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## Student Test Scores Plunge



State test results show California students overall performed much worse in math and English language arts than pre-pandemic. Photo by Elena Elisseeva@Dreamstime.com

California's Education Department released student test scores showing a statewide decline that nearly wiped out the academic progress made since the state overhauled how it funds education in 2014.

The gist of the scores, the most extensive measure so far of the

COVID-19 pandemic's impact on student achievement: The percentage of California students meeting state math standards plummeted 7 percentage points to 33%, and the percentage meeting English language standards dropped 4 percentage points, to 47%.

Some scores for students of color and those from low-income households dropped less dramatically than

their counterparts, an indication that the state's funding formula, which sends more money to high-needs districts, worked to soften the blow of two years of disrupted learning.

As if to prove that pandemic learning loss is not just a California problem, officials released the state data to the public on the same day that results of a different test,

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## YWA Approves \$4.2 million for Infrastructure and Forest Biomass Project

MARYSVILLE, CA (MPG) - Yuba Water Agency approved on October 18, 2022, more than \$4.2 million in funding to support a major water and wastewater infrastructure expansion project in south Yuba County and a planned forest biomass plant and business center in the foothills.

Two loans, one for \$2.6 million to the City of Wheatland and a second for \$1.55 million to Olivehurst Public Utility District will be used to complete a unified grant application by the two entities to combine their water and wastewater systems in the south part of the county. The loan from Yuba Water is expected to make the project more competitive for potentially tens of millions in grant funding through a State Water Resources Control Board wastewater regionalization program targeted toward disadvantaged communities.

"This project is truly a game changer for Wheatland and Yuba County and exemplifies what's possible when we all work together toward the same common goals," said Board Chairman Gary Bradford, whose district includes the area of the county where upgrades are planned.

Yuba Water previously provided grants and loans to Wheatland and OPUD to complete the design and engineering of a modern, combined regional wastewater system. In addition to accommodating current and anticipated growth in Wheatland, the improvements will also protect groundwater quality in the region.

In another action, Yuba Water approved a third loan of \$70,000 to the Camptonville Community Partnership to purchase 100 additional acres of land adjacent to the property where it plans to build a three-megawatt forest biomass plant and business center. The planned biomass plant would process bio-waste from nearby forest restoration projects and use it to generate clean electricity, creating a regional market for forest waste material.

The loan and land purchase will allow the partnership to have full site control of the property, which is a

requirement of many external grant programs, including a \$2 million grant that the partnership is currently applying for through the Sierra Nevada Conservancy.

“Building a biomass center in Yuba County ties in perfectly with the agency’s ongoing forest health efforts,” said Vice-Chairman Randy Fletcher, whose district encompasses the foothills. “When built, this project will be critical to our efforts to reduce the risk of a destructive

megafire in our foothills.”

Owning the land will reduce insurance costs, as well as allow the partnership to plan, prepare and market the potential biomass business center to its full potential. Once the biomass facility and associated infrastructure are successfully built, Yuba Water’s loan would then turn into grant funds.

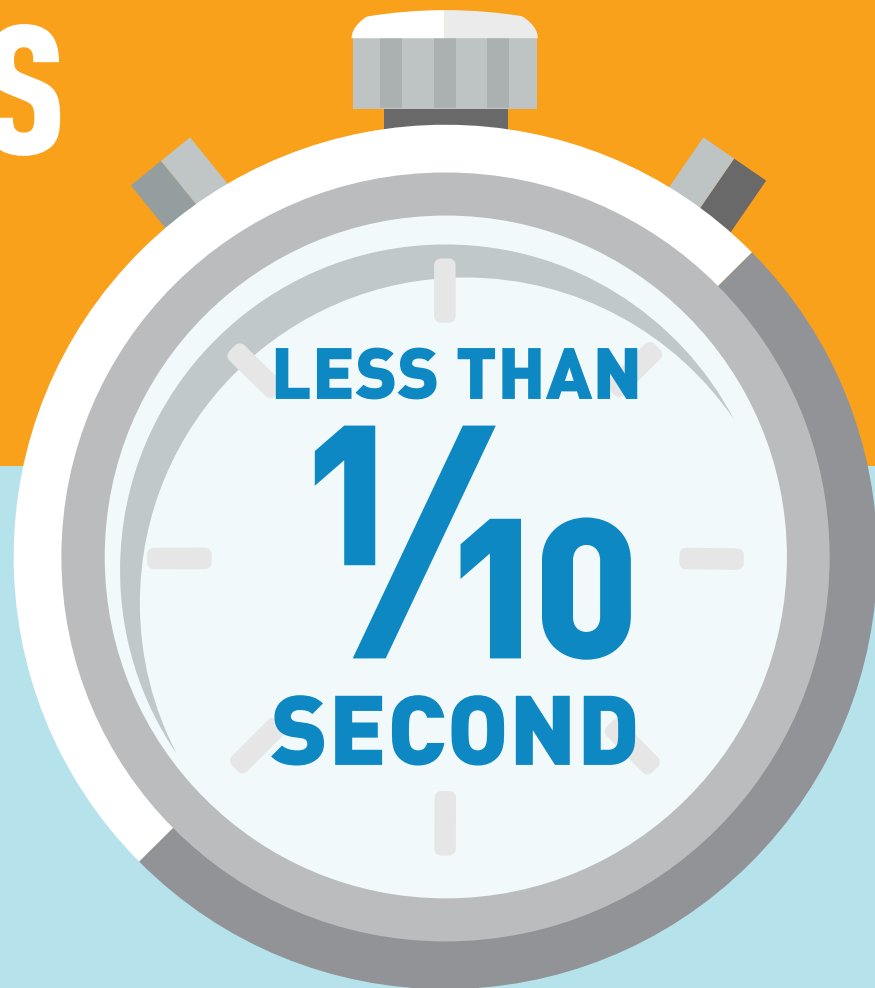


# HOW THE COMMUNITY WILDFIRE SAFETY PROGRAM IS HELPING TO PREVENT WILDFIRES IN 2022

PG&E's Community Wildfire Safety Program (CWSP) will continue to use Enhanced Powerline Safety Settings following the success of its pilot program. Enhanced safety settings allow PG&E to be more surgical in its approach to preventing wildfires. These settings will automatically turn off power within one-tenth of a second if an object comes in contact with a powerline. This approach is just one part of a multifaceted wildfire strategy which includes:

- **Undergrounding 175 miles of powerlines** in high fire-threat areas as part of our multi-year goal of 10,000 miles.
- **Strengthening the electric grid** with stronger poles and covered lines to reduce wildfire risks.
- **Installing microgrids** that use generators to keep the electricity on during wildfire safety outages.

While these safety settings prevent wildfires, they also may result in additional outages for customers.



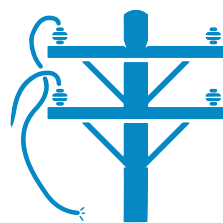

**California water agencies, farmers offer to conserve Colorado River water**

Farmers in America's largest growing region for winter vegetables are bracing for cuts in water supplies as anxiety mounts over the 2023 growing season. The Imperial Irrigation District, which delivers water from the Colorado River to farmers in the Imperial Valley, has joined other California water agencies in offering to take less water from the river between 2023 and 2026. Their offer to U.S. Bureau of Reclamation is a concession to protect water levels in the drought-impacted river and dangerously shallow Lake Mead.

**Hydroponics debate: Can crops raised without soil be organic?**

A debate is raging within the organic farming community over whether crops grown in hydroponics systems can be sold as organic. Two recent court rulings backed the U.S. Department of Agriculture's position that foods raised in hydroponic growing systems are eligible for organic certification. Some farmers argue that hydroponic crops cannot be organic because they are not grown in soil. A group of organic farms sued the USDA after officials refused to prohibit organic certification of hydroponic farms.

**Comment period extended for proposed organic livestock and poultry standards**

The public comment period has been extended on proposed changes to U.S. organic regulations for organic livestock and poultry production. A proposed rule, published Aug. 9, clarifies living conditions, healthcare, transportation and slaughter practices. Recommended changes would also establish indoor and outdoor space requirements and stocking-density limits for poultry. The USDA has extended the deadline for comments from farmers and the public to Nov. 10.

**Climate-smart farmers in California win grant awards from USDA**

Twenty California projects have received grants under the first pool of \$2.8 billion in funding from the USDA's Partnerships for Climate Smart Commodities program. The grants support efforts such as manure management to reduce methane emissions, regenerative farming practices for almonds and data collection for developing a national soil inventory. California grant recipients recently discussed individual climate-smart programs in a meeting of the California State Board of Food and Agriculture. ★

**CHP Receives Grant to Increase Safety for Motorcyclists**

**SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG)** - The California Highway Patrol (CHP) will implement a yearlong federal grant to help save lives and reduce the risk associated with riding a motorcycle.

The goal of the Get Educated and Ride Safe (GEARS) V grant is to decrease the number of motorcycle-involved crashes and victims through education and enforcement efforts across California through September 30, 2023.

From October 1, 2020, to September 30, 2021, there were 7,078 motorcycle-involved crashes resulting in 354 deaths and 6,400 injuries within CHP jurisdiction, an increase of 3 percent over the previous 12 months.

"Motorcycle riders are statistically more likely to be injured or killed when involved in a crash," said CHP Commissioner Amanda Ray. "In an effort to ensure every motorist reaches their destination safely, the CHP will continue to

use enforcement and non-enforcement strategies, including education and community engagement, to target the leading causes of traffic deaths."

During the grant period, the CHP will participate in traffic safety education efforts, such as

"May is Motorcycle Safety Awareness Month." These campaigns will promote the use of U.S. Department of Transportation-compliant helmets for all riders and raise driver awareness of sharing the road with motorcyclists. The CHP will also increase enforcement in areas with a high number of motorcycle-involved crashes, which resulted from speed, improper turns, and driving under the influence of alcohol and/or drugs.

Funding for this program was provided by a grant from the California Office of Traffic Safety, through the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration.

The mission of the CHP is to provide the highest level of Safety, Service, and Security. ★

**The Stock Market Continues to Convulse**

The stock market continues to convulse, making it about 11 months now since we've witnessed some sort of normalcy in the indexes.

The monetary tightening by the Federal Reserve to combat the worst inflation in 40 years is a causation for sure, but in addition to that, the restart of supply lines after the CoVid shutdowns, the unwillingness of many to get back to work after their generous unemployment bonuses and stimulus checks, the Ukraine war and wallet-crushing prices on many of the things people buy have also contributed. 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# California May Reallocate Shrinking Water Supply

While it's not yet formal policy, those who manage California's vast water system are edging toward a historic reallocation of the state's shrinking supply that could have a life-altering impact on its largest-in-the-nation agricultural industry.

For many years, farmers have used about 80% of the water diverted from rivers for human use, with the rest going to urban areas for drinking, watering lawns, maintaining swimming pools, taking showers, cooking and commercial or industrial use.

Prolonged drought has compelled all users to make do with less. However, the biggest loser has been the environment — free flows to maintain habitat for fish and other aquatic species — which generally gets about 50% of the total flow.

In recent years, federal judges have ordered cuts in agricultural water diversions to enforce the Endangered Species Act and the state Water Resources Control Board has moved in the same direction on an emergency basis due to drought. However, environmental groups want permanent habitat-enhancing reductions.

Former Gov. Jerry Brown and his successor, Gavin Newsom, have sought “voluntary agreements” by

which agricultural water agencies would curtail diversions to maintain river flows, but results have been scanty at best.

Without such agreements, the water board could implement mandatory reductions, but they would be viewed by farmers as an assault on their historic water rights and probably trigger massive legal battles.

The key principle in these conflicts is that water belongs to the public as a whole and must be put to “beneficial use,” as defined in a 1943 law that implemented a constitutional declaration passed by voters in 1928. The law commands authorities to prevent “waste or unreasonable use or unreasonable method of use of water...”

Environmentalists believe the constitution thus authorizes the state water board to curtail agricultural diversions for the protection of habitat, but the 1943 law also declares, “In the enactment of this code the Legislature does not intend thereby to effect any change in the law relating to water rights.”

That obvious legal dichotomy is the crux of the situation.

Whether, indeed, the state water board is gearing up for a showdown over water rights, some of which stretch back to the 19th century, is the subject of much speculation in water circles.

Early this year, water board chairman Joaquin Esquivel told a gathering of water officials, “We know we have to change the system. Water rights can be there as a tool to be able to manage supplies through

not just a drought but when

there is water again. Our water rights system can be there to facilitate decisions on projects and help us make decisions, or they can be a hindrance.”

While the water rights issue percolates in Northern California, there's a similar conflict underway in Southern California over how much water the state diverts from a severely threatened Colorado River.

California is legally entitled to 4.4 million acre-feet per year, with the vast majority of that going to the Imperial Irrigation District and other agricultural users, but the Colorado's flow has dropped dramatically.

The federal government demands that California and other states that draw from the river, principally Nevada and Arizona, reduce diversions by 2-to-4 million acre-feet per year, and threatens to mandate cuts under the “beneficial use” doctrine if they cannot agree.

California has offered a 400,000 acre-foot reduction, only 9%, but that's not enough to satisfy the other states and the outcome is very much in doubt. Meanwhile, the feds are offering Colorado water users \$400 for every acre-foot of water they don't take.

Farmers' water rights are clearly not as sacrosanct as they once seemed to be, and as drought persists the stage is being set for a monumental reckoning of some kind.

# SFD Brass Says Only Fat and White People are Religious

So many judges have proven to be corrupt that it was shocking to learn that a jurist ruled in favor of 21 fired San Francisco (SF) firefighters that refused the job. The city requested that the suit against it be dismissed thinking it had every right to force employees to end their lives.

According to the suit filed in June 2022 by attorney Heather Gibson all 21 firefighters were in good standing with the Fire Department and the city until October 13, 2021. That day was the deadline to submit to the untested, experimental, and deadly COVID job.

SF's smart firefighters that declined the job were “placed on unpaid leave and either constructively terminated and forced to retire or Commission Hearings were set with the goal of terminating those Plaintiffs who elected not to retire.”

Deranged leadership is nothing new for San Franciscans. On November 18, 1978, Jim Jones, the city's darling cult activist led more than 900 followers (300 children) in a mass homicide/suicide to “drink the Kool-Aide” (laced with cyanide and other poisons).

The vaccine mandate stated that the “Vaccination is the most effective way to prevent

transmission and limit COVID-19 hospitalizations and deaths.” However, it was known as early as June 2021 that the jabs did not perform as stated thereby removing any legitimacy for the mandate.

Incredibly, Fire Chief Jeanine Nicholson ordered the mandate to remain, took the job and then contracted Covid-19 in December of 2021. The Chief and 140 other department “sheep” were injected and became ill. Nicholson is a slow learner.

Competing for the Damaged DNA Pool, Fire Commission President Katherine Feinstein said that she would choose to drive herself to the hospital rather than be assisted by an unvaccinated firefighter. She is like the Pedwood types that promised to leave America if Trump was elected.

The firefighters have nine causes of action in their complaint against the city; violation of religious freedom; violation of bodily autonomy and privacy guaranteed by the California Constitution; violation of due process; retaliation and harassment.

The eighth cause alleges that Woke City made working conditions so intolerable for eight of the firefighters that they were forced to resign. The city posed degrading and invasive questions about the employees' religious beliefs and practices. The firefighters experienced constant harassment from superiors. Bosses even condoned and encouraged similar abuse coming from “compliant” employees.

The department brass considered those with religious beliefs to be “conspiracy theorists.” The “leaders” said that the resisters' religious beliefs “are only held by ‘fat’ and ‘white’ people.” Unvaccinated firefighters found yellow stars fixed to their locker doors analogous to Nazis marking the clothing of Jews as dirty disease-spreading vermin.

Regarding their privacy complaint, many citizens may not realize that there is a California Constitution. It actually guarantees “a person of adult years” a legally protected privacy interest, “in the exercise of control over his own body, to determine whether or not to submit to lawful medical treatment.” In response to the firefighters' privacy complaint, the city said the employees had the right to reject the vaccine and “seek employment elsewhere.” San Francisco is known both for its excrement and its arrogance.

Judge Richard B. Ulmer Jr. called the city's actions “coercive enough” to reject its request to dismiss the case. Judge Ulmer also found the firefighters' other causes to be valid and has granted them a jury trial.

In the midst of California's judicial darkness Ulmer brings the light of justice against the oppressors. But are there 12 righteous jurors to be found in the city?

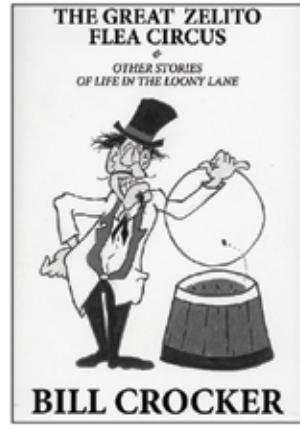

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## Federal Funding to Help California

**SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG)** - California has the green light to start using federal infrastructure funding to expand electric vehicle (EV) charging stations along the state's interstates and highways following the recent federal approval of a joint plan by Caltrans and California Energy Commission.

The U.S. Joint Office of Energy and Transportation's signoff on the California Deployment Plan for the National Electric Vehicle Infrastructure (NEVI) Program makes an initial \$56 million in funding available to install charging stations throughout the state. Funded by the federal Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act of 2021 (IIJA), California expects to receive a total of \$384 million for the program over the next five years. The federal funding will build on California's historic \$10 billion, multiyear investment to accelerate the transition to zero-emission vehicles by improving affordability and expanding charging infrastructure.

"Thanks to the Biden-Harris Administration's approval of California's NEVI plan, we can start putting historic levels of federal infrastructure funding to work to close gaps in our state highway system's evolving EV charging network and improve availability and reliability for low-income and rural residents," said California Transportation Secretary Toks Omishakin. "Coupled with unprecedented levels of state investments in zero-emission vehicles, this funding will help supercharge California's nation-leading efforts to drastically cut climate-changing pollution from the transportation sector."

The IIJA funds will add to efforts to complete a 6,600-mile statewide charging network and deploy 1.2 million chargers by 2030 to meet the anticipated charging

needs of the state's EV fleet.

"With this unprecedented federal investment, California can advance our vision of a unified network of charging stations along the state's busiest corridors," said California Energy Commission Commissioner Patty Monahan. "This new network will increase charging access, particularly in the rural areas of our state, and help EV drivers charge up on long trips."

The state's NEVI plan focuses on construction of fast-charging stations near interstates, U.S. routes and state routes throughout California. These charging stations will increase the availability of charging options, improve the reliability of the charging network and remove barriers to accessing EVs. NEVI funding will also support upgrades to existing infrastructure, charging stations' operation and maintenance costs, community and stakeholder engagement, workforce development, and related mapping and signage.

California surpassed one million zero-emission vehicles (ZEV) sold in 2021 and leads the country in all ZEV market metrics including the highest level of public funding, the largest EV market share percentage, and the most extensive public charging infrastructure. The success of the state's programs has led to ZEVs becoming a top export and has spurred major advances in manufacturing and job creation.

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# California Takes Action to Combat Illicit Cannabis Grows

**SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG)** - Taking aggressive action to protect communities, consumers and the environment alike, Gov. Gavin Newsom has directed the creation of a new multi-agency, cross-jurisdictional taskforce of enforcement agencies designed to better coordinate agencies combatting illegal cannabis operations and transnational criminal organizations.

This new “Unified Cannabis Enforcement Taskforce,” which has been actively working since late summer, is co-chaired by the Department of Cannabis Control (DCC) and the California Department of Fish and Wildlife (CDFW) and is being coordinated by the California Governor’s Office of Emergency Services (Cal OES) through its Homeland Security Division. The taskforce has been charged by the Governor to better align state efforts and increase enforcement coordination between state, local and federal partners.

“The State of California is committed to combatting illicit commercial cannabis activity which is causing pervasive harm to California communities, the environment, consumers and legal cannabis businesses,” said Nicole Elliott, Director of DCC.

“We cannot allow harmful, illicit cannabis operations to lay waste to the environment or threaten our communities,” said Mark Ghilarducci, Director of the Cal OES and the Governor’s Homeland Security Advisor. “We are bringing together the combined law enforcement resources of our state, local and federal agencies in a coordinated enforcement action against these bad actors and criminal organizations.”

“California has an abundance of public lands set aside for conservation, recreational use and the enjoyment of the people of this state,” said CDFW Director Charlton H. Bonham. “Unfortunately, criminal organizations are impacting these areas by exploiting some of our most pristine public lands and wildlife habitats as grow sites for cannabis.”

Since its inception, the taskforce has been actively coordinating with federal, state, local and tribal agencies to disrupt this illegal market, including: Combatting

the non-linear threat of transnational crime that extends to areas of California beyond the border and into some of most rural parts of the state. Establishing a new data sharing agreement which allows state and local enforcement officials to more broadly share information and cross-match data across jurisdictions. Leveraging and better aligning the authorities and legal provisions of federal, state and local law enforcement and regulatory agencies in conducting search warrants, indictments and maximizing arrests and prosecution of perpetrators, while also maximizing administrative, regulatory and civil penalties for bad actors. Disrupting human traffickers and illegal firearm and drug smugglers. Interdicting illegal cannabis shipments crossing California’s borders. Coordinating with local police chiefs, sheriffs and federal officials to deploy personnel and equipment where needed.

By investigating, removing and reclaiming illegal grow sites as well as shutting down illegal manufacturing, distribution and retail operations, and by apprehending and applying meaningful repercussions to offenders and traffickers, state, local and federal law enforcement agencies are protecting consumer and public safety, safeguarding the environment, and depriving illegal cannabis operators and transnational criminal organizations of illicit revenue that undercuts the regulated cannabis market in California.

Large scale, illicit outdoor cannabis cultivation can be harmful to the environment. Non-compliant cultivation sites can negatively affect wildlife, vegetation, water, soil, and other natural resources when they utilize chemicals, fertilizers and terracing, and even poach local wild animals. Illicit cannabis cultivation results in the chemical contamination and alteration of watersheds, diversion of natural water courses, elimination of native vegetation, wildfire hazards, poaching of wildlife and harmful disposal of garbage, non-biodegradable materials and human waste.

Untested cannabis products also pose safety hazards to consumers, while all illegal activity undercuts the regulated market and hurts licensed cannabis business owners. ★

# Student Test Scores Plunge

nicknamed the Nation's Report Card, revealed an unprecedented score dive among a sampling of students nationwide.

Gov. Gavin Newsom swiftly issued a press release headlined "California outperforms most states in minimizing learning loss..." Various state officials credited the state's investments in summer school and other recovery efforts for minimizing the blow to pupils. Yet the national test, in contradiction to the state test, indicated that the achievement gap among students of color widened in California.

"California focused on keeping kids safe during the pandemic," Newsom said in a statement, "while making record investments to mitigate learning loss and transforming our education system."

The test upon which the Nation's Report Card is based is older and was given to only about 4,000 California students, while the state's Smarter Balanced tests are administered every spring to virtually all Californians in grades three through eight and grade eleven. The states set those tests, prompting some criticism that

they encourage "teaching to the test". The goal of those Smarter Balanced tests: to measure how well students have mastered the state's Common Core standards.

The initial reluctance of state officials to promptly share the Smarter Balanced test data raised questions about whether elected state schools superintendent Tony Thurmond and others were trying to minimize the impact of bad news landing before voters cast November ballots.

"Democrat policies get an F," Senate GOP leader Scott Wilk of Lancaster declared in a statement. "It is no wonder these scores were kept under lock and key. They are a clear referendum on the failed policies advocated by the governor, legislative leaders, and the state superintendent of public instruction for years – not just during the pandemic. After shuttering schools for the better part of two years, student failure is on steroids."

In spring of 2020, the first year of the pandemic, the state canceled its testing. In 2021, only one in four eligible students took the tests because not all students were back on campuses. In 2022, nearly all

eligible students participated, making these results a key data point for understanding widespread pandemic-triggered learning loss in California.

There had been concern that the pandemic would completely undercut California's efforts to close a persistent achievement gap among certain groups of students. The results show that all students and economically disadvantaged students dropped the same 4 percentage points in English language arts, although that leaves economically disadvantaged students lagging their peers, with just 35% meeting standards. The rates for English learners and students with disabilities both dropped less than a single percentage point, from 12.8% to 12.5% and 16% to 15% respectively.

For math, rates for economically disadvantaged students actually dropped slightly less than the average drop for all students, falling 6 percentage points but still resulting in an abysmal 21% meeting standards. English learners went from 13% to 10%. Students with disabilities went from 13% to 11%.

When separated by grade level, third-grade students saw the largest drops in both subjects. In 2019,

48.5% of third graders met English language arts standards. Compare that to 42.2% in 2022, a 6.4 percentage-point decline. For math, the rate for third graders meeting standards dropped by 6.7 percentage points.

Megan Bacigalupi is the executive director of CA Parent Power, a parent advocacy group that rallied parents to fight for school reopenings earlier in the pandemic. She said these scores aren't just the reckoning for prolonged school closures but a wake-up call for parents. California's test scores were always abysmal, and they couldn't afford to sink any lower, she said.

"We're not a state that's performing well, so for kids to backslide... We were never in a good place," Bacigalupi said. "What I hope is eye-opening to parents is that, guess what, prior to all this, our kids weren't doing that well."

The Local Control Funding Formula gives additional money to school districts and charter schools for their English learners, foster children and students from low-income households. Districts with high percentages of students who fall into at least one of these student groups get an additional pot

of money called a "concentration grant."

The state's funding model also gives districts more control over how they spend their money. Lance Christensen, who's running against incumbent state superintendent Tony Thurmond, said the state needs to play an even smaller role.

"The state has done enough to destroy our kids' education," he said. "I think the state needs fewer education programs and more getting out of the way."

But this surge of funding won't last forever. And the recent increases to state education funding might not be enough to make up for the disappearance of the federal money.

Bacigalupi, the parent advocate, said there's been little explanation to parents when it comes to how districts are spending this money. She said the lack of transparency has been an alarming trend throughout the pandemic, from the rationale behind prolonged school closures, to even the release of these test scores.

"It's a pattern that parents are very aware of when it comes to public education," Bacigalupi said. ★

## Veterans and Suicide General Tree Squirrel Season Underway

Veterans Day, November 11th, is an important day for every American and is intended to honor America's veterans for their patriotism, love for their country, and willingness to serve and sacrifice for the common good. This day of remembrance celebrates the service of all U.S. military veterans. Communities across the country plan events to honor those who have served and are currently serving. As we celebrate and recognize these brave men and women, we should also consider the struggles that they go through with mental illness.

Suicide is a national problem in the U.S. and a major concern for active-duty service members and military veterans. Members of the military may experience a variety of difficult and traumatic events including combat, natural disasters, and physical assault. According to the 2022 National Veteran Suicide Prevention Annual Report, there were 6,146 Veteran suicide deaths in 2020. That is 31.7 deaths per 100,000. During that year, suicide was the second leading cause of death among Veterans under age 45. The suicide rate for Veterans was 57.3% greater than for non-Veteran U.S. adults.

Veterans can come home from service carrying a weight they did not go in with. Without the right help, that weight can seem like too much, leading some Veterans to consider, or carry out, suicide. Some of the warning signs that Veterans exhibit include feelings of hopelessness, acting agitated, struggling with

anxiety, insomnia, outburst of anger or rage, an increase in substance use or abuse, and isolating themselves from the people close to them. Other factors related to the higher risk of suicide among Veterans are related to undiagnosed or untreated conditions, such as PTSD or mood disorders, which can increase a person's overall risk of suicide.

The VA offers a wide range of treatment programs for Veterans and their families. Also, "Vets for Warriors" is a peer support network with Veterans answering the phone for those in need. The number is 1-855-838-8255. Veterans may also use the Veterans Crisis Line Number where there is 24/7 crisis support. Dial 988, then press 1.

The Jason Foundation is another valuable resource for those struggling with suicidal ideation. Many times, a Veteran will exhibit clear warning signs prior to an attempt. By knowing the warning signs, and knowing how to help, you could save a life. ### CDFW News Release

**SACRAMENTO REGION, CA (MPG)** - California's 2022-2023 general tree squirrel season is open from Saturday, Sept. 10, 2022, through Sunday, Jan. 29, 2023.

Tree squirrels may be taken only in open zones during the open season and in observance of the shooting hours for resident small game, which is one half hour before sunrise to one half hour after sunset. A map of the state's tree squirrel hunt zones can be found on the California Department of Fish and Wildlife (CDFW) website, along with the full tree squirrel regulations.

Four types of tree squirrels are game species in California. The Western gray squirrel and the Douglas squirrel are both native to California while the Eastern fox squirrel and the Eastern gray squirrel have been introduced and not native to the state. These tree squirrels can be hunted under authority of a hunting license in California and no other validations are required. To learn more about how to hunt for these squirrels and their distributions, habitat and patterns, watch the "Hunting California Tree Squirrels" recorded webinar on CDFW's YouTube channel.

A fifth species of tree

squirrel, the Northern flying squirrel, is not a game species and may not be taken. Northern flying squirrels are small tree squirrels that are native to the boreal forests of North America and can be found as far south as the Sierra Nevada. They are seldom encountered due to their nocturnal nature and preference for mature forest habitats with complex canopy structure.

Tree squirrel population levels fluctuate from year to year based on prevailing weather conditions and the annual production of nuts, acorns and seeds for forage.

National forests provide some of the best opportunity to hunt tree squirrels in California. Bureau of Land Management lands and CDFW wildlife areas may also provide opportunity for squirrel hunting. As a friendly reminder, nonlead shot is required when taking any wildlife with a firearm anywhere in California.

#### Brief Project Description:

The County of Yuba is soliciting proposals from qualified, professional consulting firms to undertake a Biological Resource Report and/or, dependent on the project budget, the preparation of the entire Environmental Assessment under NEPA for a roadside fuel reduction project that will address 45.7 centerline miles of rural roads in the forested portions of the Sierra foothills of Yuba County. This project includes 18 road segments serving a total of seven at-risk communities.

The 18 road segments proposed for fuel reduction include the following: Baker Road (from Garden Valley to end), Youngs Hill Road (Entire Length), La Porte Road (Woodleaf Tunnel Road to Oregon Hill Road), La Porte Road (Scale Road to Barton Hill Road), Marysville Road (Moonshine Road to SR 49), Frenchtown Dobbins Road (Entire Length), Frenchtown Road (Willow Glen Road to Frenchtown-Dobbins Road), Oregon Hill Road (Marysville Road to Moran Road), Mountain House Road (Cleveland Avenue to County Line), Challenge Cutoff Road (County line to La Porte Road), Indiana Ranch Road (Indiana Ranch Road to Forsythe Road), Indiana School Road (Indiana Ranch Road to Marysville Road), Pendola Road (Garden Valley Road to Old Camptonville Road), and Cleveland Avenue (SR 49 to Mountain House Road).

The goals of the project are to create fuel breaks along County roadways, reduce fire spread to structures and/or natural resources, allow access for fire-fighting equipment, and to provide safe evacuation routes for residents. Currently, trees on either side of the roads encroach to the point where the canopies extend over the roads and vegetation encroaches up to the edge of the roadways, allowing fires to cross the roadways easily while also impeding ingress and egress to at-risk communities. This project would also benefit the potable water systems in Brownsville and Camptonville, and would help protect and preserve access to the airport adjacent to La Porte Road in Brownsville. This roadside fuel reduction project will benefit the residents of hundreds of habitable structures.

# Parents Arrested on Multiple Felonies for Incident on School Grounds

LINDHURST, CA (MPG) - On September 28, 2022, around 1 pm, Yuba County Sheriff Deputies responded to Lindhurst High School regarding several juveniles fighting. During the fight, one juvenile sustained injuries that

required treatment at a hospital. In hearing about the fight, the parents of the injured juvenile, James Renshaw Sr. and Tabitha Heidebreider, came to the school.

Renshaw Sr. entered the front office and immediately began assaulting the principal, who was able to defend

himself until deputies arrived. Renshaw Sr. was arrested for the assault, and school staff advised that Heidebreider had left. Deputies went to their residence with a search warrant, located a firearm and confirmed the weapon was brought on school grounds by the parents. The firearm was determined to

be self-manufactured and with no serial number affixed (commonly referred to as a ghost gun). Both Renshaw Sr. and Heidebreider were confirmed to be felons and prohibited from possessing firearms. They were arrested and booked in the Yuba County Jail for the following: Child Endangerment; Felon in

possession of a firearm; Carrying a concealed firearm within a vehicle; Carrying a loaded firearm in a public place; Felon in possession of Ammunition; Possession of a weapon on a school campus; Manufacturing or assembling a firearm; Assault on a school employee (Renshaw Sr. only). ★

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# Center Defense Overpowers Marysville for Senior Night Win

ANTELOPE, CA (MPG) - The Marysville Indians' three-game win streak in the Pioneer Valley League was snapped by the Center Cougars in a 20-0 loss on Thursday, October 20.

The Center (5-4, 2-4 PVL) defense shut down the Marysville (6-3, 3-2 PVL) offense, which came into the game averaging 286 yards with their Wing-T based offense.

Indians head coach Will Claggett told the Dispatch that the Cougars were more physical than Marysville.

"They were strong at the point of attack," Claggett told the Dispatch.

He added the schemes Center did were what the Indians saw in the previous two games against Bear River and Wheatland, but the Cougars made Marysville struggle to get any type of push on the offensive side of the ball.

The Indians defense, who came in averaging 18 points allowed per game, kept Marysville in the thick of things. The first quarter was a defensive battle as the game was scoreless at the end of the first. Indians senior outside linebacker Maddox Marino intercepted Center quarterback Elias Bonds on the Cougars first possession of the game.

Center got on the scoreboard in the second quarter when senior running back Benny Tafoya scored the first of his two rushing touchdowns on the night from the two-yard line. Marysville punted three times and had one turnover on downs in the first half.

The Cougars attempted a 47-yard field goal to end

the first half, but the kick was well short to keep the lead 7-0 at the end of the first half.

Center started with the ball in the second half and faced a long third down on their opening possession, but Bonds threw a 54-yard screen pass to Tafoya that put the Cougars in great scoring position. Tafoya added his second rushing touchdown of the night from the two-yard line to extend the Center lead to 14 halfway through the third quarter.

The Indians had a good drive going on the next position until senior running back Danny Lanini fumbled and gave the ball back to the Cougars. Bonds then threw a long

touchdown pass that extended the lead to 20 after a missed extra point attempt.

Marysville only had two offensive possessions in the second half due to Center having long possessions that ate a lot of time off the clock. Indians senior defensive tackle Jack Howsley reiterated the message his coach told the Dispatch about physicality.

"They beat us on the line, pushed us around and schemed it up good," Howsley said.

Marysville was projected as the fourth seed in the CIF Sac-Joaquin Section Division VI playoffs, according to MaxPreps on October 16.

The Indians final game is against Twelve Bridges next Friday, October 28 and will be for second place in the PVL. Twelve Bridges was projected as the seventh seed in the CIF SJS Division 6 playoffs in the latest MaxPreps rankings. The Indians game versus the Raging Rhinos is also the last home game for Marysville, which is Senior Night.

Howsley told the Dispatch that Marysville needs to have a great week at practice.

"The most important thing is to be brothers, keep balling and don't quit on each other," Howsley said.

Claggett told the Dispatch that he wants

everyone to enjoy the environment.

"At our home field, we're very close to the fans to begin with," Claggett said.

Claggett added that Senior Night is a good time

for the players to reflect on their time as an Indians football player, but when the warm-ups begin, it will be time to lock in.

Kickoff in Marysville is scheduled for 7 p.m. ★

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
