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Nurse Shortage at Crisis Point

In the past month, four emergency room nurses – exhausted by the onslaught of patients and emotional turmoil wrought by COVID-19 – have quit at the Eureka hospital where Matt Miele works.

Miele, who has been a trauma nurse for four years, is actively looking for a less stressful nursing position and has colleagues who are, too.

“On the bad days, I think ‘What am I doing and is this what I want to be doing?’” Miele said. “It’s shifting me to my core.”

Around California – and the nation

– nurses are trading in high-pressure jobs for a career change, early retirement or less demanding assignments, leading to staffing shortages in many hospitals.

Hospitals are struggling to comply with the state’s nurse staffing requirements as pandemic-induced burnout has exacerbated an already chronic nursing shortage nationwide.

But burnout isn’t the only thing compounding California’s nursing shortage: The state’s new vaccine mandate for health care workers is already causing headaches for understaffed hospitals before it is even implemented. Some traveling nurses – who are in high demand nationwide

– are turning down California assignments because they don’t want to get vaccinated.

Hospitals say they are reaching a crisis point, straining under the dual forces of more people seeking routine care and surging COVID-19 hospitalizations driven by the Delta variant.

Hospitals, some with more COVID-19 patients now than during the winter surge, say they are confronting unprecedented staffing shortages, particularly among nurses.

The staffing shortage is so severe that Scripps Health is considering temporarily consolidating some of its outpatient centers. Scripps, which has

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Yuba City to Consider District-Based City Council Elections

YUBA CITY, CA (MPG) - At its September 7 meeting, the Yuba City City Council will consider a proposed schedule of public meetings that would start the process to transition the city from at-large elections to by-district elections. Members of the public will be encouraged to attend the meetings to learn more about elections and voter rights laws and share their thoughts on how the districts should be divided.

Since the City of Yuba City was incorporated in 1908, the city has elected its Councilmembers through an at-large election system, where registered voters elect all five City Councilmembers regardless of where the candidate, or the voter, reside in the city. Under by-district elections, the city will be divided into five districts, and each voter will vote in their district of residence for one candidate who resides in their district. City Council elections would continue to occur every two years, with either two or three seats elected to four-year terms.

All California county board of supervisors are already elected by district. The transition to district elections for cities is now becoming increasingly common in California. Regionally, the cities of Chico, Davis, Citrus Heights, Elk Grove, and Roseville have all recently transitioned to district elections. One of the reasons for these transitions is that district elections are consistent with the California Voting Rights Act, which encourages district elections for communities with a significant population of minority groups. Additionally, if certain jurisdictions do not transition themselves, they could be compelled to do so by a judge through a process that could potentially restrict community input. To avoid this, and despite COVID-related delays of the 2020 Federal Census, City staff have been preparing the initial groundwork to allow the City to move to elections by districts to allow greater community participation.

While population equality and contiguity will be the most important factors when creating the districts, they will be drawn to ensure as best as possible that neighborhoods and communities with shared features will

SUTTER COUNTY, CA (MPG) - Caltrans is hosting in-person and virtual community open houses in September to seek public comments about a proposed long-term safety project on State Highway 99 in the Lomo Crossing area between Yuba City and Live Oak.

The outdoor, in-person event will be Thursday, September 9 from 6 p.m. to 7:30 p.m. at the Lomo Cold Storage, 6005 Highway 99 in Live Oak.

Community members can view displays with project alternatives and review maps and other materials. Caltrans staff members will be available to answer questions and receive comments from the public. The in-person event is subject to change due to COVID-19 restrictions for public gatherings.

The following week, Caltrans will conduct an online virtual open house via Cisco WebEx from 6 p.m. to 7 p.m. on Tuesday, September 14. During the presentation, community members will learn about the project alternatives, view displays and maps and learn where they can submit comments. Caltrans staff members will be available to answer questions and receive comments from the public.

Waterfowl Hunting Seasons Opening Soon

SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) - As California’s 2021-22 waterfowl hunting season approaches, hunters may find that wildlife areas have limited space, particularly early in the season.

Most years, quality public hunting access can be found on more than two dozen national wildlife refuges and wildlife areas administered by the California Department of Fish and Wildlife (CDFW). With this year’s drought, some areas will have significantly reduced amounts of water available, while others will have normal to near-normal water conditions. As a result, some wildlife areas and refuges may be closed, while others may open later in the season or have a reduced hunter quota.

Beginning Sept. 1, hunters can submit reservation applications for state-operated

waterfowl hunting areas. CDFW will attempt to offer reservation applications only for areas that will be open for hunting. However, last-minute closures may occur due to uncertain water availability, and refunds cannot be issued for applications submitted to areas that close due to a lack of water.

Updates about wildlife area and refuge closures will be posted on CDFW’s Closures web page. For detailed information about hunter quotas, please contact the wildlife area or refuge you wish to hunt.

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**CHEW ON THIS:
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Despite deceptive industry marketing, smokeless tobacco is not a safe alternative to smoking and vaping. The tobacco industry knows that people are catching on to the health risks of smoking so they are heavily advertising smokeless tobacco — which refers to loose leaf or ground tobacco leaves also known as chew or snuff — especially in rural communities.

The tobacco industry dangerously promotes smokeless tobacco as an alternative where smoking is not allowed, even though it carries the same dangers and risks as vaping and cigarettes.

Tobacco companies understand that rural communities value self-reliance and independence, so they package and advertise their products to depict images of headstrong cowboys, hunters and racecar drivers to make it seem like smokeless tobacco is part of the rural lifestyle. On average, the tobacco industry spends more than \$1 million dollars an hour marketing their products.

“Tobacco companies have always aggressively marketed to rural communities, and it is up to us to enact the change needed to regulate the tobacco companies and protect our youth and our community,” said Shelly Brantley, Project Director of RISE (Rural Initiatives Strengthening Equity), the Statewide Rural Coordinating Center. “We cannot allow Big Tobacco to target our communities and push harmful products on us. Tobacco doesn’t define our community — we do. Use of smokeless tobacco products only puts our community at risk of negative health outcomes.”

In the 2019-20 California Student Tobacco Survey, students at rural and town schools had rates of smokeless tobacco use that more than doubled those of students in city or suburban schools.

Big Tobacco’s use of kid-friendly flavors has made smokeless tobacco products even more popular, especially among young people. Internal company documents show that the U.S. Smokeless Tobacco Company has strategically used flavors to addict new users, with advertisements for smokeless tobacco products often featuring flavors as a selling point. It’s no surprise that more than half of 12 to 17-year-olds who had ever used smokeless tobacco used flavored smokeless tobacco the first time they tried the product, according to one survey.

New flavored oral tobacco products like Zyn, On!, and Velo have also hit the market, contributing to increased smokeless

tobacco and nicotine consumption, particularly among youth. Snus — a type of smokeless tobacco pouch that doesn’t need to be spit when consumed — comes in flavors, like menthol. A recent survey reported that more than 80% of youth ages 12 to 17 who had ever used snus indicated that the first type of the product they used was flavored. Unlike snus, however, oral nicotine pouches and lozenges do not contain leaf tobacco, but are still derived from tobacco and contain nicotine, which is dangerous in any form.

High rates of smokeless tobacco use among young people are particularly dangerous, since a lifetime of nicotine addiction and disproportionate health outcomes can often result. A study in the American Journal of Preventive Medicine stated that “snuff use may be a gateway form of nicotine dosing among males in the United States that may lead to subsequent cigarette smoking.”

The truth is that NO type of tobacco is safe. We can’t let Big Tobacco continue exploiting our communities by pretending that tobacco is part of our culture. Our kids — and all of us — deserve better.

CDFW Lands to Close Temporarily Due to Fire Conditions

SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) - The USDA Forest Service has announced the temporary closure of nine national forests in northern California effective Sunday, Aug. 22 at 11:59 p.m. through Monday, Sept. 6 at 11:59 p.m. due to extreme fire conditions. A 10th forest, the El Dorado National Forest, was closed earlier last week due to wildfire.

In response, the California Department of Fish and Wildlife (CDFW) will close seven of its properties that lie within or immediately adjacent to USDA Forest Service boundaries during this same period to support emergency response routes, firefighting efforts and protect public safety.

“We understand these closures – even temporary – will significantly impact our hunters, especially with archery deer seasons opening this weekend in many parts of northern California,” said CDFW Director Charlton H. Bonham. “We have a public safety emergency and an environmental crisis on our hands with these wildfires. We thank hunters, anglers and others who cherish these public lands for respecting these closures and allowing firefighters and public safety personnel to secure these areas and help protect our wild places and our rural communities.”

Hunters are urged to check directly with the appropriate land agency about any wildfire-related closures before heading out on hunting trips.

Unfortunately, resident deer tag fees are non-refundable regardless of land closures due to fire, weather or other natural disasters per the California Code of Regulations, Title 14, Section 708.2(b). Refunds may be issued to nonresident tag holders (subject to specific requirements) and for select elk, pronghorn antelope and bighorn sheep tags.

Bonham said CDFW is evaluating options to petition the California Fish and Game Commission to refund deer tag fees – and other big game tag fees – for those areas closed due to wildfire conditions. Land closures announced this week are temporary. California’s deer seasons are just beginning to open. Many of California’s general seasons are still a month or more away from opening.

“Our hope, certainly, is that deer hunters will have the opportunity to hunt at some point and participate in part or all of their favorite seasons,” Bonham said. “But we also are prepared to support our deer, elk, pronghorn and sheep hunters who have done so much for conservation over the years.”

Premium deer tags awarded using a first choice in California’s Big Game Drawing, elk tags, pronghorn antelope tags, and bighorn sheep tags may be returned to CDFW with a request to have preference points reinstated and one preference point awarded for the species for the current hunt year. To be considered for preference point reinstatement, the

tag must be returned (post-marked) prior to the first date the tag is valid for hunting.

Premium deer tags cannot be exchanged, but any hunter that has only been issued one deer tag during the hunting license year may purchase one additional deer tag from the list of available deer tags (PDF).

A complete list of tag return deadlines along with additional information on tag returns, exchanges and preference point eligibility requirements can be found on CDFW’s Hunting Licenses and Tags webpage.

PG&E Has Installed 33 New Weather Stations in the North Valley

CHICO, CA (MPG) - With an ever-expanding network of weather stations across its service area, Pacific Gas and Electric Company (PG&E) is positioned to refine the scope of Public Safety Power Shutoff (PSPS) events and prepare for increasingly common severe weather events.

More than 200 new weather stations have been installed this year alone, 33 of those are in North Valley counties. PG&E plans to have a total of 1,300 by the end of 2021. This will equip the company with one weather station for every 20-line miles of electric distribution circuits within Tier 2 and Tier 3 High Fire-Threat Districts, as designated by the California Public Utilities Commission.

Data captured by the weather stations such as temperature, wind speed and humidity levels help PG&E meteorologists evaluate where severe weather may be headed and inform utility operational planning. During a PSPS, PG&E turns off specific power lines, based on severe weather conditions, for public safety. This is to prevent tree branches and other debris from contacting energized power lines.

“We know that losing power disrupts lives, especially for our customers with medical needs. That is why we are finding ways to reduce the impact of PSPS events without compromising safety. The sole focus of a PSPS is to keep our customers safe,” said Mark Quinlan, Vice President of PSPS Operations and Execution.

Since 2018, PG&E has installed more than 1,200 weather stations mostly across high fire-threat areas in Northern and Central California. There is a total of at least 33 weather stations in North Valley, with the newest ones installed in locations in the following counties:

Butte: 6 New, 51 total; Colusa: 1 new, 12 total; Glenn: 5 new, 11 total; Lassen, 8 total; Plumas, 9 total; Shasta: 7 new, 69 total;

Tehama: 8 new, 73 total; Trinity: 3 new, 7 total; Yuba: 3 new, 16 total

“Observations from the weather stations contribute to the improvement of our predictive capabilities for PSPS events. We now have a historical database of these observations, many in remote areas where we have never had this level of detailed data before, and it is now used to help fine-tune our models to better predict when critical fire weather conditions may occur,” said Ashley Helmetag, Senior PG&E Meteorologist. “As the model is improved, the forecast becomes more accurate, allowing meteorologists to limit the scope of PSPS events to the areas where the riskiest fire weather conditions are expected, and to do so with higher confidence.”

These new weather stations across PG&E’s service territory are now sending hyperlocal data not only to PG&E meteorologists, but also to analysts and experts in PG&E’s Wildfire Safety Operations Center (WSOC). The WSOC is the hub where PG&E detects, evaluates, monitors, and responds to wildfire threats across its service area. The information from these stations is also viewable by the public at pge.com/weather and is combined with other weather station information and shared with partners through MesoWest.

Weather stations are just one part of PG&E’s Community Wildfire Safety Program. The program also includes the installation of hundreds of sectionalizing devices to break the grid into smaller pieces and hardening hundreds of miles of lines, poles, and other infrastructure to reduce wildfire risk and lessen the effects of PSPS events on customers.

Coupled with PG&E’s growing network of weather data, temporary generation and microgrids, these tools and technologies helped keep the lights on for hundreds of thousands of customers during the PSPS events in 2020, as compared to those events in 2019. ★

Two Arrested on Homicide Investigation of 25-year-old

YUBA COUNTY, CA (MPG) - On August 19, 2021, Yuba County Detectives located and arrested one suspect on a Ramey Warrant stemming from the August 16, 2021 shooting incident at Johnson Park in Olivehurst. 19-year-old Brayden Martinez of Linda, Calif. was booked into the Yuba County Jail for 32PC/Accessory, 187PC/Murder, and felony drug sale charges.

On Friday, August 20, 2021, Yuba County Detectives with the assistance of Marysville Police and Yuba City Police arrested a second suspect on a Ramey Warrant for 187PC/Murder. 21-year-old Asael Prado Villalobos of Olivehurst was booked into the Yuba County Jail for 187PC/Murder.

The homicide victim was identified as Ondrai White, age 25, of Sacramento. The investigation remains active and ongoing.

8/18/2021: OLIVEHURST, CA. – Yuba County Sheriff Detectives are investigating a homicide that occurred at approximately 10:15 p.m. on 8/16/2021 on Copper Leaf Court at Johnson Park. A single victim with a gunshot wound was located and pronounced dead at the scene. At this time, there is no suspect in custody.

This is an active and ongoing investigation. We will update as more information becomes available. ★

Mail Theft Call Leads to Four Arrested

SUTTER COUNTY, CA (MPG) - On August 18, 2021 at approximately 6:48 pm, the Sutter County Sheriff’s Office received a call regarding mail theft in the 1600 block of Barry Road. Sutter County Sheriff’s deputies arrived on scene and viewed video surveillance footage from the reporting party/victim. Upon viewing the video surveillance footage, deputies recognized the suspect vehicle from prior incidents.

The SCSO deputies recalled Julie Keovilayphone was associated with the vehicle recognized. SCSO deputies responded to Keovilayphone’s residence and located the vehicle that was observed in the video surveillance footage. SCSO deputies contacted Keovilayphone who claimed ownership of the vehicle of interests. Keovilayphone gave consent to search the vehicle which led to the

location of a check for \$35,654.00 which was later determined to be stolen.

The SCSO deputies contacted SCSO detectives who came out to assist with the investigation. A search warrant was written for Keovilayphone’s residence which led to the location of more stolen checks, stolen mail, evidence of identity theft, and other stolen property.

The investigation is still on going, but the evidence located in the original call for service and the warrant served led to the arrest of the following: Julie Keovilayphone, 32 years of age from Yuba City, Sierra Valenzuela, 33 years of age from Yuba City , Vicki Keovilayphone, 39 years of age from Yuba City and Delilah McCall, 45 years of age from Yuba City.

remain together. Some of the community features to consider will be school attendance areas; natural dividing lines such as major roads and highways; areas around parks and other neighborhood landmarks; shared demographic characteristics such as income, education and languages spoken at home; and planning for future growth.

“Yuba City is growing. Moving to district elections is a proactive measure we can take to help ensure all areas of Yuba City are represented on the council,” said Yuba City Mayor Marc Boomgaarden. “We want to encourage more folks to participate in local politics. If you are interested in getting involved, this is the time.”

If passed by the council at the September 7 meeting,

Yuba City will have at least two public hearings to provide initial input as to how the districting maps should be drawn, and then at least two more public hearings for the community to provide input on the draft map(s). five hospitals and 28 outpatient clinics in the San Diego area, told CalMatters that it is serving nearly 20% more patients on average than before the pandemic. At the same time, job openings at the hospitals have increased 57% since August 2019. For nursing jobs alone, vacancies have increased 96%.

Emotional and physical exhaustion is the primary reason nurses are fleeing the bedside, experts say. It has been a long and brutal 18 months.

Hospital administrators worry that the state’s vaccine mandate for health care workers, which goes into effect Sept. 30, could drive some of their workers out. Already, some report resistance among employees.

Administrators are particularly concerned about low vaccination rates among support staff like janitors and food service workers. However, some nurses also are wary of the COVID-19 vaccine. Some nurses with large social media followings have participated in protests in Southern California, arguing that the mandates violate their personal freedom.

The vaccine order allows only for narrow religious and medical exemptions. Until Sept. 30, unvaccinated workers must undergo weekly COVID-19 testing. The state nursing association issued a statement saying “all eligible people should be vaccinated.”

While California was first in the nation to impose a vaccine mandate for health care workers, other states have since joined in, but their mandates aren’t as broad.

Cole of Scripps Health said the state’s testing requirement, imposed this week, already has discouraged some out-of-state, traveling nurses from taking temporary jobs at California hospitals.

“If they don’t want to get vaccinated, they are turning down California assignments,” he said.

To contend with local shortages, hospitals are increasingly turning to hiring temporary, traveling nurses from around the country.

During the past 18 months, Janet Stovall, a traveling ICU nurse for more than 20 years, has worked in hospitals in the Imperial Valley town of Brawley, Visalia, Wichita, Kan., and now Folsom and Alameda, and all of them have been running on “very lean staffing.”

“Last night there were ambulances waiting just to get into the ER to be evaluated... They pulled a nurse from the ICU to help with the ER, and we worked without a charge nurse or a

break nurse,” Stovall said.

Stovall said traveling nurses like her are in high demand. At one hospital, “we hadn’t even finished orientation when the VP of patient services called and said ‘You need to leave right now, test out of orientation, and be at work by 11 p.m.’,” Stovall said. “That’s how desperate they are.

Nationwide more than 52,000 temporary health care jobs are posted, and Aya is only able to fill about 3,000 per week, she said.

To entice nurses to come to California, the state Department of Public Health agreed to pay up to \$145 per hour for Aya Health’s ICU nurses and more if a facility had a “critical need.” Stovall, who works for Aya, said between October and December 2020, she was paid \$10,000 per week with an additional \$2,000 if she picked up an extra shift.

The money is pulling full-time staff nurses into traveling positions, further aggravating the staffing shortage nationwide. Stovall, who is based in North Carolina, said her sister-in-law took a week’s vacation from a full-time nursing gig to pick up an \$8,000 traveling contract. She also convinced a longtime friend, Candace Brim, to leave her staff position and travel during the height of the pandemic in December.

Traveling has been key to helping them avoid burnout, Brim and Stovall said. It’s rewarding to be able to come in and “save the situation” at hospitals in dire need of extra hands, Brim said, and the money is good enough that they can afford to take weeks off at a time after difficult assignments. Their contracts in Folsom and Alameda last until Thanksgiving.

Time off has helped them cope with the somber realities of treating COVID-19 patients in the ICU: In the past seven months, every COVID patient Brim and Stovall treated has died.

“We took care of about 65 COVID patients in Brawley and not a single one made it,” Stovall said. “We coded one every night.

“Before (COVID-19), you could make a difference in someone’s life. Now I will do anything for a patient, and it does not make a difference. ...Three days later they don’t make it.”

Will so many nurses burn out and leave the profession that California will face long-term shortages? It’s possible. Pre-pandemic, one projection said California will be short more than 44,000 nurses by 2030, while other studies suggested that there will be an adequate supply of new graduates.” ★

Larry Elder’s Critics may be Helping Him Succeed

“The enemy of my enemy is my friend” is an ancient proverb thought to date from a 4th century BC Sanskrit writing on statecraft.

The most graphic example of its application occurred in World War II, when Soviet Russia, which had a “nonaggression” pact with Nazi Germany, was suddenly attacked by its erstwhile ally.

Overnight, the Soviet Union’s dictator, Joseph Stalin, was transformed from enemy to a partner of the U.S. and Great Britain in their war against Germany and its dictator, Adolf Hitler. Militarily, it was the best thing that could have happened for the Western allies because had it not happened, Hitler might easily have triumphed.

Something like that is happening in California as Gov. Gavin Newsom fights off a campaign to oust him from office via a September 14 recall election.

With voting underway, Newsom’s campaign has shifted from defending his gubernatorial record to attacking the leading Republican candidate to succeed him, talk show host

Larry Elder. Pro-Newsom editorialists and the second place Republican, former San Diego Mayor Kevin Faulconer, have joined Newsom’s assault on Elder.

The overall theme of the attacks is that Elder’s extreme right-wing views make him unacceptable as an officeholder, and the drumbeat quickened last week when Elder’s former girlfriend accused him of being verbally abusive and even, at one point, waving a gun at her.

“I, for one brief moment, believed that he intended to shoot me. I was in fear for my life,” Alexandra Datig said, adding: “At the same time, I’m also very fearless and, having grown up around guns, I didn’t take it seriously.”

Elder, of course, denied the gun allegation, but immediately, his critics turned from saying he shouldn’t be governor to demanding that he drop out of the contest.

The Sacramento Bee declared that Elder’s “misogynistic attitudes toward women and the damning allegations revealed this week about how he treated his ex-fiancee Alexandra Datig are disqualifying, and make him wholly unfit to be California governor. Elder must drop out of the race immediately.”

“Elder’s backwards positions harm women’s rights and the livelihoods of California families,” Faulconer said in a late Friday afternoon statement. “Elder’s lack of judgement and character flaws threaten the success and credibility of this historic recall

movement — Californians will not vote to recall one dysfunctional governor if it means replacing him with another.”

So what effect will this barrage of criticism from Newsom, Faulconer and pro-Newsom media have on Elder and the recall drive?

Newsom obviously hopes that focusing on Elder and the supposedly terrible fate that would befall California should he become governor will not only change the subject but motivate Democrats to vote against the recall. Democratic voter apathy is, polls indicate, the prime reason Newsom is in danger of losing his office.

However, the focus on Elder could also make it more likely that he would, in fact, become governor should the recall succeed. Voters who favor the recall could easily conclude that if Newsom, the media and Faulconer are ganging up on Elder, perhaps he’s just the man to lead the revolt against the political status quo.

That’s what happened in 2016 when Donald Trump emerged from the Republican pack to become the GOP’s presidential nominee. The more Trump was attacked for his many personal shortcomings, the more attractive he became to angry Republican voters. The rest, as they say, is history.

Elder may be, as his critics say, unfit to be governor. However, like Trump, he probably loves the attention because his enemies are making him more friends.

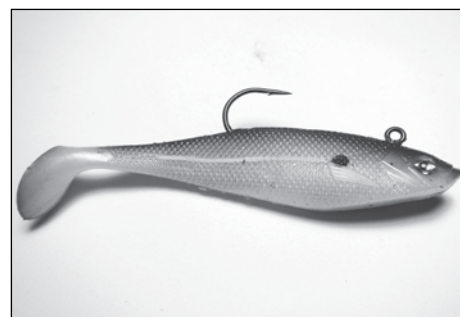

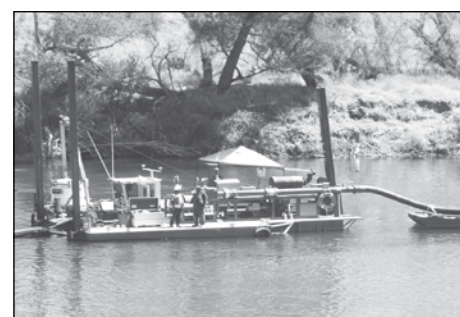

This Month In Your Garden

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It is already September and that means we are on the path to fall which usually brings with it some cooling temperatures and definitely shorter days. The temperatures lately are feeling very nice.

There are definitely things to be done in the garden. Watering and keeping weeds at bay seems to be ever present by this time of the year, but will begin to slack off soon. Be sure to keep your mulch around your plants to conserve the water. It will soon be time for a winter vegetable garden so start planning that. It does mean removing the summer garden which is usually still doing well now so maybe you have another spot for the winter garden. If not start with removing the plants that are obviously showing signs of slowing production and go from there – tomatoes are usually what we have to give up last. Where ever the new winter garden is to go, the soil needs to be worked up and readied. The winter veggies will begin to be available soon. They will do better if they are planted in cooler weather than we have been experiencing this summer. We get requests for winter vegetables in the heat of August, but we usually wait until the second week of September to offer them.

September is an important month for fertilizing trees and shrubs. They store nutrients within the trunks and limbs to carry them through the winter, and help them leaf out, bloom and set fruit in the coming spring season. This has to be done while there are still healthy green and working leaves on them. There is no specific time for the leaves to start showing the fall color change, but we all know it is in fall. Keep an eye on them and don't miss the opportunity to get the fertilizing done. It will benefit your shrubs and trees. As usual, there are exceptions – any plant that has already set buds for spring bloom, such as rhododendrons and camellias should not be fertilized now, do them soon after they finish their bloom cycle. The reason being, is that they will likely respond to the fertilizer and start putting on new growth which can push the buds off the plant. Just wait until they have finished their bloom cycle to fertilize them. That is when they normally start putting on new growth and the fertilizer is very beneficial for that process.

Since fall begins in September, it is a month that allows us to do things that would have been difficult in the heat of the summer. Cool nights and only warm, not hot, days make it a great time. If you are planning on planting any grass, this month or next are ideal times for it. With the cooler temperatures, it requires less water to get it established and it is much easier to keep the newly emerging grass damp enough so that it doesn't perish. It is also a good time to plant ground covers from flats. They will get established since it is so much easier to keep the area damp, allowing roots and runners to find their way and

multiply. It is a good time to dig up some perennials and divide them to enlarge a bed, create a new bed, or share them with other gardeners. This is routine for many garden clubs at this time of the year. And this is the best time of year for planting any trees or large shrubs that you might want to plant this fall.

Fall is the best time for planting trees and shrubs. They will slowly develop roots during the winter, giving them an advantage over the same thing planted next spring. A fall planted tree will be well established and require less demanding watering through the spring and next summer. September and October are the best months for tree planting, so start thinking about the trees you would consider. Pick out your tree or plant, take it home in the container, and ideally plant it now. If you need to wait, put it in a place that can't be missed and water it well daily, until you are able to get it planted. Once planted, they should be kept moist. Most newly planted trees need 10 to 15 gallons of water a week during September and 10 gallons per week or so during October. Water newly planted trees and shrubs 2 to 3 times a week, giving the total of about 10 to 15 gallons of water in the week.

Fall planted bulbs should be available soon. If you have a gopher problem, choose daffodils and narcissus, they will not bother them except to sometimes move them around a bit. Fall is also the time to plant wildflower seeds. When shopping for them, check the container carefully. Sometimes bargain wildflower mixes contain a large percentage of grass seed. We recommend planting wildflower seeds right before a good rain when you know that more rain will be coming. I usually wait until October or November depending on what the weather is doing. Because many of the wildflower seeds are very small it is a good idea to mix them with some sand or something else to give them bulk so that they can be spread more evenly over a larger area.

Using pre-emergent now will help to reduce the growth of winter weeds, keeping in mind that it will keep any good seeds you may have planted from sprouting as well, so be careful with it. Remember that all those leaves that will be falling soon make great compost. If you have a compost pile add them. If you don't, you might want to find space to start one – it is great to have it always available, especially in the summer. Enjoy the coming seasonal changes.

Alternative Investments

Alternative investments are investments which usually are not listed on the Wall Street Journal, Investor Business Daily or other public media outlets. I also refer to them as "privates."

I have seen my share of private (alternative) investments, and although not all of them bad, most I wouldn't touch with a ten foot pole. My opinion of course.

An alternative investment is one that an advisor or perhaps a friend or acquaintance may bring to an investor and suggest they invest funds.

Privates run the gamut from a second mortgage, to a private bond or note, or perhaps investing into a company portfolio with some promise of return or gain. Energy or real estate projects are common as well. Privates can also fund projects to build such things as resorts, condominium complexes or other entities, or just center around buying a mortgage contract where the investor is essentially the bank to the borrower, and secured by future profits. Whatever the underlying proposal, an above average return on investment is offered which is usually more than an investor could get in the regular market. Hence the allure.

The key here is the offering is privately held and purchased, and its price is not listed anywhere on a public media platform like a newspaper or brokerage house stock screener.

I have always voiced my opposition to privates, as I have seen too many people burned on a variety of these offerings.

The contracts can vary and the fine print and disclaimers can be many.

The contracts usually suggest a date to maturity, and a suggested rate of return, but the disclaimers and fine print may give all sort of "outs" to the offering entity. The contracts that I have seen certainly have addressed the owner's interests over the investors, at least in my experience.

What can go wrong is obviously the issue. Some of the problems I have seen are plummeting prices in energy holdings, a real estate crash in property portfolios,

defaults on the mortgages or private bonds, or an overall stock market crash or interest rate spike, which stresses out issuing company balance sheets. Dividends or payments also might stop or decrease, or the maturity date may be postponed (all legally of course due to the fine print).

The ramifications to the investor then revert back to all those disclaimers and fine print he or she may not have bothered to read.

The question I always ask is if market rates are say 2% to borrow money from a traditional bank or lending institution, why is the borrower paying you a much higher rate?

What you get paid also may not be counting the "take" for the selling agent which can be healthy. That means the borrower is paying even more than you're getting.

Usually any entity paying above market rates are doing so because they can't get money in the regular lending market. Not a good sign.

In other words, the risk involved from the borrower is higher than normal and therefore the investor is bearing the brunt of the increased risk.

In conclusion, with few exceptions such as lending funds for a sound and local second mortgage, I am of the opinion that most alternatives are not a good idea.

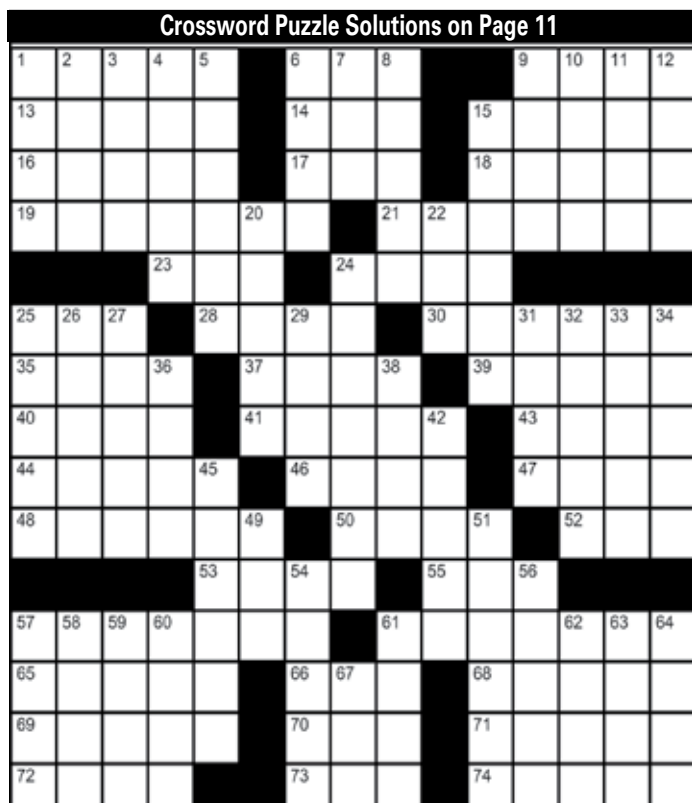

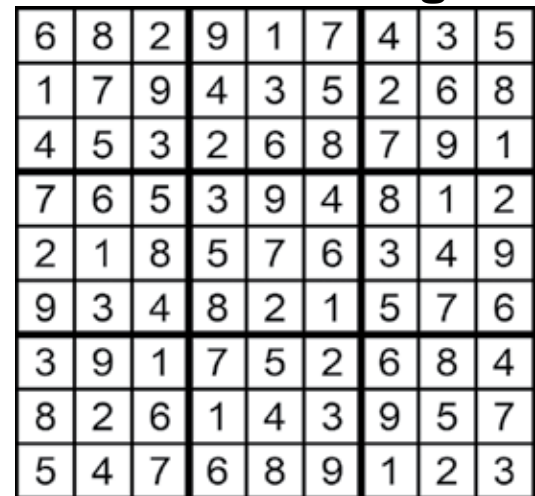

Strong Demand in Home Sales Begin Shift Towards Normalized Market

SACRAMENTO REGION, CA (MPG) - Sacramento-area new home sales continued moving toward more normal patterns in July but still reflect continued strong demand, the North State Building Industry Association reported.

Area builders reported selling 501 homes during the month in the seven-county region. That was the lowest number reported so far this year and appears to reflect that the market is continuing to shift into its normal pattern – sales peak in the spring, plateau during the summer and then continue drifting lower during the rest of the year.

But sales are still robust compared to historical averages. The average number of sales during July since the BIA began keeping records in 1997 is just 366, and July’s total was the second-highest recorded in the region since 2007. It was eclipsed only by the massive 888 sales that took place in July 2020 as the market rebounded from the huge drop-off in sales

that spring due to the onset of the COVID-19 restrictions.

Michael Strech, the BIA’s president and CEO, said the gradual movement towards a more normal market is welcome but that builders will continue working to meet the strong demand shown by area buyers.

“There continues to be a strong demand for new homes in the region as buyers look for homes that have been designed with today’s needs for space and flexibility in mind,” Strech said. “Despite serious supply chain issues that are causing

construction delays, our members continue to work hard to find solutions and complete construction as quickly as possible.

“The continued strong market for new and existing homes also provides even more proof that the supply of housing in the region does not meet the demand. Local governments need to work with builders to reduce fees and other costs and to allow the construction of more new housing to begin closing the gap.”

The report reflects sales in El Dorado, Nevada, Placer, Sacramento, Sutter, Yolo and Yuba counties. ★
