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They're Spending Your Money

Gov. Gavin Newsom is a man of many superlatives, but even he seemed to struggle to adequately describe just how much extra cash the state of California will have to spend in the coming year's budget: \$97.5 billion.

Speaking for more than two hours in a press conference in Sacramento, Newsom unveiled his latest record spending proposal for the coming fiscal year. Riding a superheating

economy and drawing disproportionately from the state's highest earners, the state is now projected to have a surplus bigger than California – or any state – has ever had, and significantly more than the \$76 billion that the governor predicted in January.

Roughly half of the surplus is required by law to be spent on education. That leaves "only" roughly \$49 billion in discretionary money, and the governor wants to reserve 99% of that for one-time spending: \$18.1 billion to provide financial relief for Californians buffeted by inflation,

plus \$37 billion for infrastructure investments, including \$5.6 billion for education facility upgrades, and an extra \$2.3 billion for the ongoing fight against COVID-19.

A few of the other big numbers that Newsom mentioned: \$128.3 billion in education spending, from transitional kindergarten through high school, a record-breaking sum that works out to \$22,850 per student; Another \$23 billion will be parked into the state's rainy day fund, to be drawn upon the next time the

Caltrans Breaks Ground on Bridge Replacement

- Caltrans broke ground on a major Sacramento River bridge and viaduct replacement project on State Route 162 in the Butte City area of Glenn County. The \$106 million project includes \$13.8 million in funding from Senate Bill (SB) 1, the Road Repair and Accountability Act of 2017.

"With about 1,200 farms, agriculture serves as the engine that drives Glenn County's economy," said Caltrans District 3 Director Amarjeet S. Benipal. "The new Butte City Bridge and viaduct will enhance motorist safety and meet the needs of today's larger farm tractors and commercial trucks that serve the county's \$750 million-per-year farm economy."

For more than seven decades, residents, travelers, farmers, and school buses have relied on the Butte City Bridge to cross the Sacramento River. On average, more than 2,700

vehicles, including more than 270 trucks, travel daily on the bridge, which connects the county seats of Willows Glenn County and Oroville in Butte County.

The aging structure serves as a vital transportation link connecting Glenn, Colusa, and Butte counties. Without the bridge, motorists would have to travel more than 30 miles to connect back to State Routes 162 and 45.

Crews will construct a new bridge and viaduct featuring 12-foot traffic lanes and 8-foot shoulders in each direction just north of the current alignment. The structure will feature a 4,686-foot cast-in-place prestressed box girder. A 14-foot eastbound shoulder will be constructed on SR 162/Main Street from east of McDougall Street to south of Eureka Street in Butte City.

SB 1 provides \$5 billion in transportation funding annually split between the state and local agencies. Road projects progress through construction phases more quickly based on the availability of SB 1 funds, including projects that are partially funded by SB 1. economy slows; \$2.5 billion for housing, including \$500 million to fund the conversion of vacant malls and storefronts into homes; An extra \$3.4 billion to pay down state employee retirement debt.

The massive windfall that the state is sitting on, coupled with the state's progressive tax system is a sign of "the concentration of wealth and success in the hands of a few that are enjoying abundance in historic and unprecedented ways," Newsom said. "I am proud of California's progressive tax system...and we're the beneficiary of that."

Now the ball is in the state Legislature's court as key lawmakers in the Assembly and the state Senate decide where they agree with the governor and which priorities they want to haggle over before the June 15 deadline to pass a final, balanced budget for the fiscal year that starts July 1.

The "May revise" rollout is part of the annual call-and-response between the governor's

office and the Legislature over how to spend your tax dollars. Each year, the governor sets the negotiations in motion in January with a preliminary budget proposal. This year, Newsom's proffer included a record surge in K-12 education spending, along with multi-billion dollar proposals to ramp up the state's wildfire prevention projects, convert more vacant hotels into housing for the homeless and open up Medi-Cal, the state's health insurance program for the poor, to all undocumented immigrants.

What a difference two years makes. In May 2020, with the state still weathering the first surge of COVID-19, the governor's Department of Finance projected a \$54 billion deficit and a year of Great Depression-level unemployment rates. Neither came to pass, just the opposite: Boosted by rosy economic conditions for the state's highest earners and a massive influx of cash from the federal government, state coffers have been overflowing for the last two years.

Still, Newsom and the Legislature's budget staff add a note of caution: The war in Ukraine, rising inflation and higher interest rates are increasing uncertainty. And capital gains as a percentage of personal income is the highest since 1999, just before the dot.com bust. The nonpartisan Legislative Analyst's Office also warned that a recession may be on the horizon within two years, and urged the governor and

Legislature to add to reserves.

The Republican minority in the Legislature is so diminished that Democrats don't need their support to pass a budget. But that isn't stopping GOP lawmakers from weighing in, if only to provide voters with a clear contrast as Election Day approaches.

"Newsom specializes in grand announcements and flashy sounding proposals, but he rarely follows through with effective solutions that actually help California families," GOP Assembly leader James Gallagher from Chico said in a statement. "The Governor may not want to acknowledge it, but California is in crisis and his budget is unsustainable."

If the average Californian hears anything about the announcement it's probably this: The governor wants to send \$400 to most of the state's car owners.

That's been the governor's idea to help drivers bear the cost of historically elevated gas prices. In the face of pushback from environmentalists, he also wants to throw in \$750 million to entice transit agencies to make bus and rail travel free for three months. And lest he be accused of throwing money at those who don't need it, the proposal is limited to drivers whose cars are worth under an as-yet unspecified cap.

Despite all that, there's some distance between this proposal and the Legislature's, where Democratic leaders want to send cash rebates to Californians making less than \$250,000, car owners or not. And it's even

further still from the GOP plan, which is simply to suspend the state gas tax.

"I have all the confidence in the world we'll be able to square those modest differences and we'll come around to a number and a strategy that's in the best interests of Californians," Newsom said.

For his part, Newsom pointed out his gas rebate proposal includes \$750 million to encourage free public transportation for three months. It also includes \$2.7 billion to pay rental assistance to residents who had applied before March 31 (covering claims that the original federal funding did not), and \$1.4 billion in utility assistance.

The announcement also answered another big question left unaddressed by the January proposal: Will an obscure amendment inserted into the California Constitution in 1979 compel the state to reroute some of the state's extra cash back to taxpayers?

The answer, at least for now, appears to be no.

The constitutional provision in question, the Gann Limit, was approved by voters during the heyday of the state's conservative "tax revolt" and capped per-person state spending to its 1978 level, after adjusting for inflation. Anything left over has to be sent back to taxpayers and school districts. With the state's coffers as full as they are, the January budget blueprint projected that the state would breach the cap.

But with more spending on exempt types of expenditure, including infrastructure, the current plan is now \$2.6 billion below that ceiling. Newsom noted that he would support a proposal to put an amendment to voters to tweak or perhaps outright eliminate the Gann Limit, which he said is "long overdue."

Following a years-long trend, the governor also hints at the possibility of shuttering more state prisons. Though the state prison population has ticked up slightly since the early days of the pandemic, it still sits at a decade-long trough and is expected to continue trending down. The budget proposal notes that the state may be able to "close three additional state prisons by 2024-25."

With the state bracing for yet another season of extreme heat, wildfire and drought, Newsom's revised budget includes an additional \$8 billion to increase the reliability of the state's power grid and hasten the development of clean energy projects.

Echoing his Republican challengers in the unsuccessful effort last year to remove him from office, Newsom cast some blame for the housing crisis on the state's premier environmental law – but proposed little in the way of change. Instead, he said he signed 17 CEQA reform bills and looks forward to working with legislators on more proposals that provide more certainty and more predictability to address housing affordability issues. ★

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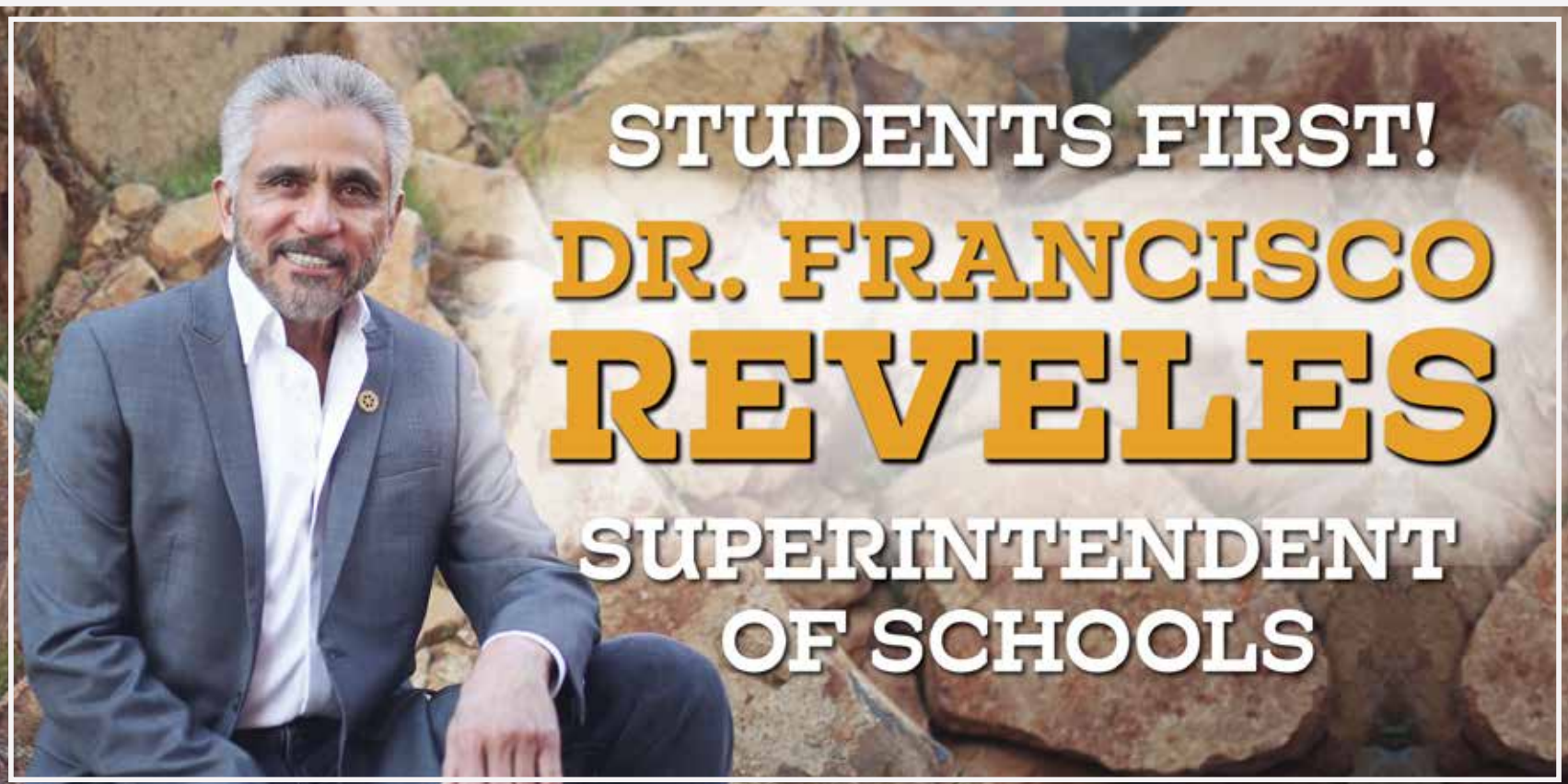
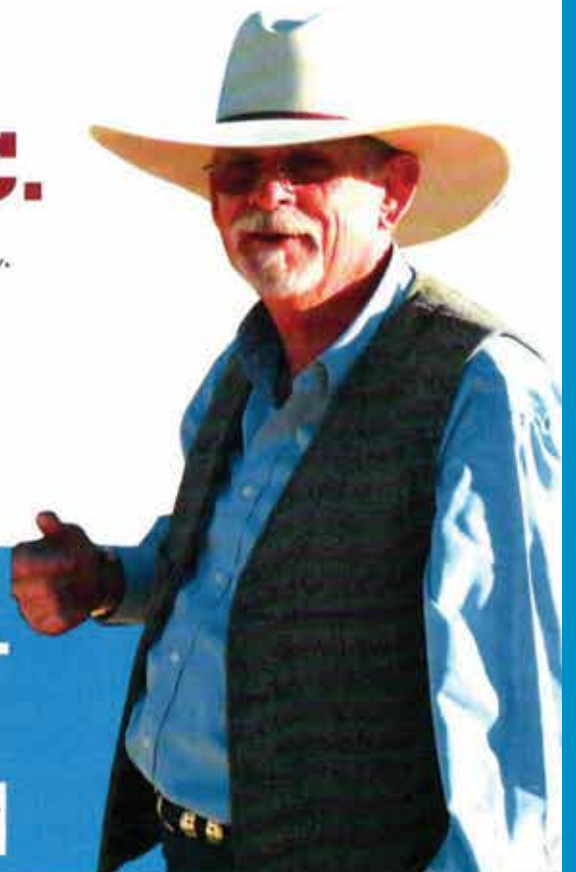

Private Catholic High School to Open in Yuba City

YUBA CITY, CA (MPG) - Yuba-Sutter parents looking for alternatives to public high school will soon have a new option.

Next fall, Chesterton Academy of the Most Holy Eucharist will open on the Campus of St. Isidore's School in Yuba City. This school will join the Chesterton Network of Schools, a collection of independent school that have been opening across the country, as well as in Canada and Italy. The Mission of the schools is to "inspire and encourage parent led schools across the nation."

The Chesterton Network of schools aims to provide a rigorous classical education to high school students. What started as a single school in Minneapolis, Minnesota now has campuses in mul-

Each of the four years of the program will have a focus. Freshmen will concentrate on the ancient world, sophomores on the early Medieval period, juniors on the High Middle Ages/Renaissance and seniors on the Modern World.

The Yuba City program will be supervised

of expanding to the former Notre Dame School campus in Marysville, if needed. While the school is Catholic, students from all backgrounds will be welcome. Tuition will be kept as low as possible to make the school accessible to interested families. Recently, Chesterton announced a partnership with Franciscan University in Steubenville, Ohio which would allow juniors and seniors to earn as many as 36 college credits before graduating from high school.

The school's mission is to collaborate with parents, honoring them as their children's primary educators. This combined with Burky's emphasis on St. Isidore's being a place of "healing" makes the new high school an attractive option to local families.

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The Warning Lights of a Market Crash

The markets stopped their seemingly weeks long freefall last Friday, May 13th, with green numbers across the board. Not all stocks went up. I can't actually recall a day when every stock did go up, but certainly Friday was a welcome sea of green in an otherwise month or three of mostly red.

Although no one can forecast market direction at any time with certainty, Mr. Market does speak to those analysts that are listening and know its language.

It's a difficult thing to interpret, Mr. Markets language, but serious students of the equity marketplace and those having the experience to have lived through many a correction and rally can at least get a grip on the mood of Wall Street if they take the time to listen.

When markets start to fall, certain things can occur that, when watched, lead the analyst to draw at least a few conclusions. When Wall Street's mood turns negative and stocks pull back, it is common to see certain sectors rise in a contrarian move to those stocks that are falling. Consumer staples (things like soap and things that people *have* to buy) can rise. Food stocks can also move opposite to a falling market. So can bonds and utility stocks.

If a sell off continues, the contagious mood of stock selling can begin to lead these same stocks to flatten out and then fall in concert. Basically, even though an initial selloff can move some stocks up at first, the longer the selloff, the more things tend to get sucked down the same black hole of a falling market.

Think of it like a series of lights that is often seen at automobile drag races. The "Christmas tree", as it is called, is two rows of colored light mounted vertically, that illuminate in series, going from red to green, where green means both dragsters floor it.

In stocks, invert the colors, and you have a warning system that goes from green to red. Green means all is well, then as a crash progresses, more and more orange lights illuminate until the red ones finally do.

Green means go and stocks are rising, then the first orange light gets lit, meaning markets are pulling back. Imagine another orange light illuminating that may mean more money is moving to bonds, utilities and staples. A

continuing crash illuminates another orange light, gold might start to rise while utilities, staples and other contrarian stocks many stop their ascent. Another orange light and these stock now start to pull back as well, following the general market down. Moving further along the warning lights, market leaders (like an Apple or Microsoft), which may have held up relatively well (being favorites of many an investor) finally break down as well. The final orange lights might light up when markets further accelerate downward with seemingly little support. The final red light on our financial Christmas tree of warning lights might occur when all out panic selling obliterates every stock in its path. Also known as a "Capitulation" event, the market is now yelling loud and clear "We are in a full fledge crash people!"

As if anyone wouldn't know it by then right?

Although there is no financial Christmas tree in real life, I do picture this tool when I review markets both on a daily, weekly and monthly basis.

I ask myself, how many lights are lit? How many signs are flashing? Is it getting worse or better? What stocks are moving up during the crash, and what sectors are they in? How fast are they moving and is it accelerating?

Barring an unexpected and out of the blue event known as a "Black Swan" like 9/11, tsunami or major political event, the markets lingo may indeed be very difficult to understand.

But considering education is the cornerstone of progress, the more you know about the markets, the better listener you will be, and hopefully a bit more tuned in to what the market it is *trying to tell you*.

Newsom's Electric Car Nirvana Collides with Reality

Gov. Gavin Newsom and the California Air Resources Board publicly boasted last week about making great strides toward eliminating fossil fuels and their greenhouse gases.

The board released "a draft plan that, when final, will guide the state's transition to a clean energy economy, drastically reduce the use of fossil fuels, achieve carbon neutrality by 2045 or sooner, and significantly clean the state's air especially in disadvantaged communities disproportionately burdened by persistent pollution."

Much of the plan is concentrated on transportation — particularly cars and trucks — which is the largest single emitter of carbon dioxide and other pollutants.

"That means rapidly moving to zero-emission transportation, electrifying the cars, buses, trains, and trucks that now constitute California's single largest source of planet-warming pollution," ARB said.

Newsom, meanwhile, crowed that with new state subsidies, sales of battery-powered zero-emission vehicles (ZEVs) have exceeded 16% of all new vehicle sales so far this year, more than double the proportion in 2020. He also noted that Californians make

half of nationwide purchases of electric vehicles.

"Our state is on the frontlines of extreme weather, and we're taking aggressive steps to protect Californians from the costs of climate change — transitioning away from the big polluters fueling this crisis and towards clean energy," Newsom said. "These incentives make it easier and cheaper to make that transition."

This year's increase in electric car sales was, no doubt, spurred in part by a steep hike in gasoline prices, as well as subsidies — which poses an interesting dichotomy. Newsom has decried those fuel price spikes and wants the state to offset them with payments to motorists, which would reduce some of their motivation to buy electric cars.

Moreover, were California to eventually ban sales of gasoline- and diesel-powered vehicles and go 100% ZEVs, as Newsom also advocates, charging their batteries would impose immense new burdens on an electric power grid that's already strained to meet demand.

By happenstance, as Newsom and the air board were issuing their upbeat messages about the shift, a financial data website, Forbes Advisor, was revealing that California has one of the nation's worst records on providing recharging sites for ZEV owners.

Its study, drawn from U.S. Department of Energy data and numbers from all 50 states, found that North Dakota is the nation's most ZEV-friendly state with one charging station for every 3.18 electric vehicles. Wyoming, Rhode Island,

Maine and West Virginia round out the top five.

And California? It has the fourth highest ratio, just one station for every 31.2 ZEVs. New Jersey is the least accommodating to ZEV owners, with one station for every 46.16 electric vehicles.

Okay, so California is lacking when it comes to infrastructure needed to support the ZEV nirvana that Newsom and the ARB envision, both in terms of electrical power supply and sites to connect that power to electric cars.

However, the situation may actually be worse.

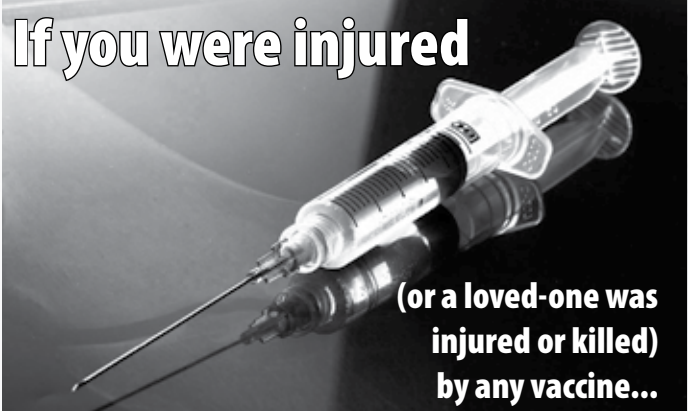
Again by happenstance, last week brought us evidence that not only is California failing to provide enough ZEV charging stations, but those it does have often don't work.

David Rempel, a retired professor of bioengineering from UC Berkeley, and a team of volunteers tested 181 public Bay Area charging stations with 657 plug-in kiosks and found 73% in working order but 23% had inoperable screens, payment failures or broken connector cables and in 5% cables were too short to reach vehicles recharging inlets.

California's much-vaunted shift to electric cars may turn out to be one of the state government's many high-concept programs that become managerial disasters, another Department of Motor Vehicles or Employment Development Department.

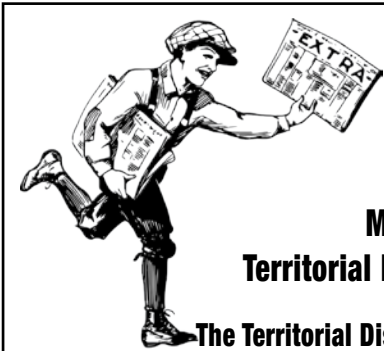

Joining Forces to Bolster Wildfire Safety and Preparedness

PG&E News Release

SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) - Pacific Gas and Electric Company (PG&E) and the PG&E Corporation Foundation (Foundation) are continuing their partnership with the California Fire Foundation to (CFF) increase wildfire safety and preparedness.

PG&E and The Foundation are providing \$1.4 million, in aggregate, to CFF’s Wildfire Safety and Preparedness Program (WSPP).

Now in its fifth year, the program’s objective is to raise public awareness about wildfire safety and deliver resources to underserved communities in high fire-risk areas. It includes a grant program that awarded 54 local fire departments, fire agencies and community groups \$670,000 in

funding last year.

Beginning May 18, fire departments and community-based organizations in California can submit applications for this year’s wildfire safety and awareness grants. Applications must be submitted by 11:45 p.m. on June 17, 2022, at the CFF website. Award notification will begin mid-July 2022.

Since 2018, the CFF, which administers and manages the WSPP, has awarded 199 grants to fire departments and fire agencies statewide, focusing its efforts in Northern and Central California. Funding targets communities identified as having extreme or elevated fire risk as identified by the California Public Utilities Commission.

“California’s drought, coupled

with drier, hotter conditions are putting communities at risk. The Wildfire Safety and Preparedness Program is a partnership with PG&E that was created to address the increasing wildfire risk,” said Rick Martinez, Executive Director of CFF. “Our partnership over the last five years, in which California has seen an increase in fire activity, has played an important role in helping local communities become more fire-safe.”

“At PG&E we’ve taken a stand that catastrophic wildfires shall stop. But we know we can’t do it alone. It will take all of us working together to mitigate the wildfire risk, and help our hometowns be better prepared and be more resilient to this growing threat,” said Sumeet Singh, PG&E Executive Vice President, Chief Risk Officer

and Interim Chief Safety Officer.

How the Grants Help Communities

Over the past five years, PG&E has provided \$6 million in total support for fire safety awareness through the WSPP. The charitable contribution is shareholder-funded, not paid for by PG&E customers.

Since 2018, WSPP has funded: Specialized fire equipment and personal protective equipment; Defensible space and vegetation management efforts; Fuel/hazard reduction programs; Fire prevention and emergency preparedness education including senior citizen wildfire preparedness programs; Fire safety outreach campaigns including 12,000 brochures targeting underserved communities in English, Spanish, Chinese, Hmong

and Vietnamese; Partnerships with community groups in high fire-risk areas to distribute fire-safety information.

The WSPP develops and distributes in-language fire-safety messaging targeting Spanish, Chinese, Hmong, and Vietnamese communities. These efforts include a comprehensive media campaign consisting of outdoor billboards and in-language television, radio, and digital ads.

The CFF, a non-profit 501(c)(3) organization, aids firefighters, their families and the communities they protect. The CFF’s Firefighters on Your Side program, also supported by PG&E, provides multi-lingual, culturally relevant fire safety messaging in both digital and print form, to assist the public in staying safe. ★
