

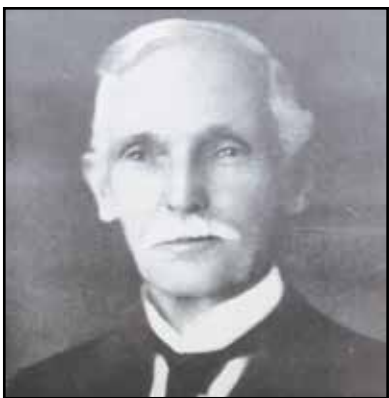

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Honoring Fallen Highway Workers

SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) - Caltrans dignitaries, employees, families and friends gathered solemnly on the west steps of the State Capitol for the department's 32nd Annual Workers Memorial to remember and honor the 189 public servants who have died since 1921 while building and maintaining California's transportation system.

The yearly memorial – in addition to honoring families and giving staff the opportunity to pay respects to their fallen colleagues – reminds us to “Be Work Zone Alert” and “Move Over” a lane when you see flashing amber lights ahead, or slow

down if not safe to do so. “Safety is always Caltrans' top priority and the tragedies that brought us here today have resulted in intensified safety efforts within the department,” said Caltrans Acting

Director Steven Keck. “Zero deaths on our state highway system is the only acceptable number, and – as we recognize those who tragically died while at work on our transportation system – we remind all motorists to please Slow for the Cone Zone, Be Work Zone Alert and Move Over when you see flashing amber lights.” During the ceremony, Caltrans placed 189 orange traffic cones in a diamond “caution sign” configuration, each bearing the name of an employee lost since 1921. A black cone in the center represented all people killed while working on the state highway system, including

It's Bicycle, Pedestrian Safety Awareness Month

MARYSVILLE, CA (MPG) - The Marysville Police Department will conduct periodic traffic safety operations focused on the most dangerous driver behaviors that put the safety of people biking or walking at risk.

These violations include speeding, making illegal turns, failing to yield or provide right of way to bicyclists or pedestrians, or failing to stop for signs and signals.

We all have places to be and not everyone gets there by car. Bicyclists and pedestrians have the same rights to the road but face even more risk without the protections vehicles have. We should all be looking out for one another.

The Marysville Police Department offers steps drivers and pedestrians can take to greatly reduce the risk of getting injured or in a crash:

Pedestrians – Be predictable. Use crosswalks, when available; Take notice of approaching vehicles and practice due care; Do not walk or run into the path of a vehicle. At 30 mph, a driver needs at least 90 feet to stop; Be visible. Make it easy for drivers to see you—wear light colors, reflective material and carry a flashlight, particularly at dawn, dusk or at night; Be careful crossing streets or entering crosswalks at night when it is harder to see, or when crossing busier streets with more lanes and higher speed limits.

Drivers – Obey traffic laws, use hand signals, use lights at night (front white light and rear red reflector), and wear a helmet; Bicyclists must travel in the same direction of traffic and have the same requirements as any slow-moving vehicle; Avoid the door zone: do not ride too closely to parked cars; If there's a bike lane, use it, unless making a left turn, passing, or approaching a place where a right turn is allowed; Yield to pedestrians. Bicyclists must yield the right-of-way to pedestrian within marked crosswalks or within unmarked crosswalks at intersections.

Funding for this program is provided by a grant from the California Office of Traffic Safety, through the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration. ★

More than a thousand military men and women and family members have donated thousands of personal items and stories to the Museum of the Forgotten Warriors over the past forty years. The displays span World War I to the conflicts in Iraq and Afghanistan and tell the stories of those who fought and died. The series, *Stories of the Museum*, describes a few of these in more detail.

Richard Lawson, commander of Yuba City's VFW Post No. 2563, gave a final salute during the Pledge of Allegiance at the retiring of the colors ceremony for the post's flags on Friday, 14 December 2012. The flags

were to be placed on permanent display at the Museum of the Forgotten Warriors. This was the final act in the history of the eighty-year-old Judge W. E. Tucker VFW Post No. 2563 Although

the portrait of this distinguished gentleman hung in the VFW hall for several decades, few knew his story. Who was Judge William E. Tucker anyway?

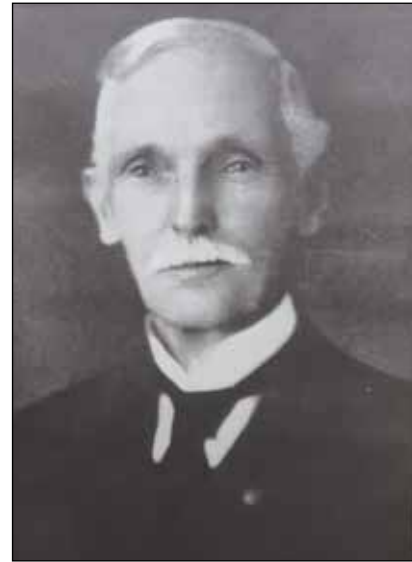
William Tucker was born on 6 February 1845 and spent his early years in Morris County, New Jersey. He ran away from home in November 1861 and enlisted in Company K, First Regiment New York Engineers. He participated in several Civil War battles and was wounded twice during the three years of his enlistment. He was honorably discharged in December 1864 and returned to his home in Morristown, New Jersey, where he became a carpenter.

In 1878, Tucker moved to South Butte, Sutter County, California, and began a career in politics. He was chief deputy assessor for Sutter County from 1884 to 1886 when he established a permanent home in Yuba City. He was deputy county clerk from 1887 to 1889 and postmaster of Yuba City

from 1889 to 1893.

When Yuba Township Justice of the Peace H. C. Grover died in 1902, William was appointed to that position and was hence forth known as Judge Tucker. He was repeatedly elected without opposition seven times until his retirement from the position in 1929 because of his advanced age of eighty-four years.

His association with veterans' organizations began with his 1886 membership in Corinth Post No. 80 G.A.R. in Marysville, California. The Grand Army of the Republic was a fraternal organization composed of veterans of the Union Army and Navy. He served as quartermaster, adjunct, and commander of the Corinth Post. He also served as an aide-de-camp on the staff of the big guy himself, James W. Willet, Commander-in-Chief of the Grand Army of the Republic—a rare distinction. Judge Tucker was the only surviving member of Post No. 80 on Memorial Day 1930 when he proudly took part in the parade dressed



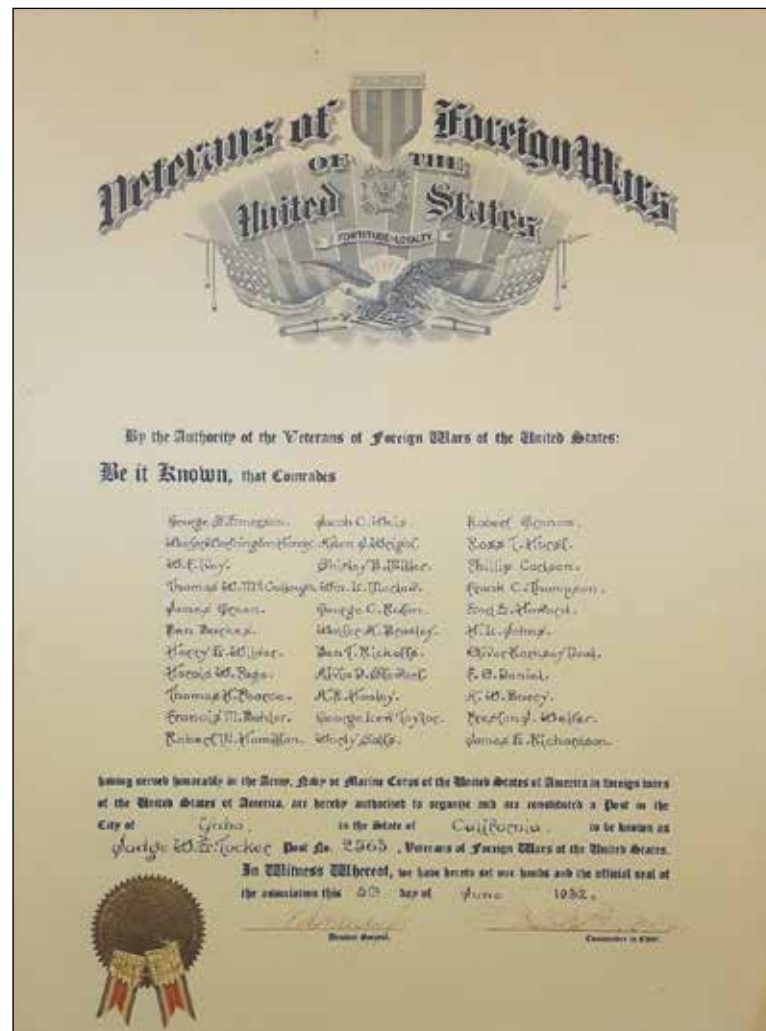

in the uniform of the Grand Army, retaining his soldierly bearing despite his age.

William Tucker passed away on 7 February 1932. Yuba City's Veterans of Foreign Wars Post No. 2563 received its charter on Sunday, 5 June of that year and was named after the well-known and popular Civil War veteran and political star.

Continued from page 1 private contractors, tow truck drivers, California Highway Patrol (CHP) officers and other emergency responders. The commemoration also included the Caltrans Honor Guard, who led the symbolic tribute. Additionally, flags are flying at half-staff today at the State Capitol and at all Caltrans facilities in honor of these fallen workers.

The ceremony marked the third year in a row that no new names were added to the memorial – the longest stretch in nearly 75 years – though speakers at the memorial stressed the need for everyone to remain vigilant.

With the help of Senate Bill 1, the Road Repair and Accountability Act of 2017, as well as the recently enacted federal Bipartisan Infrastructure Law, Caltrans and local agencies now have significant additional funds to repair and

maintain California’s transportation system. The additional funding also increases the number of Caltrans employees and contractors working on our roadways, increasing their exposure.

According to the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics, highway construction and maintenance work is one of the most hazardous occupations in the United States. In 2020, more than 6,500 work zone collisions occurred on California roadways, resulting in an estimated 1,964 injuries and 60 fatalities. Nationally, drivers and passengers account for 85 percent of the people who are killed in work zones.

In February, Caltrans announced a new Director’s Policy on Road Safety, which commits the department to the Safe System approach and reaffirms the vision of reaching zero fatalities and serious injuries on state highways by 2050. This policy takes

steps to further a shift that began in 2020, as state transportation leaders recognized a bolder and more focused approach was necessary to combat the troubling rise in fatalities and serious injuries on California roads. The state’s 2020-24 Strategic Highway Safety Plan – managed by Caltrans and involving more than 400 stakeholders – was updated to include the Safe System approach.

Caltrans has partnered with the California Transportation Foundation to develop two funds to benefit the families of Caltrans workers killed on the job. The Fallen Workers Assistance and Memorial Fund helps with the initial needs a surviving family faces and the Caltrans Fallen Workers Memorial Scholarship is available to the children of these workers. Researcher Featured in ‘2000 Mules’ Documentary Explains How Local Election Fraud Was Grown to National Scale

Local Election Fraud Was Nationalized in 2020, Researcher Says

Voter fraud has traditionally been a local affair in the United States, where elections are conducted by more than 3,000 counties in a decentralized system that makes mass ballot manipulation nearly impossible.

And it very much remains so, maintains Gregg Phillips. His investigation into Georgia voter fraud during the state’s 2021 U.S. Senate election runoff is featured in Dinesh D’Souza’s “2000 Mules” documentary, to be released this week.

While manning True the Vote’s voter fraud hotline during the 2020 election, Phillips said he observed local election fraud “grown to scale” as part of a ballot-harvesting scheme orchestrated by national organizations.

Across the country, “there are a thousand local insurgencies doing their own things” in defiance of state election laws, he said.

But what has happened over the past few decades, and became evident during the 2020 election, is “new money and old money, old-fashioned foundations” can “leverage fraud already in place at a local level,” Phillips said. “This is how this thing grows to scale” and can influence state and national election results.

Phillips, a former director of the Mississippi Department of Human Services and a former deputy commissioner for the Texas Health & Human Services Commission, is the managing partner and majority owner of OPSEC Group LLC, based in Birmingham, Alabama.

His company conducts voting roll and election results investigations and analysis for True the Vote (TTV), a nonprofit based in Houston founded by Catherine Engelbrecht in 2010.

For more than a decade, TTV has been training poll watchers, educating voters in election law, and lobbying to enact many of the reforms adopted post-2020.

Engelbrecht’s TTV and Phillips’s OPSEC conducted the investigation presented in the documentary by D’Souza, which is set to open in 300 theaters on May 2 and May 4.

The genesis of the investigation, which he and Engelbrecht say proves large-scale, illegal

vote trafficking occurred in the 2020 election, was digging into reports after manning TTV’s tip line, Phillips said.

“We started to see these anomalies, these densities,” in “precinct after precinct” in places like Milwaukee, Detroit, Atlanta, and Arizona’s Maricopa County, where voter turnout was extraordinarily high and virtually all ballots were cast for the same candidates, he said.

“Mistakes happen, but when you have 100 percent of [registered voters] voting and all for the same candidates,” there is something fishy afoot, Phillips said.

He said that people calling the tip lines from across the country reported oddities around ballot drop boxes. A common theme was seeing the same people dropping off ballots.

“There was a lot of speculation about things related to drop boxes, a lot of video around these drop boxes,” Phillips said, but it was difficult to use in trying to prove fraud.

Then he had an idea: Geospatial analysis gleaned from cellphone data.

He said that each cellphone emits a unique, identifiable signal, or “ping,” he said, all of which are “collected and amalgamated by brokers and sold.”

By collecting cellphone data, “you not only know where, but when” a phone is at different places, Phillips said. “Presuming you know the person who owns that phone, you can learn, where does he sleep? Where does he work?”

He was eager to see what analyzing cellphone “pings” around drop boxes would engender. The phone numbers can be tracked

and investigators “can go back and bust out a pattern of locations before, during and after” the phone was at the dropbox, he said.

They then “refined a hypothesis that [could be tested] in Georgia” during the January 2021 runoff election for both of the state’s U.S. Senate seats.

The operation would require the purchase of a petabyte of pings. A petabyte equals 1,000 terabytes, which Phillips said is “a big, big, big thing.”

“[Engelbrecht] and her team were working on filing freedom of information requests, and she didn’t really buy into a lot of the stuff that was out there,” he said. “But she supported us, backed us all the way, when we needed more data, she went out and raised more money.”

The data were “super expensive”—millions of dollars, Phillips said. “We may be the only group left standing when this is all said and done that went out and bought 10 trillion” pings.

Once they had the data, the question was, who made 25 or more visits to a dropbox?

“What that left us with was 242 individuals who met that threshold,” Phillips said.

TTV also collected “4 to 5 million minutes” of video that also show the cellphone owners making ballot drops, he said. Those who did so 25 or more times were labeled “mules.”

The data confirmed conclusively that industrial-scale ballot harvesting was routine in Georgia, especially in the Atlanta area. Phillips said Engelbrecht demanded it be checked and rechecked.

“She says over and over again,

‘Gregg, no matter what, you can’t be wrong,’” he said. “We had to put it through these quality control checks, create algorithms to pick up anomalies and kick them out. We did not want to include false positives, exclude people who should be included, and include people who should be excluded.”

“We don’t want to get ahead of ourselves,” Engelbrecht said. “It takes time” to develop these analyses.

When the findings were presented to state officials in early 2021, they didn’t get the expected response. In September 2021, Georgia Bureau of Investigation Director Vic Reynolds said that since TTV would not reveal sources cited in its analysis, there was no probable cause to investigate.

“They got mad at us and sent us a letter saying no probable cause to investigate—you don’t need probable cause to investigate,” Phillips said.

“I think the greatest challenge we faced was we really believed we could get our work to a point to where it was clear there is a problem, that using our data” collected by the same technology “routinely used by law enforcement would be impetus enough for key officials to say, ‘This is something we should look into,’” Engelbrecht said.

On April 25, Georgia Secretary of State Brad Raffensperger announced the state would investigate TTV’s claims and subpoenaed Engelbrecht and Phillips.

One reason for Georgia’s revived interest in TTV’s 2021 investigation—and sources—was that similar subsequent geospatial investigations by Phillips had gained traction with officials in Arizona, Wisconsin, and Pennsylvania.

Phillips said they found ballot harvesting to be a local cottage industry everywhere they looked.

County by county, “the gifts are different, the collectors and the collection methods are different,” he said. “You think, how could this possibly be so coordinated? It doesn’t seem plausible that thousands of people could have been brought in to do all this stuff.”

This makes combatting fraud at the polls a “thousand-front war, a whole bunch of mini-insurgencies” that provide the infrastructure for national groups to scale up.

Phillips said he can’t name names right now. “We are being advised right now (not to make specific allegations) until we get further down the road,” he said.

But he said the groups capitalizing on local election fraud networks tend to be state chapters of national advocacy groups and foundations with grant programs that have significant influence in communities.

“I went to Dinesh and said there’s enough material here for a movie, and I’m not sure anyone else will tell the story,” Engelbrecht said. “It’s very difficult in today’s environment to find people like Dinesh willing to step up to the line and say, ‘Let’s take a look at it.’”

“We both ended up being a lot more involved in this movie than we thought we would be,” Phillips said. “The next thing we know, we are front and center.”

But stay tuned, both say more is coming.

“We have two investigations that are more explosive and likely more impactful than this entire ‘mules’ thing,” Phillips said.

“There is something we haven’t spoken of publicly because we thought it was going to go in a certain direction, and now that agency is flipping the script, so we are trying to batten down the hatches,” Engelbrecht said. “When it comes to this stuff, you cannot be wrong.”

You Only Need One Reason to Succeed



A Gift from the US Government

With the stock market in free fall, and most bonds (IOU's from businesses and government entities) following suit, investors are looking for alternatives. Cash is safe, but holding cash in an inflationary environment will result in a loss of purchasing power.

But there is an investment that offers both inflation protection and the 100 % safety of U.S. government backing.

A Series I bonds, offered by the U.S. Treasury Department, are currently yielding 9.62%. The interest rate paid on these bonds increases as inflation rises, which is why the yield has skyrocketed.

An I bond earns interest two ways: a fixed rate and a variable rate. The variable rate is adjusted every six months. Note that your rate can also adjust downward or upwards if the underlying interest rates change. The bonds duration is 30 years, but an investor can cash them in at any time after the first 12 months.

In the first six months, you'll get the prevailing interest rate at that time. Then your bond will adjust to whatever new rate is announced in October and adjust every six months thereafter.

If you need cash and turn in the bond before it's at least five years old, you'll pay a penalty of the last three months' worth of interest, but if you do the math, it's only a small portion of the total amount.

Interest on the bonds is also exempt from state and local taxes, but you will still have to pay federal taxes on any gains. There are also special tax considerations if you use the proceeds for higher education purposes.

To buy I bonds, you must be:

- A U.S. citizen, even if you live abroad
- A U.S. resident
- A civilian employee of the U.S. government, regardless of where you live

Trusts and estates can also purchase I bonds in some cases, but corporations, partnerships and other organizations may not.

You need to set up a Treasury Direct account at [Treasurydirect.gov.](https://treasurydirect.gov), and have a taxpayer identification number (such as a Social Security number), a U.S. address, a checking or savings account, an email address and a web browser that supports 128-bit encryption.

Although children under age 18 cannot set up a TreasuryDirect account, a parent or other adult custodian may open an account for the minor which is then linked to their own.

Once you have an account, TreasuryDirect will email your account number, which you can then log in to your account. Select "BuyDirect" and then "Series I bonds", then select the bank account to use and the date you'd like to make the purchase.

The limits per calendar year are:

- \$10,000 in electronic I bonds (\$20,000 for married couples)
- \$5,000 in paper I bonds with your federal income tax refund

You can buy more every year and even set it up to automatically repeat the purchase each year.

At the current yield of 9.62%, and the Feds expected to raise rates at least few times in the coming months to curb inflation, an I bond or two might be just the ticket to help combat today's rising inflation with the added feature of U.S. government backing.

Gavin Newsom's First Term: Reality Bites

Last weekend, Gavin Newsom released the first video ad of his campaign for a second term as California's governor.

It is, therefore, an appropriate moment to look at what he said he wanted to accomplish as governor during his 2018 campaign and how it has turned out.

A two-word summary would be "reality bites."

Candidate Newsom, touting a book entitled "Built to Last: Successful Habits of Visionary Companies," embraced its central point that visionary leaders should seek "big, hairy audacious goals."

"I'd rather be accused of (having) those audacious stretch goals than be accused of timidity," he said at one point.

True to that philosophy, Newsom told voters he wanted to do big things, such as creating a single-payer health system, solving the state's chronic shortage of housing and completely converting California to renewable energy.

During his 2018 campaign, the state Senate passed a single-payer bill and Newsom enthusiastically endorsed it, saying there was "no reason to wait around."

"I'm tired of politicians saying they support single-payer but that it's too soon, too expensive or someone else's problem," Newsom said.

The 2018 bill stalled in the Assembly but when another bill cleared the Senate and was pending in the Assembly this year, Newsom made no effort to get it passed and it died without a vote.

A commission Newsom appointed to study single-payer's feasibility has issued a report that lays out options but offers no clear path to implementation. Essentially, single-payer is no more likely today than it was four years ago.

Instead, Newsom's budgets have incrementally extended Medi-Cal coverage to uninsured residents, including undocumented immigrants, but in the long term, that coverage depends on the state's notoriously volatile revenues.

As he was running for governor, Gavin Newsom pledged to "lead the effort to develop the 3.5 million new housing units we need by 2025 because our solutions must be as bold as the problem is big."

The pledge would have required increasing production to 500,000 units a year, but actual construction has been, at best, about 20% of that figure. Newsom downplayed his pledge to "a stretch goal," telling the Los Angeles Times, "It's a stubborn issue. You can't snap your fingers and build hundreds of thousands, millions of housing units overnight."

And so it has gone – Newsom edging away from "big hairy audacious goals" one-by-one when they proved impossible to achieve in the real world.

Two recent positions on high-profile environmental issues also illustrate how reality has tempered his governorship.

One reality is that California is afflicted by severe drought and, due to climate change, may face permanent shortages of water. One very controversial option is tapping the limitless supply of ocean water and stripping out its salt.

Recently, the state Coastal Commission recommended that the state's second desalination plant not be built, but Newsom reiterated his support. "We need more tools in the damn tool kit," Newsom told the Bay Area News Group editorial board.

That, at least, was a consistent position, but he modified his stance on another real world issue – whether California's only remaining nuclear power plant, Diablo Canyon, should be shuttered as now scheduled.

The San Luis Obispo County plant generates at least 6% of the state's electrical energy and the closure could leave California, whose power supply is already marginal, in the dark.

Newsom had supported decommissioning Diablo Canyon but told the Los Angeles Times editorial board last week that California will apply for federal funds aimed at keeping threatened nuclear plants in production, saying, "We would be remiss not to put that on the table as an option."

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Rural Conservative CA Shorted COVID Dollars

Due to the unprecedented billions of Covid dollars coming from the Federal government in 2020-21 California State Auditor Elaine Howle cautioned that there could be a high risk of waste, fraud and abuse. She appeared before state officials in January 2021 to present evidence of a lack of fairness and equity in the distribution of funds to rural counties and cities.

Howle argued that smaller cities and counties received less per capita in Covid relief funds than larger jurisdictions in violation of federal guidelines. It is no secret that smaller rural counties are the more conservative people of California and were more resistant to Covid un-Constitutional dictates. They were also less supportive of the governor. Could the governor have used Covid funding to politically punish them during a national crisis?

State Finance maintained that illness rates were higher in the more densely populated urban regions but Howle countered that there is no evidence of that. In fact, she argued that rural communities could have experienced higher Covid impacts.

Governor Newsom pledged to withhold funding from cities and counties that did not follow his public health orders. Howle argued that the state did not consistently monitor that issue. At one point in the ongoing

California distribution of funds 16 large counties received about \$190 per person while the 42 smaller counties got \$102 per person her audit revealed. In addition, the 16 more densely populated counties already had received funds directly from the Federal government according to Howle. (U.S. Treasury paid \$5.8 billion directly to California counties and cities with populations greater than 500,000.)

“It’s a pretty common frustration in California,” said Assemblyman James Gallagher, a Republican who represents six smaller counties. “The way that funds are distributed tends to favor the (San Francisco) Bay Area and Los Angeles, where the majority of the legislature are from, right? Whereas, the rural areas really feel like they get kind of short shrift.”

In some cases less populated counties had higher rates of infections. Imperial County, with a population of just over 188,000 people, averaged 3,215 COVID-19 cases per 100,000 people while Los Angeles County, with more than 10.1 million people, averaged 989 cases per 100,000 people.

The state’s strategy, Howle said, contradicted guidance from the U.S. Treasury that urged states to “treat local governments equitably, regardless of their population size.” “By not equitably providing counties with funds, there is greater risk that more small counties’ COVID-19 related funding needs were unmet,” Howle wrote.

The state initially withheld money from two cities – Coalinga (\$212,000) and Atwater (\$387,000) — after they passed resolutions defying un-Constitutional and nonsensical public health orders. But Howle said the Governor’s Office

of Emergency Services (OES), which was in charge of monitoring local governments, “could not demonstrate that it had evaluated all cities.” (476 cities)

The City of Imperial passed a resolution defying the Governor’s orders, encouraged businesses to open and still received their funds. Howle challenged the hit and miss “informal” approach to evaluating compliance. OES eventually funded Coalinga and Atwater in spite of their resolutions as a result of pressure from the Auditor.

The state’s Employment Development Department was responsible for distributing a larger sum of unemployment checks than any other state had in modern history. In the rush to get people funds, the department paid billions of dollars (\$31 billion as of Jan 2021) in claims that since have been found to have been fraudulent, Howle said. Many inmates in California prisons received unemployment monies.

California Corona Virus money funded hundreds of millions in contracts (often no-bid) with large corporations that had been very generous underwriting the Governor’s political campaigns.

The moral is that the more money and responsibility you give people with no accountability or integrity the bigger the disaster. Covid policies killed more people and damaged more lives than the mild illness ever could.

The Covid Agenda again revealed the moral bottom feeders that pose as our leaders.

Deep Freeze Severely Impacts Valley, Foothill Winegrape Growers

Winegrape growers in the northern San Joaquin Valley and Sierra Nevada foothills are tallying losses from an April frost that devastated crops in many areas. Some growers report the freeze destroyed more than 90% of winegrapes. Two counties—Amador and Calaveras—are preparing disaster declarations based on crop losses averaging 60% or more. Much of the damage occurred during a four-hour freeze spanning night and pre-dawn hours April 11 and 12.

Port Delays Worsen for Farm Products, as Empty Containers Sent to Asia

Tree nuts, fresh produce, dairy products and other California farm commodities continue to pile up. That is happening as fewer ships arrive to pick up cargo at the Port of Oakland, where farm products account for 60% of total exports. Agricultural shippers were frustrated as some 67,000 containers left empty during the first two months of 2022, nearly double from last year. Three out of every four containers returning to Asia were reported empty.

UC Extension Offers Certification Training for Water Diversers

California law requires water-rights holders, including agricultural interests, to measure and report the water they divert from rivers and streams. It’s a complex process, requiring metering equipment and, often, expenses in hiring professionals to do the work. But the state is now allowing water-rights holders to do the measuring themselves—if they complete certification courses offered by University of California Extension. The reporting requirement applies to diversions exceeding 10 acre-feet a year.

Scientists Target Glassy-Winged Sharpshooter, a Peril to Grapevines

Scientists at the University of California, Riverside, are researching gene-editing technology that may help neutralize a dangerous agricultural pest. The research is targeting the glassy-winged sharpshooter, a pest whose resistance to insecticides has been growing. The flying insect transmits bacteria that causes Pierce’s Disease, which infects vineyards and poses a worrisome challenge for California’s \$58 billion wine industry. ★

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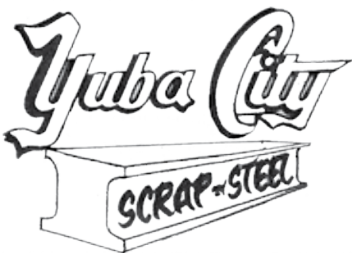


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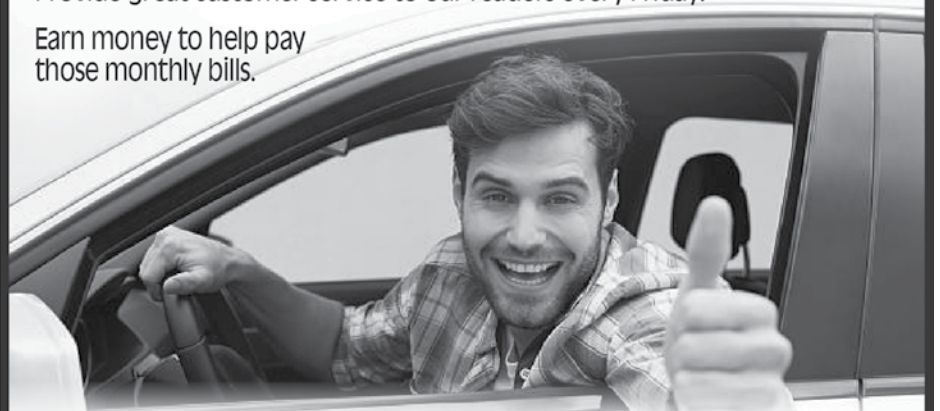

- On April 21, 2022 at about 7:00 AM, the Colusa County Sheriff's Office served a search warrant and arrested 5 suspects in connection with a large-scale, illegal indoor marijuana grow operation. The operation was taking place inside an old rice mill located on the 200 block of E. Main Street, Colusa, CA—just outside of the city limits. The illegal operation had been taking place for several months.

The large-scale, illegal indoor marijuana grow operation has been connected to

other operations in the San Joaquin County area. The San Joaquin County Task Force assisted in the investigation when they discovered a connection to the Colusa County location.

The investigation resulted in the seizure of 4,832 mature plants and the arrest of 5 suspects. The Colusa County Sheriff's Office Specialized Operations and Response (SOAR) Team assisted in the service of the search warrant.

The suspects arrested during the service of the search warrant were booked into the Colusa County Jail and currently face charges for violations of Health & Safety Code; 11358

- Illegal cultivation of marijuana and Penal Code; 182 – Conspiracy to commit a crime.

The 5 suspects arrested were as follows:

Bo Sen Tan, age 45, from San Leandro, CA; Hong Pin Zhen, age 52, no address listed; Guo Ming Zhang, age 56, no address listed; Xin Shi Yu, age 45, no address listed. Zhui Gou Hiu, age 43, from Brooklyn, NY.

The investigation is still ongoing. If anyone has information regarding the illegal marijuana grow operation at the 200 block E. Main St. location, they are asked to contact Sergeant Arnold Navarro at (530) 458-0200. ★

Big Game Tag Drawing Applications Available

CDFW News Release

SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) - California hunters can now purchase hunting licenses for the 2022-23 season, as well as apply for the Big Game Drawing online.

Californians have many options to bring home wild game for their dinner table, and at this time, the current COVID-19 pandemic is not expected to lead to the closure or delay of any hunting seasons.

The deadline to apply for the Big Game Drawing is Thursday, June 2 at 11:59 p.m. The 2022 California Big Game Hunting Digest includes information about hunts, tag quotas, season dates and the Big Game Drawing. As part of a broader effort to go paperless, CDFW transitioned to a digital format for the California Big Game Hunting Digest last license year. The hunting digest is no longer printed and shipped to license agents or customers, but the electronic version of the hunting digest continues to be available

online. The California Department of Fish and Wildlife website is the most reliable source for the Big Game Digest.

CDFW also wants to remind hunters non-lead ammunition is required for all hunting in California.

Due to changes in the penal code regarding the purchase or transfer of ammunition, purchase ammunition well in advance of hunting and practice with it in order to ensure firearms are sighted-in appropriately before heading into the field.

In some cases, California deer, elk and pronghorn antelope hunters whose 2021 seasons were cut short or eliminated as a result of wildfires and public land closures can seek a reinstatement of their preference points and/or receive refunds of their tag fees. Eligible hunters must mail their unfilled tags and written requests for preference point reinstatements and/or refunds to CDFW postmarked no later than April 30. Learn more about post-season tag returns on the CDFW website. ★
