**YUBA CITY, CA (MPG)** - The tally is in for the annual Yuba-Sutter-Colusa United Way's "Cash for Food Drive," which this year collected a record \$26,361!

Each year, the local United Way organization calls upon the community to assist in raising funds for the special promotion, which is designed to provide a summertime boost to organizations serving

low-income families with nutritious foods.

"We are totally astounded at the generosity of our community when it comes to assisting their neighbors in need," said Bob Harlan, Executive Director of Yuba-Sutter-Colusa United Way.

"This drive comes at a time when the demand for nutritional foods is at its highest, but the normal donations of foods and cash are near their lowest. This money will provide

thousands of meals," Harlan said.

Of the total, an astounding \$19,846 was donated by customers of the "Grocery Outlet" in Yuba City during the company's annual "Independence from Hunger" event, with the balance coming from donors to United Way.

100% of all monies and "Grocery Outlet" gift cards will go to serve our neighbors in need of good nutritious foods through local food pantries and the

Yuba-Sutter Food Bank.

YSC United Way will have another opportunity to give meals to the community during its annual "Turkey Drive" in November, where donors can give cash or turkeys which are 100% used to feed low-income families during the holiday season. That drive collected more than 500 turkeys and hams and an additional \$25,000 in cash in 2020 which provided holiday dinners for some 6000 people. ★

**YUBA COUNTY, CA (MPG)** - First 5 Yuba County is working on many new programs to help make Yuba County a great place to live. The following is just a little information about the smoking cessation program and services First 5 Yuba County has to offer.

First 5 Yuba County's Building Resilient Families program, a California Tobacco Control Program (CTCP) funded program, aims to address tobacco related health disparities and support social norm change surrounding tobacco usage. This is a comprehensive and dyadic whole child-whole family approach is the backbone of First 5 Yuba County. By enhancing Tobacco screening and cessation services, supporting providers to be ACES aware and conducting early developmental screenings, we can promote parent resilience, provide concrete support in times of crisis, and link families to local services for care and treatment.

Working in conjunction with some of Yuba, Sutter and Surrounding County's Federally Qualified Healthcare Centers (FQHC's) and Family Serving Agencies, First 5 Yuba County strives to improve access to smoking cessation services in Yuba and surrounding counties.

Specifically, this project explores building upon existing systems to integrate proven early screening, intervention and treatment supports within our county's obstetric and pediatric settings. In addition, Home Visiting agencies will be used as a vehicle to reach our county's most rural, and sometimes isolated, women and their children who are using or exposed to 2nd or 3rd hand smoke

In addition to enhancing Tobacco screening and cessation services, First 5 Yuba is collaborating with iconic Yuba County events and venues to provide visitors with a smoke free experience. The Gold Sox ballpark, worked in collaboration with First 5 Yuba County to enhance their smoke-free environment by installing Smoke-Free Signage as well as post A-frames at the ballpark entrance during First 5 Thursdays. This year's Peach Festival also participated in going Smoke

Kids' painting of the dogs of the K-9 services, Iko and Yari were also on display. Guests had an opportunity to meet and chat with various officers and representatives from different departments

of local law enforcement and take a look at the booths set up, providing information on what they do and what they have to offer.

As shade began to cover the grassy side of the lot and more guests had started to arrive, it was time for the main event of the night—the K-9 Unit demonstrations. Deputy Brandon Pope brought out Jari, a Belgian Malinois, as they readied for their demonstration. Jari is

an important member of the Special Units Team and is trained for building searches and handler protection. Jari seemed excited and ready to show off his skills to the crowd that had gathered around the yard. Once he was given the command, Jari rushed forth, attacking the other officer participating in the demonstration, who was wearing padded protection on one arm. This display on

## Sen. Nielsen Responds to Hyatt Powerplant Shutdown

**SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG)** - Senator Jim Nielsen, R-Red Bluff, issued the following statement in response to the shuttering

of the Hyatt Powerplant at Lake Oroville for the first time because of record low water levels:

“Governor Newsom and the Democrats running this state should be ashamed.

“Rather than planning for the future, they kowtowed to environmental special interest groups and stalled the construction of Sites Reservoir.

“They fast track through environmental regulations to build sports stadiums, but refuse to do the same

when it comes to infrastructure projects that would protect the livelihoods, health and safety of Californians.”

When there’s adequate water in Lake Oroville, Hyatt can generate up to 900 megawatts of electricity. Typically, it produces 450 megawatts – enough to power 800,000 homes. However, due to the record low water levels, only 10 megawatts of electricity were being generated, which is why the decision was made to take it offline. ★

## Covered CA Lends Support for Wildfire Victims

**SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG)** - In an effort to help Californians who have been affected by the historic wildfires burning across the state, Covered California announced a special-enrollment period for those living in counties where a state of emergency has been declared. The new law ensures that everyone eligible will spend no more than 8.5 percent of their household income on their health insurance premiums, which is dramatically reducing the cost of coverage for

lower-income Californians and helping middle-income Californians save hundreds of dollars a month on their plans.

The most recent data shows that nearly 700,000 enrollees now have quality coverage through brand-name health plans for \$1 per month.

Consumers who live in counties under a state of emergency have 60 days from the date the emergency was declared to sign up for coverage.

Covered California is working with the more than 10,000 Licensed Insurance Agents and community-based organizations statewide to help Californians sign up and understand their coverage options through phone-based service models.

## PG&E Partners with Red Cross to Aid Residents Impacted by Recent Wildfires

- As drought-fueled wildfires continue to burn across several western states including California, the American Red Cross is deploying volunteers and opening shelters to provide services to displaced and impacted residents and communities. 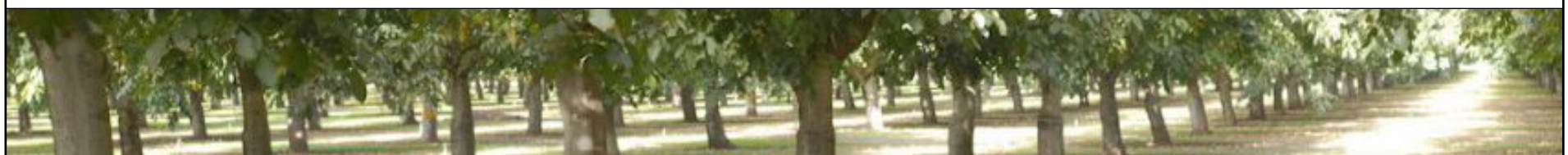

## Former CSUC Professor Admits to Possession of Child Porn

**BUTTE COUNTY, CA (MPG)** - The Butte County District Attorney's Office announced a former CSUC professor charged with possessing approximately a hundred images of child porn has pleaded no contest to the possession charge.

Laird Easton, 64, then a professor of history at CSUC was arrested on January 21, 2021 after a search and arrest warrant was issued by a local judge based on a Butte

County Sheriff's Office investigation. The investigation had revealed a person tied to Laird's personal and university email accounts had downloaded and uploaded child porn images from/to the internet. During the service of the search warrant at his home, sheriff's detectives contacted Easton and determined he was actively viewing child porn on his cell phone as those detectives were knocking at his door.

District Attorney Mike Ramsey said a subsequent extensive forensic

download of Easton's electronic devices seized during the search warrants revealed more child porn images. Easton was charged in March 2021.

Ramsey said Easton pleaded admitting that he was in possession of child pornography from August 28, 2020 through January 21, 2021. Easton, who remains out on bail pending sentencing, is set for sentencing on October 6, 2021. He faces a maximum of three years in state prison and will be required to register as a sex offender. ★

## Will Legislature Confront California Housing Crisis?

California had a huge and growing housing problem before COVID-19 reared its ugly head 18 months ago, falling well short each year of state construction goals.

The pandemic, which continues to flare up, "exacerbated a long-standing housing shortage, intensified a statewide affordability crisis, and provoked housing instability," the new state budget declares.

While suddenly unemployed workers struggled, and often failed, to make their monthly payments, the prices for homes soared, freezing out many who aspired to ownership.

The budget projects that California will add, at best, about 100,000 housing units this year, which is scarcely half of the 180,000 units state housing authorities say are needed to meet current demand and reduce the backlog. And that projection did not take into account the current COVID-19 surge.

The Legislature has reconvened after its summer vacation and is sprinting toward adjournment in mid-September. Housing is, or should be, at the top of its agenda.

While many factors affect the housing shortage,

the most important is the reluctance of suburban communities to embrace multi-family housing projects, particularly those for low- and moderate-income renters.

Dubbed "not-in-my-backyard," or NIMBY, it is by no means a recent phenomenon. One could trace it back to the anti-Asian exclusion laws of the 19th century, and 20th century anti-okie laws and whites- and Christians-only deed covenants.

As California's population exploded after World War II, some rural communities attempted to avoid becoming commuter suburbs. When Petaluma adopted a strict growth control law in the early 1970s, developers sued and the case went all the way to the U.S. Supreme Court, which allowed Petaluma's law to remain in effect.

The state has made multiple attempts to overcome NIMBYism, such as imposing residential zoning quotas on regions and cities. Recent versions contain some penalties for cities that ignore their quotas and the state sued one city, Huntington Beach, for ignoring its quota.

One of the state's many anti-NIMBY actions is the Housing Accountability Act, first enacted in 1982 and later tightened up. It essentially bars local governments from arbitrarily blocking housing projects that are "consistent with objective local development standards."

Citing the law, pro-housing organizations have been challenging local governments when they reject low- and moderate-income projects and two cases are looming as tests

of the law's efficacy.

One is in Huntington Beach, which rejected a 48-unit project. The California Renters Legal Advocacy and Education Fund (CaRLA) sued but a local judge ruled for the city, declaring that it had valid reasons, such as increased traffic, to deny a permit for the project.

CaRLA is also suing San Mateo, which imposed stringent design requirements on a 10-unit project that its developers said were onerous. Once again, a local judge ruled for the city and even questioned whether the Housing Accountability Act can be constitutionally applied to a charter city under the home rule doctrine.

Both cases are headed up the legal appeals chain and state Attorney General Rob Bonta is intervening in the San Mateo case to defend the law's application.

That brings us back to the final weeks of the legislative session and two highly controversial anti-NIMBY measures. Senate Bill 9 is the latest effort by Senate President Pro Tem Toni Atkins to allow small multi-family projects on lots zoned for single-family homes, while SB 10 would allow local governments to approve up to 10 units of housing on any lot, regardless of current zoning, near transit.

Whether they pass or fail will tell us much about the direction of housing policy as California's crisis continues.

## Child Molester Sentenced to Life

**Butte County District Attorney**

**BUTTE COUNTY, CA (MPG)** - A Chico man was sentenced in Butte Superior Court to life imprisonment for sexually abusing two young boys, ages three and nine. Judge Corie J. Caraway imposed the maximum sentence under the law of 15 years to life in prison.

Vincent Balderas, 25, of Chico, had been charged with three counts of sexual molestation for the two separate victims, possession of child pornography, and meeting with a minor for a lewd purpose. Balderas was also charged with being an accessory after the fact for unsuccessfully attempting to destroy evidence that could be used against another sex-offending cohort of his. All of the offenses took place in 2019 in

Chico. One of the victims was a relative and the other a child of an acquaintance.

Balderas' acts of molestation were exposed through an extensive investigation by the Chico Police Department into ongoing sexual abuse by multiple offenders with whom Balderas associated. Each of those other offenders were also charged and only one, David Kenneth Hamilton, Jr., remains to be convicted.

Pursuant to new regulations adopted by the California Department of Corrections this past May, life offenders need only serve 2/3 of their actual statutorily mandated sentence before being eligible for parole. This means Balderas will be eligible for parole after 10 years in custody, which is calculated from the day of his arrest in 2019. ★

**US Black Hawk Helicopters Captured by Taliban as 'Horrified' Senators Demand DOD Audit** | 20 Aug 2021 | Likely billions of dollars of American weapons and vehicles are now in the hands of the Taliban extremist group after the collapse of the Afghan government and army, with numerous videos and photos surfacing online showing Taliban members seizing the equipment. Photos have circulated of Taliban members holding American M-4 carbines and M-16 rifles rather than AK-47s or AKMs. Other images and videos showed the Taliban surrounding U.S. Black Hawk helicopters and A-29 Super Tucano attack aircraft. On Aug. 18, several Republican senators demanded the Department of Defense (DOD) provide full accounting over the weapons and equipment that were captured by the Taliban, considered by several agencies as a terrorist organization. "As we watched the images coming out of Afghanistan as the Taliban retook the country, we were horrified to see U.S. equipment – including UH-60 Black Hawks – in the hands of the Taliban," Sens. Marco Rubio (R-Fla.), Bill Cassidy (R-La.) and two dozen other senators wrote to Pentagon chief Lloyd Austin this week.

**Pentagon Aware of Reports That Americans Are Being Beaten by Taliban - Spokesman** | 20 Aug 2021 | A spokesman for the Department of Defense (DOD) said the Pentagon is aware of reports that Americans have been beaten in Afghanistan by Taliban members, appearing to contradict comments made by Joe Biden earlier in the day. Earlier Friday, Defense Secretary Lloyd Austin told congressional lawmakers in a confidential call that U.S. citizens were assaulted in Kabul, according to several news outlets citing anonymous sources... When asked about the reports of beatings and Austin's comments, DOD press secretary John Kirby said, "We're certainly mindful of these reports and they're deeply troubling, and we have communicated to the Taliban that that's absolutely unacceptable, that we want free passage through their checkpoints for documented Americans."

**Internal State Department Cable Warned of Kabul Collapse** | 19 Aug 2021 | An internal State Department memo last month warned top agency officials of the potential collapse of Kabul soon after the U.S.'s Aug. 31 troop withdrawal deadline in Afghanistan, according to a U.S. official and a person familiar with the document. The classified cable represents the clearest evidence yet that the administration had been warned by its own officials on the ground that the Taliban's advance was imminent and Afghanistan's military may be unable to stop it. The cable, sent via the State Department's confidential dissent channel, warned of rapid territorial gains by the Taliban and the subsequent collapse of Afghan security forces, and offered recommendations on ways to mitigate the crisis and speed up an evacuation, the two people said. The cable, dated July 13, also called for the State Department to use tougher language in describing the atrocities being committed by the Taliban, one of the people said.

**Biden State Dept. Moved to Abolish Crisis Response Bureau Months Before Taliban Takeover of Afghanistan** | 18 Aug 2021 | The Biden State Department moved in June to cancel a program overseeing the protection and evacuation of American citizens stationed overseas in the case of an emergency, just as the Taliban was taking over Afghanistan, according to an internal State Department memo obtained by the *Washington Free Beacon* and multiple sources familiar with the matter. The Biden State Department moved to dissolve the Trump-era crisis response program, according to an internal State Department memo and sources familiar with the matter. That memo, which was marked sensitive but unclassified and was signed by Deputy Secretary Brian McKeon, approved the "discontinuation of the establishment, and termination of, the Contingency and Crisis Response Bureau (CCR)," a new State Department entity created during the Trump administration to coordinate emergency response services overseas.

**FBI finds scant evidence U.S. Capitol attack was coordinated - sources** | 20 Aug 2021 | The FBI has found scant evidence that the Jan. 6 attack on the U.S. Capitol was the result of an organized plot to overturn the [fraudulent] presidential election result, according to four current and former law enforcement officials. Though federal officials have arrested more than 570 alleged participants, the FBI at this point believes the violence was not centrally coordinated by far-right groups or prominent supporters of then-President Donald Trump, according to the sources, who have been either directly involved in or briefed regularly on the wide-ranging investigations. "Ninety to ninety-five percent of these are one-off cases," said a former senior law enforcement official with knowledge of the investigation. ★

## Investors Understand What Buying a Stock is, Far Fewer Understand the World of Trading

Although most investors understand what buying a stock is, far fewer understand the world of trading stock options. Often labeled highly volatile and risky, there are ways to benefit from the trading stock options in lieu of trading the actual stock.

Stock options do not initially involve the actual stock of publically traded companies. Instead, options are contracts to buy or sell a stock sometime in the future. That means when you buy or sell a stock option, at that exact moment you are not actually trading stock, but promising to do so at some point in the future.

An option is a contract an investor can buy or sell, and depending on what option the investor transacts, he has either acquired the right to do something or the obligation. Specifically, having the right means you can exercise an action if you want, while having an obligation means you are required to.

Investors buy options because one gets more bang for the buck, which means they can be twice as lucrative or twice as dangerous. Simply put, options is stock trading on steroids.

Without getting too technical, the easiest way to learn the world of options is to learn how to buy them. One can sell an option, but because of the many different types of contract conditions that exist, buying an option is the easiest to understand.

There are two types of stock options: a "call" and a "put". You could SELL or BUY a call option, or sell or buy a PUT option. In the example below, we are buying a call option because that is the simplest transaction to start one's education.

Without getting to deep into how they are priced, as options price rather oddly, we are just going to buy a call option on a fictional company I am calling the ACME ANVIL COMPANY (AAC).

Example: AAC price is 100 per share. You think the price of AAC will rise for whatever reason. You don't have enough money, or perhaps don't want to spend a lot of money, to profit from the move, so you decide to try and benefit from buying an option contract called a call.

Doing so means you will spend a LOT less to participate in an AAC move. You could buy the stock at \$100 share, meaning 100 shares will cost you will cost you \$10,000.00, or you could BUY A CALL option, which controls the same 100 shares, meaning you will still get the same benefit (profit) of a 100 share move, but

you will be likely spending a lot less to participate. Remember options are highly leveraged.

You first find if an option is available on AAC and we will pick a call contract with a price of \$105.00. You decide the stock should move quickly so you buy a contract that expires in one month. (Keep reading).

Since option contracts have a "strike" price and a "maturity" date, and many strikes and dates can be offered, you can pick what price and date you prefer and each one probably has a different price. Our fictional contract is the \$105 strike and is one month out, say September 15th (9/15).

You will now PAY for the contract. Assuming you pay an arbitrary price of \$500 for one call option (remember prices, maturity dates and strike prices vary and you pick which one you want), you now own one call contract, which controls 100 shares of AAC, and you paid \$500 for it.

In a nutshell, if AAC goes above 105 by 9/15, you make money. If it goes way past 105, you make more money. The higher it goes by 9/15, the more money you make.

If AAC never gets to 105 by 9/15, you lose all of your money. Although trading professionals will notice the explanation above leaves out a ton of details and may not reflect actual gains or losses, the general concept of how this option works is conveyed in broad detail only. If the price goes above the contracts strike price by the maturity date, it can mean profits to the investor.

In conclusion, there is a lot more to options then explained above, but the general concept is options can give you extreme leverage, which means more bang for your buck and a cheap way to play a stock, can amplify losses or gains and with astounding speed, and have time factor which can work for or against the investor depending on the option strategy selected.

### Infrastructure Bill Boosts Water Projects in the West

Water projects in the West stand to benefit from the Senate's recent passage of a bipartisan infrastructure bill. The bill, still to be passed in the House, would provide more than \$8 billion for new water storage facilities, upgrades to aging dams and canals and other infrastructure. Western states face severe drought impacting farmers and water providers. A national coalition, led by the California Farm Bureau, backed the legislation.

### Drought Curbs Tomato Harvest, Stokes Fears of Harder Times

California tomato farmers are expecting only a modest decline in output this year. But growers fear exceptional drought conditions could lead to a far greater drop in tomato production next year. The California Tomato Growers Association said this year's very hot growing season will impact Central Valley yields. The state's tomato forecast of 12 million tons has been revised downward by 400,000 tons and may fall some more.

### Tariffs From China Still Impact California Farm Products

Tariffs as a result of trade disputes with China are continuing to impact a range of California farm products. In particular, tree nuts and wine still face increased duties, despite last year's implementation of the Phase One U.S.-China trade agreement. Meanwhile, tariffs on farm products have been suspended for exports to Europe under an interim agreement between the U.S. and the European Union.

### Usda Provides Healthy Food Grants To California Communities

The U.S. Department of Food and Agriculture is funding \$69 million in grants to provide nutritious foods to low-income communities enduring the pandemic. The money includes more than \$6 million in nutrition grants to increase fresh fruit and vegetable offerings for shoppers in underserved California areas. Funds also will support the VeggieRX nutrition program at Fresh Approach in Concord and provide produce to Los Angeles County residents with diabetes. ★

# ‘To Newsom or Not to Newsom’

Governor Newsom’s recall election concludes September 14, and the rhetoric is heating up, so it’s important to carefully evaluate what’s being said! We will see more political advertisements bombarding us!

The first ad I saw was the rapid-paced Newsom’s “Roaring Back” blitzkrieg. It starts with, “Newsom is delivering money to your pocket!” It continues ... \$1,100 in your pocket, plus \$500 if you have children (Covid relief). It then proclaims he delivered \$4 billion in small business grants (again Covid). A couple projects by Newsom are mentioned and it ends with “Free Pre-K” for every child!!

Honestly, my first reaction was that Newsom is paying us to vote for him. Money for everyone! However, most of that money is federal money and all of that money is taxpayer money.

The other ad I viewed was US Senator Elizabeth Warren (D-Massachusetts) “Here’s the Deal” declaration. “Republicans across the country are attacking the election results and the right to vote.” And, she asserts, these same evil forces are attacking California in a power grab. This “Partisan Recall” is “abusing the recall process,” Warren declares!

How so, I wonder? How is the process being

abused? The process was laid out in state law for anyone to use since 1911.

Since 1913, eleven recalls have qualified for the ballot (of 179 attempts) and six were successful per the Secretary of State. Of those six, three republicans and three democrats were recalled. That doesn’t seem too partisan. And, if this is such a partisan power play, why is Warren from Massachusetts doing the ad and not one of our two US California Senators (both democrats)? Other Newsom ads speak of “anti-science republicans” and other guilt by association smears.

And, by the way, if you ask who is funding the Warren ad, it’s Reed Hastings (Netflix founder/CEO) who was also on the board of Facebook; the Service Employees International Union #215 (state employees union); and the California Democratic Party.

Newsom blasts the \$276 million cost of the recall, which is a lot of money. However, that pales with other state expenditures, such as the proposed \$1 billion being foisted by the legislature to tear down and rebuild the Capitol annex so legislators can have new luxury offices! The recall is a legitimate expense of citizens exercising ownership over their government. The Annex is just the legislators padding their own chairs!

There are approximately 22 million registered voters in California. About 24.2% are republicans, 46.1% are democrats, and 24% have no party preference. To gather the 1.5 million signatures to qualify the recall (1.6 million were collected), I am confident that there were a few democrats mixed in the petitions. And, last spring

when Newsom touted the 30 day period when people could retract their signatures ... less than 50 did so. How embarrassing!

In an August 2-4, 2021 statewide poll for the San Diego Union, 51% favored recalling Newsom (up from 36% in May). Only 40% wanted to keep him (down from 47% in May).

Now, you may like or dislike Newsom, and I’ll keep my opinion to myself, but I can confidently predict the recall is not about partisanship, but perceived performance by the voters.

If voters do recall Newsom, we have 46 replacement candidates, most of whom are useless, “vanity candidates” who clutter the names of the six or seven serious candidates. Yes, with \$4,200 and 65 friends, you, too, could have run for governor! Please don’t waste your vote on a lost cause candidate, the issues are too important. Just be glad we don’t have the 135 candidates as we did in 2003 with the Gray Davis recall.

Be skeptical of advertisements. Beware of what is promised but unproven! Come to events, such as our SacTax (Sacramento Taxpayers Association) interviews with Governor candidates this year. Be informed and intelligent. Exercise ownership over our governments. These recommendations will make each of us better citizens!

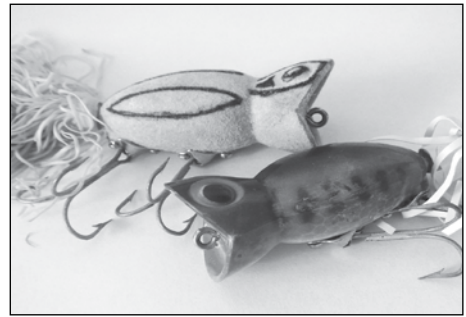

# Construction Starts on Major Butte County Highway Project

## CalTrans Special Release

### BUTTE COUNTY, CA (MPG)

- In a major milestone, Caltrans is beginning construction this week on a safety and passing lanes project on State Highway 70 in southern Butte County.

Starting today, crews plan to begin placing temporary concrete barriers, or K-rail, along a four-mile stretch of roadway from East Gridley Road to the Honcut Creek bridge.

Caltrans and the Butte County Association of Governments (BCAG) are partnering on this \$50 million project to create continuous passing lanes with a two-way left-turn lane and build a new bridge over Honcut Creek. Other improvements include widening the shoulders to 8 feet, upgrading drainage systems and establishing an area for vehicles veering off the roadway to return to the main highway.

The work represents the last of three Butte County projects to improve safety on the Highway 70 corridor between Oroville and the Butte-Yuba County line.

A second safety and passing project between Palermo Road and Cox Lane is currently under

construction and expects to be completed this fall. An earlier safety improvement project from Ophir Road to Palermo opened to traffic in fall 2019.

“It took a lot of hard work by our partners and Caltrans to get this stage. We’re excited to begin construction on this segment,” said Caltrans District 3 Director Amarjeet S. Benipal. “After this important safety project is completed, motorists will have continuous passing opportunities from Oroville to the Butte-Yuba County line.”

About 17,000 vehicles and approximately 900 trucks per day use this segment of Highway 70 on average.

“Butte County and Caltrans have spent more than three decades working to provide safe, reliable four-lane access on the Highway 70 corridor. It’s

vital that we modernize this highway for the safety of motorists and residents as well as the regional economy,” said Butte County Supervisor Bill Connelly, who also serves on the BCAG board.

Teichert Construction of Sacramento and MCM Construction of North Highlands are the contractors on the project. Over the next two years, motorists may expect intermittent traffic-interfering and occasional overnight roadwork. The contractor will maintain driveway access to the highway for businesses and residents.

As part of a Caltrans work zone safety initiative, the speed limit has been reduced from 55 to 45 mph in the construction zone. Radar speed feedback trailers are in place along the highway to remind motorists of the reduced driving speed. ★

## Newsom Scrambling to Keep the Lights On

SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG)

- On Friday, August 20, Assemblyman James Gallagher (R-Yuba City) reacted to reports from Bloomberg and KQED that Governor Gavin Newsom is scrambling to build five new gas and diesel fired powerplants in a last minute effort to stabilize the energy grid and prevent rolling blackouts.

The California Energy Commission approved the Governor's plan earlier this week, noting how it contradicts with the state's goal of creating a carbon neutral grid by 2045 (SB 100).

"Desperate to avoid blackouts caused by his own mismanagement, Gavin turns to the same natural gas plants he has

vulnified," said Gallagher. "How many ways can you spell hypocrisy?"

On Monday, the Roseville City Council approved a term sheet between the City and the California Department of Water Resources (DWR) to install two natural gas peaking units with the goal of providing grid support by mid-September. According to the city's staff report, DWR is purchasing two \$20 million turbines for the Roseville site and compensating the city \$9 million for the temporary facility with an agreement to operate through December 31st, 2023.

"The blackouts of 2020 should have been a wake-up call for the Newsom Administration. But to

no one's surprise, it was business as usual here in California," Gallagher continued. "Newsom's team continued its crusade against dependable energy sources and they shut down hydroelectric facilities as a result of their water mismanagement. Now he's in complete panic mode trying to keep the lights on."

The Governor's five gas and diesel powerplants are estimated to bring online 150 megawatts of power. California is expected to be short 5,000 megawatts by summer of 2022. The construction of these energy facilities enjoys a full CEQA exemption courtesy of the Governor's July 30 energy shortage Emergency Proclamation. ★
