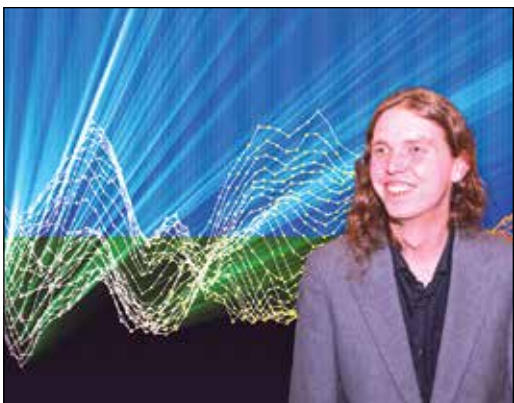

COLUSA COUNTY, CA (MPG) - Colusa County in Northern California is the top producer of rice in the Sacramento Valley. Colusa County historically produces more than 150,000 acres of rice in a normal year. But in 2022, Colusa officials say they will only be able to produce a fraction of their usual rice crop, costing rice farmers, workers and suppliers hundreds of millions of dollars.

"In April 2022, the water districts serving Colusa County were given their final allocation for the 2022 growing season - 0.4-acre feet per acre," Colusa County officials said in a statement. "This allocation is not enough to support rice production, and estimates show that the Sacramento Valley will fallow 370,000 of 450,000 acres in the Sacramento River Settlement Contractors service area, primarily in Colusa and Glenn Counties.

Currently, less than 7,000 acres are estimated to be planted in Colusa County, resulting in a direct financial loss to growers in excess of \$270 million."

The first 50% of California's water flows out to the Pacific Ocean for fish and environmental purposes - something the Public Policy Institute of California verified in 2019: "Water in California is shared across three main sectors. Statewide, average water use is roughly 50% environmental, 40% agricultural, and 10% urban."

Colusa County officials hosted a legislative tour and informative briefing for Assemblywoman Cecilia Aguiar-Curry (D-Winters), "highlighting the crisis-level economic impacts resulting from the unprecedented drought and winter freeze."

"The event concluded with a request for local assistance."

The Globe spoke with Colusa County Administrator Wendy Tyler about the meeting with Assemblywoman Aguiar-Curry, and

what the county is facing this year after the February Freeze and latest water allocation cuts.

Tyler said their meeting and message was "very well received," and noted that the Assemblywoman has an agriculture background and understands their plight.

Tyler described the devastation of the county's agriculture industry similar to what Covid lockdowns did to businesses in urban cities. "We need a payroll protection plan and rental assistance," Tyler said. "We have the third largest farm worker housing in the state. Thousands of people come to Colusa County every season, and work with Colusa County's own people. Their children go to Colusa schools, so when they aren't here it impacts our ADA."

She said when growers can't plant, suppliers are hurt - everyone from equipment suppliers to the people who make the bags for farm products. Specifically, this also impacts

New Wine, Spirits Bottle Recycling Bill Clears

SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) - The California Senate voted on May 25, 2022, unanimously to approve legislation written by Senate President pro Tempore Toni G. Atkins, D-San Diego, and co-written by Sen. Bill Dodd, D-Napa, to add wine and distilled spirits bottles to California's recycling program.

"I am really pleased that so many of our Senate colleagues recognized the importance of this common sense bill that benefits our environment and consumers," Sen. Dodd said. "With SB 1013 we can increase the recycling rates of millions of bottles that would otherwise wind up in our landfills or be illegally discarded. I look forward to seeing this bill with all its benefits for California pass the Assembly and be signed by Gov. Newsom."

"SB 1013 is historic change that is 40 years in the making," Pro Tem Atkins said. "I want to commend the wine industry, distilled spirits industry, environmental advocates, and other groups who have come together to support this landmark proposal. We will continue working with stakeholders as the bill moves through the Assembly to make sure remaining concerns are addressed, and then, hopefully, 2022 will be the year we can pop a cork and celebrate this overdue improvement to California's recycling law."

The California Beverage Container Recycling and Litter Reduction Act, established in 1986, encourages consumers to recycle beverage containers by requiring them to pay a deposit for eligible bottles. According to a 2019 report, curbside programs received approximately \$172 million from the so-called Bottle Bill in 2017, including \$15 million that is annually provided from the Beverage Container Recycling Fund.

Although the program includes beer, it does not include wine or spirits. It is estimated that California generates more than 500 million wine and spirits bottles each year, with less than 30% being recycled and over 300 million wine and spirits bottles going into landfills. Under Senate Bill 1013, wine and spirits bottles would be added to the program, leading to more recycling, increased business for recycling centers and

Long-Term National Study of Pregnant Women Finds Increase in Chemical Exposure

SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) - A national 12-year study that enrolled a highly diverse group of pregnant women, including women in the Sacramento region, found rising exposure to chemicals from plastics and pesticides that may be harmful to development.

"This is the first time we've been able to measure the amounts of chemicals in such a large and diverse group of pregnant women - not just identify chemicals," said Tracey J. Woodruff, senior author of the paper. Woodruff is a professor and director of the UC San Francisco Program on Reproductive Health and the Environment and co-director of the UCSF EARTH Center.

The results of the study,

which included co-authors from UC Davis Health, were published May 10, 2022, in *Environmental Science & Technology*.

Prenatal exposure to industrial chemicals can come from air, food, water, plastics, and other industrial and consumer products. Although these

chemicals could be harmful to pregnancy and child development, few of these chemicals are routinely monitored in people.

All Participants had Chemical ESposure

To determine exposure, researchers measured 103 chemicals, mostly from pesticides, plastics, and

"replacement chemicals," new forms of chemicals that were banned or phased out, like bisphenol A (BPA) and phthalates. Certain phthalates have been identified as neurotoxic chemicals that can harm child brain development and increase

Update on 2 Arrested for Animal Cruelty Violations

Sutter County Sheriff's Office

SUTTER COUNTY, CA (MPG) - On May 26, 2022, a second search and seizure warrant were executed as part of an ongoing investigation on the basis of suspected animal cruelty and neglect in the vicinity of the 3400 block of Sankey Road, Pleasant Grove.

During the original warrant service on May 24, 2022, Sutter County Sheriff's Officer Deputies and Animal Control Officers were unable to seize approximately 10 animals included in the warrant, due to logistical constraints. Animal Control Officers wrote a "Piggyback" warrant to seize those additional animals.

While serving the warrant, Deputy Arbaugh and Officer Terry noted 7 of the animals to be seized were not at the property, however, Deputy Arbaugh and Officer Terry determined 47 additional Animal Cruelty violations had occurred.

The Sutter Animal Authority and the Sutter County Sheriff's Office, with assistance from the Sutter County Sheriff's Posse and the Yuba County Animal Control, combined their efforts to seize 64 animals which included: 18 horses, 8 geese, 7 dogs, 7 alpacas, 5 peacocks, 5 exotic birds, 4 sheep, 2 pigs, 2 brahma bulls, 1 longhorn bull, 1 rooster, 1 camel and an ostrich.

Animals were seized due to a lack of proper nourishment, shelter and veterinary care. The warrant served was due to a collaborating effort between Animal Control Officers Newman and Terry with the Sutter Animal Services Authority and Deputy Arbaugh with the Sutter County Sheriff's Office. Both Agencies worked diligently to obtain an additional warrant to complete the investigation.

After the warrant was served, Pleasant Grove residents, 50-year-old Lynette Kim Countryman-Dunivan and 51-year-old Chad Damon Dunivan, were arrested for numerous felony charges, including animal cruelty. A bail enhancement was authored for Lynette and Chad. A Sutter Superior Court Judge reviewed

and signed the bail enhancements. Kim's new bail is \$75,000.00 and Chad's new bail is \$50,000.00.

This is an ongoing investigation and could potentially see more criminal charges.

Original News Release

On May 24, 2022, a search and seizure warrant were executed on the basis of suspected animal cruelty and neglect in the vicinity of the 3400 block of Sankey Road, Pleasant Grove.

The Sutter Animal Services Authority, Sutter County Sheriff's Office and Sutter County Code Enforcement combined their efforts to seize 63 animals which included: 39 dogs, 13 horses, 7 cats and 4 exotic birds.

Animals were seized due to a lack of proper shelter, nourishment, and veterinary care. The warrant served was due to a collaborating effort between Animal Control Officers Newman and Terry with the Sutter Animal Services Authority and Deputy Arbaugh with the Sutter County Sheriff's Office. Both Agencies worked diligently to obtain a warrant after multiple attempts were made to abate the issue.

After the warrant was served, Pleasant Grove residents, 50-year-old Lynette Kim Countryman-Dunivan and 51-year-old Chad Damon Dunivan, were arrested for numerous felony charges, including animal abuse.

This is an ongoing investigation and could potentially see more criminal charges.

"The combined efforts of all parties involved was not only motivating but inspiring. So much can be accomplished when everyone works together," said Megan Anderson, Manager of the Sutter Animal Services Authority.

Sheriff Barnes stated, "Thank you, community members, for coming forward with the information provided to help us obtain the search warrant. This collaborative effort with the community and Sutter Animal Services Authority was key to saving all the animals seized."

mills, aerial applicators, crop dusters, pesticide and fertilizer dealers, and ground applicators.

"The economic devastation is unprecedented," Tyler said. "People aren't dying, but businesses and communities are."

California ranks as the second-largest rice-growing state in the United States. "California rice is highly prized all over the world – particularly in Asia and the Middle East. In 2019, more than 498,000 acres of rice were planted on 1,100 farms, Think Rice reports. Rice production contributes more than \$775 million to the state economy."

In addition to the drought and water crisis, Tyler said in February Colusa County and much of the Sacramento Valley experienced a devastating freeze, resulting in a 74 percent loss of local almond crops. The estimated direct financial loss to growers is nearly \$210 million. Tyler said the impacts are felt by businesses related to growing almonds, dryers and processors, and added that growers are concerned about future labor shortages.

Tyler said they spoke with Assemblywoman Aguiar-Curry about receiving economic help, "especially going into the budget with the \$86 billion budget surplus."

Colusa County's request of Assemblywoman Aguiar-Curry's office is for an economic bridge to support and assist the industry through this crisis. Without assistance, Colusa County officials say generations of local heritage and their place in the global market are at risk. They say it is critical that the State develop and deploy local programs to help assist the industry through this historic crisis.

Tyler added, "The budget surplus should go to a rainy-day fund, but how about the day it doesn't rain?" ★

reduced processing costs. The expansion would also cut greenhouse gas emissions by almost 200,000 tons of carbon dioxide while reducing litter of wine and spirits containers, a visible and dangerous component of urban litter pollution.

SB1013 is supported by a number of groups including Californians Against Waste, Heal the Bay, California Association of Local Conservation Corps, Monterey Regional Waste Management District, National Stewardship Action Council, Northern

California Recycling Association, California Teamsters Public Affairs Council, The 5 Gyres Institute, the Plastic Pollution Coalition and Zero Waste USA. It has no formal opposition.

It passed the Senate with unanimous, bipartisan support. It heads next to the Assembly.

children’s risks for learning, attention, and behavioral disorders.

All participants had chemical exposure, and several compounds were detected in all 171 participants. More than 80% of the chemicals were found in at least one of the women in the study, and more than a third of the chemicals were found in a majority of the participants. The study also found that some of these chemicals were present in higher amounts than seen in earlier studies.

The multi-institutional study included 171 women from California, Georgia, Illinois, New Hampshire, New York, and Puerto Rico who are part of the National Institutes of Health Environmental influences on Child Health Outcomes program. About one-third (34%) were white, 40% were Latina, 20% were Black, and the remaining 6% were from other or multiple groups.

Latinas had Higher Levels of Exposure

The study found higher exposures for non-white women, those with lower educational attainment, or who were single or had been exposed to tobacco. Latinas had especially high levels of parabens, which are used as preservatives, as well as phthalates and bisphenols, which are used in plastics.

“While pesticides and replacement chemicals were prevalent in all women, we were surprised to find that Latinas had substantially higher levels of parabens, phthalates and bisphenols,” said Jessie Buckley, associate professor of environmental health and engineering, as well as of epidemiology, at Johns Hopkins Bloomberg School of Public Health and first author of the study.

“This could be the result of higher exposures to products with chemicals, such as processed foods or personal care products,” Buckley said. “Our findings make clear that the number and scope of chemicals in pregnant women are increasing during a very vulnerable time of development for both the pregnant person and the fetus.”

Many of the chemicals the women had

been exposed to were replacement chemicals, which may turn out to be just as harmful as the ones they replaced. The study also found many women had been exposed to neonicotinoids, a widely used insecticide that is toxic to bees.

“Exposure to chemicals in the environment is inevitable because they are used widely. We know some of the chemicals cause harm, but for some of the ones being measured for the first time, all we can say with certainty is that exposure to these compounds is occurring. More work needs to be done to determine potential risks,” explained Deborah Bennett, a co-author of the study. Bennett is a professor of environmental health in the UC Davis School of Medicine Department of Public Health Sciences. She helped identify which chemicals to track.

“Exposures are generally low, so pregnant moms should continue to live their lives and not be too concerned,” Bennett said. According to Bennett, there are steps people can take to help limit chemical exposures.

“Cook at home using fresh or frozen ingredients – rather than processed or packaged foods – when possible,” Bennett said. She also recommends avoiding pesticides and controlling household pests without chemicals. “People can also learn which personal care products have fewer harmful chemicals by checking with organizations such as the Environmental Working Group.”

Many of the children in this study will be followed as part of the Environmental influences on NIH Child Health Outcomes (ECHO) program study.

Bennett is leading a separate study funded by the Environmental Protection Agency that is looking at children’s exposure to chemicals in household dust. Bennett and her team will track more than 80 chemicals in dust collected from participating homes, including many plasticizers, flame retardants and environmental phenols. ★



Former Church Administrator Arrested in Oklahoma, Charged with Fraud /Identity Theft

In early December 2021, a Moore, Oklahoma single mother received a text from her day care provider. “There is an emergency. We need you to pick-up your child immediately. Nothing is wrong with your child.” “Imagine my surprise when I show up to pick-up my son and the FBI is waiting for us,” says the mother. They wouldn’t tell us anything other than “they are not investigating anything with the day care including physical harm to children.” My day care provider was Chanell Easton. Her husband is Aaron Easton. As a new parent I was losing my mind said the mother. She called Department of Health Services (DHS) to ask about the Eastons. DHS was not helpful. She then found an article online about the unsolved death of Sara Matthews Easton, then Marysville Chief of Police Aaron Easton’s deceased wife. She never returned to the daycare for her son’s belongings. On May 19, 2022, a federal grand jury in Sacramento returned an indictment, charging Chanell Easton with 22 counts of wire fraud and two counts of aggravated identity theft for a scheme to embezzle church funds, U.S. Attorney Phillip A. Talbert announced. “According to court documents, from June 2013 to February 2018, Easton worked as an administrator at a church in Yuba City. During her employment, Easton stole over \$360,000 from the church, including

from its food pantry and youth ministry, during a years-long embezzlement scheme. Without the church’s knowledge or authorization, Easton opened five business credit card accounts in the church’s name. Easton used these five credit cards, as well as a credit card used by the church’s youth pastor, to make personal purchases – including at a hair salon, retail stores, online retailers, a vacation rental service, and to buy concert tickets – and then paid off the resulting balance with the church’s money. Easton also transferred money directly from the church’s bank accounts to her own personal account, paid down the balance of her own personal credit card, and paid her cellphone provider for her personal bills and for new phones.” (U.S. Attorney’s Office Statement) (The Pastor of Saint Andrew’s Presbyterian Church Garret Andrew, Easton’s boss, served there from January 1, 2013 to August of 2020. He now pastors Nipomo Community Presbyterian Church. Chanell Bright Easton left her church job after marrying former Marysville Chief of Police Aaron Easton on December 9, 2017. They eventually relocated to Oklahoma.) If Chanell Easton is found guilty as charged that means she was embezzling church funds while being the fiancé of Marysville’s Chief of Police. The Aaron / Chanell timeline reaches nearly back to Sara Matthews Easton’s death. The Appeal Democrat published a story on November 9, 2017 describing accusations of a former police cadet that Aaron Easton forced her to perform oral sex in a patrol car in 2008. Chief Easton resigned the day the story appeared according to the paper. The Yuba County Sheriff’s Department and the

District Attorney had been investigating the accusation. Sara Matthews Easton died on August 16, 2015 from a gunshot wound to the head in Aaron and Sara’s Yuba City, CA. bedroom. The case is unresolved. The Sutter County coroner has never declared the “manner” or circumstances of Sara’s death. The probe was turned over to the California Department of Justice where Vice President Kamala Harris was then the Attorney General. The investigation ended there. The Sara Matthews Easton death tainted Sutter County District Attorney Amanda Hopper’s time in office. Hopper could not prosecute the case as her then husband Brian Hopper was interviewed by Yuba City Police Department regarding Sara’s death. The Hoppers and Eastons were friends at one time. The indictment also says that Chanell Easton stole money from the church by writing checks to others and to her for personal expenses. She forged the signatures of the church’s treasurer or the head volunteer of the church’s food pantry. This case is the result of the investigation by the Federal Bureau of Investigation. Assistant U.S. Attorneys Elliot C. Wong and Christopher S. Hales are prosecuting the case. If convicted, Easton faces a maximum statutory penalty of 20-years in prison and a \$250,000 fine for each count of wire fraud, and a mandatory two-year sentence on each count of aggravated identity theft. The charges are allegations and Chaney is presumed to be innocent unless proven guilty beyond a reasonable doubt. 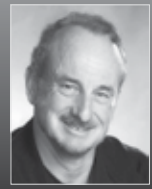

The Stable Coin Blow Up

After nine straight weeks of a bitcoin decline, now the experiment that combined math and software to get a digital currency to behave like a U.S. dollar crashed in dramatic fashion, posing the biggest threat yet to develop a decentralized cyber currency.

TerraUSD, or "UST", is another in a long line of attempted cyber currencies, called "cyber coins", the most celebrated of which is Bitcoin.

TerraUSD, was called a stable coin, which, unlike its thousands of counter parts which include bitcoin, was developed to provide a "stable" valued vehicle in the cyber coin universe. Investors in cyber tokens know of the wild swings that cyber coins can have. Terra was an attempt to provide a coin that would retain its value at par, which is to say, remain worth one U.S. dollar at all times.

TerraUSD, an "algorithmic stable coin", uses a variety of methodologies and incentives in an attempt to maintain its peg of one-to-one to the dollar. It strives to accomplish this by working with a crypto token in the same ecosystem. That token, called Luna, can be swapped for Terra and vice versa.

This back and forth swapping by traders supposedly keeps the price of a Terra where it should be, which is walking in lockstep with the U.S. dollar.

The thinking around developing a stable vehicle was to enable crypto traders to make transactions in differing cyber coins easily and quickly without needing to leave the digital asset universe. It also was thought to alleviate intermediaries and the concerns the value of various coins would fluctuate when trades or swaps were executed.

If it all sounds a little gobblydegookish, it's not you. I have found unless one is a full on member of the computer geek squad, the world of cyber coin will be more than a bit confusing.

Even for experienced Wall Street alumni like myself, although millions of people trade and write about the world of cyber coin, there is much we plain folks don't understand about exactly what is going on in the cyber coin universe.

A month ago, the future looked bright for TerraUSD. Until last Monday, when all of the mechanisms that were supposed to keep TerraUSD stable, were anything but stable.

TerraUSD fell to a low of 60 cents on that day, and reached a further low of around 20 cents in another crash on Wednesday. At the time of this writing, it sits at two cents.

Pretty rocky stuff for a coin called "stable."

The event took down the market cap of TerraUSD from \$18.4 billion to essentially zero. The Luna "backbone token" also avalanched.

Nikita Fadeev, head of crypto fund Fasanara Digital, which de-risked its position in advance of the crash, said: "Everything broke. It is full capitulation."

Exactly why all of the so called "stable" UST mechanisms failed remains unclear. Conspiracy theories abound as to what happened, but in this analyst opinion, when vast amounts of monies are floating around in cyberspace, this whole fiasco comes as no surprise. Once again, many lost everything while others walked away very rich. Nothing new in the world of cyber coin.

I know there are a lot smarter people than me when it comes to the net and the cyber coin playground. As a result, it's no place I want to put my hard earned money, and I doubt the average Joe Shmoe should be doing it either.

The move is on to provide more backing to TerraUSD to once again stabilize its value, with figures around the 1.5 billion being tossed about. But since none of this is government backed, I view the entire cyber coin universe and its multiple trading platforms to access it, one big Wild West show. There are landmines everywhere, it rife with amateurs and novice traders, and its run by techno wizards of unknown repute.

The whole thing, at least to me, reminds me of a three ring circus, complete with the "3 Card Monty" con game, where everybody that plays never seems to win, at least for long.

With the latest collapse of the cyber token called "stable coin", I can say it comes as no surprise. What is ironic is that what was supposed to be the epitome of why people flock to the bitcoin game, which is autonomous stability and safety, failed miserably in both respects.

Concluding, if some people still elect to play in the cyber coin universe after this collapse, it will be one of most baffling investor decisions I have ever seen.

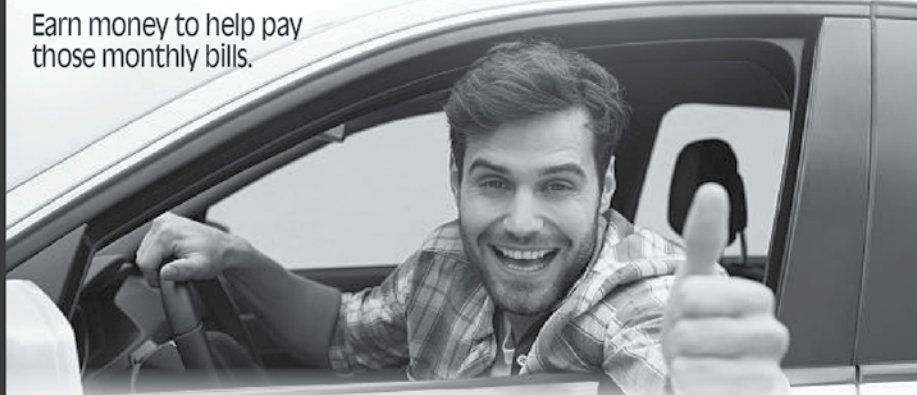

Newsom, Legislators Given Stark Budget Warning

The Capitol is agog about Gov. Gavin Newsom's declaration that California will have a nearly \$100 billion budget surplus.

"You've never seen a number like this," Newsom told reporters as he unveiled his revised 2022-23 budget proposal.

Nearly half of the surplus must, by law, go to schools. The governor and legislative leaders are now busily negotiating how to spend the other \$52 billion. They agree on giving a big chunk of it back to Californians but are arguing over how much and who will get the checks and/or cash cards.

However, the Legislature's own budget advisor, Gabe Petek, is warning the politicians that they should be very careful because the budget could be in big trouble in the years ahead. If they ignore his advice, there could be a fiscal meltdown of epic proportions.

Petek believes that the governor's revenue estimates – on which the huge surplus estimate is based – could be too optimistic because he ignores a very real threat of recession. Petek also faults the governor's budget for ignoring long-term effects of the Gann Limit, a

constitutional provision that imposes tight controls on revenue windfalls.

"Although predicting the next recession is impossible," Petek says in a report released on Tuesday, "economic indicators currently suggest a heightened risk of recession within two years. Past recessions – with the exception of the one induced by the pandemic – have resulted in cumulative revenue losses of tens of billions of dollars. In two recent recessions, in fact, total revenue losses were around \$100 billion."

"Under our estimates of revenue and spending in the out-years, the state would have a very narrow operating deficit in 2023-24, a small operating surplus in 2024-25, and a larger operating deficit in 2025-26," Petek says.

Although Newsom's budget makes passing reference to the possibility of recession, it assumes that the state's recovery from the pandemic-caused downturn will continue to be strong, and thus will generate a strong flow of revenues.

Petek reserves his sharpest criticism, however, for the budget's lack of a plan to cope with the effects of the Gann Limit. Once the calculated limit is reached, any revenue beyond that point must be either returned to taxpayers or spent on a few exempt categories.

"These requirements would far exceed the state's narrow operating surpluses – and would compound operating deficits," Petek notes, adding that without corrective action "the state likely would have significant

budget shortfalls in the out-years."

As drafted, Newsom's budget avoids triggering the Gann Limit in 2022-23 by clever accounting, but Petek warns that it's likely to hit home within the next few years, forcing Newsom – assuming he's re-elected this year — and the Legislature to reduce spending on other programs to meet Gann Limit requirements.

Although Newsom and legislative leaders have indicated they may ask voters to repeal or modify the Gann Limit's stringent requirements, "In the meantime, we strongly caution the Legislature against passing a budget with a structural deficit stemming from unaddressed State Spending Limit (Gann Limit) requirements," Petek says.

He suggests that one way to make the budget more resilient to both recession and Gann Limit requirements is to devote more of the surplus to reserves, which would mean spending less of it on things that the governor and legislators want, such as a massive election year giveback of cash to voters.

"Economic indicators point to a recession on the horizon within the next two years, not three-to-four years from now," Petek warns. "The state has a \$52 billion surplus this year – now is the time to prepare for these looming budget problems."

Capitol Democrats Again Reject Lower Gas Prices

Assembly Republicans News Release

SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) - On May 25, 2022, Assembly Republicans gathered in front of a local gas station ahead of a pivotal vote to suspend the gas tax. For the third time this year, Democrats struck down any efforts to lower gas prices as they continue to escalate. Ahead of Memorial Day weekend travel, Republicans wanted to put forward a bipartisan solution that would have passed on savings to consumers at the pump, though Democrats continued to play party politics and were not in favor of hearing this legislation on the floor.

Assembly Republican Leader James Gallagher (R-Yuba City) was joined by colleagues Assemblyman Kevin Kiley (R-Rocklin), Assemblywoman

Laurie Davies (R-Laguna Niguel), Assemblyman Steven Choi (R-Irvine), and Assemblyman Thurston Smith (R-Apple Valley) in front of a Sacramento gas station to discuss bipartisan proposal AB 2547 ahead of a vote on the Assembly floor that took place this morning. This legislation would have suspended the gas tax for one year and require that all revenue generated by the tax be passed on directly to the consumer.

Assembly Members of the Republican Caucus released the following statements:

"This morning we are here to talk about the gas prices and much-needed relief California families need. As Republicans, we have been pushing for a gas tax suspension since the beginning, when we introduced a bill in January and pushed for a vote and brought a vote to the

floor... we need to provide this relief. People have waited far too long... we are now on day 77 of the Governor promising to provide gas tax relief. The good news is, there's been a bipartisan measure that's been introduced, AB 2457, which has both Democrats and Republicans who have signed on. We are going to bring it to the floor and vote on it now. We are not going to wait any longer."

"Yesterday, Joe Biden celebrated high gas prices as we make our 'incredible transition'. Apparently, it's more incredible here in California than anywhere else as our gas prices climb to astronomic levels... our caucus is fighting to reverse the tide. our colleagues on the other side of the aisle when they are ready to work on real solutions. That starts today, this morning, when we will give them another chance to vote on suspending the gas tax."

In some parts of the state, gas is nearly \$8 a gallon. That is unacceptable and unsustainable for our

communities... enough is enough."

'There's a Perfect Storm Brewing,' Farm Bureau President Warns in D.C. Visit

California Farm Bureau leaders met with members of Congress and key officials of the U.S. Department of Agriculture and other agencies in Washington, D.C., this month. The meetings took place as California agriculture faces severe challenges from drought and water shortages, surging fertilizer prices and supply chain disruptions stranding farm exports. "There's a perfect storm brewing that could pretty traumatically affect our food supply," warned Farm Bureau President Jamie Johansson.

Blueberry Yield Plummets After Weather-related Damage

California blueberry growers are picking a smaller crop this year after losing fruit to spring frost and hail. The California Blueberry Commission estimates that farms will produce 55 million pounds of fresh berries this year. That's down from an original projection of 65 million pounds and nearly 20 million pounds less than the 2021 crop total. The drop comes after farmers in parts of Northern and Central California suffered crop damage in a spring freeze.

California Almond Harvest May Fall by 4%, According to Forecast

California's 2022 almond harvest is expected to drop by 4% compared to 2021. That's according to the U.S. Department of Agriculture's National Agricultural Statistics Service. The agency's subjective forecast estimates that California will harvest 2.8 billion pounds of almonds this year, down from last year's yield of 2.92 billion pounds. The average yield per acre is expected to drop by 8%, falling from 2,210 pounds per acre to 2,040.

Cattle Ranchers Partner with Conservationists to Protect Rangelands

California cattle ranchers and conservationists are partnering to preserve open space, while also protecting grazing for livestock. Since 2001, 280,000 acres of working ranch landscapes have been lost to development, such as subdivisions and shopping centers. But some 80 California ranches have reached agreements with a conservation group, the California Rangeland Trust, to permanently protect another 365,000 acres of working lands. ★

Two Arrested for Possession of 3 lbs of Methamphetamine and 5 lbs of Marijuana

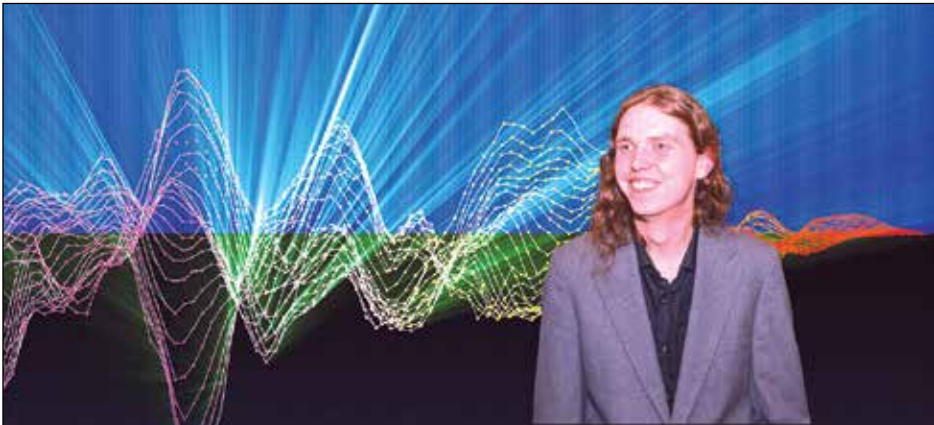
YUBA-SUTTER REGION, CA (MPG) - On May 10th, 2022, members of the Yuba Sutter Narcotic and Gang Enforcement Task Force (NET-5) contacted and arrested Gerardo Garcia Garcia (25 years old of Yuba City) and Juan Castro Garcia (26 years old of Yuba City) in a parking lot of the 1200 block of Bridge Street in Yuba City. The two men were found to be in possession of approximately 3 pounds of methamphetamine during an apparent drug transaction occurring at that location.

Following the arrest search warrants were served at two locations in Yuba City believed to be associated with the suspects. NET-5 Agents located an estimated 5 pounds of processed marijuana at one of the residences located in the 100 block of Toledo Street in Yuba City. Both men were arrested and booked into the Sutter County Jail for charges of conspiracy to distribute narcotics and possession of narcotics for sale. This investigation was forwarded to the Sutter County District Attorney's Office. ★

Presence - A Sound Environment Experience by Local Composer, Kevin Swenson

MARYSVILLE, CA (MPG) - On June 11, Yuba-Sutter Audiences will have the opportunity to enjoy a very unique sound experience created by a very talented local composer. Presence - A Sound Environment is a flexible, generative, and immersive sound installation environment created by Yuba City born composer Kevin Swenson. The piece is powered by a computer algorithm that analyzes data in real time about the date, time, and weather of the location in which the piece is performed. Thus, the piece is not only different whenever it is performed, but concurrent performances hosted in different locations will also produce different results. An accompanying laser light show designed by lighting designer, Chris Bolton, will enhance the experience. With seven distinct sound sources symbolizing the seven days, Presence molds a range of environments suitable for contemplation, dancing, introspection, meditation, prayer, and ritual. Participants are encouraged to come as they are and experience

the piece in a safe, welcoming environment. In theory, the piece has no fixed beginning or end, and participants are free to come and go as they please during any given performance. Through participation listeners may find the space to cultivate a peaceful curiosity and open mind. The nature of Presence is ephemeral after all - if you miss it now it will never be the same again. The sonification of data is nothing new. Sonification is the use of non-speech audio to convey information or perceptualize data. Auditory perception has advantages in temporal, spatial, amplitude, and frequency resolution that open possibilities as an alternative or complement to visualization techniques.

For example, the rate of clicking of a Geiger counter conveys the level of radiation in the immediate vicinity of the device. Kevin Swenson is a composer and performer of a wide range of acoustic, electronic, and electro-acoustic music originally from Yuba City. His influences are diverse, ranging from the just-intonation works of La Monte Young to Carter Family ballads, and the jazz of Miles Davis. His musical foundation was built at both Yuba City High School and Yuba College, as well as in the private trumpet studio of Michael Meeks. He a Master of Music degree in Composition from Syracuse University and a Bachelor of Music (Summa Cum Laude) in Composition from

University of the Pacific. In the Fall, Kevin will begin studies towards a Ph.D. in Music Composition at the University of Iowa. The free event will be held Saturday, June 11, from 5-9pm at the Sutter Theater Center for the Arts, 754 Plumas Street in Yuba City. Feel free to bring your own lawn chair or blanket or enjoy the tables and chairs in the theater. The lobby concession stand, and bar will be open during the event. Plenty of free parking is available on Plumas Street and the streets adjacent to the theater. 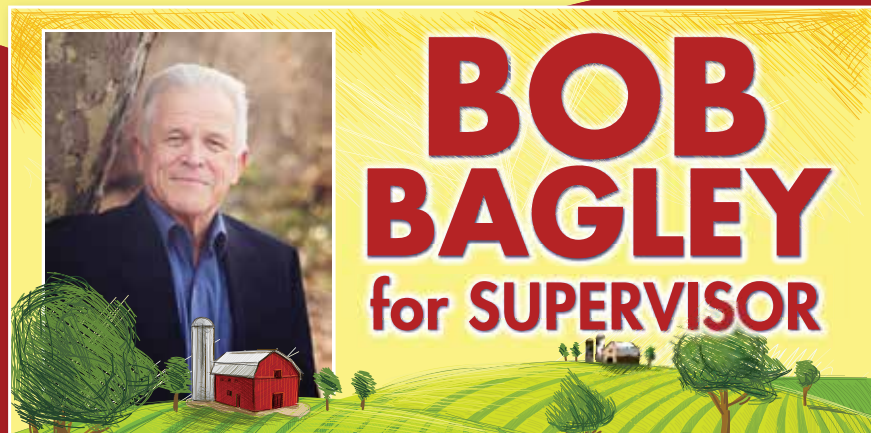
