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## Know Your Zone Campaign for Emergency Evacuation Planning

**MARYSVILLE, CA (MPG)** - Yuba County Sheriff with Yuba County Office of Emergency Services and our public safety partners are excited to be launching a "Know Your Zone" campaign to help county residents and businesses be better prepared for the next evacuation or emergency.

Residents simply enter their address into an interactive map (<https://community.zonehaven.com>) developed by Zonehaven, that includes all 130+ evacuation zones currently in Yuba County. Residents should record their zone number and review zone details before the next emergency to be better informed and able to quickly map their best path to safety. When you find your zone, you will see valuable links for additional information during an emergency, such as to Yuba Sheriff social media, Yuba Office of Emergency Services website, and Fire Emergency Services for your area. In addition, a "subscribe to alerts" button takes you directly to the county's "Code Red" alert system to subscribe to notifications. Public Safety Power Shutoff information will also be incorporated into the platform for affected residents.

In the event of an emergency, first responders will use Zonehaven to plan and execute evacuations both large and small. They have access to real-time weather, traffic conditions, and natural disaster information; and the ability to model evacuation traffic and fire or flood spread scenarios. From Zonehaven, public safety officials will update the community with zone-specific information on the map including up-to-date evacuation status; live incident updates such re-population, and relevant resources like shelter options. For those without access to the internet or in poor cell reception areas, we will still utilize traditional media sources such as TV/Radio, Local Media, and even posted information and maps at common gathering areas during evacuations.

"Public safety during emergencies is of utmost importance to us," said Yuba County Sheriff Wendell Anderson. "The collaboration between the Sheriff's Office, Yuba Co Office of Emergency Services and our fellow public safety and fire officials across the county has

# Some Visitors Allowed?

*Hospitals in much of California begin reopening to visitors*

One patient recovering from COVID-19 finally started eating after a family member was allowed to bring home-cooked meals to a hospital in Fresno. Another patient's racing heart calmed at a hospital in Monterey when a relative was allowed inside.

After a year of strict rules that forced many people to abandon their family members at a hospital entrance, many California hospitals are now beginning to crack open their doors to regular visits for non-COVID-19 patients.

Most counties moved this month to less restrictive tiers and the state last week issued new, looser guidelines for hospitals. Now hospitals in 50 counties – home to more than 93% of the population – are eligible to open up to two visitors per patient, with some caveats.

Some hospitals changed their visitor policies immediately and with enthusiasm.

Some hospitals, however, are cautiously weighing whether to allow more people inside. Dignity Health, Kaiser Permanente and Sutter Health hospital systems, for example, said that they will continue to reevaluate their visitor policies and could update them soon.

Until two weeks ago, most of California remained in the strictest purple tier, where state health officials advised hospitals to limit visitors to only special cases, such as children and women giving birth. Now only eight counties, with less than 7% of the state's population, remain in the purple tier.

In addition, the new state guidance increases the number of visitors recommended in non-purple counties to two at a time per patient, provided they're

from the same household and "social distancing can be accomplished." For all tiers, the number of visitors recommended for children, women giving birth and patients who are dying, undergoing surgery, or have disabilities increased to two.

The guidance doesn't have the force of law, but a spokesperson for the California Department of Public Health said "hospitals are licensed by CDPH and should comply." Counties may implement stricter standards if the local public health officer orders them.

While the guidance doesn't explicitly mention emergency rooms, a state health department spokesperson said it "applies to visitation for various levels of patient care, including those in emergency room care."

Charis Hill, a 34-year-old disabled activist whose immune system is

weakened by treatment for an inflammatory disease, came down with a 102-degree fever in August. A friend rushed Hill to the emergency room at Mercy General Hospital in Sacramento, but they were separated at triage.

Hill spent hours alone in limbo – sweating, shivering and waiting for care. Unable to sit up, a security guard threatened to call the police on Hill for lying down across the chairs in the waiting room, Hill said.

"I felt helpless. I was alone," Hill said. "I needed someone to advocate for me, to explain my disease that I live with."

Hill's friend, who asked not to be named because she works for the state, sat for hours in her car, wearing a respirator because she didn't know whether Hill was infected with the coronavirus.

"You're just wondering what the hell is happening."

# Suspect Arrested for Fraud and Mail Theft

**PLUMAS LAKE, CA (MPG)** - On Monday, April 5, at approximately 4:00 a.m., a Yuba County Sheriff Deputy arrested 30-year-old Samuel Smiley of Oroville after finding him in possession of stolen mail in a vehicle near the intersection of Wilcox Ranch Rd. and Casa Dulce Way in Plumas Lake. Smiley was previously arrested by YCSO in Plumas Lake for similar crimes on March 8, 2021.

Just before 4:00 a.m. this date, Yuba County Sheriff Deputies on patrol in Plumas Lake made contact with two occupants sleeping in a vehicle at Wilcox Ranch Blvd and Casa Dulce Way. The license plate on the vehicle was reported stolen and did not match the VIN number of the vehicle. One of the occupants in the vehicle was on probation for theft, and a search of the vehicle was conducted that revealed items of stolen property and several sets of mailbox keys. A stolen driver's license was located in Samuel Smiley's possession and

after contacting the victim, it was determined that it was used fraudulently by Smiley to open a casino player's account.

Smiley was booked into the Yuba County Jail for possession of stolen property, identity theft, fraud, possession of burglary tools, and conspiracy. US Postal Inspector's Office was notified of the case. ★

# Suspect Arrested for Drug Possession and Sales after Short Pursuit

**PLUMAS LAKE, CA (MPG)** - On Monday, March 29, 2021 at approximately 4:40 p.m., a Yuba County Sheriff Deputy arrested 35-year-old Luis Ernesto Munoz of Yuba City for resisting arrest and drug charges, including possession of controlled substances for sale. Munoz was taken into custody following a short vehicle pursuit that began after he failed to yield during a traffic stop on Highway 70 in south Yuba County.

A YCSO deputy on patrol in the Olivehurst area attempted to pull Munoz over on Highway 70 for driving on a suspended driver's license, but Munoz passed several exits and proceeded southbound Hwy 70 without yielding. The suspect

eventually pulled over near the Feather River Blvd Exit in south Plumas Lake. Munoz initially refused to exit the vehicle before complying with the Deputy's orders. After Munoz was detained, a search of the vehicle he was driving led to the discovery of heroin and methamphetamine, along with packaging materials and drug paraphernalia.

Deputies discovered that Munoz was out on bail for a prior drug arrest in Sutter County in which he had failed to appear in court for on March 29, 2021. He was booked into the Yuba County Jail on charges of Possession of Controlled Substance, Possession of Controlled Substance for Sale, Possession of Drug Paraphernalia, Resisting Arrest, and a Yuba City warrant for failure to appear. ★

# 68% of California Small Businesses Confident to Stay Open for 6 Months

The Global State of Small Business Report reveals the ongoing crisis facing small businesses, and new challenges ahead. This report surveyed 35,000 small businesses around the world and builds on six surveys over the last year to find comprehensive trends over time. For US data, Facebook partnered with the Small Business Roundtable.

As COVID vaccines are being distributed to more and more American and people across California, 68% of California small business owners say they are confident in their ability to stay open for at least six months.

The news continues to be dire for California business owners - 59% of operating small businesses are reporting lower sales, the third highest state in the nation. Fueling that is the 31% that are expecting a lack of demand and/or no customer challenges from Golden State customers, eight points above the national average.

As of February 2021, 79% of California small businesses were operational or engaging in revenue-generating activities; 33% had reduced employment as

a result of the pandemic, 6 points higher than the national average; 22% expect cash flow challenges, 2 points lower than the national average.

Comparatively, other large states saw a mixed bag of results to California, New York only had 69% of SMBs operational or engaging in revenue-generating activities 10 points lower than California. And the results were even more stark when comparing minority-owned SMBs operational in NY was 58%, which is 16 point difference than California (74%). Texas has 83% of women-owned businesses operational, 5 points below California and only 48% reporting lower sales, 9 points below California.

To help small businesses during what are still challenging times, Facebook launched numerous initiatives aimed at supporting small businesses and helping them navigate the uncertainty of reopening including providing grants to business owners, developing innovative new tools and products, and hosting digital tool training events, such as "Boost with Facebook" events.

# Plumas National Forest Readies for Season

**QUINCY, CA. (MPG)** - More campsites across the Plumas National Forest within the Feather River Canyon, Bucks Lake, Lake Davis, and Lakes Basin recreation areas, will be available by reservation this year, according to Forest Supervisor Chris Carlton.

"With so many more people looking to visit the Plumas National Forest (PNF), providing better maintained facilities & creating more certainty in recreation planning are real priorities for us," said Carlton.

According to Carlton, the Forest Service recreation budget is not enough to operate and maintain all PNF developed recreation facilities. Rather than close facilities, via a competitive process, the Forest Service permitted a concessionaire (Outdoors in Plumas) to operate and maintain 68 of the Forest's 150 developed recreation sites in 2020. This strategy has enabled the Forest to keep facilities open and maintained to a high standard.

Visitors can expect to pay modest fees at additional recreation sites managed by Outdoors in Plumas this year. The fees will take effect beginning April/May 2021 and will be used to offset operations costs including facility upkeep (including hazard tree removal and water/septic system repair), cleaning restrooms and trash pick-up.

Fees were charged by OiP at 46 sites in 2020 while issues related to the Covid pandemic and fire season precluded charging at the remaining sites. Those 21 sites

are coming on-line with fees this year.

The Plumas National Forest will continue to operate 71 recreation sites at no cost to the public, including 10 campgrounds/camp areas.

Dispersed camping & day-use opportunities are available in general forest areas where visitors may camp or enjoy day-use activities without a fee, although there may be no restrooms or services such as piped water and trash removal. If National Forest system land is not specifically closed to camping or other activities, it is open, without a fee, for public enjoyment.

Visitors are reminded to distance themselves and mask-up as necessary to keep everyone as safe as possible.

# Traffic Safety Partners Stress Dangers of Distracted Driving

The California Highway Patrol (CHP), California Office of Traffic Safety (OTS) and Impact Teen Drivers (ITD) are working together this April to remind Californians of the dangers of not giving the road their full attention when behind the wheel as part of Distracted Driving Awareness Month.

The National Highway Traffic Safety Administration reports 3,142 people were killed in motor vehicle crashes involving distracted drivers in 2019 nationwide. That same year in California,

there were at least 18,698 crashes from distracted driving that resulted in 108 deaths and more than 13,500 injuries.

"Driving safely requires your full attention," CHP Commissioner Amanda Ray said. "Distractions put you and others on the road at risk. Together, with our traffic safety partners, enforcement, and the cooperation of the motoring public, we can save lives and eliminate this dangerous behavior on California's roadways." Distractions are not limited to cellular phones. Other electronics, children, pets, and eating or drinking while driving can also divert attention and result in a crash.

Breaking distracted driving laws becomes more serious this year. Beginning July 1, a violation for using a handheld cellular phone or texting while driving will result in a fine and also add a point to the driver's record for each violation occurring within 36 months of a prior conviction for the same

offense.

"Distracted driving is a serious issue that is 100 percent preventable," OTS Director Barbara Rooney said. "That text, phone call, or social post is never more important than the task of driving."

As part of Distracted Driving Awareness Month, the first week of April is California Teen Safe Driving Week. Throughout the week, CHP and ITD will place an increased emphasis on informing California's newest drivers about the dangers and consequences of reckless and distracted driving.

"Parents, your kids have been watching you drive since they were in a forward-facing car seat," Kelly Browning, Ph.D., executive director of ITD, said. "Your driving habits will become their driving habits – be the driver you want your kids to be."

The mission of the CHP is to provide the highest level of Safety, Service, and Security. ★

## New Community Garden to Serve Yuba-Sutter Residents in Need

**YUBA CITY, CA (MPG)** - The Yuba-Sutter Food Bank and the 4G Foundation have partnered to support a Plant, Grow, Share a Row program. The new 4G Foundation community garden – a space used to provide a resource of healthy foods and an educational tool will donate anywhere from 10 percent to 100 percent of their yield to the Yuba-Sutter Food Bank to help people in need.

“Our mission is to lead the fight against food insecurity through community partnerships. The Food Bank is a community resource and the measurement of our impact is attributed to the unyielding support through partnerships,” said Michelle Downing, CEO of the Yuba-Sutter Food Bank.

The garden is approximately 1/2 of an acre. It will be a resource to about 24K people facing food insecurity in parts of the Yuba-Sutter community vapid of fresh fruit, vegetables, and other healthful whole foods.

“The 4G Foundation is committed to helping others, and the new community garden and our partnership with the Food Bank are vehicles in doing just that, said Jerry Handy, CEO, and Founder of the 4G Foundation.

Donated fruit and vegetables will be collected and loaded onto a Food Bank refrigerated truck and transported to the Food Bank warehouse in Yuba City. The food will be weighed, logged, checked for food safety by trained Food Bank staff and volunteers, and stored under refrigeration when necessary. The fresh produce will be distributed to people in

the community through the Yuba-Sutter Food Bank Community Partner Agencies (church food pantries, shelters, congregate meals, etc.) and distributed to over twenty monthly food distribution sites.

“Produce remains inaccessible to those on a tight grocery budget, and thanks to the support of generous partners like the 4G Foundation, the Yuba-Sutter Food Bank can provide nutritious choices to those in need,” said Downing.

## Broadband Discounts for Low Income Families

**MARYSVILLE, CA (MPG)** - United Ways of California has received an award of more than \$1 million from the California Public Utilities Commission over a two-year period to increase awareness and household access to high-speed internet connections for low income residents.

Most low-income households are eligible to receive basic broadband (in broadband service areas) for under \$20.00 per month

through major providers such as AT&T and Comcast, along with others.

Yuba-Sutter-Colusa United Way is participating in promoting this exciting program locally in Yuba, Sutter, and Colusa Counties.

United Ways of California has two simple ways for people to learn about their eligibility and to access providers. Full information and sign-up links are at <http://broadband.unitedwaysca.org/> or text INTERNET to 211 – 211. Trained personnel are standing by to walk you

through the process and to answer questions.

“We're excited that under state law, broadband providers are establishing new accounts and modifying existing accounts to thousands of low-income households to assist children, families and older adults,” said Bob Harlan YSC United Way Executive Director.

“Most families find broadband essential for school, health information, appointments, seeking employment and a myriad of other things,” said Harlan. ★

You know, you're just kind of stuck in the lurch just thinking is it good, with no information? Is it bad? Like what's going on?” she said.

When she heard about the security guard's threats to call the police, she raced into the emergency room to join Hill. “I was going in, come hell or high water,” she said. “COVID be damned. I was going in.”

William Hodges, a spokesperson for Dignity Health's hospitals, which include Mercy General, couldn't comment specifically on Hill's experience. “We have no record of a complaint or incident report filed by this patient, and therefore, do not have necessary details to determine what may have transpired during the visit,” he said.

He said the health system is constantly re-evaluating its visitor policies, which at the time allowed one support person in the emergency department.

Doctors across the state are seeing the benefits of letting family members into hospital rooms and emergency departments.

Hospitals in counties with high-infection rates worry that in places with widespread infections, people may unknowingly walk into the hospital and bring the coronavirus with them – or contract the virus there and walk back out with it.

The benefits of visitors are especially clear for older adults with cognitive impairments, who are at risk for delirium in hospital settings.

“I think it's really vital and important that hospitals see that family caregivers are as integral to the patient outcomes for older patients as they are for children and pregnant women,” said Terri Harvath, a professor and director of the Family Caregiving Institute at UC Davis Health.

“There's actually strong data that support that older

patients, particularly older patients with cognitive impairment, or communication challenges, do better when they have a family caregiver there to support and advocate for them.”

While the state's policies make allowances for people with physical and cognitive impairments of all ages, there is no exception specifically for older adults, a public health department spokesperson said.

In the absence of visitors, Tammy Hshieh, an associate physician at Brigham and Women's Hospital and the Dana-Farber Cancer Institute who has studied delirium, recommends that people keep calling their loved ones.

“It can't replace human touch, and human presence,” she said. But “that love that you have with each other, those emotions of love and caring or even sadness, patients realize that... these emotions don't go away.” ★

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# Pandemic has Damaged California's School Children

A comprehensive history of the COVID-19 pandemic's effect on California would surely conclude that the state's school children have been treated shamefully.

The incessant political squabbling over closing and reopening schools, and the sporadic efforts at in-home learning, have once again demonstrated that the supposed adults who manage and operate public education in California are more focused on their own interests than on the wellbeing of students.

Indeed, one could easily describe what has happened and not happened in the schools as child neglect on a massive scale.

California schools were not a roaring success even before pandemic struck more than a year ago. By almost any measure, we lagged behind other states, particularly in meeting the needs of the more than three million students classified as poor or English-learners.

The many billions of dollars that the Legislature appropriated to improve their outcomes under former Gov. Jerry Brown's Local Control Funding Formula were often misdirected with little accountability.

When the coronavirus

reared its ugly head, schools were quickly shuttered and educators scrambled to replace classroom instruction with at-home instruction via the Internet. But once again, many of the children already at risk of failure were left behind, lacking the resources and/or familial support to participate.

The damage has been huge, widening the already yawning gap between the at-risk students and their more privileged peers. A new report on impacts in Los Angeles Unified School District, the nation's second largest school system, reveals the extent of the damage.

LA Unified's classrooms have been closed for more than a year and will only begin to reopen later this month, largely due to conflicts between the district's managers and its unions – a syndrome that's delayed reopening in many large urban districts.

"The COVID-19 pandemic has interrupted the livelihoods, health, education, childcare, and financial stability of millions," says the report issued by Great Public Schools, a local advocacy group. "Students in Los Angeles Unified School District...are experiencing the painful loss of connection with their peers, teachers and school staff, and serious loss of learning that will have life-long consequences if not addressed."

"We may not know the full impact of this last year on our students for another year or more, but the preliminary data we have paints an alarming picture," the report adds.

Among the specific findings, based on LA Unified's own data:

40% of LAUSD middle and high schoolers were disengaged or absent from classes in spring 2020; Disengagement was likely even higher for elementary students; More than 13,000 middle and high school students were consistently disengaged in fall 2020. An additional 56,000 did not actively participate on a daily basis; Two-thirds of LA Unified students are falling behind in literacy and math. Fewer young students of color are on target in reading skills compared to a year earlier; Across all academic progress indicators, students of color, low-income students, English learners, foster children, students with disabilities and homeless students have been set back further than their more advantaged peers; Many high school students are at risk of not graduating. Currently, 20% of the class of 2021, 43% of the class of 2022, 37% of the class of 2023, and 30% of the class of 2024 will not graduate.

These numbers are – or should be – shocking and embarrassing to every adult involved in the operation of California schools, from Gov. Gavin Newsom downward. Not only are the futures of the affected children dimmer but their educational lapses will affect the entire state for decades to come.

## North Yuba Water District - the past 2 1/2 years

It's hard to imagine the drama that has befallen this district in the last 2 1/2 years.

Donnie Forguson looses to Gretchen Flohr and ends his career with the Water District with his infamous farewell "cancer" speech. General Manager Maupin refuses to provide Director Flohr with requested documents regarding the Forbestown Ditch piping project. Director Flohr sues Water District. Yuba Water Agency grants District \$225,725 for Forbestown Ditch piping project. Grand Jury begins investigation of the NYWD with Jury members attending a number of board meetings but no report is provided. Manager Maupin receives \$480K from Yuba Water Agency to pipe the Oroleve Ditch and awards contract to Hanson Bros. Enterprises in Grass Valley. Manager Maupin commandeers Yuba County GIS employee to draw him a gerrymandered division map that moves all of Gary Hawthorne's Division 3 irrigation customers, including himself, into Director Flohr's Division 4. Hawthorne votes for the revised map, thus assuring he cannot run again. Director Terry Brown moves to Florida but not before illegally voting for Manager Maupin's gerrymandered map. Manager Maupin fails to sign Yuba LAFCO application to detach 403 parcels which is required before gerrymandered map can be submitted to Yuba County. Water District division voting map remains as before. Gary Hawthorne decides to run again. Water District files Mitigated Negative Declaration for the Forbestown Ditch piping project with CEQA in June and withdraws filing in August. Director Flohr prevails in her court case and Manager Maupin is ordered to produce the requested documents, which he does. Documents show no routine maintenance has been done on the Forbestown Ditch since Manger Maupin was hired in 2011. Irrigation water deliveries end by July and 50 county residents sign Demand Letter to Water District to resume water deliveries. Concurrent with the mail out ballots from the Yuba County Elections Department in October, Manager Maupin, fearful of losing his job if the three incumbents are not reelected, pays Smart Marketing \$4126.93 from District funds to print and mail out 2,500 copies of a previously published newsletter addressed to the District's voters intending to sway voters thus tainting the election. Complaints are made to the FPPC. Not wanting to lose her job either, Office Manager Leona Harris confers with like minded individuals to set up bogus North Yuba Water District Facebook account to attack, in a mean spirited manner, incumbent challengers. Twenty-five Yuba County residents sign letter to County Supervisors and Yuba Water Agency Directors asking for some action regarding Manager Maupin's campaign newsletter FPPC guidelines violation. County Council makes lengthy explanation of why county can do nothing. Water District spends \$600K in legal fees. Informal survey is presented at Board meeting showing of 42 respondents of the ~105 irrigation customers, 70% have no confidence of a full water delivery season. Subsequently, Water District Directors declare there will be no irrigation water for 2021. South Feather Water and Power Authority files lawsuit against North Yuba Water District for violating CEQA reporting requirements for the Oroleve Ditch piping project. Two more South Feather lawsuits are in the works. Eric Hansard resigns from water district board and District advertises for a Division 5 replacement.

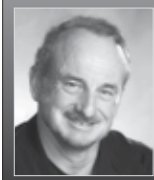

## The Damage from CoVid in both Economic Terms and Human lives is Tragic

The damage from CoVid-19 in both economic terms and human lives is tragic. The economic devastation hoisted upon the world's economies by the CoVid shutdowns is unprecedented.

It is no secret I have been against shutdowns from the onset of the virus and have written such on numerous occasions.

My standpoint is/was not based on the debate of the use of masks or how deadly the virus was or is. In fact, I stand more in line with the majority on these two points. However, in reality, no one really knows the effectiveness of masks or the true lethality of the virus. That is a contentious statement to say the least, but truthfully, both sides of both arguments have their scientific backing.

In addition, it is not possible to go back in time and try the "other" way on any of this. So goes another impossible experiment in an alternate universe where we try it with no masks and no shutdowns.

My support of not shutting down the economy was based on the realization that much more damage, both economically and in the human cost, would be caused with the shutdowns.

This statement will once again undoubtedly spawn hot debate, but look no farther than the latest article out by Scott W. Atlas, M.D., whose resume is longer than this article.

His top honors (and there are many) include Senior Fellow at the Hoover Institute at Stanford, as well as chief professor and head of neuroradiology. He served as senior health care advisor to several presidential candidates in 2008, 2012 and 2016, and was a member of the Nominating Committee for the Nobel Peace Prize in Medicine and Physiology.

Comparing the death and sickness toll of the massive shutdowns, he lays out his case against shutdowns based on the same criteria I detailed in many previous articles.

Mainly that the death toll from the shutdowns is far greater (or will be) than the virus itself.

In his article "Science, Politics and Covid: Will truth prevail" Feb 2021, he states between 750,000 and one million cancer cases will go undetected due to patients not getting checkups or screening due to CoVid fears.

An untold number of children will suffer from suicide, depression, drug addiction, gang involvement, domestic violence, poor education and more, from the social isolation of the being out of school.

Adult domestic violence has skyrocketed as well as drug abuse, depression, more suicide and similar maladies.

The CDC reported four-fold increases in

depression, three-fold in anxiety and twice the number of suicide ideation among young adults.

Child abuse, most often reported from school observation, has undoubtedly gone unattended.

The National Bureau of Economic Research states a three percent increase in the future mortality rate and a 0.5 percent drop in life expectancy due to unemployment and lock downs.

No doubt, suicides may rise and more marriages will blow apart due to the financial stresses of the shutdowns and subsequent shuttered businesses. In the U.S. alone, forecasts from the University of Santa Cruz shows nearly 317,000 businesses closed between February and September. That works out to 1,500 business closures a day.

Multiple prognostications on skyrocketing starvation is also hitting the news wires. "More than 130 million more could go hungry in 2020" said Arif Husain, chief economist at the World Food Program, a United Nations agency. Even more frightening is a statement from David Beasley, the Executive Director of the World Food Programme, where he warned in June. "We could see 300,000 die a day, for several months, if we don't handle this right"..... as a result of global shutdowns.

In conclusion, many argue the shutdowns and masks were necessary and may still be, and that without them, the death and sickness toll would be higher.

But much like the forecasts above, they are just that: forecasts and guesses based on a variety of methodologies and theories. No one can say for sure what would have happened had the global authorities taken another path. What we do know for sure is the impact from CoVid has been horrific. Whether humankind made it worse by shutting down the planet is and will always be an unknown.

To this analyst however, the numbers sure do look like we made some huge mistakes.

## New Survey Finds that Remote and Hybrid Working is Here to Stay

**SAN FRANCISCO, CA (MPG)** - A new survey and economic analysis by the Boston Consulting Group (BCG) and commissioned by Zoom focused on what industries were able to pivot their business processes using video conferencing, resulting in business continuity and even growth during a time of significant economic turmoil. The resulting report, prepared by Zoom based on the survey data and findings made by BCG, spans key industries and six countries around the globe, specifically looking at five U.S. states as well.

"A hybrid approach will also be necessary when it comes to fostering and retaining talent. The pandemic spawned a more geographically diverse workforce — people moved out of certain regions, they applied to and accepted jobs under a remote context. With a widespread, global workforce, creating a hybrid workforce is not a luxury, it's a necessity." — Zoom blog post.

Key findings from the BCG survey found that businesses are more open than before the pandemic for a flexible work

## Jury Finds Man Guilty of Six Counts of Child Molestation

**Butte County District Attorney Press Release**

**BUTTE COUNTY, CA (MPG)** - After an eleven-day trial, a Butte County jury this morning found a man, who was on federal parole for child pornography, guilty of molesting two young sisters last year, when they were ages 10 and 7.

Joshua Chadwick, 40, of Oroville, was convicted of six individual counts of lewd and lascivious conduct involving the girls, along with a special enhancement for multiple victims. Butte County District Attorney Mike Ramsey said the girls, now ages 11 and age 8, bravely faced their molester in court and testified against him.

The trial prosecutor, Deputy District Attorney JJ Stark-Modlin, said, "Despite their tender years, the girls showed more bravery and resilience on the witness stand than most adults." Stark-Modlin gave special recognition to a pair of specialized comfort dogs, Micah and Reuben, who sat at the girls' feet while they testified in court. The Lutheran Churches of

Yuba City and Elk Grove provided the dogs.

Ramsey said the girls, their older siblings and their parents moved into Chadwick's home last year after moving out of the home of David Acuff, 38, of Oroville. Acuff is Chadwick's cousin and he is currently pending trial for his earlier molest of the same girls when they lived with Acuff. Ramsey said the evidence presented at trial showed Chadwick targeted the girls as easy prey based on their previous molests at the hands of Acuff.

Chadwick remains in custody with no bail. Chadwick faces up to 43 years to life in state prison at his pending sentencing hearing on May 5, 2021.

Ramsey said Chadwick was previously convicted of federal charges of possession of child pornography and sentenced to five years in federal prison in 2012. Evidence produced at this trial included child pornography depicting the two sisters, which was found in Chadwick's possession. Federal prosecutors are preparing to prosecute Chadwick for this child porn, which

could bring an additional 50 years of federal prison time.

Summer Carver, 36, the children's mother, last week plead guilty to four counts of Procuring a Child to Engage in a Lewd Act, and four counts of felony Child Abuse as a result of knowingly making her children available to Chadwick and Acuff. She is facing 19 years 4 months in state prison and is scheduled to be sentenced on April 28, 2021.

Ramsey praised the twelve deliberating jurors and three alternate juror for sitting through an emotional jury trial that was spread over 5 weeks. Noting that the jurors had to listen to and watch difficult evidence related to sexual acts with children, including the child pornography videos of the girls. Ramsey also noted, "Justice is never easy and is rarely swift, yet despite the length of the trial and the complications of the COVID-19 pandemic, Butte County residents are taking their job as jurors seriously and rendered a guilty verdict after deliberating for nearly three days." ★
