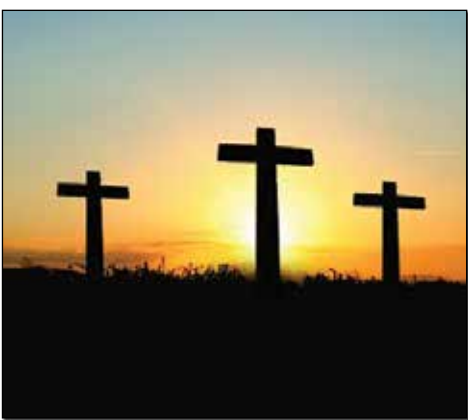

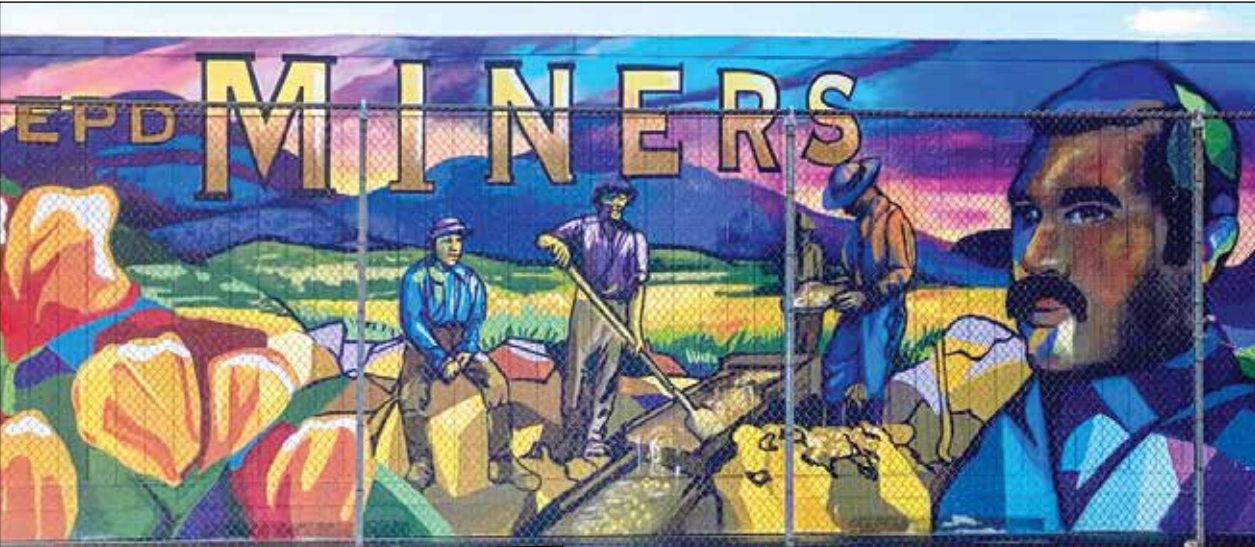

**MARYSVILLE, CA. (MPG)** - The Edward P. Duplex Continuation High School in Wheatland is a two-year-old institution dedicated to helping credit deficient students graduate. Pam Sullivan, an educator at the school, recently asked Yuba Sutter Arts & Culture if it would be able to support an arts education program at the school culminating in

YSAC has received several rounds of funding from the California Arts Council through its "Jump StArts" program to provide arts education for at risk and system engaged youth. In the past, it has paid for arts educators in various fields from poetry to visual arts and from ceramics to African drum and dance, at several schools including Albert Powell, Feather River Academy and South

Lindhurst High School.

Frequent YSAC collaborator and professional muralist, Madelyne Templeton, was hired to take the students through a guided process from the design phase up to and including the actual painting of the mural. She created classroom curriculum and took the students through a bit of art history from ancient rock wall painting to present day public art. YSAC invested over \$6,000 in the project from the Jump StArts grant and is waiting to learn if it will receive the grant once again for the next school year.

The mural is an homage to the community, the natural beauty of the region, local history and the diversity of people that have come together to settle in Yuba County. Featured prominently is Mr. Duplex who was from New Haven, Connecticut and came to California in 1854 to join the gold rush. He developed a successful barber shop business and was elected mayor of Wheatland in 1888.

**YUBA CITY, CA (MPG)** - After 27 years of law enforcement service in Yuba City, Police Chief Robert Landon will be hanging up his badge. Chief Landon announced his plans to retire on September 30, 2021.

Chief Landon joined the Yuba City Police Department in 1994. He rose through the ranks, holding positions of patrol officer, detective, sergeant, lieutenant, captain, deputy chief, SWAT commander, and in 2008, he became the Department's 13th Chief Officer.

"It has been my honor to serve the incredible community of Yuba City my entire law enforcement career," said Chief Landon. "I am blessed to have worked with so many talented and dedicated public servants."

Chief Landon is lauded for his involvement and outreach with schools, community groups and nonprofit organizations.

Chief Landon will be greatly missed," said Yuba City City Manager, Dave Vaughn. "He has rightly held our top law enforcement position for almost 13 years because of his servant leadership, approachability, professionalism and true love for our community."

Chief Landon is a U.S. Navy veteran who served more than 11 years onboard nuclear powered submarines during Operation Desert Storm and the Cold War. He holds a Bachelor of Science degree in Business Management and a Master of Science in Emergency Services Administration. He is a graduate of the West Point Leadership Academy, the FBI National Academy and the California Police Officers Standard and Training (POST) Management Course.

Along with multiple military awards and decorations, Landon possesses the Yuba City Police Department's Purple Heart, Distinguished Service Medal and Peace

## Three Fatalities Result from SR-70 Collision

**YUBA-SUTTER AREA, CA (MPG)** - On March 29, at 6:18 am, CHP Chico Communication Center received a call of a white Ford F250 driving recklessly (unable to maintain lanes and erratic speeds) traveling southbound SR-70 south of Lower Honcut

Road. At 6:21 am the white F250 while traveling southbound within the northbound lane, collided with a Ford Explorer traveling northbound SR-70 just north of Chandler Road. The impact caused the Ford Explorer to veer off the east shoulder where it overturned and caught fire. The F250 overturned in the northbound lane and impacted with a white Lexus RX350

that was traveling northbound SR-70.

Both drivers of the Ford F250 and the Ford Explorer sustained fatal injuries as a result of the collision and where pronounced deceased at the scene by paramedics. The driver of the Lexus was uninjured in the collision.

The use of alcohol and or drugs in this collision are unknown at this time. ★



# DWR Adjusts State Water Project Allocation Following Dry Winter

SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) - As California experiences a second consecutive dry year, the California Department of Water Resources (DWR) announced an adjustment to its initial State Water Project (SWP) allocation for the 2021 water year. The department now expects to deliver 5 percent of requested supplies this year, down from the initial allocation of 10 percent announced in December.

Initial allocations are based on conservative assumptions regarding hydrology and factors such as reservoir storage. Allocations are reviewed monthly and may change based on snowpack and runoff information. They are typically finalized by May.

“We are now facing the reality that it will be a second dry year for California and that is having a significant impact on our water supply,” said DWR Director Karla Nemeth. “The Department of Water Resources is working with our federal and state partners to plan for the impacts of limited water supplies this summer for agriculture as well as urban and rural water users. We encourage everyone to look for ways to use water efficiently in their everyday lives.”

Ongoing drought conditions require the coordination of federal, state and local agencies. Today, the U.S. Bureau of Reclamation, which operates the Central Valley Project, is also expected to adjust its initial CVP water supply allocation accordingly. The State Water Resources Control Board mailed early warning notices to approximately 40,000 water right holders urging them to plan for potential shortages by reducing water use and adopting practical conservation measures.

As a result of the persistent drought conditions, and in accordance with its permit for the long-term operation of the State Water Project, DWR has submitted a revised Drought Contingency Plan to the California Department of Fish and Wildlife. The plan provides updated hydrologic conditions and outlines areas of concern for the joint operations of the

State Water Project and the Central Valley Project, water quality, and environmental impacts.

DWR does not anticipate the need to pursue a Temporary Urgency Change Petition (TUCP) to allow for temporary changes to the water quality and outflow requirements for the Sacramento-San Joaquin Delta.

The severity of the situation is particularly evident in the North State. Lake Oroville is currently at 53 percent of average. The Feather River watershed, which feeds into Lake Oroville, has seen significantly less precipitation this year than normal, on track for its second driest year on record. Following a below average 2020 water year, California’s major reservoirs are at 50 percent of capacity.

California is better prepared for drought than in the past. Following the 2012-2016 drought, DWR enacted many programs focused on managing the state’s water through a strategic, integrated approach with a strong emphasis on water use efficiency and conservation. The state provides assistance and tools to local water agencies to help them reduce their drought vulnerability. DWR’s Water Use and Efficiency Branch (WUE) provides agencies and individuals assistance for improving water use efficiency and developing and meeting efficient water use requirements.

The 5 percent allocation amounts to 210,266 acre-feet of water, distributed among the 29 long-term SWP contractors who serve more than 27 million Californians and 750,000 acres of farmland.

Allocations represent the amount of SWP water that DWR will deliver for the year and are reviewed monthly based on several factors, such as water in storage, environmental requirements, and rain and snow runoff projections. For 2020, the initial SWP allocation was 10 percent and the final allocation was 20 percent in May.

# Arrest Made in Regard to Shooting in front of 7-Eleven

YUBA CITY, CA (MPG) - On March 21st of 2021 at approximately 1pm, Yuba City Police Officers responded to the area of Upland Drive and Queens Avenue, near the 7-Eleven store for a report of shots fired. Witnesses advised Officers the shooting involved subjects in two separate vehicles, and had both fled the scene prior to the Officers arrival. During the investigation, it was determined the involved parties had been in a physical altercation in front of the 7-Eleven store

prior to the shooting. Video surveillance and other evidence were collected at the scene.

On March 23rd, Jose Salgado (19 yoa, of Yuba City) was identified as a suspect. Salgado was booked into the Sutter County Jail for 664/187 PC, 246 PC, 26100(c)VC, and 25850 VC. This shooting was not gang related. Due to the ongoing investigation, further information is not being released.

# Attempted Homicide is Under Investigation

OREGON HOUSE, CA (MPG) - Yuba County Sheriff Detectives are investigating an attempted homicide reported to the Sheriff’s office at approximately 9:00 a.m. on Monday, March 22, 2021. One of two known victims arrived at the Sheriff’s headquarters in Marysville to

report an alleged shooting that had occurred overnight off Begonia Way and Saagannah Trail in Oregon House. The female victim had a gunshot wound to the arm and was transported to a local area hospital where she was treated and released for her injury. That victim reported that she believed a second victim remained at the residence from which she had fled.

The SWAT team was dispatched to the vicinity where the incident was reported and located the second victim. There were no suspects located at the scene.

# Appeals Court Sets Date in Case Against Newsom

SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) - California Assemblymembers James Gallagher (R-Yuba City) and Kevin Kiley (R-Rocklin) announced that an Appellate Court has scheduled oral argument in their lawsuit challenging Governor Gavin Newsom’s abuse of emergency powers during the COVID-19 State of Emergency. The parties will appear before the 3rd District Court of Appeal in Sacramento on April 20 at 9:30 AM.

“California has not been well-served by one-man rule. We are asking the court of appeals to affirm the superior’s court’s decision and protect our representative government from the abuses

of this or any future Governor,” said Assemblymembers Gallagher and Kiley.

On November 14th, a California State Superior Court finalized its ruling determining that Governor Gavin Newsom abused his authority by changing state law in violation of the California Constitution during the COVID-19 pandemic.

The Assemblymembers’ lawsuit challenges the legality of Executive Order N-67-20 which changed several statutory laws overnight. Gallagher and Kiley contend that this was an unconstitutional act because it invaded the powers that are left to the Legislature alone. Newsom argued that a State of Emergency “centralizes the State’s powers in the hands of the Governor.” ★

# Closure of Interstate 5 Maxwell Rest Areas Extend to June

COLUSA COUNTY, CA (MPG) - Caltrans is alerting motorists that the long-term closure of the north- and southbound Interstate 5 Maxwell Safety Roadside Rest Areas (SRRA) in Colusa County has been extended to June 1, 2021.

The Maxwell Rest Areas have been closed over the past year for construction. Additional electrical work is needed before the facility reopens to the traveling public.

Caltrans also is reminding motorists that the neighboring north- and southbound Willows Rest Areas in Glenn County remain closed for construction through December 31, 2021.

These rest areas are located off Interstate 5 between the cities of Orland in Glenn County and Williams in Colusa County.

During the closures, northbound I-5

motorists will be directed to use the Corning SRRA in Tehama County (about 25 miles north of Willows). Southbound motorists will be directed to the Dunnigan SRRA in Yolo County (about 34 miles south of Maxwell).

Caltrans is investing \$13.8 million to update the wastewater and water systems at the Maxwell and Willow rest areas. TSI Engineering Inc. of North Highlands, Sacramento County, is the contractor for both projects.



# Missing Marysville (Hallwood) Man Located

**MARYSVILLE, CA (MPG)** - On Sunday March 21, 2021 at approximately 8:00 a.m., Yuba County Sheriff's Department received a 911 call reporting a missing elderly man identified as 86 year old Teddy Grady of Hallwood. Family members advised that Teddy suffered from dementia and was last seen safe at home in their guesthouse Saturday night.

A Silver Alert was activated and an extensive search was launched in the area and surrounding communities. The search included not only law enforcement and search and rescue, but many family and community members from the area.

Neighbors scanned security camera video from overnight to find footage of Mr. Grady walking in the Hallwood area during the latenight and early morning hours. The search continued throughout the day into the evening hours on Sunday; from foot, vehicle, horseback, ATV, and air.

Unfortunately at approximately 4:45 p.m. on Sunday 3/21/2021, TeddyGrady was located deceased in the water of an irrigation ditch on the west side of the road in the 2400 block of Highway 20 in Hallwood. Official cause of death remains pending an Autopsy

# Large Amount of Drugs Found During Traffic Stop

**OROVILLE, CA (MPG)** - On March 14, 2021, Deputy Runyon made a traffic stop on Lincoln Blvd. at Ophir Road in Oroville, on a vehicle for vehicle code violations. Deputy Runyon contacted the driver, identified as Misty Black, age 33 of Oroville, and passenger, Timothy Jones, age 38 of Oroville. Deputy Arredondo arrived with his K9 partner "Chico" to assist with the traffic stop. Deputy Arredondo's K9 partner Chico alerted to the odor of narcotics after a free air sniff around the vehicle. During a subsequent search of the vehicle, Deputy Runyon located multiple packages of narcotics, totaling 25 grams of heroin, and 5.2 grams of methamphetamine. Deputy Runyon also located items that indicated possible sales of narcotics, to include packaging material (plastic baggies) and a digital scale.

Misty Black was arrested for possession of a narcotic controlled substance for sale (heroin) 11351 H&S, possession of a controlled substance for sale (methamphetamine) 11378(a) H&S, and possession of controlled substance paraphernalia (meth pipes and

used syringes) 11364 H&S. Misty's bail was set at \$47,000.

Timothy Jones was arrested for possession of a narcotic controlled substance for sale (heroin) 11351 H&S, possession of a controlled substance for sale (methamphetamine) 11378(a) H&S, and possession of controlled substance paraphernalia (meth pipes and used syringes) 11364 H&S. After Jones was booked into the Butte County Jail, he was found to be in possession of 1.6 grams of heroin. Jones was also booked for bringing a controlled substance into the jail 4573 PC. His bail was set at \$62,000. ★

# PG&E to Do Night Work on Bald Rock Road in Berry Creek

# CAL FIRE Investigators Determine Cause of the Zogg Fire

**SHASTA COUNTY, CA (MPG)** - Last year's Zogg Fire in Shasta County started on September 27, 2020 and burned a total of 56,338 acres, destroyed 204 structures and caused four civilian fatalities and one non-life-threatening injury.

CAL FIRE investigators were immediately dispatched to the Zogg Fire and began working to determine the origin and cause of the fire. After a meticulous

and thorough investigation, CAL FIRE has determined that the Zogg Fire was caused by a pine tree contacting electrical transmission lines owned and operated by Pacific Gas and Electric (PG&E) located north of the community of Igo.

The Zogg Fire investigative report has been forwarded to the Shasta County District Attorney's Office.

**Redfield tells CNN he believes origin of the coronavirus pandemic is a lab in China** | 26 March 2021 | Former Centers for Disease Control and Prevention Director Robert Redfield told CNN in an interview that aired Friday he thinks coronavirus originated in a lab in China. "It's not unusual for respiratory pathogens that are being worked on in a laboratory to infect a laboratory worker," Redfield said... Redfield said he did not think it makes "biological sense" that the virus would be able to spread so well between humans if it had just made the jump from animals to humans. The Wuhan Institute of Virology has been a focus of the theory that the virus escaped from a lab. "I do not believe this somehow came from a bat to a human," Redfield said.

**Silicon Valley oligarchs oppose 'politically motivated' Newsom recall in letter** | 28 March 2021 | Members of the Silicon Valley ultra-rich led by venture capitalist Ron Conway are opposing the recall effort against California Gov. Gavin Newsom and signaled they may be willing to drop major dough for their cause in a letter. Seventy-five Silicon Valley luminaries signed the letter opposing the "politically motivated" recall effort, saying it would "roll back growing progress," Politico first reported. Signatories include Steve Jobs's widow, Laurene Powell Jobs, former Google CEO Eric Schmidt and LinkedIn co-founder Reid Hoffman.

**'I consider it human trafficking.' California foster parents are being asked to take in '26 or more' migrant children as social services scramble to place a 'record number' of unaccompanied minors crossing the border** | 27 March 2021 | California foster parents are being asked to care for a staggering 26 or more unaccompanied migrant children per household, DailyMail.com can reveal. On March 12, foster parents Travis, 45, and Sharla Kall received a voicemail amid the crisis at the Mexico border. "This is an emergency message, please respond to this urgent message from the Community Care Licensing Division (CCLD)," the voicemail obtained by DailyMail.com said. "CCLD would like to know how many available beds you have to serve additional youth." ...The couple received an email with the same urgent message, containing links for them to communicate how many available beds they have - ranging from zero to '26 +.' Travis, who along with his wife runs a non-profit fighting against human trafficking, believes this is just the tip of a sinister iceberg. 'I consider it human trafficking,' he said. 'It's not the burden of taking kids in because we have the heart for it, but these are kids that were taken from the border for a money scheme and now they're going to use us resource parents to take care of them.'

**Hunter Biden texts contradict claims Secret Service wasn't involved in gun case** | 26 March 2021 | Hunter Biden sent a text message that said the Secret Service responded after his handgun disappeared in 2018 -- contradicting the agency's assertion that it wasn't involved, The Post has learned. The unprecedented move places the responsibility of seeking an asylum hearing on the migrants through Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE) or legal assistance. Multiple Border Patrol agents confirmed the new process to Fox News, revealing that they have been directed to use prosecutorial discretion (PD) to forgo the hours-long process of paperwork required to issue an NTA amid the surge of migrants at the border. ★

## This Month In Your Garden

April is one of the nicest months of the year in our area. Comfortably warm days and cool nights. The first day of spring greeted us on March 20th. The cold of the winter is behind us for the most part, but always be ready for a cold night here or there. Those happen after a rain storm usually.

Some vegetable gardens are under-way and many more are in the planning stage for lots of folks. Sometimes early April still brings us some very cold nights. Keep in mind that the night time temperatures should be at a consistent 50 degrees to sustain the best growth. Seeds that have been planted should be fine, but small plants can be stunted by cold nights. Many people feel that April is a late start, but, that is an opinion, not a fact. Monitor the night time temperatures for a few nights and make your decision. Up in our foothill areas there are lots of microclimates depending on whether you are up on the hill or in a valley where the cold is more apt to settle – the difference in temperatures can be significant. Many people in the higher foothills, such as Grass Valley or Brownsville wait until May because of the almost inevitable late cold spell that is apt to come along and freeze the small plants making it necessary to start all over again.

If you planted any fruit trees during bare root season or recently purchased any in containers, remember to paint the tree trunk with tree-trunk paint from the ground up to the first limbs to protect them from sunburn. Sunburn can cause the young, still thin bark to crack which puts the tree under stress and allows insects to get in. Water the young trees with a good deep soak once a week or so now and increase that to twice a week as the weather gets hotter as we get towards summer. This is very important to help

them develop deep roots to become healthy trees. A quick watering every day or so will develop shallow roots that will not be able to sustain them well as they grow larger. This actually applies to any trees you may plant - especially with the hot weather that we know is coming along. Roots seek the water wherever it is.

Citrus trees are blooming and soon the very small fruit will be seen in their place. They are probably no longer in need of protection from cold weather, but be ready to protect them should some freezing weather be predicted. Citrus trees should be fertilized regularly to keep them nice and green. If they begin to have yellow leaves with green veins they should be given some chelated iron.

Lawns should be fertilized with a lawn food. If your lawn areas have weeds invading them, it is helpful to use a lawn food that has a weed control incorporated in the formula. This is also a good time to plant a new lawn if that is in your plans. It is much easier to do it now before the daytime temperatures become hot. That requires more frequent short watering sessions to keep the soil moist enough to help the seed sprout without washing some of the seed away or drowning the first new little sprouts.

The spring weather is such a nice time to be out in the garden and yard. Daffodils are blooming now or have just finished. Wildflowers are blooming. Lots of mowing and weed eating to be done. It's a great time to get out and enjoy the beautiful area where we live. Enjoy it.

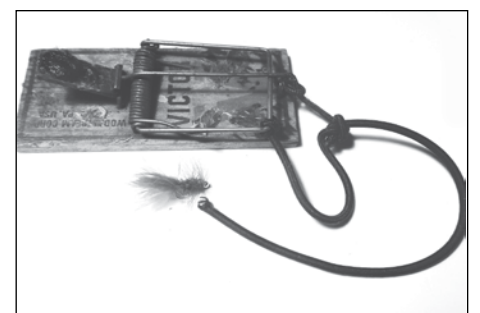

## California and The Political Food Chain

While the relationships among the various levels of American government are often cooperative, always lurking in the background is what one might characterize as a political food chain.

Officials plot constantly to impose their will on their counterparts occupying lower links of the chain while avoiding similar efforts by those above them – all in the name of better governance, of course.

We're seeing one example of the syndrome now in the efforts of California's legislators and Gov. Gavin Newsom to confront California's housing crisis. They want to compel local governments, particularly cities, to make more land available for high-density housing to serve low- and moderate-income families, and override local zoning laws that favor single-family homes on large lots.

Local officials tend to view the state's efforts as heavy-handed, one-size-fits-all violations of their traditional rights to control land use and thus shape the atmosphere of their communities. But advocates of state intervention say it's needed to overcome not-in-my-backyard resistance that discriminates against the poor and

the non-white.

As state officials strive to impose their will on local governments, they often resist the federal government's efforts to do the same on states. California's former attorney general, Xavier Becerra, filed more than 100 lawsuits against the federal government during Donald Trump's presidency, many of which asserted the principle of states' rights to resist decrees from Washington.

Becerra now heads the federal health and welfare agency and can be expected to crack the whip on any states that resist federal policies in the programs he manages. That's how the food chain works; it's not personal animosity, just institutional jousting for control.

The recently enacted \$1.9 trillion "stimulus" that Becerra's new boss, President Joe Biden, pushed through Congress provides another example. It gives state and local governments \$350 billion in aid, supposedly to make up for revenue losses during the COVID-19 pandemic. But one provision prohibits recipients from using the windfall to reduce taxes, and that has generated criticism from state officials of all ideological stripes that it interferes with their ability to manage their finances.

In California, politicians and interest groups on the left say it could prevent them from reducing tax burdens on the poor, such as expansion of the earned income tax credit, and small businesses.

State Finance Director Keely Bosler told Treasury Secretary Janet Yellen

in a letter that strictly applying the tax cut prohibition would "limit a state's ability to adopt policies that support federal goals and could thus constrain the economic benefits that were intended by the authorization of these funds."

"We're trying to provide additional relief to businesses that took it in the teeth during the recession," H.D. Palmer, a spokesperson for Bosler's Department of Finance, said. "We don't want to go down that road until we've got further clarification from Washington."

California business groups, meanwhile, say that the tax cut ban would undermine efforts to restore two business tax breaks that the state suspended last year when it appeared that COVID-19 would devastate state finances. With state revenues now running more than \$14 billion over-estimates, business leaders say that the tax breaks, which amount to more than \$4 billion a year, should be reinstated.

The business-backed California Taxpayers Association and 16 other state taxpayer organizations also sent a letter to Yellen seeking clarity on what states can and cannot do under the tax cut language. The stimulus law gives her the authority to make those decisions in a classic example of how the intergovernmental food chain works.

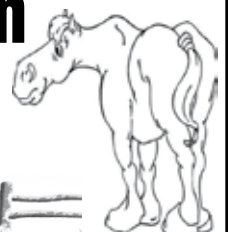

## Investors are still asking me What May Be up Next for the Markets

Continuing along a familiar theme, investors are still asking me what may be up next for the markets. Many are fearing a crash, having witnessed an historic and record setting run since the third week of March 2020, when the 38% correction in the Dow came to a surprising end, having fallen that amount in a mere three weeks. No doubt, the speed of the CoVid crash was historic in itself, and downright frightening to those that didn’t have stops (predetermined sell points) installed in their portfolios.

Not as fast but just as spectacular was the rebound that followed and continues to this day. This prolonged snap back rally has taken the Dow from its March 2020 level of around 18,000, to over 32,000 this month. Almost 12 months to the day and the Dow has risen more than 14,000 points. Not quite a double but comparatively historic to say the least.

It has become obvious to investors and non-investors everywhere that the market is not the economy. At least not since CoVid decimated the markets to historic lows, and then elevated them to astonishing new highs, all within a 12-month period. Truly, an event that will not soon be forgotten and likely talked about in schoolbooks for years.

So what is to explain an economy, devastated by a pandemic, which simultaneously spawns one of the fastest rising markets in history?

In a previous Money Matters musing, I suggested the forward-looking propensity of investors to see past the grey of recession and instead look to the wild blue yonder of economic recovery. Surely, this had something to do with the rise in markets. After all, with Main Street shuttering businesses up one block and down the next, there was little rhyme or reason why stocks would only fall for three weeks, only to then take off like a rocket while the nation was still in the beginning stages of the mandated shutdowns.

To think that the hopes of recovery could power this market to where it is now would be missing a much bigger picture.

Simply put, rising markets take money. And the amount of money it takes to lift a market as big the U.S. market (as well as almost every major global market with it) from the depths of where they were, to new heights in a little under a year is certainly an historic amount of money, of which the amount can only be guesstimated.

What can be said is the current value of the

U.S. stock market is somewhere around 87 trillion. During the March 2020 Covid lows, it was worth about 50 trillion. The difference is 37 trillion.

So the question becomes, where did the 37 trillion come from in order for to feed this type of valuation gain?

Various mechanisms allow for extreme leverage on Wall Street. This means to boost market valuation by 37 trillion does not actually take 37 trillion. But it does take a least a few trillion, and the only entity that has that amount of fire power is U.S. government. Not that they have a couple of trillion lying around. They don’t. In fact, they’re in debt up to their eyeballs. But what they do have is a printing press, and the ability to borrow.

But buying stocks is not in the Fed’s mandate, nor is it even legal. So how do we explain the cash infusion that was necessary to drive the market up 37 trillion dollars when the Fed is the only entity with that much cash but is forbidden buy stocks with it?

If you recall the government has instigated more than a few bailout and stimulus programs in an attempt to stave off the economic effects of CoVid-19. Like the 2008/09 programs, which also caused historic market increases (the market nearly tripled), once again oodles of money has obviously found its way to Wall Street. Like the 2008/09 programs which showered much of the funds into the financial sector, a greater proportion of the CoVid bailout funds are again aimed at Wall Street by design, the reasoning being (again) that the financial system needs protecting. Couple that with interest rates being in the dirt making credit extremely cheap, the answer to where all the money came from is pretty obvious.

The Fed’s have printed it, borrowed it and then fire hosed it onto the economy. Some did go to you and me, but a lot more went somewhere else.

### Water Projects Reduce and Delay Deliveries

Water worries intensified for California farmers Tuesday. The State Water Project announced it would cut its water allocation by half, to 5%, and the federal Central Valley Project said it would delay delivery of its 5% allocation to agricultural customers south of the Sacramento-San Joaquin Delta. In addition, the state water board has warned water-rights holders to plan for potential shortages.

### Farm Bureau Conference Focuses On State Issues

Drought concerns surfaced frequently during the California Farm Bureau Capitol AG Day event, held via video conference Tuesday. Farm Bureau President Jamie Johansson expressed disappointment with the slow progress of projects funded through a 2014 water bond, and urged movement on voluntary river-flow agreements intended to head off further water cuts. The conference featured discussions with legislative and administration leaders on a variety of topics.

### Farm Exports Face Delays at Ports

Agricultural exporters say they’ve having a “nightmare” of a time moving farm products through California ports. A surge in cargo volumes, a reduced port workforce and other problems have contributed to a shortage in shipping containers. Shippers trying to export California crops and commodities say they’ve experienced canceled bookings, increased costs and concerns about lost business. They fear the problems may not ease for weeks or even months.

### Union-access Rule Undergoes Supreme Court Review

A decision could come by the end of June, after the U.S. Supreme Court took up a California regulation that allows union organizers to recruit farm employees on a farmer’s property. Two agricultural employers challenged the regulation, describing it as an unconstitutional taking of private property by the government. Farm groups say the regulation goes against Supreme Court precedent, especially when unions have other ways to communicate with farm employees. ★

## AB 516 Clears Assembly Education Committee with Full Support

**SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG)** - On March 24, 2021, Assembly Bill 516 by Assemblywoman Megan Dahle (R-Bieber) passed out of the California Assembly Education Committee on a vote of 7-0 in support of the bill. The legislation will allow students to be excused from school in order to participate in a cultural ceremony or event.

Current law only allows absences to be excused if they are for a religious purpose, which excludes

legitimate cultural events and ceremonies that are equally important to encourage pupils to participate in. As a result,

Native American families often feel penalized when they have their children participate in cultural ceremonies or events as the days are not excused.

“Rural counties have the highest percentage of Native students with the highest absenteeism.” Said Dr. April Lea Go Forth, Executive Director of Resources for Indian Student Education (RISE) located in Modoc County. “There are schools that record those absences as ‘excused’ for religious purposes. While the gesture and effort to respect ancient traditions is appreciated, it is a lie and approves dishonestly. Our ceremonies are not dogma-bound practices of religion. Each event holds spiritual purpose to develop personal growth, preserve

life values and reinforce community.”

“This misrepresentation is untenable, and AB 516 provides the simple, necessary fix to support our Native American students.” Said Dahle. “This bill will end a long-held practice of false reporting that backfires on respect. It also could not come at a better time given the current pandemic and will help students connect deeper to their culture, spirituality, and academics.”

Assemblywoman Dahle serves on the Assembly Appropriations Committee, which will be the next committee to consider AB 516 this spring.
