## California Gets Green Light for EV Charging Network

### Caltrans and CEC Joint News Release

SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) - California has the green light to start using federal infrastructure funding to expand electric vehicle (EV) charging stations along the state's interstates and highways following the recent federal approval of a joint plan by Caltrans and California Energy Commission.

The U.S. Joint Office of Energy and Transportation's signoff on the California Deployment Plan for the National Electric Vehicle Infrastructure (NEVI) Program makes an initial \$56 million in funding available to install charging stations throughout the state. Funded by the federal Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act of 2021 (IIJA), California expects to receive a total of \$384 million for the program over the next five years. The federal funding will build on California's historic \$10 billion, multi-year investment to accelerate the transition to zero-emission vehicles by improving affordability and expanding charging infrastructure.

"Thanks to the Biden-Harris Administration's approval of California's NEVI plan, we can start putting historic levels of federal infrastructure funding to work to close gaps in our state highway system's evolving EV charging network and improve availability and reliability for low-income and rural residents," said California Transportation Secretary Toms Omishakin. "Coupled with unprecedented levels of state investments in zero-emission vehicles, this funding will help supercharge California's nation-leading efforts to drastically cut climate-changing pollution from the transportation sector."

The IIJA funds will add to efforts to complete a 6,600-mile statewide charging network and deploy 1.2 million chargers by 2030 to meet the anticipated charging needs of the state's EV fleet.

"With this unprecedented federal investment, California can advance our vision of a unified network of charging stations along the state's busiest corridors," said California Energy Commission Commissioner Patty Monahan. "This new network will increase

charging access, particularly in the rural areas of our state, and help EV drivers charge up on long trips.” The state’s NEVI plan focuses on construction of fast-charging stations near interstates, U.S. routes and state routes throughout California. These charging

stations will increase the availability of charging options, improve the reliability of the charging network and remove barriers to accessing EVs. NEVI funding will also support upgrades to existing infrastructure, charging stations’ operation and maintenance costs, community and stakeholder

engagement, workforce development, and related mapping and signage. California surpassed one million zero-emission vehicles (ZEV) sold in 2021 and leads the country in all ZEV market metrics including the highest level of public funding, the largest EV market share percentage,

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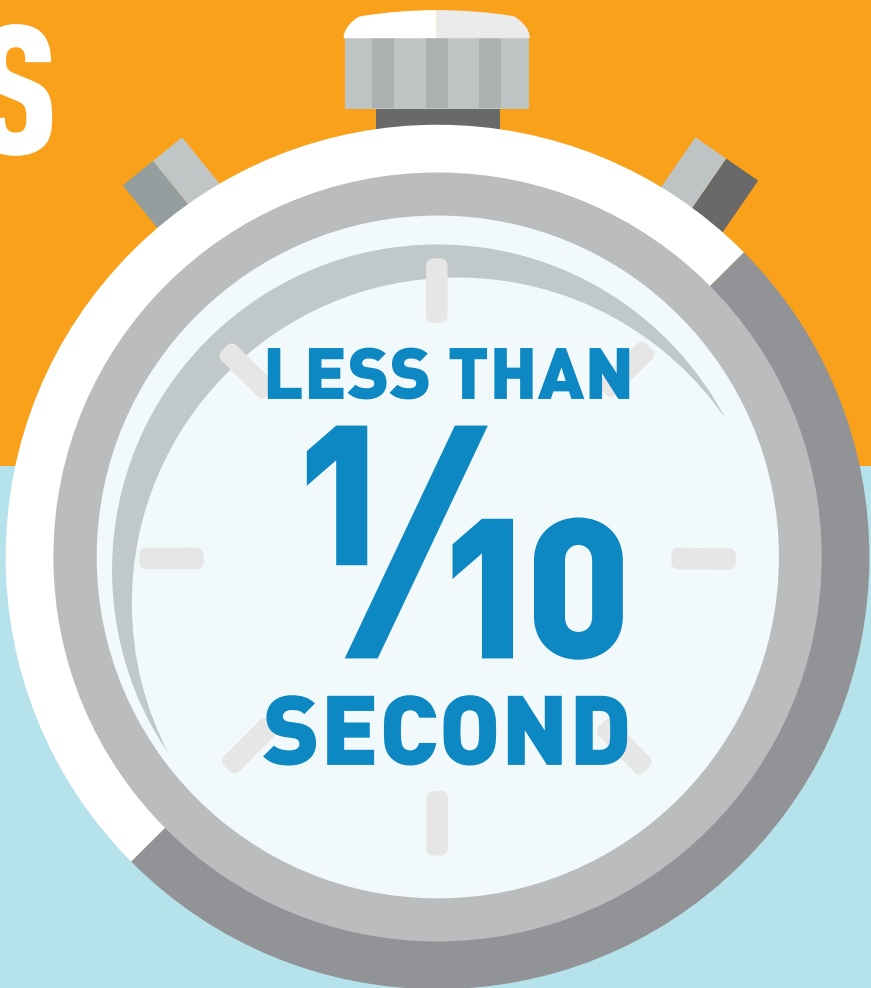

# HOW THE COMMUNITY WILDFIRE SAFETY PROGRAM IS HELPING TO PREVENT WILDFIRES IN 2022




PG&E’s Community Wildfire Safety Program (CWSP) will continue to use Enhanced Powerline Safety Settings following the success of its pilot program. Enhanced safety settings allow PG&E to be more surgical in its approach to preventing wildfires. These settings will automatically turn off power within one-tenth of a second if an object comes in contact with a powerline. This approach is just one part of a multifaceted wildfire strategy which includes:

- **Undergrounding 175 miles of powerlines** in high fire-threat areas as part of our multi-year goal of 10,000 miles.
- **Strengthening the electric grid** with stronger poles and covered lines to reduce wildfire risks.
- **Installing microgrids** that use generators to keep the electricity on during wildfire safety outages.

While these safety settings prevent wildfires, they also may result in additional outages for customers.

These enhanced safety settings will automatically turn off power within one-tenth of a second if an object such as a tree comes in contact with a powerline.



# Sutter County Ready to Offer Electronic Vital Records

**SUTTER COUNTY, CA (MPG)** - Governor Newsom signed Senate Bill 876 last night, September 28th which allows California County Recorders the option to deliver certified electronic versions of birth, death, and marriage records in place of paper-based certificates.

Sutter County is on target to be the first county in California to offer this service, said Sutter County Clerk-Recorder Donna Johnston, whose advocacy for use of secure blockchain digital technology in 2018 was the impetus for the change in the law.

“Having the opportunity to have an electronic birth, death, or marriage certificate delivered electronically to customers would have been extremely beneficial during the pandemic,” noted Johnston. “Thankfully, with the bill now becoming law, our customers will experience a higher level of service in a safe, effective, and expedited manner.”

The bill amends California Health and Safety Code section 103526.5 and now allows all County Recorders the authority and option to issue certified copies of birth, death, and marriage records by means of blockchain technology. California has modeled this after the success of the state of Nevada’s use of this technology in Nevada County Recorder offices.

Currently, if a customer is unable to make a request in person at the Recorder’s office, they will request via mail or fax. The Recorders office will then mail the certified copies of marriage certificates on secure banknote paper with a wet signature. This whole process takes on average 10 to 20 days from the initial request to the customer receiving the document. This can impact the start of Social Security benefits, veteran’s benefits, pension benefits, or any situation where official documentation birth, death, and marriage are required.

This legislation began when Johnston advocated for electronic delivery of vitals as President of the County Recorder’s Association of California (CRAC) in 2018. Previous attempts to pass legislation for electronic copies of such records were halted because of security concerns,

but this time a working group was created at the state level to vet the blockchain technology. Johnston worked with CRAC, who sponsored the bill, and Senate Majority Leader Emeritus Robert Hertzberg (Los Angeles), and has testified at legislative hearings from a Recorder’s perspective in support of the bill.

Requests for the certificates will not change. Customers can request and pay for the requested certificate and will have the option of receiving it as a traditional paper certificate, or an electronic certificate which includes an authentication page. This two-page electronic certificate will be delivered via email to the customer who can then forward it to the requesting agency. The requesting agency can then verify the certificate through the blockchain using the information contained on the authentication page. An added benefit to the customer purchasing the electronic certificate is that it can be reused, stopping the need to purchase additional copies of the paper certificate.

This process is more secure than the traditional current method of paper certification which can theoretically be forged, due the nature of a decentralized computer network working together to protect the authenticity of the transaction.

Washoe County in Nevada has successful distributed over 4,500 digital marriage certificates to customers since implementing blockchain technology in 2018. Certificates are delivered within minutes – not just in the United States, but to destinations such as Spain, Canada, and Asian countries. Agencies that have accepted the electronically certified marriage record from Washoe County includes the Social Security Administration, the Department of Motor Vehicles, cruise lines, veteran’s benefits offices, and other offices that need proof of marriage. Additional Nevada counties have begun using blockchain technology to increase services to their customers.

The electronic certificates will be available at the Sutter County Clerk-Recorder beginning January 1, 2023, when the law becomes effective. The office will offer customers the option of a paper-based certificate in addition to the electronic certificate for a few months to introduce the new process. ★

# Plumas Lake Native Builds on Seabees 80-year Legacy

**GULFPORT, MS (MPG)** - Since 1942, sailors assigned to the U.S. Navy’s Construction Force have been building and fighting around the world. Construction Apprentice Felicia Elms, a Plumas Lake, California, native is one of those sailors.

“I hope to be a good example to my daughters by being in the Navy,” said Elms. “The Navy sets high stands of values to live by. I joined to make a path for my daughters to look up to.”

Eighty years ago, members of Navy Construction Battalions were fittingly nicknamed, “Seabees,” a play on the C and B initials. They are responsible for building military bases and airfields, supporting humanitarian efforts and conducting underwater construction projects.

Elms, a 2006 Maysville High School graduate, currently serves as a builder with Naval

Construction Training Center at the headquarters for naval construction forces in Gulfport, Mississippi.

“I would like to thank my mother because she has been my support system, has written me letters every day and is always a phone call away,” said Elms. “I also thank God for taking me this far. Without him, I would not have the strength to get where I am today.”

According to Elms, the values required to succeed in the Navy are similar to those found in Plumas Lake.

“I learned in my hometown that connections and community can determine a successful experience,” said Elms. “My mom has always taught me to have confidence and to strive to reach my dreams because anything is possible. This has gotten me through each test and emotional moments.”

Serving in the Navy means Elms is part of a team that is taking on new importance in America’s focus on strengthening alliances, modernizing capabilities, increasing capacities and maintaining military readiness in support of the National Defense Strategy.

“The Navy is present all around the world and ready to defend at sea and on land to keep us safe,” said Elms.

With more than 90 percent of all trade traveling by sea, and 95 percent of the world’s international phone and internet traffic carried through fiber optic cables lying on the

ocean floor, Navy officials continue to emphasize the importance of accelerating America’s advantage at sea.

“Maintaining the world’s best Navy is an investment in the security and prosperity of the United States, as well as the stability of our world,” said Adm. Mike Gilday, Chief of Naval Operations. “The U.S. Navy – forward deployed and integrated with all elements of national power – deters conflict, strengthens our alliances and partnerships, and guarantees free and open access to the world’s oceans. As the United States responds to the security environment through integrated deterrence, our Navy must continue to deploy forward and campaign with a ready, capable, combat-credible fleet.”

Elms and the sailors they serve with have many opportunities to achieve accomplishments during their military service.

“I am most proud of being promoted, becoming a fire team leader and having held the top of my class since we started at the school house,” said Elms.

As Elms and other sailors continue to train and perform missions, they take pride in continuing an 80-year legacy and serving their country in the United States Navy.

“The Navy is a family of sailors who have created a path of direction that is visible to my two daughters,” added Elms. ★

# COLONEL NICOLL GALBRAITH

Nicoll F. Galbraith was born in 1896 and entered the Army on April 6, 1917. He was a major in 1940 when he was sent to the Philippines to command the 24th Field Artillery Regiment, a Philippine Scouts unit. This assignment was monumental in the distinguished and somewhat traumatic military career that followed.

Immediately following the bombing of Pearl Harbor on December 7, 1941, Galbraith, now a lieutenant colonel, was caught in the maelstrom of the Japanese invasion of the Philippines. He was serving on Major General Jonathan Wainwright’s staff as the

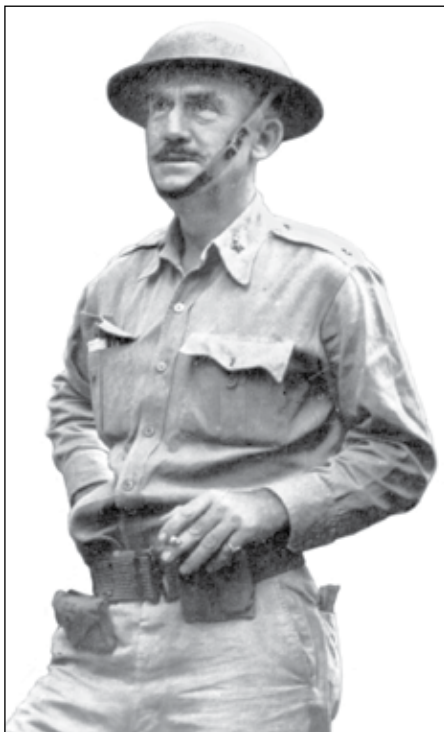
logistics officer. Galbraith was a full colonel in March 1942 when General Douglas MacArthur was forced to retreat to the island of Corregidor and then to Australia. With MacArthur’s departure, Major General Wainwright was promoted to Lieutenant General and became Commander of Allied forces in the Philippines with Colonel Galbraith at his side. Wainwright and Galbraith were on Corregidor when the Japanese attacked on May 5. On May 6, Wainwright decided to surrender his dirty, hungry, and exhausted troops to Japanese General Masaharu Homma. However, contacting the Japanese general was difficult, and

the surrender process proved to be very messy and confusing.

Negotiations stalled when Homma demanded the capitulation of all the guerrilla forces in the Philippines, including those still resisting elsewhere. Communication with these far-flung units was difficult. Someone had to physically locate these units and convince them the war was over for them. Colonel Galbraith was directed to accompany a small group of Japanese soldiers to complete this nearly impossible task. Galbraith and his Japanese captors crossed battle lines numerous times during the next six weeks in search of men who did not want to be found. When the surrender agreement was finally signed, Galbraith was left exhausted and malnourished.

Colonel Galbraith and fellow officers were shipped off to a prisoner of war camp in Formosa, modern-day Taiwan, where they spent the next eighteen harsh and tedious months with British and Commonwealth prisoners. Food and soap were in short supply. Rice was the diet, but there was never enough. Garden snails were a delicacy. Beatings were frequent, often for no discernable reason. Wainwright was beaten for using the wrong door.

Colonel Galbraith was released at the end of the war and was reunited with his wife and their three children. In 1946 Colonel Galbraith rejoined Wainwright at Fort Sam Houston where he was awarded a Silver Star for his actions in the Philippines. He

retired from the Army in 1950 and passed away in 1986.

Colonel Galbraith’s son Colonel Nicoll Galbraith Jr. served in Desert Storm, was a Modesto, California, thoracic surgeon, and financed the construction of the museum’s second building. Colonel Galbraith’s display may be viewed in glass case marked 59. ★

# New Laws Trade One Gerrymander for Another

California once had a history of epic political and legal battles over redrawing legislative and congressional districts after each decennial census.

The Legislature, dominated then as now by Democrats, would create maps that enhanced the party's prospects of gaining, or at least holding, power and if the governor was a Democrat, the gerrymandered districts would become law.

That happened after the 1980 census when then-Gov. Jerry Brown signed redistricting bills that were especially one-sided. The late Congressman Phil Burton, who largely drew weirdly shaped, but highly partisan, congressional maps called them "my contribution to modern art."

The initial set of maps was challenged by Republicans via referendum and voters rejected them, but Democratic legislators and Brown simply passed slightly amended versions.

However, if the governor happened to be a Republican, he would veto the Democrats' maps and the state Supreme Court would step into the impasse and appoint a special master to draw replacement maps that tended to favor neither party. It happened under Republican Gov. Ronald Reagan after the 1970 census

and 20 years later under GOP Gov. Pete Wilson.

A twist on the process occurred after the 2000 census. Although a Democrat, Gray Davis, was governor, leaders of both parties agreed on what amounted to a bipartisan gerrymander, freezing in place the partisan status quo in the Legislature and congressional delegation. An indirect threat that the Republican-led U.S. Justice Department would thwart a Democratic gerrymander forced the compromise.

The obvious self-interest of Capitol politicians dictating the shape of legislative and congressional districts ultimately sparked a backlash — a 2008 ballot measure to shift legislative redistricting to a 14-member commission of five Democrats, five Republicans and four declined-to-state independents. Two years later, voters extended the commission's authority to congressional districts.

The professional politicians in both parties didn't like losing their authority. Democrats were particularly unhappy since they had legislative majorities and the national party tried to thwart having the commission change congressional districts.

Nevertheless, the commission drew new districts after the 2010 and 2020 censuses and while their maps may have been imperfect, they more fairly captured the population's very diverse makeup.

So if it's a good idea at the state level, why not for local governments, such as city councils, county boards of supervisors and school boards, which are just as prone to self-interested redistricting?

In 2016, the Legislature

decreed that a 14-member commission would redraw districts of Los Angeles County's five-member Board of Supervisors. A year later, virtually identical legislation was passed for San Diego County and this year, clones were enacted that affect Fresno, Riverside and Kern counties.

All five measures, however, deviate significantly from the state model of even-handed party representation. They require that county redistricting commissioners reflect the partisan makeup of each county's registered voters.

That means Democrats dominate the Los Angeles and San Diego commissions and will do so in Fresno and Riverside counties as well. Republicans have a slight voter registration edge in Kern County, however.

In effect, therefore, these county redistricting commissions are being stacked to enhance the power of the dominant local party — exactly contrary to the party-neutral intent of the state commission.

Sponsors of the local bills said they were needed to prevent county supervisors from gerrymandering their own districts. But as constituted, the local commissions will be empowered to create gerrymanders of a different kind.

Institutionalizing party control of local redistricting also further undermines California's historic commitment to non-partisan local government. That's not progress.

# Appellate Judges Endorse Measure A Deception

God expects judges on the earth to decide court cases just as He would make the decisions. When judges show partiality or bias in a matter, then these jurists become a mockery to be cursed by the people. (See Isaiah 10:1-3, Ps 82:2, Eccl 3:16).

The 3rd District Court of Appeal is held in disdain by more than 7-thousand Yuba County voters that opposed Measure K.

In November 2018, Yuba County Supervisors placed Measure K on the ballot to increase sales taxes. They both described and promoted K as funds needed for public safety. Depicting K as a special tax necessitated a 2/3rds voter approval. However, the ballot ordinance was deceptively drafted saying that for approval K only needed a simple majority.

Just 53% (7,964) of voters agreed to raise taxes on themselves. Supervisors and bureaucrats celebrated their ruse all the way to the bank. Yuba County government now takes \$6-7 million more from economically-stressed residents annually.

However, after the vote, local opponents and the Howard Jarvis Taxpayers Association filed suit in Yuba County Superior Court. The County's attorneys argued that they could bait and switch - promote the tax for public safety and yet use the funds for any purpose.

September 9, 2019, Yuba County Judge Stephen Berrier invalidated the Measure K win and the resulting tax

saying County officials needed a 2/3rds approval. This ruling complied with law made by the voters when passing both Prop 13 and 218.

County officials then sought relief with the 3rd District Court of Appeal. Three appellate justices overruled Judge Berrier's decision July 22, 2021. Their decision undermined current law by re-defining special taxes versus general taxes in the above noted propositions.

(Since 1978, politicians and bureaucrats have sought to overthrow the will of the people regarding how new taxes are passed or assessed. They have used legislation, propositions and court cases to take more money. A recent example is the slim passage of Proposition 19. It removed property tax protections when one generation gifts their assets to their children or grandchildren. Today, these properties are re-assessed with egregious tax increases -- the latest government scam. Local Assemblyman James Gallagher endorsed Prop 19.)

The three appellate judges ignored the people's will in the law to instead garner government's favor. Vance Raye authored the decision to overturn Berrier's decision. Louis Mauro and Jonathan Renner concurred.

However, just ten months after the Measure K reversal presiding Justice Raye left office in May 2022. He was ordered by the Commission for Judicial Performance to retire or be removed. Basically, the Commission found Raye lazy, incompetent and guilty of misconduct.

"Raye entered into a stipulation agreement with Director-Chief Counsel Gregory Dresser to resolve the pending preliminary investigation by agreeing to public admonishment, to retire, and not to serve in a

judicial capacity, subordinate judicial officer, or judge pro tem with any court in the State of California, or accept a reference of work from any California state court, at any time after June 1, 2022."

Both Raye and Justice Louis Mauro were also accused in 1991 by family court watchdogs and whistleblowers of creating and concealing a RICO racketeering enterprise operating in the Sacramento County family law court system.

Attorneys were recruited to act as Pro-Tem judges in family court to relieve the judges of the family court case load. It was alleged that "in exchange for operating the settlement conference program - which results in coerced divorce case settlements and significantly reduces the caseload and administrative duties of full-time judges - the attorneys receive kick-backs in the form of "rubber-stamped" court orders and other preferential treatment when representing clients in court."

Today, as an outcome of the unjust Measure K reversal, Sutter County added Measure A (raise sales taxes by 1%) to the November 8, 2022 ballot. The Sutter campaign uses the same illegal "bait and switch" maneuvers as Yuba County, the deception now endorsed by the appeal ruling.

Sutter County is using hundreds of thousands of tax dollars to wage a media campaign to deceive voters to pay more taxes. The bait is public safety. However, millions of dollars will then be taken annually for a bigger government.

The Supervisors and their hired barkers are lying to you. Vote No on Measure A.

# FBI Field Office Warns of Scammers Posing as FBI Agents

## Sacramento FBI Field Office

**SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG)** - The Federal Bureau of Investigation Sacramento Field Office (FBI Sacramento) is cautioning the public to be wary of any unsolicited call, especially if the caller claims to be from the FBI.

"Nothing sends a person into a panic like a call from law enforcement, especially when the call informs them that they have been a victim of a crime or may be wanted for a crime," explained Acting Special Agent in Charge Dennis Guertin. "Sadly, that response is something scammers are leveraging with increased frequency, so it is important to educate the public about what to look out for."

Scammers are sophisticated and any unsolicited call, text or email can be a path for a scammer to attempt to gain your trust and separate you from

your hard-earned money. To ensure your security and safety:

Never click on links contained in unsolicited emails or texts. The links may route you to fake websites or deploy malicious software on your phone or computer; Never trust the caller ID number; the displayed telephone number can be manipulated with software; Never be afraid to hang up on an unsolicited caller; Always consider sending unsolicited phone calls to voicemail. Most scam call centers will not leave a message; Always check the email address of seemingly official communications and feel free to reach out to your bank or credit card company directly by calling the telephone number on the back of your card to verify if the email is legitimate.

Some scammers impersonate FBI agents over the phone. "The public should not be afraid to hang up on an alleged agent. An

authentic FBI agent will find other ways to contact you, if necessary," said Guertin.

An official FBI special agent will never provide you with a badge number or telephone number to attempt to verify their identity without additional verification. Instead, they will direct you to the official FBI website www.FBI.gov to locate the local field office's telephone number and encourage you to make a call.

FBI will never call or email you to do any of the following:

Make demands for money, wire transfers, gift cards, or bitcoin; Coordinate financial transactions of any kind; Threaten arrest.

Reporting scams is an important step to protect yourself and others from victimization. All scams can be reported online on the FBI Internet Crime Complaint Center website, www.ic3.gov, or call your local FBI field office. ★

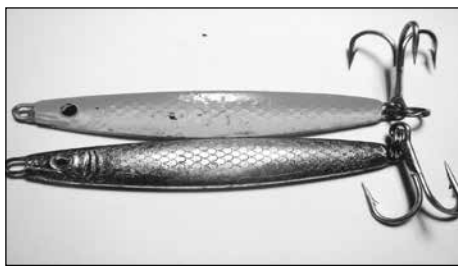

## New sensor technology helps tree-crop growers make improved irrigation decisions

New technology, which allows farmers to detect how thirsty their trees are, can help them make better irrigation decisions and get greater yields. Researchers at the University of California, Davis, have been testing sensors in different commercial orchards as part of a four-year study funded by the Almond Board of California. The sensors measure a tree's stem water potential, which refers to the amount of energy a plant needs to draw water from the soil. Two sensors tested by the research team have made market debuts in recent years.

## State officials approve hike in water program fees

The State Water Resources Control Board is raising fees for water-quality and water-rights programs. The state's Waste Discharge Permit Fund fee is going up 0.84% and fees for the Water Rights Fund are going up 7.2%. The increases are intended to meet budget shortfalls for programs that require participation by farmers and ranchers. With farmers already facing soaring costs for fertilizer and fuel, California Farm Bureau is advocating using state general fund dollars to offset the fee increases.

## Newsom signs farm labor legislation opposed by California Farm Bureau

Gov. Gavin Newsom has signed legislation that will allow unions to collect signed ballots or authorization cards to organize farm employees in lieu of holding secret-ballot elections for union certification. Agricultural groups say the governor's signing of Assembly Bill 2183 represents a dramatic departure from rules protecting farm employees from coercion in union votes. The California Farm Bureau and other agricultural groups strongly opposed the legislation.

## Farmers request help with H-2A visa costs, as government solicits input on labor shortages

The federal government is seeking input on a grant program intended to help address labor shortages and legal migration pathways and improve the resiliency of the food and agricultural supply chain. Farm employers from different states have urged that the grant program include incentives to help agricultural employers curb their travel costs for employees with H-2A visas. They're also requesting a streamlined process to extend program contracts beyond 10 months. ★

## The Market And Its Investors Seemingly Don't Know Which Way To Turn

The news wires is alight with economic news jerking markets and investors to and fro in an almost bipolar like fashion. Up hundreds of points one day and down just as much the next, the market and its investors seemingly don't know which way to turn.

With the Federal Reserve on inflation watch, reading the economic tea leaves as statistics hit the news wires almost daily, investor's heads are spinning round and round trying to catch their breath as markets jump around like the proverbial Mexican jumping bean.

Adding to the drama, Tesla founder and corporate maverick Elon Musk has flopped once again on his decision to buy social media giant Twitter. The purchase, first announced in early April after buying a chunk of Twitter stock a month earlier, in July he then backed out of the deal and a lawsuit filed by Twitter soon followed. Last week, to the surprise of many, Musk announced his intention to go through with the purchase after all. No doubt more craziness will follow.

The war in Ukraine unfortunately rages on, crimping supply lines and commodity sources, adding to our economic woes and current consumer shortages.

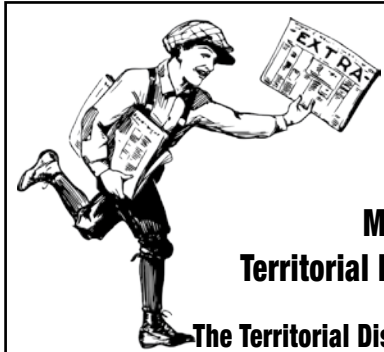

# Kiley Blasts Newsom’s Proposal to Raise Taxes in Response to High Gas Prices

*From the Office of Kevin Kiley*

**SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG)** - On September 30, Assemblyman Kevin Kiley (R-Rocklin) released the following statement in response to a proposal by Governor Gavin Newsom to raise taxes on oil producers:

“Californians need immediate relief from soaring gas prices, which we can provide by passing my bipartisan proposal to suspend the gas tax. Instead, Governor Newsom wants to increase taxes yet again,” Kiley said. “The Governor’s tax hike will make matters worse, by restricting production and passing on costs to consumers in the form of higher gas prices. Californians simply cannot afford more backward policies.”

California’s average gas price hit \$6.29 per gallon today, nearly \$2.50 more than the national average. This is just 15 cents below the state’s record high of \$6.44 set

in June of this year and an increase of nearly 80 cents in the past week alone.

In January, Kiley introduced AB 1638, an urgency measure that would have immediately suspended the gas tax and saved Californian’s over 50 cents per gallon at the pump. That bill was rejected in the Assembly on multiple occasions. Instead of providing relief, the Speaker of the Assembly created the Select Committee on Gasoline Supply and Pricing to study the issue. To date, the committee has held two hearings and has yet to produce anything actionable.

Assemblyman Kevin Kiley represents the 6th Assembly District, which includes the Sacramento, Placer, and El Dorado County communities of Cameron Park, El Dorado Hills, Fair Oaks, Folsom, Granite Bay, Lincoln, Loomis, Orangevale, Penryn, Rocklin, Roseville, and Sheridan. ★

# Dahle Bill to Support Restaurant Growth Signed into Law

**SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG)** - Senator Brian Dahle (R-Bieber) cheered when his last remaining bill of the 2021-22 Legislative Session was signed by the Governor.

Senator Dahle introduced Senate Bill 1452 to support smaller county economies, whose growth depends on tourists who are exploring or simply passing through.

Specifically, SB 1452 authorizes more liquor licenses in El Dorado and Shasta counties to improve the likelihood of success for the restaurant industry and their local economies.

The current California Department of Alcohol Beverage Control (ABC) formula for issuing liquor licenses in sprawling, low-population counties makes it difficult to meet the demand in growing communities like El

Dorado Hills and the greater Redding area.

“After a devastating past couple of years for this industry, these new licenses will surely add to the success of our business communities,” said Senator Dahle.

Beginning in 2023, the ABC will issue up to four licenses per year until each county receives an additional ten.

In 2020, Newsom signed a nearly identical piece of legislation (Assembly Bill 2459, Bigelow) for the counties of Mariposa and Napa.

SB 1452 will become effective January 1, 2023.

Senator Brian Dahle represents California's 1st Senate District, which contains all or portions of 11 counties, including Alpine, El Dorado, Lassen, Modoc, Nevada, Placer, Plumas, Sacramento, Shasta, Sierra, and Siskiyou. ★

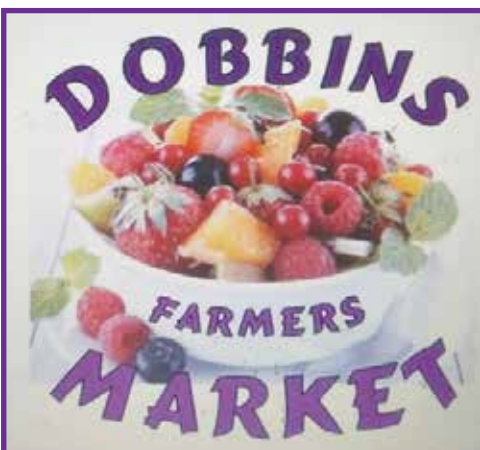
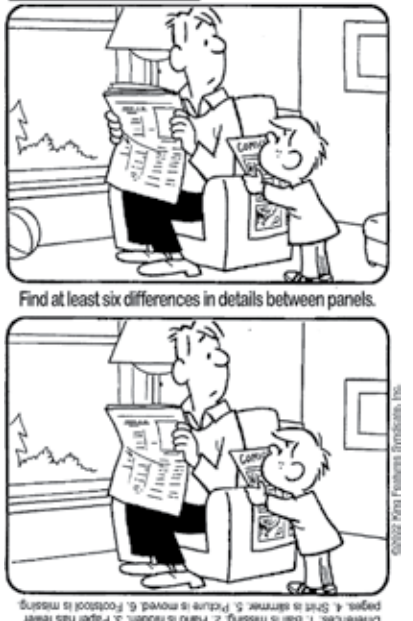
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## Lady Honkers' Playoff Hopes Loom Closer with Sweep over River Valley

**YUBA CITY, CA (MPG)** - The Yuba City Honkers varsity volleyball team kept themselves in playoff contention on Thursday, October 6, with a three-set sweep in a Capital Valley Conference (CVC) match over the River Valley Falcons.

In a packed gym with peers behind them, it was a new experience the Lady Honkers weren't used to, Yuba City (8-10, 4-3 CVC) head coach Jenny Dove told the Territorial Dispatch.

"I can start by going all out myself and keep encouraging the team," Benkowski said.

Fellow senior captain and outside hitter Jillian Posanek told the Dispatch she wants to see positivity and fun from her team for the rest of the season.

"I want to enjoy it. I don't want to see any negativity. It's my last year so I wanna have fun and keep the positive energy," Posanek said.

She added that during the third set, you could see the Lady Falcons starting to

mesh well with one another.

As she fought tears back, Tongson said she coached Posanek and Benkowski as freshmen on junior varsity all the way to varsity in their sophomore to senior years.

"They've never stopped leading, they embody the all-out attitude," Tongson explained.

Yuba City freshman captain and setter Emily Smith told the Dispatch that the win over River Valley built more confidence as the Lady Honkers are currently on a five-match win streak.

"You still need to make it one game at a time, because no matter what the record is, everyone is going to show up the same," Smith said.

She added that the support from her fellow students felt good because they worked hard as a team to get the students to come out and support them. ## Huskies Win Homecoming Thriller in OT Victory sets up big match-up with Twelve Bridges

**SUTTER, CA (MPG)** - The No. 16 Sutter Huskies football team stayed unbeaten on the season after they adjusted and gritted their way to a victory that took extra time over the Center Cougars 23-20 Friday, October 7.

Sutter (8-0, 4-0 Pioneer Valley League) experienced a lot of firsts Friday night, which included multiple fumbles in a game, and they trailed for the first time this season.

The Huskies turned the ball over on their first two possessions of the game when junior quarterback Jagger Beck threw an interception and senior running back Robbie Faupula fumbled.

Faupula had the ball stripped from his hands and Center (4-3, 1-3 PVL) recovered the ball and returned it 25 yards to the endzone to take an early 7-0 lead.

It was a defensive battle between both teams not giving any leverage to the opposite team for the rest of the first quarter. That is, until Sutter senior linebacker Dylan Humes picked off Cougars junior quarterback Bradley Kenny at the Center 20-yard line and returned it for a touchdown. Humes was also named the Homecoming King.

Sutter head coach Ryan Reynolds told the Territorial Dispatch that his defense kept them in the game throughout the entire night.

"They kept us in it, our offense struggled tonight," Reynolds said.

The Huskies coach gave huge credit to his defensive coordinator Matt Schamanski and said he knows how to get the Sutter defensive players in the right positions based off their skill sets. He added that his team is known for not fumbling the ball and that it was uncharacteristic and something he will be working on throughout this week with his team.

The Huskies reclaimed the lead in the second quarter when senior running back Luke Miller scored on a four-yard rushing touchdown to put Sutter up 14-7 early in the second quarter.

Miller started the season as the quarterback, but due to injuries to the backfield, Reynolds told the Dispatch that there has been a lot of movement all around. Miller was the leading rusher in the game with 16 carries for 150 yards.

The Cougars quickly answered back to tie the game when senior running back Benny Tafoya had a three-yard rushing touchdown. With a minute to go in the first half following a Huskies timeout, Sutter had a great trick play that scored a touchdown but was called back due to a penalty.

The play consisted of Beck throwing to Miller on the left side and Miller threw downfield to open senior wide receiver Brayden Underwood for a 52-yard touchdown, but the penalty was thrown due to Underwood not checking in with the line

judge, making himself an eligible receiver.

That would have been a huge momentum booster for the Huskies, but the game went into the locker room tied at 14.

To open the second half, Sutter senior linebacker Joseph Martinez blocked the Center punt which gave the Huskies great field position on the Cougars side of the field.

"We've been working on special teams punt block a lot and I had an open hole," Martinez told the Dispatch.

He added that the game against Center reminded him of the same intensity from their CIF Northern Section championship game last year. Martinez, who currently leads the team with 79 total tackles on the season, contributed 16 tackles.

Sutter sophomore kicker Josiah Thompson gave the Huskies a 17-14 lead when he converted a 31-yard field goal with 7:32 left in the third quarter.

Reynolds told the Dispatch he saw Thompson kick as a freshman last year and had to have him on varsity this year. It's safe to say that decision paid off Friday night. Thompson added a 30-yard field goal with 9:23 left in the game to give Sutter a 20-14 lead.

Center tied the game when Kenny threw a six-yard touchdown pass to running back Elias Bonds with 6:24 to go in the game. The Cougars' kicker missed the extra point try to give them the lead.

The Huskies marched down the field until Miller fumbled in Center territory where the Cougars recovered the ball on their own 22 with just under four minutes to go in the game. After trading possessions with one another, the clock hit triple zeroes and the game went into overtime. Center won the coin toss and began with the ball.

The Cougars started on the Sutter 25-yard line and quickly got a first down. However, Huskies junior linebacker Jeevan Chatha intercepted the ball on the two-yard line which gave the Sutter offense an opportunity to kick a field goal and win the game.

Miller fumbled again for Sutter after he reached the first down marker. The Huskies recovered the ball and after a couple run plays, Reynolds brought Thompson in to kick the winning field goal. The Sutter coach told the Dispatch that he had major confidence in Thompson's ability to close out Center.

Thompson nailed the 22-yard field goal attempt to win the game and keep the Huskies perfect on the season as the team rushed onto the field in excitement.

"I walked up there, kept a clear mind and did what I've been training on all season," Thompson told the Dispatch.

The win sets up a big match up with the Twelve Bridges Raging Rhinos this Friday night, October 14. The Rhinos are 3-0 in the PVL and in this is their first year competing at the varsity level in football. ★



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
