This is an annual award that is given to local law enforcement officers who demonstrate dedication and valor in the line of duty. The award with given in a small private ceremony at

the Sutter County Sheriff's Office. Aguilar grew up locally and is a graduate of Lindhurst High School as well as a Yuba College alumni. Superior Court Seeks Volunteers for Civil Grand Jury

MARYSVILLE, CA (MPG) - Presiding Judge Debra L. Givens announced on February 6, 2023, that the Superior Court of California, County of Yuba is seeking volunteers to serve on the 2023-2024 Civil Grand Jury. The civil grand jury is an investigatory body created for the protection of society and enforcement of the law. Civil grand juries act as guardians for the county and cities of Yuba. The primary responsibilities of the grand jury include examining all aspects of county government ensuring that public monies are being handled judiciously and all accounts are properly audited – in general, guaranteeing honest, efficient government in the best interest of the residents of Yuba County. Each year the grand jury publishes a final report summarizing their findings and providing recommendations for study and action. The grand jury serves for one year from July 1 through June 30 of the following year.

Grand jury service affords citizens the unique opportunity to give back to their community and contribute to the efficiency of local government by developing innovative recommendations for improving government operations. Grand jurors will have a desire to work with one another for the betterment of the government, which in truth, belongs to all of us. Judge Givens noted, "Qualified applicants will be invited to participate in selection events in early May, 2023. During the selection process, a superior court judge will interview groups of applicants and recommend the most qualified to become the pool from which the civil grand jury will be randomly selected. A total of 19 jurors will be sworn, and up to 11 will serve as alternates on June 29, 2023." "The best grand jurors are interested, curious, persistent and passionate about improving the effectiveness of local government. There is no particular background, training, or experience required to serve as a grand juror; all civic minded individuals who share a dedication to democratic ideals are encouraged to apply" stated, Yuba County Superior Court, CEO, Heather Pugh. SMF Launches \$1.3 Billion Expansion Project

SACRAMENTO COUNTY, CA (MPG) - The Sacramento County Department of Airports, which operates Sacramento International Airport (SMF), announced on February 1, SMForward, a \$1.3 billion expansion project that will reshape the Airport to accommodate projected passenger growth over the next seven years. SMForward is embarking on a transformative journey, with the launch of six ambitious projects in 2024, including the construction of a stunning \$140 million pedestrian walkway. This state-of-the-art walkway will seamlessly connect Terminal B to Concourse B, empowering passengers with the flexibility to

choose between a leisurely walk to their gate or utilizing the Airport's efficient train system. Additional SMForward projects include expansions to both Terminal A and Concourse B, which will add gates and new amenities; a new Terminal B parking garage; and a consolidated ground transportation center that will centralize taxi, rideshare, and off-site shuttle providers into a single area that is walkable from both terminals. SMForward is expected to conclude in late 2027 with the completion of a new \$400 million consolidated rental car facility, allowing passengers access to the Airport's rental car providers without the need to ride a shuttle bus. SMForward is a major milestone for Sacramento,

representing the largest construction program in the airport's history. This ambitious project is not just an expansion, but a complete transformation of the airport experience for the people of Sacramento and its visitors. The project will bring about significant improvements and upgrades that will enhance the convenience, comfort, and accessibility of the airport for all. "The airport experience is the first impression many people see when they arrive in Northern California – and the last as they leave," said Cindy Nichol, Director of Sacramento County Department of Airports. "SMForward will change the airport's skyline, but it also sets the stage for the airport's growth and our region's as a whole."

SMForward creates jobs and economic opportunities for local businesses and serves as a catalyst for further development in the region. The project will help Sacramento to be more competitive as a destination, attract more visitors and businesses, and ultimately contribute to the growth of the region. SMForward is a visionary project that will be financed through a combination of federal and state grants, municipal bonds issued by the airport, and user fees. This means that the burden of financing will not fall on the local taxpayers. "Over the next five years, this transformation will create world-class facilities that will enhance our customer's travel experience while improving

crucial infrastructure to meet our growth,” said Nichol. “Our airfield has plenty of capacity, but our parking, concourses, and roadways have several choke points. SMForward will address these issues and create an airport ready to serve the modern passenger.”

SMForward comes as air travel demand in the Greater Sacramento region continues to exceed peer airports in the region after unprecedented impacts from the COVID-19 pandemic. In 2022, SMF nearly returned to pre-pandemic levels with six consecutive years of year-over-year record-breaking passenger growth through 2019. Forecasts show steady passenger growth averaging 4.3 percent annually through 2041, underscoring the need for expansion.

“With record numbers of people traveling through SMF and the region’s growing economy that continues to create new opportunities, Sacramento International Airport is at a crucial intersection,” said Sacramento County Supervisor Phil Serna, “It is critical to invest in our aviation infrastructure to ensure we can meet the needs of residents and travelers who will make the region an even better place to live, work and visit.”

“SMForward represents the continued implementation of SMF’s master plan, which the Sacramento County Board of Supervisors approved in February 2022. The plan evaluated past and projected passenger growth along with infrastructure needs as a basis for developing a plan to

accommodate that growth,” said TJ Chen, Deputy Director of Airport Planning and Development. “In addition to roadways and gates, the master plan anticipates the additional facilities and airfield infrastructure needed to meet the growing demand for air travel.”

“A lot of hard work and planning has gone into ensuring the success of SMForward,” Nichol said. “I want to thank the SMF team and Sacramento County leadership for their dedication and support in helping shape this project.”

Reward for Information Leading to an Arrest for the Murder of Tyler Dickson

BUTTE COUNTY, CA (MPG) - On July 3, 2021, Butte County Sheriff’s Office (BCSO) deputies were dispatched to the Bidwell Canyon Campground, which is owned and operated by California State Parks, to assist with a homicide investigation. During the initial response, State Parks Peace Officers requested BCSO assume jurisdiction over the investigation.

Detectives responded and determined that 20-year-old Tyler Dickson, of San Pablo, was fatally shot while sleeping inside a tent. Detectives initiated a homicide investigation. Over the past 18 months, detectives have actively and zealously investigated this case, however it has remained unsolved.

In 2021, BCSO requested Governor Gavin Newsom’s Office issue a reward

through the Governor’s Reward Program to encourage those with pertinent information to come forward. After reviewing the circumstances of the case, Governor Newsom’s Office issued a \$50,000 reward for information leading to an arrest and conviction for the murder of Tyler Dickson.

The Sheriff’s Office is committed to solving this case. We very much want to bring closure to Tyler’s family and friends and see to it that the person(s) responsible for Tyler’s murder are held accountable. Our hearts go out to Tyler’s family and we are hopeful that this reward will renew public interest in the case and ultimately result in justice for Tyler.

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Unprecedented Levels of High Severity Fire Burn in Sierra Nevada Forests

High-severity wildfire is increasing in Sierra Nevada and Southern Cascade forests and has been burning at unprecedented rates compared to the years before Euro-American settlement, according to a study from the Safford Lab at the University of California, Davis, and its collaborators. Those rates have especially shot up over the past decade.

For the study, published in the journal *Ecosphere*, scientists analyzed fire severity data from the U.S. Forest Service and Google Earth Engine, across seven major forest types.

They found that in low- and middle-elevation forest types, the average annual area that burned at low-to-moderate severity has decreased from more than 90% before 1850 to 60-70% today.

At the same time, the area burned annually at high severity has nearly quintupled, rising from less than 10% to 43% today. (High-severity burns are those where more than 95% of aboveground tree biomass is killed by fire.)

Lead author and UC Davis project scientist John N. Williams said this ratio is severely out of balance.

“We’re seeing more ‘bad fire’ and less ‘good fire,’” said Williams, who is the coordinator of the California Prescribed Fire Monitoring Program. “Any consolation we’d get from the idea that, ‘At least we’re burning more than we used to,’ isn’t really a consolation because it’s often coming in the form of the wrong kind of fire.”

Good Fire, Bad Fire

Many fire ecologists talk about the need to burn more acreage by putting “good fire” on the ground, such as through prescribed burning, while preventing “bad fire.” In forests like oak woodland, yellow pine and mixed conifer, good fire refers to the low-to-moderate severity burning that the dominant species are adapted to. They are typically ignited by lightning or by people to enrich and restore the land. Many such fires were set by Native Americans before the mid-19th century through the practice of cultural burning.

Before 1850, much more land burned each year in California compared to the present day. The study indicates that gap is beginning to close. Unfortunately, more of what is burning comprises damaging, high-severity fire.

That represents the most concerning result, say the authors: The average area of high-severity burning in the region is now

above the best estimates of high-severity burning that took place before Euro-American settlement, even though overall burning in the modern day is still much lower.

“At current or even projected rates of forest management by federal and state agencies, the amount of forest treated or restored is going to be a drop in the bucket compared to the need and compared to the huge unmanaged areas that are going to burn, often at high severity,” said senior author Hugh Safford, a UC Davis fire ecologist and chief scientist of environmental public benefits corporation Vibrant Planet. “I’m not exaggerating when I say that the very existence of montane conifer forest in California is at risk, especially in the southern part of the state.”

A Severe Decade

Nine of California’s 10 biggest wildfires occurred within the past decade. The state’s record-breaking 2020 fire year — when nearly 9,900 fires burned 4.3 million acres — was the only year in which the annual area burned exceeded historical levels, but much of that burned at high severity.

The authors say this trend is especially concerning because most of the low- to middle-elevation forest types affected are adapted to low-to-moderate severity burning. Excessively severe fires in these forests can harm landscapes and the habitat and ecosystem services they provide.

Other research carried out by the Safford Lab at UC Davis and its partners has shown that negative effects of severe burning in these forest types are serious and long-lasting to biodiversity, carbon storage, soil biogeochemistry, air quality and forest regeneration.

Getting the Right Mix

The study’s results highlight the need to better balance fire exclusion with management practices that proactively reduce forest fuels and increase resilience to climate change and other ecological disturbances.

“We need to burn much more each year, but we want the right mix,” Williams said. “The current trend is going in the wrong direction if we want to restore forests and their natural ecological processes.”

The study’s additional co-authors include Nic Enstice of the California Department of Conservation, Zack Steel of the USDA Forest Service Rocky Mountain Research Station, and Alison Paulson of USDA Forest Service Humboldt-Toiyabe National Forest. ★

Hospitals Finally Face the Music

Two Georgia hospitals were recently fined \$1.1 million for failing to publish their prices. The facilities had also ignored letters from the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services asking them to publicly disclose what they charge for procedures.

It’s about time. The federal government directed hospitals to publish clear, consumer-friendly charge lists by the beginning of 2021. Six months later, just 6% of hospitals nationwide had complied, according to a study published in June in the medical journal *JAMA*.

Hospitals shouldn’t be able to get away with flouting the law. Price transparency empowers patients and payers to shop around for medical care — and ultimately allows them to leverage the power of competition to extract the best value for their dollar.

The Trump administration issued the price transparency rule in 2019. It required hospitals to publish standard prices for 300

of their most common services, including rates for insurers and those for individuals paying cash. The rule set daily fines for non-compliant institutions, which the Biden administration increased in November 2021.

Since the rule took effect, hospitals have been cautioned plenty. CMS has issued more than 350 warning letters requesting compliance.

Yet transparency has lagged. The biggest medical centers have been among the worst offenders. Just 0.5% of facilities owned by the country’s three largest hospital systems were fully compliant as of early 2022, according to a report from Patient Rights Advocate.

Hospitals may be leery of revealing their prices because the results can be embarrassing. In one case, an Illinois patient received a \$15,000 hospital bill for an EpiPen. He later learned he could have purchased the same device from a pharmacy for \$320.

Or, take the recent experience of a couple in Fresno, Calif. According to reporting from NPR, the husband underwent cataract surgery with an in-network provider that cost over \$4,000. His wife, who has the same coverage, received the same exact procedure at a neighboring clinic — and only owed \$204. The two facilities were just a half mile from one another.

High-cost

providers wouldn’t be able to get away with those wide spreads in price if patients and payers knew about them. That’s why a 2021 RAND Corporation study projected that improving price transparency could reduce U.S. healthcare spending by up to \$26.6 billion a year.

Of course, some hospitals may be justified in charging more than others. Factors like quality, convenience, and reputation of doctors and hospitals always influence price. But patients and payers should be able to evaluate those factors on their own. Hiding prices deprives them of key pieces of information that help them make prudent decisions.

Opaque prices also undermine competition — and thus help healthcare providers avoid improving quality or reducing costs in order to attract customers at the margin.

The feds did the right thing by fining hospitals that aren’t following the rules. But more needs to be done to make hospitals around the country do what businesses in every other sector do every day — tell potential customers what they can expect to pay.

Newsom Shuns Blame for California’s Unseemly Issues

Gov. Gavin Newsom’s obvious efforts to raise his national profile have taken two forms – touting California as a societal model and criticizing red states such as Florida and Texas for their supposed shortcomings. Increasingly, Newsom employs a third tactic – shifting blame for California’s less seemly aspects. That tendency is particularly evident in something that Californians rate as one of their top concerns – its worst-in-the-nation incidence of homelessness, manifested in thousands of squalid encampments in the state’s cities. While running for governor in 2018, Newsom promised to appoint a cabinet-level official to concentrate on homelessness but later, when reporters pressed him, responded, “You want to know who’s the homeless czar?” Newsom. “I’m the homeless czar in the state of California.” Despite that self-appointed role, as homelessness continued to grow, officially approaching 200,000 people but probably much higher, Newsom began shunning responsibility. Last year, he blamed local officials for a lack of effective action, at one point suspending state funds. He later restored the money but continued to castigate them. “If we can’t clean up the

encampments and address what’s happening chronically on our streets, I’m going to be hard-pressed to make a case to the Legislature to provide them one dollar more,” Newsom said as he introduced a new state budget in January. Another example of Newsom’s fingerpointing occurred last week as a congressional committee dominated by Republicans delved into why states – particularly California – handed out billions of dollars in unemployment insurance benefits to fraudsters. The state auditor had issued a report citing the Employment Development Department’s “poor planning and ineffective management” for shortcomings in handling unemployment insurance claims. But the current EDD director, Nancy Farias, sent the committee a four-page letter blaming Donald Trump’s administration for as much as \$30 billion in fraudulent payments. “Unfortunately, the Trump Administration expressed no interest in establishing (a) coordinated national response when these (emergency pandemic unemployment) programs were initiated in 2020, leaving states to fend for themselves against a clear pattern of sophisticated, international criminal syndicates at work,” Farias’ letter, which no doubt was approved by the governor’s office, said. A third example of blame-shifting also popped up last week when Fresno County District Attorney Lisa Smittcamp cited Newsom’s support for lenient prison policies that allowed the alleged killer of Selma policeman Gonzalo Carrasco to be released after serving just six months of a 64-month sentence for a previous crime.

“Today, Governor Gavin Newsom, and every legislator in the state of California who supports this over-reaching phenomenon they try to disguise as legitimate criminal justice reform, has the blood of this officer on their hands,” Smittcamp said. “The governor and his political allies who continue the quest to close state prisons are increasing the incidents of violence to everyone who lives in, or visits, the state of California,” Smittcamp continued. “No city or county is safe from the wrath of this misguided thinking, and this mismanaged prison system.” Newsom quickly fired back, referring to the plea bargain that Smittcamp’s office accepted: “She should blame herself. I’ve been listening to this for years from her. She has the prosecutorial discretion. Ask her what she did in terms of prosecuting that case.” Smittcamp persisted, saying, “Governor Newsom continues to demonstrate his ignorance and lack of understanding of how the criminal justice system works. His arrogant and defensive response is proof positive that he is attempting to deflect responsibility for his failed policies.” It is outrageous that the alleged killer, a self-proclaimed gang member with an extensive criminal record, was released after just six months. And it does exemplify the uber-lenient penal policies California has adopted in recent years, begun by former Gov. Shooting Down Inflation

The U.S. military shot down the now infamous high altitude Chinese spy balloon which Beijing claimed was simply a weather balloon gone awry. After initially delaying the action because the balloon was over land, President Biden congratulated the aviators that accomplished the task off the Eastern Seaboard. I can’t imagine that there is much challenge in shooting down a floating balloon with the supersonic AIM-9X Sidewinder missile fired from the world’s most advanced fighter jet but I’m sure the pilot had fun. I couldn’t help but think how somehow this reminded me of the Federal Reserve chief Jerome Powell taking down the American consumer and the economy to accomplish his mission of bringing down inflation. On the subject of inflation and spy balloons, one is too high and the other one used to be. Both situations are untenable, although the solution to the balloon was to quickly bring it down to zero altitude. With inflation, the desired level is not zero, but definitely lower than it is. Fed Chief Powell can’t use a guided missile to shoot down our current inflation problem, but I bet he wish he could. Instead of Sidewinder missiles, the Fed’s weapons are interest rate hikes, Quantitative Tightening (QT) and various Federal Open Market Committee (FOMC) operations. Without getting too far into the weeds, just know that all three tools at the Fed’s disposal is to remove money from the American economic system, destroy the consumers ability to buy so many gewgaws and make borrowing more expensive, all to reduce demand which will bring down inflation. Unlike the Sidewinder however, the Fed’s inflation weapons are not nearly as accurate and are highly unpredictable as to their effectiveness until way later after they’re used. What this mean is it’s like firing a Sidewinder and not being told if you hit the mark until after you’ve landed and turned off the airplane. Yea, the Fed’s tools are kind of like that. The combination of interest rates, QT and the FOMC operations are called Monetary Policy. Put simply, monetary equals “money”, so monetary policy basically means messing with the money in our economy. By “messing” with the money in the system, it means either putting more money INTO the economy, or withdrawing money FROM the economy. The Fed uses the three tools mentioned above to accomplish this task. When the Feds put more money into

the economy, there’s more cash sloshing around in everybody’s hands and they subsequently buy more stuff, driving up prices. Lower interest rates also makes borrowing money less expensive which drives demand even higher. When the Feds take money out of the system, the exact opposite happens. Demand falls so prices drop but so do wages, home prices and stocks. People in essence get poorer and some go broke. Unfortunately, some others are even worse off and go hungry. In essence, when the military uses its missiles, the spy balloon is destroyed. When the Feds use their weapons, the consumer gets crushed. Making matters worse, the Fed, nor anyone else for that matter, knows exactly how many consumers it will crush in the process until way later. Like 6-18 months later. Unfortunately, because of the complexity of the system, monetary policy is a very broad and inaccurate sword. And in an economy the size of ours, its use is a highly unpredictable maneuver. Simply put, it is impossible to know how much is too much, and how long is too long in its implementation. The recent downing of the spy balloon was done over water to mitigate the chance of damage to life, limb or property, and thankfully, no such damage occurred. Unfortunately however, many argue, including this analyst, it is not so when the Fed has used its monetary weapons in the past. Since monetary policy takes up to 6-18 months to reveal its final effect on the economy, it is impossible to know exactly when enough becomes too much. The result then becomes on the way up, an overheating economy and massive inflation. Sound familiar? On the way down, which is the way they are going now, it can mean a crushing recession as the Fed overshoots in the other direction. Walnut Growers are Hard Hit by Crop Damage, Plummeting Prices California walnut farmers are tearing out older trees and less desirable varieties as walnut prices have plummeted well below costs of production. The California Walnut Commission estimates that the 2022 crop suffered \$1 billion in damages after a devastating heat wave in September cooked walnuts on trees in a critical time in the growing cycle. Later, ill-timed rains led to mold problems. As much as 30% to 40% of the walnut volume was impacted—resulting in disaster declarations for growers in several counties.

State Upgrades Water Delivery Expectations after January Storm Deluge California’s January storms may be paying their first dividends for farmers. The California Department of Water Resources announced that the State Water Project may deliver 30% of requested supplies this year. That allocation is up from an initial projection of 5% in December. The final water allocation for 2022 was 5%, plus limited supplies for unmet human and safety needs. A 30% allotment would allow the state to deliver 1.27 million acre-feet of water to 29 public water agencies.

Surging Natural Gas Costs Causing Greenhouse Operations to Hike Prices Skyrocketing natural gas prices are created challenges for California nursery operations, which use the fuel to heat greenhouses. Some are facing utility bills as much as five times higher than in previous years. As a result, nursery operators say they must raise prices to customers, including farmers who buy transplants and seedlings for planting. Some nursery businesses are adding fuel surcharges to their plants. The West Coast, which relies on natural gas imports, has seen reduced deliveries from Canada and the Rocky Mountains.

Wine Sector Seeks to Connect with Younger Consumers Amid Declining Demand California winegrape growers and wine professionals say they have been facing sliding demand for wine over the past two years. At the recent 2023 United Wine & Grape Symposium in Sacramento, speakers said the wine sector needs to win over younger consumers and market to a more diverse customer base. Wine sales saw roughly two decades of sustained growth before the recent decline in demand. It has been attributed to a broad shift away from alcohol in general. Last year, people over 60 were the only demographic with higher wine consumption. ★

MARYSVILLE, CA (MPG) - The Marysville girls' basketball team dropped their second Pioneer Valley League loss on Wednesday, February 1 in a 52-37 defeat to the Colfax Falcons.

The Marysville loss inched Colfax one game closer to clinch the PVL title, but it also decided who will more than likely end up as the number one seed in the 2023 Sac-Joaquin Division IV CIF playoffs.

The Lady Indians came out of the opening tip strong and were able to get deep inside the paint with the one-two punch of the Briggs' sisters Karisma and Krystal.

Senior forward Karisma was able to get inside to the rim on a few possessions in the first quarter, but on the defensive end she got into foul trouble as she picked up her first two within the first five minutes of the game.

Karisma told the Dispatch they saw Colfax was playing in a man-to-man defense so they changed their offensive approach to a four-out offense, which helped open up the middle of the floor and allowed the Marysville guards to be able to drive.

"We worked on this four-out in between the first and second matchup," Karisma said.

Lady Indians head coach Ike Prince expressed to the Dispatch that they were able to move the ball and get through the defensive trap the Falcons attempted in the first half.

Marysville (20-4, 8-2 PVL) trailed 9-6 at the end of the first quarter.

The Lady Indians were effective with getting to the free-throw line in the second quarter as they attempted eight total charity shots in the quarter. Marysville went into the

half with a one-point lead at the break.

Karisma led the Lady Indians in the first half with eight points.

In the second half, Marysville had trouble holding onto the ball as they had 13 total turnovers in the second half.

Prince exclaimed to the Dispatch the Lady Indians weren't able to get

through the continuous defensive press from Colfax that led to a lot of the turnovers in the second half.

The duo of sisters were huge on the rebounding department for Marysville as they each had 12 in the game. Krystal is the Lady Indians leading rebounder averaging 11.4 per game and was ranked the 74th best rebounder in California, according to the latest MaxPreps rankings on January 25.

Karisma ended the night with a team-high 14 points, four assists, five steals and four blocks. Her 3.9 blocks per game average ranked 20th in the Jan. 25th MaxPreps rankings.

Krystal contributed 12 points, two assists and three steals in the loss.

The Lady Indians were called for a lot of fouls in the third quarter as they committed seven fouls to allow Colfax to be in the single bonus situation in the final minute of the third quarter, which allowed the Falcons at least one free foul shot every time Marysville committed a foul.

Karisma received her fourth foul with just over three and a half minutes left in the third quarter. Colfax led 35-27 after the end of the third and eventually stretched a strong lead in the fourth to control the rest of the game.

Prince expressed to the Dispatch that with the foul trouble, it took away the capability of Karisma being able to be aggressive on the offensive end, being a low-post threat. ★

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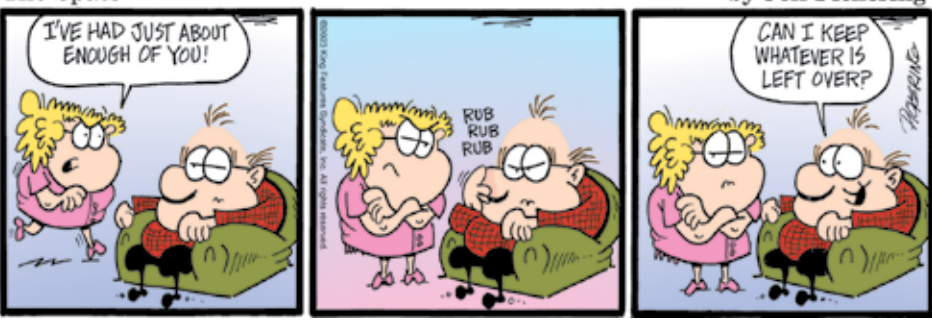

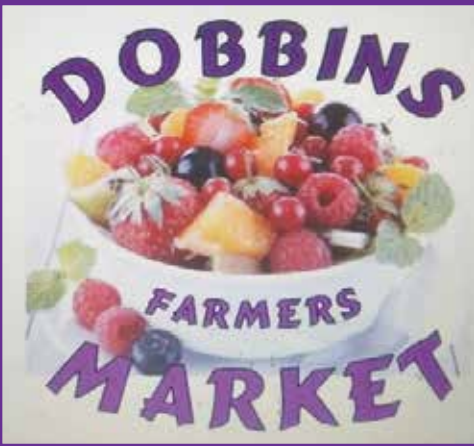

More than a thousand military men and women and family members have donated thousands of personal items and stories to the Museum of the Forgotten Warriors over the past forty years. The displays span World War I to the conflicts in Iraq and Afghanistan and tell the stories of those who fought and died. The series, *Stories of the Museum*, describes a few of these in more detail.



LIEUTENANT COLONEL LARRY JAMES CHESLEY

The mission was a “milk run” about thirty miles north of the Demilitarized Zone (DMZ) in Vietnam. Air Force Captain Larry Chesley and his copilot were flying a McDonnell Douglas F-4C Phantom jet fighter on 16 April 1966 when the aircraft was hit, and the men were forced to bail out. Chesley landed in a rural area with five cracked vertebrae and was captured by a group of Vietnamese who took all his clothes except for his underwear, socks, and boots. He was taken to a village that night where he was handcuffed, blindfolded, and put in a hole. Twenty-one days later,

he was in Hanoi where he was introduced to another “hole” called Hoa Lo Prison, infamously known as “Hanoi Hilton.” Captain Chesley was born on 27 September 1938 in Burley, Idaho. He enlisted in the Air Force after high school graduation in May 1956, spent two years at Shiroy Air Force Base, Japan, and then Frankfort, Germany, until his discharge in June 1960. He entered Weber College in Ogden, Utah, graduated in 1963, and promptly rejoined the Air Force. He was assigned to the Air Force’s Officer Training School at Lackland Air

Force Base, Bexar County, Texas. He successfully completed the nine and one-half month rigorous program and graduated as a second lieutenant. Webb Air Force Base, Big Spring, Texas, was the next duty station where he completed undergraduate pilot training, then on to Davis-Monthan Air Force Base, Tucson, Arizona, for combat crew training. After the 1966 downing of his Phantom, Chesley endured seven years of captivity. Most of that time, he was kept either in isolation or in a two-man cell that measured nine by three and one-half feet. Interrogations and beatings were frequent. He suffered from Beri-Beri, which attacked the nerves in his hands and his feet with excruciating pain. The interrogations intensified when the captors wanted statements written by Chesley and other POWs. “After continuous torture,” Chesley said, “the will finally eroded to the point where it no longer functioned. I wrote what my tormentors told me to write.” During Chesley’s seven-year captivity, he said he learned what it was like to be stripped of everything, every possession, and to be left with only himself. It was a sobering experience and one which he regards as very valuable. “There, we had nothing. We learned to value what we were.”

Larry Chesley was finally released on 12 February 1973 as part of Op-

eration Homecoming following the Paris Peace Accords that ended the US involvement in the Vietnam War. He weighed just ninety-five pounds. He retired as an Air Force Lieutenant Colonel in 1982 after twenty-two years of service.
