CHP Officer David Gordon is Home

Officer David Gordon, a Yreka native who started his 13-year CHP career with the Santa Rosa office, suffered his injuries in the early hours of Oct. 19, 2019 after he and

a partner exited their patrol vehicle to direct traffic past malfunctioning train crossing gates on Highway 99, near Live Oak.

While the officers directed traffic, a dark gray SUV came speeding around a curve. His partner was able to jump out of the way, but Gordon couldn't avoid the SUV. After hitting Gordon, the driver exited the vehicle and attempted to flee. The unharmed officer chased down the suspect, identified as Lucas Julian Nelson, who was later booked the Sutter County jail on charges of resisting arrest and DUI with great bodily injury. The CHP Yuba-Sutter office said Nelson was determined to have been

driving under the influence of alcohol.

CHP Officer David Gordon came home on Friday, February 21, 2020 after four months in the hospital. He was met with cheers and raucous applause from more than 100 hospital workers and law enforcement brethren as he emerged from the main entrance of UC Davis Medical Center in Sacramento on Friday afternoon. Accompanied by his wife and their two children, a walker-assisted Gordon, dressed in a blue T-shirt with an American flag on the front, climbed into a white limousine moments after turning and offering his crowd of supporters a humble but enthused "Thank you!"

Being Charitable with the Neighbor's Money

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Yuba and Sutter Sheriffs Partner with Yuba-Sutter Farm Bureau for CSI Crime Prevention Program

On 2/19/2020, Yuba County Sheriff Wendell Anderson and Sutter County Sheriff Brandon Barnes announced a new state-of-the-art, crime-fighting tool designed to reduce agriculture thefts. Agriculture in the Yuba Sutter Area is an over 800 million dollar a year industry; and they are often a target of property crimes involving extremely valuable equipment and commodities. The Yuba and Sutter Sheriff Offices are collaborating with the Yuba-Sutter Farm Bureau to launch the program locally with the creators of a company called SmartWater CSI, which makes a liquid product used to mark and identify owner-

ship of farm equipment.

SmartWater is a liquid you cannot see, feel, or smell. However, once a special light shines on the applied SmartWater product, it emits a yellow telltale glow. The liquid has its own unique fingerprint or DNA-similar encryption that is registered to individual farmers or ranchers who take part in the program. A small dab on a piece of equipment is all that is required. If equipment is stolen that is marked with this special liquid and investigators are able to locate the suspect or the marked property, it can lead to identification of the rightful owners of the property and evidence

to assist in prosecution of suspects involved in the theft.

Once applied, the unique liquid lasts for years. It is not susceptible to scrubbing; and not even bleach or other chemicals will remove it. If the traceable SmartWater gets on the hands or clothes of the offender, it can assist investigators to forensically place that suspect at the crime scene and potentially help solve such theft cases.

Crime Prevention is also a core goal of the program. Signs and stickers will be provided to farmers using the system to designate equipment and property as being a part of the SmartWater CSI program. The hope is that thieves will see the signage at farms and ranches and decide it is simply not worth the risk to steal equipment protected by SmartWater.

We are committed to helping protect one of Yuba-Sutter's most important industries. Gavin Celebrates Tax-Free Tampons

A longtime neighbor and resident of downtown Marysville, CA while out for a walk stopped to explain that he and his wife were moving. They visited relatives in Oklahoma at Christmas and there was no looking back to the Left Coast.

In fact, California recipients of state aid receive a disproportionately large share of it in no-strings-attached cash disbursements. It's as if welfare reform passed California by, leaving a dependency trap in place."

After the legislature forced PGE (rates 2 times the national average) and other utilities aground with environmental and regulatory excesses, Governor Newsom is politically desperate

The Fish and Game Commission made a ruling on February 21st which could be the beginning of the end for the striped bass population in California. The commission brought up the striped bass policy, was seconded and voted on and became law without any comments from a small group of people who wanted to protest this change like the past huge meetings of people who previously attended meeting on the striped bass controversy.

The new policy amends the 1996 striped bass policy which committed the state to maintain one million striped bass in the Delta and all waterways connected to same.

Striped bass are not a native fish in California. The species was introduced to California, from the east coast, in 1879. They were transported by rail and were planted in the Pacific Ocean near Martinez. Not all the small minnows survived the trip across the country, but those who did survive took off quickly in their new environment growing in size and the striper population burst wide open.

Since their introduction in the west fish have been planted in various reservoirs in California. The fish has been a popular target for anglers due to their size, fighting ability, table fare and aggressive behavior. In addition, these fish are

regarded as a predator which controls the trach fish population of any water they live in. The predator part of these fish is one of the subjects being discussed which pertain to both salmon and steelhead smolts (small minnows) planted each spring in local rivers.

These small minnows will orientate themselves, form schools and start the long journey to the Delta and beyond. On their way downstream they will encounter many challenges which include hungry striped bass, both resident fish and those which are drawn up stream from the smell of all those little guys. It is also true that the striped bass eat their share but other fish in the system, such as small and largemouth bass, catfish (yes, large catfish will attack and eat small fish) squawfish and other fish who show

predator abilities also take a toll on the salmon and steelhead smolts.

Let us face one fact.....fish eat fish, even their own species. The eventual removal of striped bass in California waters will not stop the reduction of planted salmon and steelhead caused by aggressive and predator fish that remain in the system and have been a part of this state for a long, long time. Besides, the striped bass fishery is a boom to California's economy, from the bait shops to the motel and hotels, professional guides, eatery's and beyond. The removal or drastically reduction of the striped bass population in California would be a financial disaster to all

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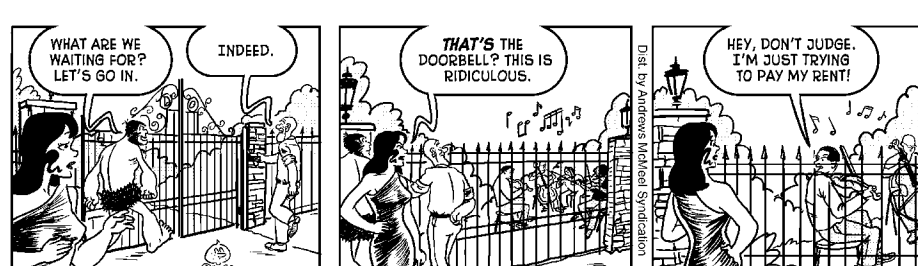
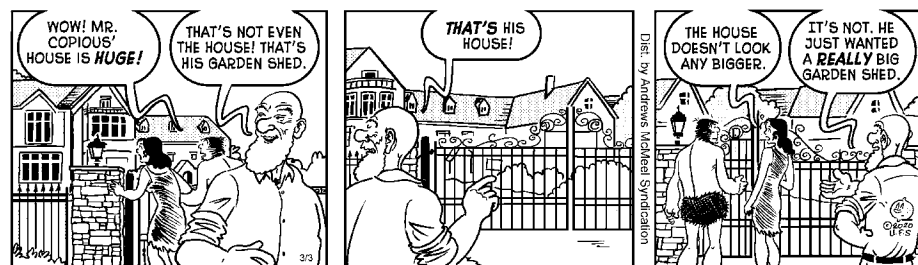
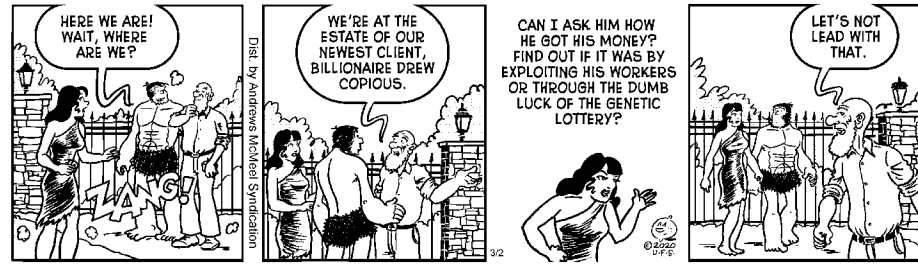

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COUNTY OF YUBA SUMMARY OF ADOPTED ORDINANCE NO. 1589 SUMMARY OF ORDINANCE REPEALING AND RE-ENACTING ARTICLE 5 OF TITLE II OF THE YUBA COUNTY ORDINANCE CODE REGARDING PURCHASE OF REAL PROPERTY

The following is a summary of an ordinance repealing and re-enacting Article 5 of Title II of the Yuba County Ordinance Code regarding purchase of real property that was adopted by the Board of Supervisors of the County of Yuba on February 25, 2020.

Pursuant to Government Code Section 25350.60 the Board of Supervisors may authorize a County officer to perform any or all acts necessary to approve and accept for the County the acquisition of any interest in real property.

The ordinance repeals and re-enacts Article 5 of Title 2 of the Yuba County Ordinance Code for the purchase of real property. The ordinance establishes the Public Works Director, or designee, to be responsible for coordinating, planning, and negotiations of all real property purchases, and for maintaining records. The ordinance authorizes the Public Works Director, or designee, to perform all acts necessary to approve and accept for the County of any real property where the purchase price does not exceed \$150,000 and establishes procedures for the Public Works Director.

The complete text of the proposed ordinance may be reviewed in the Office of the Clerk of the Board of Supervisors of Yuba County.

Food and Farm News

CVP announces initial water allocations

A reduced snowpack leads to cautious water allocations for San Joaquin Valley farmers. The federal Central Valley Project said Tuesday it expects to provide agricultural water contractors south of the delta with 15% supplies. The CVP says the allocation would have been less had it not been for new operations plans signed last week. Farm water contractors north of the delta received a 50% allocation.

February weather affects pastures, orchards

Warm, dry February weather has ranchers providing supplemental feed to their animals, and farmers checking their orchards. Pastures

around the state have dried due to lack of rainfall, though a farm advisor says forage plants could recover if rains return in March. Fruit and nut trees need a certain amount of chilling to set a crop each year. So far, experts say, trees appear to have gotten enough chilly weather to go fully dormant.

Lower lemon prices result from increased supplies

Lemon prices have been lower than a year ago. Farmers say larger crops and overlapping harvests from other growing areas have put more fruit on the market. More farmers are harvesting a new, seedless variety they hope could boost lemon sales. Most demand for lemons comes from food ser-

vice buyers, because the most frequent use for the fruit is as a condiment. California farms produce about three-quarters of the lemons grown in the U.S.

USDA reports on crop-automation investments

With farmers reporting ongoing trouble in hiring enough people to harvest fruits and vegetables, the U.S. Agriculture Department says it has invested nearly \$300 million in research into automation and mechanization of specialty-crop production. In a report to Congress, USDA said it has funded more than 200 automation projects during the past decade. The agency says it has also worked to improve digital connectivity in rural areas.

Heart Disease Top Cause of Death Nationally, Yuba-Sutter

Heart disease is a top cause of death nationally as well as in the Yuba-Sutter region. With Yuba County's death rate above the state average—392.7 deaths per 100,000 people ages 35 and older, versus the statewide average of 324.3 per 100,000—heart health is key in maintaining quality of life. February is National Heart Month, and bi-county Health Officer Dr. Phuong Luu wants residents to ask themselves what they have done for their heart health lately. Heart disease can manifest as a heart attack, heart failure and/or abnormal heart rhythm. The main risk factors for heart disease include high blood pressure, high blood cholesterol

and smoking—with 47 percent of Americans having at least one of those three. Other risk factors include being overweight or obese, having diabetes, excessive alcohol use, physical inactivity and an unhealthy diet. Heart disease also comes with misconceptions: that it is a “man's disease” and only affects older adults. Heart disease is now the leading cause of death for women in the U.S.—in 2017, heart disease was responsible for about 1 in every 5 female deaths, according to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention. Women may also have differing symptoms of heart disease than men: a dull and heavy or sharp chest pain or

discomfort; neck, jaw or throat pain; pain in the upper abdomen or back; nausea, vomiting and fatigue. And heart disease is affecting younger adults more and more. Dr. Luu said there are ways to prevent heart disease. “First, strive for healthy habits including healthy foods and drinks, keep a healthy weight, get regular exercise, don't smoke, and quit smoking if you do,” Dr. Luu said. “Also, be in charge of your health by making sure that you know your blood pressure, cholesterol, and diabetes screening status by getting regular medical care.” For more information on heart disease, visit cdc.gov/heartdisease.

Being Charitable with the Neighbor's Money

The "rule" will favor granting citizenship to younger, self-sufficient, healthier, and English-speaking legal immigrants over those who have used at least one form of public welfare for more than 12 months within any 36-month period.

In the past, 56 percent of Hispanic citizens here said they supported favoring self-sufficient legal immigrants for green cards over welfare-dependent legal immigrants, as well as about 6-in-10 of all American voters and 62 percent of all swing voters.

Department of Homeland Security (DHS) Deputy Secretary Ken Cuccinelli said that the "Public Charge" rule is a continuation of "longstanding law" dating back to the 1800s. Most recently in 1996, a rule demanding legal immigrants be self-sufficient was codified into federal statute but has hardly ever been enforced.

Cuccinelli said, "This rule enforces longstanding law requiring aliens to be self-sufficient, reaffirming the American ideals of hard work, perseverance, and determination. It also offers clarity and expectations to aliens considering a life in the United States and will help protect our public benefits programs." "The rule's" restrictions

do not apply to foreigners arriving here as refugees, asylees, victims of human trafficking, domestic violence, and violent crime.

Big business and corporate lobbyists denounce "the rule" wanting instead to provide taxpayer handouts to new arrivals, legal or illegal, in order to create more consumers and attract cheap laborer.

"The rule's" enforcement will create a windfall for taxpayers in the form of an annual \$57.4 billion tax cut — the amount taxpayers spend every year for the welfare, crime, and schooling costs of the country's 1.2 million new, mostly low-skilled legal arrivals.

In 2017, the National Academies of Science found that immigrant households consume 33 percent more cash welfare than American citizen households. Center for Immigration Studies (CIS) explains that about 63 percent of noncitizen households in the U.S. use at least one form of public welfare, while only about 35 percent of native-born American households are on welfare. This means that noncitizen households use about twice as much welfare as native-born American households.

In California — with the largest noncitizen population in the country,

almost 11 million or nearly 30 percent of the state's total population — more than seven-in-ten, or 72 percent of noncitizen households are on at least one form of welfare. Only about seven-in-twenty or 35 percent of native-born households in California are on welfare.

Currently, there are an estimated 44.5 million foreign-born residents living in the U.S. This is nearly quadruple the immigrant population in 2000. The vast majority of those arriving in the country every year are low-skilled legal immigrants who compete against working and middle-class Americans for jobs.

When unlimited public benefits await those from other countries as a reward for arriving here, it is akin to winning the lottery upon landing. Those noncitizens convicted of crimes, after serving their time here, often fight their deportation, remaining in immigration detention centers like the Yuba County jail for years hoping to win their cases. They can voluntarily return to their nation of origin at US taxpayers expense at any time in their appeal process.

Hopefully, enforcing the "Public Charge" rule will be a step toward sanity in immigration regulations.

What's In A Name?

There's an ongoing discussion over the renaming of Fifth Street, Marysville. Local citizen and business owner John Nicoletti and others have proposed renaming the street after Dr Martin Luther King, Jr. They would like to honor King year-round, rather than just on a federal holiday. Naming a street for Dr King would also be a way to openly celebrate the area's diversity.

Not everyone agrees. An opposing camp asks, "What did Martin Luther King have to do with Marysville? He never came here, he never lived here." Some on this opposing side would like to remind everyone that Marysville is a Gold Rush town and that renaming Fifth Street with a Gold Rush name such as Gold Rush Boulevard or Gold Country Way would be a smart way to honor its history and also to attract needed tourism to the area.

Back in its colorful heyday, Marysville was the stopping point for the riverboats that brought prospectors to the digging grounds after gold was discovered in 1848. The population was almost 10,000 in the 1850s due to its strategic riparian location. According to Wikipedia, over 10 million dollars in gold was shipped to the US Mint from Marysville banks. Such was its prosperity that the city's founders imagined Marysville becoming the New York City of the West Coast.

But gold, and the greed for gold, ultimately led to Marysville's decline.

Debris loosed by hydraulic mining above the bustling town raised the riverbeds of the Feather and the Yuba and made the city vulnerable to serious flooding during winter storms and spring snowmelt. The same mining debris also choked off the Feather River and soon the riverboats could no longer reach Marysville. Other adverse environmental impacts include the ravaging of forests for timber and pollution of fertile soil by chemicals used in mining.

Gold mining also gave rise to a plethora of social ills such as price gouging, prostitution, alcoholism and opium dens. The Chinese population were driven underground and in 1886, all Marysville's Chinese residents were driven violently out of town.

But no population suffered more than the Native Americans. While local numbers are hard to come by, it is documented that in the first two years of the California Gold Rush, 100,000 Native Americans lost their lives due to disease, mining accidents or violent clashes with settlers. Those who survived were likely to be enslaved by settlers since in spite of California's anti-slavery laws, enslavement of Native Americans was common. A slave's wife could be raped and his

children forced to labor in the mines.

To put it bluntly, the gold era was not something to be proud of.

Rather than romanticizing the Gold Rush, should we not choose a more realistic name for Fifth Street, such as Devastation Drive, Syphilis Avenue, or Genocide Boulevard?

I propose we support John Nicoletti and his MLK idea. Streets named for Dr King are found in many cities of the US and in nearly every major metropolis. Thirteen cities have freeways named after him. But of the more than 955 MLK-themed streets, not one is in Yuba County nor in any of the neighboring counties such as Sutter, Placer or Colusa.

As Steve Miller wrote recently in an Appeal-Democrat editorial, Martin Luther King was an American hero whose voice made a difference for all races, religions and cultures. He affected all communities in all parts of the nation.

King was such an influential figure that touched all of our lives through advocacy of civil rights, compassion, fair treatment, dignity and the building of bridges between diverse cultures; you could say that in many ways he was the antithesis of what was wrong with the Gold Rush. And in that sense, he had everything to do with Marysville.

Yuba County Fixes Four Years of Road Work in One Year

Award-winning feat has the state asking: How did they do it?

Last year, cities and counties across California were left wondering how the Public Works Department in tiny Yuba County did it: accomplishing four years' worth of road repairs in a single summer, while managing to save \$4 million in taxpayer dollars in the process. This week, the innovative solution was recognized in a statewide award.

The project titled "Tomorrow's Paving Today" was named winner of the 2020 Outstanding Local Streets and Roads Project Awards Program in the Roads: Efficient and Sustainable Road Maintenance, Construction and Reconstruction Projects category. It will be highlighted at the County Engineers Association of California's Spring Conference/Public Works Officers Institute March 19 in Monterey.

"As you might imagine, we are extremely pleased the creative thinking and hard work that went into this unprecedented feat in Yuba County is being honored, and we think the approach may be embraced by other counties," Yuba County Public Works Director Mike Lee said.

The new awards program was developed to recognize and raise awareness of the exceptional achievements made by California's cities and counties to preserve and protect the public's investment in the local street and road

system, according to the California State Association of Counties and County Engineers Association of California call for nominations (<https://bit.ly/38WMohd>).

Yuba County had originally scheduled 15 miles of road repair using gas tax funds, but by working with the Yuba Water Agency to get advanced funding leveraged against future gas tax funds, the County was able to complete 70 miles of road repairs last summer—representing 15 percent of the County's entire network of paved roads.

This approach also resulted in around \$4 million worth of savings, accomplished by bundling all the roadwork into two large contracts at once instead of multiple smaller ones, avoiding escalating construction costs, and avoiding ongoing maintenance on yet-to-be-repaired roads.

In 2017, the state Legislature passed SB 1—a comprehensive transportation funding bill that established a reliable source of gas tax revenues for the foreseeable future that adjusts for inflation (since 1994, gas tax revenues were never adjusted for inflation). Even through the significant road repair funding that would be generated by SB 1, it would still take years to make meaningful progress in fixing roadways.

Yuba County leaders had a lightbulb moment

in hoping to advance SB 1 funds so the County could complete future road repair work in a single construction season, then pay back the advance over time using future apportionments of SB 1 revenues. Initially, using gas tax money to pay back loan advance was not allowed, so Yuba County worked with state lawmakers to champion Senate Bill 848 (2018), which changed state regulations to allow such a use.

After a complicated and lengthy process that required the use of special bond counsel and financial advisors, Yuba County received a lease-back through the Yuba Water Agency. The end result was an advance/loan of \$9 million at a favorable interest rate of 2.25 percent. Yuba County will use its general fund to pay off interest on the advanced funding, as benefits to residents exceed the cost of its improvements. "The Outstanding Local Streets and Roads Project Awards Program highlights cities and counties that are employing projects, programs, practices, and innovative technologies and materials to achieve safety, preservation, and sustainability goals for the statewide local street and road system," CEAC said in its awards call for nominations. "Their exceptional work is worth recognizing and replicating across the state!"

Brown Act to allow members of the public time at any regular meeting of the agency's governing body to comment on any matter that may fall under the jurisdiction of the agency.

Some jurisdictions refer to the time set aside for the exercising of these rights as the time for Citizen Comments, or Public Participation, or

Public Business, or Public Business From The Floor. In Sutter County, it is referred to as the time for Public Comment. However named, the time set aside is an important part of the democratic process, moments when individuals have an opportunity to influence the direction of a community by appealing directly to those elected to represent the community.

It is not, however, an easy thing to do. It is one thing to make a comment on Facebook or SnapChat from the safety of home, or to discuss things among friends. But it takes a great deal of courage to speak in public, especially in formal settings about matters important to a community, where the audience might contain reporters or video cameras, and where someone might disagree with your point of view and let you know.

For the fifth year, the Sutter County Board of Supervisors invites high school students in the County to participate in the Public Business From The Floor Speech Contest, designed to acquaint them with the exercise of petitioning their local government. Participants will be given three minutes to speak on the topic of their choice—as long as it is in the jurisdiction of the County Board of Supervisors—at a lectern, with a microphone, with the Su-

pervisors present, with the public and press invited, and the video camera rolling.

It may be the only speech contest of its type. County Supervisors and representatives of the Active 20-30 Club of Yuba City-Marysville will act as judges.

The contest is open

to any high school aged resident of Sutter County, regardless of which high school they attend. There is no cost to participate. Local schools are encouraged to help spread the word about the contest, but students may contact the County directly by email at speechcontest@co.sutter.ca.us to express

interest and ask questions.

Nevada Co BOS Designates Two Historical Landmarks

The Nevada County Historical Landmarks Commission announced the designation of two new landmarks: John Woolman School and Kentucky Flat School.

John Woolman School – The private Quaker boarding school which opened in 1963 is located on Woolman Lane in Nevada City. The sprawling 230 acre property was purchased in 1961 and housed the first Quaker boarding school in the western United States. The school is named after John Woolman, a staunch proponent of the abolition of slavery who urged other Quakers to free their slaves and boycott slave-made goods.

The high school boarding program at John Woolman School ended in 2001, and a semester program operated at the location from 2004-2016. Today, the campus hosts a range of programs such as Camp Woolman, the Sierra Streams Institute, The Outdoor School, Jorgensen School for Nonviolence, and various teen and family camps as well as retreats and private rentals.

Woolman students have made many contributions to our local community. Woolman has produced entrepreneurs and songwriters, and continues to support local artists with their original Oborigama Climbing Kiln that is one of the largest wood-fire kilns in the U.S.

Kentucky Flat School – Located on Newtown Road in Nevada City, the Kentucky Flat School building was originally located at the Kentucky Ridge and Kentucky Flat Mining Camp on Bridgeport Road. As the building became too small to house the area's children, it was moved to the current site in 1855 and deeded over to the Grass Valley school district in 1877. Used as a school until 1963, it boasts a bell tower and bell that were used to alert the local residents to fires, special events, and the opening of school days.

Since 1964 the building has housed and been maintained by the Kentucky Flat Community Center hosting many events and organizations valuable to the community including 4-H and Farm Bureau functions, Head Start, community meetings, and a daycare center.
