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Covered CA Rates to Increase

Premiums for health insurance plans sold through the state marketplace will increase an average of 6% next year, Covered California officials announced.

This rate hike is the largest California has seen since 2019. In the last three years, insurers had kept average increases under 2%.

Rate changes vary by region – from an 11.7% increase in Imperial, Inyo and Mono counties to zero change in Fresno, Kings, and Madera counties

When premiums increase, an individual's financial aid usually does, too. Aid is based on household

income, so subsidies may offset some of the increase. But people who don't qualify for subsidies will bear the full cost of the rate hike.

"Premiums are a capturing of what health care costs are, how they vary across geographies and communities, how health care costs are growing over time, which we know in this country are already too high and rising," said Jessica Altman, executive director of Covered California.

She noted that California's rate hike is still lower than it is in other states. A recent Kaiser Family Foundation analysis found a 10% average premium increase proposed by 72 insurers in 13 other states.

The rate increase, Altman said, is largely attributed to people resuming

doctor visits and procedures that they postponed during peaks of the COVID-19 pandemic. There is also the cost of general inflation.

About one percent of the increase, however, is attributed to the potential loss of enhanced subsidies from the federal government, which are set to expire at the end of this year. Without the additional aid, people will pay more for their premiums, likely pushing young, healthy people to drop their coverage. And when healthy people leave the marketplace, premiums go up for everyone.

The federal government's American Rescue Plan last year provided California with around \$3 billion designated for two years

Wildfires and Climate Change

BUTTE COUNTY, CA (MPG)

- Climate change threatens communities around the world with the promise of more floods, drought, extreme heat, hurricanes — and wildfire. As these events increase in frequency, they will add new pressures to the federal budget.

The Forest Service has already taken proactive steps to mitigate some of these impacts. The agency recently established a Wildfire Crisis Strategy to increase hazardous fuels and forest health treatments up to four times in the West. The agency estimates that a total of 50 million acres nationwide in addition to what it currently treats each year need similar treatments. Of those 50 million acres, 20 million are on national forests and grasslands.

Agency scientists quantified how climate change might impact the frequency and intensity of wildfires on federal lands – as well as the amount of money needed to suppress them.

The result? According to Senior Research Forester and Project Leader Jeff Prestemon, who led the Forest Service team charged with conducting the analysis, "The wildfire area burned is expected to more than triple in the next 80 years."

He also confirmed that the anticipated increase in wildfires will require more money to suppress and manage.

"Fire suppression spending will likely nearly double by the end of the century," said Prestemon. "Combined Forest Service

and Department of Interior spending is projected to rise by 90% – or \$1.8 billion – by 2100."

Prestemon added that the projected study results are based upon assumptions that could potentially change the anticipated Continued on page 2

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outcomes. "For example, our modeling accounts for how climate has changed fire and fuels management of the past," he said. "However, it doesn't take into consideration future changes in fuels management strategies by agencies."

The study results could be considered an assessment of what could happen if federal wildfire management does not change appreciably. Aggressive, proactive changes in how fuels are treated, such as those outlined in the Forest Service's Wildfire Crisis Strategy, could make a difference.

"This study revealed the importance of uncovering how changes in our wildfire management strategies could lead to overall better wildfire outcomes in America," said Prestemon. "The science could help us move our forests towards conditions where levels of wildfire and suppression spending are more ecologically and economically sustainable."

The report builds upon similar work done in 2016. As in 2016, the team developed wildfire models at regional scales based on historic climate and wildfire data. This year the team also built a set of ten climate projections to the year 2100 that included variables such as historic and projected future temperature, humidity, and precipitation. The team members also updated the data on wildfire suppression expenditures through 2020, while considering areas previously burned.

BUTTE COUNTY, CA (MPG) - During the early morning hours of July 7, 2022, Agents from the Butte Interagency Narcotics Task Force (BINTF) were conducting surveillance of Michael Alan Kunde in the City of Gridley.

Mr. Kunde, a 42-year-old Gridley resident, is currently on Searchable Probation through Sutter County Superior Court for

a drug related offense.

During the surveillance, Mr. Kunde left the City of Gridley, driving northbound on Highway 99 in his vehicle. As he approached the City of Chico, he was observed to be in violation of traffic laws. Coupled with his probation status, Agents directed a Butte County Sheriff's Deputy to conduct a traffic stop on Mr. Kunde and his vehicle. The traffic stop occurred on Highway 99 in south Chico.

Pursuant to conditions of his probation, Agents searched Mr. Kunde and the vehicle he was operating. In the passenger compartment, approximately 200 suspected Fentanyl pills were located, along with methamphetamine. Agents then conducted a more thorough search and crawled underneath the vehicle. They observed that plastic covering the undercarriage of the vehicle had been tamped with. Agents removed the plastic and located a large amount of suspected Fentanyl and methamphetamine which had been concealed in the undercarriage of the vehicle.

After the totality of the vehicle search, the following items were located and recovered: 1168 grams of suspected Fentanyl pills (counterfeit Oxycodone pills) – 2.5 pounds gross weight. 906 grams of Methamphetamine – 2 pounds gross weight.

Mr. Kunde was arrested for Possession

and Transportation of Fentanyl and Methamphetamine for Sale (11351 HS/11352 HS; 11378 HS/11379a HS). He was booked into the Butte County Jail with bail set at \$700,000, after a bail enhancement request.

A passenger in the vehicle, Janae Nicole Sanchez, a 27-year-old Gridley resident, was arrested for Possession of Methamphetamine and Drug Paraphernalia (11377 HS; 11364 HS). She was later cited and released.

Two children in the vehicle, an (8) year old and a (10) year old, were taken into protective care by Agents and released to Butte County Children Services Division professionals.

The 1168 grams of suspected Fentanyl pills recovered during this operation represent approximately 11,000 individual pills. As we have become acutely aware, a single counterfeit pill containing Fentanyl can kill, and has become the leading cause of death for Americans aged 18 through 45, according to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC). In addition, methamphetamine kills more people in Butte County than any other illicit drug.

BINTF Agents are committed to disrupting the flow of these deadly substances into our Butte County communities, to include working all hours of the night This is but one example of those on-going efforts.

MARYSVILLE, CA (MPG) Last weekend, Marysville hosted its 22nd annual Peach Festival. The Peach Festival celebrates the rich history of peach farming in the Sacramento Valley.

The warm Yuba-Sutter climate is ideal for growing stone fruit. Yuba County now is the 6th most popular county for peach production in the United States. Woman Arrested on Sexual Assault Charge

YUBA CITY, CA (MPG) - On June 26, 2022, the Yuba City Police Department Investigation Unit began an investigation related to a sexual abuse between 30-year-old Elizabeth Valdovinos of Yuba City and a juvenile male

Ms. Valdovinos is alleged to have sexually abused the juvenile from January 2022 until

April 2022. Ms. Valdovinos was the legal foster parent to the victim, and the victim was living with Ms. Valdovinos during the time frame when the sexual abuse occurred.

On July 7, 2022, the Yuba City Police Investigation Unit located and arrested Ms. Valdovinos in the 900 block of Eastcrest Court. She was booked into the Sutter County Jail on charges of statutory rape and oral copulation of a minor.

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Preparing for Wildfire Season: Battery and Generator Rebates, and More

OAKLAND, CA (MPG) - As wildfire season nears, emergency preparedness becomes even more critical. Good preparation means practicing emergency plans, having go bags packed and ready, keeping extra batteries for flashlights and radios within reach and more.

For those customers with access and functional needs, Pacific Gas and Electric Company (PG&E) offers discounts on generators and batteries; sponsors a Disability Disaster Access and Resources Program; and partners with 211, a free call to help with local resources and support 24/7.

These programs are designed to help our customers when weather and wildfire risk prompts the company to initiate a Public Safety Power Shutoff (PSPS) or to enable Enhanced Powerline Safety Settings (EPSS).

"In advance of wildfire season, it's critical that customers who require extra assistance because they are reliant on power for health and safety know there is support available," said Marlene Santos, a PG&E EVP and the Chief Customer Officer. "Our partnerships with local community organizations mean we can better ensure the right resources get to those customers who need them most."

Here's how to get started:

Disability Disaster Access and Resources Program

We continue to partner with community-based organizations to assist customers with medical and independent living needs before, during and after PSPS outages. This includes collaborating with the California Foundation for Independent Living Centers' (CFILC) Disability Disaster Access and Resources Program to support the Access and Functional Needs (AFN) community. The support for customers with medical or independent living needs may include:

Emergency preparedness outreach and education; Promotion of our Medical Baseline Program; Accessible transportation resources; Hotel stays and food stipends; Portable backup batteries.

Generators and Batteries

This year, we continue to provide portable battery solutions to customers as part of the Portable Battery Program and the CFILC's Disability Disaster Access and Resources Program.

In 2021, we delivered approximately 6,500 batteries to customers. Combined with the roughly 6,500 batteries we provided in 2020, more than 13,000 batteries were distributed through the Portable AFN commu a PSPS.

Battery Program and the Disability Disaster Access and Resources Program. The batteries were provided to those in the aging and disabled populations who rely on power for medical needs and income-qualified Medical Baseline customers in high fire-threat areas.

For 2022, we've removed the low-income requirements for the Portable Battery Program and offer it to Medical Baseline customers who live in High Fire-Threat Districts (HFTDs) or have been impacted by two or more recent PSPS outages. In addition to portable batteries, insulin cooler bags, miniature fridges and extension cords are provided to qualifying customers with medication that requires cold storage.

Additionally, the funding and eligibility for the Generator and Battery Rebate Program, for customers who rely on well water, customers in our Medical Baseline Program and certain essential small businesses, will expand to customers both residing in Tiers 2 or 3 HFTDs and/or who are served by an EPSS circuit. The availability of Backup Power Transfer Meters, which makes it easier and safer to connect a generator, has been expanded to all customers who have compatible portable generators in Tier 2 or 3 HFTDs and/or are served by an EPSS-circuit.

Call 211 for resources 24/7

To support our customers who rely on power for health and safety, PG&E partners with the California Network of 211s to provide help during times when it's needed the most. 211 is a free, confidential calling and texting service that provides 24/7 connections to local resources and assists with emergency preparedness planning to minimize the hardships that may be caused by wildfire safety outages, like a Public Safety Power Shutoff.

This partnership also provides proactive outreach to help prepare those who rely on electricity for medical needs, individuals who may be disabled, older adults or customers with other medical needs. Resource coordination might include creating an emergency plan; transportation and hotel accommodations; portable backup power; food resources; and other services.

The 211 network utilizes PG&E's existing resources, as well as resource partnerships specific to 211. 211 provides proactive outreach to all customers and serves as the first point of contact for our AFN community before, during and after a PSPS.

California Wheat Production Remains Steady, But High Prices May Increase Plantings

California farmers are on track to deliver 80,000 acres of winter wheat, equal to last year, according to the U.S. Department of Agriculture's June forecast. The state is also expected to harvest 24,000 acres of durum wheat, an increase of 4,000 acres from 2021. With wheat prices having spiked to record levels this year, eyes are now on the next planting season. Claudia Carter, executive director of the California Wheat Commission, says "for next year, we could see more wheat being planted and harvested."

Report: Pistachios are California's Fastest-growing Nut in New Production

Pistachios are becoming the fastest-growing tree nut in California in terms of acreage expansion. In its June report, Rabobank said pistachio-bearing acreage has grown fivefold in the past two decades. The bank, which conducts agricultural market research, said the 2022-23 California pistachio crop will likely set a record for the third straight year. California accounts for 99% of U.S. pistachio production and, in 2021, new pistachio acreage in the state totaled more than 34,000 acres.

Driverless Tractor Future may be Arriving, as Manufacturers Tout Benefits

Could the portrait of a farmer on a tractor become a thing of the past? Probably not. But autonomous tractors are becoming more attractive to farmers looking to keep fields productive amid labor shortages. New driverless tractors can be monitored through smartphone apps or office computers. Live video feeds can be checked for issues in the field needing investigating. Manufacturers are also touting the autonomous machines for applying crop protection materials without worker exposure.

California Farmers, Ranchers Offer input on Farm Bill Reauthorization

Congress is set to craft omnibus legislation to govern the nation's agricultural and food programs, and California farmers and ranchers are offering feedback on what is working and isn't. They turned out in Fresno for a recent informational session on the 2023 federal Farm Bill reauthorization. State agricultural representatives called for improved water supplies and infrastructure, enhanced support for innovations in farm technology and more help in expanding the farm labor workforce. The session was hosted by U.S. Rep. Jim Costa of Fresno.

some would call bi-polar behavior. One day stocks go up, the next day they plummet. Technology stocks, who were the market darlings of late 2020 and first 10 months of 2021, cratered during the first six months of 2022 to previously unheard of levels. Brief rallies in the sector give hope to beaten down investors looking to recoup losses only to be carpet slammed again and again to new lows in classic "head fake" rallies.

The first week of July appeared to be another in a long line of hopeful rallies and only time will tell if the latest upswings will hold or new lows await once again. Alas, the following week another beat down. Investors are definitely gun shy and not trusting rallies right now.

Some analysts argue the bad news about inflation and the FEDS response to it is thoroughly baked into the market, while others claim there is more down-

Stock prices are based on company earnings and since earnings are backward looking, the current earnings reports may show just how anemic some believe the economy is. Since current stock prices reflect last quarter earnings however, this latest round of reports coming out throughout this month of July, may reflect more reductions in profits and revenue. If earnings come in weaker than expected, stock prices may fall again in what is called "earnings compression".

One could say the current fall in stock prices is based on earnings expectations, whereas earnings compression may occur when the current financial reports come out in this next quarter.

Earnings compression is the fall in reported earnings based on an economic slowdown. Since stock prices are believed by some to have currently fallen based on the expectations of falling earnings, the actual reports may show

The market continues to exhibit what a verified fall in earnings. This fall in earnings may then have an effect on analysts and investors to subsequently adjust their expectations based on real numbers instead of projections. This adjustment means a stock price, which was based on what the company was expected to earn in the coming quarter, may be adjusted lower due to the verification that earnings indeed are slowing.

Southern Cal Ports and **Warehouses Face Threats**

As California's post-World War II industrial economy slumped during the 1970s, civic and business leaders in the state's two major metropolitan areas made some momentous bets on their economic futures.

While the San Francisco Bay Area opted for the emerging sector of digital technology, Southern California – Los Angeles particularly - believed that its future lay in logistics, tying the region to the fast-growing economies of Asia.

Southern California expanded and modernized its twin ports of Los Angeles and Long Beach to handle what became a flood of container ships from China and other Asian nations. Rail and highway connections were improved and the region's "Inland Empire" became a massive logistics center of warehouses and distribution centers serving the entire nation.

It's estimated that 40% of U.S. imports and 25% of the nation's exports pass through Southern California's ports.

Although logistics industry salaries are not high in comparison to those of the Bay Area's tech industry, its warehouses and other facilities have provided much-needed jobs for the wave of immigrants, mostly from Latin America, that Southern California

experienced in the 1980s and

However, despite its importance, Southern California's logistics industry faces an uncertain future as the movement of goods becomes increasingly competitive and, as industry leaders complain, new state laws and regulations raise operational costs that could encourage shippers to go elsewhere.

As shipping volume increased in recent years, new Inland Empire warehouses proliferated to handle the traffic, creating a backlash of opposition from local residents and environmental groups.

Attorney General Rob Bonta sued the city of Fontana for approving a warehouse close to a high school and Assemblywoman Eloise Gómez Reyes, a San Bernardino Democrat, introduced legislation requiring new warehouses in Riverside and San Bernardino counties to be located at last 1,000 feet from "sensitive receptors" such as schools.

Business groups have opposed the measure, saying that its setback requirements and a provision of the bill requiring unionized labor on warehouse projects would hamstring development of facilities needed to handle ever-increasing amounts of cargo. The bill has passed the Assembly and is pending in the Senate.

Meanwhile, McLaurin, president of the Pacific Merchant Shipping Association, told Gov. Gavin Newsom in a letter last month that several new state policies also threaten to curtail the logistics industry's ability to handle increasing amounts of cargo.

He specifically cited new

rules from the California Air Resources Board that prohibit older trucks from handling cargo at the ports and require replacement trucks to be zero-emission vehicles "that are currently unavailable due to the shortage of semi conductors and other equipment."

McLaurin also noted that while a just-passed state budget trailer bill purports to "invest in port-specific high-priority projects that increase goods movement capacity on rail and roadways serving ports and at port terminals," it also bans spending for "fully automated cargo handling equipment."

The prohibition is supposedly aimed at protecting port jobs from being automated but McLaurin told Newsom that unions have already agreed to provisions allowing automation, which is needed to keep Los Angeles and Long Beach ports competitive in the battle for shipping business vis-à-vis other ports.

"California's ports have no more room to grow except up," McLaurin said. "If we are to meet the needs of California consumers and exporters, support hundreds of thousands of supply chain related jobs and function as a competitive gateway, innovation along the waterfront should be encouraged - not stifled."

These issues are a warning that as logistics have become so important to Southern California's economy, the industry's future should not be taken for granted.

Shooting on Monterey Ave. Leaves One Dead and One Injured

YUBA CITY, CA (MPG) - On July 17, 2022, at approximately 8:00 PM the Yuba City Police dispatch center received several calls about a shooting that occurred in the 300 block of Monterey Avenue. Hartman Bar Road Section Closed for Construction

Forest Service News Release

OROVILLE, CA (MPG) - Beginning this week, approximately 3.25 miles of Forest Road 94 on the Plumas National Forest will be closed for construction.

It is expected the work will be completed and the road will reopen by November 4. Information will be shared as the work is completed and the road reopens.

The closure is between milepost 8.13 at the intersection with Forest Road 21N23, also known as Cascade Creek Road, and Forest Road 22N62, also known as Milsap Bar Road.

The stretch of Forest Road needs critical repairs this summer and is a section with numerous turns, the road narrows, sight is limited and there are not safe places to turn around. For public, employee and contractor safety, it is necessary to temporarily close the

Crews will be working on repairing road damage, removing hazard trees, widening the road, repairing slides and replacing retaining walls damaged in the North Complex Fire.

The focus was on signing the section of road as closed and moving equipment to stage in the area to start work this week. As work begins, the road will be impassible for the duration of the project.

Recreation sites, including campgrounds, trailheads and trails along that portion of Forest Road 94 are currently closed for repairs due to damage from the North Complex Fire in fall 2020. Covered CA Rates to Increase

Continued from page 1 of additional financial aid through Covered California. The new law helped further reduce what people paid for their monthly premiums, driving more people to sign up for health insurance. It also expanded who was eligible for savings to include middle-income individuals.

Currently 1.7 million Californians buy their coverage through the state marketplace. Covered California has estimated that if Congress does not renew the American Rescue Plan subsidies, about 1 million people will see their premiums double and about 220,000 would likely drop their coverage.

"(The rate increase) for the subsidized population

is almost divorced from what they pay out of pocket. What's more important is what happens with the (American Rescue Plan) subsidies," said Christine Eibner, a senior economist for the RAND Corporation, a think tank.

Altman said the sooner Congress acts the better the chance of avoiding consumer confusion in the fall. Covered California usually sends renewal notices to enrollees beginning in October, ahead of the sign-up period, and having clarity for people by then is key.

"There have been references both ways, 'Will it be permanent? Will it be temporary? Will it stay in the current form?...Or will there be some adjustments to it?' – and we really don't know," Altman said about the conversations happening in Washington, D.C.

California's 2022-23 budget includes \$304 million for middle-class marketplace enrollees that would kick in if Congress does not renew the aid. While helpful, it would not fill the hole the annual \$1.7 billion federal aid would leave, Altman said.

Covered California also announced that another insurer, Aetna CVS Health, will join the state marketplace and be an option for people in El Dorado, Fresno, Kings, Madera, Placer, Sacramento and Yolo counties. Meanwhile, Anthem Blue Cross will expand into San Diego County.
