“Race Car Legends Coming to Town”

On Saturday, March 21st, four of Northern California's top racers for the last 40 years, will be coming to Yuba City to be inducted into the Northern California Sports Association's 50th Annual “Hall of Fame/Scholarship” Dinner.

Leading the group will be Scott Pruett and Bill McANALLY. Scott Pruett recently retired from active racing, but has the most impressive record of racing accomplishments. Racing Go-Karts at the age of 8 he

went on to win 10 professional karting championships. Following that Scott raced Indy cars in the CART Series for 12 years, and highlighted that career as the 1989 “Indianapolis 500” co-rookie of the year. He then moved to the NASCAR Winston Cup Series for 7 years and raced on the Chip Ganassi team. Scott eventually won 11 American Sports Car Championships, with 3 Trans-Am Series Championships and 2 IMSA GTO Championships. He is still actively involved with

the Lexus Motorsports Racing team. Scott and his wife Judy own a wine vineyard in Auburn and are both involved with a successful career in writing children's book. Scott and Judy are donating a number of items to be auctioned off at the dinner.

Bill McAnally, who also attended Roseville High, is one of the most established racers and promoters to ever come out of Northern California. Crowned as the Open-Division

AAUW STEM Conference at Yuba College



Yuba County, Ca. – The next STEM Conference for 8th Grade Girls will be held at Yuba College the morning of Monday, March 30. Last year's STEM Conference brought more than 800 students to the Yuba College campus to experience what college life might be like, and to learn from local women about their careers in fields that require science and math. The conference's purpose is to encourage girls to stay in school and not to avoid the ‘hard’ subjects. Studies have shown that girls are as proficient in science and math as anyone, and they can succeed. This year's STEM Conference will include working

women in fields of science, technology, engineering, and mathematics.

Middle and K-8 schools in Sutter and Yuba Counties are invited to attend, and many teachers bring their 8th grade girls to the STEM Conference every year. Students come to the STEM Conference with their math or science teachers in school busses as a school project. Many leave with ideas about the career direction on which they wish to focus, and have a better idea of what classes to sign up for when they get to high school in the fall.

The STEM Conference begins at 9:00 a.m. in the Yuba

College gymnasium with keynote speaker, Preet Didbal, the former Mayor of Yuba City and Yuba City Planning Commissioner. Then they will break out into Sessions taught by local women in STEM careers. After each girl has attended her 3 sessions, all 800 or so girls will join again in the school cafeteria for lunch. Girls who have signed up for a Campus Tour will do so following lunch. Sara's Blood Cries Out

In 2015, Sara Matthews Easton, a devoted mother of three children, was in a troubled marriage, regretting her choice of a partner and wishing she would have chosen someone like her father.

On Saturday night, August 15, 2015, she was with her husband Marysville Chief of Police Aaron Easton at Joe's Crab Shack celebrating her 32nd birthday. In just a few hours emergency personnel would arrive at the Easton residence to find Sara with gunshot wounds to the head. Her husband and children were in the home at the time.

Law enforcement indicated that Aaron Easton was extended “professional courtesies” at this apparent suicide. They did not approach the scene with the same investigative vigilance as with a regular citizen.

However, the scene had been tampered with and three shell casings were found along with other evidence pointing to a possible homicide versus a self-inflicted or accidental death. That morning rather than calling “911,” Aaron Easton first called Brian and Amanda Hopper to come to the home. They declined. Then he called “911.”

Sara was then transported to Adventist Emergency Department in Marysville and pronounced dead.

Brian Hopper and Aaron Easton began their careers in law enforcement at Yuba County Sheriff's Department (YCSD). Easton's “Linked-In” profile says he was at YCSD from April 2004 – February 2011. Hopper left the department after Easton.

YCSD leadership was relieved with both Hopper and Easton departing. There was information that they were having sexual relations with women while on duty. In fact, a Yuba College police cadet later accused Easton of forcing her to give him oral sex while she was on an academy ride-along.

Brian Hopper was married to Amanda Jones Hopper at the time. Amanda Hopper was the new District Attorney (DA) of Sutter County

Colleges Unaffordable and Irrelevant

Colleges in America are in trouble and the recent Yuba College Measure C Bond failure showed their desperate predicament. Colleges are burying future generations with bond debt and current students with loan debt.

Measure C lost in all 8 counties where property owners are saddled with the property tax assessments for 20-40 years to fund Yuba College projects.

The California community or 2-year colleges are funded by the state but don't live within their means so they borrow money via bond measures. Fantastic salaries and pensions for administrators and faculty, along with bloated administrations have financially buried schools.

Bond funds are paid back at egregious interest costs over decades by property owners.

The fight to defeat Measure C uncovered disturbing facts about the Yuba College system. The Yuba County campus looks neglected even after the 2006 bond funding.

The administration deserted the Yuba campus to lease space on Plumas Street in Yuba City for \$310,000 per year. And new campuses are being developed in Sutter County and Woodland (Yolo County).

Yuba and Sutter voters wonder why a majority of their bond payments are going to a Woodland campus. And, why is maintenance not being done at the Yuba County site? The former Yuba College facilities in Marysville now a part of Marysville High School are still serving students while newer buildings on North Neale Road have been “moth-balled” and are now wet, moldy and in disrepair.

Personnel salaries, pensions and benefits have hindered even normal maintenance like paint, plumbing, roofing etc. It is incredible to read that a bond measure would include annual budgeted items like maintenance costs.

The place looks like it is going out of business. Is the long term vision to abandon the Yuba County campus? It looks that way.

We have a couple of report which are not current. Striped bass have been caught in the Sacramento River as high upstream as Colusa. Anglers are seeing more action in the vicinity of Verona, both in the Sacramento and Feather Rivers. The Sacramento River temperature was measured at above 65 degrees. With this temperature we expect the spawn to get underway at any time. As far as the Delta goes we hear the bass are plentiful on the Sacramento side. Expect this area to just get better as we move into March.

A couple weeks ago our weather source told us to expect rain the middle of March. The rain came on March 7th so we contacted him again. He still predicts rain in the middle of March and also continues to feel we will have snow in the mountains at that time.

Congratulations goes out to Yuba City angler Nancy Santana on her big limit of king salmon which were caught while fishing Lake Oroville.

Sturgeon are moving up the Sacramento River to spawn. Best area to fish is at Knights Landing. Best bait at this time is Eel and ghost shrimp.

When the weather clears up we expect the bite at Lake Almanor to improve dramatically for salmon, trout and small mouth bass.

The recent (and con-

tinued plant program) plant of rainbow trout at Collins Lake had smiling faces on many anglers last week. The fish were a mix of feisty trout from 12 inches up to four and

five pounders.

Sara's Blood Cries Out

(November 2014 election) when Sara Easton died. And, DA Hopper's father Steve Jones worked as a prosecutor for the Yuba County District Attorney's office.

These relationships created a number of conflicts to investigating Sara's death. Brian Hopper was called-in for questioning by Yuba City Police detectives.

However, they did not believe his story about his relationship to Sara Easton and they called his wife, the DA to explain the situation. That led to more questions. Did investigators think Brian Hopper was having an affair with Sara Easton or was he a person of interest in her death or both?

Police investigators noting the ethical conflict in dealing with the Sutter and Yuba County DA offices went to Colusa County District Attorney John Poyner seeking approval of search warrants. Poyner authorized the warrants and said he would have no problem prosecuting Aaron Easton for murder with the evidence he reviewed.

Although DA Hopper could not prosecute this case she had a lot at stake. Hopper sought confidential details and findings from the sheriff's department. It was awkward for law enforcement personnel.

According to Sara Easton who once considered the DA a close friend, Amanda had sexual relations with Sara's husband. Sara Easton knew her husband to be a sex addict, having had many affairs including an Appeal Democrat reporter. She knew he was having other women while working at YCSD which eventually led to her getting a venereal disease from her

husband.

When Aaron Easton applied for a job at Marysville Police Department in 2010 where he later became chief and interim city manager the background investigator was informed of Easton's marital unfaithfulness. He was hired by the city anyway.

Sara Easton was afraid of her husband's penchant for sado-masochism including choking her and taping a plastic bag over her head. She was afraid of her husband. Sara was tired of trying to outperform or compete with the flings and affairs in his life.

In her frustration did Sara kill herself in her own home near the children she loved? Or, did she tell him she was leaving leading to an argument and Aaron shooting her?

Law enforcement personnel close to the case believe Aaron killed Sara. The family wonders why nothing is being done. Some say the case went to the State Attorney General's (AG) Office.

The AG's office has never been helpful on cases here. The AG has a reputation of being political and paper-weights. Some in the Yuba City Police Department say the

case is still there. Who is blocking this investigation?

Meanwhile life goes on. Both Assemblyman Gallagher and Senator Nielsen endorsed DA Hopper for another 4-year term. She won easily in 2018.

Easton re-married right away and lives in Moore, OK. His “Linked-In” profile touts his law enforcement accomplishments while leaving out his resignation as the Marysville Police Chief following the cadet sexual assault investigation. Easton says, “I have been asked to speak on the Dr. Phil Show, Good Day Sacramento and was featured on several programs, including NBC News, Yahoo News, and American Police Beat Magazine, among others.”

"I was featured in 'Police Chief' magazine as a recipient of the International Association of Chiefs of Police 2016 40 Under 40 Award; given to the 40 law enforcement professionals under 40, throughout the world, that best exhibit leadership in the law enforcement profession."

Other inductees include ex-professional baseball athletes Pat

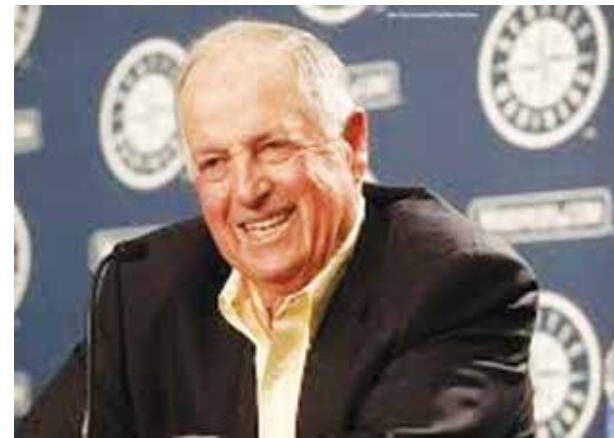

Originally raised and schooled in Oroville, Pat Gillick will be returning to this area to accept an award as the latest inductee into the Northern California Sports Association “Hall of Fame”. on the demand side of things have ground to a halt. All of this translates into a worldwide slow down likely affecting many companies throughout the global stage and possibly causing serious damage to their economies. Indeed, there have

been earning warnings from some of the biggest companies, and one only has to look at the evening news to understand the possible scope of the paralysis. Sunday night when I penned this reveals Dow futures down another 500 points. What transpires when this goes to print is anyone's guess.

CNBC states the financial conglomerates JPMorgan, Citi and Goldman Sachs all concur there hasn't been enough pain to call a bottom yet and many analysts agree with them. There is that much uncertainty.

With the Dow falling back to 2019 levels and beyond, investors are likely seeing more red than they have in years. The additional pain of "giving it all back" likely adds to the frustration. It wasn't so long ago when the 2018 October to late December crash significantly decimated investor balances only to rebound in the stock blast off that was year of 2019.

Although 2020 appeared to start as more of the same up and away direction, the virus event emerged late January into the proverbial "Black Swan" market event it has turned out to be. Black Swan events can take down even the most resilient of market rallies. The term Black Swan refers to the rarity and unpredictability of the occurrence of such a creature. Black Swan events are rare and difficult if not impossible to predict. 9/11 or the Indonesian Tsunami are examples of Black Swan events.

The rise of the Covid-19 virus certainly qualifies as a Black Swan.

The difference and uniqueness of this event is whereas 9/11 and the Tsunami occurred and concluded in the same day, the current virus event has an unknown

duration and at this point in time unmeasurable consequences. We simply do not know how far and fast it will spread, when it will stop and how long lasting and widespread its effect will be.

Indeed, if one could conjure up the perfect storm for the stock market, outside of an alien invasion, a contagion outbreak certainly would qualify as a near perfect Black Swan that could wreak havoc on the stock markets all over the world.

Only time will tell as to when the bloodletting will end and just how much blood will be spilt. For now, however, investors who are losing sleep because of the continuing erosion in their portfolio balances might consider lightening up on traditional stock holdings, possibly adding some hedges and consider U.S. guaranteed investments.

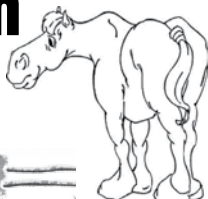

Singer/songwriter, Tom Galvin, will get the musical festivities underway and then One Eyed Reilly will “strike up the band” at 6pm. The cost for dinner and the show is only \$30 in advance or \$40 at the door. Irish Coffee, Irish Whiskey, drink specials and all your other favorite beverages will be available for purchase. Tickets are expected to sell out again so order in advance at yubasutterarts.org. This year, the band will be located outside, weather permitting, with heaters if necessary. This will make them more easily accessible for guests. If you haven’t heard them before, One Eyed Reilly is a Celtic/Americana rock band that blends some original songs with modern Celtic rock, Americana, and energetic, innovative versions of traditional Irish and Scottish classics. Their original music draws upon musical influences from The Clancy Brothers,

The Chieftains, and The Dubliners, to Flogging Molly and The Waterboys. Most of the classes are a waste of time and contribute nothing to a career or good citizenship. Most needed subjects can be offered online where people can study and complete the tests. Tesla inventor-entrepreneur Elon Musk hires based on skill and intellect. Degrees and diplomas are unnecessary. Other Silicon Valley companies like Google and Apple no longer require a college degree. Musk has a personal dissatisfaction with school and says “I don’t care if you even graduated high

school. I hated going to school when I was a kid. It was torture.” Conventional schools today are incapable of helping young people develop the knowledge and skills they need to do 21st century work. The old factory model of signaling potential employers by surviving the schooling conveyor belt is sick and dying. Musk realizes what it takes to succeed in the innovation era and it has little to do with conventional schooling. The online coding Lambda School has income share agreements. You can attend for free but the company takes a percentage of graduates’ earnings once they land a high-tech job. If the student does not secure a job then they do not pay. Lambda is receiving 1,000 applications a week. Community colleges are in trouble and bond requests represent extraordinary end of life measures.

Food and Farm News

Study predicts significant impact from water shortages Water shortages could cause 1 million acres of San Joaquin Valley farmland to be idled and cost as many as 85,000 jobs, according to an analysis by University of California economists. The report considered the impact of potential groundwater and surface water restrictions resulting from laws and regulations. The group Water Blueprint for the San Joaquin Valley commissioned the study and said a second report will discuss ways to reduce the impacts. **Vineyard removal addresses grape surplus** More vineyards will be removed in California this year, as farmers and wineries work to correct an imbalance

in supply and demand. Wine-business analysts say some grapes went unharvested last year, as wineries sought to reduce their inventories. The 2020 grape crop has just begun to develop, with vines pushing out buds. That means farmers will be monitoring for frost that might damage the emerging crop. **Federal funds help fight plant pests, diseases** To protect California-grown crops, the U.S. Department of Agriculture has allocated \$12.7 million to plant-health and pest-fighting projects. More than a third of the money will go toward surveys for exotic fruit flies that could damage crops. Other grants will support "detector dog" teams that search for harmful pests

in packages at mail and parcel delivery facilities, plus additional projects to fight pests and plant diseases. **Research focuses on pistachios' healthy properties** Two recent studies point to health benefits derived from pistachios. The American Pistachio Growers organization announced new studies showing roasted pistachios meet the definition of a "complete protein" that provides all essential amino acids. That makes roasted pistachios one of the few plant-based sources of complete protein. A separate study indicated pistachio extract could be used to fight a variety of bacterial or viral infections.
