\$647 Million to Cover **Overdue Utility Bills**

SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) - Gov. Gavin Newsom on November 22 announced the release of \$647 million in

funding to help over 1.4 million California households struggling to pay their overdue energy bills.

The awarded funding will eliminate all past due energy debt accrued by residential customers between March 4, 2020 and December 31, 2021, providing real relief to households that have suffered the economic impacts of the COVID-19 pandemic and increased energy debt.

Over the last year, California has distributed over \$1.6 billion in financial assistance for bill credits through the California Arrearage Payment Program (CAPP) to reduce or eliminate overdue electric and gas bills.

"California has made unprecedented commitments to help vulnerable households stay afloat as the cost-of-living increases," said Governor Newsom. "By providing utility relief that will eliminate over 1.4 million Californians' overdue energy bills, we're helping families who continue to struggle with higher costs."

Governor Newsom and the California Legislature established the 2022 California Arrearage Payment Program (2022 CAPP) to address 100 percent of past due energy bill balances incurred by residential customers during the program's COVID-19 pandemic bill relief period covering March 4, 2020 to December 31, 2021. Thirtythree energy utilities applied for 2022 CAPP funding on behalf of over 1.4 million eligible residential customers.

Participating state energy utilities are required to apply a 2022 CAPP bill credit to their customer accounts within 60 days of receiving

"Once again, we are leading with our values by working to ensure that our neighbors economically impacted by the pandemic can keep their lights on," said California Health and Human Services Agency Secretary Dr. Mark Ghaly. "Many of us fell behind as the pandemic continued, and our commitment to further address energy debts is another way we are lifting up all Californians."

CAPP is administered by the Department of Community Services and Development (CSD). Under the first round of CAPP funding in 2021, over 1.5 million residential and commercial energy utility customers received a CAPP bill credit to reduce

SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) - Beginning in 2023, Californians will get easy access to data on over 19,000 long term care services and facilities in California, thanks to a \$1 million grant from the California Department of Aging for the expansion of the Cal Long Term Care Compare website.

Through this funding, Californians will be able to access Cal Long Term Care Compare to compare quality performance and facility information for over 1,000 nursing homes, as well the following services and facilities in their area: home health agencies, hospices, adult residential care programs, adult day health centers, long term care hospitals, inpatient rehabilitation facilities and more.

The public website will be updated over a two-year period to include comparative information, such as facility location, number of

beds, resident information, services, and resident feedback, for these additional long term care options. In addition, the website will be updated to include several tools designed to guide Californians through the decision-making process, from determining their longterm care needs to selecting the right provider in their area. As part of this effort, overall website accessibility, such as Spanish translation services and ADA compatibility, will be improved so that even more Californians can access this vital information.

Cal Long Term Care Compare is a free website that offers an unbiased, onestop snapshot of how local long term care services and facilities compare to each other and to statewide averages on a variety of quality

"Searching for long term care services can be a difficult, anxiety-ridden challenge. We know that many individuals and families struggle with just understanding the difference between the various long term care options such as nursing homes versus hospice," said Dr. Bruce Spurlock, Executive Director of Cal Healthcare Compare. "We hope that this free site will lessen the apprehension and provide individuals and families with reliable, objective information and educational material so that they can be more confident in the decisions they make."

Created by Cal Healthcare Compare, a multi-stakeholder nonprofit, the user-friendly website offers a quick reference about some of the most pressing issues consumers need to weigh before choosing the long term care facility best suited to their unique needs. 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Hospital Association say cases of the flu, COVID-19, and RSV are overwhelming the health system."

However a look at the CDC Covid dashboard shows hospitalizations are static. Of the 331.9 million Americans, there are 19,480 hospitalizations:

Here's part of the motive: "Declaration of a national emergency would give providers additional funding as well as more flexibility from regulations to deal with what they call a 'crisis."

The COVID-19 pandemic is over and has been over except for political motivations – and government funding.

Taking a page from Dr. Anthony Fauci who warned families to get Covid tested ahead of Thanksgiving gatherings, California Health and Human Services Secretary Dr. Mark Ghaly said, "I think there's ways that we can really improve how we do it, rather than spend our time talking about whether we should or shouldn't," referring to family gatherings.

The Los Angeles Times reporters took the hysteria one step further:

"In California, however, coronavirus-positive hospitalizations have been increasing. As of Wednesday, there were 2,782 coronavirus-positive patients in hospitals, up 84% from the autumn low of 1.514 on Oct. 24."

There are 40 million residents in California, and 2,782 are Covid-positive in the hospital?

"Nationally, hundreds of Americans are still dying every day of COVID-19, which remains a leading cause of death. And there are signs that transmission is once again on the upswing," the LAT reports.

But the CDC reports, COVID-19 was the third leading cause of death after heart disease and cancer.

For perspective, on any given day, approximately 740 Californians die of all causes, totaling about 270,000 California deaths annually.

According to the California Department of Public Health, as of November 21, 2022, there are zero deaths from Covid.

But at the top of their chart, the CDPH shows 96,701 total Covid deaths. This is the cumulative total since February 1, 2020, through November 22, 2022, according to the CDPH's data.

The state of California wants people to believe that Covid patients are dropping like flies at 12 per day. But that is the average over the entire almost 3-year Covid pandemic since February 2020.

It's feeling like Groundhog Day with public health officials and media breathlessly talking about Covid "cases," rather than focusing on the vulnerable groups of people.

Throughout the pandemic, there was too heavy of a focus on an uptick in cases, as Stanford's Dr. Scott Atlas reported, "especially in places where governors either have reinstated or have further enforced restrictions. When we see this focus on more cases, it doesn't really matter how many cases – it only matters who gets the cases. We know that the infection-fatality rate for people under 70 is 0.04 percent – that's less than or equal to the seasonal flu," he said.

A physician told the Globe that because doctors even can have a difficult time getting good data through their hospitals, trends are far more important numbers than raw numbers to study, as it gives more context.

For the average American, faith in government authority was significantly eroded because of how Covid was handled, managed and grossly mismanaged. It's still going on with politicians and the State of California inundating the people with advertisements pushing Covid vaccines and masks by the California Department of Public Health (CDPH). These ads are everywhere radio, television, online ads, social media, iHeart radio, Sirius radio - even radio hosts are being paid to read the CDPH ads... it's difficult to escape the commercials.

The governor and Legislature are also seeking to punish physicians and surgeons for "unprofessional conduct" for advocating for the potential benefits of early treatment with off-label drugs, or those who dare to ask questions about COVID vaccine safety. Under AB 2098 doctors will be subject to disciplinary actions by the Medical Board of California and the Osteopathic Medical Board of California if they do not adhere to the "approved COVID treatment consensus."

Fortunately, a group of California physicians has filed a complaint and motion for a preliminary injunction in Høeg, et al. v. Newsom, et al., asking the U.S. District Court for the Eastern District of California prevent AB 2098 from going into effect.

Will there be another Covid Groundhog Day? The Californians I talk to say "oh, Hell no."

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'Kids of Caltrans' Aims to Get Drivers to Move Over, Save Lives

SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) - The young faces of the families of highway workers are reminding you to move over a lane or slow down for their loved ones who help keep our roads safe. The "Kids of Caltrans" provide the personal, impactful messages behind the new public awareness campaign from the California Department of Transportation (Caltrans), in partnership with the California Office of Traffic Safety (OTS) and the California Highway Patrol (CHP), that kicked off today at Sacramento's Golden 1 Center.

Some of the children, grandchildren, nieces, and nephews of Caltrans workers featured in the "Move Over" campaign were on hand for the kickoff event, which comes on the heels of last week's National Crash Responder Safety Week. In video messages that will air throughout the state through January 2023, they ask drivers to be alert and move over a lane if safe to do so or slow down to safely pass highway workers.

Sadly, highway workers, law enforcement officers, emergency personnel and tow truck drivers are killed or injured along California's roadways every year.

Moving over and slowing down when passing a vehicle stopped on the roadway with flashing lights in California isn't just a matter of following the law—it is about saving lives. The "Move Over" law exists to provide a safer environment for maintenance and emergency vehicles stopped along roadsides close to fast-moving traffic.

"Not a single person should die on our roadways – let alone in our work zones – so I urge you to do your part, pay attention, move over and save lives," said Caltrans Director Tony Tavares. "Don't let that split second of inattention destroy the lives of so many people ... including your own."

"Making a traffic or emergency stop on the side of the road is one of the most dangerous duties law enforcement officers and other first responders perform," said CHP Commissioner Amanda Ray. "Tragically, too many first responders and highway workers have been killed on the shoulder or median, and dozens more have been seriously injured. Please, move over or slow down when you see our officers and others working on the side of the freeway; not only is it the law, their lives depend on it." "Caltrans workers are mothers, fathers, grandparents, aunts and uncles who have loved ones who need them to come home," OTS Director Barbara Rooney said. "For your safety, and the safety of all roadside workers and emergency responders, please be alert and slow down."

California's "Move Over" law requires all drivers to move over a lane if safe to do so, and if unable to do so safely, to slow down when they see amber flashing lights on Caltrans vehicles, law enforcement and other emergency vehicles and tow trucks.

"Towing professionals are the ones we rely on when the unexpected happens. We all depend on these Heroes of the Highway to clear our roadways and get traffic safely flowing after a crash has occurred," said Sam Johnson, President of the California Tow Truck Association and the Emergency Road Service Coalition of America. "As a motorist, you can help protect these heroes by paying attention, slowing down, and moving over when you see the flashing lights of a tow truck assisting a stranded vehicle. The California Tow Truck Association along with the Emergency Road Service Coalition of America would like to thank the motoring public for their help with our mission to get each and every one of these Heroes of the Highway safely home to their families at the end of the day."

In 2020, nearly 7,000 work-zone crashes occurred on California roadways, resulting in more than 3,000 injuries and nearly 100 fatalities. Nationally, drivers and passengers account for 85% of those killed in

Although all 50 states have enacted "Move Over" laws, the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration found that 71% of Americans are not aware of them. In California, failure to obey the "Move Over" law can result in fines up to \$1,000, plus points on your driving record.

Since 1921, 191 Caltrans employees have been killed on the job, and one of the biggest hazards to them and anyone working on the roads is from motorists who do not exercise caution. Those 191 employees represent scores of families torn apart by preventable work zone collisions.

SMF Named WSJ's Top Airport

SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) - Sacramento International Airport (SMF) was named the top airport in the nation according to the Wall Street Journal's 2022 Airport rankings. Compared to the 50 other airports surveyed, SMF received the highest score overall.

The top 50 busiest airports were surveyed and then divided into two sizes - 20 large and 30 midsize. The airports were then measured on 19 categories including experience from on-time performance and security waits to customer-satisfaction scores and ticket prices. The categories ranked were further grouped into three broad categories – reliability, convenience, and value.

SMF ranked highest among all airports surveyed in the reliability category and also ranked high in arrival and departure times, low flight cancellations, quick taxi and security clearance times, and a max walking distance of only 1,213 feet.

"The SMF team consistently provides our customers with a safe, comfortable and enjoyable travel experience," said Cindy Nichol, Director of the Sacramento County Department of Airports. "Living our values every day clearly makes a difference, as we make our customers our top priority. We see each day as an opportunity to improve and accomplish more together by collaborating; communicating and taking pride in what we do."

In 2019, SMF similarly won the top midsized airport award - the award was not issued in 2020 or 2021 due to the pandemic.

The Sacramento County Department of Airports is responsible for planning, developing, operating and maintaining the county's four airports: Sacramento International Airport, Executive Airport, Mather Airport and Franklin Field. For more information, visit sacramento.aero





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The Yin and Yang of California's Job Picture

When California's monthly report on employment was issued last week telling us what the situation was in October Gov. Gavin Newsom quickly issued a celebratory statement.

"California has now fully recovered all jobs that were lost to the pandemic-induced recession. but we know this isn't the finish line," Newsom said, making a plug for his ecorising consumer costs and "to help create thousands of jobs and opportunities for Californians throughout the state."

Newsom claimed that "California has recovered 101.1% of the 2,758,900 jobs lost during the recession — the state is now 30,800 jobs above the pre-pandemic level total of February 2020."

Data from the state **Employment Development** Department (EDD) tell a slightly different story. In February 2020, according to EDD's bulletin for that month, 18,756,900 Californians were employed. The bulletin for October 2022 pegged employment at 18,502,900, or 254,000 fewer.

Numbers aside, California's employment picture has definitely improved from what it was two-plus years ago,

The financial pain to millions of California families was made immeasurably worse when EDD experienced a bureaucratic for people looking for meltdown that prevented many jobless workers from collecting unemployment insurance payments, sometimes for months. > For one thing, the reports for February 2020 and October 2022 reveal that the state's labor force — the total of Californians either employed or looking for work — has shrunk by nearly a quarter-million persons. The numbers continue a long-term decline in the high-tech indusin what's called "labor force participation"—the thousands of workers in percentage of working-age adults who have jobs or want to work. They also imply that as the state's overall population ages, the pool of potential workers is also shrinking.

Whatever the underlying causes, the labor force decline is one reason why California's employers are having such great difficulty *newspapers*.

"For the past full year the spread of COVID-19, and for first time in throwing nearly 3 million decades. California has more job openings than job seekers," a new report from the Public Policy Institute of California notes. "While this is good news work, it also limits businesses' workforce plans and growth — and wage increases have put upward pressure on prices."

In response, the PPIC report says, some employers are implementing more labor-saving technology, such as ordering kiosks in fast food outlets and GPS-guided machinery in agriculture.

The labor shortage may be having other impacts. munity collage enrollment could, for instance, reflect would-be students' opting for higher wages in service industries over education.

We may look back on October 2020 as a high point for employment in California because, economists tell us, a recession may be on the horizon. Some employers, especially those try, are already laying off anticipation of a downturn.

California has a history of experiencing a recession of some kind about once a decade and we may be due for another.

The Coming Diesel Shortage

With the price of gasoline skyrocketing to unthinkable heights in the last year or so, the next shoe to drop is the price of diesel fuel. Or should I say the next price to rise.

Not that diesel hasn't increased in price.

Today the national average for a gallon of diesel is \$5.29. Last year about this time it was \$3.64. But that could be just the beginning.

Bad things are happening in the world of diesel as far as its supply goes, and that equates to a possible increase in price and my guess is its going to be a nasty one.

There are many factors all coming together in the supply chain of diesel, and although you might not own a diesel car or truck yourself, you are nonetheless going to feel the pain.

It might not necessarily be at the pump, but prices will likely rise at just about every other store you go to. That's because it is estimated that 95% of goods travel at some point by a boat, truck or train powered

The war in Ukraine has certainly been pinching supplies as Russia is a major exporter of diesel and China will soon implement an export restriction on a variety of goods, diesel being one of them. Add in some shutdowns of diesel refineries both in the U.S. and Europe, and historic low inventories of the fuel worldwide, and it has all the makings of a severe inflationary spike in diesel over and above the bad inflation we are already seeing in other

Estimated costs to the U.S. economy from spiking diesel prices exceed 100 billion.

Transportation fuel is the most common use for diesel which powers most trains, semi-trucks and yes, some automobiles, all using it in lieu of gasoline. A ton of it is used for ocean freighters.

Often called the dirty fuel as it is easier to refine than gasoline, it is most commonly used in in large engines and power plants which are the lifeblood of supply lines and power for almost everything we

Making matters worse is a threatened workers strike deadline of December 5th from the railroad unions wanting improved health care and other compensation type

demands. If the railroad strike comes to fruition, estimated costs are an astounding two billion dollars a day to the U.S. consumer. If you think supply lines are slow now, just wait and see what happens if the trains stop running.

Europe is preparing for what it knows is coming. Anticipating empty shelves due to fuel shortages, they are prepping for a possible run on cash (aka the banks) as people start to hoard both cash and goods. Many countries expect the same and are acting accordingly before supplies get critical. More alarming is the fact that diesel is

also widely used as heating fuel, mostly along the eastern seaboard, but also warming homes and businesses in a variety of regions worldwide. Should a cold winter be in store, things could get very ugly in many areas of the country and indeed, the world.

With supply chains already constrained due to a variety of reasons from the war, the CoVid shutdowns and a lack of available workers, a spike in the cost in the main fuel used for shipping will likely further stress retailers and consumers in obtaining goods in a timely manner. The result will be even higher prices and lack of availability on many items as shipping costs escalate.

With the Federal Reserve trying to tame inflation and consumers feeling its effect on their pocketbooks, a spike in diesel will further add to the cost of just about everything we buy. This will amplify inflationary pressures and worsen the scarcity of goods we are already facing and in process, make the Feds job of quelling inflation that much harder.

Researchers are on the lookout for pests, 'citrus greening' disease in Southern California

Researchers are combing commercial citrus sites in Southern California to determine whether Asian citrus psyllids are spreading huanglongbing "citrus greening" disease. The insect vectors are known to carry the bacterium that can cause the virus known as HLB. So far, researchers have tested more than 3,000 of the insects collected from 15 commercial citrus sites. Just over 3.5% of the bugs had some level of bacterium. California so far has not had widespread infections in citrus, as has occurred in Florida and Texas.

Study: Farmers who increased online sales were more resilient during pandemic

Farmers who increased use of online sales and marketing were more resilient to economic shocks of the pandemic, according to a new study by researchers at the University of California, Davis. According to the study, published in the journal Agricultural Systems, farmers with a greater diversity of crops and livestock were better able to respond to the pandemic and reported no change or an increase in profitability, compared to farmers with less diverse offerings. Some 46% of 364 California farmers and ranchers interviewed said they relied on online sales.

UC Merced and UC Santa Cruz designated as new agricultural research centers

For the first time in a half century, the University of California has designated additional campuses as agricultural experiment stations. Both UC Santa Cruz and UC Merced are now joining UC Davis, UC Berkeley and UC Riverside as research centers focused on scientific studies related to agriculture and natural resources. The campuses will work closely with UC Cooperative Extension farm advisers, as well as farmers, ranchers, processors and others in food production and agriculture.

Farmers and ranchers to be surveyed for 2002 Census of Agriculture

The 2022 Census of Agriculture is underway. The census provides America's comprehensive database on farming and ranching in every state. The U.S. Department of Agriculture on Nov. 22 began mailing survey codes to agricultural producers across the country. Paper questionnaires will be mailed out in December, and all farm operations that produced or sold \$1,000 or more of agricultural products this year are required to participate in the census. All responses are due by Feb. 6, 2023.

California Trucking Company to Pay \$71K for Spills into Lake County Waterways

EPA News Release

SAN FRANCISCO, CA (MPG) - The U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) today announced a settlement with the owner and operator of Steve Wills Trucking and Logging LLC to resolve claims of violations of the Clean Water Act. Tanker trucks transporting milk from the Steve Wills facility near Fortuna, California, were involved in three separate driving incidents, all of which resulted in discharges of raw milk into waterways. One of the three incidents resulted in the death of a driver.

"Improper transport of goods can negatively impact waterways and compromise the safety of workers," said EPA Pacific Southwest Regional Administrator Martha Guzman. "When companies fail to manage substances that have the potential to impact waterways the local community, environment, and worker safety is put in danger."

On January 19, 2020, a tanker truck carrying raw milk on Highway 20 near Glenhaven, CA and released raw milk into Clear Lake. On April 12, 2020, a second incident took place when a truck on Highway 20 near Clearlake Oaks, CA overturned down an embankment and released raw milk into Clear Lake. Finally, on December 11, 2021, a truck on Highway 20 east of Lance Road in Lake County overturned down an embankment into Grizzly Creek, a tributary of

incidents. The third incident is still pending the results of an ongoing investigation.

Steve Wills Trucking and Logging agreed to a penalty in the amount of \$71,967 to resolve claims that the company discharged to Waters of the United States without a permit, which is a violation of the Clean Water Act.

U.S. law requires the safe management of materials to protect public health, the environment, and limit the need for costly and extensive cleanups. It is unlawful

to discharge pollutants into Waters of the United States, except as authorized by a National Pollutant Discharge Elimination System permit issued under the Clean Water Act.

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

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

to do in the yard, though there are some things that are needed. The most important of those is the second spraying of dormant spray to keep the fungal infections at bay, and that should be done in late December. As mentioned in November, curl leaf on peaches and nectarines is the main target, and it is useful on a host of other things which can be found on the directions for use. December usually brings cold enough weather that frosty and/or freezing cold nights are a possibility. Be sure to watch for frost or freeze warnings and be ready to protect your plants as needed. All citrus trees are quite vulnerable to the cold weather because they are evergreen and sub-tropical. A light frost will likely damage the leaves of the plant, whereas a hard freeze will cause much leaf damage and fruit damage as well - best to be ready for it. An old blanket can be placed over a plant as long as it isn't apt to rain causing it to get wet and heavy. A blanket would be best used by putting them on at night and taking them off daily in order to be exposed to the sunlight. Frost cloth is a preferred method which works well and can be held in place by tucking it under a few pots or rocks so wind can't displace it, and it can be saved and re-used – just fold or roll it up and put it with other gardening supplies. It also has the advantage of being permeable enough to water plants with it in place. Adequate sunlight also reaches the plants. Plastic should not be used directly on a plant. It has no insulation quality, in fact it can direct the freezing temperature directly to the leaves. Make a temporary frame work with a few stakes several inches from the foliage of a plant and put the plastic over it as a covering, tee-pee style. Or, three to four stakes can be driven a little way into the ground to create an enclosure over which to put the plastic covering. The dead air space within has insulating quality. Time was that a light bulb could be hung in the enclosure and provide warmth, but the newer, more efficient bulbs do not emit much heat. If you have any of the older bulbs, or any strings of the old Christmas decoration lights, they can be used to keep plants warm when the weather forecast suggests that it will be especially cold. For containerized plants, be sure that they have been very well watered when especially

Bare root fruit tree season is fast approaching. Bundles bare root fruit trees will start coming in soon. It takes a bit of time to get them all organized once they arrive, but we are usually ready to offer them for sale by late December. Roses will also be here soon. If you are interested, we have availability lists to help you make choices. Oregon stock with live Christmas trees and dogwoods and other Oregon stock usually comes in late November, so should be here and ready for sale. You can see that there are lots of possibilities for the gardeners. Many of them are also good Christmas gift possibilities as well.

Lilacs do well in our area and don't require lots of care, but they are especially happy in very cold climates. The flowers they produce are generally larger clusters than those grown in our more temperate climates. To compensate for the lack of very cold weather, try putting ice cubes around the base of the plants several times during the winter to keep the roots colder, as they would be in snowy climates. Poinsettias are a frequent gift at this time of the year. They seem to bloom and fit right into the season with the festive red flowers. If you are given one or buy one, and the pot has a lovely foil wrapping on it, before you water it cut out a circle of the wrap on the bottom of the container, then place the plant on a saucer with a layer of pebbles to hold it out of any standing water - then water when needed. The wrap won't become a reservoir to waterlog the plant and you will enjoy its beauty longer. We wish everyone a Joyful

Conversion to Organics Could Increase Food Prices, Shrink Farm Profits

SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) - A European Union policy goal to exponentially increase organic farming to 30% of all agricultural production by 2030 is expected to be considered by Gov. Gavin Newsom for next year's budget. However, a new economic analysis says such a plan would dramatically increase the price of food for many consumers and jeopardize the solvency of organic farms.

California currently has an estimated 7.35 million acres of irrigated cropland, of which 460,000 acres – or 6% –is certified as organic and not all of that is farmed in any given year.

any given year.

A preliminary analysis by ERA Economics, a Davis-based consultancy specializing in the economics of agriculture and water resources in California, focused on the potential challenges of applying the EU standards to one California crop: tomatoes. The state produces 95% of America's processing tomatoes and the total annual tomato crop is valued at \$1.2 billion.

Only 5% of California's 228,000 processing tomato acreage is currently needed to meet consumer demand for organic. The study found that reaching 30% organic production by 2030 would cause substantial disruptions to the market. The farmgate price of conventional tomatoes was estimated to rise by more than 11%. And, importantly, the price for organic tomatoes was estimated to fall by 28% at the farmgate level – potentially putting the market price below the cost of production.

That could mean organic farmers would be forced to cease production, sell, or farm something else – a result that could potentially crash the organic market and ultimately drive-up consumer prices. Mandating an increase in organic acreage without a clear connection to consumer demand could result in market disruptions that would hurt farmers, farm employees and consumers alike, the study noted.

Any initial organic price drop would

mostly benefit wealthier consumers who purchase organically grown products, with lower-income customers paying more for traditionally grown products. All tomato farmers, organic or not, could see reduced profits, according to the analysis.

"Farming works when we are able to grow what the consumer actually wants and not what government mandates. California consumers are already struggling to afford higher prices for food than other states because of government mandates and these types of proposals just make things worse," said Jamie Johansson, president of the California Farm Bureau. "When the government increases the price of food, it acts like a regressive tax, hurting lower- and middle-income families the hardest. At the end of the day, the government needs to let organic markets grow organically."

To increase organic acreage for processing tomatoes from an average of 4% to 30% would represent a five- to six-fold increase in current acreage. Tomato growers and processors interviewed for the analysis confirmed industry data regarding consumers' finite desire to purchase organic tomato products;

Tomato growers may specialize in organic, non-organic or both, depending on market demands and conditions. By mandating a specific growing method, it could greatly impact the ability of farmers to keep their operation sustainable, both financially and as they encounter other challenges, such as climate change and pests and disease;

Both conventional and organic farmers of processing tomatoes face risks of economic losses. Conventional growers, with likely reduced acreage, could see a 17% potential downside cost from expected earnings;

Organic production presents greater risk of crop failure, higher production costs and lower crop yields. As a result, organic farmers are likely to see less stability. They face a potential downside cost of 36% of anticipated net returns, making it potentially unprofitable to grow organic processing tomatoes.

Judical Watch Files Appeal Challenging FBI's Withholding of Communications

WASHINGTON, D.C. (MPG) - Judicial Watch announced today it has filed an appeal challenging a U.S. District Court for the District of Columbia decision allowing the FBI to withhold records of communication between the Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI) and several financial institutions about the reported transfer of financial transaction records of people in DC, Maryland and Virginia on January 5 and January 6, 2021 (Judicial Watch, Inc. v. U.S. Department of Justice (No.

The appeal, filed in the U.S. Court of Appeals for the District of Columbia, comes in the Freedom of Information Act (FOIA) lawsuit filed by Judicial Watch after the FBI failed to respond to a February 10, 2021, FOIA request (Judicial Watch v. U.S. Department of Justice (No. 1:21-cv-01216)). Judicial Watch is asking for:

All records of communication between the FBI and any financial institution, including but not limited to Bank of America, Citibank, Chase Manhattan Bank, Discover, and/or American Express, in which the FBI sought transaction data for those financial institutions' debit and credit card account holders who made purchases in Washington, DC, Maryland and/or Virginia on January 5, 2021, and/or January 6, 2021.

In its appellate brief, Judicial Watch argues: This appeal arises from what appears to be an unprecedented abuse of the financial privacy of thousands of Americans. Substantial and compelling evidence demonstrates that the FBI sought and received records from financial institutions of anyone who used a credit card or engaged in other transactions in the Washington, D.C. area on January 5 or 6, 2021. This would include many thousands of persons living in the Washington, DC area, including possibly members of this Court.

In its appeal Judicial Watch points

out that the lower court was mistaken when it upheld the FBI's Glomar response (neither confirming nor denying the existence of records) because the FBI previously acknowledged the existence of the records in multiple ways. For instance, court records filed in support of a criminal case include the FBI's statement of facts that provides the defendant's address, which was obtained through "his Bank of America account and recent Expedia transactions."

In another case, the FBI "confirmed that it obtained records from PNC Bank and discusses in detail the multiple ways that it used the financial data."

Judicial Watch cites two additional cases where the FBI describes in publicly available court records its use of financial records in the January 6 investigation.

Judicial Watch concludes: [Judicial Watch] more than adequately demonstrated that the FBI may have sought and received records from financial institutions of anyone who used a credit card or engaged in other transactions in the Washington, DC area on January 5 or 6. If so, this would be an unprecedented abuse of the financial privacy of thousands of Americans. [Judicial Watch's] FOIA request to investigate this should not be blocked by a meritless Glomar response.

"We want the details on what looks to be an unprecedented abuse of the financial privacy of countless innocent Americans by big banks and the FBI," stated Judicial Watch President Tom Fitton. "The FBI's cover-up should be rejected, and the records made public."

In February 2022, Judicial Watch filed an opposition to the U.S. Capitol Police's (USCP) effort to shut down Judicial Watch's federal lawsuit for January 6 videos and emails. Through its police department, Congress argues that the videos and emails are not public records, there is no public interest in their release, and that "sovereign immunity" prevents citizens from suing for their release. ★

Could Monoclonal Antibodies Replace Opioids for Chronic Pain?

DAVIS, CA (MPG) - During the pandemic, physicians used infusions of monoclonal antibodies — antibodies made in a lab — to help patients fight off COVID-19 infections. Now, researchers at UC Davis are trying to create monoclonal antibodies that can help fight chronic pain. The goal is to develop a monthly non-addictive pain medication that can replace opioids.

Vladimir Yarov-Yarovoy and James Trimmer, professors in the Department of Physiology and Membrane Biology at the UC Davis School of Medicine, are leading the project. They have assembled an interdisciplinary team featuring many of the same researchers who are also trying to turn tarantula venom into a pain medication.

Earlier this year, Yarov-Yarovoy and Trimmer received a \$1.5 million grant from the National Institutes of Health's HEAL Initiative, an aggressive effort to speed scientific solutions to stem the national's opioid crisis.

People can become addicted to opioids due to chronic pain. The CDC National Center for Health Statistics showed an estimated 107,622 drug overdose deaths in the United States in 2021, an increase of nearly 15% from the 93,655 deaths estimated in 2020.

"Recent breakthroughs in structural and computational biology – using computers to understand and model biological systems – have set the stage for applying new approaches to create antibodies as superior therapeutic candidates to treat chronic pain," said Yarov-Yarovoy, the principal investigator for the award.

"Monoclonal antibodies are the fastest growing sector of the pharmaceutical industry and have many advantages over classical small molecule drugs," Trimmer said. Small molecule drugs are drugs that can easily enter cells. They are widely used in medicine.

Trimmer's lab has created thousands of different monoclonal antibodies for various purposes over many years, but this is the first attempt to generate antibodies aimed at pain relief. Monoclonal antibodies are already being used for migraine

Although it may seem very futuristic, the Food and Drug Administration has already approved monoclonal antibodies to treat and prevent migraine. These new medications act on a migraine-associated protein called calcitonin gene-related peptide.

The project at UC Davis has a different target — specific ion channels in nerve cells known as voltage-gated sodium channels. The channels are like "pores" on the nerve cell.

"Nerve cells are responsible for transmitting pain signals in the body. Voltage-gated sodium ion channels in nerve cells are the key transmitters of pain," explained Yarov-Yarovoy. "We aim to create antibodies that will bind to these specific transmission sites at the molecular level, inhibiting their activity and stopping the transmission of pain signals."

The researchers are focused on three specific sodium ion channels associated with pain: NaV1.7, NaV1.8 and NaV1.9.

Their goal is to create antibodies that can fit into each of these channels like a key into a lock. This targeted approach is intended to stop the channels from sending pain signals but not interfere with other signals sent through the nerve cells.

The challenge is that the structures of the three channels they are attempting to block are incredibly complex.

Software programs help create virtual models

To address this, they are turning to software programs called Rosetta and AlphaFold. With Rosetta, the researchers are designing complex virtual models of proteins and analyzing which ones might best fit the NaV1.7, NaV1.8 and NaV1.9 nerve channels. With AlphaFold, the researchers independently validate proteins designed by Rosetta.

Once they identify several promising proteins, they will create antibodies that can then be tested on lab-created neural tissue. Human testing would be years
