

State Shares Your Data

In March 2020, as Californians hunkered down for what many expected to be a two-week lockdown, high-ranking health officials were scrambling to find out how many COVID-19 patients were hospitalized, how many were in intensive care and how many beds remained available.

With no system in place for hospitals to report this information to the state and share it, Secretary of Health and Human Services Dr. Mark Ghaly, the state's public health director and other staff had to call 426 hospitals to assess the situation.

Now, officials hope to avoid similar

scenarios in the future by changing the way patient data is collected and shared. Legislation passed last year requires all health and human services providers to sign a statewide data-sharing agreement. This includes hospitals, doctor's offices, nursing homes, public health agencies, laboratories, mental and behavioral health providers, substance use treatment facilities, insurance plans, public health departments and emergency services.

The final version of the agreement was published July 1. Most participants will have six months to sign the agreement and a year to begin sharing data.

If implementation goes as planned,

a doctor or case worker could request a patient's full medical and social services history in real time. Patients could view their own records easily, and government agencies would also have access to more reliable aggregate data on patient outcomes and demographics — rendering the pandemic scramble obsolete.

The health care industry already amasses incredible amounts of patient data. John Ohanian, chief data officer for the state Health and Human Services Agency, likens it to "freeways of information." The problem is, not everyone has an onramp to the

Bay Fire Forces Evacuations from 2 Areas of Yuba County

YUBA COUNTY, CA (MPG) -Loma Rica residents were forced to evacuate from their homes Friday afternoon, July 8, due to the Bay Fire spreading within their area of Yuba County.

Primarily two areas of Yuba County were evacuated due to what CAL FIRE's Nevada-Yuba-Placer Unit deemed the Bay Fire. According to CAL FIRE, they ceased forward movement around 3:30 p.m. Friday with the fire contained to about 26 acres.

"Extensive mop up in the area," CAL FIRE wrote in a news release. "Use caution as fire equipment will be entering and exiting the roadways near Marysville Road and Bayberry Lane near Loma Rica in Yuba County. Go to the Yuba County Sheriffs Office website or social media for evacuation and road closure information."

The Yuba County Sheriff's Department (YCSD) encouraged the pubic to avoid the area and "follow the directives of law enforcement and fire personnel."

According to the California Highway Patrol (CHP), Bayberry Lane, Big Oak Lane and Pioneer were immediately evacuated. The CHP also stated that the wildfire spread to multiple acres and that two structures were threatened.

"CAL FIRE Nevada-Yuba-Placer Unit is in unified command with the Yuba County Sheriff's Office for the Bay Fire," CAL FIRE said. "Marysville Road and Bayberry Lane near Loma Rica in Yuba County. Assisted by CHP, Loma Rica Fire, Tahoe National Forest, Dobbins Fire, Oregon's House Fire, Penn Valley Fire and Foothill Fire."

Evacuees can find shelter at Sycamore Ranch located at 5390 Highway 20 in Browns Valley according to the YCSD. An animal shelter has also been set up in Browns Valley right down the road from the ranch.

"We have the Yuba County Sheriff's Posse Arena open for large animals who have been displaced located at 5396 Marysville Road in Browns Valley," the YCSD wrote in a news release. "If you need assistance with evacuating animals, please contact Animal Care Services at (530) 701-8997."

Roads affected by the Bay Fire include Scott illorate Road and Peoria Road at Marysville Road; Marysville Road at Fruitland Road; and Dawn Drive at Big Oak Lane.

State Budget Invests to Help Fully Restore California's Tourism Economy

- The new state budget agreed upon by Gov. Gavin Newsom and state lawmakers will include \$15 million in marketing funds to support the ongoing recovery of California's tourism economy.

These funds will be used to supplement Visit California's proven tourism efforts by providing direct support for domestic tourism marketing programs aimed at driving increased travel to destinations and communities throughout California.

The new funding builds on the state's previous investment of \$95 million in tourism marketing stimulus in 2021, which has been critical to reviving the state's hard-hit tourism sector and accelerating the travel industry's path to recovery.

Visitor spending in California grew 46% last year compared to 2020, totaling \$100.2 billion, according to Visit

California's 2021 Economic Impact Report. Updated economic projections now forecast that travel spending will reach 2019 levels by 2023 – a year earlier than previous estimates.

"California's travel and hospitality industry is grateful to Gov. Newsom and the Legislature for including \$15 million in the state budget to continue the tourism economy's recovery from the devastating pandemic," said Visit California President and CEO Caroline Beteta. "The state funding will supplement the travel industry's contribution and allow Visit California to continue marketing programs across the nation to inspire travel to the Golden

State. The \$95 million allocated by the Legislature a year ago helped California reclaim its nation-leading tourism market share and reestablish itself as one of the state's most reliable job producers. This \$15 million contribution will help finish the job and bring California's tourism economy back to pre-pandemic levels in 2023."

This stimulus will provide additional resources that will help Visit California close the gap in the state's uneven tourism recovery by supporting marketing programs aimed at promoting family travel, professional meetings and travel to California's urban hubs, which continue to be disproportionately impacted by the pandemic.

Initial projections estimate that the state's \$15 million investment in tourism marketing stimulus will generate at least \$4 billion in visitor spending at California businesses and create 37,600 travel and hospitality jobs. ★

goal was – to make it mandatory that people exchange information and provide rules of the road and guidelines so it can be done well," Ohanian said.

It's a huge endeavor for the state, and not everyone is on board.

In a public comment responding to a draft of the agreement, the California Hospital Association and California Association of Public Hospitals and Health Systems complained that the requirements exceed the statutory authority of the law that established the data-sharing requirement. When contacted for clarification, hospital association spokesperson Jan Emerson-Shea said there was nothing to add beyond what was in the letter.

The California Association of Health Plans also commented that parts of the draft proposal go beyond the scope of the new data-sharing law, including the proposed governing body that would oversee compliance. The association also pointed out potential conflicts with a parallel federal effort to create a national data exchange for health data.

Other groups, including the County Welfare Directors Association of California, County Behavioral Health Directors Association and Planned Parenthood Affiliates of California, raised concerns about data privacy and security. They also want patients to be given the ability to choose whether their data is shared and noted that addiction and mental health records are more strictly protected than other health data. In a letter to the state, Planned Parenthood asked to delay implementation by one year.

According to a state analysis, the proportion of medical and social services organizations that currently use digital records and share that information with other providers varies widely based on sector and location.

While 97% of family physicians used electronic record-keeping methods in 2020, those who didn't tended to be small independent practices or they were in rural areas. Likewise, 90% of medium and large hospitals also used electronic-only patient records, but only 70% of small hospitals in the state used digital records.

The report found a little more than a third of addiction treatment centers used electronic records to document treatment plans and view laboratory results. Less than half of nursing homes used electronic records and only 10% reported that their

systems connected with local hospitals.

Some of the organizations with the fewest digital record-sharing systems are government agencies like county public health and social services departments. The state Legislature's approved budget includes \$50 million over two years to help small doctor's offices, rural hospitals and community organizations invest in the technology needed to comply with the law.

Even before the pandemic, community clinics and social services providers like homeless shelters say disconnected record-keeping systems caused chronic problems.

On a broader scale, the patchwork of digital accessibility has made it difficult to reduce health disparities for conditions like heart disease and diabetes, both before and during the pandemic, said Kiran Savage-Sangwan, executive director of the California Pan-Ethnic Health Network and a member of the data exchange advisory group.

Communities of color make up 63% of the state's population but represent more than 80% of all enrollees in Medi-Cal, the state's health system for people who can't afford health insurance. According to a California Health Care Foundation report on health disparities, Black and Latino residents are far more likely to experience preventable hospitalizations for conditions like asthma, heart failure and diabetes than white residents. The same groups are also the most likely to report delaying health care due to cost or lack of insurance.

In recent years, the state has launched ambitious plans to transform the Medi-Cal system through an initiative called CalAIM, which aims to address the root causes of failing health, like food insecurity and housing instability. It offers coverage for services not typically thought of as medical needs, such as housing. CalAIM, along with the state's Healthy California for All Commission, which is exploring what a single-payer health care system could look like in California, relies on data.

"I can't think of a thing on our list of huge transformations that won't either depend on or benefit from this effort," Ghaly said. "All of these data systems having some ability to come together around the individual is going to accelerate – whether it's a social worker or an emergency room nurse – their ability to provide more comprehensive and coordinated services."

Olivehurst Fire Destroys Structures, Closes Streets

YUBA COUNTY, CA (MPG) - A fast-moving fire moved through a central Olivehurst neighborhood late Saturday afternoon, July 2, destroying four structures along 11th Avenue between Ardmore Avenue and Fleming Way. Officials are investigating the cause of the blaze.

Fire agencies from Olivehurst, Linda, Wheatland, Yuba City, and Sutter County responded, and Sheriff's deputies alerted residents with mutual assistance from the police departments of Marysville and Yuba City, as well as the Sutter County Sheriff's Office and CHP.

CodeRED alerts were issued for the fire

zone, as well as for the zone to the north, up to 2nd Avenue in Olivehurst. Power was interrupted to some parts of the community, due to damage to transmission line.

Forward progress of the fire was stopped around 5 p.m.

Roadblocks are currently up along Ardmore Avenue and Fleming Way, between 9th and 11th avenue, as mop up efforts continue and for the purpose of investigating the cause of the blaze. Also closed is 11th Avenue between the two roads. Residents with homes in fire area will be allowed to enter by foot, as vehicles are currently not allowed.

is as Bad as the Process

- This column addresses budget issues frequently and, most recently, reported on how broken the budget process is. While the "budget bill" is constitutionally mandated to be enacted by June 15, it only passed by that date for one reason – so the legislators could continue to receive their paychecks.

Moreover, since the enactment of the budget, there have been two so-called "junior budget bills" amending the fake June 15th budget and around 30 so-called "budget trailer bills" directing the spending of billions in ways that the budget bill itself did not direct.

But it isn't just the budget process that is wholly broken, the actual substance of the bill reveals perverse spending priorities. Let's start with the size of this gargantuan budget. One veteran political reporter, who has followed state budgets since the 1960s, remembers when the budget was \$3 billion. It has grown since then by 100-fold to a staggering \$300 billion.

The old saying that the bigger they are, the harder they fall, can be applied to the California state budget. There remains a legitimate question whether massive new spending programs can be sustained when, not if, we have a major recession, as more and more economists and business

leaders are predicting.

For taxpayers, priority number-one in this year's budget was the long-promised gas tax relief. This is especially important since. on Friday, California's gas tax went up by about three cents. That might not seem like a lot, but we already had the highest gas tax in the nation. So, while other states are providing immediate gas tax relief directly at the pump, California will not.

Rather than do the right thing and suspend the gas tax for a year - a quick, simple and low-cost solution recommended by Republicans - the governor and Democrats in the legislature agreed on a \$9.5 billion tax rebate program which will attempt to target refunds based not on the amount of taxes paid, but on need and family size; and not now, but just before the November election.

Another example is Assembly Bill 208 that will create a new excise tax on lithium extraction. Why? Because lithium is crucially important for battery manufacturing and there is something of a gold rush on lithium occurring in the Salton Sea. The Legislature intends to get in on the

The Legislature's plan would impose a tax of \$400 to \$800 per metric ton of lithium extracted in California. The industry says that could discourage investment and make locally sourced lithium more expensive than imports coming from half a world away. Currently, lithium is imported from countries including China, where the lithium industry has been tied to forced labor and environmental

degradation. Meanwhile, California Energy Commission estimates that there is enough lithium in the Salton Sea to meet America's lithium needs and up to 40% of the

world's demand. Further, it has been reported that the Salton Sea could produce the world's "greenest" lithium and that the lithium industry has the potential of breathing economic life back into a region that faces high rates of unemployment and suffers health impacts from the drying sea.

Disincentivizing our local lithium industry through taxation is counter to California's climate and labor values and bad for Riverside and Imperial counties, our state, the United States, and the

Space limitations prevent a full airing of all the silliness to be found in the state budget, but this one caught our eye. One of the post-budget "trailer" bills revealed Gov. Newsom's obsession with poking at pro-business states like Texas and Florida. The bill would give special consideration to businesses seeking state "Go-Biz" grants if they're relocating jobs away from a state that limits access to abortion or "permits discrimination" on the basis of sexual orientation, gender identity, or gender expression. Apparently, Newsom believes businesses will be more attracted to California for its woke purity than they are repelled by its high taxes and burdensome regulations.

someone Maybe should remind the governor that Chevron, one of California's most storied businesses, announced it was moving its headquarters to Texas.

As long as California remains under one-party rule, the public's money will continue to be spent to pick winners and losers, reward political friends and hurt political enemies. It's a broken process with a very high price tag.

California's Budget Substance Plastic Recycling Scam

The Causation of Inflation

With inflation the worst in 4 decades, we look for reasons why prices are skyrocketing. Economist Milton Friedman said "Inflation is always and everywhere a monetary phenomenon in the sense that it is and can be produced only by a more rapid increase in the quantity of money than in output".

Put simply, increase the currency in an economy faster than the total output of goods and services increases and inflation will rise. The more imbalance of currency to production, the higher the inflation.

Washington for decades seemingly discounts Friedman's theory. It's no surprise to anyone that freshly minted money has poured out of Washington's money conduit, the Federal Reserve, with the most egregious money creation occurring in the last 2 years or so. The more than generous handouts were an attempt to stave off the detrimental effects of CoVid and its subsequent worldwide shutdowns by governments everywhere.

Much of the blame coming out of Washington points the inflation finger at the Russian/Ukrainian conflict which has pinched down the supply lines of many commodities. Although there is little doubt the war has constrained supply, some argue that much of the inflation follows along the lines of Friedman's hypothesis.

After all, Friedman was no dummy. He was fully aware of supply side effects on prices, yet if one rereads his inflation hypothesis, he unequivocally points the finger exclusively at monetary creation as the sole cause of inflation.

There are arguments stating worldwide economies cannot simply be shut down almost entirely for a year or more and then turned back on like a light switch. Supply conduits are complexed systems. Once halted, it takes months to start them up again and even more time to get them functioning to the levels they were prior to the shutdowns.

No doubt Friedman never imagined a total stoppage to the entire world's workforce as was witnessed during CoVid, and one wonders what Friedman would have to say as it pertains to inflation. We will never know if he would have adjusted his exclusive claim that money creation is the sole source of a general increase in prices.

That said, there is little argument among scholars that the massive money creation that was bequeathed on individuals and businesses in the last two years has played a large part in the inflation we are now seeing. The total money supply in the U.S. was increased by 40% or so in the last two years. This is without precedent.

That said, there is still little mention in our political hallways that at least acknowledge that massive government spending is contributing to our record inflationary rates we are now seeing.

To validate that one, look no further than to the State of California who will soon be sending out yet more checks to its residents to help offset the rising costs consumers are struggling with. The irony, at least to those that believe Friedman's hypotheses on inflation is correct, is that California is printing even more money to counteract the previous effects of previous money printing.

Sounds like typical government reasoning to this analyst.

California's Chronic Technology **Woes Will Be Probed**

Last month's primary election was the latest test for a state computer system that is supposed to provide timely and complete data on campaign contributions, lobbying expenditures and other financial aspects of the political process.

Cal-Access, as it's known, struggled to do what it was supposed to do, which surprises exactly no one who tries to use the system.

It's not a new problem. The shortcomings of the 23-year-old political reporting system have been known for years. The former secretary of state, Alex Padilla, once described Cal-Access as "a Frankenstein's monster of code" that is in need of "a complete rebuild" and sponsored 2016 legislation to create a replacement.

Then-Gov. Jerry Brown, himself a former secretary of state, agreed that the system needed an overhaul and signed the legislation. A successor system was supposed to be ready within a few years, but it wasn't.

Last year, Padilla was appointed to the U.S. Senate. Shirley Weber, a Democratic assemblywoman from San Diego, was named as his successor and she more or less scrapped what Padilla had done on the Cal-Access CARS, as it's called.

"To ensure that the CARS project can fully meet its statutory obligations, the scheduled June 30, 2021, rollout of the project will be postponed," Weber said. "Moving forward, the secretary of state's office will assess the project's state of readiness so that on the date it goes live it will meet the expectations of the public, stakeholders and the regulated community."

It's another example of a syndrome that has plagued state government for years. While California's Silicon Valley and other technology hubs may be global leaders in the development of information technology, its state government has been chronically incapable of implementing IT systems that work as promised.

One of the most spectacular IT failures was a meltdown in the **Employment Development** Department's handling of claims for unemployment insurance benefits from hundreds of thousands of California workers who lost their jobs due to pandemic-related shutdowns, compounded by approving billions of dollars in payments to fraudsters.

The long list of IT systems that that have failed, incurred huge cost overruns and/or were delayed for years is, or at least should be, especially embarrassing to Gov. Gavin Newsom. In 2013, he published a book, "Citizenville: How to Take the Town Square Digital and Reinvent Government," predicting that technology would transform American democracy and end political gridlock.

California's sorry record

Replacement System or of IT failure raises the obvious question of "why?" Is it bureaucratic sclerosis? Is it an inability to define missions precisely enough for software engineers to design solutions? Do vendors overpromise results to pad their bills?

The state auditor's office has identified managerial shortcomings in many specific projects, such as one dubbed FI\$Cal, supposedly a comprehensive integration of financial data. However, there's never been an analysis of what obviously is a systemic procurement failure — until now.

Last week, the Legislature's audit committee directed the auditor's office to examine the entire IT procurement system, beginning with the Department of Technology, which was created several years back to solve the chronic problem.

The audit was requested by Assemblywoman Cottie Petrie-Norris, an Irvine Democrat who chairs the Assembly Accountability and Administrative Review Committee.

"The pandemic showed us the disastrous results of state IT systems that are overloaded, antiquated, and not ready for the task ahead," Petrie-Norris said. "This audit request is a critically needed look at the technology systems Californians should be able to easily rely on every day to interact with their government and obtain vital services."

A long-overdue look.

Watermelon Production Meets Demand as Prices Increase

San Joaquin Valley watermelons are fetching higher prices this year. According to the U.S. Department of Agriculture, a carton of 45 valley seedless watermelons was selling for \$158 to \$161 at the end of June. That was up from \$119 to \$126 in June of 2021. Seedless miniature watermelons were going for \$12.95 to \$13.95 for cartons of six to nine melons, up from \$8.95 to \$10.95 for six to eight melons. Watermelon production in the valley remains steady this year.

Farmers Markets Rebounding after Setbacks During Pandemic

California's farmers markets are rebounding after the pandemic shuttered numerous markets or drove away reliable urban customers as downtown offices closed. "We are doing very well now," reports Amy Arnold, who manages four farmers markets in Los Angeles County. Three of those markets closed during the early days of the COVID-19 crisis. Now they are greeting throngs of customers seeking summer fruit. Other markets report high demand for melons, peaches, oranges and cherries.

Higher Milk Prices aren't Helping Dairy **Producers as Production Drops**

Higher milk prices aren't bringing good news for California dairy farmers. Amid price spikes, demand for dairy products is slipping and production is dropping. At the same time, feed costs are rising and supplies are tightening amid the drought. As a result, dairies are milking fewer cows. Meanwhile, a stronger cattle market is incentivizing some dairies to raise more bulls for beef than dairy replacement heifers. Across the country, that is lowering U.S. cow numbers.

Schools Get New Funding for Purchasing U.S. - Grown Foods

The U.S. Department of Agriculture is providing new funding to enable schools to purchase American-grown foods for school meal programs and to extend this year's summer meal programs through September. The funding is being made available after President Joe Biden signed the Keep Kids Fed Act, which provides support for school and child nutrition programs through the 2022-23 fiscal year. The \$943 million for school food purchases will be provided through the USDA's Commodity Credit Corporation.







Oroville Man Arraigned on 2 Shootings

Butte County DA News Release

BUTTE COUNTY, CA (MPG) - An Oroville man was in Butte County Superior Court on July 6 and was arraigned on two separate shootings caught on surveillance cameras in May and June of this year in the Oroville area.

Jason Allen Kraft, 36, of Oroville, was arraigned on two counts of assault with a semi-automatic handgun, two counts of possession of a firearm by a

felon, and a count of causing great bodily injury with a firearm. At the request of the District Attorney, Kraft was held in Butte County Jail on \$375,000 bail pending his next arraignment date on July 13, 2022.

District Attorney Mike Ramsey said the June 22 shooting occurred at approximately 10:40 p.m. near the intersection of Olive Highway and Lower Wyandotte Road. Bobby Rogers, 41, of Oroville, was riding an ATV in the area when he was shot once in the back. He was taken to a local hospital where he underwent emergency surgery and was subsequently released with a bullet still in his body.

The Oroville police collected surveillance tapes from local businesses in the area and one of them was released to local media on July 1, which lead to a tip identifying Kraft as the shooter. The next day, July 2, Kraft was spotted by Oroville police in Oroville, and after a short foot pursuit was arrested for the Rogers' shooting. During a search of the pathway used by Kraft, police found a semi-automatic "ghost gun", consistent with the caliber believed used in the Rogers' shooting.

Ramsey said the investigation also led to Kraft being identified as a suspect in a May 11, 2022, shooting at approximately 8:10 p.m. at an Oroville carwash in the 3400 block of Orange Avenue. Surveillance footage of that shooting showed a car being chased by another car come into the parking lot of the carwash and attempt to hide behind the carwash. A man later identified as Kraft came out on foot from the chasing car and fired two shots at the chased car. The man then got back into the vehicle and fled

Ramsey said the police are still looking for the victim of that shooting. Casings found at the carwash shooting were consistent with the caliber of the Roger's ATV shooting and with the ghost gun found near Kraft's arrest, as well as ammunition and gun supplies found in Kraft's home during a search warrant.

Chico Woman Pleads Guilty to Murder for Hwy 70 DUI that Killed One

Butte County DA News Release

BUTTE COUNTY, CA (MPG) - A Chico woman plead guilty today in Butte County Superior Court to Second Degree Murder as a result of a car crash while driving under the influence in February 2021.

Nicole Schalles, 36, of Chico was accused of driving her vehicle north on Highway 70 at speeds over 120 mph into the rear of another northbound vehicle on the road. The collision happened on February 4, 2021 at 11:25 p.m. near Lower Honcut Road killing Dollar Vang, 30, of Olivehurst.

Butte County District Attorney Mike Ramsey said Vang had been traveling from Olivehurst to work in Oroville when Schalles' vehicle overtook him as she traveled from Marysville back toward Chico. When Schalles hit the rear of Vang's vehicle, it caused Vang's vehicle to spin into the opposite lane

of traffic. Another vehicle traveling in the opposite direction then hit Vang's vehicle. Vang died from injuries sustained in the collision, the driver of the other vehicle sustained a broken collarbone.

Vang left behind a pregnant wife and an infant child, Ramsey said. His second child was born shortly after his death.

Ramsey said Schalles had left her home in Chico around 7:30 p.m. and drove to two bars in Marysville to drink and buy drugs. An analysis of her blood revealed Schalles' blood alcohol content was 0.24 per cent, more than three times the legal limit and showed the presence of oxycodone in her system.

Ramsey said Schalles had previously been convicted of a DUI in 2012 during which time she engaged in alcohol programs as well as a DUI school. Schalles said she had been involved in Alcoholics Anonymous for at least 10 years prior to the collision. Schalles reportedly told a friend after the collision that, "They talk about it. One time. That's all it takes."

Ramsey said the murder charge rather than a manslaughter charge was pursued by his office because Schalles had been previously warned during her prior DUI hearing and in subsequent classes that should she drive under the influence and cause a death, she could be charged with murder. This subjective knowledge of the dangers of drinking and driving ultimately resulted in Schalles' murder conviction for the death of Vang.

Schalles will next appear in Butte County Superior Court on July 29, 2022 at 1:30 p.m. when she will be sentenced. She is facing a life sentence in state prison with the possibility of parole in 15 years. She continues to be held in the Butte County Jail with no bail.

DBW Reminds Boaters to Carry a California Boater Card

California State Parks News Release

SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) - California State Parks' Division of Boating and Waterways (DBW) reminds California boaters of the requirement to obtain and carry a California Boater Card when boating on state inland and coastal waterways. Applying for one is a simple process, it costs \$10 and lasts a lifetime. Operators who are not in compliance with the law and caught operating a vessel without their California Boater Card will be cited accordingly. This is considered an infraction and base fines can range anywhere from \$100

U.S. Coast Guard boating accident data show that states with some form of boating safety education have fewer accidents and fatalities than states without any boater education requirements. California is one of the last states to implement a mandatory boating education requirement. The law is being phased-in by age. By Jan. 1, 2023, all boaters 50 years of age or younger must carry a card. All boaters, regardless of age, will need to carry one by Jan. 1, 2025. The card is verification that its holder has successfully taken and passed an approved boating safety education course. It is important to note there are exemptions to the law. For example, those operating a rental vessel or possessing a valid marine operator's license issued by the U.S. Coast Guard do not need to obtain a California Boater Card. To date, DBW has issued more than 143,000 cards.

"It's not just novice boaters that benefit from this education program by learning the

boating rules of the road," said DBW Acting Deputy Director Ramona Fernandez. "Even experienced boaters find that a boating safety course can help them improve their boating knowledge and stay up to date with current boating laws."

Applying for a California Boater Card is a simple process. Boaters can complete their application by visiting CaliforniaBoaterCard. com. The card only costs \$10 and lasts a lifetime. Boaters have an option to complete an online, classroom or a home study course. Boaters only need to complete one of the approved courses. Once DBW has received your application, proof of education and payment, you will receive a 90-day temporary boater card by email. You should receive your official boater card by mail within 30 days from the time the application was approved. Detailed information on the process and information on available boating safety courses is available online at CaliforniaBoaterCard.com. A toll-free telephone support line is also available at (844) 421-8333.

Assembly Request Action by the Governor to Protect the Trucking Industry

SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) - On Tuesday, July 5, Assembly Republicans sent a letter to Governor Gavin Newsom, urging him to delay implementation of AB 5 or exempt independent truckers entirely from its employee reclassification (ABC) test. The Supreme Court declined to hear a case on June 30th that would have challenged the new law, now putting AB 5 on the fast-track for going into effect in California.

"California's and the nation's economy in part depends on our ability to move products through our ports. The employment standards that AB 5 sets for independent truckers puts more undue stress on our economy and will increase shipping costs, driving inflation even higher. We are trying to prevent our already strained supply chain from getting worse, and if there are cuts to the trucking workforce, this will hurt both businesses and consumers."

"The sad reality is that the devastating ramifications of this ruling will be felt most among minority truck owners - my constituents. Not only will the rollout of AB 5 hamper minority truck owners in their goal to achieve the American Dream, but it will also force our owner-operator fleets to give up their independence and ability to work on their own terms. Many of the signatories of this letter argued strongly against AB 5 on these grounds. While I respect the Supreme Court's decision, this issue falls upon the failures of our state to prevent unintended consequences of rash policy decisions, such

The letter calls on Governor Newsom to use his executive powers to either delay application of AB 5 or exempt the trucking industry altogether from the ABC test, which determines whether a worker is an employee or an independent contractor. By not taking action, the Governor would be eliminating 20 percent of California's vital supply chain workforce.

The Ministry of Truth

On Monday June 20th, Sutter County continued with their work on the 23-23 County budget which will be passed in the next few weeks. Assistant CAO Leanne Link gave an introduction speaking of the successes, challenges and realities the County must face in order to create a proper budget for the year. She went out of her way to reference me, my campaign, and a note I wrote to the people who voted for me. She felt it was important to note that my perspective of Sutter County's financial state, being a "mess" is not true. She addressed a few of my criticisms of county spending, like public safety and the K-mart building. She went on to say "The county is not in a financial mess" followed by, "At the same time we are facing significant challenges.... Our projections show a widening gap between our revenues and expenditures just to maintain the current level of services".

This budget cycle there are no grand gestures to tighten the County's belt, there is no talk of how much of a burden the taxpayers are under at the moment. Only grim threats that if there isn't an increase of revenue soon, programs will be cut and everyone in the county will feel the weight of that. Link finished with "Our budget is balanced."

Am I going crazy here? Throughout my election I gave the voters facts. Sutter County's budget has increased by 60% in the last 8 years alone, from 255 million to 410 million. We are currently coming off 2 of the highest budgets in Sutter County history, and yet according to Leanne Link as well as the "Grand Jury Report and Services Updates" brochure sent to Sutter County residents- we're out of money and need to cut vital programs. Overall County efforts to villainize me and my "negative" campaign only continue to do what the County has gotten all too comfortable with, putting lipstick on a pig and hoping no one will notice. The reality is, everyone can see it's a pig, that lipstick isn't fooling anyone. I did not gain supporters this election cycle by cleverly making up rumors about the County. I gained supporters because people in this community related to my message. They are also unhappy with the County's

An example of unnecessary and frivolous spending by the county would be on May 24th, when the Supervisors voted to donate \$6,000 to Marysville for their fireworks show (I wonder where they got that idea? Mr. Suma is all too comfortable with this word 'mis-information.' He seems to forget before the giant propaganda campaigns and communist lockdowns during the last two years, we used to refer to people disagreeing with each other as a difference in opinion. We should all be-ware and worried when reporters show their political affiliation all too plainly in their publications, as it is clear there is no un-biased nor accurate reporting going on.
