Conant Orchards Celebrates 100 Years

RIO OSO, CA (MPG) - On June 19, 2021, the Conant Family celebrated the 100th Year Anniversary of Conant Orchards in Rio Oso, California. Started in 1921 by Ernest Leslie and Gertrude Conant, the farm is located in south Sutter County, at the intersection of Bear River Drive and Pleasant Grove Road.

Over 100 family, friends, community leaders and business associates were present for the celebration event hosted by Mat and Lorene Conant, who reside on the farm today. The dinner was aptly held under the shade of walnut trees and included speeches by Mat and Ernest Conant and a video with highlights of the 100-year legacy. The evening included Mat's signature lemon drop cocktail, made with Conant farm grown lemons, and ended with the guests receiving a

package of Lorene Conant's signature recipe candied walnuts, made with Conant Orchards grown walnuts.

The Conants have farmed for four generations in Rio Oso, six generations in California, and were actually one of the first settling families in America to begin farming nearly 400 years ago!

Roger Conant immigrated to the New World, arriving in Plymouth Colony in 1624. He has been called the first Governor of the Massachusetts, having been appointed by the Crown. Roger is credited with establishing the communities of Salem, Peabody, Beverly and Danvers, Massachusetts. He built the first Salem house on what is now Essex Street, opposite the Town Market. In 1630 he was chosen as a voting stockholder of the Massachusetts Bay Company. He was one of the first two Salem representatives to the colony's general

court and was repeatedly elected a selectman by the people of Salem.

Numerous generations later, in 1873 after serving in the Civil War, Timothy Conant III moved from farming in the Midwest to California and began farming in the Santa Clara Valley. His son, Ernest W., continued farming and served as Santa Clara County Treasurer from 1902 until his death in 1934.

Ernest L., Ernest W.'s eldest son, graduated from Davis, married Gertrude and bought the original 60 acres in Rio Oso in 1921 from the Natomas Company for \$50/acre. 50 plus years of hydraulic mining near the land had left it overgrown but deposited with soils ideal for orchards. Mules and back power cleared the land for the first crop of peaches and the original four room home. Over time, oak root fungus took its toll, and walnuts replaced the peaches.

Linda Property Purchased for New Zero-Emission Bus Facility

MARYSVILLE, CA (MPG) - YUBA-Sutter Transit took a major step toward the construction of the Next Generation Transit Maintenance, Operations and Administration Facility by completing the purchase of a 19.7-acre property at 6035 Avondale Avenue in Linda. A new facility is needed as the agency's existing undersized and functionally obsolete facility in Marysville will not allow the agency to meet state requirements to purchase zero-emission buses. After an extensive public process and exhaustive analysis by an international planning and engineering consultant, the Yuba-Sutter Transit Board of Directors selected the top-ranked site from among 16 identified sites located throughout the bi-county area. The vacant former industrial

site was purchased at a cost of \$899,900 using available state funding.

Two major factors are driving both the need and timing of this purchase along with the development of a new transit facility. First, California now requires that 25 percent of all new buses purchased after 2025 be zero-emission (battery electric or hydrogen fuel cell electric) and this increases to 100 percent after 2028. An analysis of Yuba-Sutter Transit's current Marysville facility revealed that it had the space and power capacity for just 12 battery electric buses - less than a quarter of the 51-bus fleet now being operated.

Second, and even more near term, the State Route 70 Binney Junction Roadway and Complete Streets Project is expected to significantly impact Yuba-Sutter Transit's existing facility if not render

it useless by 2025. This fully funded \$111 million Caltrans project will result in the widening of the highway (B Street) in front of the existing facility and the realignment and replacement of the railroad overpasses just north and south of the facility.

Addressing these factors through the siting and development of an environmentally-forward purpose-built facility will allow Yuba-Sutter Transit to continue serving the community for decades to come. As envisioned, the new facility will be designed specifically for the maintenance and operation of zero-emission vehicles of all kinds to allow for the introduction of new technologies and service delivery options to maximize the community benefit of public transportation while minimizing any environmental impact. In addition, the new facility

site has the space to include the necessary power generation, storage and charging capacity to be largely self-sufficient and the development of the abandoned and long-neglected Avondale site will by itself benefit the community.

Toward that end, at their July 15th meeting, the Yuba-Sutter Transit Board of Directors took the initiative to adopt a policy statement committing to the 100 percent conversion to zero-emission buses by 2035, well in advance of the statewide goal of 2040. This policy is contingent upon the availability of sufficient funding to construct the new zero-emission transit facility by 2025, as well as to finance the incremental cost of all replacement and expansion buses that may be purchased thereafter. This focus on meeting or exceeding the state zero-emission bus purchase

YSEDC Initiates Economic Recovery and Resilience Strategy

YUBA-SUTTER REGION, CA (MPG) - YSEDC received CARES ACT funding from the Department of Commerce Economic Development Administration to develop and initiate a Pandemic Economic Recovery and Resilience Strategy for the two-county region. A Request for Proposal (RFP) was sent to 20 consulting firms, and six responded to the RFP.

The International Sustainable Resilience Center, Inc. (ISRC), a New Orleans, LA based not-for-profit corporation that specializes in economic recovery and resilience strategic action agendas, has been selected to develop and provide implementation guidance for the strategy.

ISRC has developed a unique approach to post-pandemic and post-disaster economic recovery and resilience that focuses on a holistic approach to determine impacts on the societal, community, and business sectors. Then, working hand in hand with stakeholders in the region, ISRC develops strategies, along with specific actions to quickly move them into implementation. In addition, ISRC has created and will administer a proprietary economic resilience scorecard that provides communities in the region with a self-assessment and guidance to increase their ability to better withstand, and more effectively recover from, future incidents of all types.

The strategy will be developed over the next twenty-two weeks and will include a variety of public participation opportunities. YSEDC will oversee the planning process, with guidance from a strategy committee comprised of local stakeholders. The final strategy will guide the region toward actions to increase economic resilience while charting a path for continued economic recovery for Yuba and Sutter counties.

IRS Refunds Nearly \$4 Million for Unemployment Compensation Overpayments

WASHINGTON D.C. (MPG) - The Internal Revenue Service began another round of refunds to nearly 4 million taxpayers who overpaid their taxes on unemployment compensation received last year.

The American Rescue Plan Act of 2021, which became law in March, excluded up to \$10,200 in 2020 unemployment compensation from taxable income calculations. The exclusion applied to individuals and married couples whose modified adjusted gross income was less than \$150,000.

Refunds by direct deposit began the week of July 14 and refunds by paper check began on July 16. The IRS previously issued refunds related to unemployment compensation exclusion in May and June, and it will continue to issue refunds throughout the summer.

To ease the burden on taxpayers, the IRS has been reviewing the Forms 1040 and 1040SR that were filed prior to the law's enactment to identify those people who are due an adjustment. For taxpayers who overpaid, the IRS will either refund the overpayment, apply it to other outstanding taxes or other federal or state debts owed.

For this round, the IRS identified approximately 4.6 million taxpayers who may be due an adjustment. Of that number, approximately 4 million taxpayers are expected to receive a refund. The refund average is \$1,265, which means some will receive more and some will receive less.

Most taxpayers need not take any action and there is no need to call the IRS. However, if, as a result of the excluded unemployment compensation, taxpayers are now eligible for deductions or credits not claimed on the original return, they should file a Form 1040-X, Amended U.S.

Individual Income Tax Return.

Taxpayers should file an amended return if they:

Did not submit a Schedule 8812 with the original return to claim the Additional Child Tax Credit and are now eligible for the credit after the unemployment compensation exclusion;

Did not submit a Schedule EIC with the original return to claim the Earned Income Tax Credit (with qualifying dependents) and are now eligible for the credit after the unemployment compensation exclusion;

Are now eligible for any other credits and/or deductions not mentioned below. Make sure to include any required forms or schedules.

Taxpayers do not need to file an amended return if they:

Already filed a tax return and did not claim the unemployment exclusion; the IRS will determine the correct taxable amount of unemployment compensation and tax;

Have an adjustment, because of the exclusion, that will result in an increase in any non-refundable or refundable credits reported on the original return;

Did not claim the following credits on their tax return but are now eligible when the unemployment exclusion is applied: Recovery Rebate Credit, Earned Income Credit with no qualifying dependents or the Advance Premium Tax Credit. The IRS will calculate the credit and include it in any overpayment;

Filed a married filing joint return, live in a community property state, and entered a smaller exclusion amount than entitled on Schedule 1, line 8.

Taxpayers will generally receive letters from the IRS within 30 days of the adjustment, informing them of what kind of adjustment was made (such as refund, payment of IRS debt payment or payment offset for other authorized debts) and the amount of the adjustment. ★

requirement will increase the positive environmental impact of the new facility even sooner.

Now that the site has been purchased, the next step is to begin accumulating the necessary funding to design and construct what is expected to be a \$40 million facility. This process is already well underway as a funding plan was included with the site analysis and initial discretionary federal

and state grant applications valued at a combined \$28.5 million are now pending. Additional grant applications from several sources are expected to be submitted this fall. Design, engineering, and construction of the new facility will start when the necessary funds have been secured.

Ernest L. and Gertrude had two children, Ernest Roger, nicknamed “Bud”, and Joy. Unfortunately, Joy was killed in an automobile accident during the great flood of 1955. Bud attended Annapolis Naval Academy and served in WWII and Korea. Bud met fellow naval officer, Ann, in an officer’s club in Japan during the Korean war. Bud ended his service with the rank of Commander and Ann as a 1st Lieutenant.

Bud and Ann had five children, all of whom attended the 100-year celebration event, Ernest A. of Folsom, Joe of Wheatland, Tim of Hidden Valley Lake, Mat of Rio Oso, and Lisa of Folsom. Mat now continues the operation along with his wife Lorene and son Matthew, rounding out the 6th generation farming in California.

The original home built by Ernest L. and Gertrude in 1921 still remains, having undergone major renovations in 1938 and again by Mat and Lorene in 1991.

Conant Orchards now owns or operates approximately 600 acres of walnuts in the Rio Oso area, and includes a walnut huller and dryer facility, and a custom harvesting, hulling and drying operation for various customers.

For decades, Conant Orchards has partnered with the University of California Cooperative Extension on research and rootstock trials, with the goal to help other farmers implement more-efficient growing methods.

In the 1990’s, a far

superior performing walnut tree was discovered in a very challenging replant site at Conant Orchards. This original “mother” tree, now branded the Grizzly Clonal Walnut Rootstock, is currently being laboratory cloned and field planted. The Grizzly rootstock has become the first ever walnut rootstock cloned due to superior performance in a commercial orchard, and the first walnut rootstock observed with a variety on it for 20 years.

Mat Conant served on the Yuba-Sutter Farm Bureau board for over 30 years, the California Farm Bureau board, and

numerous school and water boards. Mat is currently serving his second term as Sutter County’s elected 5th District Supervisor, and continuing the tradition of farming and public service that original colonist, Roger Conant, started in America nearly 400 years ago.

YCUSD Superintendent’s Letter Regarding the Mask Mandate

Dear YCUSD Families and Community,

The Centers for Disease Control (CDC) released its updated recommendations for K-12 schools on July 9, 2021. The California Department of Public Health (CDPH) issued their Guidance for California K-12 Schools on July 12, 2021. The CDPH’s document takes the CDC’s recommendations and tailors them for California to help our schools formulate and implement plans for a safe, and successful school year of full in-person instruction. The fundamental principle of the CDPH’s guidance is that “all students must have access to safe and full in-person instruction and to as much instructional time as possible.” Click here to view the CDPH’s COVID-19 Public Health Guidance for K-12 Schools in California, 2021-22 School Year.

Both the CDC and CDPH agree that facial coverings are one of the most effective and simple ways to prevent in-school transmission of COVID-19; therefore, for the 2021-2022 school year, facial coverings will be required for all YCUSD TK-12th grade students when indoors and on the bus, unless a medical exemption has been provided. Staff will be required to wear a facial covering when indoors with students. Facial coverings will be optional when outdoors.

We understand that the CDC and CDPH’s current guidance may impact your decision about how your student returns to school. Please be aware that facial covering mandates have changed over the recent weeks and are likely to change in the future; therefore, our District is offering

two instructional options for our families: full in-person instruction at your student’s school, or independent study through Yuba City Independence Academy (YCIA). The independent study program will provide live instruction (interaction between the student and teacher, either in person or in the form of internet/telephonic communication) and/or synchronous instruction (classroom-style instruction, small group, and/or one-on-one instruction delivered in person or in the form of internet/telephonic communication) depending on your student’s grade level. When not engaged in live or synchronous instruction, YCIA students will work independently at home.

If you would like to register your student for the YCIA independent study program, please click here, and complete the registration form available through July 26, 2021. If you would like to request a parent/student conference meeting before enrolling in YCIA, please contact Assistant Superintendent Pam Aurangzeb at (530) 822-7611. If you enroll in YCIA and determine that you would like to return to your student’s school of residence, the District will re-enroll your student for full in-person instruction within five (5) days of your request.

The District is prepared to meet the needs of your student based upon your decision for full in-person instruction or independent study. We look forward to a safe and productive 2021-2022 school year.

Could Crime Surge Push Newsom Recall?

Those who want voters to recall Gov. Gavin Newsom joined crime victim advocates at the state Capitol last Tuesday to accuse the governor of being too lenient on lawbreakers as the state experiences a new wave of crime.

They castigated him for unilaterally suspending executions of murderers and making it easier for felons to win release from state prisons.

“The thing that really alarms me about what the governor did, is that it’s a continuation of policies to undermine the criminal justice system, and to put dangerous people back out onto the streets,” said Marc Klaas, whose daughter, Polly, was murdered 25 years ago by a recently released felon. The killer, Richard Allen Davis, is one of 737 murderers benefiting from Newsom’s death penalty suspension.

A few hours later, Newsom’s office announced that he would hold a press conference in Los Angeles Wednesday “on state action to address crime and reduce retail theft in communities across California.”

Newsom devoted much of the event to signing

Assembly Bill 331, which extends an effort to crack down on organized shoplifting that has plagued California retailers in recent months. But he attributed the sharp increase in violent crime, particularly murders, to “a proliferation of guns on our streets” and noted that “There is not a state that’s been spared.”

The back-to-back events imply that crime may be a new front in the recall campaign and that Newsom feels the need to defend himself.

“In 2020, California saw a troubling rise of more than 500 homicides, the largest jump in state history since record-keeping began in 1960,” the Public Policy Institute of California says in a recent report. “Victims were predominantly Black and Latino, male, and killed by guns on our streets, parking lots, or in vehicles.”

Newsom’s comments about “a proliferation of guns on our streets” echoes declarations by gun control advocates that California’s surge of homicides results from a big jump in gun ownership. Californians legally bought a record 686,435 handguns in 2020 – a nearly 66% increase from the year before – and sales of rifles and shotguns also shot upward.

However, Newsom and other gun control advocates offer no proof of the connection. In fact, a new study by University of California-Davis researchers found no evidence that increases in legal gun sales resulted in more violent crime, seemingly refuting Newsom’s assertion.

“Nationwide, firearm

purchasing and firearm violence increased substantially during the first months of the coronavirus pandemic,” the study by UCD’s Violence Prevention Research Program, concluded. “At the state level, the magnitude of the increase in purchasing was not associated with the magnitude of the increase in firearm violence.”

“Results suggest much of the rise in firearm violence during our study period was attributable to other factors, indicating a need for additional research,” the researchers added.

A more likely scenario is that Californians are buying more guns because their fears of becoming violent crime victims have increased. In recent weeks, the residents of three Northern California homes, one in Solano County and two in Stanislaus County, have shot and killed violent home invaders.

The surge in crime, both violent assaults and thefts, is real. The videos of brazen daylight raids on pharmacies and other stores, particularly in San Francisco, by thieves unafraid of either arrest or prosecution, have become cable television and YouTube staples.

While rising crime might not sink Newsom in the recall election a few weeks hence, if it continues to rise, he could feel the backlash when he runs for re-election in 2022.

DWR to Use Airborne Technology

SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) - The California Department of Water Resources (DWR) is using an innovative, helicopter-based technology to gather information about the state’s groundwater aquifer structure to support drought response and the implementation of the Sustainable Groundwater Management Act (SGMA).

DWR’s use of airborne electromagnetic (AEM) surveys advances Governor Newsom’s Water Resilience Portfolio goal of using technology to support the State’s understanding of groundwater resources.

“The data collected during these surveys will provide a better understanding of California’s groundwater systems, and in turn support more informed and sustainable groundwater management and drought preparedness and response approaches,” said Steven Springhorn, DWR’s SGMA Technical Assistance Manager.

Beginning this month, DWR will conduct AEM surveys of groundwater basins in the Salinas Valley, Paso Robles and Cuyama Valley. During the surveys, a low-flying

helicopter tows a large hoop with scientific equipment approximately 100 feet above the ground surface. The helicopter, flown by experienced and licensed pilots, will make several passes over the survey areas and may be visible to residents.

Surveys will be conducted over the next several years in high- and medium-priority groundwater basins around the state, where data collection is feasible.

Survey data creates an image of the subsurface down to a depth of about 1,000 feet below ground surface and provides information about large-scale aquifer structures and geology. This information supports the implementation of local groundwater sustainability plans (GSPs), which can help local agencies sustainably manage groundwater during drought. Governor Signs Budget Bill Supportive of Small Business

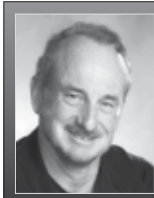
SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) - The state’s leading small-business association today recognized Gov. Gavin Newsom for signing Assembly Bill 150, which contains a new elective tax for pass-through entities that is a way for smaller businesses to work around the State and Local Tax (SALT) caps slapped on them by the 2017 Tax Cuts and Jobs Act.

“We appreciate the governor for providing a mechanism that will assist Main Street businesses,” said John Kabateck, California state director for the National Federation of Independent Business (NFIB), the state and nation’s leading small-business association. “Those businesses that are structured as pass-through entities will now enjoy a favorable tool when filing taxes. Small

businesses could use more direct relief from their government after a year of statewide closures, but are thankful for this recognition. Operators of small businesses are a resilient bunch and are happy to get back to normal after a very bleak 2020.”

How High Can It Go?

From the March 2020 “CoVid” low of the Dow 18,000’s, the index has recently breached the 34,000 level.

3,000 more points on the Dow (DJIA) would make a double. Considering the massive damage done to world economies from the imposed shutdowns on both business and travel, the possibility that the Dow would reach such a milestone so soon is indeed perplexing, if not outright bordering on the unbelievable.

Gaining 3000 more points is not a given by any stretch, but the fact that the Dow is even close to a double in the face of such economic calamity begs some sort of explanation.

Analysts everywhere have opined on just why and how the incredible rally in stocks has occurred given the circumstances. We can comfortably conclude we will never know the exact reasons for the astonishing increase in stocks. The cross currents of markets and the aggregate whims of investor sentiment can never be scientifically explained, hence the reason economics is a more a study of sociology than of science.

The difference being a scientific conclusion can be replicated and its equations categorized, while markets movements are just the sum of investor beliefs and whims at any given time. As such, nothing concrete can ever be concluded where the human psyche is involved.

The next question is just how high can this market go.

No one can say how high it might go, how long it might take, or how low it might fall to, or if anything happens at all.

Whatever direction the markets do end up going will solely depend on the sum of all the beliefs and subsequent actions of the billions of players in it. As such, forecasting market direction is akin to knowing the exact path a leaf will take during a windstorm, which is an exercise in futility.

Keeping this fact in mind, investors can take a variety of actions in their portfolios:

1. Do nothing (hold their positions whatever happens)
2. Sell all their positions immediately
3. Sell a portion of their positions immediately
4. Sell all or a portion of their positions if and when prices hit a predetermined point
5. Buy more positions at a predetermined point
6. Buy opposing positions in an attempt to hedge (counter balance the account, keeping in mind it may not be possible to achieve a counter balance due to the

nature of markets)

In my experience, many investors and advisors opt for #1. Moreover, I can comfortably say the majority of economic news outlets lean into the same. In other words, “hold for the long term”.

Past readers of Money Matters know I am not a wholehearted supporter of hold for the long term for a variety of reasons:

1. I do not know how much “long” I have left in my “term”, and truthfully, neither does anyone else.
2. Hold for the long term assumes markets always come back. Based on the advisor restriction from authorities that a licensed advisor can never guarantee markets movements of ANY kind, the statement speaks for itself. Never say never. Markets may always come back, until they don’t.
3. The pain and stress of a severe market crash can be excruciating. That translates to “unhealthy”, and during extreme crashes, that can be detrimental to one’s health and wellbeing, and possibly even one’s life.
4. Buy low and sell high is an old market adage. It isn’t “Ride ‘em wherever they go.” I will leave it to the imagination as to how that applies. Buying stocks when they are all beat up and riding them higher means profits. You can’t do that without dry powder.

Much like leaving a slot machine when you have lost enough money, my strategies center around #4, and that is simply knowing when to get out of dodge. Consider selling at least some of your holdings if things get ugly to lessen the pain, and make that decision before hand and stick to it.

In other words, leaving the casino when you have lost enough money, rather than to keep pulling the handle, all while watching your bank account dissolve into the nothingness of a market crash.

Farmers Markets Slowly Rebound in Uncertain Comeback

California’s farmers markets are facing challenges, even as produce shoppers are returning after easing of pandemic restrictions. Foot traffic remains light at many urban markets as the flow of office workers remains down due to employees still working from home. Some markets remain closed and others – like the Ferry Plaza Farmers Market in San Francisco – are climbing back toward near-normal traffic levels.

Drought, Winds Yield Smaller Avocados

Avocados from California are smaller this year and the seasonal harvest is expected to be down by as much as 30 percent in total pounds. According to the California Avocado Commission, that’s the result of low rainfall totals over the last few years. Another factor is Santa Ana winds that struck avocado-growing regions in January. This year, growers are more likely to fill cartons with 60 smaller avocados rather than 48 larger ones.

November Temperature Swings Damage Walnut Groves

Wild temperature swings last fall are believed to be the cause of widespread freeze damage in California’s walnut groves. In early November, temperatures dropped from 80 degrees to below freezing in several areas. Freeze damage, observed this spring, is most severe in Butte, Glenn and Tehama counties and is also reported in Lake, San Joaquin, Stanislaus, Yolo and Yuba counties. Before the freeze, walnut production had been steadily increasing.

Agriculture Coalition Seeks Federal Water System Upgrades

A coalition of western farmers, ranchers, water providers and farm communities is urging the U.S. Senate to pass legislation to upgrade aging water infrastructure. The California Farm Bureau joined with more than 200 organizations in seeking more than \$14 billion in water storage and conveyance projects and related construction as part of President Biden’s jobs and economic recovery plan. ★

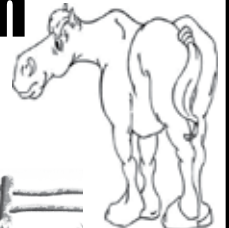
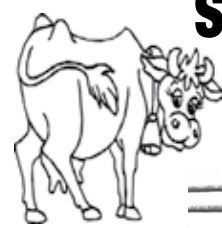

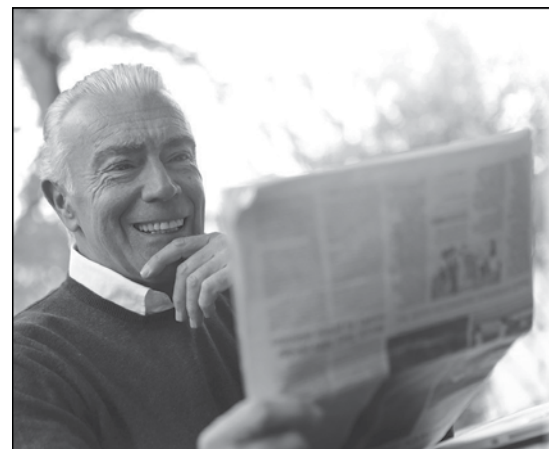

This Month In Your Garden

The month of August is a month of maintenance and also planning for fall planting. Trees in particular are best planted in the fall. Where, after the heat of the summer would be a good spot for a shade tree? Shade trees cool your property and your home. Make your plans fall planting. It will be here before you know it. While you are planning and doing maintenance, be sure to keep things watered, keep weeds at bay and flowering plants dead headed, lawns mowed. Add mulch where needed if it is starting to get thin. Mulching will keep your trees and shrubs healthy through the heat and will require less water to be used. Put 3" of mulch around trees and in garden beds. Keep the mulch 3'-6" away from the trunk of trees when you apply it and put a ring out 3' or more for larger trees.

Your vegetable garden still requires considerable attention. The ripened fruit needs to be harvested regularly to keep it coming through the summer and into the fall. Keeping an attentive eye on the plants in order to keep them insect free is needed to maintain healthy, productive plants. If you have pumpkins and/or melons in your garden, don't let them lie on soil that is wet from irrigating – either move them (without detaching them), to a nearby spot that doesn't get wet, or place a board or anything else that will keep the underside dry so the outside rind won't spoil and possibly rot. Apply vegetable food once a month to keep the plants green and productive. The fertilizer should not be higher in nitrogen – the first number – than in the other two. Nitrogen creates lots of green growth, but does not contribute much toward creating fruit, Phosphorus and Potassium are needed for that. Most citrus fruit ripens sometime near the winter months, and citrus trees require regular fertilizing to bear fruit. Use a formula specifically for citrus and apply it as directed on the container, which is usually, but not necessarily, every three months. If the leaves are yellowish with the veins green, they need iron. If

you have fruit trees, any fallen and possible rotting fruit should be raked up and disposed of so that it doesn't invite wild critters and because the rotting fruit can create an unpleasant odor and might harbor some harmful fungi. Keep up with the deep watering and mulching around your trees until the weather cools and we get rain.

Crape myrtle bushes or trees are lovely and are available in several colors. They can be encouraged to re-bloom by cutting off the spent flower heads. When the flowers are gone they begin making round seeds. Just cut that sprig off and usually more blooms will come. Dead heading is definitely needed to keep roses blooming. The spent bloom should be clipped off next to the nearest three leaf leaflet. That leaflet should be growing toward the outer edge of the plant, rather than toward the center of the plant. If dead heading is not done, they will form the round "Rose Hips". Since the hips are the seed pod for roses, they have done their duty for the year and they are ready to rest! This is true for most plants, but we keep interfering with their work by trimming off the bloom that would otherwise create seeds to carry on the species, so they bloom again in an effort to perpetuate their species. Nature is amazing!

Perennials can be planted now. Many will give you late blooms now and some may not, but they should all provide color in the yard next spring and summer. They can be done from cuttings, too. It is a good idea to put some kind of identification near it since it will die back and it can easily be lost in the midst of other sprouting plants next spring.

Disease Outbreak Strikes California Deer Herds

SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) - The California Department of Fish and Wildlife (CDFW) has confirmed outbreaks of adenovirus hemorrhagic disease in deer in several northern California counties and is asking California residents to help curb the spread by not feeding wild animals, and report potential cases to the department.

“Providing attractants for deer – food, salt licks or even water – is against the law for good reason,” said Dr. Brandon Munk, senior wildlife veterinarian with CDFW’s Wildlife Investigations Laboratory. “Because these artificial attractants can congregate animals and promote the spread of disease, it’s particularly imperative to leave wildlife alone during an outbreak. There is no cure or vaccine for this disease, so our best management strategies right now are to track it carefully, and to take

preventative measures to limit the spread.”

Beginning in May, CDFW began receiving increased reports of mortality in deer, both free-ranging and at fawn rehabilitation facilities. With the assistance of wildlife rehabilitation facilities and the California Animal Health and Food Safety Laboratory, CDFW confirmed cervid adenovirus 1 (CdAdV-1) as the cause of hemorrhagic disease outbreaks this year in Kern, Napa and Nevada counties.

The disease is typically fatal to young deer, particularly fawns, and can be spread by animals in close contact with each other. The virus is not known to affect people, pets or domestic livestock.

CdAdV-1 was the cause of a 1993-1994 outbreak of hemorrhagic disease in black tailed deer and mule deer that spanned at least 18 California counties. Since then, CdAdV-1 has been identified as the cause of sporadic, often widespread, outbreaks of hemorrhagic disease in

California and other western states. Deer fawns are at greatest risk, with high rates of mortality following infection. Yearlings and adult deer are more resistant but mortalities in these age groups occur as well. Outbreaks can be widespread and may have significant impact on affected deer populations.

Affected deer are often found dead without any obvious symptoms. They may be found near water. Sick animals may have excessive salivation (drooling or foaming at the mouth), diarrhea, regurgitation or seizures.

In addition to removing food and other attractants, Californians can help wildlife veterinarians track and study the disease by reporting sightings of sick or dead deer. Anyone who observes a deer exhibiting symptoms, or encountering a deer that has died from unknown causes, can submit the information to CDFW through the department’s online mortality reporting system. ★

BARC is Back at SMF

- After an 18-month hiatus, the BARC team is back at Sacramento International Airport (SMF). These special pups’ friendly faces and “Pet Me” vests are relieving the stress of travel for many passengers. The program was halted due to the pandemic, but as of July 7, the dogs are making a comeback.

RC – short for the Boarding Area Relaxation Corps – greets guests once they pass through security, with big smiles and wagging tails. Studies show spending time with dogs can reduce blood pressure and anxiety while boosting feelings of relaxation and well-being. Traveling can be stressful for some people – from a fear of flying to worrying about delays or cancellations – BARC dogs provide a furry dose of relief.

Rose Margolis and Sophie, a Cavalier King Charles Spaniel, have been with the program since the beginning. She was looking for a fun activity to do with her

dogs and wanted something interactive that gave them both a way to meet people. She knows Sophie helps those who are nervous about flying.

“A little girl was completely terrified and wouldn’t stop crying until she laid down with Sophie,” Margolis said. “She was so much more relaxed, and we love being able to see that.”

Jennifer Baer-Riedhart and Logan, a Great Pyrenees with soulful eyes, is a big hit with even the littlest passengers – even though he’s much bigger than they are.

“When he lays down the little ones like to lay on him,” Jennifer said. “He is so happy to be here with all the people. I’m so glad we’re back.”

Colbert, a 14-year-old black Lab, was one of the first dogs in the program and is nearing retirement. He is happy to pose for photos and get in a few snuggles with adults and kids before they head off to their gate. His handler, Jenniene Cheng says the BARC team helps create a sense of security.

“People stop to pet the dogs and then start up conversations and share stories

about their dogs,” she said. “It’s a great way to put people at ease.”

BARC dogs have been lifting spirits and calming nerves at SMF since 2015. There are now 27 BARC teams making travel a little less “ruff” in both Terminal A and B.

“The BARC teams make the airport experience less stressful and more fun,” said Cindy Nichol, Director of Airports for Sacramento County. “Travel can be a hectic experience and with these friendly faces around, passengers can’t help but stop, take a breath and relax before continuing their journey.”

They’ll be at SMF on Mondays, Wednesdays, and first and third Fridays. Each dog and its handler are part of the Lend A Heart Animals Assisted Therapy organization, a Sacramento-area non-profit, founded in 1987, provides animal-assisted therapy throughout the region. The organization also has additional teams that visit hospitals, nursing homes and libraries.

“There’s nothing better than seeing all these smiling faces,” said Cheng. ★

CDFW Reminds Big Game Hunters to Test Deer, Elk for CWD

California Department of Fish and Wildlife

SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) - With California’s Big Game Drawing complete and big game hunters planning in state and out of state hunting trips this fall, the California Department of Fish and Wildlife (CDFW) reminds hunters once again to be vigilant in helping to keep Chronic Wasting Disease (CWD) out of California.

CWD is a fatal neurological disease of deer, elk, moose and reindeer. It has been detected in captive or free-ranging deer in 26 states and two Canadian provinces. The disease spreads through contact with infected animals, tissues and environments. CDFW has been testing and monitoring for CWD in California deer and elk herds for more than 20 years with no detections to date.

“Our big game hunters have been incredible partners in this effort and should be proud,” said Dr. Brandon Munk, CDFW wildlife veterinarian. “The potential for this deadly disease to spread to California remains very real. We all need to remain vigilant and adhere to CWD best practices. That includes testing harvested animals, following safety recommendations when cleaning and handling game, knowing and abiding by state regulations when transporting harvested deer or elk meat into California from out of state.”

Get Your Animals Tested

CDFW will once again staff voluntary CWD sampling and hunter check stations throughout the state during upcoming deer seasons. At these locations, hunters can have their deer tag validated while contributing to CWD surveillance. A list of sampling locations and dates will be available at CDFW’s CWD web page. If hunting out of state, be sure to check with that state’s wildlife agency for any mandatory CWD testing or handling requirements in the area you will be hunting. Some states may restrict the movement of an animal carcass or other parts in CWD zones. CDFW recommends testing any deer or elk

harvested in a CWD-positive area, whether there is a mandatory test requirement or not. Most states will have information on how to get a deer or elk tested for CWD. CDFW does not routinely test out of state animals.

Use Caution When Handling Game

Hunters are advised to wear gloves when field dressing and processing their animals. A best practice to prevent the movement of CWD is to bone out meat from harvested animals, leaving brain, spinal cord, eyes, spleen and lymph nodes where the animal was harvested. Hunters should wash hands and instruments thoroughly after field dressing and avoid eating meat from sick or CWD-positive animals.

Report Sick Animals

Report any deer or elk exhibiting abnormal signs via CDFW’s online Mortality Reporting system.

Know the Laws When Bringing Deer or Elk into California

The California Code of Regulations, Title 14, Section 712 governs the importation of hunter-harvested deer and elk into California. It is unlawful to import, or possess any hunter harvested deer or elk (cervid) carcass or parts of any cervid carcass imported into the state, except for the following body parts:

Portions of meat with no part of the spinal column, brain or head attached (other bones, such as legs and shoulders, may be attached); Hides and capes (no spinal column, brain tissue or head may be attached); Clean skull plates (no brain tissue may be present) with antlers attached; Antlers with no meat or tissue attached, except legally harvested and possessed antlers in the velvet stage are allowed, if no meat, brain or other tissue is attached; Finished taxidermy mounts with no meat or tissue attached (antlers in the velvet stage are allowed if no meat, brain or other tissue is attached); Upper canine teeth (buglers, whistlers, ivories).
