YUBA/SUTTER COUNTIES, CA (MPG) - Recently, local businessman Sarb Thiara has taken the job of supporting the Yuba-Sutter communities during the COVID-19 pandemic to heart.

Due to the Corona Virus, Yuba City and Marysville areas are in the midst of a food crisis. Thiara, responded to a call of the Yuba-Sutter COVID19 Task Force and SAYLove's request for food donations as community food closets are running dry. With the help of his friends and

family, Sarb Thiara generously donated 5639 lbs. of food to the Food Hub (Yuba City Kmart) and a large monetary donation of \$5,000 to the organizations behind the distribution. Thiara also donated the use of his company van to help transport goods throughout the crisis. In an online post, SAYLove's founder, Jeff Stephens, thanked Thiara and his crew for his generosity and support.

Thiara didn't stop there. In a memo addressed to the first responders and health-care workers in the Yuba/Sutter Area, Thiara said,

"We wanted to take some time to let you know that we appreciate all the efforts the county has provided to this community. Without your selfless work, we could not have maintained this county at the standard we have," thanking both counties and their employees for "maintaining the safety of the community." As part of that special "Thank You," Thiara and his crew treated the Yuba and Sutter County Sheriffs' Departments, Yuba City and Marysville Police Departments, Yuba City and Marysville Fire Departments, Bi-County

Ambulance and Adventist Health Hospital to free lunches catered by Cool Hand Lukes of Yuba City. That afternoon, the Yuba County Sheriff's Department publicly thanked Thiara, the Thiara family and Jovan Orchards in a statement online saying that the lunches were the "highlight of our workday" and "thank you so much for your kindness and support!" Spokesperson for Thaira, Money Dhami says that this all comes from the desire to support and a love of the Yuba-Sutter communities. ★

Survey Shows Strains on Rural California

SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) - Lost markets and lost off-farm income related to the COVID-19 pandemic have proven doubly difficult for many California farmers and ranchers, according to a survey by the California Farm Bureau Federation. More than half of the farmers responding to the voluntary survey said they had lost customers or sales due to COVID-19, and nearly half said they or someone in their immediate family had lost off-farm income.

"Just as in the rest of society, the effects of the pandemic have reverberated throughout rural California," CFBF President Jamie Johansson said. "There's no aspect of farming, ranching or agricultural business that has been spared."

CFBF and the Farm Employers Labor Service, a Farm Bureau affiliate, asked farmers and ranchers to respond to an online survey form between April 7 and April 21. More than 500 responded. Nearly 57% of respondents said they had lost customers or sales during the pandemic, with most citing stay-at-home orders that had closed customers' businesses. Forty-two percent of responding farmers said they or a family member had lost off-farm income, mainly because of jobs unavailable due to stay-at-home orders or to care for children due to school and child-care closures.

"Most farm and ranch households count on off-farm income to supplement what they earn from agriculture," Johansson said, "and have seen those jobs reduced at the same time as prices farmers and ranchers earn for many crops and commodities have fallen."

About three-quarters of the responding farmers said they had been able to maintain operations so far, and had been able to avoid furloughing or laying off employees. Of those who reported reducing operations or staff, most cited cuts to customer orders or revenue. Only 20% reported employees unable to work, mostly because the employees were considered in a high-risk group for the novel coronavirus. About one-third reported being unable to undertake routine planting, cultivation or crop-care activities due to lack of personal protective equipment such as respiratory protection.

High School Food Pantry Becomes Mobile

NEVADA COUNTY, CA (MPG) - In January, a startling number of about 380 homeless students (K-12) was reported to the United Way of Nevada County Food Insecurity Committee. As a result of this report, a collaboration with the Nevada Union Joint High School District, Interfaith Food Ministry, the Food Bank of Nevada County, and United Way of Nevada County was formed, and a new high school food pantry program was created to help students who have been dealing with homelessness and food insecurity. When this program began, the Food Pantry initially was open on Fridays at Nevada Union High School with volunteers providing bags of healthy shelf-sustainable food to students in need. This program has been run by a group of volunteers who have been very passionate about helping students get the much-needed food.

"I volunteered because I thought that I could help students in need. What I experienced was a group of young adults

empowered to take care of themselves, their families, and loved ones." Deborah Lewis, United Way Board Member.

The pilot program began at Nevada Union High School, with the hope of growing the program to include other high schools in Nevada County. Due to COVID-19 and the shelter in place restrictions, the High School Food Pantry has now become a mobile food pantry and is being held at Nevada Union High School and at Bear River High School.

Currently food is being distributed every

other Tuesday during the Reduced and Free Meal distribution at the high schools. Volunteers, practicing social distancing and wearing masks and gloves, deliver bags of food as cars drive up. Approximately 100 families each week have received extra bags of groceries on Tuesdays as supplemental food during the distribution.

"When I meet these families that are being greatly effected by lay-offs and the effects of COVID-19, I feel very thankful that we live in such a giving community and that

we are able to at least give them some healthy food to help them get through the week." Megan Timpany, United Way Executive Director.

This program will continue as a mobile high school food pantry while the Reduced and Free Meals are distributed to families. Once the students go back to school, the program will continue to run at Bear River High School and Nevada Union High School. News Outlook

Ever wonder what kind of unique things are going on out there at the Air Force Base? Many people are aware of the reconnaissance operations; it's cool but all top secret.

You can't go to a reconnaissance information processing visitor centre. There are 23,000 acres that make up Beale Air Force Base, so it hosts many missions. Today's highlight is on one that you may not know about - the 9th Medical Group, which is made up of three squadrons: 9th Medical Operations, 9th Medical Support and 9th

Physiological Support Squadrons. They provide for the medical needs of Beale AFB beneficiaries and support Beale's high-altitude flyers in the U-2 aircraft. The Beale Clinic is located on Warren Shingle Road on a gentle hillside near base housing. The

clinic's primary mission is to support the worldwide operational readiness and high altitude mission of the 9th Reconnaissance Wing. They provide comprehensive health care, physiological and environmental support and promote health education and wellness to the Beale AFB community. The Beale Clinic is accredited by the Joint Commission on the Accreditation of Healthcare Organizations and is dedicated to providing support to active-duty members of base tenant organizations and their family members.

This outpatient clinic consists of both the 9th Medical Operations and 9th Medical Support Squadrons that provide primary care services with aerospace medicine and limited ancillary (e.g., pharmacy, laboratory, radiology) capabilities. No inpatient or emergency services are available and minimal specialty services exist. The clinic's range of services include Family Practice/Primary Care, Women's Health, Pediatrics, Flight Medicine, Dental, Life Skills Support, Family Advocacy, Laboratory, Pharmacy, Optometry, Physical Therapy, Public Health, Radiology, Health and Wellness and Immunizations.

That seems like a lot of things, and it is. They say that for every one person at the front lines pointing a gun at the bad guy and pulling the trigger there's like 15 in the chain that puts the person there. Such is true in the Air Force, we outside the fence see an plane fly by, but there is a global logistical team keeping everything running all the time, with hundreds of people for each plane. If we ever let our guard down it would not be good, so having this massive military organization is imperative, it is also understood by few people. Fewer than one percent of Americans are in the military, compared with about nine percent during World War II. Admiral Mike Mullen, a former chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff, says he's concerned the military is becoming its own separate class. "Most American families aren't connected to the military, don't have kids that are in the military, don't have friends that have kids that are in the military," he said. "This is a little bit of an exaggeration, but it's almost like the French Foreign Legion."

Celebrating Women and the 19th Amendment with "Wo-Manikins"

MARYSVILLE, CA (MPG) - Wo-Manikins is a timely, but slightly awkward term for a very important project being undertaken this year by Yuba Sutter Arts. It is a manikin decorating project, art gallery exhibit, an art march and celebratory brunch. Yuba Sutter Arts has half torso female shell manikins looking for good homes. The manikins are free to individual community members, families, businesses and service clubs willing to decorate a manikin and to participate in our gallery show which will be a celebration of women and the enactment of the 19th Amendment to the U.S. Constitution which gave women the right to vote.

Manikin or mannequin comes from the French word mannequin, which had acquired the meaning "an artist's jointed model." Historically, artists have often used articulated mannequins, as an aid in drawing draped figures that may be kept immobile for far longer than would be possible by using a living model. Mannequins were a frequent motif in the works of many early 20th-century artists, notably the Metaphysical painters Giorgio de Chirico, Alberto Savinio and Carlo Carrà.

As part of the Wo-Manikins project, the public is invited to decorate a manikin that will be displayed in the Gallery at Yuba Sutter Arts during the month of August 2020. Additionally, the decorated manikins will be part of the "March of the Wo-Manikins" on Saturday, August 22, a short march (walk) where the decorated manikins will be paraded publicly (location tbd) followed by a "Celebration Brunch" hosted by Yuba Sutter Arts. Volunteering to decorate a manikin entitles participants to be part of the march and enjoy the brunch for free.

The goal is to call attention to the significance of the passage of the 19th amendment and other ongoing women's issues in the 21st century including, but not limited to the gender wage gap, violence against women, hunger and homelessness, lack of affordable child care and human trafficking. Passed by Congress June 4, 1919, and ratified on August 18, 1920, the 19th amendment granted women the right to vote. Nielsen on Re-Opening of Phase Two

SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) - Governor Gavin Newsom unveiled his plan to re-open certain segments of the state's economy. Senator Jim Nielsen (R-Tehama), who represents northern rural counties, issued the following statement:

"Governor Newsom is responding to the messages from so many of California's counties that have been lightly-impacted by the Coronavirus, to allow local decision makers and public health officials to determine when and how to restart their respective businesses

and local enterprises."

"Rural counties have much lower infection rates than urban areas of the state. Sacramento County, the most populist county in the Fourth Senate District, has the lowest coronavirus infection rate of any large U.S. metro area as reported by the Sacramento Bee. As of May 2, Sacramento County had only 26 Covid-related hospitalizations.

"Our economy is in crisis. The shelter-in-place must be lifted.

"Approximately 74% percent of Californians are worried about their personal finances (PPIC). It is clear that Californians can return to their

businesses and employment and restore their economic lives, and do so responsibly, as we move forward from this temporary order.

"More than three million Californians have filed for unemployment, many of whom continue to struggle with getting their rightful benefits through state government via the Employment Development Department (EDD). The state deficit is estimated to be in the tens of billions. Economists expect this recession to be worse than the Great Recession.

"We must thoughtfully re-open the economy now, so that our people don't experience any further financial hardship." ★

YUBA SUTTER COUNTIES, CA (MPG) - On Friday, April 17th, the “Yuba-Sutter Covid-19 Relief Task Force” held an emergency food drive. Overwhelming community support resulted in 42,639 pounds of donated food which went directly to the Yuba-Sutter Food Bank. Dozens of Yuba-Sutter food pantries that provide food to food-insecure families, rely on the Yuba-Sutter Food Bank for supplies.

In addition to donated food items, \$31,220 in monetary contributions and pledges were collected.

Area food pantries are experiencing a significant uptick in demand due to the rising unemployment resulting from the COVID-19 pandemic. Bulk food is being secured by

the Yuba-Sutter Covid-19 Relief Task Force to supply additional food to area pantries to meet the increased demand and cash awards are being given to local food pantries and the Yuba-Sutter Food Bank.



Energy Efficiency Incentives for Homeowners Rebuilding Homes after Wildfires Extended

CHICO, CA (MPG) - A program that provides customers rebuilding homes lost in wildfires with financial incentives for incorporating enhanced energy efficiency measures has been extended.

In January, PG&E's Advanced Energy Rebuild initiative program was extended into 2020 for customers who obtain building permits this year to replace a home lost in a recent major wildfire like the Carr or Camp fires. Customers can receive up to \$12,500 in rebuild incentives by adopting energy-efficient construction practices in homes rebuilt after a wildfire – even if the home is built elsewhere in PG&E's service area.

Customers with manufactured homes built to ENERGY STAR V.2 certification or higher also are eligible to apply for the incentives. An all-electric manufactured home with high efficiency equipment and appliances could qualify for up to \$7,000 in incentives.

The owner of a rebuilt home nearing completion in the Camp Fire footprint earned incentives by using PG&E's Advanced Energy Rebuild program.

In Paradise, Heidi Lange's home is being rebuilt and will be about 23 percent more efficient than a similar home not utilizing the same enhanced energy efficiencies. She took advantage of the financial incentives to help pay for more efficient insulation, windows, a water heater and

heating and cooling systems that will lower her energy bills.

Lange is pleased that using less energy also means her home is more environmentally friendly.

"I'm all for that," said Lange. "I try to do my part to be responsible."

So far, about 75 customers affected by the Camp Fire are either enrolled in or have applied for Advanced Energy Rebuild program.

"We realize our customers have many priorities and challenges right now, and this program is designed to assist with lowering utility bills while creating more comfortable and sustainable homes for decades to come," said Laurie Giammona, Senior Vice President of Customer Care and Chief Customer Officer at PG&E. "These financial incentives cover some, if not all, of the additional cost of higher-efficiency appliances and building improvements like better insulation, advanced windows, air sealing and heat pumps for water and space heating."

Expanding Upon a Successful Model

The Advanced Energy Rebuild program was originally developed by Sonoma Clean Power and PG&E after the October 2017 wildfires in the North Bay. At the request of PG&E, in early 2019 the California Public Utilities Commission made the same program available to all areas impacted by the 2017-2018 Northern California wildfires.

Approximately 260 customers have taken advantage of Advanced Energy Rebuild in the North Bay.

Supporting Savings for New Homes

PG&E is encouraging customers to build high-performing homes that will result in lower energy bills. Customers can receive between \$2500 to \$12,500 in incentives, depending on building choices they select. An efficient, all-electric home would earn the highest incentive.

Incentives are available to serve customers with destroyed homes in 10 Northern California counties – including Mendocino, Sonoma, Lake, Napa, Solano, Butte, Yuba, Plumas, Shasta and Nevada – where wildfires occurred in 2017 and 2018. These customers are eligible for incentives if they pull a permit for a new building by the end of 2020.

Funding for the program is from public service program surcharges on utility bills that are designed to increase conservation and energy efficiency in California.

Rural Economy Will Benefit From New Federal Aid Package

SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) - As farmers, ranchers, their employees and other people in the food supply chain continue to cope with the impact of market shifts caused by the COVID-19 pandemic, the California Farm Bureau Federation welcomed today's announcement of aid to farms and food banks from the U.S. Department of Agriculture.

"The entire rural economy has been affected by the sudden, severe shift in demand we've seen since the stay-at-home orders went into place," CFBF President Jamie Johansson said. "Farmers, ranchers, food processors and others along the food chain are working as rapidly as we can to be sure the food we produce can be redirected from restaurants, schools and other food service outlets to retail stores, where the demand has moved."

The Coronavirus Food Assistance Program announced by USDA will include \$16 billion in direct assistance to farmers and ranchers who have suffered losses related to the pandemic and another \$3 billion in purchases of food

for distribution to food banks and other nonprofits.

"Aid to farmers and ranchers will benefit the entire rural economy, allowing farmers to continue hiring employees, purchasing essential supplies and keeping food and farm products flowing to the marketplace," Johansson said, "and it's important at the same time to be sure food reaches people who need it."

USDA said it has yet to establish how farmers and ranchers can qualify for the program.

"The assistance for farmers and ranchers must be distributed quickly and fairly, with enough safeguards to assure it reaches the appropriate people," Johansson said. "We understand that can be a difficult balance, and we will continue to offer USDA our best advice on how to make this aid package as effective as possible for farmers, ranchers and all the people who depend on them."

The California Farm Bureau Federation works to protect family farms and ranches on behalf of nearly 34,000 members statewide and as part of a nationwide network of nearly 5.6 million Farm Bureau members. ★

How Much Damage the Shutdown Does to Each Countries Economies Can Only Be Guessed

As the CoVid 19 shutdown continues worldwide, the damage to global economies has yet to be realized.

How much damage the shutdown does to each countries economies can only be guessed. One of the few knowns here in the U.S. is that unemployment skyrocketing. The many unknowns include but are not limited to how many mortgage defaults will be seen, how many small businesses will be reduced in size or disappear altogether, the number of corporate bankruptcies we will see, how many people will be driven into the ranks of the homeless and how long will the overall damage to the economy will last.

Judging by the performance of the stock markets' nearly 25% rise in recent weeks, a case could be made the recovery is already starting. But the markets surprising upward performance in light of such dire economic expectations begs many questions.

Does the recent meteoric and historic rise in stock prices make sense and is the rally any indication of will happen in the overall economy? Why is the market rising so fast in the face of possibly the worst economic disaster in modern times? Will the market keep rising and if so, will it continue at the breakneck speed we have just witnessed?

Prognostications as to what will happen run the gamut. But if certain market theories hold any weight, and they do for many experts, the rebound in the stock market could have been predicted. Additionally, these analytic methodologies may also give us an indication of where stock prices might go next.

After an historic run up in stock prices, the common belief is the longer a market runs, the closer it gets to its correction date and the more severe that correction will be.

One often quoted term is that a parabolic and continued rise in stocks is an ever inflating "balloon looking for a pin."

The "pin" is an event that causes its sudden bursting and in stocks that means a horrific crash.

One could argue that a healthy market can withstand negative events with a measured retreat instead of a cataclysmic crash. Of course CoVid 19 is no ordinary event nor is the shutdown it has caused.

Indeed, the world has never witnessed a complete global shutdown. But in a market that nearly added 38% in 40 months (Dow 18,332 November 8, 2016 to Dow 29,563 February 12, 2020), many analysts expected a major correction was only a matter time.

With the Dow crashing to about 18,591 on March 23, 2020, about 38% was shaved off the Dow in a little more than a month. This historic crash set the record for the fastest Dow correction from an all-time high to a bear market determination (down 20%) and then fell even farther.

From the low on March 23 rd , the Dow gained more than 6500 points or 23%. Hauntingly this gain took a similar amount of time as the crash. A little over a month.

Now with the Dow appearing to possibly stall out, the question investors are asking is where do we go from here. Although no one can forecast market direction at any time, many theories abound as to what has happened in the past and what might happen in the future.

A popular belief is a retest of recent lows may be in the cards. Some argue the amount of stimulus the government has added puts to rest another severe correction. Others believe at least a partial retest is not only possible but probable.

If the market continues up from here

it will be described as a V shaped recovery. The V portion of the term describes a quick fall and quick rebound with no retest of the previous recent lows.

Others prescribe a U shaped recovery is more likely. A U shaped recovery points to a much slower and gradual return to upward price movement with any number of retests being the likely pattern of recovery.

In my opinion it is highly unlikely the market will continue the rally we just witnessed. Although market movements are impossible to forecast without exception, there may too much economic damage for a sustained and uninterrupted new high to form a V shape type of recovery. More likely will be a number of retests to form more of a U shape over a longer period of time.

Indeed, the disconnect between the market and what the consumer is experiencing is baffling to say the least. Although it is

said stock markets look six months or more ahead, the virus is not eliminated, the shut downs have not concluded and the consumer is reeling.

To imagine things will be resembling anything near normal in short order is inconceivable, at least to this analyst.

In a way, it's kind of like deciding what to ask for when you sell a car. You try to appraise it for what it's worth in the marketplace to other people. That leads to a discussion. You're not telling them what to do or presenting an ultimatum, you're providing information and conducting a dialogue in a professional and respectful way.

You'll still have emergencies, though, and it'll be your responsibility to cover them. Some of those may need to be addressed immediately. See what I'm saying, Kevin? Everyone needs an emergency fund. Just make saving for it part of your budget for a while, until you have three or four months of expenses sitting in a good money market fund with check writing privileges. You'll be glad you did!

FISHIN' TALK

It is that time of year again and shad are showing up in the Feather, Yuba, American and Sacramento rivers. Those who have not tried this sport are really missing out on lots of fun and action. Shad have been called the poor man's tarpon. Yes, these fish come from the ocean and each year thousands of fish enter rivers and streams to start the spawn run. We do not particularly care for shad on the table and have tried just about every way to cook them. Some people say they are good pressure cooked. Others say they are good smoked, but we will enjoy the sport of catching them and turning them loose to continue their journey. For us they are just too boney.

Shad are real fighters and have lots of spunk. Catching a 2 pound fish is almost equivalent to catching a five pound striped bass. I have caught female shad, full of eggs, which have weighed up to four pounds. One in particular, while fishing on the Feather River below the old fifth street bridge, I had a strike just before dark and fought the fish for 10 ten minutes while walking downstream and hearing my drag singing. I thought, as well as others on the bank fishing, I had a salmon or striper on but when I finally got the fish in the net it was a very large shad. I turned her and two smaller males who entered the net with

her loose so they could continue the ritual of spawning.

The best way to catch shad is early morning and late evening. Bank fishing as well as in a boat will catch you a lot of action. When fishing from the bank we suggest casting your shad dart or spinner upstream and following it down as it slowly bounce along the bottom. Expect snags and the best action takes place when the line is parallel with the bank and the drift is almost complete.

Light spinning gear is the best way to fish for shad. My favorite setup was always a seven foot ultralight rod and reel filled with two pound test mono. As far as weight goes you do not need much, just enough to get the jig or dart out there and then keep it on the bottom. We always used pencil weights which seemed to cause less snags. Also, keep in mind they have a thin lip. Some call it a paper lip.

Years ago we only fished with a shad dart which was white in color with a red neck. We called the lure a fuller brush lure due to the tail looking like a miniature brush. Today there are many varieties of lures designed for shad and other fish which are available at your favorite sporting goods store.

Closing thought: "Hard times will always reveal true friends." ★

Food & Farm News



Pandemic Brings 'One-Two Punch' to Farm Economy

The impacts of the COVID-19 pandemic reverberate through California agriculture, according to speakers at an online forum. During a virtual town hall hosted by chairs of the Legislature's agriculture committees, economists said changes in diets and buying habits have disrupted every aspect of the farming business. One analyst said agriculture faces a "one-two punch" from the pandemic shutdown and a slow economic recovery.

Food Box Program Works Toward Implementation

By mid-May, the U.S. Department of Agriculture plans to begin shipping food boxes to food banks through a new program in response to the COVID-19 pandemic. An analysis by the American Farm Bureau Federation says the food boxes will be packaged for household use, and will contain fresh produce, dairy and meat products. AFBF says more Americans will likely need food assistance

due to pandemic-related job losses.

Fresno State Farm Maintains Operations

Though classes have transitioned to virtual instruction, the student farm at Fresno State University continues operating, while observing social-distancing protocols. The university says its Agricultural Laboratory has maintained a "near-normal pace" the past month. Students continue to care for livestock and to manage orchards, vineyards and vegetable crops on campus. The farm market at Fresno State has remained open as well.

Study Examines Grazing, Oak Recovery

Nearly two years after wildfire scorched a research facility in Mendocino County, University of California specialists say they're learning more about how oak woodlands recover. The 2018 fire caused significant damage at the UC Hopland facility. The fire brought much less initial impact in areas where livestock had been allowed to graze. Long-term studies are showing how to manage grazing to assure oaks regenerate. ★

Spring Storms Not Enough to Offset Dry Winter

SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG)

- The season's final manual snow survey at Phillips Station was conducted by the Department of Water Resources (DWR). The survey recorded 1.5 inches of snow depth and a snow water equivalent (SWE) of 0.5 inches, which is 3 percent of the May average for this location. The SWE measures the amount of water contained in the snowpack, providing a more accurate forecast of spring runoff than snow depth alone.

Measurements from the 130 electronic snow sensors scattered throughout the state indicate that the statewide snowpack's water equivalent is 8.4 inches, or 37 percent of the May average. The readings will help hydrologists forecast spring and summer snowmelt runoff into rivers and reservoirs.

"March and April storms brought needed snow to the Sierras, with the snowpack reaching its peak on April 9, however those gains were not nearly enough to offset a very dry January and February," said Sean de Guzman, chief of DWR's Snow Survey

and Water Supply Forecast Section. "The last two weeks have seen increased temperatures leading to a rapid reduction of the snowpack. Snowmelt runoff into the reservoirs is forecasted to be below average."

California's weather variability has been on full display this water year. Dry conditions in October and November were followed by precipitation in December that measured 120 percent of average. Very dry conditions returned to much of the state in January and February, with March and April storms leading to the snowpack peaking at just 66 percent of average on April 9.

In normal years, the

snowpack supplies about 30 percent of California's water needs as it melts in the spring and early summer. The greater the snow water equivalent the greater the likelihood California's reservoirs will receive ample runoff to meet the state's water demand in the summer and fall.

The state's six largest reservoirs currently hold between 83 percent (San Luis) and 126 percent (Melones) of their historical averages for this date. Lake Shasta, California's largest surface reservoir, is 94 percent of its historical average and sits at 81 percent of capacity.
