## Relief Stalled at the Pump

The number of gas tax relief and rebate programs is likely to be culled even more this week as Governor Gavin Newsom's plan to stop the planned inflation-adjusted gas tax increase has stalled, likely making it impossible for any action to be passed by the May 1st deadline.

Four major proposals centered around giving relief to Californians due to high gas prices have been proposed since gas prices have climbed exponentially since the beginning of the Biden Administration and then following the Russian invasion of Ukraine in late February.

The GOP's \$6 billion proposal, AB 1638, which would have removed the state's 51 cent gas tax for a period of six months, was rejected in the

Assembly last month. A \$9 billion Assembly Democrat plan to give \$400 tax rebates to all Californian taxpayers regardless of car ownership status, is currently under discussion in Sacramento, as is a joint plan between Assembly Speaker Anthony Rendon (D-Lakewood), Sen. Pro Tem Toni Atkins (D-San Diego), worth \$6.2 billion to give \$200 rebates to all Californians taxpayers except the wealthiest 10% of car owners.

And finally there is Governor Newsom's \$11 billion plan that would give \$9 billion in tax refunds to all car owners, amounting to a \$400 debit card per vehicle with a household limit of two vehicles. This would be along with \$750 million in grants to provide free public transportation for a period of time to California riders, \$500 million for walking and biking promotion, \$600 million on pausing

the diesel sales tax rate for a year, and critically, \$523 million going to pause inflation adjustments on gas and diesel excise taxes.

All four proposals, including Newsom's, rely on tapping into the projected \$30 billion in projected state budget surplus funds.

While the inflation adjustment, currently scheduled to be added to the gas tax on July 1st, would only be for 5.6%, amounting to a roughly 3 cent tax per gallon for gasoline and 2 cent tax per gallon for diesel, would not be much, it would still result in a slight savings for Californians at the pumps. However, efforts to pass the Governor's proposal have largely been non-starters this month. The inflation adjustment to the gas tax needs to be stopped by legislation by May 1st due to a 60-day lead time. And with a lack of legislation being

## NYFP Awarded \$34.8 Million for Forest Restoration

**YUBA COUNTY, CA (MPG)** - The North Yuba Forest Partnership is set to receive millions in federal funding to support the implementation of forest restoration treatments in the North Yuba River watershed, which will reduce the risk of catastrophic wildfire and improve the overall health and resilience of the forest. The funding was announced by the U.S. Forest Service in two separate releases in the last few weeks.

On Apr. 12, United States Department of Agriculture Secretary Tom Vilsack and U.S. Forest Service Chief Randy Moore announced that the North Yuba River watershed is one of 10 landscapes that will be funded under the U.S. Forest Service's new 10-year Wildfire Crisis Strategy implementation. The strategy outlines the need to treat up to an additional 20 million acres on national forest lands and up to an additional 30 million acres of other federal, state, Tribal, private and family lands over the next decade.

The North Yuba landscape will receive significant federal investment as part of the first round of funding under the strategy. This funding will provide \$6.8 million to treat 4,500 acres in 2022 and an expected \$25 million in 2023-24 for the treatment of an additional 16,900 acres. These funds will be used towards increasing the pace and scale of projects that the partnership has been working on since the memorandum of understanding was signed in 2019.

The 313,000-acre North Yuba landscape is one of the largest, contiguous "unburned" landscapes remaining in the Sierra Nevada Mountains. The watershed is also an important water source for residential and agricultural areas surrounding Sacramento.

"The inclusion of the North Yuba River watershed in this initial investment is a testament to the partnership demonstrating that it is effective at the landscape scale and able to get this important and impactful work done," said JoAnna Lessard, project manager for Yuba Water Agency's watershed resilience and forest health program.

largely a no-go in the past few weeks, and Assembly Speaker Rendon and Senate Democratic leader Atkins not actively pushing the Governor's plan in favor of their own, the Governor's office said in a statement on Monday that that a gas tax increase halt is all but certain to not go through in time now.

"It is clear now that the Legislature will not act in time to provide that immediate, limited relief," explained Governor Newsom's spokesman Alex Stack in a statement on Monday. "But we look forward to working with lawmakers on the Governor's proposal for direct payments to Californians wrestling with rising prices."

With only the two legislative plans, as well as the remnants of Newsom's plan, currently on the table past May 1st, many Californians struggling with gas prices currently hovering around averages of \$5.50 a gallon to \$6.50 a gallon have little

choice but to wait for legislative action to pass. Many also criticized Democratic lawmakers on Tuesday for failing to back that part of Newsom's plan in time to meet the deadline.

"California Democrats are so bad at helping Californians," said RNC spokesperson Hallie Balch in a statement. "Democrat Josh Harder has been regaling the public with his gas tank woes, but where is he now with his calls to halt the gas tax? Democrats continue to prove that they have no solutions as they refuse to help the millions of commuters dealing with increasing pain at the pump."

Others noted that the situation only seemed to be dragging out any kind of relief despite prices going higher.

"Republicans are mad for the Democrats not supporting a measure by Newsom," said Chuck Albright, a California fuel price researcher, to the Globe on Tuesday. "I'm not really into politics, and even I know

how ridiculous that sounds."

"But Californians need relief. The tax increase is only a few pennies per gallon, but it's at least something. It's a start. It's something. But no. Some in Sacramento don't want to lose out on infrastructure funding that comes with the gas tax, even though it would be paid anyway ultimately by the surplus. Prices are going up still, and the state still hasn't come up with something. They dismissed a good plan, the one eliminating the gas tax temporarily, out of hand, and now they're doing the same to another very reasonable plan here, or, well, part of a plan. And look, prices are likely to climb even more with summer coming. And still nothing. For Californians, this news on the gas tax increase not being stopped in July should be distressing, no matter how small the increase would have been."

The deadline for legislation to stop the gas tax increase is on May 1st. ★

# Arrest Made after Search Results in 837 grams of Cocaine

**YUBA-SUTTER, CA (MPG)** - On April 7th, 2022, members of the Yuba-Sutter Narcotic and Gang Enforcement Task Force (NET-5) with the assistance of the Yuba City Police Department (YCPD) served a search warrant on the residence of Trae Norton (29 years old of Yuba City), in the 1200 block of Plumas Street, in Yuba City. During the search of the residence, NET-5 Agents located and seized 837 grams

of cocaine, one (1) black operable digital scale, two narcotics packaging, and indicia belonging to Norton. Norton was not home during the service of the warrant but was later contacted and arrested as a result of this investigation for possession for sale of narcotics per section 11351 of the California Health and Safety Code. Norton was booked into the Sutter County Jail and the investigation was forwarded to the Sutter County District Attorney's Office. ★

# Yuba City Council Approves Recology Contract Amendment

**YUBA CITY, CA (MPG)** - During a recent meeting, the Yuba City Council unanimously approved an amendment to the current Recology service contract.

The amendment addresses several items requested by the City of Yuba City, including the addition of a state-mandated Residential Food Waste Collection Program; a requirement for Recology to perform ongoing comprehensive collection route audits; a requirement for Recology to prepare an Emergency Action Plan to provide collection services after a catastrophic event; and it significantly reduces the rate increase for Recology hauling and disposal of biosolids from the City's Wastewater Treatment Facility.

The amendment also addresses several items requested by Recology, mainly focused on bringing the Yuba City contract in line with the other five Yuba-Sutter jurisdictions, including using the same Consumer Price Index (CPI) methodology to determine rate increases, aligning ancillary charges, and modifying the franchise term to match the other jurisdictions. The amendment also removes the requirement for Recology to staff an office in Yuba City and adjusts the rates to compensate for the addition of the Residential Food Waste Collection Program.

"I'm proud of the work the Council and City Staff have done to get our Recology contract back in-line on all fronts," said Yuba City Mayor, Dave Shaw. "We, as a council and city, have been working for over three years to resolve the issues that remained from the 2018 contract. We inherited a contract where Yuba City customers were paying higher rates than neighboring areas, ignored the transportation of the biosolids from the wastewater treatment plant, left us out of compliance with new state 1383 mandates, and was a point of contention for our community that began in 2017. It has been a long road to get back to where we should be; in a contract that places our residents first in a manner that is both good for the city and good for business."

Of significant note in this amendment is the City of Yuba City's willingness to reduce their franchise fee from 13.38% to 10%, for all residential and commercial accounts. This reduction aligns the City's franchise fee with that of Sutter County, and significantly offsets the rate increase the customer would have endured from the addition of the state-mandated Residential Food Waste Collection Program.

"It was extremely important to our Council to align our base rates and franchise fees with that of Sutter County, as our Yuba City customers will now be receiving very similar services to Sutter County customers," said Yuba City Manager, Diana Langley. This action aligns with the current Council's goals to be business friendly and fiscally responsible."

Residential Food Waste Collection is one part of Senate Bill 1383 (SB 1383), the most significant waste reduction and recycling mandate to be adopted in California in the last 30 years. It includes state-wide requirements to reduce organic waste disposal, including food and food-soiled paper products, by 75% by 2025; and increase the rescue of food for people to eat to at least 20% of currently disposed surplus food by 2025.

Organic waste accounts for 18% of all landfill material and emits 20% of the state's methane, a climate super pollutant 84 times more potent than carbon dioxide.

With this amendment passage by the City of Yuba City, all Recology customers within the six Yuba-Sutter jurisdictions now have the ability to include food scraps and food-soiled paper in their green organics cart. Everything from fruits & vegetables and meat bones, to pizza boxes, paper plates and napkins, can all be composted now.

- Caltrans is alerting motorists about a short-term lane reduction to the left turn pocket of northbound State Highway 70 (E Street) to westbound 5th Street in downtown Marysville.

Only one of the two left turn lanes is open to motorists during the City of Marysville's major roadway rehabilitation project on 5th Street. The inside turn lane will be closed through late July.

The turn pocket lane reduction will accommodate traffic lane restrictions during the City's \$3.5 million 5th Street roadway improvement project between Highway 70 and J Street. The city anticipates completing the roadwork by early fall.



# CA Tax Waste Report

Howard Jarvis Taxpayers Foundation issued its "Follow the Money 2021" report this week. It is not recommended reading for those prone to depression.

It begins with "This last year California once again ranked worst in the nation to do business, according to an annual report by CEO Magazine, and numerous examples of waste, fraud and abuse totaling billions of taxpayers' dollars down the drain were reported by independent investigations."

California is now expected to be the leading state in screwing its citizens and businesses. Voters, likely suffering from Stockholm syndrome, reward their molesters with a return to power.

Even Silicon Valley is in decline losing 20% of its venture capital investment. Even after Gov. Newsom's \$95 million advertising blitz tourism never has come close to its pre-2019 levels.

The ongoing loss of jobs, businesses and productive citizens has cost the state a Congressional seat and national influence for the first time in its history.

The state can't even monitor its budget due to failed technology scheduled to come online in 2016. The accounting system is hundreds of millions over budget. Now, here are some specifics on waste, fraud and abuse.

Openthebooks.com reported that 82 - L.A. life-guards made more than \$200,000 each and 7 made over \$300,000 in 2019. And State Controller Betty Yee cannot even produce a checkbook or summary of monies spent. Yet most large cities and 49 other states can show a record of expenditures.

Five DMV employees at the Torrance and Lincoln Park offices admitted taking tens of thousands of dollars in exchange for issuing licenses to unqualified drivers.

A Sacramento Bee investigation found that Governor Newsom's wife's nonprofit, a firm focused on gender equity in film, received \$800,000 in donations from companies involved in lobbying the state. The following donor companies also contributed to the Governor's political activities.

They include PG&E,

Kaiser Permanente, AT&T, and Comcast. The Governor denies that the donations to his wife's nonprofit had any inappropriate influence on his decisions, stating that "There's no correlation, period, full stop. Absolutely none."

The chief executive of the state's largest union (SEIU) resigned after being charged with numerous crimes including failure to pay her taxes. This union is in favor of higher taxes and gave \$6 million to Newsom for his recall fight.

In 2019-2020, state and county officials labeled thousands of businesses nonessential, bankrupting them. County medical officers forced millions of healthy workers to go home. Assemblyman Kevin Kiley then asked the director of the Employment Development Department why unemployment was so high. She was baffled saying her "research team" would look into it.

While Californians were threatened to "stay home to save lives" politicians maintained their junkets (Pebble Beach, Australia, Scotland, Portland, and Maui) with lobbyists covering many of the costs to buy influence.

State employees bilked \$2.7 million destined to help AIDS patients. The money funded personal travel, cruises, parties, and trips to sporting events. Fake invoices made out to a non-existent company diverted the money for personal gain.

Democrat Congressman Ted Lieu donated \$50,000 of his campaign funds to Stanford University before his son was accepted to attend. The contributions were first exposed by an anonymous Twitter user. The user's account was then banned by Twitter.

A federal grand jury indicted South L.A. Councilman Mark Ridley-Thomas on charges of funneling millions of dollars of contracts to the University of Southern California in exchange for an admission with a full scholarship and a paid professorship for his son. The son, Sebastian Ridley-Thomas, is familiar with scandal. He was a State Assembly member accused in the "#metoo" scandal before resigning his seat to become a professor, despite lacking a graduate degree.

Ontario Montclair School Superintendent makes more than \$600,000 annually and Sutter-Yuba Behavioral Health psychiatrists are collecting \$400,000-\$600,000 a year.

Politico revealed that California's Superintendent of Diversity, a new position paying \$180,000 a year, lived in Philadelphia where he ran a private

business. The state job was never even posted as he was buddies with the State Superintendent of Schools.

The Los Angeles County District Attorney charged four men including a former state senator with stealing \$20 million intended for a solar project. One of the individuals is accused of spending over \$8 million of the funds on personal items.

Only 27 percent of Californians who received coronavirus vaccinations used the website "MyTurn" to schedule appointments due in part to multiple tech glitches. The site failed to list many providers and pharmacies where Californians could be vaccinated. The site hindered people by requiring multiple logins. The \$50 million contract to build the site was awarded to Blue Shield of California on a "no bid" basis.

As part of its mad obsession to inject people, the state resorted to bribery using lottery-style payouts and prizes. Ten Californians received \$1.5 million each, 30 got \$50,000 each, and 2 million people were rewarded with \$50 gift cards.

Whistleblowers exposed a COVID-19 test facility for serious problems including lab techs sleeping while processing samples and test swabs found in bathrooms. State officials initially denied the existence of any problem. They finally acknowledged "serious deficiencies" but still renewed a contract worth \$1.7 billion.

A program to build "tiny home villages" in Los Angeles consisting of 64-square-foot (8X8) aluminum and composite sheds. The state paid \$130,000 each for the structures, ten times what other cities spent.

The San Francisco Chronicle reported that 260 tents San Francisco maintains in six "sleeping villages" cost the city \$5,000 per tent per month, or \$60,000 annually. In addition to tents, the villages provide access to showers and 3-meals a day.

Some complained about the cost. At \$5,000 per tent per month, the rent on a luxury apartment would be less, and the rent on an average 1-bedroom apartment in San Francisco would be less than half.

### Water Curtailments in Russian River Watershed Expected to Continue

Farmers and ranchers in the Russian River watershed are likely to see continued restrictions on irrigation supplies this year. State water officials are seeking to extend a 2021 curtailment order for Russian River water diversions. The state plans to revise its emergency drought regulations next month. Farm Bureaus in Mendocino and Sonoma counties are proposing an alternative plan that would incorporate a volunteer, locally driven water conservation program.

### Dairy Farmers Gearing Up for State Mandates on Cutting Methane Emissions

California dairy producers are facing increasing pressure to curb the carbon footprint of their operations. Dairy and livestock producers must cut methane emissions by 40% below 2013 levels by 2030. They are currently on pace to hit a reduction of 22% by then, according to the California Air Resources Board. Nonetheless, participants in a recent California Dairy Sustainability Summit said progress is underway and a climate-neutral dairy industry is achievable.

### As Mushroom Tastes Evolve, Growers Reap Premium Prices for New Varieties

Specialty mushrooms are trending. California mushroom growers are taking advantage of evolving customer demands to produce diverse product lines of healthy medicinal mushrooms, from reishi to cordyceps. One grower, Roberto Ramirez of Mountain Meadow Mushrooms in Escondido, says his organic lion's mane mushrooms now fetch \$15 a pound. That's far more than the \$2.25 he gets for his common white mushrooms.

### Legislature Advances Bill that would Reimburse Farmers for Cleanup of Illegal Dumping

Farmers are seeking help in addressing illegal dumping on their properties, and state lawmakers may be responding. Landowners complain that people are discarding everything from household appliances to tires on farms and along rural roads, creating unsightly messes and costly and often hazardous cleanup challenges. Legislation passed in the Assembly Natural Resources Committee would provide grants to reimburse farmers for costs of cleaning up the illegal dumping. ★

## Major Roadwork Starting on Highway 20

### Caltrans News Release

**COLUSA COUNTY, CA (MPG)** - Caltrans is alerting motorists that roadwork activity has started on a 1.7-mile stretch of State Highway 20 east of the Colusa County Airport in Colusa.

Crews Thursday, April 14 and Friday, April 15 cleared vegetation along the highway between Niagara Avenue and Steidlmayer Road as part of a \$9.1 million project that will widen shoulders to 8 feet, repave the roadway and improve drainage systems.

During early May, crews are scheduled to place temporary concrete barriers, or K-rail, on one side of the roadway, which will reduce the width of the eastbound and westbound traffic lanes to 11-feet wide to accommodate major construction activity.

Motorists may expect construction activity during the daytime and nighttime hours Monday through Saturday. Although most of

the roadwork will be performed behind the barrier, motorists may expect intermittent traffic-interfering work.

Teichert Construction of Sacramento is the prime contractor with project completion expected by early fall. The schedule is subject to change due to weather or unexpected events.

During construction the speed limit in the project work zone will be reduced to 45 mph. Caltrans reminds motorists to Be Work Zone Alert and slow down.

Caltrans District 3 is responsible for maintaining and operating 4,385 highway lane miles in 11 Sacramento Valley and Northern Sierra counties. ## Reasons for the Sell Off

Friday, April 22, the Dow lost almost 1000 points. We had not seen that bad of a day since 2020 when CoVid hit.

Keep in mind, after that similar day in 2020, the Dow screamed back even higher soon thereafter, so hope springs eternal.

Investors might take heart knowing that bad sell-offs can be followed by equally eye-popping rallies. Not to say the pain is over, as there usually are reasons for massive routs, and this crash is no exception.

The NASDAQ actually started its slow motion crash late in 2021. In my opinion, the sector represented by the NASDAQ simply got too frothy, and it finally reversed as investors took profits.

That was followed by investors finally taking notice, at the start of 2022, of the inflationary forces that had been accelerating for about a year. Consumers likely knew prices were jumping more than usual. You would have had to live on the moon not to notice. But in the market, fear tends to surface all at once, and can come to a head in a horrific crash on any particular but obscure day that no one can predict.

Detailed in numerous Money Matters shows and articles, and shouted from the roof tops on many news media outlets, inflation had been getting worse for months, and it was only a matter of time before the Federal Reserve (FEDS) decided to do something about it. Originally believing it was "transitory" (in their own words), inflation was actually just getting started, and similar to other times in history, the FEDS were late in correctly assessing the severity of the crisis.

FED speak soon hit the newswires, and they warned a reduction in Quantities Easing (Q.E. for short and basically is money printing) was coming. They also revealed an increase in interest rates was to be undertaken. The news prompted the first sell off beginning in January. The market anticipated the usual 1/4% increase we had often seen in the past.

Once that bitter pill was swallowed, the markets somewhat stabilized, only to be rocked again when the FEDS upped the ante and starting talking about 1/2% increases. Investors appeared to shake that

off after another market set back, and then the Ukraine problem hit the wires.

The first few weeks of late March and early April offered up some hope with some green numbers bouncing the markets and indeed, many key metrics signaled the worst might be over. The market looked like it had somewhat stabilized until the FEDS once again raised the stakes and mentioned possible 3/4% increases were on the table.

Subsequently, and hence therefore, Friday turned more than ugly. Investors likely saw red in their portfolio balances and probably more red than they have seen in a long, long time.

Keeping in mind no one can predict market movements at any time, we can only guess as to what will happen next. Will we once again wash the bad news down with the elixir of time, and see the markets rebound? Or will the carnage continue and test the March lows once again, which would be another 900 or so Dow points? Could it even go lower?

We won't know the answer until it is well in the rear view mirror.

One thing is certain. Inflation is bad and getting worse. Ditto for the FEDS interest rate forecasts. Keep in mind, the FEDS haven't even done anything yet. So goes the effect of interest rate announcements on the market. Sometime the anticipation of the event causes more damage than the event itself.

The key to the whole thing will be how inflation responds to the FEDS actions and whether the FED's current plan of interest rates increase does the trick, or if even stronger medicine may be needed.

## Gov. Brown Pushed for Softer Treatment of Violent Felons

It's an election year and crime has emerged as a major campaign issue, so it's no wonder that the horrendous shootout between two gang factions in downtown Sacramento that left six people dead has led to much political fingerpointing.

Republicans, who have become virtually powerless in California, quickly pointed the finger of blame at Gov. Gavin Newsom because one of the alleged shooters, Smiley Martin, had served just five years of a 10-year prison term for spousal abuse due to the state's recently loosened parole standards.

"In California, you can do the crime and skip the time. Criminals see little to no consequences for crime, and that needs to change," said Senate Republican leader Scott Wilk. "If we are to restore order and safety to our communities, a good place to start is ensuring early release credits are not given to violent and dangerous felons for simply breathing."

In response, Newsom's office has said the state prison system was merely implementing authority to grant more generous "good time" credits to inmates that voters authorized when they passed

Proposition 57 in 2016.

Prison authorities had adopted the new rules on an expedited basis without the chance for public input, but after a lawsuit was filed and a judge tentatively ruled against the process, they reversed themselves and have allowed a period for comment.

The politician who should bear the onus for allowing the alleged shooter and other violent criminals to serve only portions of their sentences is former Gov. Jerry Brown, who wrote Proposition 57 and more or less tricked voters into believing that it would benefit only felons who committed non-violent crimes.

Brown's stated aim was to undo some of the tough sentencing laws he signed during his first stint as governor nearly four decades earlier, saying they had not worked.

He closely guarded details of the "Public Safety and Rehabilitation Act of 2016" until just before submitting it as an amendment to a pending ballot measure dealing with juvenile justice, thereby virtually eliminating any chance for opponents to influence "title and summary" processing by the Department of Justice.

The measure, a constitutional amendment, declares that "any person convicted of a non-violent felony offense and sentenced to state prison shall be eligible for parole consideration after completing the full term for his or her primary offense" and made it easier for them to reduce the "full term" with more

generous credits for good behavior.

However, it did not define or list "non-violent felony offenses." Instead, Brown's campaign referred to a section of the Penal Code that listed 23 particularly violent offenses, such as murder. Any crime not on the list would be considered non-violent for purposes of parole.

Indirectly, therefore, dozens of serious crimes would be considered non-violent for parole purposes. They include assault with a deadly weapon, soliciting murder, intimidating or harming a crime victim or witness, resisting arrest that injures a police officer, violent elder or child abuse, arson with injury, human trafficking and several forms of manslaughter.

Ironically, as Proposition 57 was being debated, Kamala Harris, then the attorney general, released a report revealing that violent crime had increased by 10% in 2015 and she counted several crimes considered to be non-violent under Brown's measure.

Nevertheless, Brown's campaign for Proposition 57 continued to insist that only non-violent felons would benefit and voters passed the measure handily. Two years ago, voters also rejected a measure that would have added a number of obviously violent crimes to the 23 that Proposition 57 had specified.

# The Pentagon Is Hemorrhaging Top IT Talent

Another senior tech official resigns, says breaking through bureaucracy was like ‘working to defy gravity’


The Department of Defense (DoD) lost another top IT official on April 18 with the resignation of Preston Dunlap, the founding chief architecture officer of the Air and Space Forces.

Dunlap wrote that he was proud of the three years he spent at the Pentagon in an open resignation letter posted to social media, but that bureaucracy, a risk-averse culture, and other internal issues made innovation more difficult than it should have been.

He said the DoD fostered an environment in which it was “hard, but not impossible” to innovate and compared the effort required to break through Pentagon bureaucracy to the effort needed to push satellites past earth’s gravity.

“I’ve spent the last three years working to defy gravity and get desperately needed technology into our operators’ hands,” Dunlap said. “By the time the Government manages to produce something, it’s too often obsolete; no business would ever survive this way, nor should it.”

Dunlap’s resignation follows that of DoD Chief Software Officer Jason Weiss earlier in April and that of Air and Space Forces Chief Software Officer Nicolas Chaillan in October. Both Weiss and Chaillan used their resignations to warn that out-of-control bureaucracies were preventing a talented and dedicated workforce in the DoD from succeeding.

“This is a massive loss for DoD,” Chaillan said in reference to Dunlap’s departure. “The number of top talent leaving the Pentagon is very concerning.”

“I don’t know anyone who is as good as Preston in the entire Department. [He] Will be very tough to replace, particularly since they have yet to replace me. Even worse after [Weiss] left last month too.”

## Pentagon Lacks Budget, Authority, and Vision

In the eight-page document marking his departure from the Pentagon, Dunlap painted a bleak picture of a military bureaucracy run amok, with little to no resources or support available for those trying to change the status quo.

“Not unsurprisingly to anyone who has worked for or with the Government before, I arrived to find no budget, no authority, no alignment of vision, no people, no computers, no networks, a leaky ceiling, even a broken

curtain,” Dunlap said. “You get the picture. Sadly, I was probably better off than most who show up to serve.”

“Ironically as I’m writing this, I received notification that the phone lines are down at the Pentagon IT help desk. Phone lines are down? It’s 2022, folks.”

Dunlap noted that there was a strong cadre of dedicated individuals who had worked to stand up to the Pentagon’s efforts at building a next-generation fighting force, but that they were too often blunted by bureaucracy.

Dunlap singled out a handful of individuals for gratitude in continually supporting the mission regardless of the trials faced. Among them was Gen. John Hyten, former vice chair of the Joint Chiefs of Staff.

Like Dunlap, Hyten also tried to combat the growing military bureaucracy and, in the final months before his retirement in November 2021, he sounded the alarm

on what he saw as a number of red flags for U.S. military readiness.

During an October interview, Hyten derided what he called a “brutal” Pentagon bureaucracy for hamstringing the U.S. military. He said weapons programs took 10 to 15 years to develop on average, with others taking far longer.

“We can go fast if we want to,” Hyten said. “But the bureaucracy we’ve put in place is just brutal.”

Still other systems were scrapped outright for not immediately succeeding, he said, as was the case with the brief U.S. effort to develop hypersonic weapons a decade ago.

Further, Hyten said U.S. military leadership was making the nation less secure through the process of over-classification, essentially blocking out knowledge of their projects from the public eye because they knew that if a project were classified, there would be less bureaucratic red tape for it to become entangled in.

## Arizona Border Sheriffs Expect More Cartel Crime Once Title 42 Revoked

One sheriff gets the illegal alien “gotaways” in his Arizona county, while the other predominantly gets the “give-ups.”

Cochise County Sheriff Mark Dannels said that during the month of March, his office apprehended more than 7,000 illegal immigrants who were trying to avoid capture, also known as “gotaways.”

Two years ago, that number was “a manageable” 400 per month, Dannels said.

“In my section of the southeast corner in the state of Arizona ... we see 100 percent aggravated individuals that are camouflaged, they’re coming to the country for all ill intent—they’re taking advantage of current times,” Dannels told members of Congress during an April 6 House hearing.

Between 900 and 1,000 smugglers drive into Cochise County to pick up illegal aliens near the border and drive them to Phoenix for about \$1,000 per head, according to Dannels.

“We need to understand that smuggling comes with criminal cartels. These transnational organizations, they have no respect for Americans, no respect for communities,” he said. “My office right now is investigating several acts here last month, where an agent—they tried to cut his throat. Had another one [where] they tried to kill the agent.”

As the Biden administration

prepares to end the Title 42 public health order on May 23, border sheriffs are expecting the worst.

“We have great concern,” Dannels said. “It’s going to have a huge impact. We’re already outpaced.”

Title 42 is a Centers for Disease Control and Prevention order that was invoked in March 2020 under then-President Donald Trump to minimize the spread of COVID-19 by ensuring that only essential travel occurred at U.S. borders.

It directed that illegal immigrants could be quickly expelled back into Mexico as a pandemic precaution, rather than be processed under Title 8 immigration law, which is a much more protracted process inside the United States.

“Currently, we’re spending \$17,000 a week out of a rural county sheriff’s office to address border security,” Dannels said.

Between July 1, 2021, and February, the sheriff’s office has spent \$1.1 million in booking border-related criminals into the local jail.

“What we’re not talking about when it comes to our southern border is the rule of law. We’re also not talking about border security. We have immigration, and we have border security. And sadly, border security has been set aside,” Dannels said.

## The ‘Give-Ups’

A 320-mile drive to the west sits Yuma County, where Sheriff

Leon Wilmot is grappling with thousands of illegal immigrants walking around the unfinished border wall and waiting for Border Patrol—the “give-ups.”

“These are not poor people; they are dressed in designer clothing with money and cell phones,” Wilmot told The Epoch Times.

“They are flying into Mexico from over 140 different countries and then taking a cab or bus to the river. They walk across the border, discarding their trash, clothing, and identification [showing] they have been granted permission to live and work in Mexico. They are exploiting the weakness of this administration’s policies on our border.”

In 2021, Yuma Sector Border Patrol agents apprehended 183,750 illegal immigrants, according to Customs and Border Protection (CBP) data. In 2020, that number was 8,758.

“Estimates are that the cartels are making an average of \$15 million a week in the smuggling of humans across the Yuma Sector alone,” Wilmot said. “This has led to escalated violence along the border in Mexico as the cartels fight over control of the border.”

He’s bracing for the end of Title 42 and expects border-related crime to increase.

“In my 37 years of law enforcement in Yuma County, I have never seen such a lack of border security or concern for the safety of our country as I do today,” Wilmot said.

In the Yuma Border Patrol Sector, agents are already so busy processing large groups of illegal aliens that only four agents are available to patrol a 150-mile section of the border.

The amount of drugs being seized at the border has correspondingly plummeted, ac-

ording to CBP data.

The two Arizona Senators, both Democrats, wrote to President Joe Biden on March 24, urging him to keep Title 42 in place until the Department of Homeland Security (DHS) has a plan to handle the anticipated influx.

DHS has told Border Patrol agents to be prepared to apprehend up to 500,000 illegal immigrants per month—more than double what the overwhelmed agency is currently encountering.

The leaked contingency plan from DHS shows senior officials being told that the removal of Title 42 would lead to an increase in illegal immigration and one way to respond is to quickly release many into the U.S. interior.

The agency would use “broad-scale release mechanisms” such as issuing notices to appear in court or even releasing illegal immigrants without a court notice, a practice that wasn’t used until Biden took office, according to the document first published by Breitbart News.

As many as 450,000 illegal aliens could gather from the southern U.S. border through Central America in a 30-day period, according to one of the planning scenarios in the contingency plan. That could lead to “multiple surges” of 10,000 to 20,000 illegal crossings at different locations at the same time.





# Investing in New KidsVaxGrant

## CDPH Press Release

**SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG)** - In an effort to expand COVID-19 vaccine access for youth, the California Department of Public Health (CDPH) is offering \$10 million in grant funding through the newly launched KidsVaxGrant. "This grant program will make COVID-19 vaccines more accessible to children and their families by recruiting new providers and supporting existing providers by expanding operating hours. As a father and a pediatrician, I assure you COVID-19 vaccines are safe and effective. Please make an appointment to get your family vaccinated today."

Since its inception in 1995, the

state's VFC Program has played an essential role in vaccinating youth by supplying providers with vaccines for children at no additional cost to parents or guardians who may be unable to afford them. The state aims to increase access to the COVID-19 vaccine by recruiting additional providers into the California COVID-19 Vaccination Program and by helping providers expand their operating hours to make vaccinations more convenient for families. Longer hours CDPH has contracted with Physicians for a Healthy California to

administer the KidsVaxGrant program statewide.

Newly enrolled VFC providers that are part of the California COVID-19 Vaccination Program could be eligible for \$10,000 in KidVaxGrant funds per site to establish COVID-19 vaccination services. VFC providers already enrolled are also eligible to apply and could be awarded \$15,000 grant per site. The deadline to apply is May 27, 2022.

To be considered, providers must expand their operating hours. Expanding the capacity of providers to open their doors

beyond normal business hours allows for additional vaccination options for working families. Operating hours must be increased by a minimum of 15 hours outside of standard operating hours during a 60-day period.





## Chico Man Ordered to Stand Trial For 2019 Marijuana Grow Murder

**CHICO, CA (MPG)** - A 2019 murder case involving a perceived employment compensation dispute over an illegal marijuana grow will proceed to trial after a Butte County Superior Court judge found sufficient evidence to hold a Chico man to answer today at his preliminary hearing.

Dylan Andrew Glen Rice, 27, of Chico, was held to answer on a murder charge arising from the killing of Jacob McArthur, who was 27 at the time of

his death. Judge Michael Deems presided over the hearing and determined from the evidence that the case should proceed to trial.

Butte County District Attorney Mike Ramsey explained that a preliminary hearing is conducted in felony cases in order for a judge to decide whether there is enough evidence to order someone to stand trial.

Ramsey said the case began in December of 2019 when Butte County Sheriff's detectives responded to McArthur's rural residence on Craig Access Road east of Lake Oroville. McArthur was found to have been shot multiple times inside his residence. Over the course of the next year and a half, the detectives continued to gather evidence. Finally, in July of 2021, because of their investigation, detectives determined Rice was the gunman responsible for the death of McArthur,

and he was arrested for the murder.

Ramsey said the evidence presented at the hearing showed that Rice, who had previously worked with McArthur cultivating marijuana at the Craig Access Road property as part of an illegal marijuana organization, felt he had been "short changed" over his work. Evidence showed Rice had lurked outside McArthur's home for some time during the night before shooting through a living room window and hitting McArthur inside.

Ramsey said the lurking outside of the home before the intentional shooting made Rice subject to a potential prison term of life without the possibility of parole. Rice will next appear in court on May 5, 2022, to have his jury trial date set. Rice remains in Butte County Jail with no bail. ★

## Wanted Felon Who Fled Courthouse Captured in Utah

**BUTTE COUNTY, CA (MPG)** - A former Butte County resident wanted on two felony warrants after fleeing from Butte County Superior Court last month was captured in Utah on April 20, 2022.

District Attorney Mike Ramsey said Kipp Ford, 40, formerly of Gridley and Chico, was found hiding in a Utah garage in an upper wall storage cabinet by local police. He was taken to a local jail where he is being held without bail pending extradition to Butte County.

Ramsey said Ford had been charged in Butte County with multiple felony counts of construction fraud and was due in Butte County Superior Court on March 16, 2022, after previously bailing out of jail on those charges. He however failed to appear at court on that date and instead sent a signed excuse through his attorney that he was supposedly unable to appear due to a construction job he had in Colorado. Ramsey said an investigation into that excuse showed it to be false and his office filed a new felony charge of filing a false document with the court.

That new complaint was awaiting Ford, when he appeared out-of-custody in court two weeks later on March 30, 2022. When the judge read the new felony complaint, Ford's surprised attorney asked the judge if he could speak to Ford outside of the courtroom. The in-court prosecutor expressed her concern that Ford would not return to the courtroom if the court granted his attorney's request. The judge warned Ford that if he failed to return to the courtroom, there would be consequences.

Approximately 30 minutes later, Ford's attorney returned to the

courtroom without his client. The attorney explained to the judge that Ford said he had to get something out of his truck, but never returned. The judge immediately issued no-bail arrest warrants for Ford's arrest.

Ford's attorney later conducted interviews with local media outlets where he claimed his client left the courthouse due to an "emergency."

Ramsey said Ford previously lived in both Chico and Gridley, but more recently, he had been tied to Utah, Colorado, Texas, and New Mexico. Ramsey said his office received multiple tips as to Ford's current whereabouts, which were used to locate him in Utah.

Ramsey said his investigators contacted the Herriman Police Department in Utah and requested their assistance in locating Ford. Herriman Police officers conducted surveillance and were able to locate Ford's truck parked near a girlfriend's townhouse. Officers contacted the girlfriend, who allowed officers to search her home, claiming she did not know where Ford was.

Ramsey said officers searched the girlfriend's house and then its garage, and noticed a footprint on a box, which was directly below an upper wall storage cabinet. An officer tried to open the cabinet door, but it would not open. Finding no lock on the cabinet door, the officers forcibly opened the door and found Ford curled inside the cabinet trying to hold the door closed.

Ramsey, amused by the image of Ford in the fetal position hiding in the cabinet, said, "It must have been one heck of an emergency."

Ford was placed under arrest and booked into the Salt Lake County Jail, where he will remain in custody until extradited to Butte County. ★

## Suspect Arrested with almost 500 grams of Meth, Cocaine and Heroin

**YUBA-SUTTER, CA (MPG)** - On March 10th, 2022, a Wheatland Police Department Officer contacted White male adult (WMA) Jeffrey Wroblewski (sitting inside his vehicle parked in the Dollar General parking lot located, 1920 Highway 65, Wheatland. The officer noticed drug paraphernalia sitting in plain view, inside Jeffrey Wroblewski's vehicle. Officers conducted a thorough search of Jeffrey Wroblewski's vehicle and located the following items; 472.4 grams of methamphetamine, 31.5 grams of cocaine, 2.5 grams of heroin, drug packaging material, two digital scales, and a loaded-concealed firearm which had the serial number removed. Wheatland Police Department turned the investigation over to the Yuba-Sutter Narcotic and Gang Enforcement Task Force (NET-5). NET-5 Agents learned Jeffrey Wroblewski's was currently out of jail on bail for an unrelated narcotics

investigation out of Placer County. It was also learned Jeffrey Wroblewski was prohibited from possessing firearms.

NET-5 Agents ultimately arrested and booked Jeffrey Wroblewski into the Yuba County Jail for violations of: 113 78( a) H&S-possession of a controlled substance for sale, 113 79( a) H&S-transportation of a controlled substance for sale, 113 70.1 H&S- armed with a firearm while possessing a controlled substance for sale, 29800(a)(l) PC-prohibited possession of a firearm, 30305(a)(l) PC-Unlawful possession of ammunition, 12022.1 PC-committing a felony while on bail or OR, 23900(1) PC-possession of firearm with serial number removed, 11364(a) PC-possession of drug paraphernalia, 25850 PC-loaded firearm in public, 25400 PCconcealed firearm in public, and 113 50( a) H&S-possession of a controlled substance.

The investigation has been sent to the Yuba County District Attorney's Office. ★

by the U.S. Forest Service on Apr. 18 committed an additional \$3 million for work in the North Yuba River watershed in 2022 as part of its Collaborative Forest Landscape Restoration Program. These funds will also be used for implementation-ready projects.

"Both of these new funding awards provide resources at a pivotal time," Lessard said. "There is an urgent need

to address high wildfire hazard potential and areas more susceptible to insects, disease and drought in the North Yuba River watershed."

The treatments that this funding will support, such as ecologically based thinning and prescribed fire, are designed to promote forest conditions that are more resilient, while reducing the risk of catastrophic wildfire and restoring watershed health and native biodiversity. ★

## Illegal Indoor Cannabis Grow Discovered due to Overwhelming Odor

**Yuba-Sutter NET-5 Press Release**

**YUBA-SUTTER, CA (MPG)** - During the past six months, Yuba-Sutter Narcotic and Gang Enforcement Task Force (NET-5) received multiple complaints regarding the overwhelming odor of marijuana in a commercial structure at 598 Garden Highway. The odor was permeating the building and impacting other neighboring businesses. NET-5 Agents investigated and obtained probable cause to believe there was cannabis being illegal cultivated inside of Unit #23.

On April 5th, 2022, at approximately 12:35 PM, NET-5 Agents with assistance of the Yuba City Police Department, served a search warrant at 598 Garden Highway #23. Upon entering Unit #23,

Agents saw it had been converted into a complex illegal indoor cannabis grow. The illegal cannabis grow consisted of approximately 368 plants and was determined to be unlawful within the city limits of Yuba City, a violation of the Yuba City Municipal Code and a violation of section 11358(c) of the California Health and Safety Code. The grow was eradicated and the landlord for the unit was notified. The tenant of Unit # 23 was identified as Robert Mann (40 years old of Sacramento) and issued a misdemeanor citation for illegally cultivating cannabis, a violation of section 11358(c) of the California Health and Safety Code.

The investigation will be sent to the Sutter County District Attorney's Office for prosecution. ★
