

MARYSVILLE, CA (MPG) - The Marysville Drakes kept pace atop the Pacific Division standings in the Pecos League as they recorded a 4-1 record throughout the week

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Temple Construction Manager Benefits from Community Support

YUBA CITY, CA (MPG) - Adam Roberts earned an appreciation of the “refiner’s fire.” As Project Manager for Okland Construction in the building of the Feather River Temple in Yuba City, he supervised the construction process of the temple building and grounds. “It was my first temple as Project Manager, and it has been way tougher than I expected.”

The temple, built by The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints, is near completion. Roberts especially appreciated the support of “the community—how cool the community has been. Church members or not, people have been great.” He noted the City was especially efficient and helpful.

Roberts described the most difficult challenge in one word, “Covid.” Materials procurement was especially difficult, especially the interior marble stone floors and the millwork. There were also Covid challenges on site. For months, workers wore masks and had to navigate vaccine mandates. They incorporated boot sanitization pads and performed special cleanings of surfaces being touched.

Roberts also recalled rogue storms that came in during early scheduled concrete pours. They were receiving concrete pours every other week when a storm knocked them off schedule. Afterwards, they received three pours in one week, in a quarter of the time, and it put them back on schedule.

An interesting challenge arose with the placement of the Angel Moroni statue atop the temple tower. To Latter-day Saints, the Angel Moroni is not a symbol of worship, but represents preaching to the world. “The first time, we didn’t even take the statue off the truck,” Roberts explained. The final, which needed to fit atop the ball, was off by 22.5 degrees, so it was returned for modifications. “When the statue was finally set,” Roberts shared, “it was a good, happy, memorable day.”

Completing the finish work was also challenging. “It is difficult to achieve the level of finish required by a temple,” Roberts continued, “We would do good finish work, the inspector would come, we would

MARYSVILLE, CA (MPG) - Yuba-Sutter Transit services will be detoured from Plumas Street on Saturday, June 17th for the annual Summer Stroll Festival held in downtown Yuba City. Plumas Street from Colusa Avenue to Bridge Street will be closed to traffic beginning at 10:00 a.m. on this date to set up for this free community event that will be held from 3:00 to 9:00 p.m.

take it up a notch, the inspector would come again and so on,” until the work met requirements. Noting the ceilings in the instruction rooms include groin vaults with different radiuses, Roberts said that, “Watching them come together was especially rewarding.”

Roberts mentioned some of the outside features. The Church agreed to keep Constitution Grove, on the north-east corner of the site. Under the mature redwood trees is a city plaque that will be maintained. A mature California Oak on the west side of the temple was preserved and named “Bruce.” Roberts reported that, as he walked by the tree one day, he thought, “That tree looks like a Bruce,” so he and the crew began calling it Bruce. The tree was planted in the 1970’s, when the original meetinghouse was built.

The Feather River Temple incorporates elements native to the Yuba-Sutter area. Almond blossoms are integral to the art glass designs. Roberts also described an olive-tree art piece in the temple, a reproduction of an original painting in the Rome Italy Temple.

Roberts was particularly excited for the 30 olive trees, each over 100 years old, brought to the site from Corning. Ancient Olive Trees, a company that specializes in transplanting old olive trees, warned that the failure rate can be as high as 20%. Roberts reported, “We’ve only lost one tree, so it is a tender mercy.” The trees compose four orchards on the four corners of the temple.

Roberts and his wife Jessie had two daughters when they arrived in California in July 2020. While here, they added a third daughter, their “California souvenir.” They enjoyed touring northern California during their nearly three-year stay. As a self-described “outdoors family,” they visited the national and state parks, including Lassen, Yosemite, and Muir Woods. They also enjoyed boating on area lakes, including Lake Oroville.

As Roberts left the area for his next assignment, he expressed his appreciation for the community, “Thanks for all the support, I’ve felt it.” ★

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
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Alligators and Rainbows

If you have heard one of Brian Shul's keynote speeches, you've heard his two rules on life. Next time you listen to one of Brian's speeches, listen for his words on attitudes, choices, and perspectives. In every way, Brian Shul lived by this philosophy. When we first met, he taught me the part of his philosophy he called "Alligators and Rainbows." As he was not perfect at this, he carried a small, crocheted alligator to remind him of just how much of his life was under his control. It is the key to succeeding in practicing his philosophy, and any kid or adult can learn it.

Brian told his audiences that they did not really know the words to the song, "Over The Rainbow". During Brian's time in Brook Hospital after his plane crash, he began to understand the meaning of the song in daring to hope and dream of better circumstances. This challenged his attitude as he realized that he would make the choice to survive. After that he not only underwent 15 surgeries, but he was also placed in a tank to have his scar tissue scrubbed 27 times. Most people would not tolerate it more than one time. He cracked several teeth while bearing the pain, but he kept his eyes on the rainbows: he would live, he would have mobility, and he would fly again. The rainbows are the things that we look to in order to keep us going. He would say, "Keep your eyes on the rainbows."

This philosophy led Brian to become an unbeatable racquetball player, climb mountains and run marathons, apply to demo the A-10 jet, and apply to be part of the Thunderbirds. It would lead him to become one of the elite few who flew the SR-71, and when he retired, to wholly invest himself in his dream of writing and photography while spreading his messages as a public speaker. The crocheted alligator was always a reminder and encouragement. Alligators are the things that try to pull us away from our rainbows and into a swamp, but we need not fear them.

Over the course of his career, from his year-long recovery in the hospital to publishing his own books, Brian encountered a lot of discouragement. It wasn't always from those he called the "No People," for example the people who told him he should not apply to the SR-71 program. It was often from his own negative thoughts. Overcoming the "alligators" or discouragement was accomplished by looking them in the eye and stepping over them. This is true for both people and thoughts. Remember to, "Keep your sights on the rainbow", he would say, "but don't fear the alligators, don't ignore them, and whatever you do, don't let them latch on. Once one latches on, others will follow. Just look them in the eye and step over them".

The alligator in Brian's truck was made by a woman who had lost a child and was struggling with the bitter challenges of her grief. Brian had shared this message at a family dinner. When she presented the alligator, she explained his philosophy had helped her to see her own alligators, step over them and get out of the swamp.

Brian had many rainbows in his life. He loved publishing his books the way he felt they should be published. He loved giving his speeches on his own terms. He loved that he had the freedom to spend as much time as he wanted outdoors, photographing birds, and writing. The night Brian passed he was signing books after giving a very well-received, inspirational speech to Veterans. He never took his sights off his rainbows and kept his attitude, choices, and perspectives in check by stepping over his alligators. With this simple philosophy, one can write their own legacy as Brian Shul did.

Supreme Court Limits "Waters of United States" Regulations in Win for Farmers

Farmers for years sought relief from what they called government overreach into vast swaths of land and water through the "waters of the United States" regulations. They got their wish last month when the U.S. Supreme Court set limits on how the Environmental Protection Agency can regulate wetlands and waterways. Farmers argued that EPA was regulating features that are often not recognizable as water bodies. Though the high court reined in the scope of the 51-year-old Clean Water Act, states retain authority to regulate waters within their own borders.

U.S. Officials Protest Mexico's Move to Ban Genetically Modified Corn

United States Trade Representative Katherine Tai and Agriculture Secretary Tom Vilsack are contesting Mexico's move to largely ban imports of genetically modified corn from the U.S. Tai said the U.S. has "repeatedly conveyed its concerns that Mexico's biotechnology policies are not based on science and threaten to disrupt U.S. exports to Mexico to the detriment of agricultural producers." Vilsack called for "fair, open, science- and rules-based trade." Mexican president Andrés Manuel López Obrador is seeking to phase out genetically modified corn by 2024.

California Farm Bureau Delegation Makes its Voice Heard in Washington D.C.

Leaders of the California Farm Bureau are calling attention to important agricultural issues, such as the next federal farm bill, labor, water, forestry and the response to disasters, including flooding and wildfires. During the May 23-25 advocacy trip, the board of directors and federal policy team for California's largest agricultural organization met with lawmakers, including House Agriculture Committee Chairman Rep. Glenn "GT" Thompson. Farm Bureau President Jamie Johansson testified before a House subcommittee on reducing wildfire dangers to protect California agriculture.

Bill Training for Use of Agricultural Drones Passes California Assembly

Legislation seeking to make it easier for farmers to use drones for targeted pesticide applications passed 72-0 in the California Assembly and moves to the Senate. Sponsored by the California Farm Bureau, Assembly Bill 1016 would expand the Department of Pesticide Regulation's authority to create training programs for drone aerial applicator licensing. As a result of the bill's progress, Orange Coast College recently announced the creation of an associate science degree in unmanned aerial systems, or drones, with an emphasis on aerial applications. ★

My fishing buddy Abe also uncovered a perfect 195-Troy Pound of *FeS2. Wow! Eureka! My sluicing really panned out. 1/2g of Au. \$31.86. Note: *Pyrite stone when worn by my buddy Abe, increased his strength, energy, will power and confidence. That's why he always out fishes me. No rainbow trout were caught this day. Fall River is always busy. We put in at the Cal-Trout boat access, and motored up to the Spring Creek Bridge. Most fly fishermen drift back down the river. Boat etiquette is strictly adhered to. Sulfur Dun (Epeorus) in size #14 is the fly of choice. Pittman Pond is the largest of the six ponds in the Spenceville WA, and now is loaded with small mouth bass. Try: Plastic Mouse.

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California Water Rights At Risk As Three Legislative Proposals Advance

When California imposed its first-ever regulation on the extraction of water from underground aquifers in 2014, it gave environmental groups a landmark victory in their decades-long effort to overhaul water use laws.

It was also a political setback for farmers, who are California’s major water users and have depended on wells to irrigate their crops as increasingly frequent droughts reduce surface water in rivers and reservoirs.

However, while ground-water regulation ended one front in California’s never-ending political and legal battles over allocation of water, it merely set the stage for an even bigger conflict over surface water rights, particularly those pre-dating 1914, when the state first began controlling diversions.

Just months after the groundwater regulation’s enactment, with drought still gripping the state, the water rights battle was joined when the state Water Resources Control Board attempted to curtail diversions by some pre-1914 rights holders.

The board accused a small water system on the southern edge of the Sacramento-San Joaquin Delta, Byron-Bethany Irrigation District, of ignoring its curtailment order and continuing to take water

from the Delta for 13 days.

“We are a test case,” Byron-Bethany’s manager, Rick Gilmore, said at the time. “I think this has become a larger issue. I think the water board wants to use this as a precedent so they can start to gain more control over senior water right users.”

An immediate confrontation was averted, but the underlying conflict continued and last year the state court of appeal declared that the board lacked emergency curtailment authority over senior rights holders.

Meanwhile, 2022 saw another clash involving another small water agency that ignored curtailment orders on the Shasta River a few miles south of the Oregon border. The Shasta River Water Association’s farmers and ranchers continued to tap the river and later paid small fines.

The court decision and the Shasta River case fired up a long-standing drive by environmental groups to reduce diversions that damage wildlife habitat, contending that pre-1914 rights reflect exploitive and even racist 19th century attitudes incompatible with climate change and 21st century societal mores.

Water rights reformers have pressed the board to aggressively invoke the “public trust doctrine” of California water law and the state constitution’s declaration that water use must be reasonable.

Despite its clashes over curtailment orders, the water board has been reluctant to engage in a sweeping political and legal war. It did, however, underwrite research by UC Berkeley’s Center for Law, Energy and the

Environment on the powers needed to curtail diversions during droughts.

The resulting report, issued in April, declared that “the state needs to implement curtailments on a regular basis, not only in times of extreme crisis. Routine curtailments already happen in other western states. California cannot afford to remain an outlier.”

Not surprisingly, three bills have been introduced in the Legislature to give the water board the authority suggested in the UC Berkeley study, pitting water rights reformers against agricultural and municipal water agencies.

Although advocates contend that the bills would merely give the water board much-needed managerial tools, a coalition of water districts and agricultural groups see them as a prelude to the wholesale abrogation of their water rights. The board could gain the “potential to strip public agencies of water rights that have been used to sustain communities for decades,” with decrees of “arbitrary outcomes,” they wrote in an opposition letter.

All three measures, Assembly Bill 1337, Assembly Bill 460 and Senate Bill 389, survived initial floor votes but the political battle is just beginning. Their fate could rest in Gov. Gavin Newsom’s hands as powerful interests clash over a bedrock issue – who prevails when there’s not enough water to meet all demands.

Got Gold

The price of gold continues to give head fakes bumping up into the \$2000 an ounce range then backing off again and again. Gold bugs get their hopes up then are discouraged when it falls again. The question becomes when will gold claim victory and plow upwards and stay above the \$2000 level.

Often thought of as an inflation hedge, I often get asked whether investors should add gold to their portfolio to protect against inflation.

I have always said we must be clear about why we own an asset and having such clarification makes us better understand what to expect from an investment.

For example, I own my car to have transportation, and one might own a gun or a dog for protection. We don’t look to those things to make a profit.

I own my house to live in it, not to solidify my retirement. Maybe a rental house might fill that spot, but not my primary residence. In the mid 2000’s some thought a house was a retirement solution, and when the housing market crashed, they found out homes were primarily a place to live instead of counting on them to boost retirement savings.

When considering gold, if an investor buys gold to make a profit, gold stocks might be a better place to be than owning physical golds coins.

I regard holding gold coins as a hedge against financial Armageddon and not for making a profit. That is because physical gold has a significant tax requirement put on by the IRS. The IRS taxes capital gains on gold the same way it does any other investment assets but if you have bought physical gold, you will likely owe a higher tax rate of 28% as a collectible.

Physical gold also has healthy spread between the buy and sell price, sometimes as much as 10% or more. All things considered however, physical gold does have its place for some investors.

If one believes the price of gold will increase, gold stocks might be a better way to go as the tax rate can be like any other stock. Additionally gold stocks may move exponentially higher than the spot price of gold. If gold rises \$100 bucks, gold stocks may increase by higher percentage than the coins themselves. Stocks are also easier to buy through any brokerage account and one doesn’t need expertise as far as what to buy.

Keep in mind however, what gold stocks to buy does require some research. There are gold funds that attempt to mirror the price of gold one to one, and any financial professional should be able to walk you through what to consider based on your risk profile and expectations.

There are rumors that the gold price is manipulated by governments as the price could be considered as a thermometer of the health of currencies. A higher gold price may mean the monetary tools of government are being abused through higher deficits and excessive money creation by central bankers.


Whether governments actually fear a spike in gold prices is a subject of controversy but the rumor is out there.

Remember, gold is recognizable worldwide and even central banks all over the world maintain a healthy store of it. Gold is rare, hard to find, cannot be printed by central bankers, and may be one of the only constant where money is concerned. It has also been around since the beginning of civilization and has always been accepted as a store of value. Centuries ago gold could buy a suit of armor and a good meal. Today an ounce of gold can still by a nice suit and a meal, so one could say the buying power of gold has never yielded to inflationary pressures.

That said, the decision to buy gold is one for consideration as a diversified holding in one’s portfolio. For those wishing to hold physical gold, there are many reputable dealers on the web and you can shop one against the other for the best price. Don’t Put All Your Eggs in One Basket

Dear Dave,

My employer offers an employee stock purchase plan at a 15% discount. I’m usually the kind of guy who buys stocks and holds on to them forever. But when it comes to an opportunity like this, should I buy it and wait for a year to sell it, or should I buy it and sell right away?

– John

Dear John,

find a variance of as much as 15% in those 52 weeks. In other words, you could lose any or all of that discount in one move of the stock. Plus, it’s not like 15% is a big discount to begin with. Fifteen percent off a single stock, considering how volatile they are, is no big deal. But hey, if you love your company that much, they have a great track record, and the stock has a good history, go ahead. Just don’t allow single stocks as a category to make up more than 10% of your net worth.

The core issue here is a lack of diversification. When you put all your eggs in one basket, there’s always some clown twirling the basket. The first time I ran into that was a long time ago with a lady who was 70 years old. She had worked for a large company for 40 years. On top of that, she invested all her 401(k), all her wealth—\$800,000 total—in that one company. Well, this company experienced a crisis. It lost nearly

half of its value, and her \$800,000 was suddenly worth about \$400,000. She left herself vulnerable with a high-risk play, John.

I’ll say it again. Don’t bet the farm on one horse, and don’t have more than 10% of your net worth wrapped up in single stocks. Hundreds of research projects have been done that show individuals who buy individual stocks and think they know what they’re doing actually lose money much more often than they make money.

California Farm Bureau Applauds Supreme Court WOTUS Decision

SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) - On May 25, 2023, California Farm Bureau President Jamie Johansson is applauding the U.S. Supreme Court’s decision rejecting the Biden administration’s Waters of the United States Rule.

“California Farm Bureau appreciates the Supreme Court’s decision,” Johansson said. “Our farmers and ranchers have faced years of confusion over what waters are regulated by the federal government. Today’s decision brings greater clarity.”

The court’s ruling in Sackett v. Environmental Protection Agency reins in the EPA’s authority under the Clean

Water Act to regulate water bodies on private properties.

In a majority opinion, the court wrote that under the Biden administration’s rule, landowners “potentially face severe criminal and civil penalties” even for accidentally discharging pollutants into navigable waters.

“Agriculture is intrinsically tied to the earth,” Johansson said. “Our farmers and ranchers have a strong interest in effective, efficient and reasonable rules for the protection and management of the nation’s water and land resources.”

The California Farm Bureau works to protect family farms and ranches on behalf of nearly 29,000 members statewide and as part of a nationwide network of 5.3 million Farm Bureau members. ★

PG&E Wants to Help Customers Recognize Utility Scams and Avoid Falling Victim

PG&E News Release

SACRAMENTO REGION, CA (MPG) - With reports of scams targeting utility customers at an all-time high, Pacific Gas and Electric Company (PG&E) shares tips with customers to help recognize the signs of a potential scam.

A typical sign of a scam targeting a utility customer includes a caller claiming to be from PG&E and threatening disconnection if immediate payment is not made via a pre-paid debit card or money transfer service like Zelle. As a reminder, PG&E will never send a single notification to a customer within one hour of a service interruption, and we will never ask customers to make payments with a pre-paid debit card, gift card, any form of cryptocurrency, or third-party digital payment mobile applications.

"If you ever receive a call threatening utility disconnection if you do not make immediate payment, hang up the phone and either log into your account on PGE.com or call our customer service number to confirm your account details. Remember, PG&E will never ask for your financial information over the phone or via email, nor will we request payment via pre-paid debit cards or other payment services like Zelle. End the call, end the scam" said Matt Foley, lead customer scam investigator for PG&E.

Based on data collected so far in 2023, scammers are stepping up their efforts to defraud customers. In fact, there have been over 19,000 scam attempts reported by customers to PG&E, and customers have lost nearly \$342,000 in the first four months of 2023 alone. During 2022, PG&E received nearly 23,000 reports from customers who were targeted by scammers impersonating the company, and customers lost approximately \$946,000 in fraudulent payments.

Scammers can be convincing and often target those who are most vulnerable, including senior citizens and low-income communities. They also aim their scams at small business owners during busy customer service hours. Another recent emerging scam trend involves scammers targeting real estate agents via their listings, and threatening to shut off power if immediate payment is not made. However, with the right information, customers can learn to detect and report these predatory scams.

Signs Of A Potential Scam

Threat to disconnect: Scammers may

aggressively demand immediate payment for an alleged past due bill.

Request for immediate payment: Scammers may instruct the customer to purchase a prepaid card, then call them back supposedly to make a bill payment.

Request for prepaid card: When the customer calls back, the caller asks the customer for the prepaid card's number, which grants the scammer instant access to the card's funds.

Refund or rebate offers: Scammers may say that your utility company overbilled you and owes you a refund, or that you are entitled to a rebate, and ask you for your personal financial information.

Scammers Impersonating Trusted Phone Numbers: Scammers are now able to create authentic-looking 800 numbers which appear on your phone display. The numbers don't lead back to PG&E if called back, however, so if you have doubts, hang up and call PG&E at 1-833-500-SCAM. If customers ever feel that they are in physical danger, they should call 911.

How Customers Can Protect Themselves

Customers should never purchase a prepaid card to avoid service disconnection or shutoff. PG&E does not specify how customers should make a bill payment and offers a variety of ways to pay a bill, including accepting payments online, by phone, automatic bank draft, mail or in person.

If a scammer threatens immediate disconnection or shutoff of service without prior notification, customers should hang up the phone, delete the email, or shut the door. Customers with delinquent accounts receive an advance disconnection notification, typically by mail and included with their regular monthly bill.

Signing up for an online account at pge.com is another safeguard. Not only can customers log in to check their balance and payment history, they can also sign up for recurring payments, paperless billing and helpful alerts.

Customers who suspect that they have been victims of fraud, or who feel threatened during contact with one of these scammers, should contact local law enforcement. The Federal Trade Commission's website is also a good source of information about how to protect personal information.

Bill to Allow Amsterdam-Style Cannabis Cafes Passed by CA State Assembly

SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) - Assemblymember Matt Haney's (D-San Francisco) bill to allow local California governments to license Amsterdam-style cannabis cafes passed out of the State Assembly with a broad bipartisan support receiving a 64 to 9 vote on June 1, 2023. While cannabis cafes in the Netherlands capitalize on the social experience of cannabis by offering coffee, food, and live music, all of those opportunities are currently illegal under California law. Haney's AB 374 will allow struggling cannabis businesses to diversify away from the marijuana-only "dispensary" model and bring much-needed tourist dollars into empty downtowns.

"Lots of people want to enjoy legal cannabis in the company of others," said Haney. "And many people want to do that while sipping coffee, eating a scone, or listening to music. There's absolutely no good reason from an economic, health, or safety standpoint that the state should make that illegal. If an authorized cannabis retail store wants to also sell a cup of coffee and a sandwich, we should allow cities to make that possible and stop holding back these small businesses."

California is known worldwide as the birthplace of cannabis culture with its early adoption of medical cannabis and its expertise in cultivation. But there's another location that competes with California for the title of the world capital of cannabis: Amsterdam. There are over 700 cannabis cafes that operate across the Netherlands, and over 1 billion dollars is

spent in the cafes every year.

California on the other hand, is still dealing with the unintended consequences of decades of medical marijuana-only policies. California's "dispensaries" have replaced the social aspect of the Amsterdam cannabis scene with pharmacy-like businesses that only allow customers to order cannabis at a counter, purchase nothing else, and then leave.

"California's small cannabis businesses are struggling," said Haney. "Issues like over-saturation, high taxes, and the thriving black market are hurting cannabis businesses who follow the rules and pay taxes." In 2020, California's legal cannabis sales reached \$4 billion, while the state's illicit market sales were projected to have exceeded \$8 billion.

While consuming cannabis on-site at cannabis retailers is technically legal in California, selling non-cannabis-infused products is not. AB 374 is simple because it allows cannabis retailers to diversify their business and move away from the struggling and limited dispensary model by selling non-cannabis-infused foods.

"To be clear, we're not saying that coffee shops should be allowed to sell cannabis," said Assemblymember Matt Haney. "We're saying that cannabis shops should be allowed to sell coffee. It shouldn't be illegal for an existing cannabis business to move away from only selling marijuana and instead have the opportunity to grow, thrive and create jobs by offering coffee or live jazz."

AB 374 will now move to the Senate for approval, before being sent to the governor's desk to be signed. ★

State Route 70 Closure at Greenville Wye to Jarbo Gap





Huskies Recognized for D-IV NorCal Win with Parade

SUTTER, CA (MPG) - The 2023 California Interscholastic Federation Division IV NorCal Champions were acknowledged on Monday, June 5 as the Sutter community celebrated the Sutter Huskies baseball team once more with a parade down Acacia Ave.

This was the baseball program’s first NorCal regional title to be added with the multiple section titles from the Northern Section from the previous season before they added their first CIF Sac-Joaquin Division V title in completion in the SJS.

“We didn’t like to lose to them then, we weren’t going to lose to them at home again,” Lorentz said.

The Huskies did get a chance to redeem their regular season loss to Gridley on June 3, when they won the CIF NorCal Division IV title over the Bulldogs in a controlling 10-1 victory.

Sutter faced some adversity late in the season as they trailed 5-0 against Hillsdale of San Mateo late in the June 1 CIF NorCal D- IV semifinals before they erupted for six runs in the sixth and seventh inning walk off hit by infielder Logan Yacavace.

You could have called the Huskies the walk-off kids of the 2023 playoffs as they also won a 13-inning thriller to win the SJS Division V championship over Bradshaw Christian on May 23.

Sutter loses a great group of senior leadership including alumni catcher Landon Sable and utility Jack Munger added to Hanson, McCall and Lorentz.

Although leadership walks out into the “real world,” players will step up into the roles next season as the Huskies bring a ton of talent back for next year’s squad.

The pitching staff for the Huskies will be one of the deepest returning staffs going into next season as Hawaii commit Jagger Beck will lead the charge. Sutter will also have the arms of Jonny Munger, Yacavace and Kasey Combo.

On top of the pitching, Sutter brings more than half of its starting lineup back to a competitive squad on top of the talent Peterson brings up next season to help contend again in the Pioneer Valley League. ★

Drakes Continue to Gel



Blum added that they are not afraid of anyone in the league, and it showed on June 6 when they went on the road and beat the San Rafael Pacifics, who were 2022 Pacific Division champions.

Blum told MPG the Drakes are a lot of scrappy ball players and they’re going to compete the hardest they can every day. ★


