It's a Date: Recall Election Set

California voters will decide on Sept. 14 whether to throw Gov. Gavin Newsom out of office, making him the second governor in state history – and just the fourth nationwide – to face a recall.

The announcement today from Lt. Gov. Eleni Kounalakis comes after weeks of procedural wrangling by Democratic lawmakers and state officials to speed up the process for choosing a recall election date. Their apparent calculation is that the

Democratic governor has better odds of defeating the GOP-backed recall if an election is held sooner rather than later.

"I believe we have chosen a fair and reasonable date for this election to take place," Kounalakis said in a statement. "It has always been my intention to choose an election date that gives election officials and the public ample time to ensure a smooth election with broad participation."

Newsom's public approval has been rising as the state rebounds from the coronavirus pandemic, and he's already amassed a hefty war chest

to fight the recall. Holding the election on Sept. 14 protects the governor from being leveraged by special interests and fellow Democrats during most of the critical bill-signing period that ends Oct. 10.

Delaying a vote until later in the fall would give his opponents more time to mobilize – and raises the possibility that voters could sour on Newsom if conditions in the state worsen due to the pandemic, wildfire season or other unforeseen calamities.

Though the recall effort – led by conservative activists critical

Supreme Court NCAA Decisions Embolden Advocates for College Athlete Compensation

Advocates for college athlete compensation in California are on a hot streak. First the state passed a first-in-the-nation law allowing players to sign paid endorsement deals, and 20 states followed its example. Now, with both a recent U.S. Supreme Court decision and a National Collegiate Athletic Association rule change challenging the idea that students shouldn't make money from athletics, legislators are pushing to move up the effective date of the California law to this fall and expand it to cover community college athletes.

"The amateurism ideals have been weakening over time, not only with just player movements, advocate movements, but also because of litigation that's currently playing out," said Eddie Comeaux, a professor of higher education at UC Riverside who studies college athletics.

The NCAA has previously barred athletes from earning money for their performance, aside from scholarships. But the Supreme Court's 9-0 ruling June 21 allows colleges to also cover as much as \$6,000 per year in education-related expenses for athletes, such as laptops and study abroad programs. While it didn't directly strike down the NCAA's amateurism model, a concurring opinion from Justice Brett Kavanaugh signaled a willingness to do so, spurring hope among advocates that more avenues for player compensation could be on the horizon.

Then Wednesday, the NCAA announced that it won't penalize athletes for taking advantage of state laws like California's that allow them to profit from the use of their name, image and likeness.

"With the variety of state laws adopted across the country, we will continue to work with Congress to develop a solution that will provide clarity on a national level," NCAA President Mark Emmert said in a press release.

"The Supreme Court's ruling basically told the NCAA you've got to follow the law, you're not immune to antitrust, you

Gold Sox Stadium Officially Renamed Hard Rock Park

Cassidy continued, "In our discussions regarding the naming rights deal, Hard Rock and Enterprise Rancheria stressed the

importance of them giving back to the community that has so strongly supported them. This agreement will allow the Gold Sox to continue to not only entertain the community each summer, but also continue to employ the 45 to 70 local employees that are needed each season."

Creig Marcus, Tribal Administrator, Enterprise Rancheria Estom Yumeka Maidu said "After discussions with the Gold Sox ownership team, the Enterprise tribal council agreed that one of the best ways to support the

growth and prosperity of the Yuba-Sutter community was to partner with the Gold Sox on the naming rights of Hard Rock Park. Not only do the Gold Sox offer family entertainment to the community, but they provide much needed jobs for young people in our community. Our Tribal Chairwoman, Glenda Nelson, has always emphasized that the Estom Yumeka Maidu way is to support our community, especially for long standing traditions. Chairwoman Nelson appreciated that the Gold Sox has been a generational family tradition that the Tribe is pleased to partner with."

Also commenting on the new agreement, Gold Sox General Manager Tommy Lininger said "I would first like to thank Colusa Casino for their years of support, we would not be where we are without them. With that being said, we could not be more excited for our new partnership with Hard Rock. This move gives the ability to take this organization to the next level. This will be an exciting time for the Yuba-Sutter community over the next few years." ★



Kentucky Ridge Mine Site and Grass Valley AME Church are Newest Historical Landmarks

NEVADA COUNTY, CA (MPG) - Days after celebrating Juneteenth, Nevada County welcomed its newest historical landmarks. The Nevada County Historical Landmarks Commission is pleased to announce the Nevada County Board of Supervisors has designated the Kentucky Ridge Mine Site and the Grass Valley African Methodist Episcopal Church and School Site as Nevada County Historical Landmarks, NEV 21-01 and NEV 21-02 respectively.

Kentucky Ridge Mine Site

Located near the intersection of Bitney Spring Rd and Lone Lobo Trail, the Kentucky Ridge Mine Site was the largest enterprise in California operated by enslaved Black labor despite California joining the Union as a free state. After gold was discovered on the site in 1851, former Florida plantation owner Colonel William F. English, one of over a dozen slave owners in Nevada County at the time, brought between 30 and 45 slaves from Florida and South Carolina to mine.

After English died in a gun accident in August 1852, the mine failed. Some of the former slaves stayed and tried to mine for themselves, but most gradually migrated down into Grass Valley, many settling in the Boston Ravine area. Many of the slaves went on to be pillars of the community. Isaac Sanks, husband of Chasey, one of the slaves, became a religious leader, businessman, and newspaper reporter who helped to gain Black men the right to serve on juries and vote by 1870.

Mr. Sanks may have been the first Black to run for public office in California, when he ran for Grass Valley town trustee in 1870.

Grass Valley African Methodist Episcopal Church and School Site

The African Methodist Episcopal (AME) Church grew out of the Free African Society that reached the west coast in the early 1850s. The Society was set up to provide mutual aid for “free Africans and their descendants.” In 1854, the Grass Valley AME Church was erected on what is now South Church Street on a formerly larger lot that currently comprises 315, 319, 321, and 323 S. Church St.

The Grass Valley AME Church held weekly services and was known for its choir. It was used as a venue for concerts and political activities, raising funds for important civil rights causes of the era. The need for a new school was brought on by the 1860s state law that allowed

districts to provide segregated education for “Negroes, Mongolians, and Indians” who were prohibited from attending public schools with white children. In 1880, the expense of a separate school system for a relatively small number of Black children in California caused the state to abolish the segregation law.

As the Black population of Grass Valley declined towards the end of the 19th century, the church and school were sold at public auction in 1893, and the new owner sold off the property in four parcels where the Victorian homes we see today were built in 1894.

The AME church and school were the Black community's oldest and most important institutions in Grass Valley. The Church and School Site is the first Black institution to be landmarked in Grass Valley.

The purpose of the Nevada County Historical Landmarks Commission is to promote the general welfare of Nevada County and its citizens through official recognition, recording, marking, preserving, and promoting the historical resources of Nevada County.

of Newsom's opposition to the death penalty and California's high taxes, widespread homelessness and immigrant-friendly policies – began before the pandemic hit, it gained support as the virus surged and Newsom imposed strict lockdowns to contain it. He was widely blasted as a hypocrite when reports surfaced in November that a maskless Newsom had attended a lobbyist friend's birthday party at the ritzy French Laundry restaurant, even as he told Californians to mask up and avoid socializing.

Only about 55,000 voters had signed recall petitions at the time of dinner. A judge gave proponents more time to collect signatures due to the pandemic. And by the deadline in April, some 1.7 million voters signed the recall petition, more than enough to trigger the recall.

But the state law governing recall elections lays out a lengthy process between gathering signatures and holding a vote. To speed things up, the Democratic-controlled Legislature on Monday passed a bill allowing lawmakers to skip a 30-day financial review of election costs if they've already set money aside in the budget to pay for a recall — and Newsom signed it into law within hours. The new state budget they passed includes \$250 million to pay for putting on the election.

“Politicians play partisan games. It’s all about retaining power,” GOP businessman John Cox, who lost to Newsom in 2018 and is challenging him again, said during a morning campaign stop in Sacramento.

"I think people will see what's going on. And it'll backfire."

Newsom immediately vowed to defeat the recall and continued the theme he's been hammering for months – that the recall is a power grab led by “Trump Republicans” who refuse to accept the outcome when they lose elections.

"On September 14, Californians will have the chance to defend our state

and reject this Republican power grab once and for all,” said a statement from Newsom’s campaign manager Juan Rodriguez.

The Republican Party in California has diminished dramatically since 2003, when voters threw Democratic Gov. Gray Davis out of office in a GOP-backed recall and replaced him with Republican Arnold Schwarzenegger. Voters haven't elected a Republican for statewide office since Schwarzenegger's reelection in 2006. And Republicans hold so few seats in the Legislature — about one-fourth — that they don't have the power to influence policy or budget decisions.

But a recall creates an opportunity for Republicans, because the rules are different from an ordinary election.

A recall ballot contains two questions. First: Should Gavin Newsom be recalled? And second: If he is recalled, who should replace him? If more than 50% of voters say “yes” to the first question, the person who gets the most votes on the second question wins – even if they have less than a majority. That’s because there’s no limit to how many people can run in the recall.

Already, 55 people have filed a statement of intention to run, including former San Diego Mayor Kevin Faulconer, former Sacramento-area U.S. Rep. Doug Ose and reality TV personality Caitlyn Jenner – all Republicans. Conservative talk show host Larry Elder also is considering a run, Politico reported.

Faulconer has tried to appeal to voters across the political spectrum by highlighting his work with a Democratic city council as San Diego mayor. "This movement is powered by Californians from every community — Democrats, Republicans, and Independents. I am ready to lead this recall and begin the California Comeback to clean up our streets, cut taxes on the middle class, and reopen our schools," he said in a statement.

Candidates have until July

16 to finalize their decision to run in the recall. In 2003, 135 people ran to replace Davis. But now there's a new requirement that could narrow the field: candidates must submit five years of tax returns.

Voters will be sent a ballot in the mail beginning on Aug. 16. Everyone will be able to mail in their ballot, but options for returning it in person will vary by county. Local election officials had raised alarms about the rapid timeline, saying they couldn't pull it off any sooner than Sept. 14. Even then, some are still concerned they may have a hard time getting the special paper and envelopes required, and securing locations for voters to cast ballots.

"It's a good thing that we at least have a date now so we can at least focus on those items," said Donna Johnston, the registrar of voters in Sutter County and president of the statewide association of election officials.

"It's going to be like climbing a mountain. And of course once we get to the top and carry off a successful election the view will be nice."

Not surprisingly, Republicans are very fired up about the recall, with a recent poll showing 75% are highly interested in it. But only 36% of Democrats said the same, which means Newsom's challenge in the next two-and-a-half months will be to motivate them to vote.

“The risks of a low turnout, the risks of an uninformed electorate, could be catastrophic for our state,” Democratic Assemblymember David Chiu said during a call with reporters the day after the election date was announced, in which Democratic party leaders vowed to unite against the recall.

Data Undercut Newsom's 'Roaring Back' Claim

Virtually any utterance from Gavin Newsom's mouth these days, as well as those from his press office and other outposts of his administration, contains the phrase "roaring back."

When, for example, the Legislature passed a state budget to meet the June 15 constitutional deadline, Newsom issued a statement declaring that "California's economy is coming roaring back."

Not surprisingly, it's also the key slogan in his resistance to a campaign to recall him, something voters will decide later this year.

"Gov. Gavin Newsom has California roaring back," the announcer in one of his campaign spots declares. "Newsom is delivering money to your pocket. Plus an extra \$500 bucks for families with kids – \$4 billion straight to small businesses through the nation's largest grant program – cleaning up our streets and getting 65,000 homeless Californians into housing – and free pre-K for every California child, regardless of income."

To some, it might appear somewhat unseemly that Newsom so obviously merges his official actions – and taxpayers' money – with

his political campaign, but the once-discernible line between politics and policy vanished long ago.

That said, do the facts support Newsom's repetitive "roaring back" claim?

To be sure, some Californians have prospered in the 15 months since Newsom declared a public health emergency due to COVID-19 and imposed restrictions on personal and economic activities.

Those who could continue to work at home maintained their incomes and those on the top rungs of the economic ladder were enriched as the values of their investments such as stocks expanded, thanks largely to the Federal Reserve's cheap money policies.

Newsom has a multi-billion-dollar revenue surplus mostly due to taxes on the affluent, money he's now spending on the wide array of new benefits he's touting in his campaign ads.

However, broader economic data offer scant support for the "roaring back" mantra the governor is chanting these days. It's more like creeping back – slowly.

The state's monthly report on employment, issued on June 18, frames the glacial pace of improvement. The state lost nearly 3 million jobs after Newsom ordered widespread business closures in March 2020, and since then we've recovered roughly half of them. Our 7.9% unemployment rate is still twice what it was before the shutdown and is the third highest of any state, slightly under Hawaii and New Mexico.

In addition to the official unemployment rate, the federal Bureau of Labor Statistics makes other calculations, including an important one on underemployment, called U-6, which includes not only workers without jobs but those who are only marginally attached to the labor force and those working part-time.

California's U-6 rate through the first quarter, 18.4%, was four percentage points above the national figure and the third highest of any state, behind Hawaii and Nevada. Even more disturbingly, the U-6 rate in Los Angeles County, 24.1%, is higher than that of any state.

The federal Bureau of Economic Analysis reported this month that during the first quarter of this year, California's economic output increased by 6.3%, slightly lower than the national rate and in the lowest third of the states.

The federal bureau also reported that California's personal income grew by 42.8% during the first quarter, which sounds impressive until one looks at the nation as a whole and learns that California's growth was the second lowest of any state. The bureau notes that nationwide, "transfer payments" – mostly federal aid programs rather than earned income – accounted for virtually all of personal income growth.

California's economy is recovering, to be sure. But "roaring back?" Hardly.

cannot be a monopoly," said state Sen. Nancy Skinner, the author of the Fair Pay to Play Act, which passed the California Legislature in 2019. She's now pushing a bill that amends the law to take effect Sept. 1, rather than in 2023. It passed the Assembly's higher education committee this week, and would need to receive a two-thirds vote by the Assembly and be signed by the governor to become law.

State laws giving college athletes the ability to pursue money-making opportunities also went into effect Thursday in Georgia, Florida, Alabama, New Mexico and Mississippi.

Athletes on the Sprter app can sign endorsement deals, sell social media shoutouts and book in-person experiences such as a training session with fans. It's just one of a number of ventures already sprouting up as the new NCAA rules take effect this week. Hanna and Haley Cavinder, twin sisters who play for Fresno State's basketball team, told ESPN they had already signed their first endorsement deal with Boost Mobile on Wednesday.

Unlike the original Fair Play to Play Act, Skinner's new bill would afford California's community college athletes the same freedom to profit from their name, image and likeness as their peers at four-year universities. The bill has the support of the California Community College Chancellor's office.

"Students should not have to sit by and watch others profit off of their hard work and labor without being equitably compensated for it, just because they participate in college athletics – and that includes our many community college student-athletes as well," spokesperson Rafael Chávez said in a statement to CalMatters.

California's two public university

systems, the University of California and California State University, said they were monitoring the bill. "UC continues to work with Senator Skinner, and members of the state Legislature, to ensure that the University is prepared for an accelerated implementation date of Sept. 1," spokesperson Ryan King said in a statement.

Some advocates for college players want to go even further. A bill this year by state Sen. Sydney Kamlager would have required colleges to pay their athletes a royalty for use of their name, image and likeness if the revenue a sports program generates is more than double the amount it awards in athletic scholarships. The bill, introduced when Kamlager was an Assemblymember, would also have beefed up enforcement of Title IX, the federal law barring sex discrimination in sports and other educational programs, and placed a cap on salaries for college coaches.

It stalled in the Assembly. But the recent decisions by the Supreme Court and NCAA could pave the way for California to take more aggressive action on athlete compensation going forward, said Ramogi Huma, the executive director of the National College Players Association, which advocates for the rights of college athletes.

"A 9-0 decision saying that this is an exploitative industry and college athletes deserve more compensation should be a green light for the state of California to once again reshape college sports in a way that's more equitable for players," Huma said.

Survey Shows Cost of Cookout Foods

With food prices stabilizing, an annual American Farm Bureau survey shows little to no change in the average cost for items featured in a summer cookout. The survey tracks retail prices for a dozen popular cook-out items, and shows them down less than 1% from a year ago, but up 8% compared to 2019. A Farm Bureau analyst says the food system continues to adjust after disruptions caused by the COVID-19 pandemic.

USDA Urges Americans to Reduce Food Waste

Four steps can help people reduce food waste at home, according to the U.S. Department of Agriculture. USDA has released new resources to show people how to prevent food waste. The resources stress planning for food purchases, controlling food portions, properly storing leftovers and composting food scraps. USDA says an average family of four wastes almost \$1,500 worth of food each year.

Specialist Provides Drought Tips for Landscaping

When water supplies run short, homeowners should concentrate on keeping trees healthy. A University of California specialist describes trees as “our most valuable landscape resource” because of the shade, cooling and other benefits they provide. Other drought tips include irrigating landscapes in the morning, to reduce evaporation; using mulch; and controlling weeds that compete with other plants for water.

Study Indicates Heart-Health Value of Prune Consumption

Eating prunes appears to help women improve their cardiovascular health. A study by San Diego State University showed that prune consumption raised antioxidant capacity and reduced inflammation among healthy, postmenopausal women. Those factors are associated with lower risk of cardiovascular disease. Volunteers in the study ate the equivalent of six prunes a day for six months. ★

The Road to Recall Oroville Street Racer to Stand Trial on Deaths and Injury

Will liberal Californians throw-out their liberal governor? Secretary of State Shirley Weber set September 14, 2021 for Gavin Newsom’s recall vote.

The recall has been part of the state’s elective process since 1911. Since then, there have been 54 attempts to recall Golden State governors. California is one of only two states in the nation to remove a governor. Democrat Governor Gray Davis was dismissed in 2003.

Proponents needed 1,495,709 valid petition signatures to initiate the Newsom recall election. This is equal to 12% of votes cast for Governor in 2018 as prescribed in the state Constitution.

Recall advocates had 160 days from June 10, 2020 to collect sufficient signatures. However, due to Covid -19 restrictions the Sacramento Superior Court extended the deadline to submit signatures to March 17, 2021.

Along with the recall question on the ballot, there will also be replacement candidates. This vote for a candidate counts only if 50% plus one chooses to recall the Governor. The Governor is prohibited from being a candidate to succeed himself. Votes can

be cast for both or either parts of the ballot.

Candidates must file paperwork up to 59 days prior to the election along with a \$4,194.94 filing fee (or 7,000 voter signatures). The time for filing and campaigning was shortened by the liberal legislature that passed SB152 to hurry the election in Newsom’s favor. Newsom’s people also misfiled his paperwork leaving the ‘democrat’ designation off the ballot. Of course, the law does not apply to Newsom. He is going to court to get a ‘Gavin’ waiver.

The Secretary of State must provide a certified list of qualifying candidates 55-days before the election.

Candidates for governor must be a U.S. citizen; a registered voter and otherwise qualified to vote for that office at the time the nomination papers are issued; not have been convicted of a felony involving accepting or receiving, or offering to give, any bribe, the embezzlement of public money, extortion or theft of public money, perjury, or conspiracy to commit any of those crimes, and not have served two terms in the office since November 6, 1990.

If Governor Newsom is recalled then the candidate with the most votes would complete the Governor’s term in office ending in 2022. The new Governor would take office 38 days following the election. County Clerks have 30-days after the election to complete the official canvass.

Though recall petitions were signed statewide, the

highest concentrations of signatures were in the rural northeast, areas with low coronavirus case counts and where voters favored President Donald Trump. These areas are home to 5% of the state’s population but where more than 10% of the total signatures were gathered.

The lowest support of the recall is in San Francisco, Marin and Imperial Counties. The greatest support as a ratio of signatures to total registered voters came from Amador, Lassen, Calaveras, and Tuolumne Counties. In Amador County, 191 per thousand registered voters signed the recall. In San Francisco County just 18 per thousand signed.

Yuba County saw 144 per thousand sign (5,836) and in Sutter County 125 per thousand (6,544) signed. To see a successful recall the north state needs many more registered conservatives that will vote. And, there will be no recall without significant numbers of liberals state-wide that are done with Newsom.

There may be more than 100 candidates on the ballot to get publicity or become governor. A couple interesting names rumored recently as candidates are talk-show host Larry Elder and Assemblyman Kevin Kiley. Kiley opposed and filed a legal action against Newsom’s tyrannical behavior. Neither has filed papers at this point.

Butte County District Attorney’s Office

BUTTE COUNTY, CA (MPG) - A 20-year-old Oroville street racer was held to answer after a preliminary hearing in Butte County Superior Court on felony manslaughter and other charges stemming from an incident in April where he was allegedly street racing in his Camaro with another car that crashed, killing three and injuring a fourth.

Butte County Superior Court Judge Michael Candela heard the prosecution evidence against Carlos Lee Hill Jr., 20, of Oroville, and found sufficient evidence to send his case onto a jury trial on three counts of manslaughter, a count of street racing causing death and injury, reckless driving causing death and injury, and hit-and-run driving resulting in death and injury.

District Attorney Mike Ramsey said the evidence showed Hill was identified as one of two drivers engaged in a street race on Lincoln Boulevard in South Oroville that led to the other vehicle crashing, ejecting and killing three of its four occupants, including a two-year-old child. A fourth victim, four-years-old, was also ejected and sustained serious injuries, but fortunately survived after being taken to UC Davis by helicopter.

Ramsey said that on April 29, 2021, during the noon hour, 911 calls started coming in of a vehicle that had crashed off the roadway and overturned. Fire and medical personnel responded as well as California Highway Patrol units. Upon arrival, officers observed a “chaotic” scene with multiple power poles down, live electrical wires strewn about, and a large debris field. The crashed vehicle, a Jeep Grand Cherokee, was located off the road at Baggett-Marysville Road, with extensive damage.

Ramsey said the two adult victims were deceased at the scene. The two-year-old was thrown roughly 80-100 feet from the car and suffered severe injuries. Fire and medical personnel tried to save her life but were ultimately unsuccessful, and she

was pronounced dead at Oroville Hospital. The fourth victim, four-years-old, had also been ejected and had a serious head injury as well as injuries to her arms and legs. A helicopter was dispatched and landed on scene and transported the young victim to UC Davis for emergency treatment. Evidence showed the children were not in child car seats.

Ramsey said witnesses estimated the speeds of the vehicles at between 80-100mph, while the speed limit is only 45mph in that area. CHP officers testified during the hearing that the area normally has a large amount of vehicle and foot traffic at that time of day. As part of their investigation, officers obtained surveillance footage from multiple businesses confirming that the two vehicles appeared to line up at a stop sign on Lincoln Boulevard, rev their engines, and then take off in a street race. The race continued towards the curve at Lincoln and Baggett-Marysville Road, where the Jeep lost control and began to roll, crashing through the power poles and ultimately coming to rest off the road. Officers testified the Jeep had sustained extensive damage, including the roof, causing it to collapse into the passenger area of the vehicle.

Ramsey said that rather than remain on scene, as required by law, Hill instead fled the scene, only returning approximately half an hour later. Witnesses at that time recognized him as the driver of the Camaro involved in the street race, and pointed him out to officers, who arrested him.

CHP officers testified that Hill did not possess a driver’s license and had been convicted on multiple prior occasions of driving without a license. At the time of the crash, Hill had several warrants for failing to come to court on those vehicle violations.

Ramsey said Hill will next be in court on July 14, 2021, for arraignment and setting the date for his jury trial on the charges, which could bring up to 15 years in prison. Judge Candela found Hill presented a significant public safety risk to the community and ordered Hill held in custody without bail. ★
