Dixon. This is at a time when helping organizations are operating with limited budgets and other resources.

Human services needs vary and can include one- time help with rent, utilities, food; assistance in application for medical insurance and government benefit programs; help for senior citizens and



homeless adults; services for homeless school children and their families; counseling for those suffering with mental health, substance abuse; depression, anger management, grief and other behavioral health issues; prevention of family violence and child abuse/neglect; employability and life skills development; adult education and literacy; positive parenting and self-care; and tax preparation, credit repair and legal advice. The list of needs is long and these are just some of them.


None of the helping organizations are capable of providing all services for every basic necessity. So it is very important for all to understand procedures and requirements for accessing help from other local service providers. When assisting people who are in a crisis situation, no one wants to add to their stress by giving them bad information or guidance. It is best to know ahead of time what are the parameters of programs so that a proper referral can be made and avoid confusing or frustrating clients with incorrect information. Organizers of the meet-

What I want you both to understand going forward is that the idea you have to borrow money to attend college - or do anything else, really - is a myth. ## Marijuana Revenues in California Fall Short

According to an article in a San Francisco Chronicle in early January 2019, marijuana sales fell in California. Around \$2.5 billion of legal cannabis was sold in California in 2018, half a billion dollars less than in 2017 when only medical marijuana was legal,

according to GreenEdge, a sales tracking company.

"The easy part of legalization was persuading people to vote for it, industry analysts say. The hard part, now that it's legal, is persuading people to stop buying from the black market.'

"The most recent official





#### **Biodiversity Museum Day at UC Davis** Saturday, February 16 - 9 am -4 pm

Thousands of visitors are expected on the University of California, Davis, campus for the eighth annual Biodiversity Museum Day, a free family-friendly event on Saturday, Feb. 16 exploring the diversity of life.

Visitors will see everything from a chocolate tree loaded with fruit to a golden eagle named Sullivan to a Humboldt squid to a stick insect (walking stick). Hours range from 9 a.m. to noon and from noon to 4 p.m. New this year is the Marine Invertebrate

Collection in the Sciences Laboratory Building, off Kleiber Hall Drive. "Visitors can expect to see specimens collected from Oahu and Baja California, and live corals," said spokesperson Ivani Li. 

"WHAT MEN WANT" FLIPS THE SCRIPT; WINTER-SPRING ON TV

#### "What Men Want" Rated R

Flipping the gender in Hollywood remakes is nothing new. Think of the female versions of "Ghostbusters" and "Ocean's 8," notable as more recent examples that herald either an enduring trend or a fad of the moment.

Two decades later, one has to ponder the appeal of turning Mel Gibson's "What Women Want" into a female empowerment statement with Taraji P. Henson playing the tough cookie in "What Men Want."

Playing strong is what Henson does well, if you take note of her role of Cookie Lyon in the TV series "Empire." Here, as sports agent Ali Davis, she's equally sharp, fierce, relentless, fearless and unstoppable.

The trouble for Ali is that she's pigeonholed as doing her best work representing female athletes that are Olympic medalists and trophy winners. She's need to break the glass ceiling in a business dominated by males.

Poised to be made a partner at the sports management firm, Ali anticipates securing the position at a company meeting only to be humiliated by her boss (Brian Bosworth) who gives the promotion to an unqualified male junior executive.

Meanwhile, following a party with her tight-knit girl-friends, Ali has an accident that puts her in the hospital. She wakes up to find that a concussion has rendered her with the ability to hear men's thoughts.

With only her brow-beaten, nerdy assistant Brandon (Josh Brener) remotely on her side, Ali unlocks the mysteries of the male-dominated business to navigate the corporate minefield.

Meanwhile, a one-night stand with bartender Will (Aldis Hodge) turns into something more when Ali uses the widowed father and his young son to fool Jamal's father into thinking that she's in a stable family situation that enhances her ability to handle a superstar client.

"What Men Want" doesn't move the needle in any big way on the scale of generic romantic comedy, nor does it hold much surprise in how a female dynamo gets the upper hand in the workplace.

Taraji P. Henson, of course, steals the show with her blazing ball of energy that shows she has mastered the ruthless corporate culture on an equal plane with her male peers.

#### Winter-Spring Preview On TV

The winter television critics press tour brings news of many midseason new shows on the networks, cable channels and a plethora of streaming services. It's getting harderto keep up with all the options.

Among the big four networks, ABC appears to have the busiest upcoming season. Marcia Clark, the prosecutor in the O.J. Simpson murder, is one of the executive producers behind "The Fix," about a Los Angeles prosecutor taking a second chance in a high-profile murder trial.

ABC's "Whiskey Cavalier" dives into the international

spy business with a mix of heroic action and wacky humor, while "Grand Hotel" explores family intrigue and scandal in the backdrop of a ritzy hotel in Miami Beach.

"Chernobyl" reveal the sacrifices of the brave men and women saving Europe from unimaginable disaster.

"Doom Patrol" re-imagines DC's beloved group of outcast super heroes, including Robotman, Negative Man, Elasti-Woman and Crazy Jane, led by mad scientist Dr. Niles Caulder. This band of freaks fights for a world that wants nothing to do with them.

The National Geographic Channel's "The Hot Zone," starring Julianna Margulies as a heroic U.S. Army scientist, dramatizes the high-stakes operation to head off an outbreak of the deadly Ebola virus from the central African rain forest that arrived on U.S. soil in 1989.

"The Rook," a Starz original series, tells the story of a woman waking up in the rain beside London's Millennium Bridge with no memory, who turns out to be a high-ranking official in Britain's secret service for people with paranormal abilities.

Acorn TV's streaming service delivers the best in British entertainment. Derived by the memoirs of a London police detective, "Manhunt" is a gripping miniseries based on the true story of a murder investigation that riveted a nation's attention and defined a detective's career.

Ovation TV is a channel dedicated to the arts so it is

only fitting that Julia Stiles stars as an art curator in "Riviera" whose husband is killed in a yacht explosion, causing her to figure who in his family she can trust to uncover if his death was an accident or murder.


