Breakaway Roping Comes to the Stonyford Rodeo

STONYFORD, CA (MPG) -

Women's Professional Rodeo Association (WPRA) Breakaway Roping will be added to this year's Stonyford Rodeo, which will be a three-day outing on April 30, May 1, and 2, 2021.

Breakaway Roping is similar to regular calf roping, except that the calf is not thrown and tied. In this event, the contestant's rope-end is tied to the saddle horn with light string. Once the calf is roped and the horse has made a quick stop, the calf continues until the rope breaks away and signals the end of the run. A white flag is affixed to the end of the rope tied to the rider's saddle horn, which lets the timer easily see and record the breakaway time. The roper with the quickest time is the winner.

County Clears Way for **Affordable** Housing

YUBA COUNTY, CA (MPG)

- A five-year effort to construct a 41-unit permanent supportive housing apartment and a 108-unit family apartment complex in West Linda took a giant stride forward, with the Board of Supervisors recently approving the sale of county-owned land to the Regional Housing Authority's respective limited partnerships.

The two planned projects - part of a partnership between the County, the Housing Authority, and Pacific West Communities Inc. - will begin construction in late spring in an area between Cedar Lane Elementary School and Feather River Boulevard.

Yuba County Community Development and Services Agency also secured grant funding for roadway improvements to include curbs, gutters, and sidewalks, as well as the addition of bike lanes, for streets surrounding the Cedar Lane property. The two Regional Housing Authority projects plus the county road improvements together represent a total investment of \$57 million in the West Linda community.


Historically, California counties have struggled to meet affordable housing requirements established by the state. The approved project creates housing opportunities for individuals and families earning up to 60 percent of the Area Medium Income (a oneperson household with an income of no more than \$29,400). The Cedar Lane Project helps the County move closer to meeting the affordable housing construction requirements.

Here is a breakdown of notable actions related to this project:

Yuba County acquired a 13.7-acre property south of Cedar Lane Elementary School in 2016. The property's location to existing public sewer and water services, public transportation and proximity to the elementary school made it an ideal property for affordable housing.

In partnership with Regional Housing Authority, Yuba County Community Development and Services Agency secured \$7.2 million in grant funding in for road improvement projects for all surrounding streets (Alicia Avenue, Garden Avenue, Cedar Lane, and Feather River Boulevard), with construction expected to start this spring. Gallagher Statement on Wildfire Package, **Newsom Visit to Butte**

SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) Assemblyman James Gallagher (R-Yuba City) issued the following statement in reaction to Governor Gavin Newsom signing the wildfire legislation into law and touring wildfire preparedness work in Butte County:

"I'm glad that the Governor is taking a tour in Butte County today to learn directly from experts on the ground about wildfire prevention. Specifically, I hope that he learns more about how environmental red tape (CEQA) held up a critical

fuel reduction project in Berry Creek before the area was savaged by the North Complex fire last year. If the Governor is serious about solutions, he could support my legislation to remove roadblocks like this that stop critical fire prevention projects.

The legislation being signed today, while significant, is unfortunately not enough to address the urgent crisis of fuels buildup in our wildlands. Here is the breakdown:

\$125 million in the package is really just a payback for money that was supposed to be allocated to forestry management last year. This isn't 'new' money for fire prevention.

Approximately \$188 million is new General Fund money for management practices including thinning, brush clearance and prescribed fire. This is a good development but nowhere near what is required to remove the fuel load that has built up after decades of doing nothing. By comparison, my proposal in AB 297 would appropriate \$500 million.

Almost \$100 million is for State Parks, Fish & Wildlife and conservancies with no real guarantee that the money will go toward fuel reduction. Furthermore, it is focused on State owned lands, which represents only 3% of the lands with dangerous fuels.

So, in reality the wildfire package only allocates an additional \$188 million to forestry management practices. By contrast the Governor is proposing to spend \$1 billion building electric charging infrastructure, supported by a grid that is currently experiencing blackouts and sparking fires.

I'll leave it to you to determine if these are the right priorities."



HOPE for PTSD County Clears Way for Affordable Housing

Organizing needs; Prioritizing your schedule; Empowering your life.

Dr. Moore who practices at Downeast Wellness Holistic Health Services and treats many struggling with disorders besides PTSD says that "You don't have to be a slave to your stress. You don't have to be a slave to your condition. It's understanding that you have hope, or creating hope, or embracing hope, [it] means that you are seeing things from a different perspective. Ultimately, our happiness, our stress levels – it all depends on the mindset or the perception we have." A pivotal concept in her practice, she continues, "in mind-body medicine, our minds have the power to heal our bodies."

Many veterans suffering from mental health issues, MST (military sexual trauma) or PTSD express frustration with the "pop-a-pill, cure an ill" or traditional pharmaceutical approach of treating the sometimes severe physical and mental conditions manifest by those disorders. The Integrative Docs believe that "Medication is never a 1st choice," saying that "it removes

responsibility, accountability, and some of our constitutional freedoms." Dr. Matthews and Dr. Moore educate that although PTSD cannot be cured, it can be mitigated through neurolinguistic reprogramming, behavioral therapy, autonomic nervous system balancing therapy and coaching. They promote healthy diet, physical exercise, stretching and breathing exercises, along with holistic practices of using essential oils, acupuncture, mindfulness and more to

Ruscigno, who helped bring the Integrative Docs to the forum, has benefitted personally from the resources and information that is shared nationwide by Dr. Moore and Dr. Matthews. It has become a passion for her to spread this life-changing information to veterans and anyone struggling with mental or physical health issues that could benefit from it. "I believe the Integrative Docs message needs to get out. How many suicides prevented and lives-lived more fully?" she questioned. Ruscigno secured the Integrative Docs' expert advice with a personal financial donation, so that the nearly 60 veterans and the Feather River Tea Party Patriots in attendance at the PTSD Town Hall could benefit from the science.

The feedback from those in attendance was profound. Ruscigno shares that a woman, who asked to remain anonymous said, "the affirmation she got was both comforting and encouraging. Tears welled." Others in attendance reported they planned to get MRI's for diagnostic purposes as soon as possible. U.S. Navv Vet, Jonathan Bibbins said, "Awesome presentation. Bringing a conscience to the needs of veterans warriors is necessary." He ended with "I look forward to your next presentation."

will be the first ever curb, gutter and sidewalk project in West Linda and this is the start of the first ever storm drain system in West Linda.

Linda County Water District deferred \$403,940 for the permanent supportive housing deal, and \$648,744 for the family complex, with loan terms the same as the County loans (55-year, 3% simple interest, payments based on residual receipts).

In a series of motions, the Board and fee deferral loans totaling approximately \$2.6 million for the two projects. The collection of land sale proceeds, development impact and building permit fees will be deferred with 3% simple interest, paid back over a period of 55 years.

Oroville Resident Arrested for Selling Suspected Fentanyl

OROVILLE, CA (MPG) - On the evening of April 5, a minor victim called the Butte County Sheriff's Office (BCSO) and reported her three juvenile friends had overdosed on Xanax pills. BCSO deputies and medical personnel responded to a residence in the Palermo area and contacted three juvenile victims. The three juvenile victims were transported to a local hospital for treatment.

Over the past week detectives from the Felony Investigations Unit, Butte Interagency Narcotics Task Force, Special Enforcement Unit, and the Sheriff's Office Marine Unit conducted follow-up related to the aforementioned overdose. During the follow-up investigation, detectives inveniles overdosed on were Fentanyl.

On April 6, detectives served a search warrant Avenue in Palermo. During the service of the search warrant detectives obtained evidence related to this

investigation. On April 7, detectives identified the individual who sold the juveniles the suspected counterfeit Xanax pills as Knowa Massey, age 18, of Oroville.

On the evening of April 7, detectives, with assistance of the Oroville Police Department, served a search warrant at Massey's residence, which is located near the 100 block of Grand Avenue, Oroville. During the service of the search warrant, detectives located a large quantity of counterfeit Xanax pills that detectives suspect contain Fentanyl. Detectives also located cocaine and marijuana packaged for sale. During the subsequent investigation, detectives located additional evidence which confirmed Massey was the individual who sold determined the pills the the counterfeit Xanax pills to the inveniles. Detectives suspected counterfeit Xanax also located evidence asking anyone with addipills that likely contained Massey knew the pills he tional information about sold to the juveniles were extremely potent.

Massey was placed under at a residence on Baldwin arrest for the following felony counts: Possession of cocaine for sale, possession of a narcotic substance for sale, three counts of

child endangerment, selling a controlled substance to minor victims, committing felonies which caused great bodily injury, and a misdemeanor count of possession of marijuana for sale. Massey was booked into the Butte County Jail on the evening of April 7. Massey is scheduled to be arraigned at the Butte County Superior Court on

April 9, at 3 PM. The Butte County Sheriff's Office wants to remind the public that medications not obtained from legitimate pharmacists and illicit drugs like methamphetamine, marijuana, cocaine, and counterfeit pills can be laced with Fentanyl. Illicit drugs containing Fentanyl could result in death if ingested. Fentanyl, a synthetic opioid, can be up to 100 times more potent than morphine.

Commissioner sets out to Define Farmers' Insurance Gaps

With California farmers and ranchers finding increasing difficulty in purchasing wildfire insurance, the state insurance commissioner directed insurance companies Tuesday to provide data about the availability of commercial coverage for businesses including farms and ranches. The California Farm Bureau welcomed the action, saying it hoped the request from Insurance Commissioner Ricardo Lara will lead to more sustainable coverage for farmers and ranchers.

Water Shortages Stress Klamath Basin Farms

Farmers in the Klamath Basin expect to receive a water allocation this week from the U.S. Bureau of Reclamation-and all indications point to extreme shortage. Drought and regulations protecting fish species mean farmers may have little or no water from the federal Klamath Project. A leading farmer in the basin says this second dry year, combined with the COVID-19 pandemic, will have a "compounding effect" that will hit the community hard.

Grape Growers Face Drought, Wildfire Concerns

As grapevines along the North Coast begin pushing out new growth, farmers face the prospects of preparing for drought while trying to recover from wildfire. Farmers say they may have to reduce crops on some vines due to lack of rainfall, which one Napa County grower says would be a "bitter pill" after losing grapes to smoke exposure last year. Preseason work by farmers includes creating buffer zones to reduce the chance of wildfire spreading into vineyards.

Farmers Respond as Restaurants, Cafeterias Begin to Reopen

The gradual reopening of restaurants, schools and other facilities brings changes for farmers who had sold crops to foodservice outlets. Sales abruptly halted a year ago due to the pandemic. Many farmers shifted to sell subscription food boxes or other alternatives. Now, they're having to decide how strong those markets will remain when restaurants and cafeterias reopen. One farmer says "we all have to stay nimble" as markets adjust.

Chico Resident Arrested for Assault with a Deadly Weapon

BCSO Press Release

OROVILLE, CA (MPG) - On the morning of April 7, a victim called the Butte County Sheriff's Office (BCSO) and reported he was being held at gunpoint by a male later identified as William Hostetler, age 56, of Chico. The victim informed BCSO dispatch while attempting to access his property located near the 700 block of Potters Ravine Road, Oroville, Hostetler contacted the victim and pointed a firearm at him. While the victim was on the telephone with BCSO dispatch, the victim reported Hostetler used his vehicle to "ram" the victim's vehicle. Deputies arrived in the area, contacted the victim and located evidence which corroborated the victim's statements.

Deputies immediately began attempting to locate Hostetler. Around 12:20 p.m., deputies assigned to the Chico area located Hostetler at an apartment complex located in the 1600 block of Forest Avenue, Chico. Deputies contacted Hostetler and located evidence Hostetler had used his vehicle to "ram" the victim's vehicle. Deputies placed Hostetler under arrest.

While investigating the incident, deputies located multiple large marijuana grows near the 700 block of Potters Ravine Road. Detectives determined one of the marijuana grows belonged to Hostetler. Detectives obtained a search warrant for two parcels on Potters Ravine Road and

for Hostetler's apartment in Chico. Designated Area Deputies and detectives from the Felony Investigations

Unit, Special Enforcement Unit, and Butte Interagency Narcotics Task Force assisted with the service of the search warrants. During a search of the apartment, detectives located approximately eight firearms and numerous firearm parts. Two of the firearms were illegal assault rifles. Detectives also located approximately 100 bags of packaged marijuana and evidence of marijuana sales. During a search of the two parcels near the 700 block of Potters Ravine Road, detectives located approximately 3,000 marijuana plants and an additional firearm.

During the investigation, deputies and detectives obtained evidence Hostetler was involved in the illegal cultivation of marijuana. Detectives located evidence Hostetler recently began arguing with neighbors and other individuals who were cultivating marijuana in the area of Potters Ravine Road.


Based on the evidence obtained during the initial investigation, Hostetler was placed under arrest. Hostetler later posted bail. BCSO will be submitting the case against Hostetler to the District Attorney's Office for review for the following charges: A felony count of assault with a deadly weapon, a felony count of possession of assault weapons, misdemeanor counts of illegal cultivation of marijuana and possession of marijuana for sale, and a misdemeanor count of brandishing a firearm. The Sheriff's Office is asking anyone with additional information about this investigation to contact detectives at 530-538-7671.

Cause of Death Unknown for Suspect Barricaded in Attic

YUBA CITY, CA (MPG) - On April 19, 2021 at approximately 4:22 pm, Yuba City Police received a report of a family disturbance and violation of a restraining order in the 800 block of Spiva Ave., in Yuba City. Officers arrived on scene and contacted family members who were waiting outside. During the initial investigation it was determined the suspect, a male, 39 years of age from Yuba City was inside the residence armed with a hammer and being violent toward family members. The suspect could be seen damaging several items inside the residence by officers. The suspect was also throwing various household items out of the windows, forcing officers to back away from the residence. The suspect refused to exit the residence after several requests by officers. Crisis negotiators arrived on scene and attempted to talk with the suspect and de-escalate the situation to no avail.

The suspect is known to the Yuba City Police Department from several prior contacts and has several arrests for violent offenses. Based on the history of the suspect and being armed with a hammer, the Yuba-Sutter Regional SWAT Team

was activated. A search warrant and arrest warrant were authored and signed by a Sutter County Superior Court Judge. After several hours of attempted negotiations with the suspect it was determined he had barricaded himself in the attic of the residence. Chemical agents and less lethal munitions were deployed into the residence to get the suspect to surrender. The suspect did not surrender and the SWAT team entered the residence. The suspect was located inside the attic at approximately 8:10 pm and apprehended. No officers used firearms in this incident.

The suspect was provided medical aid on scene and transported to Rideout/ Adventist Hospital. After several hours of receiving medical treatment, the suspect was pronounced deceased. The cause of death is unknown pending an autopsy.

Per protocol, the investigation has been turned over to the Yuba-Sutter Regional Officer Involved Shooting Team due to the nature of this incident. The suspect is not being identified at this time based on notification of next of kin by the Sutter County Sheriff/Coroner. Based on the ongoing investigation, no further information is available at this time.

Two Sutter County Men Arrested for Homicide

SUTTER COUNTY, CA (MPG) -On March 6th, the Sutter County Sheriff's Office, with the assistance of the Yuba City Police Department, responded to a report of a shooting incident in the 1400 block of Countryside Dr. and Littlejohn Dr. Initial reports were that a vehicle pulled up to the side of the house and fired numerous rounds into the backyard of a residence, where a gathering was taking place. As a result of the investigation, 26-year-old Alex Rangel Romero and 20-year-old Miguel Angel Hernandez-Castro, both of Yuba City, were found deceased at the residence. Three additional victims were also injured and taken to Rideout Memorial Hospital for treatment of gunshot wounds.

On April 2nd, the may be forthcoming. Sheriff's Office received notification from the been working diligently Department of Justice regarding DNA profiles from evidence recovered at the scene of the shooting. The Sheriff's Office conducted additional follow up, and on

April 6th arrested 19-yearold Jorden McDaniel of Yuba City, 19-year-old Dominick Sanchez of Marysville, and 21-yearold Julio Nuno of Yuba City, for charges relating to firearms possession and participation in criminal street gang.

Additional DNA samples were obtained and further analyzed by the Department of Justice, directly linking McDaniel and Sanchez to evidence collected at the scene of the shooting.

McDaniel and Sanchez have been booked on additional charges of alleged 187 of the California Penal Code- Homicide. At least one of the firearms seized on April 6th is believed to be directly related to the shooting and is being examined further for ballistic comparisons. This investigation is still ongoing and additional charges

Shooting Incident Under Investigation

OLIVEHURST, CA. (MPG) -Yuba County Detectives are investigating a shooting that occurred on Wednesday 4/14/2021 at approximately 2:45 p.m., in the area of Beverly Drive and Ardmore Avenue in Olivehurst. Yuba County Sheriff's Dispatch Center collected for evidence. received several 911 calls reporting shots fired in lead to the identity of a the roadway with callers advising it appeared to be multiple teenage juveniles with several cars involved.

Deputies responded to the area to locate one vehicle allegedly involved in the shooting, a white Honda Accord, had crashed. Three teens from that vehicle remained in the

area and were later transported to a local hospital to be evaluated and treated for minor injuries sustained in the vehicle accident. It was determined that a fourth juvenile ran from that vehicle prior to deputies' arrival and was no longer at the scene. No victims of gunshot wounds were located; but bullet shell casings were found in the street and

Further investigation 14-year-old male juvenile suspect from Olivehurst who was arrested later that night for 246PC/Negligent Discharge of a Firearm and 245(a)(2)PC Assault with a Firearm. The case remains active and ongoing at this time, and we will update as further information becomes available.
