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Snowpack Worsens

Sierra Snowpack Falls to Lowest Level in 7 Years

Seven years ago today, (April 1, 2015) during the height of the last drought, California Gov. Jerry Brown stood on the barren slopes of the Sierra Nevada, watching as engineers measured the worst snowpack in state history.

Today's snow measurements aren't quite so bleak, but they remain devastatingly low: The snowpack — which provides a third of California's water supply — is 38% of average statewide. And at the same bone-dry spot where Brown stood in 2015, at Phillips Station south of Lake Tahoe, state engineers today found

a shrinking patch of snow that contained only 4% of the location's average water content.

After the Sierra Nevada's driest January, February and March for more than a century, the scene painted a picture of a deepening drought.

"Today is actually very evocative of 2015," Karla Nemeth, director of the California Department of Water Resources said against a backdrop of brown grass at Phillips Station.

"You need no more evidence than standing here on this very dry landscape to understand some of the challenges we're facing here in California," Nemeth said.

Worse than last year, worse even than last month, this year's snowpack is the worst it's been in seven years and the sixth lowest April measurement in state history. It's not as bad as the last drought, however: The snowpack contains about eight times more water than in 2015.

The amount of snow in April is considered critical because it indicates how much water will be available through the summer. The snow, historically at its deepest in April, melts and flows into rivers, streams and reservoirs that serve much of the state.

The Youngest Bataan Death March Survivor

Bob Brown was a plucky sort of kid, a kid with a lot of moxie. He had barely started his junior year in high school in October 1940 when he decided to quit and join the US Army Air Corps. He was just sixteen years old.

Born in Suisun, California, about fifty miles northeast of San Francisco, he was up for a change, and the Army Air Corps seemed like a

good idea. His ancestry dated back to 1852 when his family left Indiana by wagon train for Northern California, so he came from a long line of adventurous people.

Bob was assigned to the 34th Pursuit Squadron, became a medical technician, and was shipped out to the island of Luzon in the Philippines in November 1941. The Philippines was invaded

by the Japanese the following month, and Bob's squadron with other American servicemen joined forces with the Filipinos and fought valiantly with very little food or medicine. By the following April, he was fighting as an infantryman because his medical supplies had been exhausted. Finally, starving and diseased, the US and the Filipino forces surrendered to

the Japanese Army on 9 April 1942.

The infamous Bataan Death March of approximately 70,000 Filipino and American prisoners began the following day. The first leg on the trek to Camp O'Donnell was a six-day walk to a railhead at which the prisoners were loaded onto a train. During the march to the railhead, there was virtually no food or water. They were subjected to severe physical abuse, including beatings, torture, shootings, stabbings, and beheadings. At the railhead, the men were stuffed into boxcars so tight, they could not sit down. The release of body wastes was accomplished where they stood. Some 20,000 died along the way; another 30,000 perished over the next three years at the camp.

In October 1942, Bob and other relatively strong POWs were shipped to Mukden, China, to work as slave laborers. He now weighed just eighty pounds and suffered from malaria and beriberi. But the kid with moxie was not down. He learned Japanese

and served as an interpreter. He received two written commendations from the Japanese camp commander. The POWs were finally liberated on 16 August 1945. He is considered the youngest American serviceman to have survived the Bataan Death March.

Bob returned to his home in Marysville, California, was

discharged, and promptly re-enlisted in the Air Force, rising to the rank of Chief Master Sergeant, the highest enlisted rank. He retired on 6 October 1969, with twenty-nine years of active service. He passed away on 15 October 2008.

Chief Master Sergeant Brown's donations may be viewed in the glass case marked B-14. ★

the state’s snow surveys and water supply forecasting section, held his hand at roughly shoulder height on a survey instrument. “On an average year, our feet should be right here where my hand is,” he said.

As California’s water officials discovered last year, climate change is upending their forecasts for how much melting snow the thirsty state can truly expect to refill its dwindling stores.

It’s a dismal end to a water year that began with great promise, with early storms in October and December. By Jan. 1, the plush snowpack was 160% of average for that date statewide, and already a little over half the seasonal total.

“Our great snowpack — the water tower of the West and the world — was looking good. We had real high hopes,” Benjamin Hatchett, an assistant research professor with the Western Regional Climate Center and Desert Research Institute, said in a recent drought presentation.

Typically, the snowpack would continue to build until April. But a record-dry January, February and March followed by unseasonably warm and dry conditions in March sapped the frozen stores, which by the end of the month were already melting at levels that would be expected in April or May.

Now, “we would consider this to be deep into snow drought,” Hatchett said.

Reservoir storage statewide is about 70% of average — around half of total capacity, de Guzman said today.

Though state officials reported that early snowmelt has started to refill foothill reservoirs, the water level in massive Lake Shasta, critical to federal supplies for farms, people and endangered salmon, sits at less than half the average for this date. Lake Oroville is only slightly better, at 67% of its historic average.

From Andrew Schwartz’s vantage point north of Lake Tahoe at the University of California, Berkeley’s Central Sierra Snow Lab, it still looks wintry, with about three feet of snow, “plus or minus six inches,” he said.

It’s a far cry from the grassy field further south in the Sierra Nevada, where Brown stood for the survey seven years ago and where state officials found just traces of snow today.

“It’s been a false sense of security when you come up here” to the snow lab, Schwartz said “Statewide as a whole, it’s not looking great.”

There could be a number of consequences to the early snowmelt, Schwartz

said. It could result in more water loss as early snowmelt evaporates in reservoirs, disrupting the balance of mountain ecosystems and speeding the start of fire season.

“Without the snow, once things dry out, it’s just going to be catastrophic again,” Schwartz said.

Early snowmelt can also complicate reservoir operations if managers need to release water to preserve flood control space, said Nathan Patrick, a hydrologist with the federal California Nevada River Forecast Center.

California’s water supply will be determined by how much snowmelt continues to flow into major reservoirs versus how much will seep into the soil or disappear into the air. Climate change is already transforming this pattern as the weather swings between extremes, and warmer temperatures suck moisture from the soil and melt snow earlier in the year.

“The next few weeks are really that critical period to actually watch how much of that runoff will actually make it down into those lakes,” de Guzman said.

California’s Department of Water Resources is working to overhaul its runoff forecast calculations, an effort that has grown increasingly urgent. Last year, the state’s projections for runoff from the Sierra Nevada overshot reality by so much that water regulators were left scrambling to protect drinking water supplies and preserve enough water in storage.

Assemblymember Adam Gray, a Democrat from Merced, has called for a state audit of the calculations. “Has the state learned anything from this disaster?” he asked in a CalMatters op-ed.

This year, de Guzman and Patrick expect more of the snow to reach reservoirs.

The soils, for one thing, are wetter — the result of powerful October storms that soaked the state. That means more of the snowmelt may flow into rivers and streams. Generally, Patrick said, “We expect it to be better this year.”

Still, increased runoff can’t make up for a paltry snowpack — particularly in the Northern Sierra. The snowpack there is the lowest in the state, just 28% the seasonal average, compared to 42% and 43% in the Central and Southern Sierra.

Patrick sees a trend emerging in the runoff and streamflow measurements over the past three years. “One after another have been below normal,” he said.

“You can deal with one or two bad years, but when you start to get these compounding, three bad years ... it’s hard to recover.” ★

The City of Marysville is hopeful that the outfield wall will be completed by the time the Goldsox fields a team at Bryant Field this May. “It’s a lofty goal, but we are pushing hard to complete this project for our community, baseball lovers and our

SCSO Partners with Probation Department Resulting in 7 Arrests



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State Allocates Funds for Repairs to Friant-Kern Canal

The California Department of Water Resources allocated nearly \$30 million this month to repair segments of the Friant-Kern Canal. The 152-mile-long canal delivers water to 1 million acres of farmland from Fresno to Bakersfield. A critical 33-mile stretch in eastern Tulare County has been damaged by land subsistence, which threatens the canal’s carrying capacity. Repairs are expected to total nearly \$300 million, with completion in 2024.

Farmers Markets Get State Grants for Healthy Foods

Farmers markets are receiving \$750,000 in state grants to facilitate purchases of California-grown fruit and vegetables for low-income residents, including seniors. Funds from the state Department of Food and Agriculture’s California Nutrition Incentive Program will go to 100 farmers markets in the Los Angeles area, the Bay Area, and San Bernardino, Tulare, Butte, Shasta and Tehama counties. The grants seek to increase access to healthy foods and expand markets for farmers.

Chico State Agriculture Team Wins in ‘Export Market Challenge’

Agriculture students from California State University, Chico won top team prizes this month in competitions in which students evaluate export opportunities for food and other farm products. Chico State team members Kurt Sheppard, Zion Brigham and Erin Harley combined to win regional and national awards in the 2022 Agricultural Export Market Challenge, hosted by the USDA Foreign Agricultural Service. The team won for a fictitious project on cattle feed to reduce methane emissions.

Viticulture Students from UC Davis get a Surprise Victory in Beer Making

Viticulture and enology students at the University of California, Davis have produced the winning beer entry in the campus’ 2022 Iron Brew competition. The team, which also included a chemical engineering student, formulated a complex, easy-drinking Scottish export ale to win the annual event. Their entry was a dark, malty beer with caramel and toffee flavors. The triumphant brewing exercise surprised the teammates. “We study wine,” said team member Moises Gomez. “All of this is new to us.”

New Drug Pricing Reforms Would Undo Hatch-Waxman’s Historic Progress

WASHINGTON, DC (MPG) - Senate Democrats and White House officials are hastily piecing together a revised version of the Build Back Better Act, after Senator Joe Manchin announced he couldn’t support the version passed by the House.

Early reports indicate that any updated bill will still allow Medicare to set drug prices, which proponents claim will result in cheaper medicines for American patients.

They’re mistaken. Ironically, price controls will reduce patients’ access to low-cost generic medicines, at least in the long run. That’s because the Build Back Better Act would undermine a landmark Reagan-era law that has enabled thousands of generics to reach patients.

Passed in 1984, the Hatch-Waxman Act created a legal framework that allows generic drug makers to manufacture and sell lower-cost versions of brand-name medicines. Any American who has ever saved money by purchasing a generic medication has the law to thank.

Hatch-Waxman granted new drugs a five-year exclusivity period, during which the company that invented the medicine has the market to itself. Generic companies can use that time to develop and test their versions of the drug. Once that time elapses, generic competitors can launch their own versions at a lower price.

The purpose of these reforms was twofold: To increase access to low-cost generic drugs while also encouraging companies that invent original drugs to continue to invest in innovation. On both counts, the law has proven wildly successful.

Whereas generics accounted for less than 20% of prescriptions filled before Hatch-Waxman, today they account for

90%. This has made it far easier for patients to afford their medicines, as generics typically cost 80% to 85% less than brand-name drugs.

The Hatch-Waxman act also had a significant impact on drug innovation. In the time since, America has emerged as the undisputed leader in new-drug development.

The bipartisan group of legislators who passed the law went to great lengths to strike a proper balance between promoting innovation and affordability. Now, though, the Democrats’ drug-pricing proposal would destroy the law’s system of incentives.

For there to be a thriving generic drug market, there must first be a thriving brand-name market. The United States has both, but not if the U.S. Senate adopts the House’s misguided drug pricing provisions.

Democrats claim their proposal allows for the government to “negotiate” prices of targeted drugs with brand-name drug companies. But drug companies either agree to the government’s price or lose nearly all revenue from the sale of a drug. Given manufacturers won’t know what the government’s “negotiated” price will be until the drug is developed, many new, potentially life-saving drugs will never be explored.

For nearly four decades, Hatch-Waxman has fostered a competitive market for low-cost generic drugs, while helping medical science advance to new heights. Democrats’ drug-pricing plan would undermine that success story.

Because there can be no inexpensive, generic version of a brand-name drug that’s never invented.

Plaque Honoring Chinese Narrow Gauge Rail Workers

The Nevada County Historical Landmarks Commission is pleased to announce that on March 22, 2022, the Nevada County Board of Supervisors designated the County’s newest historical landmark NEV 22-01 to commemorate the Chinese workers who were integral in building the Narrow-Gauge Railroad.

Applicant Nevada County Narrow Gauge Railroad Museum is sponsoring a plaque which is expected to be placed this coming summer near the Nevada County Narrow Gauge Railroad kiosk at the corner of Sacramento Street and Railroad Avenue in Nevada City. It will read:

“In the race to build the western portion of the Transcontinental Railroad, the Central Pacific Railroad recruited over ten thousand young men from China, creating a skilled

and dependable work force. Upon completion many of these workers, who had come to America under contract for employment, returned home to China. Others remained to find employment building railroads throughout the United States.

This site marks one end of the 22-mile Nevada County Narrow Gauge Railroad that connected Nevada City and Grass Valley with Colfax and the Central Pacific Railroad. After construction of the NCNGRR started in 1875, over three hundred Chinese immigrants labored to build the railroad. They built the railroad grade over the rugged and uneven terrain between Colfax and Grass Valley, scaling canyons, filling ravines, and prepared the way for bridges and trestles. Using hand tools, horse drawn scrapers, hand carts and their determination, they completed the task in early 1876. Although considered more dependable than white workers, they were paid less.

When the railroad was

completed in 1876 most of the Chinese moved on to other railroad construction projects. A few Chinese workers remained as track workers maintaining the NCNGRR. Apart from laboring on the railroad, several Chinese businessmen in Nevada City were investors and retained stock in the company into the 20th century. The contributions of Chinese immigrants were an essential element in the building and success of the NCNGRR.”

The purpose of the Nevada County Historical Landmarks Commission is to promote the general welfare of Nevada County and its citizens through official recognition, recording, marking, preserving, and promoting the historical resources of Nevada County.

‘Job killer’ List Tests Capitol’s Ideological Bent

California is a deep blue state, markedly and proudly hewing to the left of the nation’s political centerline.

California’s Legislature, utterly dominated by Democrats, leans a little further to the port side of the political scale.

That said, there are ideological fault lines within the Democrats legislative supermajorities, some fairly obvious, others faint. Their existence explains why outcomes are not always as predictable as one might think, given one-party domination.

A prime example of that unpredictability is what happened, or didn’t happen, on legislation to overhaul medical care by having the state assume total control over its provision — a long-standing holy grail for the Democratic Party’s progressive activists.

The state Senate had passed a version of the single-payer legislation in a previous session, but it was bottled up in the Assembly. Last year, a new version, Assembly Bill 1400, moved fairly easily through Assembly committees to reach the floor, but when the Legislature reconvened in January, it ultimately died

there without a vote.

“I don’t believe it would have served the cause of getting single payer done by having the vote and having it go down in flames and further alienating members,” the bill’s author, San Jose Democrat Ash Kalra, told disappointed supporters later. He added that the measure, needing 41 votes to pass, was short by “double digits.”

Gov. Gavin Newsom, who had been a strident advocate of single-payer health care while campaigning for the governorship, didn’t make any effort to secure votes for it in the Assembly and most members were apparently unwilling, in an election year, to vote for something that would require an immense tax increase to implement.

The demise of AB 1400 was, among other things, another win for the California Chamber of Commerce’s “job killer” list, an annual exercise by the state’s business community to identify and block legislation that it considers to be the most onerous.

For a quarter-century, the list has served as a guide to the Capitol’s ideological temperature because it generally includes the highest-priority legislation of those on the left, such as labor unions and environmental and consumer protection advocates.

Although the Legislature has trended to drift leftward since the list was first issued in 1997, the chamber and its allies have rung up an impressive kill ratio.

Typically, several dozens bills are placed on the list and it’s rare for more than one or two to be passed by the Legislature and signed by the governor.

In 2021, for instance, 25 bills were targeted, and just two made it to Newsom’s desk. He vetoed one and signed the other, Senate Bill 62, which eliminates piece work payment for garment industry workers.

The chamber’s 90%-plus record in stopping bills it designates as “job killers” faces another test this year. It has issued a preliminary list of 11 bills with more to be added later.

The 2022 list includes a new “wealth tax” on the state’s richest residents, a bill that would allow workers to refuse to perform their jobs if they feel unsafe and an extension of the California Environmental Quality Act’s mitigation provisions to effects on disadvantaged communities.

The latter two, along with several others, would expand opportunities for lawsuits to enforce their provisions — thus renewing the annual jousting between business groups and personal injury attorneys over who can sue for what action, dubbed “tort wars.”

Fundamentally, the fate of bills on this year’s list will be another indicator of just how far left the Legislature is willing to go.

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The Warren Buffet Strategy

Icon investor Warren Buffett and owner of one of the largest investment companies, Berkshire Hathaway, said in a 2019 CNBC interview:

“We don’t buy the stock market, we buy companies”.

In this tiny tidbit of insight lies tremendous wisdom.

What Buffett is saying could be construed as: don’t buy the stock market because you think it will go up, but instead buy good companies that will continue to grow and subsequently increase shareholder value.

There are many historical examples supporting Buffett’s strategy as a sound one. The most recent is the CoVid March 2020 market crash and its subsequent recovery.

The Dow fell a stunning 38% in the first three weeks of March 2020 due to the onset of CoVid, and when the stock avalanche finally stopped, parts of the market started to rebound in a surprise “V” shape rally.

When CoVid caused the governments of the world to initiate global shutdowns in response, it arguably shifted the buying patterns of civilized man forever.

Stocks of companies that catered to in-person services such as restaurants, retail stores, gymnasiums and the like, saw their stock prices plummet, while those offering mail-order, on-line, remote or other distancing-type of service options, witnessed their stock price start to rise from the proverbial ashes.

Extrapolating to Buffett’s comments about buying individual companies instead of broad-based market buying, had an investor just bought a broad based index fund, that fund may have had stocks that cratered along with the shutdowns.

Investors that instead took care in buying only stocks carefully selected with the shutdown constraints in mind, may have bested the broad based indexes and possibly by many multiples.

The term “stock picker’s paradise” comes to mind. This means that blindly and, in my opinion, mindlessly, buying a broad based index mutual fund or exchange traded fund (known today as the popular ETF) possibly exposes the investor to some stocks that might rise mixed along with some stocks that might get crushed.

The net effect might be a portfolio that goes nowhere while the evening news touts the

stellar performance of a particular individual stock that sees customers flocking in droves to the online order desk.

Although many an investor and/or advisor might favor this typical shotgun approach to investing, there may be times where knowing a little bit more about investing than what is the most popular mutual fund of the day, will yield superior results.

Warren Buffett seems to think so, and his track record of successful investing is unparalleled.

With that in mind, the current market environment of 2022 may once again be setting up to teach the inattentive or unknowledgeable investor/advisor that knowing what stocks to buy in the market instead of just buying the market as a whole, may again prove that Buffett knows of what he speaks.

Although many might argue that the average advisor or investor just buy a bunch of mutual funds or ETF’s that cover the broad based market, there may have been times when doing just that yielded less than satisfactory results, and at times may have even hurt the portfolio.

It has been said the market is designed to take your money, not make your money, and that it is run by professionals. To think you can beat a bunch of Harvard educated quants sitting in front of their computer screens all day long is foolhardy.

Education is the cornerstone of progress, so keep in mind the market professionals you’re up against and running the whole shebang have a lot of the educational part under their belt and by the best of schools.

Not to say an investor can’t make money in the stock market, but knowing a little bit about stock picking than looking up the flavor-of-the-day mutual fund might go a long way in better securing your hard earned savings.

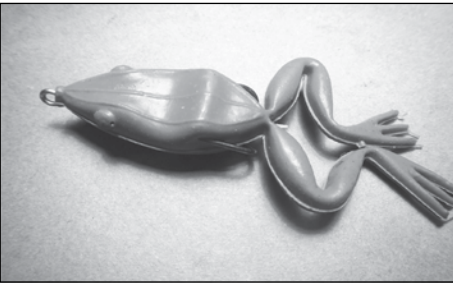

A Punch to The Gut for Alzheimer’s Patients and Their Loved Ones

WASHINGTON, DC (MPG) - Over 6 million Americans suffering from Alzheimer’s just received a gut-punch from the federal agency that oversees Medicare. So did their loved ones.

The Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services just made an unprecedented decision to cut off most seniors’ access to an entire class of Alzheimer’s treatments. CMS’s actions will have a significant impact on dementia research and could dash Americans’ hopes for a cure.

The decision most immediately impacts Medicare enrollees who were considering Aduhelm, a medicine that the FDA approved in June. The drug reduces amyloid plaque in the brain, which many but not all scientists believe is a trigger for Alzheimer’s.

The FDA weighed the science and determined that an accelerated approval which the agency has used for promising treatments for HIV and cancer in the past offered the best path forward. It gives patients access to a needed therapeutic option, while additional studies are done.

The bureaucrats at CMS evidently disagree with FDA scientists’ approach, which has long been viewed as the gold-standard for science-based safety and efficacy standards.

The Medicare administrator announced it would restrict access to Aduhelm and any other future “monoclonal antibodies that target amyloid for the treatment of Alzheimer’s disease” to a minuscule sliver of people enrolled in CMS-approved clinical trials, all of which could take several years. The proposal

excludes millions of Medicare beneficiaries currently living with the disease, and it will impact people of color particularly hard.

Studies show that over the last two decades, even though minorities are at an increased risk of developing Alzheimer’s, 94.7% of clinical trial participants for developmental Alzheimer’s treatments have been white.

The decision marks a significant setback for Alzheimer’s research. Nearly 100 Alzheimer’s programs have failed in the past decade. So, the FDA’s accelerated approval of Aduhelm, the first new Alzheimer’s treatment since 2003, wasn’t just hopeful news for patients; it was a historic event that gave researchers and investors the confidence to continue plugging away in search of new treatments.

There are companies of all sizes working to develop treatments to stop, prevent, or slow the progression of Alzheimer’s using a variety of novel strategies. Small biopharma companies are leading the majority of these programs.

If Medicare, which pays for the vast majority of Alzheimer’s treatment won’t cover a new drug, despite the FDA’s experts ruling that the medicine has great potential, companies would be foolish to keep investing in risky, hugely expensive Alzheimer’s research.

If unchallenged, this reproach and this unilateral assertion of drug-evaluation powers could harden into a precedent that could damage our treatment-approval process irreparably. And the onslaught of Alzheimer’s and other difficult-to-treat diseases will continue unchecked for generations to come. ★

Caltrans Replaces Butte County Bridge with SB 1 Funds

BUTTE COUNTY, CA (MPG) - Caltrans announced it has completed construction of the new Cottonwood Creek Bridge in Butte County. The \$15.3 million project includes \$3.2 million in funding from Senate Bill (SB) 1, the Road Repair and Accountability Act of 2017.

The new bridge, located on State Route (SR) 99 north of the Thermalito Afterbay reservoir, replaces an aging structure damaged by erosion. Over the years, swiftly moving water from Cottonwood Creek removed sediment around the bridge piers, compromising the integrity of the structure.

“The project is part of Caltrans’ effort to rehabilitate or replace several bridges in Butte County and neighboring Yuba and Sutter counties,” said Caltrans District 3 Director Amarjeet S. Benipal. “We’re continuing to honor our SB 1 commitments to all California travelers.”

In addition to building a new bridge, construction crews realigned a segment of roadway and widened the Nelson Avenue intersection at SR 99 by providing an additional left-turn lane onto eastbound lanes.

In the past two years, Caltrans has also upgraded the Western Canal Bridge on SR 99 in Butte County and replaced the SR 70 Simmerly Slough Bridge north of Marysville, the SR 20 Wadsworth Canal Bridge in Sutter County, and the SR 20 Dry Creek Bridge in Yuba County.

SB 1 provides \$5 billion in transportation funding annually split between the state and local agencies. Road projects progress through construction phases more quickly based on the availability of SB 1 funds, including projects that are partially funded by SB 1. Sacramento-based ProjectAttain! joins a cohort of four other partnerships from Florida, Indiana, New Mexico, and Texas that will meet virtually and in person to share ideas, resources, and receive technical assistance.

"We are thrilled to be selected to participate in this national program," said Dr. Jenni Murphy, founder of ProjectAttain! and dean of the College of Continuing Education at Sacramento State. "ProjectAttain! exists to help adults who opted out of their education for one reason or another get back on track with achieving their goals. Our efforts to support systems change in education and workforce development will be bolstered exponentially through our collaboration with CivicLab and by working in collaboration with the other partner programs across the country."

More than 810,000 adults across Northern California's 25 counties make up this initiative's territory, possess some college, vocational training, or high school credits, but have not completed their degree, certificate, or diploma. In the six-county Sacramento region alone, more than 400,000 individuals face the same circumstances. The Public Policy Institute of California predicts the state will have a shortfall of at least 1.5 million individuals with bachelor's degrees by 2030. Additional data indicate the shortfall increases to over 3.3 million when factoring in certificates. ProjectAttain! aims to learn CivicLab's state-of-the-art processes to develop processes that will ultimately dissolve this issue in California's north-state.

"This often overlooked and underinvested population deserves the opportunity to finish what they started," said Evan Schmidt, Valley Vision CEO and ProjectAttain!'s Executive Director.

"ProjectAttain! is here to help those who have paused their education find their way back because we know that employers, economies, and communities benefit when more adults complete their education."

CivicLab's initiative launched in February 2022 with ProjectAttain!'s guiding team, comprised of leaders in workforce and education, attending a two-day Stakeholder Engagement Process Learning Lab at CivicLab's headquarters in Columbus, Indiana. The ProjectAttain! team will return in April 2022 for CivicLab's System Building Lab to improve plans for making lasting change.

"Though many partnerships are deserving of this recognition and support, ProjectAttain! demonstrated they had the relationships, capacity, and capability to make real change," said Dakota Pawlicki, director of Talent Hubs at CivicLab.

ProjectAttain! was selected through a national call for proposals. Each partnership in the cohort includes higher education institutions, nonprofit organizations, public agencies, private-sector partners, and other local stakeholders who work together to improve education and workforce outcomes. To be selected, partnerships were required to submit plans that both improve outcomes for their residents and make lasting changes on higher education and workforce systems during the two-year grant period.

"Rural communities have largely been left out of national initiatives designed to improve postsecondary education and workforce outcomes," said Kirstin Yeado, program officer at Ascendium. "Ascendium is pleased to help build the systems necessary to ensure more learners from low-income backgrounds earn degrees and credentials."

ProjectAttain! began in 2018 as a bold idea that mobilized area leaders to shed light on working-age adults with some college but no degree. ProjectAttain! has grown into a dynamic nonprofit bringing together organizations, talent, and seed funding to serve as a catalyst for equitable social mobility and economic growth for all working-age adults returning to complete a formal educational credential at the diploma, certificate, or degree level. ★

CA Dream Fund to Award Microgrants to Small Businesses
