## State Reduces Kid Space

*Desk-spacing rule: will more schools reopen full-time?*

California just made it significantly easier for K-12 schools to bring students back to campus full-time – but some of the state's largest districts and most powerful unions are pushing back, suggesting that hundreds of thousands of students may not receive daily in-person instruction this school year.

Student desks should now be kept a minimum of 3 feet apart, down from the previously recommended 6 feet, according to guidelines the California Department of Public Health released Saturday.

The revision came a day after the U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention reduced its spacing recommendations from 6 to 3 feet and less than a week after a superior court judge blocked California from enforcing its spacing rules because of their impact on students' educational equality. The state on Saturday (March 20) also made it easier for middle and high schools to reopen in the most restrictive purple tier.

The new spacing guidelines quadruple the number of students who can sit in a classroom at one time, paving the way for schools to transition from hybrid

learning to full-time in-person instruction. But the final decision still rests with local districts and teachers unions and many have struck reopening deals contingent on desks being 6 feet apart.

The California Teachers Association also appeared to oppose the new guidelines, which it framed as "another confusing message" that could result in "cramming young adults into classrooms."

The backlash could increase pressure on Gov. Gavin Newsom to issue an executive order compelling schools to reopen full-time. Although Newsom said last week on CNN that he's "been living through Zoom

school," Politico reported Friday that his four children have been attending in-person classes since October.

Meanwhile, many special-needs students appear to have regressed socially, physically and academically after having spent more than a year without critical in-person services, CalMatters reports.

The coronavirus bottom line: As of Sunday, (March 21) California had 3,545,278 confirmed cases (+0.1% from previous day) and 56,118 deaths (+0.1% from previous day), according to a CalMatters tracker.

California has administered 14,520,575 vaccine doses. ★

## Stretch of Lower Yuba River Closing to Watercraft

MARYSVILLE, CA (MPG) - More than one mile of the north channel of the lower Yuba River will be closed to all watercraft starting April 1 through early December for habitat enhancement work as part of Yuba Water Agency's Hallwood Side Channel and Floodplain Restoration Project.

The north channel of the river will be closed from Daguerre Point Dam to 6,000 feet downstream until December 1, 2021. Signs will be placed at popular entry points along the river, alerting boaters of the closure. The south channel will remain open to shallow-draft watercraft.

"We understand that the closure is inconvenient for people who enjoy fishing and recreating on the Yuba River, but it is crucial for everyone's safety and critical for the work we are doing to improve salmon and steelhead habitat to have the intended impact," said Jeff Mathews, Yuba Water's habitat enhancement project manager who is helping lead the effort.

The Hallwood Side Channel and Floodplain Restoration Project is designed to enhance the lower Yuba River ecosystem by increasing available juvenile salmon habitat to improve the natural production of Chinook salmon and Central Valley steelhead. Both are listed as threatened under the Endangered Species Act. Enhancing the habitat will give young salmon and steelhead areas to hide from predators, so that they're able to eat and grow in preparation for their journey out to the ocean. The project will also reduce flood risk through lower water surface elevations and velocities during flood events.

The first phase of the project recently wrapped up and includes 89 acres of juvenile floodplain rearing habitat, providing 1.7 miles of perennial side channels and 3.7 miles of seasonal side channels, alcoves and swales. The second phase of work will begin on April 1, 2021.

When the entire project is complete, the lower Yuba River will have up to 157 enhanced acres of seasonally inundated riparian floodplain, approximately 1.7 miles of perennial side channels, and approximately 7 miles of seasonally inundated side channels, alcoves and swales. Enhancements will be made through land

## Magill's Memory Lives On

MARYSVILLE, CA (MPG) - A special contribution was made Wednesday, March 10th, by the Yuba River Endowment to the Margery Magill scholarship fund, in the form of \$5,000.

Magill was just 27 years old when she was tragically stabbed to death while walking a dog in Washington D.C. in the Summer of 2019. Her parents, Jeff and Bonnie Magill, both retired teachers, established the scholarship fund after their daughter's passing as people approached them wanting to help. In an interview with the Appeal Democrat, Jeff Magill says the scholarship "keeps her name out there," adding, "It's been something she would have been excited about doing."

The scholarship fund has reportedly received about \$15,000 so far and was able to grant awards to seven people in the year 2020. Depending on the

number of applicants, the Magills hope to dole out a total of \$5,000 to graduating 2021 seniors who plan to continue their higher education, focusing on those involved in 4-H or Future Farmers of America programs. In her youth, Margery enjoyed raising goats, and apparently

helped 4-H clubs with agricultural programs before continuing on to graduate from U.C. Davis.

In addition to the monetary donation, Wheatland Union High School, where Mr. Magill formerly taught, is working with community members and organizations to build

a bench in her honor. The solidly built metal bench will be placed at Wangari Park in Washington D.C. in memoriam later this year.

## The Chris Cain Quartet Celebrates a Virtual Album Release from The Center

**GRASS VALLEY, CA (MPG)** - The Center for the Arts is serving up a soulful stew of Memphis-style electric blues with the Chris Cain Quartet. On Friday, April 9, 2021 Chris Cain, Greg Rahn, Steve Evans, and Sky Garcia will celebrate the release of Cain's latest album, Raisin' Cain live From The Center.

Powerfully deep vocals and jazz inspired, blues guitar riffs make Chris Cain unforgettable; uniquely his own, while reminiscent of the legendary B.B. King and Albert King. As a child, Chris Cain attended concerts with his dad to hear many of the great blues artists of the time. When Cain burst onto the blues scene in 1987 with his award winning debut album, he soon found himself sharing the stage and trading licks with a few of those legends, including Albert King and Albert Collins. Chris Cain has released a dozen albums, each filled with soul-stirring songs pulled from his own blues drenched heart. His brand of blues is unforgettable.

His latest release, Raisin' Cain, is his first release with Alligator Records. Twelve original compositions make the album a head-spinning showcase of raucous

blues, horn-driven romps and moody, after-hours laments bursting with sharp songwriting wit, gruff, commanding vocals and sparkling, amazingly inventive guitar playing.

Cain was raised on stories of his father's childhood upbringing on Memphis' Historic Beale Street and attended his first B.B. King concert at the tender age of three. Blues music played continuously on the home stereo and family outings were often trips to concerts. Cain recalls, "I remember when I was a kid, my Dad would be mowing the lawn with the stereo blasting Muddy Waters. When I look back, that was pretty cool! There was always music playing at our house, Ray Charles, B.B. King, Freddie King, Albert King, all the greats."

At the age of eight, Cain taught himself to play guitar and began playing professionally when he was eighteen. Chris studied music at San Jose City College and was soon teaching jazz improvisation on campus. Over the next twenty years, Cain would also master piano, bass guitar, clarinet, and alto and tenor saxophone. The combination of his blues upbringing and his jazz studies melded to form the searing guitar style that sets Chris Cain apart and has moved him to the top ranks of the

blues music scene.

The Quartet includes Greg Rahn, who has played keyboards with a diverse range of artists from Latin jazz greats to rock guitar legends. Steve Evans is one of the Bay Area's most sought after bassists because of his ability to adapt his playing technique across a wide spectrum of musical genres. Behind the drums is Sky Garcia, whose family has enjoyed generations of music making here in California.

## California Roads Rank Among the Worst in the Entire Nation Again

**SEATTLE, WA (MPG)** - QuoteWizard®, a LendingTree company, and one of the nation's leading online insurance marketplaces released a new report finding that the more drivers are paying for roads, the worse their roads are. With deteriorating roads and bridges costing the average driver \$556 every year.

# Airport's New Human Trafficking Detection Program Announced

**SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG)** - Every year traffickers use trains, buses, planes and ships to transport thousands of victims, hiding them in plain sight while traveling to destinations around the world. As the eyes and ears in airports and global transportation systems, airport employees are uniquely positioned to help combat the issue of human trafficking.

January was National Slavery and Human Trafficking Prevention Month, and in recognition of that, the Sacramento County Department of Airports (SCDA) partnered with the Department of Homeland Security (DHS) to develop a new Human Trafficking Awareness and Reporting training program.

Together with U.S. Customs and Border Protection and the Department of Transportation, the Blue Campaign, a division within the DHS Office of Partnership and Engagement, created the Blue Lightning Initiative (BLI).

The BLI program is designed to provide airport employees with the tools needed to take advantage of their unique position and ability to identify potential

human trafficking victims and notify federal authorities. In 2018, then California Governor Jerry Brown signed AB 2034. This bill requires transit agencies like bus and light rail stations to provide human trafficking training to employees who may interact with traffickers and/or their victims.

Although the bill does not apply to airport agencies, SCDA has decided to move forward and join this partnership to provide training to all of its employees.

"SCDA leadership feels strongly about this program," said Airport Director Cindy Nichol. "We realize the potential impact it can have and we are committed to offering this training to our employees."

In addition to a number of other Federal agencies, there are approximately 10 other

airports, 26 airlines, and six industry associations taking part in the program.

Participating BLI partners instruct their employees using the BLI virtual training module and associated printed educational materials. The training may be integrated into partners' initial or refresher training for flight attendants, pilots, customer service representatives, and other aviation industry personnel.

The Blue Campaign is the unified voice for the DHS efforts to combat human trafficking, working with federal, state, and local governments, as well as law enforcement, public, and private organizations. The Blue Campaign strives to protect the fundamental right to freedom and bring those who exploit human lives to justice. ★

# Fare Free Services Begin for COVID-19 Vaccine Appointments

**MARYSVILLE, CA (MPG)** - In cooperation with the Yuba and Sutter County Public Health Departments, Yuba-Sutter Transit is now offering fare-free service to anyone traveling to or from their scheduled COVID-19 vaccination appointment. This offer is good on all services operated by Yuba-Sutter Transit, including Dial-A-Ride, but all service eligibility requirements still apply.

To ride free of charge, passengers must present

valid confirmation when boarding the bus of their appointment that day at any COVID-19 vaccination site in Yuba or Sutter Counties. Confirmation may be in the form of an appointment card, email, or text with the passenger's name and appointment information (date, time, and location). The driver will acknowledge that the confirmation meets the requirement and that the passenger may continue boarding.

Anyone traveling with a passenger that has a scheduled appointment must provide their own appointment confirmation to

qualify for a free fare. This offer is scheduled to end on Wednesday, June 30, 2021, but the program will be re-evaluated at that time to determine if there is still a need for it to continue.

# Missing Marysville Man Located

**MARYSVILLE, CA (MPG)** - On Sunday March 21, 2021 at approximately 8:00 a.m., Yuba County Sheriff's Department received a 911 call reporting a missing elderly man identified as 86 year old Teddy Grady of Hallwood. Family members advised that Teddy suffered from dementia and was last seen safe at home in their guesthouse Saturday night.

A Silver Alert was activated and an extensive

search was launched in the area and surrounding communities. The search included not only law enforcement and search and rescue, but many family and community members from the area. Neighbors scanned security camera video from overnight to find footage of Mr. Grady walking in the Hallwood area during the late night and early morning hours. The search continued throughout the day into the evening hours on Sunday; from foot, vehicle, horseback, ATV, and air.

Unfortunately at approximately 4:45 p.m. on Sunday 3/21/2021, Teddy Grady was located deceased in the water of an irrigation ditch on the west side of the road in the 2400 block of Highway 20 in Hallwood. Official cause of death remains pending an Autopsy.

**CHALLENGE, CA (MPG)** - On Wednesday, March 10, 2021 just before 8:00 a.m. Yuba County Sheriff's Dispatch Center received a 911 call reporting that a female had been found injured and appeared to be deceased in the guest

room of a residence in the 17000 block of Indiana Ranch Rd. Upon Yuba County Sheriff Deputies arrival, they located a

woman with obvious physical trauma and pronounced her deceased at the scene. The victim is identified as 44-year-old Christine Adams of Visalia, Ca.

Yuba County Sheriff Detectives responded to the scene and assumed the investigation. A suspect, identified as 43-year-old Bryan Adams and husband of the deceased, has been detained on a Ramey Warrant for Homicide. The suspect is currently hospitalized in the Sacramento

area as a result of a car accident prior to law enforcement locating him.

Yuba County Sheriff's Office took custody of Adams at the hospital, where he remains under our guard until he can be booked into the Yuba County Jail following his release. The victim's cause of death remains pending results of an autopsy, which was scheduled for today 3/11/2021. The investigation remains active and ongoing at this time. ★

surface changes, riparian planting and placement of large woody material embedded to simulate a more natural river at key locations. The total project cost is estimated to be \$12 million. Funding has been provided by the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service, California Department of Fish and Wildlife's Proposition 68 grant program

and Yuba Water.

The Hallwood Side Channel and Floodplain Restoration Project is a collaborative effort among many different organizations, including USFWS, cbec eco engineering, South Yuba River Citizens League, Cramer Fish Sciences, Teichert, Western Aggregates and Yuba Water.

# Newsom's One-Man Rule Cripples California Economy, Business & Students' Livelihoods

**SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG)** - It has been 365 day since Governor Newsom issued a stay-at-home order with the promise that it would be only for a few weeks to fight the pandemic and flatten the curve. Fifty-seven Executive Orders later, an estimated 19,000 businesses have shuttered their doors and others are teetering on the brink of closure, 1.7 million Californians are unemployed, and fraudulent unemployment claims climb to \$31 billion dollars, and there is no end in sight with the Governor refusing to relinquish his 'one-man rule.'

Senate Republicans introduced Senate Concurrent Resolution (SCR) 5 last December to end the Governor's state of emergency power, and reestablish the Legislature's Constitutional co-equal status, but so far, a hearing has not been set for this measure.

"A year ago, Governor Newsom shut down the state based on the prediction of a worse-case scenario. At the time, the Governor promised us his decisions would be based on sound science and data, but when the predictions did not pan out, he refused to pivot to a new strategy. Instead, he doubled down on his command and control policies. When questioned about the data driving his decisions, he claimed people would not understand - that it was 'too complicated.' What people do understand Governor is that your policies devastated our businesses, cost millions of jobs and have left our children with mental health problems and learning loss. # Tax Day for Individuals Extended to May 17

**WASHINGTON D.C. (MPG)** - The Treasury Department and Internal Revenue Service announced that the federal income tax filing due date for individuals for the 2020 tax year will be automatically extended from April 15, 2021, to May 17, 2021. The IRS will be providing formal guidance in the coming days.

"This continues to be a tough time for many people, and the IRS wants to continue to do everything possible to help taxpayers navigate the unusual circumstances related to the pandemic, while also working on important tax administration responsibilities," said IRS Commissioner Chuck Rettig. "Even with the new deadline, we urge taxpayers to consider filing as soon as possible, especially those who are owed refunds. Filing electronically with direct deposit is the quickest way to get refunds, and it can help some taxpayers more quickly receive any remaining stimulus payments they may be entitled to."

Individual taxpayers can also postpone federal income tax payments for the 2020 tax year due on April 15, 2021, to May 17, 2021, without penalties and interest, regardless of the amount owed. This postponement applies to individual taxpayers, including individuals who pay self-employment tax. Penalties, interest and additions to tax will begin to accrue on any remaining unpaid balances as of May 17, 2021. Individual taxpayers will automatically avoid interest and penalties on the taxes paid by May 17.

Individual taxpayers do not need to file any forms or call the IRS to qualify for this automatic federal tax filing and payment relief. Individual taxpayers who need additional time to file beyond the May 17 deadline can request a filing extension until Oct. 15 by filing Form 4868 through their tax professional, tax software or using the Free File link on IRS.gov. Filing Form 4868 gives taxpayers until Oct. 15 to file their 2020 tax return but does not grant an extension of time to pay taxes due.

Taxpayers should pay their federal income tax due by May 17, 2021, to avoid interest and penalties.

The IRS urges taxpayers who are due a refund to file as soon as possible. Most tax refunds associated with e-filed returns are issued within 21 days.

This relief does not apply to estimated tax payments that are due on April 15, 2021. These payments are still due on April 15. Taxes must be paid as taxpayers earn or receive income during the year, either through withholding or estimated tax payments. In general, estimated tax payments are made quarterly to the IRS by people whose income isn't subject to income tax withholding, including self-employment income, interest, dividends, alimony or rental income. Most taxpayers automatically have their taxes withheld from their paychecks and submitted to the IRS by their employer.

State tax returns - The federal tax filing deadline postponement to May 17, 2021, only applies to individual federal income returns and tax (including tax on self-employment income) payments otherwise due April 15, 2021, not state tax payments or deposits or payments of any other type of federal tax. Taxpayers also will need to file income tax returns in 42 states plus the District of Columbia. State filing and payment deadlines vary and are not always the same as the federal filing deadline. The IRS urges taxpayers to check with their state tax agencies for those details.

Winter storm disaster relief for Louisiana, Oklahoma and Texas - Earlier this year, following the disaster declarations issued by the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA), the IRS announced relief for victims of the February winter storms in Texas, Oklahoma and Louisiana. These states have until June 15, 2021, to file various individual and business tax returns and make tax payments. This extension to May 17 does not affect the June deadline.

# How Will California Spend \$150 Billion Windfall?

Let's assume that your rich Uncle Harry died and when his will was read, he had left you \$50,000.

The unexpected inheritance gives you three choices. You could put the money into a savings account or investment and have it available should you need it in the future. You could use it for a one-time purchase such as a new car, college tuition or a down payment on a house. Or you could ramp up your lifestyle by \$50K a year and hope that Harry's brother George dies and leaves you enough money to continue the party.

Something like that is occurring now as Uncle Joe (Biden) sends out nearly \$2 trillion in "stimulus" payments both to low- and moderate-income families and state and local government entities to offset losses of income during the COVID-19 pandemic and, it's assumed, kickstart the pandemic-ravaged economy.

California will be a case study in how the massive transfer of money that the federal government is borrowing from buyers of its bonds and treasury notes plays out.

California is expected to receive the nation's largest single share of the pot, at least \$150 billion. Nearly half will be in the

form of cash payments to families (\$40 billion) and supplemental payments to the roughly 800,000 unemployed workers now drawing unemployment insurance benefits (\$30 billion). Most of that money, it's assumed, will go directly into the consumer economy, plus another \$3.8 billion for direct assistance on rent, food and other necessities.

The remainder of the \$150 billion will mostly go to state and local agencies as both unrestricted revenue and money for specific purposes, such as \$15.9 billion to help schools reopen, \$5 billion for colleges, \$4 billion for mass transit services, and \$3.9 billion for child care.

Throughout California, officials in the specific government agencies that will benefit from Uncle Joe's largesse are busily deciding how to spend it - and they face the same three choices as Uncle Harry's beneficiaries would.

The political pressure to spend it on new commitments will be immense. Advocates of specific programs, such as those seeking universal pre-kindergarten education and child care, will want to expand their reach. Public employee unions will seek increases in salaries and benefits.

Elected political figures don't like to say "no" to demands for immediate gratification and few have the courage to insist that one-time windfalls should be carefully husbanded rather than spent.

There's already a mini-version of the syndrome underway in California. The state has perhaps \$15 billion in unexpected

revenues because the pandemic-induced recession had little, if any, impact on high-income taxpayers and Gov. Gavin Newsom is under pressure to spend the windfall on program expansions, even though the state faces projected budget deficits in following years.

The problem, of course, is spending windfall money on new commitments, such as salaries, benefits and program expansions, backfires when the money is gone. Those commitments morph into entitlements and their beneficiaries then demand that politicians generate new income streams to pay for them.

There's already a debate underway in Washington over how much of the stimulus spending will become permanent and whether the federal government should continue borrowing to pay for it, or raise taxes.

Left-leaning Democrats in both Washington and Sacramento are floating new tax proposals, such as a "wealth tax" on those sitting atop the economic ladder.

Newsom simultaneously embraces, in principle, big expansions of entitlements, such as universal pre-kindergarten and single-payer health care, while warning that he won't embrace new taxes, apparently fearing they would chase away the high-income taxpayers who supply a huge portion of the state's revenues.

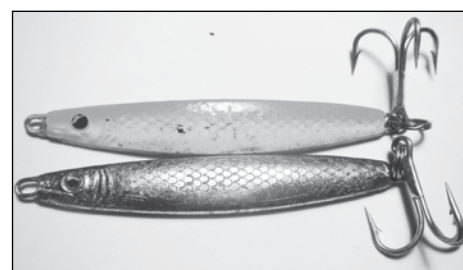

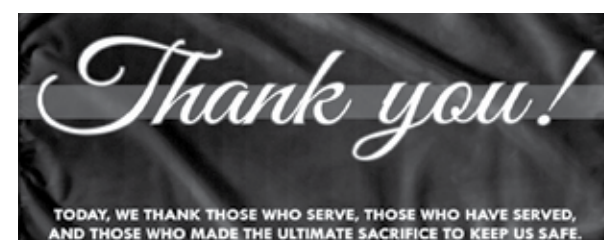

## Recall Process Holds Electeds Accountable

Governor Newsom looks certain to face a recall election. Voters – even his supporters – should be thankful that California has citizen empowerment tools to check corrupt, incompetent, unresponsive or simply unpopular government officials. If you favor accountability, look kindly upon the recall effort as a means of voters being heard. It was not always so. In the early 20th century, California state and local governments, media, and courtrooms operated as little more than subsidiaries of the mighty railroads, which abused the public faith by buying and selling influence as though it was rail stock. Republican reform Governor Hiram Johnson revolted against railroad dominance by creating a direct-democracy end run around the moneyed Colossus that so easily and thoroughly controlled the state.

Johnson championed three major reforms: the initiative, the referendum, and, so critical now, the recall. Each gave voters the chance to circumvent the existing and corrupted

power structure that had silenced them.

Voters went from having little or no way to hold their representatives to account to having a powerful arsenal for self-determination, which they have used many times in the past century.

When runaway property taxes chased seniors out of their homes and broke family budgets, voters came together in 1978 to pass Proposition 13, the most consequential tax reform in state history. Prop. 13 has saved families billions in its four-plus decades of existence. This reform simply could not have originated in the legislature, whose appetite for more and more tax dollars is legendary, but only as an initiative from the people.

When Gray Davis short circuited during the energy crisis, voters famously used the recall to usher in Arnold Schwarzenegger as his replacement, to see if the Hollywood legend could right the ship of state.

Whether you supported Davis or Schwarzenegger or Prop. 13 is secondary to the power Governor Johnson's reforms invested in the people. The key element of his changes is that voters were given the ability to weigh in, to be heard, in ways that purely representative democracy does not allow.

Governor Newsom's detractors have accused him of decimating small business, failing to reopen schools, and disregarding his own restaurant-killing safety guidance. These criticisms have fueled

another grassroots effort to end his term early and find a better replacement.

Even if you support Newsom completely and think his handling of California is flawless, is it not a good thing for the Governor – and all politicians – to be haunted by the specter of accountability?

Hiram Johnson left us tools, not toys. It is not easy to place a recall on the ballot. To qualify, proponents need to submit valid signatures equal to 12-percent of the prior election's turnout total. This year, that means roughly 1.2 million signatures were needed to put our current Governor up for a vote of (no) confidence. That threshold is a huge hurdle and ensures that recalls will not be used lightly.

But that threshold also means it now typically costs \$5 million or so to qualify a recall or initiative for the ballot. This tool of the people runs the risk of being transported into the exclusive realm of big-money special interests who can afford paid signature gatherers, advertising, mail pieces and other tools of organization and persuasion. We should not let it turn into the very thing it was intended to fight. We should make it easier to qualify initiatives, referenda, and recalls, to keep them safely within reach of authentic grassroots efforts.

Newsom may or may not fare better than Davis. But win or lose, the recall is a signal to the current Governor and all politicians that they serve at the people's pleasure. ★

## Michael Tubbs Recently Hired by the Biden Administration

Michael Tubbs, an African American and mayor of Stockton, California from 2019 -2021, and recently hired by the Biden administration, had an idea a few years back. Witnessing the rampant poverty and low-income levels of many constituents in his town, he instigated a controversial program called the Stockton Economic Empowerment Demonstration (SEED).

Its implementation fell along the lines of “Universal Basic Income”, which has also been called Guaranteed Income and Basic income. It is not a new concept and has been tried sporadically in various parts of the world including a handful of cities in the U.S.

The concept is to provide no strings attached periodic income to all. The basic principles are:

1. Periodic: distributed in regular payments
2. Cash payment: distributed as funds, not coupons or vouchers
3. Individual: paid to every adult citizen, not just every household
4. Universal: it is paid to all citizens, regardless of their situation
5. Unconditional: there is no requirement to work or willingness to work

There are variations of the principals and Mayor Tubbs tweaked the test program to limit the number of recipients to 125 and that had a median income level of \$46,000.00 annually. The payment was \$500 a month, for 24 months, was paid through a debit card, and had no restrictions on how the money could be spent. Possibly fearing backlash from taxpayers, the entire program was supported by philanthropic donations.

After two years, through an interview process, it was found recipients of the payments experienced less stress, were better parents and partners, secured full time employment in many cases and had an improved overall sense of wellbeing (CBS NEWS). No specific statistics were given to support the claims nor how the interviewers arrived at their conclusions, but the reported success of the program has spurred further discussions along the same lines. A similar pilot program in 2017 in Finland reported similar benefits.

No doubt, the pros and cons of such an idea will be fiercely debated. It is hard to imagine, considering the income limits installed on the CoVid bailout programs,

that there would be no income limits if instigated in the U.S

The bigger questions are obvious.

Would a guaranteed income kill incentive to find employment?

No doubt it would be argued that some people would forego seeking employment if given a minimum payment. Such is the way of subsidies and human nature.

Some would claim that the greater good being served would far outweigh the few that might take advantage of the program. Others would use the incentive argument to try and nix the whole idea.

Who would pay for it would certainly surround the debate. Governments would not be able to fund such programs on a large scale through donations. Recall Stockton's program only had 125 participants.

No doubt, the usual sources for funding public spending would be used. Taxation, borrowing or creating the funds from the printing press are the three methods available to the public trust. Such is the source for all government funds.

Another question is would the payments be taxed?

If everyone did receive the income, the futility of taxiing the funds away from people, only to give it back through a monthly check, seems counterintuitive. But the government is known to do that sort of thing on occasion. The precedent for taxation of benefits brings to mind social security payments. Once promised the proceeds would never be taxed, that all changed in 1984 under amendments signed by President Reagan. Portions of social security payments are taxed based on income. (For those wondering, yes, in 1983, Joe Biden joined a bipartisan effort to make 50% of Social Security benefits taxable based on income).

Concluding, no doubt, the debate would be hard fought and contentious. The idea of a basic income has gained traction since the CoVid-19 event, and the discussion is only likely to gain momentum as income inequality escalates, which in this analyst's opinion, is bound to continue.

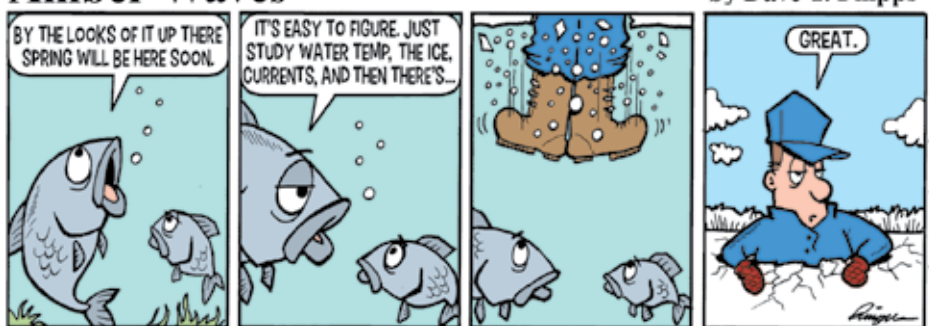

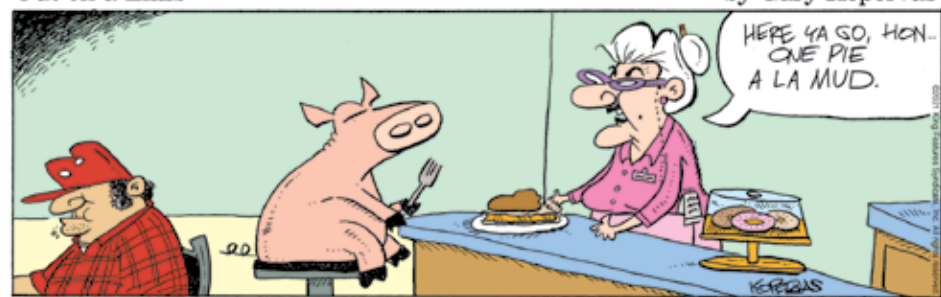

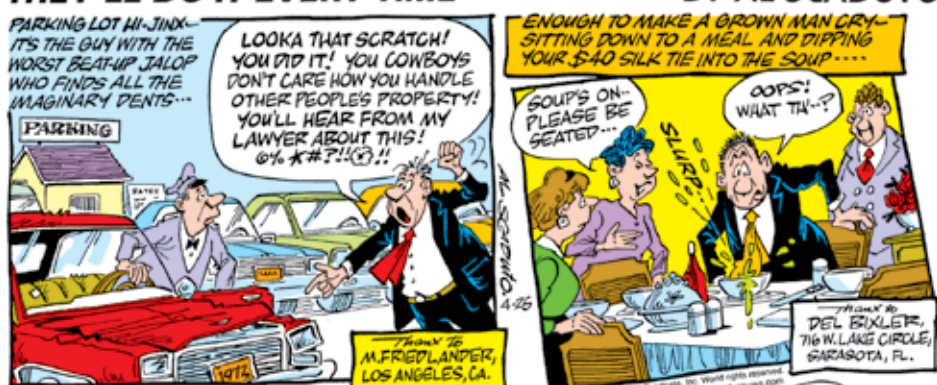

# That's One Big Bass!

# Heavy Fishing Season Restrictions Likely

**GRIDLEY, CA (MPG)** - Two local sportsmen got a big surprise when they reeled in one massive bass at the Lake Oroville Team Open, presented by Feather Falls Casino and Lodge, February 27-28th.

Fishermen Brian Fesler and Emie Haro took First Place for their massive Large Mouth Bass, weighing in at a whopping 11.79 lbs. With the record for Lake Oroville Bass sitting at 15 Lbs., Fesler and Haro's Bass comes close to being one of the bigger pulled from the lake. Fesler appropriately calls it a "Unicorn" and Haro agrees.

The pair have been fishing together for 20 years and were out on Fesler's 2018 Ranger 521L boat when their line landed on the large Bass. Haro was using a Dobyns Rod 704, with 8 lb. test line and hook & worm for bait. He says that "the fish was 30 feet deep, so when I hit him...I felt his weight and he didn't go anywhere...I just said, 'This is a good fish'" but as far as 11 lbs.? 12 lbs.? I had

no clue that's what I was dealing with." Haro shares he was calm and unhurried, partly due to disbelief, but his partner was ecstatic at what might break the surface. "Brian was very excited - shaking!" Haro continues, "I just never thought I'd catch anything that size."

Fesler says, "I'm pretty serious about it. I'm trying to get to the next level," he says of his passion for the sport and the excitement surrounding the catch. He shares that part of team fishing is helping the partner with the fish on the line keep it on, wrangle it successfully to the boat and ultimately net it for the catch. "It's definitely a team effort. A lot of the times they say netting it is the harder part because everything falls on your shoulders if you knock it off." The pair obviously had the netting handled.

Day one of the tournament, the pair were in 54th place. After their big catch, the pair jumped to nearly first place and eventually took home a grand prize of \$4,500 with an additional "Big Fish Winning" of \$400. Fesler enjoyed a bonus due to his affiliation with Ranger boats. ★

**SAN FRANCISCO, CA (MPG)** - Officials with the Pacific Fisheries Management Council (PFMC) adopted 2021 Management Alternatives for Public Review, that could allow some salmon fishing this year while protecting a low number of salmon. Restrictions being considered include cutting both commercial and sport ocean salmon fishing drastically. Commercial and sport fishermen and women are likely looking at getting half of a normal season.

The low number of salmon is primarily traced to unbalanced water practices that regularly divert too much of the water needed by salmon. About 80 percent of the water used in California goes to agriculture with literally trillions of gallons going to grow almonds and other nuts in the western San Joaquin Valley, an area considered a desert. In the middle of the last drought from 2012 to 2016, as salmon numbers were decimated, 340,000 acres of new almond orchards were added in California. Almonds require a gallon of water to produce a single nut. California's salmon runs still haven't recovered from the losses suffered in that drought.

Officials forecast there are only about 271,000 adult Sacramento Valley salmon now in the ocean off the West Coast which is far below the 500,000 needed to support a half way decent ocean salmon season. In the month ahead, the PFMC will decide how much time and area will be closed to sport and commercial ocean salmon fishing in 2021. The restrictions being considered are the most draconian since the

closure of all salmon fishing in 2008 and 2009, which was a historic first. That closure followed three record setting years of water diversions from the Delta.

Many salmon related jobs and businesses, as well as those in the hospitality industry that typically serve a sector of the sport fishery, will be seriously harmed in 2021.

"Following a poor commercial crab season, the coming paltry salmon season has us worried about how we're going to pay the bills and support our families. The local fleets that supply salmon to our markets and restaurants are in very real danger of permanent collapse," said Sarah Bates who fishes from San Francisco and is a GSSA board member.

The chronic over-diversion of Central Valley rivers means that hatcheries are increasingly becoming the only place in the Central Valley with conditions needed to keep salmon alive. The vast majority of the salmon caught in the ocean in 2020 were reared in hatcheries which can keep water temperatures under 56 degrees, the lethal threshold. The eggs of naturally spawning salmon are wiped out when reservoir releases are cut back and rivers shrink or when the cold water needed to keep salmon alive is diverted for agriculture.

Although it won't help for this season, GSSA calls on the California Dept. of Fish and Wildlife (CDFW) to move SF Bay hatchery releases west from the current release sites near Vallejo to sites closer to the Golden Gate Bridge. This could increase survival of existing hatchery salmon by 200 to 300 percent.

"CDFW is fully aware

they can double survival of hatchery salmon by simply moving the current release points near Vallejo a few miles west. Considering the dire situation we're in, the time to do this is now," said PCFFA Executive Director and GSSA board member Mike Conroy. "Maximizing survival of hatchery salmon is going to be critical to keep the industry afloat over the next several years."

In the last big drought of 2012 through 2016 many of the naturally spawned salmon were wiped out throughout the Sacramento Basin. Since then, water managers have not allowed the conditions necessary to recover them. The State Water Resources Control Board made an attempt to rectify this in 2018 starting with an order to the major diverters of rivers in the San Joaquin Valley to reduce diversions. Then governor-elect Gavin Newsom halted implementation and allowed the major water districts to instead engage in negotiations which has produced a stalemate, allowing business as usual.

"If the governor would allow the State Water Resources Control Board to balance Central Valley water use, it would go a long way towards helping the salmon industry avoid the type of catastrophe staring us in the face now," said GSSA president John McManus. "California could rebuild its salmon runs and the tens of thousands of jobs in the salmon industry."

"To people who fish salmon, it looks like our jobs and our voice don't count as much as those who choose to grow almonds and pistachios in the desert of the western San Joaquin Valley," said GSSA director and co-owner of Reel Magic Sportfishing Mike Aughney. ★
