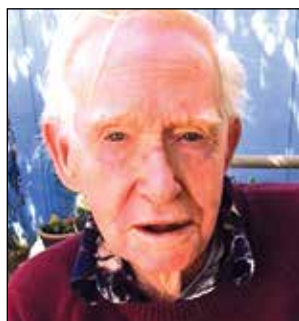

The Teacher Shortage

The decline in substitute teachers challenges school districts

California's teacher shortage means most quality substitute teachers are being hired on full-time. At the same time, there has been a steep decline in applications for substitute teaching credentials since last January.

In short, we're creating a substitute teacher shortage as we try to ensure great teachers are leading our classrooms.

Substitute teachers play a vital role in the success of students and teachers. Students spend, on average, approximately more than 10

days with substitute teachers during a given school year. Not having adequate support during these days has shown a negative impact on students' achievement. Substitute teachers maintain healthy and successful learning environments for students and provide teachers the time and energy they need to build their professional skills to best support students.

Full-time teachers could take advantage of professional learning, networking and collaboration opportunities. Most importantly, teachers felt secure and confident knowing students continued receiving a high-quality education without skipping a beat.

California is investing in teachers this year but there needs to be more focus on substitutes as part of the solution.

To expand the pool of potential substitute teachers, state policymakers need to collaborate and reexamine CalSTRS existing policies that prevent retired teachers, under state and federal law, from doing substitute teaching within their first six months of retirement. Retired teachers have experience leading students through their educational journeys and are familiar with the communities they served.

Distracted Driving: Is It Worth It?

SACRAMENTO REGION, CA (MPG) - Every year, thousands of people are seriously injured or killed statewide in vehicle crashes caused by distracted drivers. To combat this issue, the California Highway Patrol (CHP) received the Adult Distracted Drivers (ADD) XII grant to keep California roads safe through education and enforcement.

"Distracted driving is a serious issue that is 100 percent preventable," said CHP Commissioner Amanda Ray. "We are encouraging drivers to make a conscious choice to not drive distracted. This simple decision can have a tremendous positive impact on the safety of California's roadways."

Drivers who choose to drive distracted exponentially increase the odds of being involved in a vehicle crash. According to data from the CHP's Statewide Integrated Traffic Records System, in 2019 there were nearly 19,000 crashes where driver inattention played a role. Of the 9,371 drivers involved in a fatal or injury distracted driving crash that year, nearly 10 percent cited cell phone use as the source of inattention.

Though there are numerous distractions for a driver, cell phones are the most prevalent. Handheld cell phone use while driving is not only illegal in California, it is an unsafe activity behind the wheel. In California, drivers under the age of 18 are prohibited from using a cell phone while driving for any reason, including hands-free devices.

"Driving safely requires complete attention, so it is best to stay focused on the road. Distraction behind the wheel jeopardizes your safety, your passengers' safety, and the well-being of those around you," Commissioner Ray added.

Funds from the ADD grant will help support the CHP's completion of at least 400 traffic safety presentations statewide and a minimum of 80 distracted driving enforcement operations between October 1, 2021, and September 30, 2022.

Funding for this program is provided by a grant from the California Office of Traffic Safety, through the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration.

The mission of the CHP is to provide the highest level of Safety, Service, and Security. ★

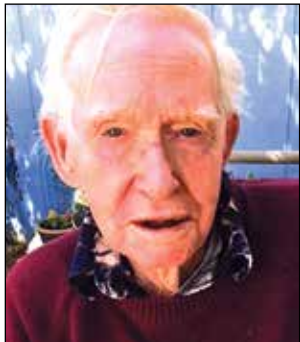

A Kids Life in the Depression

We had built a house on 9th Avenue in Olivehurst. We hauled every bit of the rock from the dredger ponds some six miles distant. The total price of the house that still stands was \$299.00 and I still have the complete run down on it. Then Dad got his call to come to work at Mare Island Navy Shipyard. We had purchased the Olivehurst land from Don Bull. At that time it was called "Bull Tract".

We moved down to Napa so Dad could be close to his job in the shipyard. One of his brothers had told him to leave Marysville and go to work in the Navy yard where you get a decent wage. His brother, Paul was a Navy man who served aboard the Marblehead, USS Minneapolis, USS Lexington and the Macon, which was a Zeppelin that carried planes in it as I recall. His brother Bill was in the Navy having served aboard the USS California since it was built at Mare Island in 1921. Each served 38 years so we were called a Blue water Navy family.

Then we read a book titled "5 Acres and Independence", so we bought five acres outside of Napa and started a farm. Dad always worked

swing shift at Mare Island so it gave him all day to farm his five acres. We lived in a tent and built our own house there I went to Napa High School, which to me was boring as hell. Since there was a war going on and I felt helpless. At 13 years old I tried to get into the Marine Corps.

I had this crazy notion that we're all gonna die sometime and it did not matter when, so I would try next to get a job in a shipyard. Under War-Time rationing I could get a bike to ride to work.

I found a job at the Basalt Rock Company's shipyard. Basalt made rock products like cinder blocks and all that stuff, With the war going pretty good, they went into ship building which seemed unusual and out of their line.

I worked the summer at the Basalt Rock Co. in their shipyard just a few miles south of Napa, CA. I then worked as a ship fitters helper something akin to a carpenter, only we built the frames of ships like keel and ribs or frames. Then the steel plates were welded or riveted to the frames to make a hull and later to the outfitting docks for painting, wiring, plumbing, placement of weaponry and in general finishing the ship ready for launching. As we were at that time building Corvettes and Mine Layers/Sweepers The dry dock was flooded for our ships. I can't remember that the Napa River was wide enough at that point for launching on the water ways.

People came to work the on West coast from all across America. There's

money in war. They built what was called "Shipyard Acres" near Basalt to house the workers. They were flat top houses, not much to them, but people just came out of the depression and many had lived in tents before the war.

I was trained to be a machinist, and I would go to school all day for one week and work in the huge machine shop on any of the three shifts the next week. I ran a large lathe and turned down propeller shafts for the ships. It took most of a shift to make one run down the shaft with your cutting tool. I also ran planers, shapers, milling machines and gear cutters. When we made parts for French ships, it was all in millimeters. The night Port Chicago blew up, it rocked the buildings on base and brought all the guys working on subs topside in a hurry. Everyone thought we were being bombed, and in a matter of seconds the Marines on base were ready and waiting.

If I worked the graveyard shift, we would get off at 8 AM and take one of the Navy buses to San Francisco All the 10 cent movie houses were open by 9 AM so we would go to shows all day, then take the streetcar out to the beach, to Playland or go to the caves at the beach along the Cliff House area. We'd build a fire, maybe roast wieners, find some girls, and before you knew it, it was time to go back to work. Your folks were working war jobs so you were pretty much on your own. Let's face it, there were kids in the military at 16 and even younger those days.

California Farm Bureau Hails Investments in Infrastructure

California Farm Bureau News Release

SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) - California Farm Bureau President Jamie Johansson today applauded members of Congress for passing the Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act, hailing its crucial benefits for California's agricultural communities.

"We applaud Congress for passing this critical bill," Johansson said. "This represents a once-in-a-generation opportunity to make the kind of investment we need to bring our rural infrastructure into the 21st century."

The legislation - H.R. 3684 - provides \$550 billion in new spending on physical infrastructure over the next five years. That includes investing \$110 billion in U.S. roads and bridges, \$65 billion for broadband, \$17.3 billion for ports and inland waterways and more than \$8 billion to repair and invest in water storage and conveyance projects for the drought-impacted West.

The U.S. Chamber of Commerce estimates that California would receive more than \$45 billion in long-term funding.

"This will benefit California's farmers and ranchers, who are counting on improvements to millions of miles of roadways and waterways to get food to America's dinner tables and upgraded ports to ship products to international markets," Johansson said. "Our rural communities can thrive with expanded broadband and feel protected due to investments in forests that reduce wildfire dangers."

"And amid our searing drought, farmers can now look forward to long-needed improvements in water storage and conveyance systems. But we need to make sure those investments result in real infrastructure and are not bogged down in regulatory processes."

The California Farm Bureau works to protect family farms and ranches on behalf of nearly 32,000 members statewide and as part of a nationwide network of nearly 5.6 million Farm Bureau members.

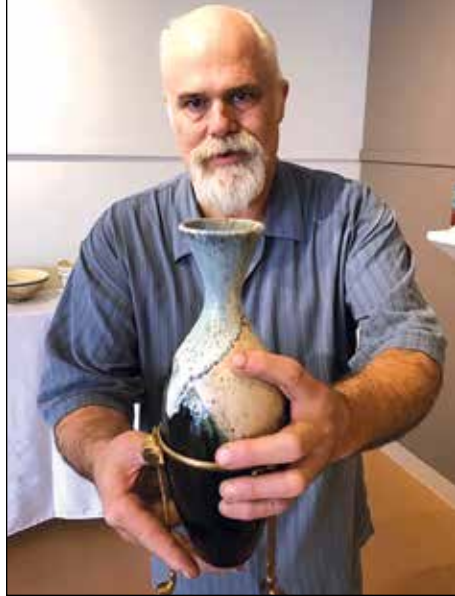

Farmer-to-Farmer Demonstration Events

Sutter County Resource Conservation District Press Release

YUBA CITY, CA (MPG) - The Sutter County Resource Conservation District recently hosted two farmer-to-farmer demonstration events through the Yuba-Sutter Specialty Crop Technical Assistance Hub. The "TA Hub" is part of a larger network of hubs, the California Farm Demonstration Network, a project partnership that includes California Association of Resource Conservation Districts, the California Department of Food and Agriculture; Natural Resources Conservation Service; University of California at Davis; University of California Agriculture and Natural Resources; and the California Farm Bureau Federation. The project was created to provide more hands-on resources to specialty crop farmers seeking guidance for climate resilient practice

implementations on-farm. The events through this hub will allow growers to see first-hand how a variety of conservation practices can be implemented on their farms, with knowledge-sharing and peer support being a primary focus.

On September 22nd, the first event in a series of five events was hosted by Money Dhami of Jovan Farms on his farm. Attendees learned about compost application in an orchard setting, with Sarah Light of UCCE presenting as well. The grower also demonstrated on how to calibrate your compost applicator. Sutter RCD was available at the conclusion of the event to schedule time to meet with growers interested in receiving technical assistance for applying to receive funding to start using compost on their farms.

On October 6th, Paul Hundal of Tudor Trees hosted a second Farmer-to-Farmer demonstration workshop focused on

hedgerows in orchard systems. While attendance dropped due to conflicts with harvesting, the event was still well attended by area growers. Few growers are interested in the addition of hedgerows on their farm due to costs, maintenance, and fewer proven tangible benefits (like yield improvement). Sutter RCD hopes to expand education and knowledge of the benefits of having hedgerows in farm systems through additional events and educational materials. Hundal did an excellent job giving an overview of his hedgerow system and how it integrates into his farm.

Having opportunities for retired teachers to temporarily work to continue helping local schools while solving a statewide shortage of teachers is a short-term solution, but one that is needed this school year.

Having the support of policymakers is only part of the solution. The support and involvement of all our communities is also important to make a difference; this is how you can help; Research requirements to be a substitute teacher and see if this is a good fit for you or someone you might know. This can be your way of giving back to your community and helping our next generation of young scholars; Call your local district and neighborhood schools and find out how you can provide additional support on campuses. If not as a substitute, it's likely volunteers are needed; Attend career

job fairs to learn more about what it takes to be an educator in today's world and how you can support districts who might need higher levels of support.

Recruiting and retaining enough substitute teachers to help solve the shortage won't be an easy task. This is a statewide problem that will be solved locally with the help of many people, people like you. Even if you've never worked in education, take a moment to learn more. What could be an occasional day of work for you could be what provides the consistency students in your town need to learn, grow and succeed.

A Confusing Array of Sports Betting Measures

Memo to California voters: Prepare to be confused because you could be facing four competing ballot measures next year to legalize sports wagering.

Indian tribes that now have a monopoly on casino gambling in California, big on-line sports betting corporations, horse racing tracks, and local poker parlors are jousting for control of what could be countless billions of dollars in bets on sporting events.

Following a 2018 U.S. Supreme Court ruling that made sports betting legal, a number of other states have accepted it, and the major professional sports leagues, which condemned sports betting for decades, have struck deals with major on-line betting operations.

However, years of efforts in the California Legislature to fashion a system acceptable to all stakeholders fell short. The legislative stalemate meant – as it often does in California – a shift to the alternative arena of ballot measures.

Major casino-owning tribes struck first with a measure that would extend their gambling monopoly to sports wagering, qualifying it for the 2022 ballot.

In reaction, three other initiatives are in the works, each of which would benefit its sponsor in some way, but it's not certain that all will make the ballot. Although the election is a year away, the calendar for qualifying measures is fairly advanced and sponsors will have to hustle to make it – which means spending millions of dollars for professional signature-gathering campaigns.

The tribal measure already ticketed for the ballot would require sports wagers to be placed either in existing casinos or in locations owned by the tribes. It also would allow sports wagers at major horse racing tracks – an obvious ploy to dampen potential opposition – but would not allow on-line bets on sports events.

The measure, if passed, would block DraftKings and FanDuel, the two major on-line wagering outfits that yearn to operate in California. But it also includes a sly legal attack on the local poker parlors, which have long feuded with the casino tribes, and the card-rooms struck back with a measure of their own that would allow them to accept sports wagers.

Very quickly, DraftKings and FanDuel pledged millions of dollars for a third measure that would allow them to operate in California and have drawn support from some big city mayors by promising that their proposal would provide money to deal with homelessness.

Finally, three casino-owning tribes, two of which have backed the

original tribal measure, are floating a fourth measure that would allow on-line betting controlled by the tribes. It's a hedge against the DraftKings-FanDuel measure because it assumes that given a choice between wagering on-line or driving to a casino to place a bet, betters would prefer the former.

Millions of dollars are already being spent by the sponsors of the four measures and they've commenced hostilities with dueling public relations campaigns in advance of what promises to be a tsunami of television and on-line advertising to persuade voters to choose one over the others.

It would surprise no one if hundreds of millions of dollars are spent on the campaigns next year, because the millions would be pocket lint compared to the billions of wagering dollars that would flow through the hands of whichever interests can claim legal authority.

That said, it's also possible that the campaigns will be short-circuited by a political deal. Those who sponsor ballot measures can remove them from the ballot if their demands are met by legislation.

Given the years of legislative stalemate on the issue, it's difficult to see the competing interests agreeing to divvy up the pie, but it's not an impossible resolution.

Inflation

Inflation. A word understood by all. Its effect on households, although somewhat tame in recent decades, is now ravaging balance sheets, both on individuals and companies alike. I have warned that inflation was coming multiple times here in Money Matters (11 articles in the last 14 months) but I have never used the "H" word, HYPERinflation.

We all know inflation is rising prices, and there can be many different causes. Monetary inflation is the most insidious and the most common. Monetary inflation is simply an increase in the money supply (printing more dollars). For a conceptual moment of monetary inflation, just think Mexican Peso.

Other types of inflation are demand inflation which is more people want whatever it is that is rising in price for whatever the reason. There is supply side inflation, which is a shortage of something. Regulatory inflation is a tax or levy added by a governing body, making the good or service more expensive.

There are other types of obscure inflation, but whatever causes it, the symptom is a rise in general prices over time.

How much and how fast prices rise has a lot to do with what is called "inflation expectations".

To conceptualize "inflation expectations", just think back to the housing bubble, when people scurried to buy a home in fear of quickly rising prices. During the housing bubble, when prices were rising fast and furiously, the fact that homebuyers knew and expected a fast increase in prices caused a "rush to buy" mindset to lock in a price before they went even higher. This "rush to buy" was a self-fulfilling prophesy. The faster prices rose, the faster people bought. This is a perfect example of inflation expectations.

Although inflation can steadily and seriously erode a family's purchasing power and subsequently cause an increase in the homeless and the poor, "hyperinflation" is devastating to the vast majority of consumers, businesses and to the economy itself.

When hyperinflation occurs, it is always monetary inflation that causes it, and the speed of which prices increase can be astounding. History is rife with examples of hyperinflation (Mexico, Argentina, Venezuela, Germany in the early 1900's and Zimbabwe's hyperinflation starting in 2007. It was estimated at 79.6

billion percent month-on-month and 89.7 sextillion percent year-on-year in mid-November 2008).

Although I have forecasted the coming of significant inflation in my many articles over the past year, I have never mentioned a hyperinflationary threat here in the U.S.

Surprisingly however, more than a few notables have warned that a hyperinflationary threat is brewing in the United States. Twitter CEO Jack Dorsey and well know market analyst Marc Faber (among others) have spelled out the reasons they believe a hyperinflationary event may be coming. They believe massive government bailouts, stimulus and deficit spending will result not only in rising prices, which we are seeing now, but quickly turn into the exponential price explosion that is hyperinflation.

Specifically they point to the 5 trillion or so dollars spent in the last year for CoVid relief, coupled with the massive deficit spending the government has undertaken since the late 1990's. With more spending programs in government debate as we speak, the amount of money entering the economy and that has entered it in recent decades, has already "baked it into the cake", or so they believe.

Hyperinflation is a very serious event. It can quickly force millions into poverty, empty store shelves and destroy businesses. It also is very difficult to eradicate, and the measures to do so also wreak havoc on an economy and its people. In the case of hyperinflation, the cure is almost as bad as the disease.

Measures to deal with hyperinflation are the same for measured inflation, but on a much more drastic scale. The government has to stop spending, social programs must be eliminated or scaled back, interest rates must rise a lot and quickly, and fiscal restraint by the government must be practiced on almost all levels. If all that occurs, the world will change as you know it.

Should hyperinflation indeed be in our future, so will be untold misery for all.

Ochoa Bogh Leads Efforts to Push for Accountability with State's EDD

From the office of Senator Rosilicie Ochoa Bogh

SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) - As Vice Chair of the Senate Labor, Public Employment, and Retirement Committee, Senator Rosilicie Ochoa Bogh (R-Yucaipa) is leading the efforts to call for more accountability of the mismanaged Employment Development Department (EDD).

In a letter to the Chair and Vice Chair of the Joint Legislative Budget Committee, signed by members of the Republican Caucus, Senator Ochoa Bogh is requesting that the committee schedule an oversight hearing on EDD before Veterans Day. The purpose of the meeting is to ensure that

recommendations from the State Auditor and some recently passed bipartisan legislation crafted based on those recommendations are being implemented by the EDD. Glaring failures at EDD date back to 2013 and the Senate Republican Caucus has been tracking those problems here.

Senator Ochoa Bogh released the following statement:

"I am heartbroken as I hear from constituents on a daily basis who have found themselves in desperate need of help from the California Employment Development Department (EDD) through no fault of their own. My Republican colleagues and I know that the legislature has the responsibility to hold state agencies accountable, and the EDD is no exception. ★

Divided Yuba Water Agency Board Makes Grant to Troubled North Yuba Water District

At their Tuesday, November 3, Board meeting, in a divided vote 4 (Fletcher, Vasquez, Bradford, Hasty) to 3 (Mathews, Blaser, Fuhrer), the Yuba Water Agency voted to grant the North Yuba Water District \$104,000. Although wrapped the language of a "study" to give the District plausible deniability, this money is intended to pay consultants who are "seeking recommendations on how to facilitate the potential sale of this water supply within and/or outside of the District's service area...". Selling the water is unpopular with foothill residents. Where is their voice in this matter? The Yuba Water Agency seems only to listen to what the District wants, not the people who the District serves.

The District describes this study in the terms of water conservation. The water being conserved is the conveyance loss which the General Manager's Forbestown Ditch piping project which would eliminate the current losses which the District states is 35%. This amounts to 35% of 3,700 acre-feet or 1295 acre-feet. This is not the water the District wants to sell which is approximately 20,000 acre-feet in Slate Creek which is completely unaffected by the water that would go through the pipe. Slate Creek is a tributary of the North Yuba River which flows into the Bullards Bar Reservoir under control of the Yuba Water Agency.

It is currently estimated to cost \$15 Million to install a ten-mile plastic pipe intended to convey 24 cubic feet per second (CFS). This summer, South Feather Water & Power Authority offered to repair the ditch for \$250K that would convey 30 CFS. With future improvements at a fraction of the cost of piping the ditch, up to 50 CFS could be conveyed.

One has to wonder why North Yuba Water District General Manager Jeff Maupin is so determined to build a pipe costing 60 times what repairing and maintaining an open ditch would for half the flow rate. One also has to wonder why the Yuba Water Agency Board would want to approve a \$104K Grant and previous Grants of hundreds of thousands, to the North Yuba Water District for a piping project that just doesn't pencil out.

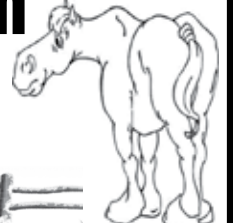

The Global Water Crisis

MARYSVILLE, CA (MPG) - Perhaps the biggest problem of climate change is best illustrated by the continuous warming of some of the coastal waters causing the drastic reduction in natural food sources for all marine life and ultimately causing their death. (Fifteen years ago, I saw several dead baby sea lions on the beach in Santa Cruz, California and according to a fish and game official there, 100's of baby sea lions were dying from starvation due to a 2-3 degree warming in the ocean temperatures.) This is my response to Global Warming and the Global Water Crisis. Why aren't we redirecting water from places with high water flow, from flooding and snow melt, into areas without water due to droughts. Using a system of PVC pipe, concrete, garden hose, steel or any other means, water could be syphoned with ease without any pumps since power is expensive and more sporadic in emergencies. If we wanted to, we could use the U.S. pipelines, a vast network of 190,000 miles of liquid petroleum lines and 2.4 million miles of natural gas lines, to pump water throughout the United States.

Slowing the flow of fresh water into the sea is crucial to keeping the weather warm in cold areas and cool in the hot areas. The world's ocean conveyor system, known as Thermohaline circulation (THC), keeps water flowing around the world and distributes heat and nutrients throughout the oceans. AMOC, the Atlantic meridional overturning circulation, is part of this conveyor system utilizing water density (the differences in water temperature and salt content) to move water throughout the world. The conveyor effect is slowing down because massive amounts of fresh water, due to the glaciers melting and flooding, are going into our oceans, changing our weather patterns and causing sea levels to rise in populated

Moving water from the flooded areas into the areas where crops can grow is so much more fruitful than paying farmers not to plant because they have no water. Divert water into dry lakes and rivers. Make reservoirs, aquifers, and cisterns to hold the water averting the danger of fires and trauma of flooding and providing water to those without it. People are dying from floods and lack of water. Flooding and ice melting are not instantaneous so there is time to set up and direct the flow. At this point, does it matter why it's happening, whether or not greenhouse gas production by humans has caused the meltdown? Stop focusing on whose fault it is, that can be dealt with after we handle the dire consequences. Let's face it, it's happening. Start dealing with it. Handling the effects of the petroleum based global economy (that we allowed) will take years and years to correct. Start with managing the catastrophes we've caused by allowing the powers that be to control us.
