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# **Saving Power and Paying More**

High-stakes battle brewing over California power bills

California utility companies are working on a controversial pricing structure that would bill households a different fixed charge depending on their income — but the idea is catching heat from Republicans who argue it will hurt low-income families.

As you may have already noticed on your own bill, monthly electric bills come with a few fixed fees that are added on top of the charges proportional to your usage rate. These charges go toward operating costs for the state's electric grid, including maintenance.

Earlier in April, three companies — Pacific Gas & Electric, Southern California Edison and San Diego Gas & Electric — submitted a proposal to the California Public Utilities Commission that includes an income-based pricing system for these fixed charges,

as called for in a 2022 state law. According to KTLA 5, the monthly charge would vary between the companies, and range from: Households making less than \$69,000 a year: \$20 to \$34; Households making \$69,000 to \$180,000 a year: \$51 to \$73; Households making more than \$180,000 a year: \$85 to \$128.

The companies say the rate of kilowatt-hour usage will also lower for all customers, but low-income households will benefit the most. PG&E and Southern California Edison estimate its lowest-income customers would, on average, save as much as a 21% on their bill.

But Republican legislators are skeptical that a plan from "a government sanctioned monopoly" will save customers money. On Friday, the Senate Republican caucus fired off a letter to the utilities commission arguing that the pricing proposal would "unfairly burden" low-income residents:

Senate GOP leader Brian Jones of El Cajon and other Republican senators, in the letter: "The goal of trying to stabilize the grid and lower electricity rates is something we support; however, the tactic of implementing a structured fixed-charge system that diminishes individual responsibility and usage in favor of an 'identity' subsidization is not, in our opinion, an answer. More fees are not a solution to already ridiculously high

utility bills."

The rising cost of natural gas has caused utility bills to surge, frustrating Californians across all economic levels. But lower-income residents end up paying a disproportionate share of utility expenses.

In the meantime, the first round of comments for the proposal will be due by June 2 and the Public Utilities Commission will be expected to make a final decision on the pricing structure by July 2024.

# Yuba River Endowment Announces Increased Scholarship Giving

MARYSVILLE, CA (MPG) - After completing interviews of potential scholarship recipients, the Yuba River Endowment board unanimously approved increasing this year's scholarship fund from \$50,000 helping 20 students, to \$71,500 helping 32 students.

The Endowment's scholarship application was launched in late 2022. To be eligible to apply, the applicant's primary residence needed to be in Yuba County, or the applicant needed to be a senior at a Yuba County high school; and the applicant must be planning to attend, or continue at, a trade school, junior college, or college in the fall of 2023.

100 students applied by the scholarship's January 31st deadline. As a reward, every student who applied was given a \$10 Dutch Brothers gift card. In late March, 32 of the applicants were interviewed by a panel of Endowment board members.

"Taking part in the interview process was a phenomenal experience," said Yuba River Endowment board member, Kelly McNally. "Whether they were heading to trade school or college, they were all very focused and driven. It was so inspiring to hear their goals and their passion to come back and better Yuba County."

The 32 scholarship winners include 21 high school seniors going on to higher education; two students attending trade school to be linemen; two students continuing at community colleges; and seven students continuing at four-year colleges. Of the high school seniors, two are from the Marysville Charter Academy for the Arts, three from Wheatland High, seven from Lindhurst High and nine from Marysville High.

The 32 awards were distributed as twenty \$2500 scholarships, seven \$2000 scholarships, and five \$1500 scholarships. Endowment representatives plan to attend the scholarship recognition events at each of the Yuba County high schools prior to graduation. As students receive and submit their fall registration confirmations, the funds will be distributed directly to them. All students who meet the eligibility criteria



# **Cold River Flows Require Caution During Spring Snowmelt**

SACRAMENTO REGION, CA (MPG) - With the near-record California snowfall, water flows will be significantly higher in rivers and streams as the spring snowmelt accelerates. Outdoor recreationists should remain aware and cautious of as higher flows mean dangerously cold, swiftly moving water.

Pacific Gas and Electric Company (PG&E) urges those who venture near or into water to take extra precautions, especially around hydroelectric facilities and dams, where flow conditions can change rapidly. As trout-fishing seasons generally opening in April, anglers are especially encouraged to take precautions.

"The abundant snowfall is good for California but will result in much higher flows and potential flooding when warmer weather arrives," said Jan Nimick, PG&E vice president of Power Generation. "We encourage everyone recreating in or near water to be situationally aware and have a plan to quickly and safely escape in case of changing water flows and cold temperatures."



Most California rivers are fed by snowmelt, making them cold even in summer. Simple actions can save lives, such as recognizing if the water is too cold or swift, knowing your limits, wearing a life jacket or simply by not entering the water when conditions seem unsafe.

Below are some water safety tips:

#### Know the Risks

Prevention is the best way to save a person from

drowning. By the time a person is struggling in the water, a rescue is extremely unlikely and places the rescuer at risk; Sudden immersion in cold water can stimulate the "gasp reflex," causing an involuntary inhalation of air or water. It can even trigger cardiac arrest, temporary paralysis, hypothermia and drowning. When faced with swift water, even the strongest swimmers can be easily overwhelmed; Cold water entering the ear canal can cause vertigo and disorientation. This can confuse swimmers, potentially causing them to venture deeper into the water;

Cold water also reduces body heat 25 to 30 times faster than air does at the same temperature and causes impairment that can be fatal.

#### Learn About Self-Rescue Techniques

If you do fall into the water, here are some sur-

vival tips:
Don't panic. Try to control your breathing; don't gasp. A sudden, unexpected fall into cold water causes an involuntary gasp (or torso) reflex. It takes less than one-half cup of water in a person's lungs to drown. If you remain calm, you have a greater chance of self-rescue;

If you have a boat, stay

with it. It will help you stay afloat and will be seen more easily by rescuers. If it's capsized and a portion of the craft is above water, try to climb on top;

Stay afloat with the help of a life jacket, regain control of your breathing and keep your head above water in view of rescuers;

If possible, remove heavy shoes. Look for ways to increase buoyancy such as by holding onto seat cushions or an ice chest:

If you're in the water with others, huddle together facing each other to help everyone stay afloat and keep warm;

If you do fall into a river treacherous. Guided trips

without a life jacket, keep your feet pointed downstream and turn onto your

If you fall into the water with waders on, roll onto the shore. Wear a belt with waders.

#### **Know Your Limits**

Swimming in open water is more difficult than in a swimming pool. People tire more quickly and can get into trouble;

Many unseen obstacles can be lurking below the water's surface. This is especially the case during spring and early summer snowmelt. Rising water can make these obstacles even more

for inexperienced paddlers are recommended.

Wear a Coast Guard-Approved Life Jacket

Conditions change quickly in open water and even the best swimmers can misjudge the water and their skills when boating or swimming.

#### Adult Supervision

Actively supervise children in and around open bodies of water, giving them your undivided attention. Do not assume that someone is watching them. Appoint a designated "water watcher," taking turns with other adults. Use the buddy system and never swim alone.

# California Man Found Guilty of Felony **Charges Related to Capitol Breach**

WASHINGTON, DC (MPG) - A California man was found guilty in the District of Columbia of felony charges for his actions during the January 6, 2021, Capitol breach. His actions and the actions of others disrupted a joint session of the U.S. Congress convened to ascertain and count the electoral votes related to the presidential election.

Sean Michael McHugh, 35, of Auburn, California, was found guilty yesterday, following a stipulated bench trial, of obstruction and assaulting, impeding, or interfering with law enforcement officers. U.S. District Court Judge John D. Bates scheduled a sentencing hearing for September 7, 2023.

According to evidence presented in court, McHugh was on the Lower West Terrace on the afternoon of January 6 where he was captured on video footage and audio assaulting multiple U.S. Capitol Police (USCP) officers. McHugh is captured on video carrying a cannister of bear spray in a holster on his hip and discharging the bear spray into a line of USCP officers. Metropolitan Police Department body worn camera video and audio captures McHugh yelling at officers, among other things, "You're protecting communists!"; "There is a Second Amendment behind us, what are you going to do then?"; and "You ain't holding the line!" At approximately 1:40 p.m., McHugh, along with other rioters, pushed a large metal sign into a line of uniformed police officers while McHugh yelled into his megaphone, "Put it up there! Put it up there!"

The case is being prosecuted by the U.S. Attorney's Office for the District of Columbia and the Department of Justice National Security Division's Counterterrorism Section. Valuable assistance was provided by the U.S. Attorney's Office for the Eastern District of California.

The case is being investigated by the FBI's Washington Field Office, as well as the Metropolitan Police Department, with significant assistance provided by the FBI's Sacramento Field Office.

In the 27 months since January 6, more than 1,000 individuals have been arrested on charges related to the Jan. 6 Capitol breach, including more than 320 individuals charged with assaulting or impeding law enforcement. The investigation remains ongoing.

# Major Roadwork Resumes on Highway 70 North of Marysville

YUBA COUNTY, CA (MPG) - Caltrans is alerting motorists and residents that major construction activity has resumed along a nine-mile stretch of State Highway 70 between Laurellen Road and the Yuba-Butte County line.

The contractor, DeSilva Gates Construction, had suspended work during the winter months. With clear springtime weather ahead, the contractor started mobilizing equipment and resumed paving operations this week.

From now until the fall, crews will be working at various locations during day and nighttime hours Monday through Saturday. Motorists should allow additional travel time and may expect intermittent traffic-interfering work, especially during overnight hours.

Residents in the area may hear loud construction noise, including OSHArequired vehicle backup warning alarms. The contractor will maintain access to all driveways and cross streets during construction.

Caltrans reminds motorists to "Be Work Zone Alert" and that the

construction zone speed limit has been reduced to 45 mph between Laurellen Road in Yuba County and East Gridley Road in Butte County, where a separate construction project is underway.

The \$131 million Yuba County project will widen and pave the shoulders to 8 feet, provide a 14-foot-wide two-way left turn lane, continuous passing lanes and 6-foot-wide unpaved shoulders for slow moving farm equipment. The project will also straighten some curves to improve sight distance, improve culverts, repave the roadway and create a 20-foot clear recovery zone for errant drivers to return their vehicle safely to the roadway.

Completion is targeted for December 2023. The schedule is subject to change due to weather, availability of equipment and/or materials or other construction-related issues.

# **CAL FIRE Launches New Online Burn Permit Application**

**CAL FIRE** Special Release

**SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) -** CAL FIRE has launched a new Online Burn Permit application platform that offers the public a user-friendly way to request a burn permit. Burn permits that are available on this platform include the following:

• Residential Burning (LE-62A) is burning outdoors at a single or two-family dwelling unit or residence using burn piles less than 4ft x 4ft. All residential burn permits expire on April 30 annually and a new permit must be applied for on May 1st.

 General Burning (LE-5) consists of agricultural burning, incinerator barrel burning in specific counties, burn piles, small parcels or strips, small plots of grass or weeds, or burn on vacant land. This permit is also used for a Hazardous Project work that could cause a fire (e.g., outdoor welding, grinding, metal work, hot work etc.).

• Broadcast Burning (LE-7/8) is controlled application of fire to the land for fuels reduction purposes (e.g., grasslands, shrublands, and oak woodlands). No pile

The permits are for projects located within the State Responsibility Area and other jurisdictions where CAL FIRE has

authority to require them. Users can now fill out the application form from anywhere they have internet access. The applicant will receive email confirmations throughout the process and the Department will have easy access to the records electronically.

Once the application is submitted, a CAL FIRE representative will review and process the information. If a site visit is required, the Department representative will schedule a time with the applicant and move the project forward. Even with a valid burn permit from CAL FIRE, residents must confirm that it is a permissive burn day with their local air quality management agency. The contact phone numbers will appear on the permit. For information and permits required outside CAL FIRE's jurisdiction, residents should contact their local fire authority.

"Burn permits are an important education tool for us to ensure Californians know the steps to burn safely", said Acting State Fire Marshal Daniel Berlant, "This new online system will make it easier for not only residents, but also our prescribed fire community to get a permit."

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

The Navy An Alien Subculture

I have always been fascinated by the possibility of the existence of alien civilizations in far off galaxies, but I'm sure I won't witness a visit in my lifetime. However, I may have been exposed to an alien civilization right here on earth: the US Navy.

aboard an eighteenth century naval vessel. The officers wore smart uniforms with large epaulettes (puffy things) on their shoulders and bicornes (funny, narrow hats) that were worn with the ends pointing side to side rather than front to back. The sailors wore tight, high water pants ending mid calf, black and white horizontally striped tee shirts, and festering pustules on their hands and faces. The latter was a result of their interaction with another group of seafaring creatures,

Rattus rattus, (the black rat).

Wait a minute! Weren't officers sailors too? Yes, officers were technically sailors. However, the term sailor traditionally referred to swabbies (those individuals who actually sailed the ship). The officers were the ones who paced the decks, hands folded in back, hats on sideways, and spouted those strange "avast" kinds of phrases in high-pitched loud voices

There was another way to tell the difference between the seafaring groups: the living quarters. Sailors slept in hammocks suspended over the mess deck (the shipboard cafeteria). As the centuries passed, uniforms and shipboard living conditions improved to the point at which they were no longer a source of comedy. Although the language changed, it did not necessarily improve. # Inflation Continues to Take Bite Out of Organic Fresh Produce Sales

**MONTEREY, CA (MPG)** - Ongoing inflation continued to impact organic fresh produce sales in the first quarter of 2023 as overall dollar sales grew by slightly less than 1 percent, and volume declined by 3.4 percent from the same per year-over-year period, according to the *Q1 2023 Organic Produce Performance Report* released by Organic Produce Network (OPN) and Category Partners.

Overall, the total produce department gained 2.6 percent in dollars for Q1 2023 compared to the same period in 2022 and declined by 1.3 percent in volume. Sales of organic fresh produce totaled nearly \$2.4 billion for the first quarter of 2023, while overall volume topped 703 million pounds. Conventional produce dollars rose higher than organic dollars by about 2 percent and declined in volume by a smaller degree than organic. The average price gap between conventional and organic is now the largest it has been in the last four years.

The Q1 2023 Organic Produce Performance Report uses Nielsen IQ syndicated data to track and report the performance of organic fresh produce—and specifically the 20 leading organic categories. The report suggests that the rising prices may cause consumers to be more selective in their organic shopping.

"In an inflationary period, we see this standard of growth for dollars and decline for volume repeated for most organic and conventional items. When we look at pricing, conventional produce average price per pound grew by 4.3 percent compared to the first quarter of 2022, while organic produce average price per pound rose by 4 percent," said Tom Barnes, CEO of Category Partners. "With rising prices, we may be seeing more selective organic shopping from consumers as they substitute conventional items for higher-priced organic items."

er-priced organic items."

Organic tomatoes were the most noticeable example of substitution as their price per pound increased by almost three times the amount of conventional, resulting in a volume decline of 8 percent. Most other categories with large differentials in price increase (compared to conventional) did not see large drops in organic volume.

Organic grapes had an incredible quarter with a 37.3 percent increase in volume and a 40.2 percent increase in dollars. The first quarter is deep into the import season for

grapes. Imported organic grapes are closing in on entering the top 20 organic categories in Q1 with \$22 million in sales for the quarter this year, which places them in the 22nd spot by dollars. A 40 percent increase in dollars and a 37 percent increase in volume means that import grapes are a category to keep an eye on as we continue to track organic produce sales each quarter.

Prepackaged salads and the berry category (strawberries, raspberries, blueberries, and blackberries) led the quarter as the top organic produce categories in dollars, accounting for nearly 40 percent of all sales.

Current trends show both conventional and organic produce volume shrinking year over year. At the same time, while volume for conventional produce is below 2020 and organics are on par with 2020, both are consistently gaining in dollars. For the first quarter of 2023, half of the leading 20 organic categories posted increases in dollars. Organic onions generated the largest percent increase in dollars at 10 percent, followed by bell peppers, lettuce, and herbs. Inversely, avocados posted the largest decline in dollars, while apples also posted noticeable declines.

In the first quarter of this year, 15 of the leading 20 categories posted declines in volume, with only seven of those 15 categories displaying positive year-over-year dollar growth. Organic apples posted the largest year-over-year decline in volume (by total pounds) of the leading categories, followed by bananas and carrots.

Despite the flat dollar growth and minor decline in volume across the country, OPN Co-founder and CEO Matt Seeley is bullish on the long-term prospects for growth of organic fresh produce. "Inflation and supply chain challenges have impacted pricing in the short term; however, organic fresh produce will remain an important component of weekly food shopping as consumers look for healthy, safe, and nutritious products for their families," he said.

The Q1 2023 Organic Produce Performance Report covers total food sales in the US, including all outlets (i.e., supermarkets, mass merchandisers, club stores, dollar stores, convenience stores, and military commissaries) over the months of January, February, and March of this year. 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# **High Living Costs Solidify** California's Two-tier Economy

Why California is what it is – a state with an immense economy but equally immense socioeconomic divisions - is the topic of perpetual academic, media and political debates.

There is one factor, both a cause and an effect, that cannot be debated: California is an enormously expensive place in which to live and work. And if anything, the relatively high inflation that has plagued the national economy in recent years has exacerbated the angst that Californians were already feeling as they struggled to make ends meet.

Gov. Gavin Newsom's crusade against gasoline refiners, accusing them of price-gouging, exploits that angst by virtue signaling to his constituents that he's sympathetic to pain in their wallets. However, the state's high fuel prices are just a tiny fragment of the state's high cost of living and its corrosive effects.

How high? Insure.com, a website that analyzes insurance costs, recently updated its comprehensive, state-bystate guide to living costs of all kinds, and revealed that it costs 46.8% more to live in California than the national average – the third highest behind Hawaii's 85.5% and 54% in the

District of Columbia.

Its high cost of living is the single most important reason why California, despite its world class economy, has the nation's highest rate of functional poverty, as measured by the U.S. Census Bureau. Its supplemental poverty index is weighted for the cost of living and California's high costs, especially for housing, drive the state's ranking.

Moreover, when the nearpoor are added, well over a quarter of Californians are suffering from serious economic stress, according to the Public Policy Institute of California.

High living costs, again market. particularly for housing, are also a major factor in California's outflow of population to other states and thus its recent loss of population.

"Since 2015, California has experienced net losses of over 500,000 adults who cite housing as the primary reason, according to the Current Population Survey," PPIC fellows Hans Johnson high housing hurdles not and Eric McGhee noted in a recent report. "About half of those who leave the state buy a house in their new state, whereas only onethird of those moving to California buy a house."

California is several million housing units – the exact number is often debated – short of what it needs to house its people, even despite recent population drops. Despite much ballyhooed efforts at the state level to increase production, the gap between supply and demand remains largely unchanged, thus putting upward pressure on rents and home prices.

According to the World newspapers.

Population Review, California's average rent, \$1,586 a month, is the third highest in the nation, topped only by Hawaii and the District of Columbia, and also third highest behind those two markets in median home price at \$538,500.

High home prices make ownership an impossible dream for millions of California families, thus explaining why the state has the nation's second lowest level of families living in homes that they or their families own, 54.6%. New York is the lowest at 53.6%, thanks to New York City's rental-dominated housing

A new study by Moneywise, a website devoted to consumer finance, reveals that firsttime home buyers in California would have to cough up the nation's second highest average down payment, \$98,904, topped only by Hawaii's \$110,360.

California's extremely only explain why so many residents are fleeing to other states, but why it's so difficult for working-class families to build generational wealth via home ownership. It solidifies the state's two-tier economy white and Asian Californian majorities in its overclass and Black and Latino Californians dominating the underclass.

#### Storms Create Challenges for Small Farmers and Farmers Markets

Storms that battered farms across California took an especially harsh toll on small organic farmers who rely on farmers markets to sell their produce. Across the Sacramento Valley, organic farmers have reported harvest and planting delays, which will be felt for months. The flood impacts come after a challenging winter, in which crop losses and production gaps resulted in slim vegetable selections at farmers markets. Meanwhile, the unusually wet weather may test organic farmers, who are wary of pests and diseases this year.

#### Imperial Valley Farmers Await Federal Actions on Colorado River Supplies

The federal government is considering two options to prevent the Colorado River from running dry. Both plans announced last week would require water users in the river's Lower Basin to dramatically cut their use. The April 11 announcement of the two plans by the U.S. Bureau of Reclamation came after the seven states that draw water from the river failed over several months to form a consensus on how to cut their water use. The outcome could significantly affect farming in California's Imperial Valley.

#### Farmers in Shasta, Scott River Regions Still Face State Water Restrictions

Farmers along the Scott River and Shasta River watersheds in Siskiyou County have faced curtailments of water supplies since 2021. After storms dramatically increased snowpack and reservoir levels this year, a March 23 executive order by the governor temporarily suspended drought curtailment orders for some watersheds. But farmers in the Shasta and Scott watersheds respectively will remain under drought-emergency restrictions until at least April 30 and May 2, state officials say.

#### New California Program Pays Ranchers for Livestock Losses, Impacts from Wolves

A new state program is compensating ranchers for livestock losses due to wolf depredation. California has allocated \$3 million for the pilot program. The first two parts were implemented last year to begin compensating farmers for livestock losses and deterrence. By early April this year, 32 applications had been processed and approved, with a total compensation request of nearly \$440,000. Of the 32 applications, 11 were for direct livestock losses and 21 were for wolf deterrence methods.

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
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# Huskies' Big Inning Pushes Past Lady Pirates in Sweep


"Our community supports us a lot and it's important our girls understand how they carry themselves," Danna said.
