Attendees will be able to watch the parade from the comfort of their own vehicles as the parade kicks off at 4 p.m.! Attendees are encouraged

to park: south of the Soccer field entrance along Bizz Johnson Drive to 1st Street, in the soccer complex paved parking lot, in one of the many parking lots throughout the Riverfront Park.

Parade attendees are encouraged to bring a chair to watch parade from the roadside. Restrooms throughout the park will be open.

The theme of the 2020 Marysville Christmas parade is “A Christmas Miracle”.

Santa will spread holiday cheer from atop the Marysville Fire Department ladder truck at the end of the parade as his elves hand out candy canes to all of the good little girls and boys along the

parade route.

The parade will be streamed live on numerous social media outlets to accommodate those with health conditions who are social distancing in their homes.

Regional Child Support Agency Approved for Sutter, Colusa, and Yolo Counties

SUTTER COUNTY, CA (MPG) - The Boards of Supervisors of Colusa, Sutter, and Yolo Counties have approved a shared memorandum of understanding (MOU) which will create a combined, regional child support agency to serve the three counties.

The counties began exploring the potential of regionalizing the three child support programs in January of 2019 which included a complete examination of the various aspects of child support and department operations. During a time when child support allocations from the State of California have been flat for almost two decades, creating a single child support agency would generate increased efficiencies, cost effectiveness, shared key positions, centralized mail processing, and a consolidated training program. With a more strategic use of resources, the agency will be better able to serve its communities’ child support need and continue to provide a high level of customer support and service delivery.

The newly approved agency, titled “The Colusa, Sutter, and Yolo Regional Child Support Agency”, begins January 2, 2021. Each of the three counties will retain a physical child support location to ensure easy access by customers.

“This is a wonderful example of government collaboration! I am proud to be part of this process,” said Colusa County Administrative Officer Wendy Tyler.

“It’s a big step for all three counties and I’m looking forward to seeing its continued development,” said Director of the California Department of Child Support Services David Kilgore.

“This is an exciting milestone as we have undertaken a deliberative process including the staff of the three offices, working to design a regional operation that is able to continue to support these three communities,” said Director of Colusa, Sutter, and Yolo County Child Support Offices Natalie Dillon.

Yuba County Disaster Planning Needs Input from Residents

YUBA COUNTY, CA (MPG) - Yuba County residents who understand the all-too-familiar natural disasters that threaten the region can be part of creating the plans that will help local communities prepare for just about any emergency.

The Yuba County Office of Emergency Services is joining with officials from Marysville, Wheatland, and special districts to update plans that will help communities prepare for natural disasters such as floods, drought, wildfires, and severe weather. An important part in updating the 2015 Local Hazard

Mitigation Plan is getting participation from community members.

“Natural hazards such as these can never be prevented, but having a solid Hazard Mitigation Plan in place that lays out long term strategies will help reduce disaster losses by breaking the repeated cycle of disaster damage and reconstruction,” said Yuba County Interim OES Manager Briana Haberman. “It’s also important to note that communities with a FEMA-approved Hazard Mitigation Plan are eligible for reduced flood insurance costs to residents through the National Flood Insurance Program’s Community Rating System.”

Haberman said another benefit of having the plan in place is that it qualifies the county to apply for grants that could help communities prepare for disasters and receive assistance after a disaster.

“We need residents to be part of updating this disaster plan, because the people most aware of potential hazards in Yuba County are those who live and work here,” Haberman said. “Local, state, and federal agencies involved in the process really need to hear from community members, to make sure the resulting Local Hazard Mitigation Plan addresses their concerns.”

Interested residents who want to be deeply involved in the process can be part

of a Planning Committee. There is also an option to participate in a Public Information meeting. The two online Zoom meetings will take place Thursday, Nov. 19, with the Planning Committee meeting taking place 1:30 – 4:00 p.m. and the Public Information meeting 6:00 – 7:30 p.m.

News Outlook

Everyone has a story. You are writing yours as every day passes. In my readings this week, I grabbed this for you from my favorite modern German theologian Dieter F. Uchtdorf. This missive on gratitude was penned in 2014, and it seems quite relevant today. Said he: “But some might say, “What do I have to be grateful for when my world is falling apart?” Perhaps focusing on what we are grateful for is the wrong approach. It is difficult to find a spirit of gratitude if our thankfulness is only proportional to the number of blessings we can count. True, it is important to frequently “count our blessings” – and anyone who has tried this knows there are many – but I don’t believe the Lord expects us to be less thankful in times of trial than in times of abundance and ease. In fact, most of the scriptural references do not speak of gratitude for things but rather suggest an overall spirit or attitude of gratitude. It is easy to be grateful for things when life seems to be going our

way. But what then of those times when what we wish for seems to be far out of reach? Could I suggest that we see gratitude as a disposition, a way of life that stands independent of our current situation? In other words, I’m suggesting that instead of being thankful for things, we focus on being thankful in our circumstances – whatever they may be.”

I am aware that the messenger is often equal in importance to the message. Uchtdorf has a life story to match his theological sermonizing. He grew up with a serious childhood lung disease, survived nearly starving during the war when his country (Protectorate of Bohemia and Moravia) ceased to exist, and was reinvented as Czechoslovakia. At age 11, he hiked over the mountains with his mother avoiding Russian checkpoints to escape the occupied Czech Republic after the war. From the mountains, the goal was to meet up with his sisters who had boarded a train and jumped off into the snow when they were in the U.S.-occupied West German part of the train trip. This extraordinary effort to escape was initiated as a response to the Soviet communists. They wanted to kill his father for his dissident ideas (ideas like freedom). There are some people who, when

confronted with their homeland being taken over, being driven from their homes, suffering hunger, poverty, oppression, and sickness, remain angry all their days. Given the same set of circumstances, other people spend their entire lives reflecting upon how things worked out and bring joy to others by sharing their grateful disposition. So for this the third column of the Thanksgiving month, the message is this: gratitude is a choice. Circumstances do not dictate how we feel – unless we choose for that to be the case. There are a myriad of stories of people who, even in the hardest of circumstances, decide to be happy and help other people. The difficulties we confront with the pandemic all about us, and the associated challenges will sort out those who have the strength of character to choose (and share) gratitude contrasted with those who give up and go to the dark side. Being thankful in good times is easy; being grateful and kind under challenging times is what makes for good stories, stories that will sustain those who come after us. I am grateful for the people who have shared their stories of choosing thanks giving. So to you I say ... Happy Thanksgiving.

Assemblyman Gallagher Responds to New COVID Restrictions

Slow the Fast Down: Public Encouraged to Follow the Speed Limit

YUBA CITY, CA (MPG) - A new statewide initiative encourages drivers to “slow the fast down” and understand the dangers of speeding. The statewide speeding campaign will be running Nov. 16-29. The Yuba City Police Department supports efforts by the California Office of Traffic Safety to address an emerging traffic safety issue: speeding. “We are seeing changes in driving behavior, and the number of people traveling at excessive and extremely dangerous speeds is alarming,” Yuba City Police Department, Sgt. Kim Slade. “COVID-19 puts the value of protecting lives in perspective, and practicing safe driving is one simple way everyone can keep themselves and others safe.”

Excessive speeding went way up during the beginning of stay-at-home orders in March. Between March 19 and April 30, CHP officers issued 4,000 citations for speeding over 100 miles per hour, more than double (113%) from last year despite a steep decline in traffic volume. “The road is not a racetrack,” Sgt. Kim Slade said. “The freeway is not the Autobahn. Follow a safe, legal speed.” Speeding remains one of the main causes of crashes: in federal fiscal year 2017-18, speed was a factor in approximately 31% of all fatal and injury crashes in California. Funding for this program was provided by a grant from the California Office of Traffic Safety, through the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration. ★

Yuba Water Agency Funds Drinking Water Infrastructure Repairs for Foothill Residents

MARYSVILLE, CA (MPG) - Yuba Water Agency took action today to improve water supply reliability for Camptonville residents. A \$56,000 grant, approved by Yuba Water’s board of directors, provides necessary funding for the Camptonville Community Services District to perform repairs to its Campbell Gulch diversion structure, which captures and diverts water for the entire community of Camptonville. “Our goal is to make sure that our communities have excellent water quality for their residents, and this project is crucial for foothill residents’ drinking water supply,” said Yuba Water Chairman Randy Fletcher, whose district includes Camptonville. “Without these repairs, it

is just a matter of time before the system fails.” The structure captures raw water from a creek that runs through Campbell Gulch before it is carried downstream through a pipe to the district’s filter plant, where it is then processed for drinking water. The diversion structure sustained significant damage due to high creek flows as a result of torrential rain events and is in need of repair to continue to provide a reliable water supply for the foothill community’s residents. This project is also part of the area’s Integrated Regional Water Management Plan, a collaborative effort to identify and implement water management solutions on a regional scale. Trump's Last Stand Against Health Dictatorship

Beyond the enormous economic interests that motivate the promoters of the ‘Great Reset,’ the imposition of the vaccination will be accompanied by the requirement of a health passport and a digital ID, with the consequent contact tracing of the population of the entire world. Those who do not accept these measures will be confined in detention camps or placed under house arrest, and all their assets will be confiscated.” Not a conspiracy theorist, Viganò’s explains that the ‘Great Reset’ is the declared objective of World Economic Forum globalists like Klaus Schwab, who says in his book, ‘Covid-19: The Great Reset,’ that the world will never return to ‘normal.’ Authoritarian rule is being installed now and through the first quarter of 2021, when more and more restrictions will be blamed on the virus. Most People know Inflation as a General Rise in Prices

Most people know inflation as a general rise in prices. The common perception is that inflation is normal and expected. Although historically that might ring true in the last century, there have been periods where inflation was a non-event. Deflation, the opposite of inflation, is a general fall in prices, and this has occurred throughout man's economic history, as well as periods where neither existed (stable prices).

There are four types of inflation: Supply side, demand side, regulatory and monetary.

Demand side inflation is when a good or service is in high demand and is sought after by many. Think housing in the mid 2000's, Japanese real estate in the mid 80's or anything else that becomes in high demand for whatever the reason. As the demand outpaces the supply, prices rise. More people want the item in question and therefore people are willing to pay more for it. As prices keep going up, demand eventually falls off. This is why it is said "high prices cure high prices". At some point fewer people can afford whatever it is in demand, and the higher prices eventually curb the demand.

Supply side inflation is driven by a scarcity situation that makes availability more difficult. Imagine a crop disease that wipes out the harvest or any other event that dries up the source. Prices rise as people are willing to bid up the price of an item due to its scarcity. Quite simply, when demand increases OR supply decreases, the price "inflates", hence the name inflation.

Regulatory inflation is when the price of something is artificially raised by adding a tax, tariff or other "fee", usually levied on it by an entity that has power or control over its distribution. This type of inflation occurs when a government or regulatory body attaches an arbitrary cost to the transaction.

Both demand, supply and regulatory inflation is asset specific, meaning it is not a general rise in all prices, but instead a rise in the price of a particular asset. It is however, not currency specific, meaning prices will rise no matter what currency is used to buy it. The most common and persistent type of inflation is monetary inflation. This is purely a general rise in prices that affects *only the currency in which the transaction is completed*, but unlike the other three types of inflation, is not asset specific. All prices will tend to rise. Note the distinct difference.

Monetary inflation is brought about by an increase in the money supply. Think Mexican Peso or more recently, Zimbabwe. No one really knows how bad the inflation in Zimbabwe got, but estimates are upwards of 4 quadrillion

percent at its worst point. This monetary type of inflation is the most common and is brought about by increasing the amount of whichever currency is used for the transaction.

Monetary inflation is currency specific, meaning a price of an item might be rising when priced in pesos, but might actually be falling when priced in Euros or U.S. dollars. Unlike the other three types of inflation, monetary inflation is not asset specific, but is currency specific.

With the advent of central banking, where a monetary authority is given control over a civilizations currency and can create it at will, monetary inflation increases when the central bank creates more of the currency for whatever reason. Think stimulus, bailouts or other social spending not paid for by borrowing. Governments do borrow to fund activities, but also routinely "create" currency in addition to borrowing.

The term "Banana Republic" came about to describe governments that egregiously print copious amounts of currency to fund activities. Once again the Mexican Peso illustrates the concept quite succinctly.

The eventual result of currency creation (commonly referred to as money printing) is an eventual and persistent overall increase in the price of all goods and services but only in the respective currency.

This type of inflation slowly impacts a societies' lower income levels first, and if the inflation persists, the damage slowly works its way up to the higher and higher income levels, until only the very wealthy remain.

Banana Republic type economies typically exhibit the haves and the have-not's wealth structure, whereas the have-nots grossly outnumber the haves, until the resulting wealth strata, when illustrated, looks like a pyramid. The vast majority of wealth is held by a very small percentage of the population at the top of the pyramid.

It could be argued that central banking, as the sole source of a currency, is the sole cause of a pyramid- type wealth distribution, by being the sole cause of monetary inflation.

FEMA's Committed to Butte County's Long-Term Camp Fire Recovery

OAKLAND, CA (MPG) - As we recognize the second anniversary of the Camp Fire on Nov. 8, the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) remains committed to Butte County's recovery.

Two years ago, the Camp Fire – California's deadliest and most destructive wildfire in history – swept through 153,336 acres over 16 days. It destroyed 18,804 structures, prompted the evacuation of more than 30,000 residents and took the lives of 85 individuals.

Such wide-spread damage required a coordinated effort between local, state and federal government, nongovernmental organizations, the private sector and volunteers to support Butte County in its response and long-term recovery efforts. Since 2018, FEMA has provided more than \$238 million in assistance to local and state government agencies, and residents to support recovery from the Camp Fire.

Individuals and households received \$84 million to manage rental expenses, home repair and home replacement costs, in addition to grants to replace personal property and cover other disaster-related expenses. As part of an extensive direct housing mission, FEMA also developed the 72-acre Gridley Industrial Park, with 289 manufactured housing units and mobile homes for thousands of displaced Butte County residents.

Costs of disaster-related debris removal, emergency protective measures to protect life and property, and permanent repair work to damaged or destroyed

infrastructure have totaled more than \$129 million. Funds have gone to repair and replace large portions of the Paradise Irrigation District's water system, repair and restore nine damaged or destroyed Paradise Unified School District facilities, remove debris on public and private property, repair damaged roads and rebuild the Honey Run Bridge.

More than \$25 million in hazard mitigation grants to Butte County and the Town of Paradise will reduce or eliminate the long-term risk to life and property from a future hazard. Some of the projects approved or under review will develop emergency notification systems, fuels reduction initiatives, administer code enforcement, install ignition-resistant materials in homes and create a defensible space program.

Due to the size and severity of the Camp Fire, FEMA established a long-term community recovery office in Paradise to take a holistic, long-term view of critical recovery needs and coordinate the mobilization of resources at the federal, state and community levels. Collectively, we are vested in and committed to the area's long-term recovery plan to restore a functioning, healthy economy, improve infrastructure, expand housing, address environmental considerations, and make Butte County and the Town of Paradise more resistant to future disasters.

Registered Sex Offender Arrested for Possession of Child Pornography

More High-Dollar Ballot Measures in 2022

Much has been said and written about the hundreds of millions of dollars spent for and against the dozen statewide measures on this month’s ballot.

Big money? Yes, but it was really just chicken feed, because the stakes in those ballot battles were infinitely greater.

Take, for instance, Proposition 15, a battle between a union-led coalition that proposed the measure, and a business coalition. Had Proposition 15 passed, it would have generated roughly \$10 billion a year for schools and local governments. That’s about 66 times as much as the one-time spending for and against the measure.

Other than the scale, there was nothing unusual this year about the lopsided risk-reward aspect of major ballot measures, and it will fuel another round of conflicts two years hence. There are at least four high-dollar ballot measures headed for the 2022 ballot:

MICRA – In 1975, Jerry Brown signed the Medical Injury Compensation Reform Act or MICRA, placing a \$250,000 cap on damages for what were called “pain and suffering” in medical malpractice lawsuits.

Consumer advocates and

personal injury lawyers have attempted numerous times in the Legislature to modify the law, contending that it protects bad medical care providers and short-changes their innocent patients. Providers and their insurers have turned back each challenge, saying that removing the cap would raise medical costs.

A measure already qualified for the 2022 ballot would adjust the cap for inflation retroactively to 1975, probably increasing it to well over \$1 million, and eliminate it for “catastrophic injuries.” The outcome could have multi-billion-dollar impacts and thus will mean multi-million-dollar campaigns.

PLASTICS – A certain-to-qualify measure would reduce or eliminate single-use plastic packaging through regulation and a tax.

California recycler Recology is the chief sponsor of the initiative, which would continue a crusade, also supported by environmental groups, that stalled in the Legislature thanks to fierce lobbying by a packaging industry coalition led by South Carolina-based Novolex.

As the battle shifts to the ballot, the Recology group will portray plastic packaging, particularly items used for takeout food, as environmental despoilers. The industry will counter that using plastic packaging is cleaner than the alternatives, particularly during a pandemic.

SPORTS WAGERING – Another virtually certain 2022 ballot measure also continues a contentious issue the Legislature failed to resolve – whether

legal sports wagering should come to California and if so, who should benefit.

A legislative measure would have given Indian tribal casinos and some horse racing tracks authority to take bets on sporting events, but the politically powerful casinos opposed it because it would also have sanctioned new forms of gambling in non-tribal card rooms, impinging on the tribes’ monopoly.

A tribal coalition’s pending ballot measure mirrors the failed legislation except for its card room enhancements. It’s uncertain whether the card rooms will try to mount an opposition drive but billions of gambling dollars will hinge on the outcome.

FLAVORED TOBACCO – Despite stalling on other issues, the Legislature did pass a ban on flavored tobacco products, which have been criticized as luring young men and women into tobacco use.

“It will be a point of deep pride and personal privilege as a father of four and as someone who’s had many, many family members die at the hands of the tobacco industry to sign that bill,” Gov. Gavin Newsom said.

The legislation was a defeat for the tobacco industry, which is fighting back with a referendum that would repeal the new law, just as this year’s Proposition 25, sponsored by the bail bond industry, erased a law that eliminated cash bail for criminal defendants.

Hoax Hype and Hypocrisy

The Chinese Communist Party (CCP) virus apparently struck a deal with U.S socialist leaders promising not to infect them though they violate the CCP Virus rules of engagement. A coalition of Nevada County restaurants organized in opposition to state-mandated, county-

enforced COVID-19 orders last week announced that it filed a federal lawsuit against the state and county

The suit names Gov. Gavin Newsom, other state officials, all of the Nevada County Supervisors, Public Health Officer Richard O. Johnson, Environmental Health Officer Amy Irani and County Counsel Kit Elliott. The 35-page complaint requests both preliminary and permanent injunctive relief again the enforcement of a number of orders issued by Newsom and the state, as well as Nevada County, and asks the court to prohibit retaliation based on the plaintiffs’ exercise of their First Amendment rights to freedom of speech and assembly. The complaint also asks for a judicial declaration that those state and county orders violated the restaurant owners’ rights under the 14th and 15th Amendments.

According to Attorney Nathan Harpainter, the rights being violated include the fundamental right to run a business and to seek lawful employment. “From my perspective as an attorney, the (state’s) actions significantly overstepped their constitutional boundaries.”

Restaurant Coalition lead attorney Stephen Bailey said, “We will ask that the court find that what the governor has been doing ... presumptively violates the Constitutional rights of these individuals, these businesses.”

The lawsuit seeks to determine whether the state and county actions have taken property from the restaurants, Bailey said, adding that a “takings claim” – essentially, monetary damages – would make the restaurants whole.

The lesson here is, fight for your rights or lose your rights.
