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Breaking Fire Records

If it seems that wildfires are burning nearly all the time these days, that there's no longer a definable fire season in California, you're right. Fourteen of the 20 most destructive fires in state history have occurred since 2007, and California has 78 more annual "fire days" now than it had 50 years ago.

2020 could break all the records, and in spectacular fashion. Jaw dropping "fire tornadoes" have spun out from the heat thrown off by monster fires in August. And a staggering sequence of more than 11,000 lightning strikes in a span of 72 hours in mid-August sparked several large blazes, unusual in California, where more than 95% of wildfires every year are human-caused.

In a state numbed by calamity – an extreme heatwave, power cuts to millions of residents and the ever-present menace of a worldwide pandemic – the apocalyptic fire scenes just pile on the misery.

Already this summer, with the fire season just taking hold, the statistics are substantially ahead of the curve: More than 5,300 fires have started in California, from the first of the year to mid-August, compared with 3,300 in the same period last year. A worrisome 100,000 acres have already burned. Last year only 28,000 acres were lost to fire by mid-August.

When 2018 became the worst fire year on record, we recognized a new reality: Each year could surpass the last, setting records for the size, destruction, cost and loss of life. A state-commissioned report made the harrowing projection that under current emissions trends, the average burn area in California will increase 77 percent by the end of the century.

The state has spent, conservatively, more than \$4.7 billion from its emergency fund from 2010 through 2019 to fight fires. Cal Fire, the state's firefighting agency, has been chewing through its firefighting budget only months into a year, leaving little to pay for thinning California's overgrown forests and helping rural

communities protect their infrastructure and water supplies.

The wildfire crisis has been at the top of the state's legislative to-do list for years, galvanizing the attention of Gov. Gavin Newsom and legislators, who have been working at an accelerated pace to address the problem.

But the response to the coronavirus, and the enormous unanticipated costs, may shuffle priorities.

So far, their approach has been to stabilize the financial health of the state's electric utilities by creating a \$21 billion compensation fund to pay for fire victims' claims, seeded with equal contributions from the companies and their customers.

They are also mandating more safety oversight and a requirement that the three largest utilities invest a total of \$5 billion to fireproof their equipment. Increasingly, those precautions have included preemptively cutting the power in high-risk areas during windy, red-flag conditions – a measure that has its own downsides, as California customers

SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) - The American Red Cross mobilized several teams in response to multiple fires throughout the California Gold Country Region. Right now, Red Cross volunteers and staff are supporting evacuees with non-congregate sheltering sites, water, snacks meals, and virtual health and mental health services.

Nearly 400 evacuees stayed in Red Cross, county, and independent shelters throughout the region. We have also assisted more than 200 individuals by placing them in local hotels.

Wildfires can occur anywhere in the country and can occur at any time throughout the year. The potential is always higher during periods with little or no rainfall, which make brush, grass, and trees dry and burn more easily. High winds can also contribute to spreading a fire.

If you live in a wildfire-prone area, prepare now, and work with your neighbors to build a fire-adapted community. Understand that your planning may be different this year because of the need to protect yourself and others from COVID-19. COVID-19 impacts us all, including firefighters, and an increase in infections may compromise their ability to respond to wildfires. Now more than ever we need to prepare ourselves and our communities for wildfires while taking recommended actions to protect one another from COVID-19.

"We are in the midst of a wildfire season here in Northern California. Many members of our community are currently evacuated on both sides of the valley. This is a reminder for all of us to be prepared, should we have to leave our homes," Said Nuriddin Ziyadinov, Executive Director of Northern California Chapter of Red Cross.

"Make sure you have your emergency go-bags ready and listen to local law enforcement for potential evacuations in your area".

Whitewater Flows Canceled on North Fork Feather River

SAN FRANCISCO, CA (MPG) - Pacific Gas and Electric Company (PG&E) announced that due to the COVID-19 pandemic, there will be no higher water flows for whitewater recreation along a portion of the North Fork Feather River.

PG&E usually conducts three or four whitewater recreational flows each summer in the Rock Creek Reach of the North Fork Feather River. After consultation, American Whitewater, the Plumas National Forest, the County of Plumas and PG&E decided to cancel the flows due to the pandemic and to adhere to guidelines that discourage

gatherings and travel.

The Rock Creek Reach is the 8.3-mile portion of the North Fork of the Feather River in the Plumas National Forest between PG&E's Rock Creek dam and the Rock Creek powerhouse near Storrie.

In September, PG&E will again discuss with stakeholders about whether the next scheduled higher flows will occur on the weekend of September 26-27.

During dry water years, recreation flows on the Rock Creek Reach are typically held three weekends a year - in July, August and September. In July, a big rig truck crashed into the river the day before higher flows were set to begin and they had to be canceled for safety. ★

Democrats Have Only Themselves to Blame for AB 5 Catastrophe

SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) - Following Sacramento politicians' mandate to do away with independent business contracts as dictated by Assembly Bill 5, many businesses and professionals fought for exemptions. Ridesharing companies, Uber and Lyft, the main targets of labor unions and Democrat lawmakers, were not successful in their efforts resulting in a roller coaster ride in the courts.

"This is a complete and utter catastrophe," said Senator Jim Nielsen (R-Tehama). "Hundreds of thousands of Californians have been sitting on pins and needles waiting for various court decisions. They fear facing a dismal job market that has resulted from haphazard COVID-19 shutdowns."

President Trump Approves Major Disaster Declaration

WASHINGTON, DC (MPG) - FEMA announced that federal disaster assistance has been made available to the state of California to supplement state, tribal, and local recovery efforts in the areas affected by wildfires from Aug. 14 and continuing.

The President's action makes federal funding available to affected individuals in Lake, Napa, San Mateo, Santa Cruz, Solano, Sonoma and Yolo counties. Assistance can include grants for temporary housing and home repairs, low-cost

loans to cover uninsured property losses, and other programs to help individuals and business owners recover from the effects of the disaster.

Federal funding is also available to the state, tribal, eligible local governments and certain private nonprofit organizations on a cost-sharing basis for emergency protective measures by wildfire in Lake, Napa, San Mateo, Santa Cruz, Solano, Sonoma and Yolo counties.

Federal funding is also available on a cost-sharing basis for hazard mitigation measures statewide.



Willie G. Nunn has been named as the Federal Coordinating Officer for federal recovery operations in the affected area. Damage assessments are continuing in other areas, and more counties and additional forms of assistance may be designated after the assessments are fully completed.

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FEMA Fire Management Assistance Granted for the Sheep Fire

OAKLAND, CA (MPG) - The Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) has authorized the use of federal funds to assist the state of California in combating the Sheep Fire burning in Lassen County.

On Aug. 22, 2020, the state of California submitted a request for a Fire Management Assistance Grant (FMAG) for the Sheep Fire. At the time of the request, the fire threatened approximately 450 homes in and around the

cities of Susanville and Janesville. The fire also threatened two schools, two power generation stations, transmission lines, and a watershed in the area.

The FEMA regional administrator approved the state's request on Aug. 22, 2020, as the fire threatened to become a major incident.

FMAGs provide federal funding for up to 75 percent of eligible firefighting costs. The Disaster Relief Fund provides allowances for FMAGs through FEMA to assist in fighting fires that threaten to cause major

disasters. Eligible costs covered by FMAGs can include expenses for field camps, equipment use, materials, supplies and mobilization, and demobilization activities attributed to fighting the fire.

quickly discovered.
California’s fires are disruptive long after they are put out, displacing homeowners and even entire communities for months or years. Even as the charred wood decays, it generates emissions that set back the state’s efforts to combat climate change – only worsening the wildfires to come.

LA Pays \$1.35M Fine for Scamming Voters

Since Yuba County’s illegal sales tax ordinance Measure K took effect in April 2019 nearly \$6 million (approx. \$10,000/day) has been taken from consumers. Though opponents challenged the tax ordinance and prevailed in Superior Court, Yuba County Supervisors appealed the ruling of Judge Stephen Berrier. The case now waits in the Appellate Court for a hearing.
Another violation that has yet to be contested in court is the fraudulent use of hundreds of thousands of taxpayer dollars by the Supervisors and County Administrator Robert Bendorf to fund the marketing campaign designed to convince voters to pay more taxes.
Using public funds to pass ballot measures is illegal. Government Code Section 54964 says “An officer, employee, or consultant of a local agency may not expend or authorize the expenditure of any of the funds of the local agency to support or oppose the approval or rejection of a ballot measure, or the election or defeat of a candidate, by the voters.”
The free speech clauses of the Federal and State Constitutions prohibit the use of governmentally compelled monetary contributions (including taxes) to support or oppose political campaigns since “Such contributions are a form of speech, and compelled speech offends the First Amendment.” Smith v. U.C. Regents (1993) 4 Cal.4th 843, 852.
And also, the “use of the public treasury to mount an election campaign which attempts to influence the

resolution of issues which our Constitution leaves to the ‘free election’ of the people (see Const., art. II, § 2) ... presents a serious threat to the integrity of the electoral process.” Stanson v. Mott (1976) 17 Cal.3d 206, 218.
These laws were noted by Measure K opponents during the campaign. However, here and statewide elected officials and civil servants sworn to defend the Constitution and uphold the law, colluded to deceive voters and literally loot and misuse hundreds of millions of dollars from taxpayers unaware of their rights.
Yuba County tax dollars were deceptively used for campaign consultants to conduct surveys, spin the measure’s wording and then craft media spots, mail appeals and other political propaganda to persuade voters to approve the measures.
Complaints were filed by Measure K opponents with the FPPC (Fair Political Practices Commission) to no avail. Finally, the FPPC said they were overwhelmed with violations and had little or no prosecutorial power. The FPPC representative said it was the role of the local DA to prosecute fraudulent misuse of tax monies but they ignore the violations.
In Yuba County’s case, now retired DA Pat McGrath worked for the passage of Measure K being a spokesperson at community meetings to sell the idea. He compromised his role as a law enforcement official by ignoring wrongdoing.
However, last week Los Angeles County agreed to pay a \$1.35 million fine to the FPPC which will be shared with Howard Jarvis

Taxpayers Association (HJTA) for LA County using tax funds to promote Measure H, a tax proposal to raise money to address their homeless crisis.
We’ve waited a long time for this” said Jon Coupal, President of the HJTA, which filed the original complaint against the county on March 2, 2017. “As we head into the November election, local governments up and down California are tempted to use taxpayer funds for political advocacy and or fail to report the same as political contributions. This fine by the FPPC will serve as a huge shot across the bow to all government entities in California not to abuse taxpayers by using public funds for political activity.”
LA’s Measure H campaign passed with nearly 70% of the vote and is raising an estimated \$355 million a year for 10 years. HJTA complained about the use of public funds, but as usual, that county’s DA refused to investigate. HJTA then filed a lawsuit and complained to the FPPC.
Although LA County agreed to the fine it is chump change compared with their raiding of county coffers and deceiving voters to lift \$355 million a year or nearly \$4 billion over ten years. Until the people responsible get jail time the lawlessness will continue because it pays well.
If you are looking for schemers and scammers, like Ponzi and Madoff, they just don’t reside in jails and prisons, just look at your local representatives and civil servants.

Protect Yourself and Others from COVID-19:
In public, cover your mouth and nose with a cloth face covering and practice physical distancing by keeping 6 feet between yourself and others. Don’t use cloth face coverings on children under age 2, anyone who has trouble breathing, or is unable to remove it without help. Avoid close contact with people who do not share your home;
Wash your hands often with soap and water for at least 20 seconds. Soap and water are always preferable, but if they are not available, use a hand sanitizer that contains at least 60% alcohol;
Always cover your coughs and sneezes with a tissue or use the inside of your elbow;
Clean AND disinfect frequently touched surfaces and items daily, including

tables, doorknobs, light switches, countertops, handles, desks, phones, remote controls, keyboards, toilets, faucets, and sinks;
If you are at higher risk for serious COVID-19 illness, continue to avoid all non-essential outings and gatherings. It is ok to go outside to exercise, walk pets, visit medical professionals, and leave during an emergency or if advised to evacuate during a wildfire. ★

Oroville Man Drives Truck into PD

OROVILLE, CA (MPG) - On Friday afternoon, August 14th, at approximately 3:00 PM, Jedidiah Guerra, 33 years old of Oroville, drove a 1997 Chevrolet full size truck into the public lobby of the Oroville Police Department. The collision caused extensive damage to the lobby, the public restroom, as well as damaging the plumbing to the building. Guerra attempted to flee on foot

and assaulted two officers who attempted to contact Guerra. Guerra was ultimately detained and placed under arrest, in front of the Police Department, without further incident.
Fortunately, there wasn’t anyone inside the lobby or the public restroom at the time of the incident. The cost to repair the damage is unknown at this time. The public lobby and restroom of the Oroville Police Department and the Oroville Fire Department are closed until for repairs.

Based on the investigation it appears Guerra drove into the Oroville Police Department intentionally; however, the reason is still under investigation. Guerra was booked in the Butte County Jail for Driving Under the Influence, Felony Vandalism, and two counts of Battery on a Police Officer. Guerra’s bail was set at \$140,000.

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



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

This Month In Your Garden

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It is already September and that means we are on the path to fall which usually brings with it some cooling temperatures and definitely shorter days. There are definitely things to be done in the garden. Watering and keeping weeds at bay seems to be ever present by this time of the year, but will begin to slack off. A winter vegetable garden means it is almost time to take out the plants that have been producing all summer. I know that is a tough thing to make yourself do since many plants are still producing. Unless there is another garden plot to be used, clearing the present spot is just about the only choice. Start with the plants that are obviously showing signs of slowing production and go from there – tomatoes are usually what we have to give up last. Where ever the new winter garden is to go, the soil needs to be worked up and readied. The winter veggies will begin to be available soon. They will do better if they are planted in cooler weather than we have been experiencing this summer. We get requests for winter vegetables in the heat of August, but we usually wait until the second week of September to offer them.

September is an important month for fertilizing trees and shrubs. They store nutrients within the trunks and limbs to carry them through the winter, and help them leaf out, bloom and set fruit in the coming spring season. This has to be done while there are still healthy green and working leaves on them. There is no specific time for the leaves to start showing the fall color change, but we all know it is in fall. Keep an eye on them and don't miss the opportunity to get the fertilizing done. It will benefit your shrubs and trees. As usual, there are exceptions – any plant that has already set buds for spring bloom, such as rhododendrons and camellias should not be fertilized now, do them soon after they finish their bloom cycle. The reason being, is that they will likely respond to the fertilizer and start putting on new growth which can push the buds off the plant. Just wait until they have finished their bloom cycle to fertilize them. That is when they normally start putting on new growth and the fertilizer is very beneficial for that process.

Since September ushers in fall, it is a month that allows us to do things that would have been difficult in the heat of the summer. Of course, I am assuming that we will have fairly normal fall weather. Number one, you can plant a lawn. As the temperatures trend down and we no longer have the scorching heat we had earlier, it is much easier to keep the newly emerging grass damp enough so that it doesn't perish. Speaking of lawns, this is the proper time to apply fertilizer with pre-emergent to kill and prevent crabgrass. Number two, ground covers from flats can also be planted and established since it is so much easier to keep the area damp, allowing roots and runners to find their way and multiply, Number three, It is a good time to dig up some perennials and divide them

to enlarge a bed, create a new bed, or share them with other gardeners. This is routine for many garden clubs at this time of the year. Number four, this is the time to start thinking about any trees or large shrubs that you might want to plant this fall. Fall is the best time for planting trees and shrubs. They will slowly develop roots during the winter, giving them an advantage over the same thing planted next spring. I know that choosing a tree going dormant is not as intriguing as picking out a tree leafing out with fresh foliage in the lovely spring weather. But, the fall planted tree will leaf out next spring in your yard. September and October are the best months for tree planting, so start thinking about the trees you would consider. Pick out your tree or plant, take it home in the container, put it in a place that can't be missed and water it well daily, until you are able to get it planted. Once planted, they should be kept moist. Most newly planted trees need 20 to 25 gallons of water a week during September and 15 gallons per week or so during October. Depending on weather. Water should be given about 3 times a week.

The soil is still warm in September, so it is an ideal time to plant winter annuals if you are interested in some colorful plants in the yard throughout the winter. Plant them soon into the still warm soil as opposed to the cold soil which can stunt them – they will grow, but probably not flourish until warmer spring weather comes. Enjoy the color all winter by starting them soon. Consider pansies, violas, primroses, snapdragons, calendulas, cyclamen and dianthus. Bulbs will be available in many places soon. Plant now for spring bloom. If you have a gopher problem, choose daffodils and narcissus, they will not bother them except to sometimes move them around a bit. Fall is also the time to plant wildflower seeds. When shopping for them check the container carefully. Pure wildflower seed is a bit expensive and often it looks as if it is a bargain until you check the contents of the package and find a large percentage is grass seed. Because many of the wildflower seeds are very small it is a good idea to mix them with some sand or something else to give them bulk so that they can be spread more evenly over a larger area. Using pre-emergent now will help to reduce the growth of winter weeds, keeping in mind that it will keep any good seeds you may have planted from sprouting as well, so be careful with it. Remember that all those leaves that will be falling soon make great compost. If you have a compost pile add them. If you don't, you might want to find space to start one – it is great to have it always available, especially in the summer. Enjoy the coming seasonal changes.

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Liberal Policies Bring Black-Outs

Venezuela is known for the greatest oil reserves in the world. However, since it became socialist on February 2, 1999, what once was one of the world's most prosperous independent nations now imports gasoline. Socialist California with world-renowned oil and other energy producing resources has also been importing fuel and power for years.

Like Venezuelans, most Californians cannot afford the state and many are leaving.

California energy policies have forced fossil fuel and nuclear utility plants to close in order to power the entire state on green energy (solar and wind). There is talk to also eliminate hydro-plants and dams to re-wild the rivers.

The interesting aspect of the current black-outs is that people are now learning that much of our energy/fuel is being imported from outside the state. The irony is that though liberal politicians are anti-fossil and hydro power they buy power from these same sources produced elsewhere.

California has always had the ability to be energy independent with phenomenal fossil fuel reserves, natural gas, geothermal and hydro power. However, liberal state policies have crippled the exploration and extraction of oil. Hydro is stymied because the state refuses to allow more dams for water storage. Nuclear is clean energy but has a stigma with liberals.

Legislators have mandated the eventual moratorium on the use of fossil fuels but they lack the know-how to switch to 'green energy' and not economically crash the state. The current black-outs occurred because we had a heat wave, there was no sun or wind to create electricity at night and

insufficient oil and hydro-power to import.

Fossil and hydro sources produce consistent utility flows while green energy is sporadic so the utility grid buys energy from out-of-state to meet routine shortages. During daytime hours on a sunny day there can be a glut of solar-produced energy but there are no battery fields large enough to store energy for the dark periods. The storage dilemma affects wind power, as well.

Energy experts say politicians can make policies but no one has an idea how going green will practically work in real life. And the truth is that renewable energy is not really renewable or green. It's all a bit of a fraud and very expensive, but it sounds cool to liberals.

All machines require the mining and processing of millions of tons of primary materials to make and the disposal of hardware that inevitably wears out. Compared with fossil fuels, green machines entail, on average, a 10-fold increase in the quantities of materials extracted and processed to produce the same amount of energy.

So, any significant expansion of today's meager amount of green energy – currently less than 4% of the country's total consumption (versus 56% from oil and gas) – will create an unprecedented increase in global mining for needed minerals, radically increase existing environmental and labor challenges in emerging markets (where many mines are located), and dramatically increase U.S. imports and the vulnerability of America's energy supply chain.

Mark. P Mills, Energy and Tech expert at the Manhattan Institute offers some sobering facts showing California is poised for expensive energy and routine shortages.

Mills says, "Building wind turbines and solar panels to generate electricity,

as well as batteries to fuel electric vehicles, requires, on average, more than 10 times the quantity of materials, compared with building machines using hydrocarbons to deliver the same amount of energy to society."

"A single electric car contains more cobalt than 1,000 smartphone batteries; the blades on a single wind turbine have more plastic than 5 million smartphones; and a solar array that can power one data center uses more glass than 50 million phones."

"Replacing hydrocarbons with green machines under current plans – never mind aspirations for far greater expansion – will vastly increase the mining of various critical minerals around the world. For example, a single electric car battery weighing 1,000 pounds requires extracting and processing some 500,000 pounds of materials. Averaged over a battery's life, each mile of driving an electric car "consumes" five pounds of earth. Using an internal combustion engine consumes about 0.2 pounds of liquids per mile."

"Oil, natural gas, and coal are needed to produce the concrete, steel, plastics, and purified minerals used to build green machines. The energy equivalent of 100 barrels of oil is used in the processes to fabricate a single battery that can store the equivalent of one barrel of oil."

"By 2050, with current plans, the quantity of worn-out solar panels – much of it non-recyclable – will constitute double the tonnage of all today's global plastic waste, along with over 3 million tons per year of unrecyclable plastics from worn-out wind turbine blades. By 2030, more than 10 million tons per year of batteries will become garbage."

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Study Brings out Five Worries with California's Economy

NFIB Press Release

SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) - A study released by the nation's leading small-business association revealed five issues in particular that were more problematic for Main Street entrepreneurs in California to deal with than they were for their counterparts across the nation.

Every four years since 1982, NFIB has published its Small Business Problems & Priorities report listing 75 concerns small-business owners have with their abilities to keep their doors open and people employed. For only the second time, California was segmented out from the national readings (New York, Texas, and Ohio were the only other states), and while some issues ranked parallel to, or didn't vary widely from, the national readings (cost of health care, federal taxes, property taxes, to name a few), five issues did show a double-digit disparity between how small-business owners across the nation ranked them as problems in comparison to California's Main Street entrepreneurs:

(1) Environmental

regulations ranked 38th nationally, 15th in California for a 23-placement difference; (2) Cost of government required equipment/procedures came in 39th nationally, 19th in California for 20-placement difference; (3) Hiring/firing/employment regulations ranked 43rd nationally, 23rd in California for another 20-placement difference; (4) Obtaining licenses, permits, etc. came in 45th nationally and 29th in California for 16-rank difference; (5) Minimum wage/living wage ranked 34th nationally, 20th in California for a 14-placement difference.

"There were some issues that were of less concern to California small-business owners than they were to others across the nation," said John Kabateck, California state director for NFIB, "but for five of the 75 issues, there was an alarming variance it would behoove state policymakers to give serious consideration to ameliorating. With only a few weeks left in the 2020 session, it's probably too late now, but that leaves four whole months to start laying the groundwork for some

2021 action. In the meantime, voters can do their part by electing more pro-small-business candidates to office."

The 2020 edition of the Small Business Problems & Priorities report also divided the 75 issues, nationally, by: Number of employees (Page 39); Industry (Page 48); Population density (Page 68); Years of ownership (Page 71); Gender (Page 74); Legal form of business, such as partnership, sub-chapter S, LLC, etc. (Page 78)

The California-specific rankings begin on Page 82.

Farmers Work to Help Coastal Crops Weather Heat Wave

Hot weather along the California coast places a strain on cool-season crops. A University of California specialist advises farmers on the Central Coast to irrigate their vegetable crops the proper length of time to prevent heat damage. Another farm advisor reports losses to strawberries from the high temperatures. UC Cooperative Extension also says avocados require care to prevent hot weather from harming trees and fruit.

High School, College Ag Instructors Adjust To Virtual Teaching

As schools reopen--in many cases, virtually--agricultural instructors must figure out how to provide the hands-on learning their classes require. At colleges that can combine distance and in-person learning, physical lab sessions have altered schedules or shop spaces to assure social distancing. High school agricultural instructors say they have distributed lesson kits, supplies and other materials to allow students to do projects at home.

Virtual Classes Bring Changes to School Food Service

School districts starting the academic year with virtual classes have adjusted how they buy food. Many districts continue to offer curbside meal delivery to students and their families. As a result, they're now buying fruits, vegetables and other foods in individual servings, rather than in bulk for display at salad bars and cafeteria lines. That has required produce packinghouses to change how they package foods sold to schools.

Pandemic Reduces Supplies of Equipment Parts

The pandemic has complicated work for California farmers who need replacement parts for machinery. In some cases, parts have been in short supply. The Association of Equipment Manufacturers says plants in Mexico slowed parts production during the early weeks of the pandemic, making certain spare parts hard to come by. Farmers and equipment dealers say supplies have stabilized, especially for American-made parts. ★

Man Arrested in Three Year-Old Murder Case

Butte County Sheriff's Office

OROVILLE, CA (MPG) - The Butte County Sheriff's Office (BCSO) announced the arrest of Larry Bonner of Oroville, age 54, for the murder of John Prater. The arrest is the culmination of an investigation that began in 2017. At that time the Butte County Sheriff's Office began investigating a homicide in the Oroville area that was reported on October 5, 2017. Prater was 35 years-old at the time of his death. For the past three years, Butte County Sheriff's Office detectives have continued to investigate Prater's murder. During the investigation detectives identified Bonner as a suspect.

While investigating the murder, detectives located evidence linking Bonner to unrelated cases involving illegal possession of firearms and narcotics. Detectives arrested Bonner in September of 2019 for

the firearms and narcotics charges. Bonner was convicted on the firearms and narcotics charges, and was sentenced to seven years in California State Prison. Over the past year detectives have been working with the Butte County District Attorney's Office and conducting additional follow-up on the murder case.

In July of 2020, detectives obtained an arrest warrant for Bonner for one felony count of murder. On August 11, Bonner was transported from San Quentin State Prison to the Butte County Jail. The Sheriff's Office is asking anyone with information about this investigation to contact Detective Vaj Thao at 530-538-7671.

Sheriff Kory Honea said, "I am proud of the persistent determination of the detectives who have worked throughout the years to bring justice to John and closure to his family." ★

Ninth Circuit Court Rules on 10 Plus Firearm Magazines

WASHINGTON, DC (MPG) - The California Rifle & Pistol Association received the much-anticipated ruling in the long-fought Second Amendment case *Duncan v. Becerra*. This is the same case that led to "Freedom Week" where thousands of Californians were able to lawfully purchase standard capacity magazines much like the rest of the country.

CRPA has been fighting this case since the 30,000+ member-driven organization filed it in 2017, and has led the fight through the courts with the assistance of the National Rifle Association.

Initially won through a positive ruling by the United States District Court in San Diego, the state quickly appealed — and Judge Benitez was forced to stay his ruling to allow the purchase of magazines holding more than 10 rounds of ammunition until the appeal was made to the Ninth Circuit. CRPA's legal team quickly answered the State's appeal and presented oral arguments.

"Today's decision in *Duncan v. Becerra* is a major victory for the Second Amendment, both in California and across the country," said Chuck Michel, president and General Counsel of the California Rifle & Pistol Association.

In its case, CRPA demonstrated how prohibiting law-abiding citizens from manufacturing, obtaining, selling, transferring,

or even possessing standard-issue magazines for firearms violates the constitution.

"After years of fighting, the Court decided in favor of our plaintiffs' challenge against the state's ban on standard capacity magazines that hold more than 10 rounds," said Michel.

The court noted that the state's efforts to ban these magazines does not pass the strict scrutiny or intermediate scrutiny tests and is a heavy burden on the Second Amendment rights of Californians.

"This is a huge win specifically for the right to possess these valuable self-defense tools. But more generally, this case may present the Supreme Court with an opportunity to set things straight on the underlying issue of what the standard of review test should be when considering any Second Amendment challenge," Michel said. "The Supreme Court seems inclined to do away with the complicated subjective tests that many courts have wrongly applied in Second Amendment cases, in favor of a clearer more objective "originalist" approach that considers the text, history and tradition of a law to determine what infringements might be tolerated," he concluded.

CRPA continues to fight in nearly a dozen major court battles to protect and defend the Second Amendment in California.

Newsom Exploits Health Crisis to Free Thousands of Convicted Felons

SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) - Senate Republican Leader Shannon Grove (R-Bakersfield) released the following statement in response to Governor Newsom's expansion plan to release additional convicted felons from four separate correctional facilities. According to a recent article published in The San Francisco Chronicle, the Governor's early release plan could free at least 50,000 convicted felons which is nearly three times the original figure as reported in the media.

On March 4, Governor Newsom ordered the mandated shutdown of California. Under the guise of the crisis, the Governor has granted the early release of 18,000 convicted felons. He now has ordered the California Department of Corrections and Rehabilitation (CDCR) to expand the early release program to include four additional correctional facilities.

Convicted felons serving their sentences for horrific crimes such as assault with a deadly weapon, throwing acid, vehicular manslaughter, armed robbery, and arson are among many of those on Newsom's lucky release list.

"Once again Governor Newsom and his liberal administration choose convicted felons over victims' families and law-abiding Californians. Governor Newsom has already released over ten thousand prisoners early and California's reentry system is already having trouble finding housing, food and other re-entry services for the released prisoners."

"Instead of focusing on releasing criminals from prison early and overwhelming communities with thousands of unhoused and dangerous felons, Governor Newsom should focus on securing the energy grid, stopping these rolling black-outs, and protecting our law-abiding citizens and families," said Senate Republican Leader Shannon Grove. ★
