## Yuba and Sutter Vote State of Emergency for Covid-19

While there remain no confirmed cases of COVID-19 (novel coronavirus) in Yuba-Sutter at this time, Bi-County Health Officer Dr. Phuong Luu recommended both county Board of Supervisors declare a state of emergency – a step already taken by 15 other California counties that is necessary to gain access to resources that will help bolster ongoing efforts to respond to the public health threat. The Yuba County Board of Supervisors and Sutter County Board of Supervisors considered her recommendation at their respective meetings on Tuesday, March 10, 2020. Both boards voted to declare a state of emergency.

Dr. Luu and staff from Yuba and Sutter counties believe this is the right time to make the declaration to ensure an appropriate, timely and organized response in the event COVID-19 cases are identified in the bi-county region. Dr. Luu believes it is simply a matter of time before someone in the region tests positive for the virus, so increasing monitoring and responsive capabilities now will further enable public health teams to prevent as much community transmission as possible.

Staff from both Yuba and Sutter counties have been working closely together to monitor residents who believe they could have COVID-19, communicate plans with area hospitals and health clinics, ensure nurses and first responders have the tools necessary to keep themselves healthy and safe, and communicate important information to the public. A coronavirus preparedness group was established last month, and that group has been in com-

munication with each facet of the community – like schools, hospitals, Beale Air Force Base, and public safety entities – to ensure the area as a whole is equipped with the best knowledge and tools to minimize the impact of COVID-19.

Over the past several weeks of COVID-19 concerns, public health staff from both counties have been operating what is known as a Department Operations Center (DOC) at a low level. The DOC is now elevating to the next level and stepping up efforts to address the health threat. A bi-county Emergency Operations Center based in Yuba County has also opened. This means staff from both counties are working together around the clock to ensure that resources and staffing remain in healthy and reliable supply.

A Bi-County Call Center has been established to respond to inquiries from area residents regarding the COVID-19 threat. The Call Center number is 749-7700, and will be open 8 a.m. to 5:30 p.m. The Call Center is intended to field general questions, not provide medical advice. Please call your primary care physician for medical advice.

Yuba and Sutter counties have been planning for this possibility and staff are properly prepared to handle the work to come. Since there are NO confirmed cases in either county, the approach may look different from Sacramento, Placer, and other counties, where community transmission has been confirmed. Nonetheless, increasing the level of public health response is necessary in focusing vital resources on preventing

severe illnesses and deaths.

With no confirmed cases at this time, and per California Department of Public Health guidelines, en masse cancellation of schools is not recommended. Schools will continue with measures to prevent spread of COVID-19. The Counties continue to work closely with the Offices of Education in both counties and their respective school districts to plan and prepare our schools for COVID-19 (those CDPH guidelines can be read here).

Dr. Luu continues to recommend hand-washing and practicing good hygiene. Vulnerable populations – the elderly and those with chronic illnesses – are encouraged to stay home as much as possible and avoid large gatherings. Keeping yourself from getting sick in the first place remains key in this effort.

If you have experienced any symptoms of acute respiratory illness such as fever, chills, or cough and have recently traveled to a country with widespread community transmission (Iran, Italy, China, South Korea), or been in close contact with a patient who has had COVID-19, immediately contact your medical provider by phone – do not go into Urgent Care, the Emergency Room or the doctor's office. Instead, you should call your personal physician, who can assess whether your illness matches those of COVID-19 and if testing should be completed. If testing is indicated, the physician will then contact Dr. Luu, Bi-County Health Officer for consultation.

## Will Sara Matthews Easton Get Justice

There is no other unresolved case creating more suspicion and doubt about law enforcement and the judicial system of Yuba-Sutter Counties than the Sara Matthews Easton death. Did she shoot herself? Was it an accident? Is someone else a suspect? Or, did her husband, Aaron, the former Marysville Chief of Police kill her.

The judicial system requires confidentiality before cases are tried and the evidence can be presented in court. Law enforcement investigates but it takes a prosecutor to review the facts and go to trial.

In this case both Yuba and Sutter County District Attorney's offices had conflicts to prosecute. Brian and Amanda Hopper were involved with the Eastons. Amanda Hopper was the Sutter County DA and Hopper's father, Steve Jones, worked in the Yuba County DA's office.

Then Colusa County District Attorney John Poyner authorized needed search warrants for the investigation and said he would prosecute the crime if it occurred in his county.

Today, Yuba City Police Department still has the investigation while the prosecution was left with the state Attorney General's office. The five year mark is approaching this August 16th with no disclosure as to what happened to Sara. However, some information has surfaced.

In the early morning hours on Sunday, August 16, 2015 multiple shots were fired in the Yuba City home of Marysville Police Chief Aaron Easton. Aaron, Sara and their three children were in the home.

As emergency personnel arrived, though the back of Sara Easton's head was blown-off from a bullet wound(s) entering the front right side, she was transported from the bedroom to Adventist Emergency Department and pronounced dead.

Fishing!”

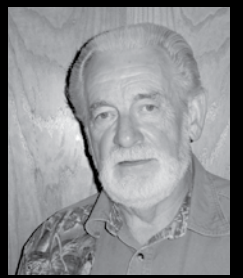

The storm has arrived and the reservoirs are receiving storage. The rivers will turn brown and the snow will fall in the mountains. All this means better fishing conditions for all of us, regardless of which species of fish you go after. It appears we will see a good fishing year after all.

The catfish are on the bite in the Sacramento River at this time. This time of year, especially with the rain making the water on the murky side, is an excellent time to add a delicious catfish fillet to your dinner plans. These fish can be caught on just about any type of bait and they have been known to after live bait as well. One of my favorite baits is chicken livers. It is best to offer enough to get their scent glands excited. I always tied mine onto the hook with thread. It certainly does not hurt to dip the bait in a strong mixture of whatever smells to add to the offering.

Rising waters also will improve the catfish success in the Sutter Bypass and all ditches and creeks which empty into them. In the old days

we used to throw smelly things in gunny sacks into waters accompanied by some weight to hold it down. After a week or so we would return to the same spot and usually had a couple of catfish ready to be taken. I believe this is now illegal so before you decide to “chum” I strongly recommend you check the regulations.

Striped Bass are currently in the system and are hungry and ready to bend your pole. These fish are amazing in regard to their strength and stamina. A twenty inch fish will appear to be a big one and many of us have screamed and

hollered bringing in the “Big One” only to find out it is only a couple inches over the size limit. Sometimes it can be downright embarrassing.

As we move into the beginning of the fishing season let us not forget to include the younger generation in our fishing plans. On this topic we recommend safety, patience and lots of help which will make the kids have a great day on the water.

Closing thought: “Opportunities to make things better surround us all the time..... if we would only open our eyes.”

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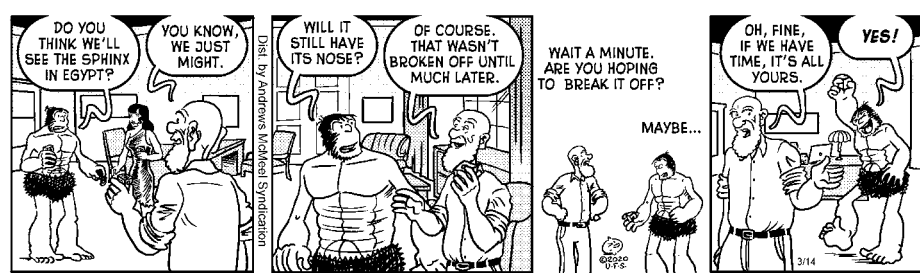

# Healthcare Services Comes to Nevada County

were made available to those in need. United Way of Nevada County raised funds and recruited volunteers. California Careforce brought their expertise and equipment.

Eight hundred and fifty patients were seen over the two-day period in which the free health clinic was held. Three hundred and ninety eight dental patients were served. Dental fillings, oral surgery, cleanings and x-rays all took place in the dental section of the clinic. Two hundred and sixteen patients were served in the vision section of the clinic. Comprehensive eye exams were given, while free eyeglasses were made on site or ordered at no charge. In the general medical section of the clinic, two hundred and thirty-six medical patients received exams. Acupuncture and chiropractic services were also offered.

The selfless medical professionals who volunteered for the clinic were able to treat over 400 people each day. Without their help, the clinic would not have been able to offer free medical, dental and vision care to those in need of services. The County of Nevada County Public Health department was also on hand to provide immunizations. Numerous service organizations, including the Donner Region Lions club, the Grass Valley Rotary club, Churches and other organizations donated and served breakfast and lunch to the hardworking volunteers. Chapa De Clinic was on hand to sign up patients for follow up care and offer post-clinic services.

The community of Nevada County benefited immensely from this collaborative event. With so many individuals without health insurance, particularly vision and dental coverage, this clinic was able to provide important services for community members. United Way of Nevada County and California CareForce are currently in discussions to bring this much-needed health clinic back to the community in 2022.

# Smartsville Church Restoration Continues

Probably the most impressive part of the interior of the historic, former Catholic church in Smartsville is the sanctuary. Its curved wall, called the apse, is striking and awe inspiring even though it once was damaged by water from a leaking roof.

A skeleton of wooden studs and cross braces create the roughly rounded concave shape. Covering this framework is a layer of thin wooden lath which, until recently, supported a coating of plaster. These details have been visible because much of the plaster was missing, revealing a large section of broken lath and damaged substructure.

Clearly a significant restoration program was needed and Kathleen Smith, vice president of SCRFI, the non-profit group in charge of the restoration, found the perfect person for the job. His name is Aurel Onut, an expert in Romanian church restoration. He is now working in the church and his progress can be seen at Pioneer Day on Saturday, April 25.

Pioneer Day is the annual festival where Smartsville's gold rush history is celebrated with fun, family style activities. There will be guided tours of the mining areas, good food and crafts by vendors and

music on stage. But best of all, the church will be open to the public where Onut's craftsmanship will be on display.

Onut's Sacramento business is known as Byzantine Painting Studio, where for the past 20 years he has repaired and redecorated church interiors in Sacramento as well as in Columbus and Atlanta, GA. Onut's career as an iconographer began years ago when he visited his local church in Burz, a small village in Transylvania, Romania. A crew was repairing frescoes and Onut asked if he could help. Recognition of Onut's talent led to an opportunity to work directly under the well-known artist Dimitri Baneca as an apprentice for 10 years, travelling all over Romania restoring church art.

Then, in 1998, Onut was invited to come to Northern California for a month-long visit. During that visit he showed up in Sacramento one Sunday morning for services at the Christian Orthodox Church, Saints Michael and Gabriel, a relatively new building whose parishioners had been praying for a church painter. It was regarded as a miracle.

Onut, who had a wife and two young sons in Romania is quoted as saying "I didn't want to stay, but they convinced

me." Finally, after a painfully long period of five years, during which he was afraid to go back to Romania for fear he would be prohibited from leaving again, he was able to bring his family to America.

Secure in his abilities and successes with Romanian churches in the United States as well as in Romania, Onut has a thriving business offering a wide variety of restoration and decoration services. His intimate knowledge of old-world materials and processes gives him the ideal background to restore a portion of the historic Smartsville church. He says, "maybe if you like my work there will be other restoration projects for me on your church." From what can be seen so far, it is a definite possibility.

Restoration of the Smartsville historic church's sanctuary is another big step toward SCRFI's goal of using this historic building for the benefit of the community as well as being a prominent reminder of California's gold rush and the history of Yuba and Nevada counties.

**New coronavirus may affect demand for farm products**

As public health officials grapple with the impacts of the new coronavirus, farmers and agricultural marketers assess the impact on their businesses. Analysts say slower economic growth, reductions in travel and trade slowdowns caused by reactions to the virus could contribute to declining demand for certain farm products. In addition, some agricultural trade missions and conferences have been canceled or postponed.

**California-grown cabbage fills St. Patrick's Day market**

Cabbage has been heading to market for St. Patrick's Day in plentiful

supply. California farmers say warm, dry weather during the growing season has caused cabbage to mature rapidly. Wholesale prices have been much lower than at the same time a year ago. Farmers along the Central Coast and in the desert have been harvesting cabbage prior to the holiday. California leads the nation in cabbage production.

**California grape crush declined in 2019**

Fewer grapes were crushed for wine in California last year. A report issued Tuesday says wineries crushed about 4.1 million tons of grapes in 2019, down nearly 9% from a year earlier. The average price earned by grape growers also declined, about two and a

half percent. Some grapes went unharvested last year because of an oversupply. Chardonnay and cabernet sauvignon remained the most popular winegrape varieties.

**Study says wild plants could help their domesticated cousins**

Wild relatives of crop plants could help crops grow successfully with less fertilizer, according to new research. A professor at the University of California, Riverside, says wild plants can interact more successfully with soil microbes than their domesticated relatives that were bred for high yields. The study indicates that breeding some of those traits back into domesticated crop plants could improve plant growth.

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## Markets and Black Swan events

With the market seemingly in free fall once again and for the second time in two years (the first one being fall of 2018) investors must be wringing their hands in frustration. Although the spring and summer of 2018 saw healthy market returns, the fall of 2018 may have wiped them clean. Enter spring 2019 and with a few minor hiccups, investors once again likely saw green in their portfolio balances. 2020 started normal enough. If you can all a Dow new high normal. But the markets are susceptible to what is called Black Swan events. Events that come out of the blue and are rare and unpredictable. An alien invasion would certainly qualify as a Black Swan event as would a Tsunami, 9/11 and a host of other imaginable events.

Enter the Corona virus, officially named Covid-19. Out of the blue and creeping stealthily unnoticed at the onset, it has exploded onto the world social and economic stage as a credible threat not only to life and limb but to the global economy as well. Not since the economic implosion of 2008/9 has the world witnessed an event that could have dire effects that span the globe.

Pandemics strike to the very core of human frailties and subsequently their fears. Few events can immobilize populations like the fear of catching a deadly contagion. Economically speaking, when people stop moving, so do the economies they support, which is to say every economy where the contagion exists or migrate to.

Unlike one off events

that end the same day they start, like a terror attack or natural calamity, a pandemic ends is unknown, and as such, so is its economic effects. It is said markets hate uncertainty. A pandemic certainly is the anthesis of uncertainty.

During the historic market fall Corona has caused, investors likely fall victim to what I call the “Headi Mind Trick”. Taking a spin from the Star Wars movies on “JEDI mind trick”, the Headi mind trick can also alter a previous thought, plan or mindset like the JEDI mind trick does.

Although investors think they can weather losses and market falls when all is well, the mind plays tricks on investors and advisors alike. Simply put, where resolve to stay the course in market falls once was, the imagination wonders to the “what ifs” that were thought to be reasoned out in one’s mind beforehand. Although temporary market set backs are well handled, continued market falls and or sudden and wicked plunges, such as the one just witnessed, opens up the minds imagination to dark places. Thought of losing it all, what if it doesn’t stop, how much have I lost and how much of my gains did I give back occupy the recesses of the brain where once calm and reasoning once resided. No matter how prepared we are, the mind can fall victim to the trick.

And one could argue rightly so. Where reasoning once dwelled, the fact of the matter is although markets historically always recover, who’s to say the next time won’t be different, won’t stop and actually wipe out a good portion or even all of one’s hard earned savings?

Although conventional wisdom would say otherwise, and I myself doubt anyone’s entire portfolio could go to zero, there is no guarantee it won’t happen. More likely than a complete collapse to zero which in my opinion has next to zero chance of happening, is a bad

enough wipe out to severely damage portfolio balances. The word “severely” being the key here. From years of handling investor fears and in talking with them over a wide variety of stock market gyrations, few investors could neither stomach nor recover from a 60-80% wipe out. The thought of losses of that magnitude is unthinkable but who is to say it can’t happen?

Since the ramifications of a financial setback of that degree would be devastating to say the least, to not have a plan for it could be said to be naïve. Although we hope for the best, we can prepare for the worst, and since the worst case would be a devastating and life altering set back, at least considering a plan of action would be prudent for all investors.

It could be a simple as setting a certain percentage as the line in the sand. If you lose this much, you are out, period, end of story.


Although few investors have such a plan, considering the ramifications of this “what if” scenario of a massive wipe out, perhaps at least discussing it should be considered. After all should a massive market crash occur, you can be certain the Headi Mind Trick will certainly materialize at some point.

Much like a medical directive, such a discussion may be difficult and have little chance of being enacted, but it is suggested we do it none the less.

Although the possibility may be remote, the ramifications are simply too dire to ignore.

**This Month In Your Garden**

**BALD MOUNTAIN NURSERY**

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March is usually a favorite month for gardeners – the cold weather is usually behind us and the hot weather is still several months off. The first day of spring officially happens on March 19th this year. Spring is a beautiful time of the year with beautiful weather for all kinds of pleasant activities, gardening being a favorite for many.

It’s time to get your vegetable gardens ready for planting. A good rule of thumb to use for when to plant vegetables, is when nighttime low temperatures are consistently 50 degrees or higher. We frequently have warm weather in February but the nights are still too cold for putting out vegetables. Select a spot with lots of sunlight for your vegetable garden, and some intermittent shade as the sun moves across the area is alright. The soil will probably need to be spaded or rototilled to loosen it. If the soil is heavy clay it will take several rounds of tilling and adding planting mix or compost to help break up the clay. Adding organic soil conditioners and fertilizers will build your soil rather than chemical products that tend to deplete the soil of needed nutrients. The decomposition of organic matter such as crushed leaves and grass clippings can be interspersed into heavy clay soil to help lighten it as well as create spaces to help with drainage which is a problem with very dense clay. Many of our customers in the foothills are very familiar with the clay soil, and maintain a compost pile - an effective way to always have soil additive ready when you need it. A compost pile is not especially attractive and might be offensive to some neighbors in town, but there are containers available that work well and will breakdown trimmings into compost. It is not a fast process, but it is still a good way to dispose of trimmings and weeds, and make good use of them.

Now is the time to try to keep weeds and brush under control – they both grow rapidly and can be an invasive problem. Control can be accomplished in several different ways such as pulling them by hand, tilling them, mowing and weed eating, or using herbicides. Pre-emergent is another effective way of weed control. It is probably too late now for the weeds that are already coming up but can stop any that have not yet sprouted. With pre-emergent, one must be careful not to apply it where you planted flower seeds for spring color – it is not fussy about what it works its magic on! Congratulations to anyone who had the foresight to use it early enough to be effective. A combination

of all those things seem to work for most people, depending on the areas to be done, the kind of weeds, etc. All methods require that some caution be used in order not to harm something else in the process.

With the weather warming, and plants eager to grow, it is also time to fertilize just about everything to give them all a good start. An all purpose fertilizer is fine for most plants, but try to use the proper fertilizer on those things that need it, such as citrus food and acid based fertilizer. I have a few words of caution, though. Should you have any plant that has buds that should open several weeks later than your date of fertilizing, skip those plants until they have finished blooming. Fertilizing while the buds are not mature might cause the plant to start putting on vigorous new growth that could push the unopened buds off. Just wait until it has finished blooming, and fertilize it then. It is natural for spring blooming plants to put out new growth following their bloom period. This caution refers to those plants that bloom only once a year in the spring. Sometimes, for instance, some rhododendrons are later blooming. Enjoy all of their beautiful blooms, and fertilize them after they have finished. Another cautionary state-

ment on rhodies – be sure to break off the flower trusses left following the petals falling, to reduce seed formation which will reduce next year’s bloom.

We are not the only ones happy to see spring Slugs, snails, earwigs aphids all welcome the warmer weather. Aphids multiply exponentially and ants farm them by moving them from one place to another because they like the sticky honeydew that they leave behind. Aphids can be controlled by hosing them off frequently, and there are insecticides that will control them for longer time. Controlling the ants helps to control the aphids.

This an excellent time to plant most anything - ground covers, lawns, annuals, etc. Perennials can also be dug and divided and possibly shared with other gardener friends. They can become well established more easily in the cooler spring temperatures and thus, withstand the heat of the summer. Enjoy the beauty of the spring season.

Is failure of the 2020 Prop. 13  
Sign of a New Tax Revolt?

The good Proposition 13 — the one from 1978, not the \$15 billion school bond currently on electoral life support — was the beginning of the modern tax revolt movement.

That movement spread across the United States and even into Europe in addition to spawning several additional initiatives here in California. But it's the bad Prop. 13 on last week's ballot that is currently generating a statewide buzz because it appears to be headed for failure. Could this be the beginning of Tax Revolt 2.0?

The 2020 version of Prop. 13 was a massive \$15 billion school facility bond measure, the largest such bond in state history. The Howard Jarvis Taxpayers Association led the opposition with a guerrilla-style campaign relying on a relatively modest \$250,000 statewide radio buy, social media and nearly a hundred interviews with television, radio and print media. This was in comparison to

the more than \$20 million spent by Gov. Gavin Newsom and his allies.

Because there are millions of absentee and provisional ballots yet to be counted, it is possible that Prop. 13's losing margin will shrink. But no matter the outcome, politicians have been put on notice that voters are growing increasingly weary of hundreds of bond and tax measures confronting them at the state and local level in every election cycle.

Here's what taxpayers can take away from the March primary election:

The first is what we'll call the "Proposition 13 blame game."

Casting about for a reason to explain why Prop. 13 is failing, the author of the bond measure, Assemblyman Patrick O'Donnell, D-Long Beach, is blaming voter confusion. That is why we look forward to supporting O'Donnell's proposal to take Prop. 13 out of the ballot number rotation.

At HJTA, we have seen Prop. 13 used as a scapegoat for more than four decades. But if the bond measure fails, the blame will belong to Gov. Newsom, both for failing to properly gauge the California electorate and

for cobbling together a strange mix of special interests to ride along on the bond's assumed passage.

The measure included language that waived local developer fees and increased local bond debt caps. Bond proponents reportedly begged him for a smaller bond that did not include funding for UC and CSU colleges, advice that was disregarded. Prop. 13 was constructed in a haphazard manner with late changes and additions, finally coming together just days before the legislative session ended. The governor became the face of the campaign. Voters were unimpressed.

Another trend to monitor is the widespread defeat of numerous local bond and parcel taxes.

According to data from the California Taxpayers Association, voters have rejected nearly half of the 236 local tax and bond measures on the March ballot and another 56 remain too close to call. This is a remarkable statistic considering the history of local revenue measures in California.

Whiteaker: Too Many Stoplights on Hwy. 99, A Roundabout Is Not the Solution

Fourth District Sutter County Supervisor Jim Whiteaker opposed the option of constructing a roundabout on Highway 99 at Oswald Road, although he does not believe any more stop lights should be placed on the highway south of Yuba City.

What is needed is a highway interchange, Supervisor Whiteaker said.

"We currently have nine traffic lights on Highway 99 heading south," he noted. "Way too many.

Every county to the south of us has overpasses. CalTrans and Sutter County need to work with the Sacramento Area Council of Governments (SACOG) to fund an overpass for future development."

Caltrans and Sutter County are currently considering options to improve traffic control on Highway 99 at Oswald Road. Options being considered range from a stop light to an interchange, and currently include a four-lane roundabout.

Supervisor Whiteaker said he is opposed to the roundabout option.

Roundabouts are designed for lower speed roadways, he said, and could increase the risk of accidents and fatalities during heavy rain and fog. He also said the roundabout could reduce response times for emergency vehicles, semi-truck trailers experience a higher rate of traffic accidents using roundabouts , and not all drivers know the proper procedure while using a roundabout, causing more confusion.

"Our residents who commute outside this County for work should have the best traveling conditions ," he said .

Colantuono's firm was hired by Yuba Co. officials to save the Measure K illegal sales tax increase. Not only do Yuba County residents feel their elected representatives and department heads have lied to them and mocked them but these same officials now hire rude liberal loud mouths with taxpayer dollars to polish the county's image.

There is more to Colantuono's quote. Originally it said, "There are none so blind as those who will not see. The most deluded people are those who choose to ignore what they already know." The saying has been traced back to John Heywood in 1546.

So, who is 'deluded?' Colantuono's law firm tortures the truth to say the county did not pitch the tax as a public safety measure with revenues funneled to a special fund, thereby needing a 2/3rds vote of the electorate to pass. The lawyers are magicians hired to deceive since there are numerous county documents and correspondence saying it was a 'public safety measure.'

Measure K public gatherings conducted throughout the county to groom voters were called 'public safety meetings.' Campaign signs touted fire and law enforcement

needs. Officials preyed upon the fears of residents that they may not receive timely fire and law enforcement assistance after voting no on the tax.

There were no other county officials on the speaking tour other than those representing public safety along with the district attorney and the county administrator.

This campaign was two-faced from the start. Exploit the fears of the people by talking public safety, guarantee the money to a special fund and then call it a general tax thereby needing only a 50% plus 1 vote to win.

The deceptive campaign and then the supervisors' appeal of Judge Stephen Berrier's ruling (invalidating the tax) that is now costing residents \$10,000 a day (to date more than \$4,040,000) soured voters in the recent election.

More than 70% (70.74%) of Yuba County voters rejected the Yuba College Measure C bond. The State Proposition 13 school bond was turned down by 73.10%. Wheatland's High School Measure L was rejected with 57.48 voting no.

Supervisor Doug Lofton, longtime resident and former Linda Water District manager lost to a political novice that spent less than \$300 on his campaign (Seth Fuhrer 1186 - 53.21%

vs. Doug Lofton 1043 - 46.79%). Lofton should ask for a refund from his campaign manager who did not take Fuhrer seriously and misread voter sentiment.

Supervisor Mike Leahy (773 votes -31.62%) may end up third in a three-way race when final totals are posted and miss the run-off against leader Don Blaser (894 votes -36.56%). Stephen Heter received 778 votes or 31.82%. Did any of these three actually campaign? None seemed concerned about winning, but Measure K hurt incumbent Leahy.

Yuba Water Agency (YWA) Director Charlie Mathews remained in office by defeating John Nicoletti (53.87% to 46.13%). Mathews' conservative message "Your Water Your Money," his business and practical approach to YWA management and his joining the lawsuit to invalidate Measure K helped him.

Joe Henderson fell short against Measure K's voice Gary Bradford (46.91% to 53.09%) due to Henderson's distracted and distant campaign consultant.

However the Measure K appeal case is decided, the Measure's ongoing controversy influenced the outcome of a number of contests. It has also tainted the confidence of citizens in Yuba County government.

## Will Sara Matthews Easton Get Justice

Aaron Easton arrived at the hospital neatly dressed without a spot of blood on him. Chief Easton made two calls prior to calling 911. He contacted Brian and Amanda Hopper and Jason Garringer.

Brian Hopper previously worked with Easton at Yuba County Sheriff's Department and Garringer currently worked with Easton at Marysville Police Department. The Hoppers refused to come to the scene while Garringer was one of the first to arrive.

Amanda Hopper had been a long-time friend of Sara Easton until Sara believed Amanda was having an affair with Aaron. Sara was so distraught that she went to the leaders of her LDS (Latter Day Saints) congregation in Yuba City for help.

There were disciplinary procedures for a parishioner violating proper church conduct. Nothing was required of Hopper. Sara felt helpless, abandoned by the leadership and stopped

attending services. She was done with church and Amanda Hopper.

Sara was married to a serial adulterer and believed that her life was in danger from his increasingly aggressive sado-masochistic sexual behavior. She did not trust her husband away from home and was increasingly fearful about his sexual exploitation of her. She confided in others about Aaron's dangerous demands, both choking her and taping a bag over her head.

Many law enforcement leaders speaking off-the-record believe Aaron killed Sara. Yuba City police investigators say Aaron shot his wife. Some believe Aaron's behavior following Sara's death was a classic demonstration of a guilty person seeking to embellish his reputation in order to prepare a defense if accused and arrested.

After Sara's death Aaron was on a mission. He continuously posted photos of Sara and himself on Facebook and

arranged a photography exhibit about Sara at the Arts Council in Marysville. Meanwhile, he was already dating another lady.

He leveraged giving a \$400 car to a single mother into a publicity stunt and appeared on television. He solicited and received policing awards.

Why is no agency prosecuting this crime? Who is standing in the way? Some law enforcement people with first-hand knowledge that believe Easton is getting away with murder are afraid to talk. If no prosecution occurs they will die with the details of Sara's death on their conscience.

Few would argue against the code of confidentiality in police work and the judicial process. However, what happens when the system fails victims, their loved ones and the citizens that remain? People then consider their government corrupt and take care of matters on their own.

## Daycare Owner-Child Molestation Suspect Enters No Contest Plea

In August of 2018, a report was filed with the Marysville Police Department which al-

leged 46-year old Luis Herrejon, a coowner and operator of Leonor Family Child Care in the City of Marysville had sexually molested a juvenile whom attended the daycare. Marysville Police Department Detectives conducted an investigation into the allegation. The investigation was conducted by the Marysville Police Department in partnership with the Yuba County District Attorney's Office, Yuba County Probation Victim Services, the California Department of Justice-Bureau of Forensic Services, and the California Department of Social Services-Community Care Licensing Division. During the course of the investigation, additional victims were identified. Herrejon was arrest-

ed on Wednesday April 17th, 2019 on the 2100 block of Huston Street in Marysville for multiple child molestation related felony criminal offenses and he was booked into the Yuba County Jail.

On the morning of Friday, March 13th 2020, Herrejon entered pleas of "No Contest" in reference to violations of two counts of 288(a) of the California Penal Code and one count of 288.7(b) of the California Penal Code in the Yuba County Superior Court. As part of his plea agreement, Herrejon has accepted a sentence of 21 Years – Life in the California State Prison. Herrejon's plea was accepted by the court and his sentencing hearing has been scheduled for Friday, May 1ST, 2020.
