## Third Confirmed Case of COVID-19

reported by Yuba-Sutter Public Health

Yuba Sutter countiesThe Departments of Public Health for Yuba and Sutter Counties confirmed a third case of novel coronavirus (COVID-19) on Sunday, March 22, 2020. This is the third case in the Yuba-Sutter region; the first two cases were reported in Yuba County Saturday, March 21, 2020.

This newest case, like the previous two, was likely exposed via person-to-person transmission. The individual did visit a neighboring county that had evidence of ongoing community transmission prior to their illness. The individual is doing well.

While confirmation of COVID-19 cases has been expected by Public Health officials, they stress the importance of heeding the state's "stay at home" order, which urges mass social distancing.

"While we have been expecting confirmed cases in our community, it is concerning that these cases were exposed via community transmission," Yuba-Sutter Health Officer Dr. Phuong Luu said. "It is important now more than ever that we all work together -- businesses and residents -- to slow the spread of COVID-19 by doing our part to socially distance ourselves from each other."

The Department of Public Health has been in contact with those who have come into contact with the three confirmed cases to ensure that this situation is handled appropriately-- including any friends, family members or health care professionals, to assess and monitor them for signs and symptoms of illness. Appropriate measures including isolation or quarantine and if indicated, testing will be made under the direction of Dr. Luu.

California residents have undergone their first weekend under the state "stay at home" order, and these three confirmed cases this weekend are a reminder of how important these measures are. Please stay home as much as possible, wash your hands often and well, and isolate yourself in another room if you are sick.

Though there will be some expected anxiety and curiosity about testing, Dr. Luu would like to advise all Yuba-Sutter residents that "For those with mild cases of COVID-19, confirmatory testing will not change the doctor's recommendations. For mild cases, the recommendations remain to stay at home, avoid vulnerable individuals, practice good cough/sneeze etiquette, and maintain good hand hygiene."

## Statewide "Shelter In Place" order replaces Yuba-Sutter directive

A Yuba County press release received March 20, 2020 states: California Governor Gavin Newsom announced a "Shelter In Place" statewide order Thursday, March 19, 2020 that effectively replaced the Yuba-Sutter "directive" just hours before it went into effect.

Under the order, "all individuals living in the State of California (are) to stay home or at their place of residence, except as needed to follow the federal critical infrastructure sectors."

The statewide order, which went into effect immediately, is a mandate that is enforceable. Businesses that must close include restaurants (except for takeout or delivery orders), bars/nightclubs, entertainment venues, gyms/fitness studios, public events and gatherings, and convention centers.

"Our Yuba-Sutter community needs to take in this information calmly, as our residents were already prepared to be in their homes to reduce the chance of exposure to the coronavirus," said Yuba-Sutter Health Officer Dr. Phuong Luu. "This is NOT martial law, and nothing has to change overnight. The state's order has the same guidelines that were in the Yuba-Sutter directive, so you're all prepared to stay home as much as possible, except for essential activities, to help slow the spread of COVID-19."

Luu emphasized residents will still be able to take walks, play with their children in the yard, and make necessary trips to grocery stores, banks, gas stations, pharmacies, and laundromats. Residents can also keep appointments with their doctors.

## Yuba County Courts Close

The Honorable Debra L. Givens, Presiding Judge of the Superior Court of California, County of Yuba, has issued Executive Order No. 2, on Friday, March 20, 2020, ordering the immediate closure of the court. Search warrants, emergency protective orders, parole/probation warrants, protective custody warrants, and any other emergency ex part matters will be handled by an on-call judge.

## 48 Hours and Sara's Case

The Yuba-Sutter area has achieved national recognition for some horrific tragedies. The Juan Corona murders starting May 19, 1971, (when the first body found) killing 25; the Yuba City High School bus crash May 26, 1971 killing 29; the Lindhurst High School Shooting on May 1, 1992 killing 4.

Certainly the 1955, 1986 and 1997 floods that destroyed lives, animals, thousands of structures and cost billions of dollars will always stand-out. And those losing loved ones and homes in the recent Yuba County forest fires could be added, as well.

There was the unsolved double-homicide of Valerie Janice Lane, 12 and Doris Karen Derryberry, 13 reported missing on November 12, 1973. A few hours later their bodies were found on a dirt road in Marysville, shot at close range.

The case went cold until December 2016 after the state forensics lab matched DNA from the two suspects to semen found on Derryberry. The two arrested were 65-year-old cousins (Larry Don Patterson and William Lloyd Harbour) who both lived near the victims in Olivehurst when they were killed nearly 43 years before.

## Wuhan or Lombardy Flu

United States media have been rabid in their obsession to undermine the stability of the nation and the presidency. Although some scientists are suggesting the Covid-19 Virus started in a Wuhan University laboratory or in the adjacent animal market, this epidemic has been another chance for reporters to mock and malign saying President Trump was the real cause.

However, the media has been outed once again for generating lies and burying negative international news about China, the Wuhan Flu, the connection between China and Italy, and the arrest of Harvard University professor and Chinese spies.

On January 28, 2020, authorities arrested Dr. Charles Lieber, 60, chair of the Department of Chemistry and Chemical Biology at Harvard University, on charges of making a materially false, fictitious and fraudulent statement.

Prosecutors say that Lieber was paid \$50,000 per month and given \$150,000 a year for living expenses by China's communist government. He was also given \$1.5 million to build a laboratory in, yes, Wuhan. Plus, Harvard University paid him.

"Unbeknownst to Harvard University beginning in 2011, Lieber became a 'Strategic Scientist' at Wuhan University of Technology (WUT) in China and was a contractual participant in China's Thousand Talents Plan from in or about 2012 to 2017," the Dept. of Justice statement said. Lieber lied to investigators about his involvement.

Also, two Chinese researchers here were arrested. Yanqing Ye was determined to be a Lieutenant of the People's Liberation Army (PLA), the armed forces of the People's Republic of China and member of the Chinese Communist Party (CCP). She is charged with stealing defense secrets by accessing US military websites and not divulging her connection to the Chinese military.

Zaosong Zheng is charged with stealing 21 vials of biological research and attempting to smuggle them out of the United States to China. Federal officers at Logan Airport discovered the vials hidden in a sock inside one of Zheng's bags, and not properly packaged.

## Plumas NF Temporary Road Closures

-Sandy Beach Road (#23N93) temporarily closed due to bridge construction –

Quincy, Ca. – Plumas National Forest Road #23N93 (Sandy Beach), will be temporarily closed beginning March 30 through Dec. 31, 2020, at its intersection with CA Hwy 70 down to Sandy Beach. Caltrans will remove a culvert and construct a bridge allowing fish and other aquatic organisms to travel upstream on Mills Creek. The stream channel will also be restored both up and downstream of the new bridge.

Sandy Beach will remain accessible from the water (river rafters and boaters) for day-use but will not be accessible by road. Recreationists must pack their own trash and waste out.

The closure will be in place 24-hours per day due to unsafe conditions, active heavy equipment operations, and hazards on the road during and after construction operations.

People exempt from Forest Order No. 05-11-03-20-02 include persons with a permit allowing them use of the road, federal, state and local officers or members of an organized rescue or fire fighting force in performance of official duty, and persons with a special use permit or contract from the Forest Service authorizing work on Forest Road No. 23N93, and their employees, sub-contractors, or agents are exempt from the order to the extent authorized by their special use permit or contract.

If any of the answers to the questions is ‘YES,’ we ask that you still please call the number so we may see how we may assist your need through other means besides face-to-face.

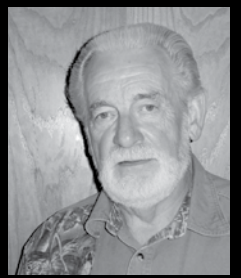

Sturgeon are being caught from the Delta all the way to Colusa on the Sacramento River. Most of the fish are oversized and must be released. In fact, according to reports, some of the sturgeon is so big they are breaking lines and straightening hooks.

The striped bass run is finally here and will be in full swing anytime soon. We feel the run will be at its best after the predicted storms yet to come this week are over. The secret at this time is to find the schools of fish and not anchor up in one spot. In addition, covering a large amount of water trolling or drifting minnows is the best way to go. We suggest keeping your distance from other boats and other anglers around launch ramps due to the current flu virus epidemic.

Our weather source advises more rain on Monday through

Wednesday this week with snow falling again in the mountains. He does not feel the storm will be as heavy as the one we just experienced which means a lighter snowfall. He feels this upcoming storm will not be the last but will be followed by more participation into April.

Reports tell us there is not much action in reservoirs in the foothills at this time. Collins Lake is the best place

to score on rainbow trout up to six or seven pounds. However, with the current conditions in regard to the virus epidemic it would not be a good idea to get to close to groups of people while purchasing bait or fishing to close to others.

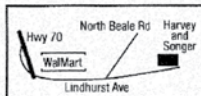

## 48 Hours and Sara's Case

(There are a number of unsolved murders in Yuba-Sutter and not mentioning them all here should not be taken as minimizing the anguish to the family and the community.)

Recently, there has been national interest in another tragedy though it took but one life.

Representatives with the weekly CBS newsmagazine '48 Hours' have been making contacts with people with knowledge of the Sara Matthews Easton case.

The well-known television newsmagazine says it "investigates intriguing crime and justice cases that touch on all aspects of the human experience..... the show has helped exonerate wrongly convicted people, driven the reopening -- and resolution -- of cold cases, and changed numerous lives. CBS News correspondents offer an in-depth look into each story, with the emphasis on solving the mystery at its heart. The program and its team have earned critical acclaim, including multiple Emmy, Peabody and Edward R. Murrow Awards."

Easton was found in her Yuba City, CA bed with a gunshot wound(s) to the head on the morning of August 16, 2015

after being out with her husband Marysville Chief of Police Aaron Easton several hours prior. The Easton case is still unresolved and at a standstill now in its 5th year being under investigation. Was it a suicide, an accident or a homicide?

Many of those involved in the case have moved-on or will be leaving soon. Sutter County Sheriff Paul Parker and his Chief Deputy Coroner Bruce Hutchinson retired and other investigators have left their departments for various reasons. Yuba City Chief of Police Rob Landon and Lt. Jeremy Garcia are soon to retire.

The Sara Easton incident occurred in the police department's jurisdiction but the sheriff's department handles the coroner or medical examiner duties. The prosecution has been given to the Attorney General's office due to conflicts of interest with both Yuba and Sutter County District Attorney offices.

Investigators close to the case do not believe Easton shot herself. However, they have not made an arrest. No one can predict if 48 Hours can bring a resolution to the investigation, but it should

prove interesting if they determine the case is worth the costs to produce an episode.

The show's key people to interview might include Amanda Hopper (Sutter County District Attorney), her ex-husband Brian Hopper (former Yuba County Sheriff's Deputy), Parker and Hutchinson, Chief of Police Rob Landon, various investigators from Yuba City Police and Sutter County Sheriff's Departments, Aaron Easton and his former co-workers, and friends and family related to Sara and Aaron Easton and Easton's new wife Chanell Chaney Easton, funeral attendants, and of course Appeal Democrat newspaper reporters.

## Agricultural Work Remains Critical During Covid-19 Crisis

With agriculture designated “critical infrastructure” by federal and state governments, the California Farm Bureau Federation reiterated its commitment to assist the state’s farmers, ranchers and agricultural businesses during the statewide stay-at-home order issued by Gov. Gavin Newsom.

“As people who work in a sector defined as critical, farmers, ranchers and people working in agricultural businesses recognize our special responsibility to maintain normal work schedules,” CFBF President Jamie Johansson said. “We encourage local, state and federal agencies to interpret the guidelines as broadly as practicable, to be sure everyone in agriculture can stay on the job, producing food and farm products during this crisis.”

As with any decisive action, Johansson said, there will likely be some confusion and questions about definitions, but he said he has been reassured agencies remain committed to smoothing the production, marketing and transportation of food and farm products.

“The state Office of Emergency Services has made it clear: People involved in agriculture, food production, distribution and transportation of food or agricultural products—anyone working in the food supply chain—people in those critical jobs are allowed and should continue to show up for work,” Johansson said.

To ensure people working in agriculture can do their jobs safely, Farm Bureau has redoubled its work with employers to make sure they’re aware of the latest guidelines from health officials and government agencies.

“Based on the questions we’ve been receiving from farmers, we know they’re being diligent in having employees engage in sanitary practices,” Johansson said. “That’s already a high priority for reasons both of food safety and employee health. Farmers take a number of steps on a regular basis to protect themselves, their employees, their families and their crops.”

County Farm Bureaus around California and CFBF will remain operational, in order to support their members.

“County Farm Bureaus provide a critical local resource for farmers, ranchers and people in agricultural businesses,” Johansson said. “County Farm Bureaus and those of us at CFBF will remain available to respond to our members and work with government agencies to assure continuity of critical food and agricultural activity.”

## Parts of Brown Act Suspended

On March 17th, Governor Newsom issued the second of two Executive Orders conditionally suspending certain Brown Act provisions to allow local agencies to hold public meetings "virtually" through teleconferencing, without any physical gathering of people. (The first Executive Order had required agencies to provide at least one physical location from which members of the public could participate in the meeting. The March 17th Order eliminated this requirement.)

Legislative body meetings must still be publicly noticed in accordance with the Brown Act, and the agency must provide a means for the public to observe the meeting and provide public comment electronically or telephonically. (For example, livestreaming the meeting and accepting comments by email, similar to a webinar, or allowing the public to dial into the meeting conference call and be "unmuted" during public comment.) The opportunities for public observation

and participation must be included in the meeting notice, and the agency is also required to establish a process for receiving and resolving any requests for reasonable accommodation to allow accessibility to persons with disabilities. These provisions will remain in effect "during the period in which state or local public health officials have imposed or

recommended social distancing measures."

The Executive Order admonishes public agencies to "use sound discretion" in applying these provisions, and counties would be well-advised to defer controversial matters that are not time-critical until normal Brown Act meetings can be resumed.

People can be assured farmers and ranchers are continuing to ship food and farm products to market as the state and nation react to slow the spread of the novel coronavirus. California Farm Bureau Federation President Jamie Johansson said farmers and ranchers, their employees and people throughout the supply chain are dedicated to maintaining plentiful supplies of safe food.

“It’s in challenging

times like these when farmers’ and ranchers’ true passion shines: feeding and contributing to the stability of our local communities, state and country,” Johansson said. “In fields, orchards, processing plants and down the line to farmers markets and grocery stores, California agriculture remains on the job.”

Johansson said Farm Bureau has been working with its members and other agricultural employers to make sure they’re aware of the

latest guidelines from health officials and government agencies.

“We may need to adjust on-farm practices to account for social distancing and other measures to further assure the safety of our employees,” he said. “Farm Bureau members from north to south have been proactive in adjusting daily activities to keep themselves and their employees safe.”

Farm Bureau will also work with local, state and federal government agencies to assure availability of the human and physical resources needed to maintain plentiful food supplies, Johansson said.

“Through drought, freeze, world war and the trauma of 9/11, farmers and ranchers and people throughout the food chain have kept Americans supplied with safe, affordable food and farm products,” he said. “That same ethic will drive us in the days and weeks to come.”

CFBF offices in Sacramento have closed in compliance with the stay-at-home protocol announced Tuesday by Sacramento County authorities.

“Keeping up with daily announcements and directives from all levels of governments so our members can remain focused on their farms and ranches has been all-consuming,” Johansson said. “CFBF employees will continue to work from their homes to provide services to county Farm Bureaus and our members, and we know each county Farm Bureau will also do what they can to work for their members.”

# Food and Farm News

## Farmers markets cope with COVID-19 response

Reaction to the novel coronavirus has led some local governments and property owners to suspend operation of farmers markets. Market managers say they should be considered an essential public service, similar to grocery stores. Though some farmers markets have been temporarily closed, others remain open and have instituted additional measures to prevent close contact among customers and vendors.

## Restaurant reductions affect farmers

Temporary closures or reduced occupancy by restaurants, work-site cafeterias and other outlets have ripple effects to the farmers and companies that sell

fruits, vegetables and meats to such food-service businesses. Food wholesalers say they’re working to find alternative customers for farm products. Though sales at restaurants and institutional clients have declined, outlets that offer drive-through, pickup or delivery service have seen their business increase.

## Flight cancellations complicate food shipments

Travel restrictions intended to slow the spread of the novel coronavirus have led to canceled flights, reducing options for shipping California-grown foods to foreign customers. Shipments carried on passenger planes complement shipments via ocean and air freight. With passenger flights

reduced, perishable cargo such as fruits, vegetables, flowers, meats and dairy products will compete for space on aircraft with other commodities and express shipments.

## March storms help pastures and snowpack, a little

Pasture grasses around California have turned brown due to dry weather for much of the winter. Ranchers say mid-March rains helped. But grass on many rangelands has matured to a point that it won’t produce as much vegetation, even after the rains. In the Sierra, weekend storms boosted the snowpack—but to only 46% of average statewide, compared to 38% before the storms.

***"May you live in interesting times"***

There is no more important influence of prices than supply and demand. Rooted in the core of capitalistic system is this price discovery method of supply and demand.

It like seems like every time I even type the word capitalism lately some part of my brain winces in fear of the incoming flak from some readers.

However, capitalism and its pricing mechanism of supply and demand are benign in reality. Both the system of capitalism and its mechanism supply and demand is, in the simplest of terms, people buying at the price they are willing to pay from sellers selling at the price they are willing to take.

Pretty simple stuff really and whether one is a supporter of capitalism or a detractor of it, both sides of the argument practice it almost every single day of their lives.

A no-more near perfect example of supply and demand and its effect on prices is the recent 25% price thumping of West Texas crude oil on March 9th. One could say it was caused by both the Russians and the Saudis, for if either one hadn't acted, the price of oil would have likely remained calm. But both did.

Russia, a non-member of the Organization of Petroleum Exporting

Countries (OPEC) began the party by refusing to cut oil production by half a million barrels a day, a request by the consortium of oil producers in response to the falling demand worldwide caused by consumer inactivity in response to the Corona virus.

The Saudis, angered by Russia refusal to cooperate in an orderly cut-back, retaliated by opening the spigots, signaling the first shot in a price war that comes with a double whammy. Increasing supply while demand is falling. The double and synergistic action of supplying more oil while demand is falling yanks both sides of the price curve, essentially providing twice the reason for an exaggerated and historic price collapse.

The 25% price drop was one of the steepest in history, surpassed only by the 31% trouncing oil took in 1991, when the U.S. launched "Desert Storm", the military move designed to force Iraq from Kuwait. During that event, in an apparent relief price move, the market sold off on the news, anticipating a resolution to the previous spike in oil prices Iraq's move into the region caused months earlier.

This time around West Texas crude, a benchmark type of oil among the many versions of sold, ended up the day at \$31.13 a barrel. The good news is such a price reduction benefits the economy by an estimated one trillion dollars in savings. The markets however saw it as a sign of the times, which is a continued erosion in spending by the consumer as social interaction of all kinds grind to a halt because of conta-

gion fears.

The Dow fell a record setting 2000 plus points by days' end, setting a single day point drop record, shell shocking analysts and investors alike. March 10 brought a rebound both in oil prices and the Dow, with the Dow rising more than a 1000 points. Short lived, the following day the Saudis vowed even more production sending oil back to the doldrums it saw two days prior.

The lower oil prices will benefit the obvious heavy users of oil products such as the airlines and other transportation companies. The consumer will also benefit from lower gas prices and the likely fall in prices of the myriad of products produced by petroleum and its derivatives.

For the time being however, the collapse of oil signifies just another symptom of a sick and getting sicker world economy caused by the decrease in social interaction and travel brought on by the increasing fear of the event that is the Covid-19 pandemic.

Significant water supply improvements are in the works for the Museum of the Forgotten Warriors with the help of Yuba Water Agency.

The Museum of the Forgotten Warriors is a non-profit corporation that was built to honor veterans who served. The museum, which is located in Marysville, houses military memorabilia, tanks, cannons and helicopters, in addition to an exhibit space and library.

Also at today's meeting, the board approved an education grant for up to \$2,500 to Lindhurst High School. The funds will enable a unique project in the Applied Science class for juniors and seniors, in which students will develop a greenhouse water collection and conservation system, providing students with an authentic experiential learning opportunity.

Both of these grants are in accord with Yuba Water's mission of ensuring a sustainable water supply.

## Free Waste Tire Disposal Coupons Available

Yuba and Sutter Counties, Ca.

Planning to do some spring cleaning soon? To assist in this effort, the Regional Waste Management Authority again has coupons available for the free disposal of residentially generated waste tires. Yuba and Sutter County residents can now request a coupon for the free drop-off of up to 20 residentially generated passenger car and light truck tires per household (for rims up to 22 inches in diameter). Free tire disposal coupons are issued on a first come, first served basis while supplies last. They expire 30 days from the date of issue and a valid coupon must be presented when the waste tires are delivered to the drop-off location. Tires do not need to be removed from the rims. Call the Regional Waste Management Authority weekdays between 8:00 a.m. and 12:00 noon and 1:00 p.m. and 5:00 p.m. at (530) 634-6890 to request a coupon or for more information on the program. Please be prepared when you call to provide the number of tires that you have for disposal. This program is for residential use only – no businesses. Commercially generated waste tires are not eligible for this program. If hauling more than 9 tires at one time, the Local Enforcement Agency conditions on the reverse side of the coupon must be completed. This program is funded by a grant from the Department of Resources

Recycling and Recovery (CalRecycle).

### Money Can't Buy Love, or Elections

Of the many conclusions that can be drawn from the March primary election in California, perhaps the most notable is that money doesn't always translate into political success.

Let's start with the "bad" Proposition 13 — the \$15 billion statewide school bond measure which, at this writing, is way behind in the polls. The Associated Press has already called the election for the opponents.

The proponents of the bond had a lot of things going for them including the vocal support of the governor, education interests, public sector unions and developers. They also had a sympathetic purpose. Raising money for schools has traditionally been easy in California because education ranks very high in importance among the state's voters. The slogan "it's for the kids" may over overused, but it can still be effective.

The proponents also had something else which should have translated into a huge advantage: Lots of campaign cash. Although all the financial filings with California's secretary of state are not yet publicly available, the proponents spent at least \$10 million and perhaps much more than that to

push their messaging.

Slick television ads claiming crumbling schools, lead in the pipes and asbestos in the ceiling tiles were intended to push the sympathy buttons of concerned voters.

As for the opponents, a small-scale, grassroots guerrilla campaign anchored with a modest \$250,000 statewide radio ad proved to be highly effective. But perhaps the most important factor in the opponents' campaign was a carefully crafted opposition argument in the official ballot pamphlet.

That didn't cost a dime. That argument hit some sympathy buttons as well, including the high tax burden in California, the misuse and waste of existing education dollars and the threat of higher property taxes due to an obscure provision in the bond measure that raised local districts' debt ceiling so they could issue more bonds themselves.

Local school bonds add extra charges to property tax bills.

The bond backers may have assumed that a 40-to-1 advantage in campaign dollars would be more than enough, no matter how flawed the underlying proposal. It is clear now that they were mistaken.

Another example of how campaign money doesn't translate into success is the failed presidential candidacy of Michael Bloomberg. Although that was a national campaign,

he spent tons of money here in California on radio, television and social media, all for naught. Nationally, he spent over \$600 million and managed only to pick up a few delegates in the American Samoa Islands. Comics have labeled Bloomberg as the "Jesse Smollett" of politics insofar as they both paid a lot of money to get beaten.

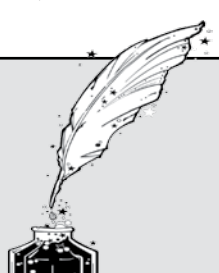
California has a long history of well-funded campaigns doing poorly, including gubernatorial candidates Ron Unz, Al Checchi and Meg Whitman, for whom seemingly unlimited money became more of a negative than a positive.

The same is true for initiatives in that powerful interest groups such as insurance companies, doctors and public-sector unions often come up short with their proposals using the tools of direct democracy.

California politician Jesse Unruh famously said that money is the mother's milk of politics and that still is no doubt true.

Financial resources are usually a prerequisite to political success.

However, Americans should not be fooled into believing that \$200,000 spent by Russia on tacky Facebook ads could affect a national election when Michael Bloomberg couldn't make a dent in the Democratic primary with \$600 million.

### Live Oak City Manager's CALPERS Analysis A Flagrant Defiance Of the Facts

On Saturday February 15 the Appeal Democrat published a front page story detailing the latest CALPERS Annual Evaluations Reports for local government agencies. These reports were released in July of 2019.

Live Oak City Manager Aaron Palmer reported that Live Oak (the taxpayers of Live Oak) paid \$242,000 to CALPERS for the fiscal year ended June 30, 2018. What Mr. Palmer didn't report is that Live Oak also paid the employee share (8% of roughly \$600,000 in salaries) for the 2.7% miscellaneous plan. That's about \$50,000 he chose not to disclose.

Paying the employee's share is basically "hidden compensation". At any rate, failing to report this pension cost means Mr. Palmer was not being forthright or transparent. Shame on him!

Mr. Palmer went on to claim Live Oak's CALPERS payments represent

only 3% of the City's total annual budget of roughly \$7 million dollars. The percentage highlighted in the CALPERS report Live Oak citizens should be paying attention to is the percentage of salary Live Oak will be sending to CALPERS for 2.7% plan members next fiscal year. The number is 53% (45% plus the employee portion of 8%).

For Live Oak's upper-level 2.7% employees this translates to about \$20 dollars per hour just for the CALPERS contribution. And unlike teachers and most other government workers, these employees don't contribute one dime of their own money. Nice work if you can get it.

City Manager Palmer went on to reinforce a false claim made many times by Live Oak Finance Director Joe Aguilar. They emphatically state that Live Oak does not have a pension problem because we don't have our own safety (3%

at 50) plan. The city indirectly pays these costs to the Sutter County Sheriffs Department and Sutter County Fire who provide the city's police and fire services. These payments (47% of salary) are actually lower than Live Oak's 2.7% at 55 payments (53% of salary). Wow! Another pension lie exposed. Mr. Palmer really should have read the July 2019 reports. I doubt that he did.

These out of control pension costs that Live Oak management refuses to address are one reason some high level Live Oak employees' total compensation will be around \$160,000 per year beginning July 1st. As a result, the top 6 Live Oak employees have a total compensation of over a million dollars. Who knew? This from a staff that's taken well over 11 years to complete one water well. Amazing!
