MARYSVILLE, CA (MPG) - The Marysville Joint Unified School District celebrated the groundbreaking of the Mary Covillaud Elementary School Modernization Project at 628 F Street in Marysville on Tuesday, April 18, 2023.

The modernization project will transform the aging school site with the addition of a new two-story building housing 16 classrooms, situated on the north-west quadrant of the campus. Students and faculty with special needs can expect

Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) upgrades that will make Mary Covillaud School easier to navigate. The new classroom building and ADA improvements are expected to be completed in January 2025.

“Ensuring that our students are receiving a quality education in comfortable classroom environments, minimizes distractions and allows them to focus on learning,” said Dr. Fal Asrani, Superintendent for the Marysville Joint Unified School District. “We are growing tomorrow’s leaders right here in our schools and it is our job to make their educational

experience a positive one.”

Marysville Joint Unified School District has prioritized infrastructure improvements at school sites throughout the district, investing over \$55M in campus modernization projects.

“Marysville High School and Lindhurst High School will each see their outdoor tracks retrofitted with rubberized tracks over the Summer of 2023 and the improvements taking place at Foothill Intermediate School will transform the educational experience for students living in the Loma Rica area,” said Dr. Asrani. ★

MJUSD Launches Middle College Academy at Yuba College

MARYSVILLE, CA (MPG) - The Marysville Joint Unified School District’s Board of Trustees took the final step to launch the Middle College Academy at a special board meeting on April 20th, creating an alternative high school option for students in the district. The Academy will be housed on the Yuba College campus, bringing the first program of its kind to the Yuba-Sutter area.

Yuba Community College’s Board of Trustees approved the facilities rental agreement with the Marysville Joint Unified School District at their meeting on April 14, 2023, making the Middle College Academy a reality for incoming freshmen for the upcoming 2023-24 school year.

“The partnership between MJUSD and Yuba College allows us to blaze a trail that will benefit not only our students, but the local business community as we prepare our students for college and careers and graduate highly skilled employees for the area workforce,” said Dr. Fal Asrani, Superintendent for the Marysville Joint Unified School District.

The Middle College Academy is a nationally recognized learning model that allows highly motivated students and families to accelerate their high school and two-year college completion. The program is designed to allow students to complete their AA degree while earning their high school diploma - “six years in four years.” This blended program structure provides significant savings for a four-year college degree. Apart from the college courses that students will access as part of their daily schedule, they will also have access to embedded internship and job experience options and complete some designated courses with MJUSD teachers. Overall, the program is designed to include layers of support from both the school district staff and the college faculty such as guidance, tutoring, mentoring etc.

The Middle College Academy will allow students to either graduate high school with an AA degree or a certificate that will place them in high skills and high wage employment.

MARYSVILLE, CA (MPG) - The play *Motherhood Out Loud*, opening May 5th at the Sutter Theater Center for the Arts, was described by one critic as "what they didn't tell you in What to Expect When You're Expecting." This is the latest production by the Convergence Theatre Company in collaboration with Yuba Sutter Arts & Culture. The play is a deep dive into the joys, challenges, sometimes funny, sometimes tragic aspects of motherhood. It explores a universal truth that will resonate with not just mothers, but fathers and with nonparents. We all had a mother after all and maybe even one or two or more in some cases.

Performances of *Motherhood Out Loud* will be held May 5, 6, 12 and 13 at 7pm and on May 7, 13, and 14 at 2pm at the Sutter Theater Center for the Arts, 754 Plumas Street in Yuba City. Tickets are \$20 and may be purchased at yubasutterarts.org.

Motherhood Out Loud is a collection of short plays that tells the hilarious, touching and sometimes agonizing story of motherhood, covering many different angles from cradle to grave. Stories from 14 playwrights are carefully curated into themed chapters. In "Fast Births" we witness the miracle of life followed by a new mom receiving unwanted sex advice from her own mother. "First Day" introduces us to gay dads, adoption, and a mother coping with her child's gender identity. Other chapters cover sex talks, step-motherhood, first dates, leaving the nest, marriage, and adulthood.

The play has been called, "utterly unpredictable," *Motherhood Out Loud* shatters traditional notions about parenthood, unveils its inherent comedy and celebrates

the deeply personal truths that span and unite generations" in a promo piece by Primary Stages for the show's premiere in New York.

CHP Welcomes Nine New Graduating Canine Teams

SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) - The California Highway Patrol (CHP) announced on April 28, 2023, the graduation and deployment of nine new canine teams. After months of intensive training, the teams were certified during a ceremony at the Canine Training Facility on the CHP Academy grounds.

"These loyal and brave public servants play a critical role in supporting the mission of the Department," said CHP Commissioner Sean Duryee. "Canines have a keen sense of smell that helps them detect items that a human officer cannot, such as narcotics and explosives. Both the canine and their handler's skills are refined during the hundreds of hours of intense training, ensuring the teams are prepared to serve throughout the state."

The graduates consist of six Patrol and Narcotics Detection Canine teams and three Explosives Detection Canine teams, all of which meet the guidelines set by the Commission on Peace Officer Standards and Training. The newest team members include four Belgian Malinois, two Dutch Shepherds, and three German Shepherd dogs. Once graduated, the CHP will have a total of 51 teams deployed throughout the state.

Each canine's partner, or handler, is an experienced CHP officer with experience ranging from five to 22 years. The officers

represent six of the CHP's eight geographic regions, including: Valley, Golden Gate, Southern, Border, Coastal, and Inland Division. Once deployed, the handlers will spend a minimum of eight hours every week completing scenario-based training with their canines to ensure the highest level of peak performance in the field.

The CHP uses canines to perform a variety of tasks, including detecting human scent, contraband, and explosives. The CHP canines are also used to assist allied agencies in apprehending criminals, detecting explosives or drugs, and in locating at-risk missing persons.

The mission of the CHP is to provide the highest level of Safety, Service, and Security. ★

YWA Partners with County on Drainage and Infrastructure in Olivehurst

Yuba Water Agency News Release

MARYSVILLE, CA (MPG) - The Yuba Water Agency will help cover just over 20 percent of an approximately \$37 million proposed Yuba County project to improve drainage in Olivehurst and add new sidewalks, bicycle lanes and improved transit stops. The funds committed by Yuba Water would only go toward elements specifically related to reducing flood risk.

The commitment from Yuba Water will increase Yuba County's competitiveness for a grant through the California Transportation Commission's Local Transportation Climate Adaptation Program, which requires applicants to come up with 20 percent of the overall cost of the project. Yuba Water had already committed approximately \$6 million to the county as the local cost share for another grant, which the county was not awarded. Those funds will now be transferred to this new grant application.

"With Yuba County and Yuba Water working together, I am really hopeful that we'll be able to secure this state grant to finally get this much-needed work done, which will reduce localized flooding and improve the quality of life for the community I serve – the people of Olivehurst,"

said Yuba County Supervisor Seth Fuhrer.

The proposed Olivehurst project includes drainage, sidewalks, and bike routes along the entire lengths of Western Avenue and Fleming Way, plus most portions of Second, Third, Fifth, Eighth, Ninth, and Eleventh avenues.

Yuba Water previously agreed to provide up to \$15 million for the county to leverage significant funding from the state to improve drainage in Linda and Olivehurst. One of these applications, the West Linda Comprehensive Safe Routes to School Project, was successfully awarded \$21 million from the state, with Yuba Water providing \$5.4 million for the local share of the project cost.

"The partnership between Yuba Water and Yuba County has already leveraged an unprecedented amount of funding for public works improvements throughout the county," said Daniel Peterson, Yuba County's director of public works. "The impact of this work will be tremendous, and we're just getting started."

The funds from Yuba Water will only be granted if the county is successful in securing the larger state grant.

If the county successfully secures grant funding through the state, construction could begin as soon as 2026. ★

4:07 pm, the Sutter County Sheriff's Office were dispatched to the area of Kempton Road near Brewer Road, in Rio Oso, regarding two bodies lying near a vehicle with gunshot wounds. Deputies and Detectives responded and located a female adult body inside a blue Ford Explorer and a male adult body lying outside approximately 50 yards near the Ford Explorer. Both the male and female were pronounced deceased on scene, and both had gunshot wounds.

The female and male were later identified as 40-year-old Elk Grove resident Vicky Keovilayphone and 40-year-old Yuba County Resident Derrick James Engelman. Due to this case being under active investigation, no further information can be released at this time. Rome Power House Approved as Landmark by Supervisors

NEVADA CITY, CA (MPG) - The Nevada County Historical Landmarks Commission is delighted to announce the County's latest landmark: The Rome Power House, approved by the Board of Supervisors on April 25, 2023.

The Rome Power House was the first and only hydroelectric generating plant built on the South Yuba River. Planning for the plant began in 1892. It entered service on 1896, serving mines in the area. It eventually led to the electrification of Nevada City, one of the early pioneering systems in California. Alphonse Tregidgo, along with many other pioneers, went on to help found PG&E. The remains of the Rome Power House include foundations and remnants of the penstocks. They are located on private land, so public access is with the permission of the owner.

The landmark will be featured in the next update to the Commission's

We Can't Ignore the Terror Threat from Somalia or The Southern Border

Terrorist groups continue to pose a major threat for America and its allies, even if U.S. policymakers have shifted most of their focus to Russia and China.

It'd be a grave mistake for Washington to ease the pressure on violent extremist organizations in remote terrorist hotbeds such as northeastern Somalia. Terrorists have already openly celebrated the possibility that the war in Ukraine will distract Western leaders and enable these groups to repeat their deadly past successes. We can't let that happen.

The American public's frustration with "endless wars" is understandable. But terrorist groups, in Somalia and elsewhere, have not been defeated, and it does not seem that they will be in the near future. In fact, the rapidly deteriorating security situation in East Africa necessitated the redeployment of American troops by the Biden administration, provoking harsh criticism.

Although the Islamic State's and Al-Qaeda's branches have suffered serious setbacks in the last two decades, they still control hundreds of thousands of square miles and millions of people from the Lake Chad Basin across South-Central Somalia to Yemen and Afghanistan. They also have the capacity to launch attacks far from their original strongholds.

The target of the latest commando raid in Somalia, Bilal al-Sudani, offers a typical example of a high-level terrorist commander who maintained and facilitated global networks and operations.

Al-Sudani, who left al-Shabaab for the Islamic State, was a key figure in the organization's Al-Karrar regional office, which serves as a coordination hub for all IS activity in East Africa. Al-Sudani also facilitated the connection between local branches and the Islamic State network beyond Africa.

The liquidation of al-Sudani

significantly degrades Islamic State financial capacities, preventing them from launching new attacks, at least for a while. Supporting friendly local forces, for instance, by conducting airstrikes in Somalia on January 23 is a cost-effective way of countering violent extremists' operations.

Increasing great power rivalries and the return of interstate wars are the realities of the current international system. But that doesn't mean that we can forget about terrorists, mainly because they do not forget us.

Violent extremist organizations are closely following global events and trying to exploit them. Consider the ongoing border crisis. In fiscal 2022, Border Patrol caught 98 foreign nationals on the FBI's terror watch list, obliterating the previous record of 15 in fiscal 2021. And this year will likely set another record in just the past five months, Border Patrol has apprehended 53 suspected terrorists.

And that's only the ones that agents caught. There have been 1.2 million known "got aways", illegal aliens who've successfully crossed into the United States and evaded law enforcement since the start of the Biden administration.

If the United States wants to avoid the possibility of a new terrorist attack on its soil, its leaders cannot neglect what's brewing in Africa or on its southern border, for that matter. The time of extended military engagements like the war in Afghanistan might have passed, but keeping the pressure on violent extremist organizations and conducting small-scale commando raids must continue.

Construction Company Owner Sentenced to Prison

A construction company owner in California was sentenced to 78 months' imprisonment and ordered to pay \$984,699 in restitution for his role in a bid-rigging and bribery scheme involving California Department of Transportation (Caltrans) improvement and repair contracts.

According to a guilty plea entered on Nov. 14, 2022, in the U.S. District Court for the Eastern District of California in Sacramento, Bill R. Miller engaged in a conspiracy from April 2015 through as late as December 2019. As part of the conspiracy, Miller recruited others to submit sham bids on Caltrans contracts, including co-conspirator William D. Opp, a former business partner who pleaded guilty in the case on Oct. 3, 2022.

In addition to pleading guilty to bid rigging, Miller also pleaded guilty to paying bribes to Choon Foo "Keith" Yong, the former Caltrans contract manager who managed the contracts involved on behalf of Caltrans, a California state agency that receives significant federal funding. On April 11, 2022, Yong pleaded guilty for his role in the bid-rigging and bribery scheme. According to Yong's plea agreement, Yong received the bribes in the form of cash payments,

wine, furniture and remodeling services on his home. The total value of the bribes that Miller paid to Yong was nearly \$1 million. Miller is the first defendant to be sentenced in the case.

"This sentence sends a strong message that criminals who corrupt the competitive bidding process will face stern consequences," said Assistant Attorney General Jonathan Kanter of the Justice Department's Antitrust Division. "Protecting infrastructure spending and taxpayer dollars remains a top priority for the Antitrust Division and our Procurement Collusion Strike Force partners."

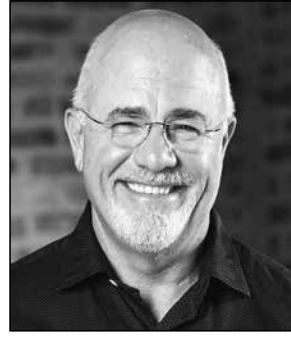
"A lengthy investigation and a series of guilty pleas has led to the sentencing today for a bid-rigging and bribery conspiracy," said U.S. Attorney Phillip A. Talbert for the Eastern District of California. "But our work is not done. Anticompetitive practices harm taxpayers and legitimate businesses alike. My office will continue to investigate and prosecute such conduct."

"Fair and free competition is essential to ensure taxpayer money is only obligated and spent on essential services and contracts," said Special Agent in Charge Sean Ragan of the FBI Sacramento Field Office. "The FBI is committed to working with our partners to investigate such allegations, and bringing to

justice those who conspire to enrich themselves by cheating the American public as a whole. We hope this sentence serves as ample warning to anyone contemplating a scheme to falsely influence a government bidding process for personal gain."

Today's sentencing is the result of a joint investigation that was conducted by the Antitrust Division's San Francisco office, the U.S. Attorney's Office for the Eastern District of California, and the FBI's Sacramento Division as part of the Justice Department's Procurement Collusion Strike Force (PCSF). Trial Attorneys Christopher J. Carlberg and Tai S. Milder and Assistant U.S. Attorney Lee S. Bickley prosecuted the case.

In November 2019, the Department of Justice created the Procurement Collusion Strike Force, a joint law enforcement effort to combat antitrust crimes and related fraudulent schemes that impact government procurement, grant, and program funding at all levels of government — federal, state and local. Just Pile Up Money, And Go Do It

Dear Dave,

I plan to buy another investment property with cash in the next year or two. Currently, I have \$83,000 sitting in a high-yield savings account at 4% interest. My goal is to save another \$50,000 to \$70,000 in the upcoming months. Right now, 4% is good, but I want to make sure I'm maximizing my returns. Should I be doing something else with the money?

Dear Brett,

I like the way you're doing things. Right now, you're simply parking the money short term for

a purchase a few months down the road. If you invest it, you might make a little more, but you're taking more risk too. If I'm you, I'm parking the cash.

Here's the deal: The money you'll have to purchase another property won't come from a return on the investment. It'll come from you putting money in the account. The investment isn't the secret sauce in this scenario — you are. If you invested the money and made 10% rather than 4% over two months, let's say, that amounts to about a 3% difference. That's nothing in your case. You're not within a couple thousand dollars of doing a deal at the moment. Your deal is a \$150,000 deal. Your return on investment isn't going to make this happen, or keep it from happening. See what I'm saying?

Just keep doing what

you've been doing and park the money. That's what I'd do. People who are math nerds, like us, always look for things to fix an investment. But sometimes the thing that fixes the investment is you. You are the one doing the investing. You are the one putting money in the account. So, in this case, don't try to fix it. Just pile up money and go do it.

Great question, Brett!

Chico Man Sentenced to Life for Murder over Marijuana

Butte County DA News Release

BUTTE COUNTY, CA (MPG) - In an emotional sentencing hearing on April 21, 2023, in Butte County Superior Court, a Chico man was sentenced for the shooting and killing of his friend in 2019 over a marijuana dispute.

Dylan Andrew Glen Rice, 28, of Chico, was sentenced to 25 years to life for first-degree murder in a case arising from the killing of Jacob McArthur, who was 27 at the time of his death.

Butte County District Attorney Mike Ramsey said the case began in December of 2019 when Butte County Sheriff's deputies found McArthur dead from multiple gunshots inside his rural residence on Craig Access Road east of Lake Oroville. For the next year and a half, sheriff's detectives continued to gather evidence and Rice was arrested for the murder in July 2021.

Ramsey said detectives learned through the investigation that Rice, a friend of McArthur who had previously worked with him cultivating marijuana at the Craig Access Road property, felt he had been "short-changed" over his work. On the night of the murder, Rice had lurked outside McArthur's home for some time before shooting through a living room window and hitting McArthur inside. Rice then stole a large quantity of marijuana from the house and fled.

Ramsey said that during the emotional sentencing hearing this morning, the victim's mother, sister, and father all addressed the court. McArthur's mother shared with the court what a wonderful son and person her Jacob was, and how Rice's actions had robbed her family of

that person. She also directly addressed Rice seated in the courtroom next to his attorney, pointing out how Rice had described the killing to others as "courageous." She told Rice that his actions were, in fact, "cowardly and driven by greed." Referencing that Rice had held himself out in the community as a "hippie," who embraced peace and love, the mother told Rice that "a real hippie understands karma. You are a fraud."

Ramsey said McArthur's sister also gave a moving tribute to her lost brother and told the court how McArthur had wanted to one day become a father, and had talked about that dream since he was a little boy. She said Rice's decision to murder her brother killed that dream.

Finally, MacArthur's father addressed the court. He spoke of how proud the family had been of his boy's growth as a man. He thanked the sheriff's detectives for their tireless dedication to finding his son's killer and bringing him to justice.

While a slideshow with smiling pictures of "Jake" in the fullness of life played in the background, the grieving father turned to address Rice in the courtroom. The father asked that a different picture be shown — a photo taken of his son's face after the murder. Through bitter tears, the father shouted at Rice: "Look at what you did! Look at what you did! You never got to see that, did you? When you shot him in the back of the head!"

Ramsey said Rice turned briefly to look, but then continued to sit staring forward, showing no reaction.

After the family was finished speaking, Ramsey said the judge imposed the sentence of 25 years to life and ordered Rice transported to state prison. ★

How Proposed Changes to Ballot Measures Could Affect Election Results

When Major League Baseball opened its 2023 season this month, players and managers had to contend with a raft of new rules, including time limits on pitchers and batters and limits on bunting infielders on one side of the diamond.

Whether the new rules speed up the games, as intended, is still uncertain, but it is certain that they will affect outcomes to some unknown extent. Changing the rules of any game changes outcomes, and what's true in sports is also true of politics.

The most obvious example of how changing rules affects outcomes is redistricting – the redrawing of legislative and congressional districts after each decennial census. Republicans hold a majority in Congress largely because GOP-controlled state legislatures redrew congressional districts to give the party more opportunities to win seats. For decades, Democrats have done the same thing when they had the chance.

This year's session of the California Legislature includes three major efforts to change rules governing ballot measures, all of which could affect outcomes.

One of them, Senate Bill 858 – and a

companion measure, Senate Constitutional Amendment 3 – is the latest of many attempts to remove the attorney general's authority to write the official titles for statewide ballot measures. Introduced by Sen. Roger Niello, a Republican from the Sacramento suburbs, the two measures would give the task to the Legislature's budget analyst, who already provides the fiscal analysis of proposed measures.

It's a change that should be made because recent attorneys general, all Democrats, have blatantly skewed official titles, with positive slants for liberal measures such as tax increases and negative ones for proposals of conservative groups. Judges have occasionally intervened in extreme cases, but generally defer to the attorney general.

Not surprisingly, those on the left want to maintain the status quo so Niello's two-bill package is likely to join other proposed reforms in the legislative trash pile.

The other two efforts to change the rules governing ballot measures come from Democrats and thus are more likely to be enacted.

One, by Sen. Scott Wiener, a San Francisco Democrat, would as originally introduced and approved by a Senate committee would have undone two genuine ballot measure reforms that the Legislature passed and former Gov. Jerry Brown signed less than a decade ago. They require local tax and bond ballot measures to clearly state their financial impacts in the 75-word summaries that appear on the ballot and prohibit authorities from using summaries to extol the proposals' virtues.

Local government officials hate the reforms because giving voters unvarnished facts might make them less likely to pass such measures. Originally, Wiener's Senate Bill 532 would have shifted the financial data to the voters' pamphlet, thus freeing officials to once again use ballot summaries for propaganda.

Late last week, however, Wiener toned down the measure, retaining the requirement to explain tax consequences in ballot measure summaries, but allowing that information to appear without counting against the 75-word limit on summaries.

Finally, there's Assembly Bill 421, carried by Assemblyman Isaac Bryan, a Democrat from Culver City, at the behest of unions and other liberal organizations.

As the Legislature turned to the left in recent years and enacted many new business regulations, those impacted by the new laws have increasingly turned to the ballot to thwart them. AB 421 is clearly aimed at making it much more difficult – or even impossible – for business groups to overturn laws via ballot measures, either referenda or initiatives, by imposing very tight new rules on qualifying them for the ballot.

AB 421 is likely to win legislative approval, but its ultimate fate is in doubt. Both Gov. Gavin Newsom and his predecessor vetoed similar proposals in the past.

Income Verses Growth Strategies

With markets in continued disarray for well over a year now, investors may be looking at ways to solidify income instead of pursuing traditional growth strategies.

You really can't blame them. The longer the market falls, the more discouraged an investor may become.

There are solutions to be able to abandon growth for long term income and looking in this direction can open up more possibilities than just buying a handful of stocks and sweating out market crashes.

Certificates of Deposits (CDs) are available both through your local bank or credit union and through most financial advisory firms. Right now, the return on CDS are healthier than they've been in decades due to the increase in interest rates by the Federal Reserve.

Time Frame Laddering CDs (my term here) is a sound strategy to both garner possibly higher returns along with a 100% government guarantee on principal. Laddering means buying different maturity dates which enables you to lock in returns for a longer period of time yet have some level of liquidity. For instance, buying a 6 month CD, a 1 year, 2 year and 5 year CD is an example of laddering. Although a 5 year CD would be essentially tied up for 5 years, the shorter duration CDs convert back to cash sooner according to each maturity date that you select. I wouldn't recommend buying anything longer than 5 years out as there is too much that could happen to interest rates given the current crazy economic environment, but that's just me.

One could certainly consider 10, 20 or even 30 year products be added to a ladder portfolio. Just make sure you understand the advantages and drawbacks of longer time commitments.

You could use the same strategy for Treasury Bills, notes or bonds. Seek out a financial professional or discuss with your local bank to understand the differences between CDs and Treasury products. These are also government guaranteed.

Buying a basket full of dividend stocks is another way to garner long term income. Dividends are sort of like thank you gifts from the publically traded companies that offer them.

Basically if you buy a share of a dividend paying company, they pay you a certain amount for every share you own every so often.

Some dividend paying companies have paid dividends for decades, and some have increased their payments every year for just as long. Be aware however that dividends can be reduced or even eliminated by the company at any time. As a general rule however, if

a company have been paying dividends for years and/or has never cut them, there is a good chance they would want to preserve that track record. Another consideration of dividend paying stocks is the price of the stock could drop or go up. Going up would be nice of course but a drop in price could sting a bit. Price changes do not necessarily change your payment however but it could.

Buying bonds (debt from companies, municipalities or even states) are usually regarded as a bit more stable than stocks. They pay an interest rate and you can buy insured bonds if you're worried about a default, and yes, defaults can happen.

Many conservative investors hold just a portfolio of bonds, having been taught by their grandfathers that bonds are a stalwart of a consistent investment strategy. Some argue however that this way of thinking is old fashion and indeed, the bond markets have been hammered like stocks on numerous occasions.

I would tend to agree that bonds, albeit, the RIGHT ONES, can be safer than holding some stocks, but in the last few decades, even bonds have, at times, been uncharacteristically volatile.

Like all investments, make sure you understand the ins and outs before venturing into the arena.

Income annuities are contracts from insurance companies that, in exchange for a payment(s) to them, they promise to pay you a certain amount for a certain period of time. Lifetime income is available and you can even select the percentage return you desire, locked in for life, if you meet certain conditions.

Not falling into the traditional discussion of what is called equities, you can always dip your toes into being a landlord and garner a property to rent out. Renting out a home, condo or mobile home, or taking advantage of the Airbnb phenomenon can supplement ones income. This route is a popular one should you be able to manage the work and investment required of such an endeavor.

Concluding, altering ones focus from capital appreciation (growth) to securing income can open up more avenues of consideration rather than just watching Wall Street all day.

Two Yolo County Ranches Share Insights on Cattle Raising

Two ranching operations in Yolo County have found ways to carve their own niche, allowing each to help maintain the region's rich agricultural tradition. Yolo Land and Cattle Co. and the Yocha Dehe Wintun Nation opened their doors this month to a group of state legislative and committee staffers, offering a glimpse of how they manage their land, livestock and natural resources. Yocha Dehe raises cattle as part of a diverse farming operation that includes more than a dozen crops. Yolo Land and Cattle raises grass-fed Angus cattle, with some Angus-Hereford crosses.

Farmers to Get Full Supplies from State Water Project and Central Valley Project

After a series of winter storms boosted California's reservoirs and snowpack, state and federal officials are pledging full water deliveries for farmers from two key water projects. The California Department of Water Resources said it expects to deliver 100% of requested water supplies from the State Water Project. That is up from a 75% allocation announced in March. The U.S. Bureau of Reclamation announced that agricultural and water service contractors will receive 100% of requested supplies from the Central Valley Project, up from 80% announced in March.

UC Davis Develops Five New Strawberry Varieties to Combat Fungal Disease

Plant breeders at the University of California, Davis, are releasing five new strawberry varieties developed to resist the soilborne disease Fusarium wilt. Researchers said this marks the first release from the UC Davis Strawberry Breeding Program where all cultivars have Fusarium wilt resistance. They also said the new varieties have high yields and improved fruit quality. In California, 1.8 billion pounds of strawberries are harvested each year.

State to Provide \$69 Million in Funding to Help with Farm Soil and Irrigation Projects

The California Department of Food and Agriculture has announced a pilot program to provide \$69 million in block grant funding for agricultural projects that improve soil health and farm irrigation systems. Some \$40 million will be provided through the State Water Efficiency and Enhancement Program, which incentivizes agricultural operations to invest in water-saving irrigation systems. Another \$29 million will be made available through the state's Healthy Soils Program, which aids conservation management practices to improve soil health and reduce greenhouse gases. ★

Big Problems for California's Income-Based Utility Rates

Last week the Globe reported that Southern California Edison, Pacific Gas & Electric and San Diego Gas & Electric had just filed a proposal to create income-based utility billing.

Currently, utility bills are based on electricity and gas consumption. The utility companies are now proposing income-based utility billing so that higher-income earners pay for more than they use, subsidizing the rates for lower income customers.

This outrageous proposal isn't the only of its kind. The Biden Administration is proposing a tax (penalty) for having good credit. Mortgage borrowers with good credit will pay higher fees so borrowers with lower credit scores can get loans.

We reported on a 2021 report from the University of California at Berkeley recommending that the state link California's highest-in-the-nation electricity bills to customer incomes – ie. your

ability to pay.

Authors Severin Borenstein (an economist), Meredith Fowle, and Jim Sallee of the UC Berkeley and the Energy Institute at Haas admit that California's electricity rates are so high, lower-income households pay a larger share of their income on electricity.

Rather than using all available energy sources to create energy abundance, the Berkeley report proposes "cutting back on the volumetric per-kilowatt-hour charges on customers' bills and recovering the missing money through constructs tied to customers' income."

And the Legislature and Governor approved this scheme through AB 205, which was signed by Gov. Gavin Newsom in June of last year claiming it was needed because the wild swings in utility prices that California experiences.

California has the highest electricity rates in the country. "Those costs could rise even faster over the next decade, as utilities harden their grids against

wildfires, grow their share of net-metered rooftop solar and add other costs that will be passed through to utility customers," Next 10 reported over two years ago.

Since we reported last week, many have recognized "the state's perpetual march toward a collectivist state," as Jon Coupal just reported.

Coupal, President of the Howard Jarvis Taxpayers Association, explains AB 205 is even worse because the bill "bypassed many of the normal procedures for enacting legislation. It did this because it was a so-called 'budget trailer bill.'"

"While the 'budget bill' is constitutionally mandated to be enacted by June 15, it only passes by that date for one reason — so the legislators can continue to receive their paychecks."

"Moreover, after the enactment of the budget, there are so-called 'junior budget bills' amending the fake June 15th budget as well as last-minute 'budget trailer bills' directing the spending of billions in ways that the budget

bill itself did not direct."

"AB 205, the 'energy trailer bill,' received scant public attention and no meaningful public hearings were held. But its impacts are profound, and not in a good way."

Is this new utility charge a tax or fee?

Coupal explains: "Trying to shoehorn an income component into utility rates converts 'ratepayers' into 'taxpayers,' and Californians have had their fill of high taxes."

The difference between a tax and a fee is more than semantics.

Taxes are imposed for generalized government services like education, public safety, transportation, and even for a reasonable safety net for the less fortunate.

But a "fee" or "charge" has always correlated to the receipt of a specific service.

There is some good news in the face of California's race to Marxism. Coupal explains:

"A coalition of taxpayer and business organizations have already qualified the Taxpayer

Protection and Government Accountability Act (TPA) for the 2024 ballot. Among its many provisions is not only further clarification of what a 'tax' is but also a provision that requires any tax to be approved by a legislative body rather than some administrative agency or other authority not directly accountable to voters."

California's politicians and unelected agency leaders are limiting energy sources rather than using an all-of-the-above approach to energy production in California: Oil, gas, coal, nuclear, hydroelectric, solar and wind.

If all we are allowed to use is renewable energy for electricity production – a deliberate energy shortage – statewide shortages and rolling blackouts inevitably become the new California normal. "We are being conditioned to accept this as normal by some very evil leaders," we said. Fortunately, Jon Coupal says "this battle on behalf of California's beleaguered taxpayers and ratepayers is not over." ★

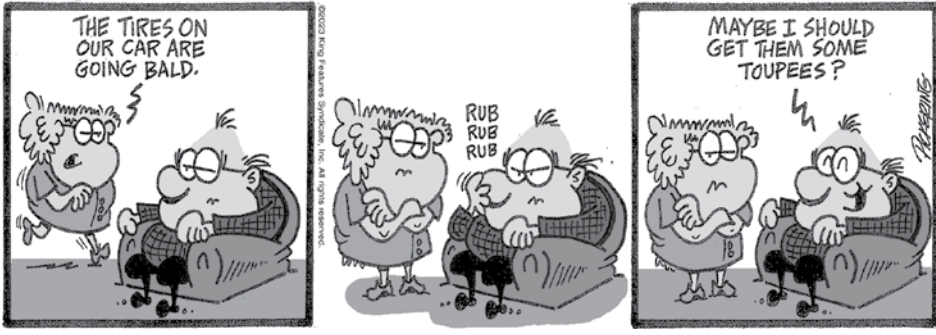

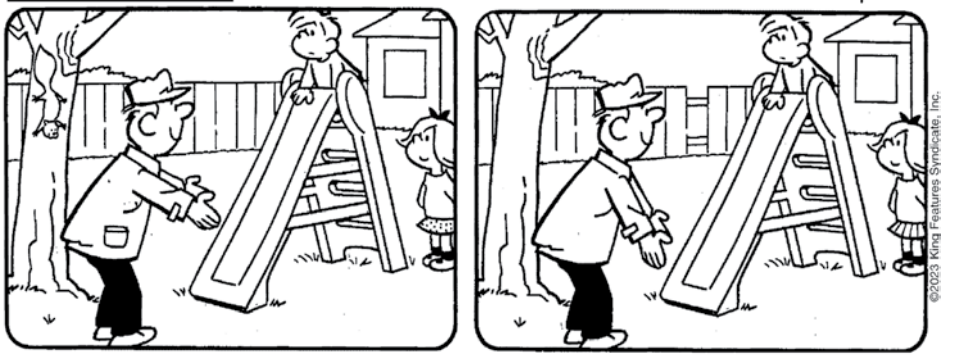

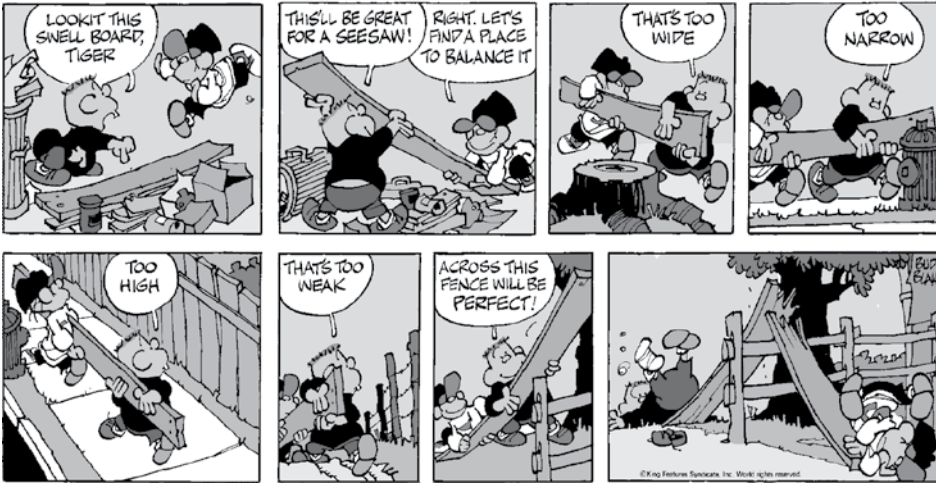

Bradshaw Christian got on the scoreboard in the first inning for the early lead.

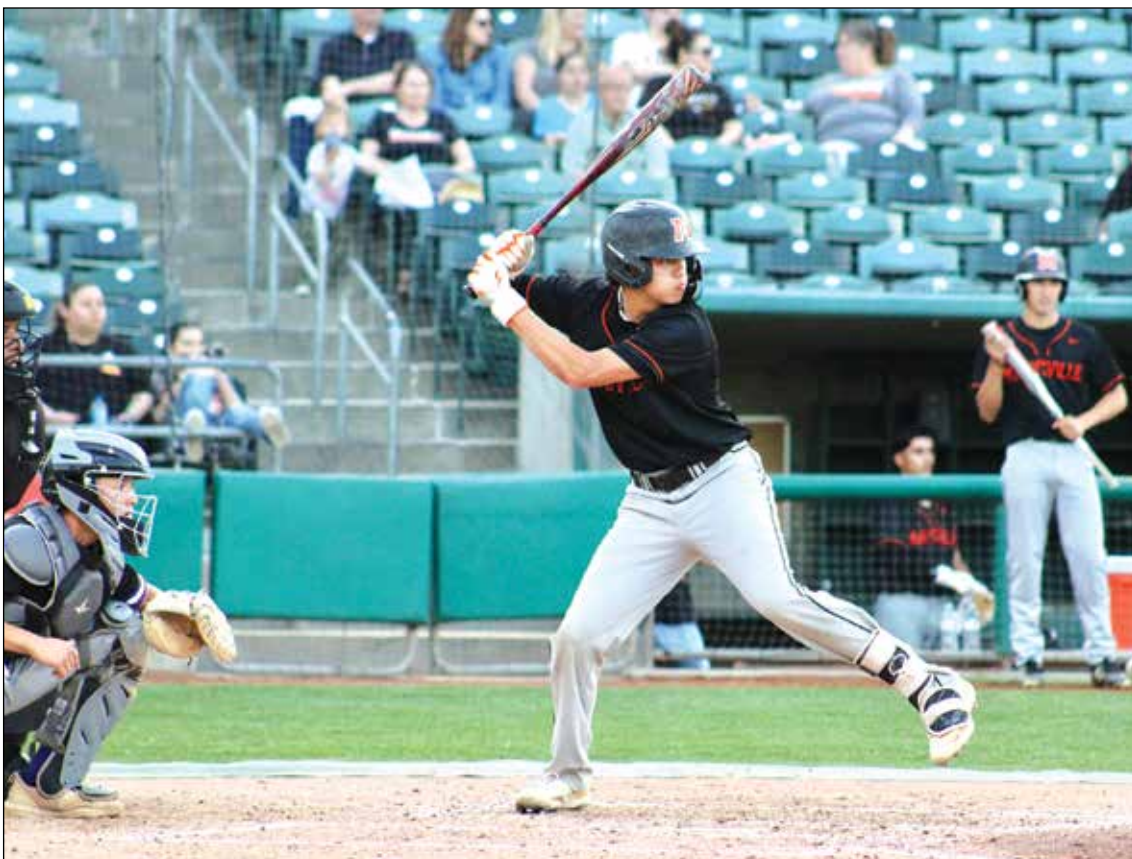

Yuba City head coach Amy Olchefske expressed to the Dispatch that they need their momentum to begin earlier in the game. The Lady Honkers consistently hit the ball hard every at bat, but they were always lasered within small steps of multiple Lady Falcons players around the diamond.

Yuba City (2-9, 1-8 CVC) picked up their first CVC win on April 25, in the first game of a double-header against Antelope.

Olchefske exclaimed to the Dispatch the importance of getting a CVC win.

"It was motivating because we can win, we just let easy mistakes get to us and we need to fix them," Olchefske said.

River Valley (6-6, 4-4 CVC) chipped away every inning as they were up 11-0 heading to the bottom of the sixth.

The dominant pitching of Lady Falcons sophomore pitcher Payton Smith dealt through her first five innings of work. She ended the day pitching 5.2 innings as she was replaced in the bottom of the sixth after a hard hit single off Yuba City freshman pitcher Chloe Gonzales struck her throwing wrist. Almond relieved Smith for the remainder of the inning as

a precaution. Smith surrendered seven hits, two runs and four strikeouts.

Almond said Smith's growth throughout the season has shown great composure.

"She never seems to get phased or rattled," Almond said. He added that Smith took over the pitching role early in the season and ran with it when he was deciding on who was going to be his ace.

On the offensive side of the ball Smith went three-for-five with two runs-batted-in (RBI). River Valley sophomore first baseman Claudia Dudek had a day at the plate as she went two-for-five with three RBIs. Dudek's two hits were both extra base hits including a double and a home run.

"I need to be aggressive at the plate," Dudek said. "I have long arms and good range, so if it looks like I can hit it, I will."

For the Lady Honkers, junior catcher/captain Lexi Dell and Gonzales had a multi-hit game for Yuba City.

Dell expressed to the Dispatch that they are continuously putting in the work and have made a huge jump throughout their season.

Dell hit two doubles going two-for-four and Gonzales went two-for-three with two singles. Additionally Lady Honkers sophomore center fielder Riley Mireles homered in the bottom of the seventh to give Yuba City a boost.

Yuba City had four games scheduled this week with a trip to Wheatland on Monday, were set to host Bella Vista on Thursday, Lincoln on Friday and end the week on the road this Saturday, May 6 at Chico.

The Lady Falcons had two crucial games this week at homes as they hosted Roseville on Tuesday and Inderkum on Thursday in hopes of making their push for the third and final guaranteed spot in the CVC standings. ★

YUBA COUNTY, CA (MPG) - Caltrans is alerting motorists and residents that traffic-interfering nighttime construction activity is scheduled next week on State Highway 70 between Laurellen Road and the Yuba-Butte County line.

The contractor, DeSilva Gates Construction, plans to perform paving work at various locations from 7 p.m. to 5 a.m. Sunday, May 7 through May 10. Motorists can expect traffic delays due to one-way traffic control.

Residents in the area may hear loud construction noise, including OSHA-required vehicle backup warning alarms. The contractor will maintain access to all driveways and cross streets during construction. After these operations are completed, traffic will be shifted to a new roadway alignment.

In a separate project at the Yuba-Butte

County line, Teichert Construction is performing paving work at the south end of the newly constructed Honcut Creek Bridge. Traffic is scheduled to begin traveling on the new bridge the week of May 8. The traffic shift will allow crews to rehabilitate the existing pavement on the east side of the new structure.

The construction schedules are subject to change due to weather, availability of equipment and/or materials or other construction-related issues.

Caltrans reminds motorists to “Be Work Zone Alert” and that the construction zone speed limit has been reduced to 45 mph. 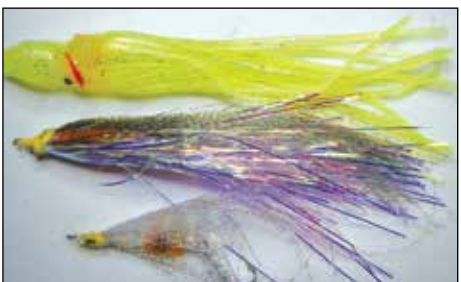

Non-profit HomeShare American River Celebrates Dozens of Happy Housemates

SACRAMENTO REGION, CA (MPG) - In July 2021, inter-faith non-profit Placer People of Faith Together (ppoft.org) launched a powerful, versatile tool to unlock both rental income and naturally-affordable housing throughout the Greater Sacramento live-work area. More than 50 such non-profit supported homesharing programs have been valuably serving their communities throughout the US, some for as long as 50 years. But there was no such service in our region until PPOFT decided to start HomeShare American River.

Almost two years later, non-profit housemate-matching and -support service HomeShare American River (HSAR) has matched up dozens of happy housemates across the region into safe, fair, valuable, and durable arrangements. HSAR makes matches in homes (whether owned or rented) located within an hour’s drive of Roseville, including Nevada City, Placerville,

Lodi, Dixon, Yuba City, and Marysville. HSAR provides help for potential “Hosts” and “Guests” throughout the entire arrangement: screening, matchmaking (including facilitating exchanges of household services for lowered rent), and active support/trouble-

shooting. And while Hosts set the rents they charge, HSAR doesn’t charge them or their Guests anything for its service, including the background checks. Instead, HSAR is entirely funded by the Agency on Aging/ Area 4 and a generous private donor, meaning that HSAR is beholden to neither Host nor Guest... just to its social mission to serve both of them equally for as long as they live together.

Since launching, HSAR has made 24 matches from Nevada City to Elk Grove. Matched Hosts and Guests vary widely in age (22-84), rents paid (\$550-900, including utilities), income, and walks of life, but all have the most important thing in common: they make “great neighbors down the hall” to each other. And that also means HSAR has effectively created many new units of housing, without hammering a single nail!

As Executive Director and Co-Founder Justin Ellerby says, “Two things tell me that this service can make a dent in a lot of big problems. One: The gratitude and relief I hear from our happily-matched clients. Two: Almost everyone I tell about this service reacts with almost the exact same words: ‘This is SO needed!’”
