Now in the midst of the Wuhan Flu crisis, what is the most controversial measure established to save us? It may be the closing of American businesses including our schools and churches.

Restaurants are allowed a take-out trade but the people permitted to dine in their vehicles are seated much closer than simply offering more spacious seating outdoors or even using 50% capacity guidelines indoors.

There are potent negative mental and financial health trade-offs for

implementing such extreme isolation measures. Many businesses and families will not recover from the restrictions.

Could vulnerable folks, ill workers and children have been quarantined rather than the healthy population? For years, the routine at the Hong Kong / Mainland China border crossings was that officials collected thousands of temperature readings and queried travelers each day about abnormal health symptoms. They targeted sick people not the healthy to curb an outbreak of anything.

Although every nation's demo-

graphics, housing and markets vary, Sweden with just over 10 million in population is allowing their people much more freedom to move about during these virus days. People are frequenting cafes, gathering outdoors and businesses are open.

Teens can be seen giving hugs, shaking hands and hanging out, nearly an American criminal offense today or at least worthy of a good shaming.

Swedish authorities advised the public to practice social distancing and to work from home, if possible,

Rebuild CA Foundation Calls for Full Transparency and Accountability in Dealing with the Coronavirus Crisis

SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) - Doug Ose, Chairman of the Rebuild California Foundation (rebuild-ca.org), issued the following statement:

"All levels of government work best with full transparency and accountability.

Transparency and accountability allow the voter to make informed decisions. Rebuild California Foundation strives to do the research and education necessary for an informed electorate.

As reported by the LA Times on Friday, California was prepared in 2010 for a pandemic: millions of masks, gloves and garbs for medical personnel; up to 21,000 beds of standby capacity; mobile capability to go where needed. Unfortunately, beginning in 2011, the Governor and the Legislature systematically dismantled the Health Surge Capacity Initiative. Consecutive budget year decisions by the Governor

and the Legislature meant that the relatively small amount of funding necessary to preserve California's ability to respond to a pandemic was re-programmed for other purposes.

In addition, policy judgments by the Governor and the Legislature contributed to a reduction in the number of laboratories that can be utilized to combat medical emergencies. According to a report in the Sacramento Bee, the number of laboratories that can do the testing needed has been reduced from 40 to only 29. In addition, funding for laboratory staffs has not changed since 2009; funding for the fiscal year ending June 30, 2020 for public health is the same

as it was for fiscal year ending June 30, 2010.

Further, our research indicates that the Governor has access to significant sources of non-public information that can serve to give leaders an early heads up for a potential emergency. We have not been able to determine when Governor Newsom was first briefed about the threat posed by coronavirus.

Finally, we are not privy to any discussions Governor Newsom may have had with Legislative leaders about the coronavirus crisis.

Rebuild California Foundation will continue to examine issues affecting California and to educate the voters that live here." ★

Local Law Enforcement Working with 'Non-Essential' Businesses

PUBLIC INFORMATION OFFICER/LEGISLATIVE AFFAIRS YUBA AND SUTTER COUNTIES, CA (MPG) - Police and sheriff departments from both Yuba and Sutter counties are working in concert to identify non-essential businesses that continue to operate, even as the state's "Shelter in Place" order enters its second week.

Law enforcement officers are visiting those who operate businesses deemed non-essential to help them understand Gov. Gavin Newsom's Executive Order, which is intended to curb the spread of COVID-19. Most of those businesses have already complied, however reports about possible violations continue to come in from both sides of the river.

While early efforts to

reach out to non-compliant businesses have had an educational focus, officials say enforcement of the state order - which can include significant fines - is highly possible.

Businesses listed as "essential" under the Governor's Executive Order can remain open but need to follow social distancing guidelines. A list of "essential" businesses can be found online

Officers and deputies are also contacting community and faith based organizations to urge them to adhere to the social distancing guidelines.

DMV Offices to Continue Serving the Public during COVID Outbreak

Department of Motor Vehicles

SACRAMENTO REGION, CA (MPG) - The California Department of Motor Vehicles (DMV) is moving to offer Californians essential services online starting next week to continue processing critical transactions during the COVID-19 pandemic. Field offices will be temporarily closed to the public statewide beginning March 27 and reopen, virtually, on April 2. All in-office appointments at this time will be canceled. Customers are encouraged to check the dmv.ca.gov website for future appointment availability.

DMV online services will continue to be available at dmv.ca.gov. Customers can also take care of many tasks at the hundreds of kiosks throughout the state or through available local business partners. DMV's customer service centers will continue to operate during normal business hours at 1-800-777-0133 or connecting via the live chat feature on the DMV website.

DMV field office employees will return on Wednesday, April 1 to process transactions and begin training on the DMV Virtual Field Office, which began in a limited pilot March 23. The Virtual Field Office gives customers the capability to take care of transactions that previously required an in-person office visit by virtually interacting with DMV staff. Beginning April 2, customers initially can complete vehicle title transfers and complex vehicle registration renewals by visiting virtual.dmv.ca.gov. The DMV will gradually add more transactions to continue to provide alternatives to an in-person office visit.

The DMV is concerned about the health and safety of its customers, including seniors and those at risk for COVID-19. Following deep cleaning of the offices, expansion of virtual services and development of new protocols, DMV will offer in-person services in each region. More updates on how DMV is addressing the needs of its customers will be announced soon on its website.

Californians who do not have an urgent need to go to a DMV field office should delay their visit, including those interested in applying for a REAL ID. The U.S. Department of Homeland Security has announced that the REAL ID enforcement date is October 1, 2021, and customers who want a REAL ID will have an opportunity to apply at a later date. ★

Going to the moon was a big deal.

People sometimes reach a point of great consternation about seeing their name in the paper in an unfavorable light. In regards to such, I received this quote from a friend "Once a man who had been slandered by a newspaper came to Edward Everett asking what to do about it. Said Everett, "Do nothing! Half the people who bought the paper never saw the article. Half of those who saw it, did not read it. Half of those who read it, did not understand it. Half of those who understood it, did not believe it. Half of those who believed it are of no account anyway" ("Sunny Side of the Street," Nov. 1989; Zig Ziglar, *Staying Up, Up, Up in a Down, Down World* 2000, 174). I doubt the cute quote above will help soothe the feelings of the moms whose children appear in the Police and Sheriff's Department updates printed in the newspaper. The details of the Police Blotter sometimes sound very much like the plot outlines of the tele-novelas daytime dramas featured on the Univision

Channel and the Young and the Restless soap opera series.

On Interstate 5, there was road construction in which I was required to drive 55 MPH for some many miles. I nearly lost my composure; it felt like I was going 15 miles an hour. In this unrelaxed state of driving, I remembered that for almost two decades, that was how fast we were allowed to go. As an emergency response to the 1973 oil crisis, on November 26th, 1973, President Richard Nixon proposed a national 50 mph speed limit for passenger cars and a 55 mph speed limit for trucks and buses. A federal limit was passed into law in 1974. Congress repealed the nationally mandated speed limit in 1995, giving authority back to the individual states to set the number. It was one of the things Newt Gingrich and the Republicans promised to do, and they did it. Our Congressman Wally Herger voted for it as he represented a district that went from Oregon to East Nicolaus, and he was always in a hurry to get home to his wife and numerous kids. I know I was working for him then.

Speaking of Highway traffic safety...Recently re-elected (by a landslide) Butte County Supervisor "Wild" Bill Connelly sent out a glowingly positive electronic update about Highway 70. "After 30 years of planning, project development, and transportation investment, the final two projects to complete the four-lane widening of State Route 70 between Chico and Sacramento received funding approval by the California Transportation Commission (CTC) at their March 25th Commission meeting. BCAG has been working with the CTC, Caltrans, Yuba County, Sutter County,

and the Sacramento Area Association of Governments (SACOG) since 1988 to widen Highway 70 to four lanes between Chico and Sacramento. Butte County has been the largest county in the State not served by a continuous four-lane highway. When the SR 70/99 Corridor Study was adopted in 1990, it served as the blueprint for future transportation investments by BCAG, SACOG, Caltrans, and the CTC through the State Transportation Improvement Program (STIP). Since 1990, fifteen major projects have been funded between Sacramento and Chico with a total investment of over \$1 billion dollars. Butte County has two remaining projects on State Route 70 to be constructed. Both are fully funded. Caltrans will start construction on the segment from Palermo Road to Cox Lane in Spring 2020, and the segment from East Gridley Highway to the Butte County line will be under construction in 2021. At their March 25th meeting, the CTC approved \$32 million in funding for the last two corridor projects in Yuba County from Laurellen Road to the Butte/Yuba County line. This funding will allow Caltrans to widen these last two segments to four-lanes with a center left turn lane, with construction starting in 2022."

- Bill has been passionate about fixing Hwy. 70 for many years - affected by the deaths of too many good people on a less than good road. DA Ramsey Confirms PG&E Filing About Pleading Guilty On Camp Fire Deaths

Butte County District Attorney Press Release

BUTTE COUNTY, CA (MPG) - Butte County District Attorney Mike Ramsey confirmed that a Pacific Gas and Electric Company (PG&E) filing in both the US Bankruptcy Court and before the Security and Exchange Commission correctly states the company was recently indicted by a Butte County Grand Jury and the utility plans to plead guilty as charged to all 85 felony counts in that indictment.

Ramsey said the indictment consists of 84 individual counts of Involuntary Manslaughter (a violation of California Penal Code section 192(b)) naming each of the persons killed in the Camp Fire by PG&E's criminal negligence. The indictment also has a count of Unlawfully Causing a Fire (a violation of California Penal Code section 452) which includes three special allegations for PG&E's causing great bodily injury to a firefighter; causing great bodily to more than one surviving victim; and causing multiple structures to burn (listed as approximately 18,804 structures).

Ramsey noted when the indictment was returned, it was sealed by a Butte County Superior Court judge per standard grand jury procedure. As a result of the sealing, Ramsey said he could not disclose the specifics of the evidence that lead to the indictment until such time as PG&E is arraigned and pleads guilty to the indictment.ii The District Attorney said it was initially expected PG&E would appear and plead guilty through its CEO/Director William Johnson this Friday, March 27, 2020 in North Butte County Superior Court in Chico. However, the recent confirmation of COVID-19 virus cases in Butte County has led to the courthouse being closed this week for the protection of the public and staff. A new date of April 24, 2020 for the guilty pleas and sentencing on the indictment has now been selected in consultation with the court.

Ramsey noted that when PG&E is sentenced, it will have to pay the maximum fine allowed under California law for the 85 felony counts, which court staff calculated at \$3,486,950. (The calculation is derived from the statutory maximum fine of \$50,000 on the fire count and the statutory maximum fine of \$10,000 for each manslaughter count plus various court fees statutorily added to those maximums.) Ramsey noted this fine was separate and apart from the negotiated \$25.5 billion set aside for fire victims in PG&E's bankruptcy proceedings [\$13.5 billion for private claims; \$11 billion for insurance companies' claims; and \$1 billion for government entity claims (including \$270 million to the Town of Paradise; \$253 million to the County of Butte; and \$47.5 million to the Paradise Recreation and Park District)]. Ramsey said PG&E's plea will also include a payment of \$500,000 to his office for

costs of the investigation.

Other agreements with the company included having a federally-appointed court monitor of PG&E's safety performance report to the Butte County District Attorney for the next two years and a commitment to rewater the Miocene Canal.

Ramsey said his staff had worked late last week and into the weekend to notify the next-of-kin of the Camp Fire deceased victims, with Ramsey holding a confidential Facebook Live briefing with them ahead of the expected PG&E bankruptcy/SEC disclosure so they would not be surprised.

Ramsey noted the 16-member Grand Jury that returned the indictment was specially and secretly empaneled under a provision of the California Penal Code in March of 2019 at the Butte County Superior Court to pursue a criminal investigation into the utility's role in the Camp Fire. Per the penal code, such grand juries have a limit of one-year in which to complete their investigation. Ramsey had high praise for this assemblage of ordinary citizens who were selected from over 100 summoned potential jurors. Ramsey noted the extraordinary sacrifice of the initial 19 finally selected, who worked steadily for nearly a year without being able to tell employers, family or friends what they were working on due to the secrecy oath of Grand Jurors. "They carefully listened to nearly 100 witnesses, examined over 1400 exhibits and produced many thousands of pages of transcript," Ramsey noted.

Ramsey also acknowledged the help of many allied agencies in pursuit of the criminal investigation, including the California Attorney General's Office, Cal Fire, the FBI, the Eastern District of California U.S. Attorney's Office; and the San Mateo County District Attorney's Office.

Ramsey said by pleading guilty to each of the 85 felony counts, the utility will admit the evidence establishes its criminal responsibility for causing the Camp Fire and the deaths of 84 victims "beyond a reasonable doubt." Ramsey said the guilty plea also waives any jury or other trial; and waives any appeal, bringing finality to the victims and hopefully a bit of a sense of "justice done" for the Butte Strong community.

i The official Butte County Sheriff-Coroner count of deceased Camp Fire victims was 85. However during the subsequent investigation more information was developed which cast doubt that one of those deaths was a direct result of the Camp Fire.

ii Although prevented at this time from going into the details of the evidence supporting Pacific Gas and Electric Company's criminal responsibility for the Camp Fire and the 84 deaths, Ramsey did provide an example of California Jury Instructions which outline the evidence and law necessary for a criminal jury to find guilt.

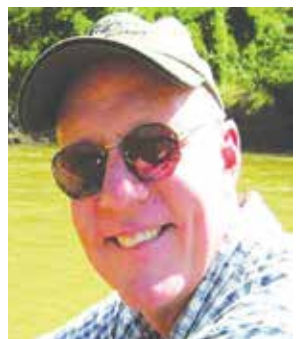

NRA & Other Groups Sue California

File Federal Lawsuit against Los Angeles Sheriff Villanueva, California Gov. Gavin Newsom Over Constitutional Violations

FAIRFAX, VA (MPG) - The National Rifle Association (NRA) joined individuals, retailers, and other gun rights groups in filing a federal lawsuit challenging state and local policies and enforcement practices that violate Second and Fourteenth Amendment rights. The gun rights groups includes the Second Amendment Foundation (SAF), the California Gun Rights Foundation (CGF), and the Firearms Policy Coalition (FPC).

“Municipalities who target lawful gun stores for closure aren’t promoting safety –by weaponizing their politics to disarm you and your loved ones, these shameless partisans are recklessly promoting a gun-control agenda that suffocates your self-defense rights when you need them most,” said NRA-ILA Executive Director, Jason Ouimet. "NRA members recognize these unlawful power-grabs for what they are, and the National Rifle Association is proud to stand and fight alongside fellow Second Amendment groups who recognize it, as well.”

“California’s attack on fundamental rights in times of emergency must be stopped in its tracks,” observed SAF founder and Executive Vice President, Alan Gottlieb. “This case is part of our mission to win firearms freedom one lawsuit at a time. And more, the lawsuits we are filing across the country are making a large number of other states, counties, and cities think twice before closing down essential gun stores.”

“Twenty-eight years ago, the LAPD had to withdraw their officers to protect their safety. We hope that the stay-home orders will mean that our public servants will not become infected in this pandemic, but the Constitution guarantees that everyone has a right to acquire arms and defend themselves should law enforcement not be able to respond before it’s too late,” remarked CGF Chairman, Gene Hoffman. “No petty autocrat can be allowed to suspend the Bill of Rights.”

“Especially due to the restrictive nature of California’s Byzantine gun laws that require the use of licensed dealers to buy and transfer both firearms and ammunition, the defendants’ orders and actions challenged individually and collectively violate the Constitution and individuals’ fundamental rights to keep and bear arms and due process of law,” explained attorney and FPC Director of Legal Strategy,

Adam Kraut. “These irrational and outrageous fiat restrictions cannot withstand constitutional scrutiny and must be enjoined from enforcement.”

“California’s State and local governments cannot simply suspend the Constitution,” FPC President Brandon Combs said. “This case is one of many actions FPC is taking around the United States to fight for liberty and freedom. The entire FPC team has been and will remain all-hands-on-deck, working around the clock on important efforts to safeguard the People’s individual liberties and property, especially the rights to keep and bear arms, free speech, privacy, and due process. FPC is fully committed to uniting the advocacy space and partnering with organizations and law firms around the country to fight government abuses and defend the People’s right to defend their lives and homes. We especially wish to recognize and thank our incredible members and supporters who make all of our legal action, research, and grassroots activism programs possible.”

and urged those over age 70 to self-isolate as a precaution. However, compared to the lockdowns imposed elsewhere, Sweden’s response to the virus allows a liberal amount of personal freedom.

Hanging-out at bars is banned, but restaurant customers can be served at tables instead of just take-out. High schools and universities are closed, but preschools and elementary schools are conducting traditional classes.

“Sweden is an outlier on the European scene, at least,” said Johan Giesecke, the country’s former chief epidemiologist and now adviser to the Swedish Health Agency. “And I think that’s good.”

Other European nations “have taken political, unconsidered actions” instead of ones dictated by science, Giesecke asserted.

Stanford University epidemiologist John Ioannidis, co-director of its Meta-Research Innovation Center, says in a paper published in the life sciences news site STAT that the extreme government measures to prevent infection may lead to more deaths.

“The current coronavirus disease, Covid-19, has been called a once-in-a-century pandemic,” Ioannidis says. “But it may also be a once-in-a-century evidence fiasco,” with policymakers relying on “meaningless” statistics based on unreliable samples.

To reduce the spread of the virus in Germany and the U.K., groups larger than two are currently prohibited unless they are composed of people who already live together. Officials in Italy and France introduced increasingly restrictive limits on public activities and eventually authorized fines because too many people ignored social distancing recommendations.

Los Angeles is threatening to cut-off power and water to businesses violating shut-down orders.

Sweden’s current chief epidemiologist, Anders Tegnell, argued that even if the country’s comparatively permissive policies are an anomaly, they are more sustainable and effective in protecting the public’s health than “drastic” moves like closing schools for four or five months.

Ioannidis says that a population-wide Covid-19 fatality rate of 0.05% is lower than seasonal influenza (Jan-Feb 29 regular flu was 20,000 deaths). If that becomes the true rate for Covid 19, locking down the world with potentially tremendous social and financial consequences may be totally irrational.

It’s like an elephant being attacked by a house cat. Frustrated and trying to avoid the cat, the elephant accidentally jumps off a cliff and dies.

Ioannidis notes that “mild” coronaviruses (not COVID-19) have much higher case fatality rates

when infecting “elderly people in nursing homes” and account for up to a tenth of respiratory hospitalizations.

The scientist further explains that just because the person died and was positive for a coronavirus does not mean the virus was primarily responsible for the death. His own “mid-range guess” for the COVID-19 mortality rate of 0.3 percent of the U.S. population would produce 10,000 deaths. That number would not be a shocker or record - setter for an “influenza-like illness.”

Sweden had 3,447 confirmed virus cases and 105 deaths by March 22, according to Johns Hopkins University. However, there has been limited testing, with just 24,500 tests conducted by Mar 25.

As of March 29 – 2,484 Americans; 10,779 in Italy; 3,300 in China; and 33,966 worldwide had died from Covid 19 Wuhan Flu. However, Dr. Anthony Fauci, director for the National Institute of Allergy and Infectious Diseases, estimated that the U.S. may see between 100,000 and 200,000 fatalities. He qualified this suggestion saying it is based on an infection model built on assumptions. If the assumptions are incorrect then everything changes according to the doctor.

DWR Awards \$47 Million in Grants for Groundwater Sustainability

SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) -

The Department of Water Resources (DWR) awarded \$47 million in grant funding to 53 applicants to support local agencies in development of plans to manage groundwater basins for long-term sustainability. These grants will support various projects including facilitating community outreach efforts, preparing feasibility studies for proposed actions to restore groundwater supplies, and installing monitoring wells to oversee groundwater levels.

This funding will provide important assistance in successful local implementation of the Sustainable Groundwater Management Act (SGMA), which establishes a framework for managing the state's groundwater resources.

"Sustainable management of our groundwater basins is a critical aspect of making our communities more resilient" said DWR Director Karla Nemeth. "The investments we make today will ensure that groundwater, such a critical resource for our state, continues to be a part of California's water portfolio long into the future."

The grants were awarded to nearly 30 groundwater

sustainability agencies for the installation of monitoring wells to better evaluate the needs of the groundwater basins in their area. Five other grant recipients will conduct aerial electromagnetic surveys to map aquifer conditions to better assess groundwater quality and storage conditions and to identify opportunities for recharge. These are just a few of the actions supported by this round of grant funding to further assist in developing groundwater sustainability plans.

Groundwater, which provides approximately 40 percent of California's total water supply during an average year, often serves as a buffer in critically-dry years by providing a supplemental, clean water source when surface water resources are diminished. In the last decade,

groundwater overdraft has severely depleted this valuable water source, impacting communities statewide.

Funding for these awards was made possible by Proposition 68, from which \$46.25 million was made available for competitive grants, and an additional \$1.2 million of Proposition 1 funds. DWR will begin working with grantees immediately to develop and execute grant agreements.

In 2022, DWR anticipates the launch of a competitive grant solicitation process to provide at least \$88 million in grant funding for plan implementation and projects that support local water supply and groundwater resiliency investments.

FEMA Resolves Claim with PG&E

OAKLAND, CA (MPG) -

The Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA), through the U.S. Department of Justice (DOJ), has reached an agreement with PG&E and the Official Committee of Tort Claimants (TCC) that will resolve claims by FEMA in the PG&E bankruptcy proceedings. The agreement is subject to final approval by DOJ.

FEMA may receive up to \$1 billion in compensation for federal disaster assistance provided in response

to the 2015 Butte Fire, 2017 Northern California Wildfires, and 2018 Camp Fire, but only after individual fire survivors have resolved their claims against the \$13.5 billion Fire Victims Trust.

FEMA's goals in filing a claim in the PG&E bankruptcy have been to: (1) ensure the needs of disaster survivors are placed first; (2) hold PG&E accountable for the expenditure of federal disaster assistance; and (3) ensure FEMA meets its legal obligations to avoid any potential duplication of benefits.

The agreement with

PG&E and the TCC will meet these goals.

FEMA will consider its claims fully satisfied by PG&E, with any potential duplication of benefits eliminated. FEMA will not seek repayment of federal funding from any state and local governments or individual disaster assistance recipients who also receive funding from PG&E.

While some food distributors who specialize in schools and restaurants chains are facing lower demand due to shutdowns, and exports to Asia following the same

path, local grocery retailers have immediate supply of produce available, particularly those with a shorter shelf-life such as fruits and vegetables. SGS is experiencing a low stock of just dry rice and beans and potatoes, forecasted to be back to normal levels in the next couple of days.

Produce distribution is guaranteed to reach all the regular demographics, including the low-income areas who depend on a more affordable supplying.

Besides maintaining short and long-term supply of produce in California, SGS's President says that all their employees are working with a touching sense of duty, as well as the truck drivers and the office team. "It is important right now that people have access to the food they are familiar with, in order to keep the emotional and physical comfort. That includes the ethnic varieties, which we are prepared to supply as well." At this point, Carole does not report any concerns

with labor shortage in the industry.

SGS encourages retailers to campaign on clear information about how to sanitize your produce before consuming it, as well as the importance of not excluding fresh fruit and vegetables of the daily diet in order to maintain a healthy immune system. "This is a time to work hard against consumer misconceptions and confusion"

Many industry members report that the COVID19 crisis has increased their sales, seeing the negative effects on travel and event cancellations, as well as on extra contingency meetings.

SGS is working hard with partners in the produce industry to keep the regular prices in times of uncertain demand, as well as to offer the best and fastest food distribution for the population of California.

The Fear Corona Instills and the Economic Damage it Will Cause

With the Corona Virus now infecting over 400,000 people and likely 500,000 by the time you read this and with most of the globe's inhabitants immobilized by fear or government decree, we must conclude that we are facing one of the most serious threats to mankind in the modern era. Although nothing is for sure where pandemics are concerned, it could be argued based on the mortality statistics however that Corona is really not a threat to mankind's very existence.

What effect it has to world economies is an entirely different matter. The virus could do immense damage to the various economies of the world. That said the fear Corona instills and the economic damage it will cause will no doubt be felt for months if not years to come.

It is a foregone conclusion a worldwide recession awaits if not a depression. An ominous claim to be sure, but one could hardly draw any other conclusion based on what we are witnessing in the face of this calamity.

As for the markets, if you followed me for any length of time, you know I have written on numerous occasions about having a sell point for one's portfolios. Going against the common catcall of much of the financial industry that believes holding for the long term is prudent advice, instead I believe there is a critical flaw in the "hold for the long term" method of investing.

Einstein was rumored to have said that the ramifications of the existence of hell and God were so dire one had better accept both just to be on the safe side. The same could be said for having an exit strategy. The ramifications of not having one when a catastrophic sell off occurs like the one we are witnessing are to dire to ignore.

Sure, for the majority of market corrections, one only has to wait it out for previous gains to rematerialize once the markets do their usual dance of recovery. But when we hit one of these "once in a lifetime" correctional phases, losing half one's investment enjoys little soothing

from those five little words "hold for the long term."

Indeed, I am of the opinion to call oneself an advisor, you have to accept the reality of investing, which is to say that in all investments "there is a time to hold an asset and a time not to."

And the last month could be said to be one of those time not to own stocks. To advise holding forever and a day seems a bit like a doctor telling you to get better but doing nothing to facilitate your path to recovery.

Is an advisors paycheck worth such inaction?

And although most of the time holding stocks through thick and thin may seem like a good idea, I doubt there are many investors that are currently comfortable they "held" for the long term.

Indeed, many of us don't know, especially in light of current events "how much long is left in our term." Others may be kicking themselves in the head for believing such claptrap as is the "just ride it out" crowd.

With the Dow down 35% at the time of this writing, and maybe going lower, had an investor set a pre-sell point, be it a certain percentage of portfolio value or an particular index value, all that resulting dry powder now in the account would buy 35% more stock.

Now that's a difference that could, well, really make a difference.

While the buy and hold crowd is now just hoping the markets recover so they can get back to even, those with dry powder to spend might reap some big rewards if the market bounces back to previous levels. Yea, buy and hold seemed like a good idea at the time.

Much like playing a slot machine where people practice sound money management by putting a limit on how much they will lose before walking away, it seems a no brainer to have the same ideology when gambling with one's entire life savings.

In my experience however few advisors nor investors ever leave the poker table of their stock markets to live and fight another day. Much like an out of control gambler,

they go from "I'm not down far enough" to "I'm down too far to get out now" and just ride it to wherever it might end up.

Not a pleasant thought should the Dow be on the road to another 5000 points lower.

I would ask, thinking back in hindsight, would you have wished you had a sell point as the market fell hard the last few weeks? And are you glad you're holding for the long term?

As for the virus, apparently I heard a rumor that Spain and Brazil are just going to sit back and let Corona rumble through the country, sickening who it will.

The thought is, and not such a far-fetched one, that the economic damage caused by a wide spread shut down of the economy will be far worse in the long run than what the damage the virus would ever do.

An interesting thought to be sure.

Both in the human and economic toll, the damage will be horrific, and no doubt could not probably have been avoided.

As for investor portfolios however, something as simple as predetermined sell point could possibly have saved much of the damage investors are likely seeing today. And I would ask, how hard would that have been and how much now do you wish you had done it?

At the March 18, 2020 council meeting I could not even muster a Second to my motion giving Live Oak residents a reprieve on their water & sewer bills for the next 2 to 3 months.

In a recent communication from City Manager, Aaron Palmer, he indicated their formal refusal to agendize a proposal to relieve Live Oak residents of their water & sewer bill burden. City Attorney, Brant Bordsen's opinion is, this would be a gift of public funds. How absurd, aren't the people the public?

In recent months, Live Oak Council significantly reduced builder impact fees for a local developer. In addition, certain businesses were granted substantial sewer discounts. And then, two city council members who are connected to the restaurant business in Live Oak, creatively, almost gave themselves a whopping 60% discount on their sewer bills. Talk about a Conflict of Gift!

We and especially our elderly residents are strongly being advised by the President, Governor, and County to Shelter In Place. Many of our elderly routinely pay their utility bills in cash. The City's new policy of not accepting cash payments for monthly water and sewer bills, shows little

compassion for our most vulnerable, elderly citizen's circumstances. Their only option is to go out and get money orders (minimum for residential is \$92.77).

Hundreds of residents could be unnecessarily exposed to Coronavirus with this hazardous policy. Talk about some high Coronavirus anxiety, what if you recently went to Safeway in Gridley for a money order!

I strongly encourage residents to call, text, or email me to voice your opinions and support efforts for suspending your water and sewer bill charges because it is the right thing to do. After all, your City Council took a sworn oath to put our citizens health, safety, and well-being first. And, it's your money anyway, that they are holding on to, so tightly.

Legislature Passes Bipartisan Emergency Funding for COVID-19

SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) - Assemblywoman Megan Dahle (R-Bieber), voted in support of two funding bills that provide \$500 million and authority for up to \$1 billion to the State to address various aspects of the COVID-19 pandemic.

"In these concerning times, it is encouraging to see the Assembly, Senate, and the Governor come together to address the needs of our communities and protect Californians," said Dahle. "This funding package will provide critical aid to address the rapidly spreading pandemic, and I am working to ensure that resources and supplies are allocated to our rural communities."

Summaries of the funding bills can be found below; the bill numbers and language are identical in both the Assembly and the Senate.

AB/SB 89: Provides \$500 million and authority for total expenditures up to \$1 billion to the State to address various aspects of the COVID-19 crisis. States intent of the Legislature to direct the Administration to work with the Legislature, legislative staff, and

stakeholders when determining expenditures for the 20-21 Budget regarding economic hardship mitigations for COVID-19. Includes \$84.1 million to address clean-up costs already incurred from the Camp Fire disaster. Authorizes the Governor to address the COVID-19 emergency and provides funding therefore.

AB/SB 117: Appropriates General Fund resources, authorizes continued apportionment and grant funding based on alternate attendance calculations for local educational agencies (LEAs) and after school programs, and makes various changes to existing law to alleviate specified instructional, assessment, and reporting responsibilities for Pre-K-12 Education and Child Care. Provides funding for schools related to the COVID-19 outbreak and declared state of emergency pursuant to Executive Order N-26-20.

Assemblywoman Megan Dahle represents the 1st Assembly District in the California Legislature, which includes portions of Butte and Placer counties, along with Lassen, Modoc, Nevada, Plumas, Shasta, Sierra, and Siskiyou counties. ★

Stop the Spread: A Patient Guide to the Novel Coronavirus

The American College of Emergency Physicians (ACEP) is providing guidance for patients to minimize their risk of getting or spreading the novel coronavirus, COVID-19. A new resource from ACEP, Stop the Spread: A Patient Guide to the Novel Coronavirus (COVID-19), provides tips on how to minimize the risk of contracting the virus—including whether you should wear a face mask—and how to determine whether patients should visit an emergency department.

"We are in the middle of flu season, which means emergency departments are already strained. To make sure that everyone can get the care they need, it's important to know when to go to the emergency department if you think you have COVID-19," said William Jaquis, MD, FACEP, president of ACEP.

Older patients and those with chronic or pre-existing conditions have the highest risk of serious cases or complications. If you think you are sick with COVID-19,

consider your symptoms. Call your doctor if you've been in contact with someone who already has COVID-19 or has traveled to an affected region and within 14 days you develop a fever, cough or shortness of breath.

If your symptoms are mild, contact your primary care physician to discuss your best options for care. Call 911 or visit your closest emergency department if:

You're experiencing a medical emergency; You're sick enough that you need to go to the hospital, especially if you recently started experiencing shortness of breath, or; You're sick and you are a high-risk individual, such as an older patient or a person with an already weakened immune system.

The situation with the outbreak is evolving daily, and while the federal government has taken steps to significantly expand COVID-19 testing, it will take time for the health care system to ramp up its testing capabilities and locations.

"Your local emergency department may not yet have the COVID-19 test. Your primary care physician can decide if you meet the criteria and help determine

where to get tested if necessary," said Dr. Jaquis.

As anticipation grows for more widespread community transmission of COVID-19 in the U.S., emergency physicians are on the frontlines caring for those affected. ACEP has a series of resources for patients, policymakers and emergency care teams.

Many farmers markets required to close have reopened

With certified farmers markets now defined as an essential service for distribution of food supplies, many of the markets that had been temporarily closed by local agencies or property owners have now reopened. Some markets lost their permits after authorities issued stay-at-home orders to slow the spread of COVID-19, and not all the markets have reopened. Markets have instituted added safeguards for social distancing.

Plant nurseries maintain services to farmers, gardeners

Spring represents a crucial season both for farmers and for home gardeners who grow produce—and a group representing plant nurseries and garden centers says that makes those businesses essential during the COVID-19 crisis. The Plant California Alliance says nurseries and garden centers remain open to provide services to farmers, urban gardens and community-supported agriculture operations.

Surging food demand includes dairy products

Grocery stores and farm groups have been urging people to buy only the food they can use, but a number of staple products have seen surges of demand, including dairy foods. Analysts say people have been stocking up on milk, cheese, ice cream and other dairy products. One small-scale milk processor in the San Joaquin Valley says he’s been operating at 140% of capacity to keep customers supplied.

Rice fields test fish-friendly farming methods

Transmitters implanted into young salmon will help scientists learn if allowing the fish to grow in flooded rice fields helps them survive their journey to the Pacific Ocean. While flooded for the winter, the fields provide abundant food, allowing the fish to bulk up fast before they’re released into the Sacramento River. Researchers have been testing four different methods of making rice fields more fish-friendly. ★

Seizure of Bombs, Guns and Drugs in Oroville Area during Investigation of Explosion at Berry Creek Residence

Butte County Sheriff’s Office

OROVILLE, CA (MPG) - The Butte County Sheriff’s Office (BCSO) announced the arrest of Elizabeth Ellis of Berry Creek, age 55. On March 19, deputies were dispatched to a report of an explosion at a residence located on Leaf Lane, Berry Creek. Upon arrival, deputies contacted Elizabeth Ellis and Nicholas West of Berry Creek, age 26. West had multiple injuries on his hands and legs. Deputies located evidence that explosive devices were being manufactured inside the residence. Deputies were concerned about the safety of the public based on the fact that an explosion occurred and explosive devices were being manufactured. Deputies evacuated the area, assisted medical personnel, and West was transported by helicopter to a local hospital.

Detectives obtained a search warrant for the residence, and the Butte Interagency Bomb Squad responded to the residence. The Bomb Squad removed components used to manufacture explosive devices and pieces of a detonated explosive device from the residence.

After the Bomb Squad determined the residence was safe to enter, detectives, deputies, and the Bomb Squad conducted a more detailed search of the residence. Additional components used to manufacture explosives were located. Deputies and detectives also located numerous evidence items to include the following items: 20 firearms, ammunition, psilocybin mushrooms, and large quantities of controlled narcotic medications. Four of the firearms located were illegal assault weapons.

Ellis was arrested for possession of illegal assault weapons, possession of a controlled substance for sale, possession of an explosive device, and possession of materials necessary to make an explosive device. The Bomb Squad and detectives are actively working on this investigation and additional arrests are anticipated. Based on the initial investigation, detectives believe West was attempting to manipulate an explosive device he manufactured when the explosion occurred. The Sheriff’s Office is asking anyone with information about this investigation to contact Detectives Joe Hooks or Brian Mollath at 530-538-7671. ★

Bridging the Gap

Dear Dave,
In light of recent events in our country, do you have suggestions for things people should think about and plan for if they get laid off from their jobs?

Dear Sam,
It's no secret that things are shutting down all across the world. If your workplace has closed its doors and isn't offering pay, then it's time to regroup and get some things in order. The thought of being without a paycheck can be overwhelming, but a little thought and planning can help you get through times like these.
Start living on a budget, if you aren't doing so already. Making a monthly budget will show you exactly where your money is going. Without it, you can't use every dollar to its fullest potential, because you don't even know how much money you have to work with. Plus, your budget will show places where you can cut back and save money.
If you don't have any income right now, make a

budget based on the amount of money on hand. If you have \$600 left to your name, budget out exactly where each of those dollars will go. It's time to squeeze every last penny out of what you've got. If you still have cash coming in from a spouse's job or some other source, then adjust your budget to reflect that. Maybe the two of you usually bring in a combined \$5,000 a month. Adjust your budget to live off that one income for the time being.
When the going gets tough, you need to focus on the things you really need to survive—food, utilities, shelter, and transportation. I call these the Four Walls. If there's any money left over after you take care of the Four Walls, make a list of what else you need to pay, and tackle those in order of importance. Reach out to anyone you can't pay, and explain the situation. They might be able to work something out, but they can't help if they don't know. Be up front with them, and pray for the best.
When you're just trying to make it to another day, you don't need to pay extra on debt. Instead, focus on piling up cash. Once life gets back to normal and everything is okay, you can pick up where you left off with your debt snowball. If it's within your budget to keep making minimum payments on your debt, go for

it. But the Four Walls come first. This is also the time to sell anything and everything you don't need to make some extra cash. With so much being shut down right now, there might not be as many traditional ways to make extra money. So, look into driving for Amazon, delivering takeout food, or dropping off grocery orders. Even if one of those doesn't work out, you can still take up odd jobs around your neighborhood. Be on the lookout for opportunities that will add a few extra bucks to your pocket. Don't forget to cut back on unnecessary expenses, either. Stop or pause your subscriptions. Call your cable, internet, and cellular providers to see if there's anything they'll do to work with you.
Finally, in times of real need, don't be too proud to ask for a helping hand. Many churches and community groups in your area exist for situations just like this.

March and April always remind me of the late Jim Clark. Jim was an avid black bass fisherman; In fact, he lived and breathed the sport. He also was a part of creating a bass club many years ago. The club was named "BASS BUSTERS" and had many anglers join in to enjoy the sport. Jim was what would be called a "Good Old Boy" in those days. This means he had a heart of gold and would not hurt a fly. Jim was a big man, heavy in build with large hands. He was a retired automobile mechanic, part of his career spent in the army during World War II. Even in old age Jim could pick up an engine block and toss it around as if it were a toy.
He had a 10 foot homemade boat which was older than he was and had been painted many times as well as being repaired a lot over the years. His love was for large mouth black bass and it was a pleasure to have known "Big Jim" and to have shared many days with him fishing his favorite spot. That spot was the Sutter Bypass and Jim knew it like the back of his hand.
He was always after the large mouth black bass and hardly ever wasted time fishing for the small mouth variety. He always caught fish and I cannot remember a day when he did not bring home fish. He had an unusual way to keep the fish which was entirely different from my upbringing and I cannot recollect ever seeing it done before or since. Jim would wash down the fish and wrap them for freezing. He did not scale or clean the fish but froze it whole. Of course when I first witnessed this unusual feat I questioned him on it. His answer was his was a good way since when he thawed the fish out and filleted same it was easier to do partly frozen. At any rate I could not tell the difference eating the fish every time he invited me over for dinner.
Jim was dead serious in how he presented his lures. He strongly believed in teasing the fish and I have personally observed him changing lures repeatedly as needed. Color was important to him and one of his favorite plugs was one he carved out of wood. It was a surface lure and he painted it white. He was quick to change this one also if it did not perform.
Watching Jim fish was an education in itself. I continued to use his ideas and his presentation on the water for years not only for the black bass but for all other species of fish which live in the waters of the Sacramento Valley and the foothills.
Closing thought: "Sometimes there is nothing you can do except let it rain and wait for the sunshine." ★

Don't Go Back to School

Liberal college professors are paranoid. Shuttered colleges have forced their classes online where they may be critiqued by parents and conservatives. Normally, their secret indoctrination in class goes unchallenged. Will they now be held accountable?

The silver lining of Covid-19 may be the “moth-balling” of government education. That could give parents a chance to think through the down-side of their children attending state – run classes. Word is leaking-out about a plethora of on-line brilliant teaching minus the perversion, anti-God and anti-family bent of government schooling.

Yes, no more horrible instructors, weird condom demos, transsexual story times, abortions or birth control pills, gender and bathroom chaos, no more monkey business and “the

world will end in 12 years” nonsense. All that wasted precious time can instead be spent with mind-popping enriching experiences elsewhere.

While some ‘educrats’ tout that school is a must for the functioning of civic culture and daily life, they don’t want you to know that home-ed and life was just fine before getting schooled by government started in the 1830s. The monopoly has yet to produce anything near the robust minds that put this nation together.

Have you ever wondered why we can’t even graduate students skilled in math, reading and writing? It’s no accident. When digging into education history you will discover Horace Mann (1796-1859) and John Dewey (1859-1952). In 1840, before public education was in charge the literacy rate in America was 90%.

Today, according to The Literacy Project, there are currently 45 million Americans who are functionally illiterate, unable to read above a 5th grade level, and half of all adults can’t read a book at an 8th grade level. In California, 25 percent of the state’s 6 million students are unable to perform basic reading skills. It’s past time to walk-out on the Mann-created mess.

John Dewey, known as the founding father of American progressive education, wanted America to mirror the Soviet Union. He purposed his method of schooling to bring about a new social order.

Dewey rejected Christianity and the existence of God. He also abhorred individualism and liberty that defined America from the beginning including the ideas of God-given rights, private property and free markets.

In his 1898 essay, “The Primary Education Fetish (sic),” Dewey argued against the then heavy emphasis on reading, writing and arithmetic in the younger years. He said it produced highly literate, independent-minded individualists with faith in God and freedom. That was not conducive to a collectivist utopia. He wanted to ditch these disciplines for

socialization and emphasize collectivism.

He was patient. He knew that liberty-minded and overwhelmingly Christian teachers, taxpayers and parents of that era would never knowingly support his America – killing agenda if they understood it. Change must come gradually.

So, rather than going to the people, Dewey went to the Rockefeller oil dynasty which funded “educational reform.” Having failed as a primary and secondary school teacher Dewey hustled a leadership position at the Rockefeller – funded University of Chicago. Later, he moved to Columbia University’s Teacher College.

From his high-place Dewey would groom thousands of teachers to push his twisted view of education and socialism that is poisoning generations of students today. The strategy has been extremely successful as 43% in a recent Gallup poll thought socialism would be good for the country.

Dewey was a proud humanist. His religion amounted to an atheist cocktail mixing socialism and communism. He and his groupies have been fabulously successful. His deception, though, created a blind-spot for him and his followers who only see paradise instead of piles of dead people. Wherever it has been entertained the ideology of collectivism and atheism has led to the extermination of hundreds millions of innocent souls and ruined nations.

Those who have children in government schools best rescue them now. The indoctrination in our classrooms is far more deadly than Covid-19.
