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Gov. Gets Tough on Oil Wells

Gov. Gavin Newsom on Oct. 21 acknowledged the health dangers of fossil fuel development in California as state regulators took a first step towards preventing the development of new oil and gas wells near schools, hospitals, and homes.

The proposal, released by the Department of Conservation's Geologic Energy Management Division, is still a draft – and may yet change as it winds its way through a regulatory process that includes extensive public comment.

“This is about morality. The issue that really unites us here today is around the issue of justice, environmental justice, economic justice

– they go hand in hand,” Newsom said in Wilmington, a community surrounded by oil refineries. “It’s about public health. It’s about safety. It’s about dignity. It’s about the ability to live your life out loud.”

The governor, who in April ordered the phase-out of new oil fracking, has been criticized by environmental advocates for not doing more to reduce fossil fuel pollution and production that disproportionately burdens low-income communities and communities of color. Newsom announced Oct. 25 that he, 15 California lawmakers and top state officials will attend a crucial international conference on climate change early next month.

Newsom directed California’s oil and gas regulators to ramp up public

protections near oil and gas facilities in 2019. The controversial proposal has already received more than 40,000 individual public comments, state officials say. And it comes after a lengthy review by a panel of public health experts.

Still, it’s likely to see significant opposition from the politically powerful oil and gas industry and state building trades lobby, which have successfully blocked legislative attempts to establish health and safety buffer zones around oil and gas facilities.

Catherine Reheis-Boyd, president and CEO of the Western States Petroleum Association, called it “an activist assault on California’s way of life, economy and people” and said it

“could lead to increased costs and reduce the reliability of our energy supply. His decision was not based on what is best for Californians or science.”

Environmental justice advocates, however, said it was “a strong step in the right direction” that nevertheless does not go far enough to rein in an industry that has historically seen limited enforcement.

The draft rule proposes a 3,200-foot public health setback around new oil and gas development, separating new wells from sensitive sites such as homes, hospitals, schools and nursing homes. Nearly 2 million Californians live within 3,200 feet of an existing oil and gas facility, according to Jared Blumenfeld, California’s Environmental Protection Secretary.

Operators of existing oil and gas wells would be required to install emissions detection and vapor capture systems at the wellheads and establish nearby monitoring for pollutants. The rule would bar diesel engines on site, and require reducing other nuisances such as dust and nighttime lighting.

Six years ago, California scientists released a comprehensive review of fracking and other practices in California, warning “many of the constituents used in

and emitted by oil and gas development can damage health, and place disproportionate risks on sensitive populations, including children, pregnant women, the elderly, and those with pre-existing respiratory and cardiovascular conditions.”

California, which cultivates an image of aggressive action to limit climate change, is the seventh largest producer of crude oil in the country.

But while new development has flatlined, companies continue to rework existing wells. Southern California has some of the most extensive urban oil fields in the nation, dating back to the 19th century in some cases.

The scientists evaluated a number of potential control strategies, and determined that eliminating or reducing new wells and properly shutting down existing ones would eliminate “the source of nearly all environmental stressors ... protects local and regional populations.”

The research team was more skeptical of the pollution controls for existing wells, which they said “tend to be disproportionately focused on air pollutant emissions” and “(lack) the important factor of safety provided by a setback when engineering controls fail.”

Alleged Suspect Arrested for Possible School Shooting

LIVE OAK, CA (MPG) - On October 16, 2021 the Sutter County Sheriff’s Office received information regarding a Instagram/Facebook Post that had statements eluding to a possible shooting that was going to occur at Live Oak Middle School on Monday, October 18, 2021. Sutter County Sheriff’s Office in partnership with Sutter County Probation Department began investigating the potential threat. During the investigation, the Sutter County Sheriff’s Office and the Sutter County Probation Department also established a plan to have extra patrol staff and probation officers on scene at both Live Oak Middle School and Live Oak High School on the 18th.

On October 18th, 2021 the Sutter County Sheriff’s Office was able to determine the IP address of the Instagram/Facebook Post which lead to the arrest of a 13-year-old juvenile. The juvenile’s parents were

contacted, cooperated with the Sutter County Sheriff’s Office and Sutter County Probation Department. A consent search was conducted of the juvenile’s residence where the Sutter County Sheriff’s Office located the cell phone used to create the Instagram/Facebook Post. No weapons were located. The juvenile was arrested and will be booked into juvenile hall on numerous charges including terrorist threats.

Sheriff Barnes and the Sutter County Sheriff’s Office wants to thank the community for bringing this to our attention, Live Oak School staff for all their help, and to the Sutter County Probation Department for assisting in the extra patrol coverage including the arrest of the juvenile. Sheriff Barnes would like to thank his staff for working diligently on this incident to not only solve the case which led to the arrest of the alleged suspect but also to ensure that school safety was our priority. ★

Historic Commission Highlights Edward B. Downer for Shaping Yuba County

YUBA COUNTY, CA (MPG) - Edward Downer, born 1869 in Browns Valley probably at the Browns Valley Hotel his mother Mary Anne operated at the time, spent his childhood traveling with his father, James around the gold diggings of the Yuba County foothills. As a teenager Edward attended a high school in Nevada County. With occupations in adulthood ranging from postmaster, telegrapher, real estate investor, and

newspaper founder he found his true calling as a banker. In 1905 he organized the Bank of Pinole and in 1907 founded the Mechanics Bank of

Richmond. He served as president of both banks until his death in 1938. Edward’s involvement in philanthropic and civic activities was vast and varied ranging from Richmond Lodge of Elks, and Athenian Nile Club of Oakland to Pinole Lodge of Masons and Knights Templar of Oakland. He was Mayor of Oakland and a Director of Berkeley Country Club and Richmond Chamber of Commerce at the time of his death. Currently the Edward M. Downer Elementary School of San Pablo continues to honor his legacy. The book, History of Contra Costa County edited by Frederick Hulaniski describes Edward M. Downer as a

“substantial and reliable upbuilder of Contra Costa County.” Little known and largely forgotten in Yuba County, Edward made a major impact on the business world of California in the 1920’s and 30’s. He is buried in Mountain View Cemetery far from the towering oaks and golden fields of his childhood.

The Yuba County Historic Resources Commission highlights historic places and people who helped shape Yuba County. The Commission meets the first Wednesday of each month at 5:30 p.m. at Yuba Sutter Arts building 624 E Street in Marysville. Anyone interested in Yuba County history is invited. Caltrans New Highway Litter Removal Program

- Caltrans announced a new Clean California pilot program that offers Adopt-a-Highway volunteers up to \$250 for picking up highway litter. The Adopt-A-Highway program has been one of the longest-standing and successful government-public partnerships in the state. Since its inception in 1989, more than 120,000 Californians have cleaned and enhanced over 15,000 shoulder-miles of roadside. The new pilot program will augment the overall goals of the Clean California program by providing additional resources to maintain and beautify the state’s roadways.

“Clean California is all about restoring pride in public spaces and making a difference in our communities, and that goes hand in hand with volunteering,” said Caltrans Director Toks Omishakin. “Through Caltrans’ Adopt-a-Highway program, volunteers can

pitch in to clean and beautify our roadsides, and we’re proud to offer an incentive for even more people to help Clean California.”

Part of Governor Gavin Newsom’s California Comeback Plan, Clean California is a sweeping \$1.1 billion, multiyear clean-up effort to remove trash, create thousands of jobs and engage communities to transform roadsides into places of public pride. Since July, Caltrans has collected nearly 2,500 tons of trash and made more than 600 conditional job offers as part of the program.

Adopt-a-Highway volunteers help create cleaner and more beautiful roadsides by removing litter, planting trees and flowers, clearing graffiti, and thinning overgrown vegetation, and also help prevent litter and other pollutants from entering state waterways through stormwater drains. Whether completed by an individual or group, Caltrans will award stipends up to \$250 total per litter collection event for activities such as:

\$250 for each adopted highway segment; \$62.50 for each ramp, or up to \$250 for all four ramps; Up to \$250 for clean-up activities at other locations, such as along bike paths or at park-and-ride facilities.

Caltrans will require volunteers to submit information – including date, location, amount of trash collected, number of volunteers, hours worked and pictures – following eligible clean-up activities to receive a stipend. Adopt-A-Highway participants are limited to one payment a month.

As part of the pilot program, the stipends will be available to Adopt-a-Highway volunteers in Butte, Colusa, El Dorado, Glenn, Imperial, Nevada, Placer, Sacramento, San Diego, Sierra, Sutter, Yolo and Yuba counties. Caltrans expects to expand the program statewide in the coming months.

There is no cost to participate in the Adopt-a-Highway program. In addition to clearing litter, Adopt-a Highway volunteers have maintained 1,500 acres of vegetation and planted 100 acres of trees and 36 acres of wildflowers since 1989. Caltrans installs signs displaying the name of the person, family, organization or business on the segment of adopted highway. ★

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Gavin's Gas Lawn Equipment Ban Hits the Little Guys

Gov. Gavin Newsom's signature on Assembly Bill 1346 makes one wonder whether California politicians ever fully understand – or even want to understand – the ramifications of their decisions.

The measure aims to eliminate the sales of gasoline-powered lawn equipment, such as mowers, string trimmers, leaf blowers and other devices, within a few years.

The purpose, it's said, is to eliminate the exhaust emissions from small engines that create smog and contribute to global warming.

The bill's author, Assemblyman Marc Berman, a Menlo Park Democrat, contends that "operating the best-selling, gas-powered commercial leaf blower for one hour emits air pollutants comparable to driving a 2017 Toyota Camry from Los Angeles to Denver. Smog-forming emissions from small engines will surpass those from passenger vehicles this year."

One could add that the gas-powered lawn machines also emit jarring levels of noise.

Under AB 1346, the California Air Resources Board will decide how and when sales of gas-powered

devices will be prohibited and it could be as early as 2024. A shift to battery-powered machines presumably would occur as older devices need replacement.

Tools powered by rechargeable batteries are convenient, quiet and relatively inexpensive to operate and make perfect sense for the homeowner. Personally, I've used them almost exclusively for the past quarter century and wouldn't have it any other way.

That said, what's practical for personal use is not necessarily so for lawn care professionals, most of them single persons or small crews, and often immigrants. It's estimated that California has at least 50,000 such microbusinesses.

Mowing a lawn once a week is one thing, but pros do it a dozen or more times a day to keep their families housed and fed. They would have to not only buy the equipment but dozens of batteries and chargers and have the facilities, including sufficient electric power supplies, to recharge those batteries.

Backers of the legislation, a coalition of public health and environmental groups, would let the Air Resources Board figure out the details. There's the possibility of a \$30 million fund to help buy new equipment.

The arithmetic, however, indicates that the proposed conversion would cost much more than that, either borne by the lawn services or taxpayers.

Andrew Bray, vice president of the National Association of Landscape Professionals, told the Los Angeles Times that "a

three-person landscaping crew will need to carry 30 to 40 fully charged batteries to power its equipment during a full day's work," adding, "These companies are going to have to completely retrofit their entire workshops to be able to handle this massive change in voltage so they're going to be charged every day."

The larger landscape companies that Bray represents could make the switch and adjust their fees accordingly. But how about the little guys?

A basic array of high-quality, battery-powered lawn tools – a mower, a trimmer and a blower – would cost at least \$1,000. Enough spare batteries and chargers would at least double the initial cost. So at a minimum, with 50,000 lawn services, the total cost would be \$100 million. The real world cost would likely be a quarter-billion dollars or more.

Even were the state willing to cover replacements, how about the infrastructure that small landscapers, operating out of their homes, would need to recharge their batteries? Would we be putting them through a daunting application process? Would the many undocumented landscapers submit the paperwork?

Newsom and the legislators who voted for this bill may think they are doing the right thing, but did they ever consider that they are messing with people's livelihoods and lives? Nothing in the bill indicates they did.

The Economic Damage from Covid

The economic damage from CoVid, coupled with humankind's decision on how to deal with it, continues to wreak havoc on worldwide economies. The shutdowns, in attempt to slow the virus, resulted in a record number of businesses reducing hours or going under completely. Then the massive stimulus programs, in an attempt to mitigate the damage, required trillions in government borrowing, stuffing an already over bloated deficit into an even larger debt load, shackling government balance sheets for decades. This tsunami of government funds then lit the fires of inflation resulting in skyrocketing prices in many of the things we buy.

The fear of contagion and those massive unemployment bonus payments caused people to stay home while businesses scrambled for workers. Many enterprises were unable to fully function due to staffing shortages and some had to shut their doors completely. Then, as unemployment benefits ran out, it appeared many would start going back to work.

It was not be, as the rise of the new Delta variant struck fear in the hearts of many and back home they went. That meant businesses who were on the verge of reopening and starting to ring the cash registers, found their seats empty and their revenue streams drying up once again. Fast forward a few months and vaccination levels continued to climb so businesses again looked toward more paying customers and more available workers. But again, the recovery stalled as business owners then found themselves stymied by, in my opinion, unwarranted and onerous vaccination mandates. These mandates are now causing a record number of workers to quit their jobs.

According to the U.S. Department of Labor, 4.3 million Americans quit their jobs in August, setting a new record. Among the highest level of the voluntary resignations were in the professional and business services, healthcare and social assistance vocations where vaccinations were mandated the heaviest. Meanwhile 10.4 million job openings were recorded at the end of August despite relatively high unemployment figures. Never before have we faced high unemployment levels while the business sector finds it difficult to fill job openings.

Insufficient staffing is causing

worldwide bottlenecks and severe supply shortages. Warehouses sit full of undelivered goods, being unable to find workers to pack and ship product. Transportation companies, also unable to find enough staff, cannot unload enough ships, log enough truck miles or make enough deliveries to satisfy demand. Shutdowns have shuttered microchip factories and a slew of manufacturing plants, making the shortages that much worse.

Many argue the fear of the Delta variant is causing most of the staffing problems, while others maintain vaccine mandates are the major roadblock, confirmed by the record number of voluntary resignations.

Whatever the reason, shortages are putting even more stress on an already untenable situation.

Some argue the entire decision process of the worldwide powers at be have been flawed from the beginning. Shutdowns were claimed to be based on bad science and the unwillingness of many to accept the inevitable and unpreventable damage that a pernicious virus would ultimately cause. Others maintain we didn't do enough, and that CoVid, and our response to it, was only made worse by the non-compliance of many, ignoring the shut downs, not wearing masks and the unwillingness to vaccinate.

Regardless of who is to blame, the record number of resignations is causing undue hardship on businesses and individuals alike. The resulting shortages of goods and services because of a lack of available workers are now exasperated by the record number of resignations, making an already tight labor market even tighter.

Meanwhile, the inflation caused by supply side shortages may spawn what some are calling the perfect storm as it pertains to wreaking severe havoc on the economies of the world. It remains to be seen how many more shocks the economic system can handle, but one thing is for certain. The economic effects from CoVid are far from over.

La Niña Climate Pattern Threatens to Sustain California Drought

A La Niña climate pattern in the Pacific Ocean is threatening sustained drought conditions for next year, even with autumn storms in the forecast. Two years of drought has already depleted California's surface and groundwater supplies, creating acute challenges for farmers and ranchers. And due to depleted snowpack, climatologists say, California needs 140% of average annual precipitation to generate normal water runoff.

Insurance Commissioner to Expand Wildfire Coverage for Agriculture

California Insurance Commissioner Ricardo Lara is taking additional steps to protect farmers and ranchers denied insurance coverage after wildfires. The Legislature in July made farm structures eligible for coverage under the California FAIR Plan. Now Lara says he will expand coverage limits for agriculture. He said, "Many farmers and vintners need more coverage than they can currently get."

Bill Signed to Aid Livestock Rescues During Wildfires

Gov. Gavin Newsom has signed legislation to help farmers and ranchers rescue livestock during wildfires. Assembly Bill 1103 creates a statewide program, called Ag Pass. The new law will allow farmers, ranchers and managerial employees to have access to livestock during wildfires or other natural disasters. The Ag Pass would permit them to pass law-enforcement checkpoints and enter their properties without escort.

USDA Forest Service Offers Aid for Innovative Wood Ventures

The Department of Agriculture is offering grants to help wood products and energy companies support sustainable forest management practices to reduce wildfire risk. The USDA Forest Service is accepting applications for funding from 2022 wood innovation and community wood grant programs. Some \$13 million in funding will support ventures that use forest materials in wood energy production or wood product manufacturing. ★

Biden Administration on Parents' Right to Engage Elected Officials

Grant Helps CHP Focus on Aggressive Driving

SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) - Excessive speed and aggressive driving are a major concern on California freeways. A federally funded grant will continue to help support the California Highway Patrol's (CHP) lifesaving grant campaign targeting dangerous driving behaviors.

The goal of the Regulate Aggressive Driving and Reduce Speed (RADARS) VI grant is to decrease traffic crashes attributed to speed and the number of people killed and injured in these crashes. In federal fiscal year 2018-2019, speed was a factor in approximately 45 percent of all fatal and injury-causing crashes in California. That year, 36,036 speed-related crashes killed 335 people and injured 53,060 others.

"Reckless driving behaviors are a significant threat to all who use California's roadways," said CHP Commissioner Amanda Ray. Since the start of the COVID-19 pandemic in March 2020, CHP has noted a significant increase in incidents of unsafe driving behaviors: motorists exceeding 100 miles per hour on state highways, illicit street racing and sideshow activities, and

speed-related crashes.

Between April 1, 2020, and September 30, 2021, the CHP issued more than 44,500 citations to motorists traveling in excess of 100 MPH. To address the issue, the CHP used federal grant funding to conduct enhanced speed enforcement operations on state routes with a history of speed-related incidents, collaborated with local law enforcement agencies to create street racing and sideshow task forces, and conducted social media campaigns to educate the public about the dangers of speeding, aggressive driving, and street racing. The RADARS grant will allow the CHP to conduct a comparable campaign from October 1, 2021, through September 30, 2022.

Funding for this program was provided by a grant from the California Office of Traffic Safety, through the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration.

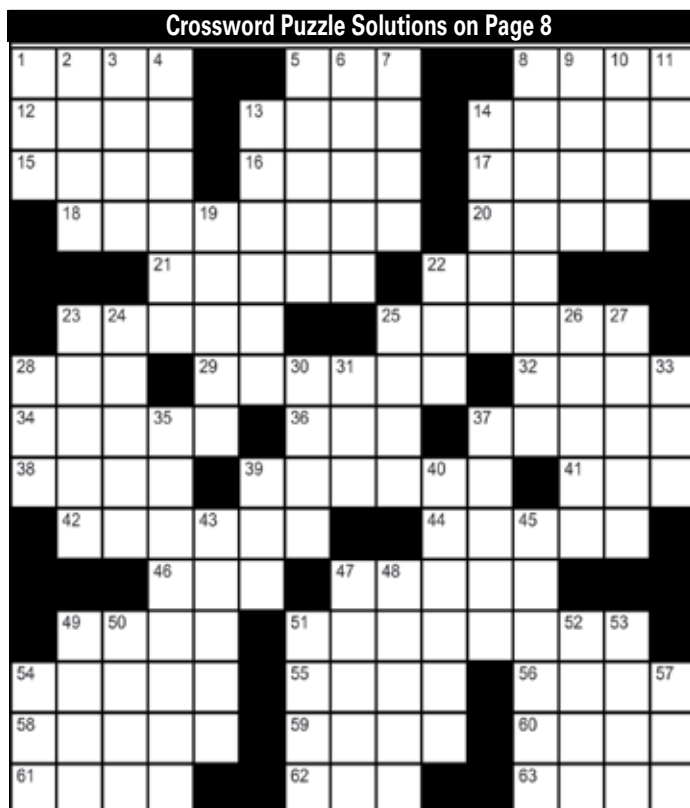

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Citizen Science on the Shores of Clear Lake

LAKE COUNTY, CA (MPG) - When the Lake County Land Trust (LCLT) developed a set of long term priorities for future acquisitions and conservation easements nearly 15 years ago, preservation of the wetlands along the western Clear Lake shoreline from Clear Lake State Park to south Lakeport in what came to be called the Big Valley Wetlands project came out at the top of the list.

Over the years Clear Lake has lost about 80 percent of its natural shoreline to development. The tules, willows, cattails, native shrubs and other riparian vegetation along the edge of the lake provided prime habitat for birds and mammals and the tule marshes supported native and non-native fish, including crucial juvenile rearing grounds for the endangered Clear Lake Hitch. Loss of this key habitat has had significant adverse consequences for numerous species, and loss of the natural filtration provided by wetlands has played a major role in the degradation of water quality.

The largest wetland areas remaining on the lake are Anderson Marsh State Historic Park in the south, Rodman Slough to the north, and the Big Valley Shoreline. Unlike Anderson Marsh and Rodman, most of the Big Valley area is privately held, putting its outstanding natural values at risk. The Land Trust therefore decided to target the lands in this area as its top priority. In the words of LCLT founder and board member Roberta Lyons, “our objective is to preserve and restore these lands either

through fee title purchase or conservation easements with the purpose of improving this vital habitat for animals and providing recreation opportunities for residents and visitors alike.”

The purchase of the 200-acre Wright Ranch near south Lakeport in 2020 was a major step forward in implementing this objective. Besides preserving the land

from future development in perpetuity, goals include restoration of a significant portion of the property to the wetland habitat that existed before berms and dikes were constructed in the 1940s to “reclaim” it for grazing. The plan is to breach the berm in order to create an additional 32 acres of seasonal wetland and to restore the population of Valley Oaks

beyond the remnant grove that exists there now: these huge trees provide habitat for many species of invertebrates, birds and mammals while sequestering immense amounts of carbon.

These major restoration projects will require review under the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) and permits from federal, state, and

county agencies, starting with a wetland delineation and botanical survey to be conducted by biologist Steve Zalusky.

To augment this professional analysis, Land Trust board member Merry Jo Velasquez has also recruited volunteers from among Land Trust members, Lake County Master Gardeners, the California Native Plant

Society and others to survey the property and catalog its populations of both native and non-native plants. Although at first glance the latter seem to predominate by a wide margin, which is not surprising on land that has been heavily grazed for many years, a number of native species also persist on the property.

The first group of volunteers went out to the property on a sunny Saturday in April. After a crash course in the National Geographic Society’s iNaturalist App provided by UC McLaughlin Reserve Co-Managers Paul Aigner and Cathy Koehler, several dozen participants broke up into small groups and fanned out over the land, taking pictures and uploading them to an ever-increasing database. According to Velasquez, “using iNaturalist as our main resource for identification has been an interesting and rewarding experience. I was intrigued by the common name of the flower *Erodium cicutarium*, which is called Stork’s Bill even though this round pink flower looks nothing like the bill of a stork. A month later, after seed pods had formed, I discovered that Stork’s Bill perfectly describes them.”

Eventually the Land Trust hopes to be able to open the property for public use and enjoyment, but before this can happen a baseline management plan must be developed, trails delineated, and signage installed. In the meantime, occasional field trips are being scheduled: to see this property before its transformation begins, contact Roberta Lyons at 707 994 2024 or roberta.lyons@att.net. ★

BCPH Isolation and Quarantine Orders to Control COVID-19

Butte County Public Health News Release

BUTTE COUNTY, CA (MPG) - To help slow the spread of COVID-19 and to protect vulnerable individuals, the Butte County Public Health (BCPH) Officer, Dr. David Canton, has issued local Health Officer Orders mandating that individuals, as specified in the order, isolate or quarantine themselves to prevent the spread of COVID-19 – pursuant to California Health and Safety Code 120175.

The Isolation and Quarantine Orders are effective immediately for Butte County.

These Orders are issued to protect vulnerable members of the public from avoidable risk of serious illness or death resulting from exposure to COVID-19. All individuals who are exposed to someone with COVID-19 or contract COVID-19, regardless of their level of symptoms (none, mild or severe), may place other vulnerable members of the public at significant risk.

What does the Local Public Health Isolation and Quarantine Order require?

Self-Isolation: Individuals who have received a positive antigen or molecular (PCR) lab test for COVID-19, who are symptomatic with 14 days of being in close contact with a person who had or was believed to have had COVID-19 or if a healthcare provider has informed the individual that they are likely to have COVID-19 must self-isolate at their home or another residence.

Carefully review and closely follow

all requirements listed in the California Department of Public Health’s (CDPH) Guidance on Isolation and Quarantine for COVID-19 Contact Tracing. K-12 students are required to follow the CDPH COVID-19 Public Health Guidance for K-12 Schools in California.

Notify their Close Contacts that they need to self-quarantine, and then refer these individuals to the CDPH Self-Quarantine Instructions for Individuals Exposed to COVID-19 and the Butte County Quarantine Order.

Self-Quarantine: Applies to close contacts within six (6) feet of an infected person for a cumulative total of fifteen (15) minutes or more over a 24-hour period to a person with COVID-19 during their infectious period, which begins 48 hours before symptoms began (or, in the absence of symptoms, 48 hours prior to the date of the first positive test).

Individuals who are defined as close contacts of a person with COVID-19 must quarantine themselves and follow the CDPH Guidance on Isolation and Quarantine for COVID-19 Contact Tracing.

Fully vaccinated persons are not obligated to comply with quarantine requirements if they do not show signs or symptoms. Fully vaccinated persons are recommended to be tested 3-5 days after exposure and wear a mask in public indoor settings for 14 days after exposure. These individuals may refer to the CDPH Recommendations for Fully Vaccinated People. ★
