Donating Big to Wheatland FFA

WHEATLAND, CA (MPG) - During a special scholarship promotion event on campus on January 23, 2023, members of the Yuba River Endowment board surprised the Wheatland High School FFA advisors and superintendent with a \$40,000 donation. Half the funds will be dedicated to cover out-of-pocket expenses for FFA students to attend Field Day and State competitions for the current school year, and the other half to help with program expenses.

The Yuba River Endowment is a non-profit organization created by Yuba County farmers to benefit Yuba County residents. The funds for Wheatland FFA will go towards farm supplies, jackets and travel costs for their 320 FFA students to participate in their upcoming field trips and State competition. Over the past two month the Endowment also presented Lindhurst High School FFA, Marysville High School FFA and

Bear River Middle School FFA with donations.

"FFA at Wheatland High School is a vital part of our ag program, but we are not able to cover out-of-pocket expenses for students to attend competitions," said Wheatland High School FFA Advisor, Melissa Taylor. "The Yuba River Endowment funding will allow all of our students who qualify for FFA events to attend those events, and also allow us to complete much needed infrastructure projects at our school farm."

The Yuba River Endowment is comprised of farmers who have a right to water that flows on the Yuba River. In some years these farmers are able to both farm their own land and transfer a portion of their water to drought-stricken areas of the state. A portion of the proceeds from these water transfers goes to the Endowment. Since formation in late 2019, the Endowment has donated almost \$500,000 to support Yuba County ag education, provide food

resources, veteran's support, and much more.

"Our motto for the Endowment is 'Local Farmers Giving Back'," said local farmer and Yuba River Endowment President, Al Lassaga. "Our board is made up of representatives from eight different Yuba County regions, from Browns Valley to Wheatland. Investing our money back into our community, and specifically into agricultural education and our future farmers, just makes sense. We want to make sure agriculture stays strong in Yuba County for generations to come."

Honoring Purple Hearts

MARYSVILLE, CA (MPG) - A Purple Heart Trail ceremony was held at Marysville Veterans of Foreign Wars, Post 948, Monday, January 23, 2023. This ceremony was the culmination of a five-year effort by VFW Senior Vice Commander Brock Bowen to add Marysville to the Purple Heart Trail. Five Purple Heart Trail signs have been erected along State Highways 20 and 70. The Purple Heart Trail is a symbolic and honorary system of roads, highways, bridges, and other monuments throughout the United States that give tribute to the military men and women who have been awarded the Purple Heart decoration.

Mr. Bowen began the ceremony by welcoming everyone with thanks to all veterans and a special

thanks to Purple Heart recipients. Colors were posted by Purple Heart recipient Greg Columio; the Pledge of Allegiance was led by Army veteran and Purple Heart recipient Don Cornett; and Post 948

Continued from page 1 with VFW member Don Schrader welcoming the first speaker, Mike O'Connor. Army Chief Warrant Officer O'Connor flew the UH-1 helicopter, known as the Huey, during the Vietnam War. He was shot down during the Battle of Hue and spent a little over five years as a prisoner of war. He spoke passionately about the importance of the Purple Heart medal. He thanked those Purple Heart recipients present for their service and sacrifice. He asked that we not forget those mothers, fathers, wives, and other family members affected.

Yuba County District Attorney Clint Curry reviewed the history of the Purple Heart medal. George Washington established the Badge of Military Merit in 1782. Only three soldiers were given the medal. Mr. Curry noted that the three recipients were sergeants, not senior officers. He said this was an indication of the type of people we are. General Douglas MacArthur, who was Department War Chief of Staff at the time, reintroduced the medal as the Purple Heart on February 22, 1932, the 200th anniversary of the birth of George Washington. It is awarded in the name of the President to those wounded or killed while serving in the US

military.


After Mr. Curry

finished, Post 948's three-man rifle team exited the building to the small area in the back. With everyone standing, and military personnel saluting, three volleys were fired, and Taps was bugled.

The ceremony's keynote speaker was State Assemblyman James Gallagher who spoke about the Purple Heart Trail and its importance in recognizing the Purple Heart medal and those who are recipients. He also acknowledged the long process Mr. Bowen endured in his tenacious push for Marysville to be recognized as a part of this nationwide symbolic and honorary trail.

At the close of the keynote speech, all Purple Heart recipients were asked to stand to receive a Purple Heart challenge coin. Then Chaplain Bartlett led everyone in a closing prayer.

There was a general social gathering after the ceremony with coffee and donuts before the participants and attendees left the VFW building and reconvened at the Highway 70 site of one of Marysville's five Purple Heart Trail signs. Assemblyman Gallagher provided a short dedication, as the sign was unveiled by Purple Heart recipients Mike O'Conner and Mike Salla. Yuba City's American Legion Post 705 five-man rifle team fired three volleys in salute, and Taps was bugled marking the end of the ceremony.



YUBA-SUTTER REGION, CA (MPG) - Herger Gas, a family-owned propane service based out of Rio Oso in Sutter County, announced on Friday, Jan 28, 2023, on social media that it is expanding its commercial and agriculture service to Colusa and Glenn Counties. The company has serviced homes, businesses, and farms in the Yuba Sutter area since 1935.

"It's an exciting time for the propane business, especially for small companies like ours that are positioned well to bring great reliable service to farmers and midrange fuel consumers," said Owner and Operator Dean Herger. "With the increase in propane use for clean and efficient irrigation power, there's lots of opportunity for growth."

The announcement coincides with Herger joining three organizations to jumpstart the company's footprint in the area ahead of the Colusa Farm Show, joining the Colusa County Chamber of Commerce, the Colusa County Farm Bureau, and the Glenn County Farm

"With all the consolidation that's happened in our industry lately, there's a real hunger for local and family-owned services like ours," said Devon Nishimura, Herger Gas Sales Manager. "Especially with family farmers who are using propane for a lot more than just their stove and water heaters these days."

The announcement comes on the heels of key mergers and acquisitions in the area. Long-time North Valley servicers All Service Propane and Reliance Propane were purchased in the last three years by national servicer Thompson Gas. Midrange propane services also saw consolidations like Stockton-based Campora was purchased by Chicago-based Energy Distribution Partners and Central Valley-based Kamp's Propane was purchased by Canadian firm Superior Plus.

"We are proud to be a family-owned company and look forward to working with farmers and processors in this new territory as we earn their business," said Herger, who is the third generation of Hergers to lead the company. "When my grandfather started bringing truckloads of propane one at a time from Fresno to our family farm in Rio Oso, I doubt he could have imagined us servicing five counties, let alone seven with Colusa and Glenn coming on board."

A date for the ribbon cutting with the Colusa County Chamber of Commerce is to be determined, and the company plans to announce online when it is scheduled. Add Another to List of California's Botched Projects

Gov. Gavin Newsom often boasts that California is a "nation state" that is or should be – a model for the nation.

However, when it comes to implementing large-scale projects and programs, California is more a model of bumbling incompetence.

The list of failures to deliver what was promised on time and on budget is endless, but here are a few obvious examples:

—A bullet train was supposed to be whisking passengers up and down the state by now, but the state is still building an initial stretch in the San Joaquin Valley that is probably a decade away from working, if ever, while cost estimates have nearly tripled.

-The reconstruction of one-third of the earthquake-damaged Francisco-Oakland Bay Bridge took a quarter-century to complete and cost 25 times as much as the original estimate.

-The Oroville Dam on the Feather River nearly collapsed in 2017 when sections of its main spillway gave way and an emergency spillway eroded the base of the dam. In seeking re-licensing of the dam 12 years earlier, state officials dismissed concerns about the emergency spillway's

integrity. Later it also was actuarially unsound, determined that the main CalPERS began sharply spillway had been poorly engineered.

-When the COVID-19 pandemic erased the jobs of two-plus million California workers, the Employment Development Department suffered an operational meltdown in handling legitimate claims for unemployment insurance, but gave as much to begin. as \$30 billion in cash to fraudulent claimants.

-Although California is the global center of information technology, the state has run up an almost perfect record of botched projects to use it, with long delays in implementation and immense cost overruns.

Again, this is only a partial list. A book could be written about how state and local governments have spent untold billions of dollars on homelessness without making any visible headway. Another could be written about how California reduced its prison population by dumping more felons into overcrowded county jails and/or releasing them to prey upon the public.

One massive failure that developed largely under the media radar deserves a place on the list - a completely bollixed program to provide long-term care insurance to California's public employees and retirees.

In 1995, the California Public Employees Retirement System received legislative approval to provide such insurance. Thousands of public workers signed up on promises a journalist for nearly that premiums would remain affordable.

However, when the program proved to be newspapers.

increasing premiums, finally leading to a class action lawsuit alleging that promises were broken.

"These people were completely, completely misled," Michael Bidart, an attorney representing the plaintiffs, told the Sacramento Bee in 2019, just before a trial was

"We raised rates to sustain the plan and we believe they were properly increased in accordance with our contract," CalPERS General Counsel Matt Jacobs told the Bee, the only media outlet that has followed the case.

Negotiations led to a tentative settlement of \$2.7 billion in payments to the plaintiffs. However, last spring CalPERS pulled out because too many individual plaintiffs rejected the deal and a new trial is scheduled later this year.

Clearly, CalPERS didn't know what it was doing. Were it a private insurer, the Department of Insurance would have probably cracked down, but CalPERS is exempt from such oversight.

Many managerial debacles have been ignored by the Legislature and the longterm care insurance is one of them. But the affected workers and retirees are now pressing the Legislature to order an investigation by the state auditor and it's sorely needed to get the bottom of a multi-billion dollar mess.

The Dance of the National Debt Limit

On occasion here on Money Matters, I include the statement that I have covered a certain topic before and that the article may be one in long line of articles that I may have penned in the past.

Once again, I can comfortably say I have covered today's topic many times before and will likely cover it again sometime in the future.

Today's topic?

The Federal Debt limit, and yes, we have reached it again.

Put simply, the debt limit is the total amount of money that the United States government is authorized to borrow to meet its existing legal obligations and subsequently pay its bills.

Once the legal limit is reached, one could say the government can't spend anymore, but we all know that ain't gonna happen. Unlike my house and probably yours too however, the government's house doesn't run out of money and therefore run into trouble.

The government instead wrings its proverbial hands, begins the party infighting and blame game, then the two sides of the aisle start the ever so familiar dance we've seen so many times before. Like 100 times before since the mid 1940's.

Don't you wish you could do that? Keep in mind, this whole fiasco is not a spending limit. It's a borrowing limit in order for the government to keep spending. Take note, there is no spending limit.

Should the debt limit not be raised, as we have been told (some say threatened) so many times before, the government could be forced to default on its debt obligations. Such an event, if it were to occur. would roil financial markets and cause chaos around the globe.

But don't start unlocking the apocalypse bunker just yet. I would say the chance of that happening is when the proverbial pigs starting flying.

Although the Dems and Republicans threaten each other, and us in the process, that one side or the other has to give way and give up, it's more a like a grand game of chicken that both sides know neither side wants to actually reach a checkmate conclusion.

God Bless Uncle Sam right?

I could go on but you get the picture. It's made out to be a serious issue, but the way they have always handled it in the past turns it into a reoccurring bunch of hooey. Which is to say don't worry about

Salinas Valley Farmers Recovering from Flooding, Assessing Toll

Farmers in the Salinas Valley are still calculating crop damages from a series of atmospheric storms that caused the Salinas River to overflow its banks, flooding 20,000 acres of agricultural land. The Monterey County Farm Bureau estimated that farmers suffered \$40 million to \$50 million in losses. Total damages were difficult to access with storm waters slow to recede. While much of the flooded acreage was dormant, thousands of acres contained newly planted vegetables and strawberries. Farmers say there may be production shortages in April and May.

Processing Tomato Growers Expecting Improved Contract Prices Amid Rising Costs

Canneries are expected to offer processing tomato growers higher contract prices this year to encourage increased plantings. However, the two sides have yet to agree on a final price. That could impact planting decisions as farmers weigh crop options and water budgets. Merced County farmer Aaron Barcellos, first vice chairman of the California Tomato Growers Association, said he is hoping contract prices compensate for soaring production costs that have made processing tomatoes less profitable to grow.

After Deluge, Hopes Rise for Agricultural Water Supply

While many farmers suffered crop losses, the deluge of storms has stirred hopes for a better water-supply year for agriculture after three years of severe drought and water delivery cuts. In the Sacramento Valley, David Guy, president of the Northern California Water Association, says growers are feeling encouraged with snow piled high in the Sierra Nevada and long-depleted reservoirs recovering. Agricultural income plummeted in the Sacramento Valley last year as vast acreage of rice fields was fallowed due to a lack of water.

The American Farm Bureau



Federation and other agricultural and business groups are suing federal agencies over the new "waters of the United States" rule. The lawsuit argues that the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency and Army Corps of Engineers overreached in finalizing the rule in December. Plaintiffs say the new rule could subject farmers to onerous requirements under the Clean Water Act. AFBF President Zippy Duvall said, "Farmers and ranchers should not have to hire a team of lawyers and consultants to determine how we can farm our land."

New Referendum Qualified for California's November 2024 Ballot

California Secretary of State Press Release

SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) - Secretary of State Shirley N. Weber, Ph.D. announced today that a referendum has qualified for the November 5, 2024, General Election ballot.

In order to qualify for the ballot, the referendum needed 623,212 valid petition signatures, which is equal to five percent of the total votes cast for governor in the November 2018 General Election.

The Attorney General's official title and summary of the referendum is as follows:

Referendum challenging 2022 law authorizing creation of council to set minimum wage and working standards for fast-food workers.

If the required number of registered voters sign this petition and it is timely filed, a 2022 law will not take effect unless approved at the next statewide general or special election after November 8, 2022. The challenged law:

Authorizes creation of Fast-Food Council (upon submission of 10,000 fast-food worker signatures) to set working standards and minimum wage (up to \$22/hour in 2023, with capped annual increases) at fast-food restaurants with 100+ nationwide locations.

February means we still have one more or Nitrogen, Phosphorous and Potassium. month of bare root season to go. All varieties of dormant fruit trees are currently available. If you are wanting to plant bare root fruit trees there is still time and selections are still good. Bare Root Season is January and February.

Now for the other things that we need to do in February. One of the most necessary things to be done is the third and final dormant spraying in mid-February with a copper based fungicide. It is important to keep ahead of the fungal pests that might occur on fruits and nuts, as well as some vegetables and ornamentals. Rose are very susceptible to black spot, powdery mildew, and rust. Copper spray is well known for its use for curly leaf on peaches and nectarines. Once a fungal disease is started it is difficult to control because the spores produced are easily blown to neighboring plants that might become infected. Because of its variable uses, it is a good product to have on your shelf for gardening needs. You should mix it with horticultural oil or Neem Oil, to help the spray spread evenly and cling to the foliage. Neem Oil has many other good uses. It is an excellent insecticide as well as controlling some fungi, to a lesser extent than the copper spray.

February usually brings hints of spring with it. Buds for the spring blooms begin to form. I am always fascinated by looking at those bare stems on the deciduous trees and shrubs and seeing the buds form the plants have their full set of leaves. The plants won't utilize fertilizer when they are bare of leaves. If they leaf out soon following the application of fertilizer, they will utilize any fertilizer that hasn't been washed away by rain or irrigation, but the usefulness of some has been lost. So- not too soon, but get on it when the signs of life show and give them a boost into spring. Use an appropriate fertilizer for the plants being fertilizes. There is a basic all purpose fertilizer that can be used on most things. It is often referred to as a "balanced" fertilizer since it has almost equal amounts of the three basic elements that are in moist formulas. Those three elements are N,P and K,

They will frequently be seen on the front of fertilizer packages. Acid fertilizer is used on azaleas, camellias, rhododendron and gardenias, plus other things that do well in similar conditions. Other elements will have been added to the basic three to create the desired acidity. Citrus trees have a special fertilizer with nutrients needed by that species. There is an abundance of formulas available to meet the needs of differing plants, there is also an abundance of plants that do well on the basic fertilizers.

Grasses are growing and weeds will be growing right along with them. Weeds can be controlled quite well in flower beds, now before they have emerged, by covering the areas with 2" of mulch. That will also help with watering chores later by reducing the frequency of watering since evaporation will be slowed.

As the weather gets warmer, be on the lookout for slugs and snails. Irregular holes in leaves are a clue that they are out and about. They also leave a slightly shiny trail behind. Use snail bait to destroy them. I have had very good luck with Sluggo - it is granular and is sprinkled in the infested areas. It is safe around pets and wildlife. I never saw the snails, just their empty shells. Snails also like beer and will be attracted to a bowl of beer cradled in a depression in the ground and will drown when they fall into it. Of course, it has to be empfor spring blooms. Wait to fertilize until tied and wastes a bit of beer. Aphids are also one of the early pests that you will encounter. They produce a sweet and sticky substance that is left on the leaves. Ants are attracted to that and will farm the aphids and that compounds the problem, so look for ants at the base of a plant infested with aphids and bait for or spray them. Spring is on the way enjoy it.

Twitter File Tweets Confess Rigging 2020 Election

They thought Twitter secure, a place where government (Department of Homeland Security DHS, and FBI agents in particular), Big Tech, Big Media, Democrats, and the Deep State, could speak freely to coconspirators to overthrow the government of the United States, more specifically its popularly serving and elected president. They succeeded in removing Donald J. Trump from the White House—a coup. America would never know, and all future elections could be rigged in the same manner preserving Deep State power. Twitter conversations would never be revealed. This is what the Twitter Files, from which this column is taken, document.

One miracle of 2022 was Twitter being bought by an OUTSIDER Elon Musk for \$44 billion—an offer too big to turn down. A second miracle, Musk, not a coconspirator, was strong enough to reveal to the world the secret combinations coup plans he found in Twitter. He did not have to do so. There was no profit for him in revealing these tweets. This made him the number one enemy of the Deep State (Combination). The coup had already been accomplished November 3, 2020. He could have remained silent with it and remained rich and favored by them forever.

The Combination (Deep State) upon realizing Musk was opposed to what they did and willing to reveal it, went into overdrive to first discredit him, then next to remove his advertising base for Twitter which would bankrupt him. He still chose to reveal their communications to each other facilitating the overthrow and making himself physically a target.

What follows are the Twitter Files documenting Twitter's 2020 election rigging. These are best assembled by KanekoatheGreat of Kanekoa News. He synthesized their election interference in 34 Twitter tweets. Column space limitation allows only highlights of his synthesis which follow.

The Department of Homeland Security (DHS) housed a censorship branch, the Cybersecurity, and Infrastructure Security Agency (CISA), geared to identify what they considered mis or disinformation

in the public sector defined as any information outside the narrative of the federal government. Lacking constitutional authority to censor the American public themselves, CISA (the government) was more than happy to team-up with like-minded private sector organizations notably the **Election Integrity Partnership** (EIP) and social media outlets, notably Twitter, to outsource actual censorship the dirty work—for them.

The EIP formed in 2020

"comprised of four organizations: Stanford Internet Observatory, the University of Washington's Center for an Informed Public, Atlantic Council's Digital Forensic Research Lab, and Graphika." Together the secret combination of government and private sector Deep Staters had about "120 analysts to censor millions of social media posts on elections.... [working] 20 hours a day, [enabling their] forwarding tickets of misinformation to be censored" to the obliging social media platforms. These "monitored 15 tech platforms •22 million tweets [were] labeled 'misinformation' •Entire 'misinformation narratives' [were] targeted for platform-wide throttling." Every repeat spreader of misinformation, the EIP acknowledged, "was on the right side of the political spectrum." They also "flagged popular populist-right YouTube channels, including: @scrowder, @ BlazeTV, @JudicialWatch, and even the @GOP War Room, as 'mis- and disinformation' spreaders,"basically the Republican Party. These were/are considered domestic terrorists by the Deep State Joe Biden government. This gave them the win.

Enter Mike Benz, the Foundation for Freedom online @FFO_Freedom. founder who "comprehensively details the US government's role in outsourcing censorship to this public-private network," the EIP. Benz "extensively documented the individuals involved and the flow of taxpayer funds (\$40M) to domestic censorship" (@ MikeBenzCyber). The DHS quietly corrupted CISA's mission when it designated domestic disinformation as cyber attacks on "critical cognitive infrastructure" (information outside the government narrative). As noted, the "US government cannot

sandblast millions of voters off the Internet because of their speech about elections." But the EIP, their private sector partners, could and did it for them.

So "who are these unelected bureaucrats who get to play judge, jury, and executioner and control the thoughts of millions of Americans?" Two main names are identified, business partners Chris Krebs and Alex Stamos. Stamos was "founder of the EIP censorship network," a CFR member and "the director of the of the Stanford Internet Observatory," one of the four organizations making up the EIP and today leads the organization. Other standouts include Kate Starbird, Graham Brookie, and Ben Nimmo. Details of their collusion in the censorship of anything right on the political spectrum by Twitter is given in the Twitter thread presented.

Essentially the EIP rigged the 2020 presidential election and 2022 mid-terms in three decisive ways: The "EIP defined 'delegitimization' as speech that 'casts doubt' on the election process or outcome. This accounted for 72% of the censorship tickets and targeted over 99% of the post throttled by narrative, focusing on voting machines and vote-by-mail (@MikeBenzCyber)." The EIP allowed the left "to discuss the vulnerabilities of voting machines after the 2016 election" while banning the right from "discussing those very same vulnerabilities after the 2020 election." Finally, the EIP "collaborated with its Big Tech partners to systematically censor any delegitimization of vote-bymail as disinformation. In effect, they sided with the left and pre-banned criticism of vote-by-mail at the narrative level five months before the 2020 election."

The Deep State used the COVID-19 "crisis to push for nationwide mail-in voting, which increased the number of ballots cast by mail from 28.8 million in 2016 to 66.4 million in 2020, a massive 131% increase." Thus the "percentage of Democrats voting by mail rose from 26% in 2016 to 60% in 2020, while Republican voters only saw a rise from 21% to 32%. In short, the extra 37 million ballots cast by mail during the 2020 election swung the election to the EIP's preferred candidate" Joe Biden. Thus, Twitter confesses rigging 2020 election.

Indians Win Nail Biter over Huskies to Continue Streak

SUTTER, CA (MPG) - The Marysville Indians escaped with a nail biting 64-61 victory in the Pioneer Valley League over the young Sutter Huskies last Wednesday to inch closer to the longest streak winning streak in program history.

Marysville opened the game with a 9-0 run in the first three and a half minutes of the game. The Indians also possessed leads of 10 and 13 points throughout the game, but the young Sutter team fought back all three times throughout the game and shortened the lead to nothing.

Huskies (10-11, 4-4 PVL) head coach Nabeel Bhatti expressed to the Dispatch it showed what kind of character his young roster holds. Nine out of the 10 players on the Sutter roster are juniors.

"We are young and winning is a learning habit," Bhatti told the Dispatch.

Bhatti added that earlier in the season, the Huskies probably wouldn't have been able to overcome those deficits, so he is excited about the progression he has seen within his team.

The Indians (19-3, 8-0 PVL) were led by senior guard Amrin Mann in the first quarter with eight points. It was also the first time Mann played a game at the Sutter campus since he transferred to Marysville for his senior season.

The Indians had a 14-11 lead at the end of the first. That would be all the points Mann scored for the

Beck made one of the two free throws and put the Huskies up three when he drove the ball inside off the backboard on the following possession.

With the game tied again at 61 under and with 10 seconds to go in the game, Brown Jr. drove to the basket down the right side of the lane and was too strong with the shot attempt as it hit of the top of the glass, but senior guard Kayden Ellyson made the play of the night as he rebounded the ball and put it back up for a successful and-one opportunity with 5.7 seconds left to go in the game.

Ellyson expressed to the Dispatch that he saw Brown Jr.'s ball looked too high off the glass so he had to snag that rebound and put the ball back up.

Ellyson swished the free throw and extended the Marysville lead to three and the Indians locked down defensively on the following Huskies attempt to tie the game and came out victorious.

Ellyson finished the game with 10 points, seven rebounds and five

Marysville head coach Stan Easter mentioned to the Dispatch that Ellyson is the heart and soul of the team.

With both teams in the second half of league, teams are going to make adjustments and Easter expressed to the Dispatch it's going to be more mental the rest of the way for the Indians.

"We're going to get everyone's best shot," Easter said.

The Indians beat Center on Friday to now have a 15-game win streak, which is the longest in school since the 2014 season (18) where Easter was in his third season at the helm of the program.





I am incredibly proud to be the first Sikh American elected to the State Legislature and thank the Punjabi American Heritage Society for their work in amplifying our stories."

The book, written by Lea Terhune, recounts the struggles and achievements of the Punjabi immigrants who arrived in California at the turn of the 19th and 20th centuries. These immigrants labored in farms, fields, and orchards, facing low wages and racial discrimination, but still managed to put down roots in their new home.

The book also highlights the current contributions of ethnic South Asians in every trade and profession in the United States. Descendants of the first Punjabi Sikh immigrants from Yuba City to the Imperial Valley continue to farm and add to the rich tapestry of the Central Valley. ★

Farm Bureau President Re-Elected to National Leadership Post

And now, after historic storms in California, we are watching uncaptured water simply flow into the ocean due to our state's lack of resolve for completing projects voters approved years ago. We can no longer accept inaction."

SLE Owner Admits to Possession of Narcotics for Sale while Armed

Butte County DA Release

BUTTE COUNTY, CA (MPG) - A 60-year-old Oroville man, who owned and operated a number of sober living environment (SLE) homes in Oroville, pleaded no-contest this afternoon in Butte County Superior Court to two charges of transporting narcotics for sales and one charge of possessing narcotics while armed with a firearm.

District Attorney Mike Ramsey said that Michael Mirton Anderson appeared in court today and entered the no-contest pleas rather than proceed to a jury trial on his charges. Anderson was arrested in April of 2022 when the Butte Interagency Narcotics Task Force (BINTF) stopped Anderson who was driving his vehicle with two known narcotics offenders.

A search of the vehicle revealed a loaded handgun hidden between the driver's seat and the center console. BINTF agents also located a backpack belonging to Anderson containing two additional handguns, 67.61 grams of fentanyl, 1.62 grams of heroin, and approximately half a pound of methamphetamine. An additional 293 pills stamped as "M-30" were located in the backpack as well. Although the pills were marked as oxycodone, testing

revealed that the pills were counterfeit pills laced with fentanyl.

Anderson's cell phone was also seized and a search of the phone located months of sales text messages.

After accumulating a lengthy criminal history in the 80s and 90s, Ramsey said Anderson managed to turn his life around and received a Certificate of Rehabilitation in 2016 from the Butte County Superior Court. Anderson became the owner, operator, and president of the Northern California Treatment Services, providing SLE homes for addicts attempting to change their lives. Unfortunately, Anderson ended up victimizing the very people he had once tried to help, illegally arming himself and selling narcotics to the addicts of Butte County.

Ramsey said Anderson's access to addicts through his SLEs was particularly concerning, especially given the quantity of narcotics found in Anderson's possession.

Anderson is set to be sentenced on his offenses on March 22, 2023. If sentenced to prison, Anderson faces a maximum sentence of seven years in state prison. In the meantime, he remains in Butte County Jail without bail.

PG&E Pays over \$339 Million in Property Taxes in Counties

California Invests Nearly \$1 Billion for Transportation Improvements

SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) - The California Transportation Commission (CTC) has allocated over \$988 million to repair and improve transportation infrastructure throughout the state. This funding includes more than \$450 million from the federal Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act of 2021 (IIJA) and more than \$250 million from Senate Bill (SB) 1, the Road

Repair and Accountability Act of 2017.

"The CTC's investments will help rebuild California's transportation infrastructure while increasing transit and active transportation options. These projects reflect the CTC and Caltrans' commitment to

safety and meeting future challenges," said Caltrans Director Tony Tavares. Projects the CTC approved include:

City of Sacramento: \$5 million in federal IIJA funding for the city's Broadway Complete Streets Project between 16th Street/Land Park Drive and 24th Street. The project includes reducing a segment of roadway from four lanes to two, constructing 6,100 feet of new buffered bicycle lanes, adding new marked pedestrian crossings and refuge islands, and making multi-modal improvements at two intersections.

State Route 65 in Wheatland, Yuba County: \$9.8 million in State Highway Operation and Protection Program funding, including \$680,000 in SB 1 funds, to rehabilitate the pavement from State Street to 0.3 mile north of Evergreen Drive. The City of Wheatland is contributing \$100,000 toward construction,

which includes adding bike lanes, improving drainage facilities, building a multi-use path, upgrading facilities to current Americans with Disabilities standards, and adding a traffic signal at the intersection with McDevitt Drive.

State Route 32 in Chico: \$462,000 for Caltrans to develop a safety project for traffic signal and intersection improvements at Main Street and Oroville Avenue.

State Route 20 in Colusa County:

\$730,000 for Caltrans to develop safety project to upgrade roadside signs, add flashing beacons, improve the pavement, and upgrade guardrail from east of the Lake County line to about 0.6 mile east of the State Route 16



junction.

Interstate 80 near Floriston, Nevada County: \$550,000 for Caltrans to develop a safety project to improve the pavement, repair drainage systems, upgrade guardrail and replace a damaged concrete barrier.

Interstate 80 in Sacramento County: \$210,000 for Caltrans to develop a project to replace current roadside vegetation and upgrade irrigation system from the State Route 51 (Capital City Freeway) junction to 0.6 mile east of Madison Avenue.

SB 1 provides \$5 billion in transportation funding annually that is shared equally between the state and local agencies. Road projects progress through construction phases more quickly based on the availability of SB 1 funds, including projects that are partially funded by SB 1.
