February 4, 5, and 6th at the Colusa County Fairgrounds in Colusa will be abuzz with activity. In the past attendees have come from all over the United States and many from around the world.

The Colusa Farm Show claims to be the oldest in California. While the Turlock Show is larger, it takes all three days to visit all the wide variety of vendors. Many locals may not get to the show because of some illusory reasons but they are making a big mistake. Modern machinery, GPS farming, pesticides, gopher control, home saw mills, irrigation, pruning, waste management and other various exposures are there. The Show is fascinating and is a great learning experience that can be a fabulous and stimulating exposure.

I will be there with two vintage tractors. Stop by and say hello.

One tractor is my favorite and it has been in a number of local parades and shows. It is a 1946 John Deere Model A that was delivered to the Colusa agency on December 6th 1946. I found the A in a logging operation near McCloud California. It was fairly beat up and had a front loader on which was used for lifting and moving logs. The engine was rebuilt and a lot of sheet metal work was performed. I have since added an air horn and an ooga unit. The chrome straight pipe makes a sound that for those who know what a John Deere sounds like will come running. The term nothing runs like a Deere is so very true. Once you have heard popping away at a slow rpm, you will



never forget it!

A few years back a gentleman introduced himself and invited me to his farm. Near Meridian to see his A. I never miss an opportunity to open a barn door. When I first saw the old Deere, I was astonished at what I saw. It was the nicest original I have ever had the pleasure to observe. It is always a tough decision to make to restore such a machine as they are only original once. However, Alan Jasche decided to go through the tractor and apply a fresh coat of paint. He also has provided some extra touches including a wide seat so his lovely local girl (wife Cheryl) of many years can join him on the parades and drives. The Model A was sold by the Colusa store, driven to the farm near Meridian, and never left the farm until it was restored. He and his helpers did a great job! It brought a smile to my face to see Alan and his Cheryl on the A enjoying the Vets Day Parade.

The Colusa Farm Show has been a great learning experience for me. A couple of things I did not know. As a retired principal I

am always interested in learning activities for young people. Valley Truck and Tractor started in 1948 and is now one of the larger dealers for John Deere in the west. Their new office complex includes a modern hi-tech classroom. They have monitors measuring many aspects of machines in the field. Many times they know what is wrong before the tech gets to the field. The company provides a two year program for technicians. At the end of the program, graduates earn an equivalent of an AA degree and a guarantee of a job!

I probably cannot tell you how many times I have driven by OMC and never paid much attention. I can only assume that there are many who do not realize that this company has a worldwide reputation. The design and quality of their machines are sought after from such faraway places as Australia, Argentina, and several European sites. One of their programmers for the hi tech machines is performed by a young man who went to Wheatland High School not too many years ago.

The Colusa Farm Show is fun and interesting. The vendors are diverse and cutting edge. The food provided by local clubs is good and fairly priced. If you want to know what a "Johnny Popper" sounded like to your Grandpa years ago working in the field of the Sutter Basin come and listen. Lawmakers Introduce Legislation to Combat Power Shutoffs

Sacramento. Ca.

Assemblyman James Gallagher (R-Yuba City) and Senator Jim Nielsen (R-Tehama), who represent the area devastated by last year's Camp Fire, introduced legislation that will help prevent future wildfires and utility power shutoff events. AB 1941 and AB 1942 would direct additional funding into utility infrastructure upgrades and forest fuel reduction projects – two of the primary factors of catastrophic wildfires and power shutoff events.

"PG&E needs to get back

to the basics of providing safe and reliable power," said Gallagher. "There is no doubt that PG&E's mismanagement is the primary culprit in these devastating fires and PSPS events. But policies coming out of the State Capitol that distract from these primary objectives only make matters worse."

Senator Nielsen said, "Power shutoffs are unacceptable. Too many lives were interrupted; many people went without pay. PG&E executives need to be held accountable."

PG&E is currently spending roughly \$2.4 billion annually

to uphold a legislative mandate to buy renewable power. At the same time, the company spent only \$1.5 billion to update its century old infrastructure in 2017. A century-old transmission tower was cited as the ignition source of the Camp Fire, and a utility tower reportedly may also be the source of the Kincadee Fire.

AB 1941 will temporarily pause the state's renewable power mandates until infrastructure and vegetation management conditions are

Yuba Supervisors Dupe Voters

Did Yuba County Supervisors declare that no tax dollars were used to promote Measure K to increase sale taxes by 1%? That's what citizens are claiming was said at a Yuba Supervisor candidates' forum recently.

Supervisors Gary Bradford, Doug Lofton and Mike Leahy were adamant that no public funds were used for the political campaign. If the supervisors were right then who paid hundreds of thousands to hire public relations agencies (\$7,000 each month), print and send mailers, produce signs and buy media ads?

The county was spending money to groom voters long before a Measure K Campaign Committee was even formed with the Elections Clerk of the County. Monies contributed by businesses and unions to the Committee were a pittance compared to the overall campaign budget.

A Freedom of Information Action (FOIA) disclosure early in the campaign revealed that the supervisors' assurance is completely false. And, the state constitution prohibits the use of tax dollars to solicit more revenue in an election from citizens. It is a violation of people's civil rights to use their own funds to persuade them to pay even more.

The county has never disclosed how much they have spent in total to illegally promote Measure K and it took months to obtain information via the FOIA request referenced above. A Fair Political Practices Commission (FPPC) staff report said that from 2015 through 2018, when local tax measures began wildly increasing statewide, the agency received 34 complaints about taxpayer funds being used for campaigns to raise taxes.

The FPPC says it has no enforcement power but District Attorneys (DA) do. It says DAs should file an action against civil rights violations but former Yuba Co. DA Pat McGrath compromised his role as an independent and unbiased prosecutor by campaigning for and endorsing the legally flawed Measure K.

Last week, a You Tube video was posted of an interview with Supervisor Michael Leahy. Leahy said that he voted along with other Supervisors to put Measure K on the ballot thinking it would be a general fund request. However, Le-

The Vagina Monologues Returns to the Burrows Theater A Special “VDay” Fundraiser for Casa de Esperanza

Marysville, Ca.
The Vagina Monologues is an episodic play written by Eve Ensler which was developed and premiered in New York in the mid-90s. Seen previously in Yuba-Sutter back in 2007, the play is a series of monologues performed by women. All of them address how women view their vaginas - some humorous and some serious. The new production will be under the direction of Janet Frye who directed the 2007 production.
An outgrowth of the play is the creation of the V-Day organization, a global movement to end violence against all women and girls. In the week's just before and immediately following Valentine's Day, royalty free productions of The Vagina Monologues are allowed as fundraisers to support work to end violence against women and to provide support for women's shelters and rape crisis centers. The performance partner agency and beneficiary will be Casa de Esperanza, the women's

shelter in Yuba City. Casa de Esperanza offers 24-hour crisis line and intervention and 24-hour intake for survivors of partner abuse, sexual assault and their children.
The Vagina Monologues explores consensual and nonconsensual sexual experiences, body image, genital mutilation, direct and indirect encounters with reproduction, vaginal care, menstrual periods, sex work, and several other topics through the eyes of women with various ages, races, sexualities, and other differences. Controversial from its earliest performances, the play has also been called, “the most important piece of political theater of the last decade,” and “an hour of theater [with worldwide impact].” Considering the social impact of the “Me Too” movement and ongoing abuse and gender equality issues, it seemed like the right time to create a revival and revisit these important topics.
The cast includes Carmen Smith, Janet Frye, Gail Carter, Kelly Barber

Cunningham, Ruby Cunningham, Lisa Kirchner and other distinguished local performers. Janet is directing and Lisa is producer and also a Casa de Esperanza board member.
All performances will be at the Burrows Theater at Yuba Sutter Arts, 630 E Street in Marysville. Show times are February 7 and 8 at 7pm and February 9 at 2pm. General admission is \$20.

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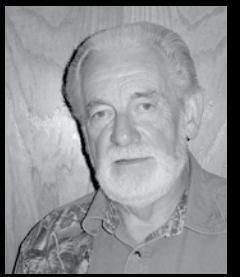

Sturgeon fishing at the Delta got off with a couple derbies planned and apparently plenty of sturgeon reports coming into marinas. Those anglers who go after the big fish should keep an eye out for derby dates and more information.

Bullard's Bar is still producing lots of kokanee salmon but the fish are running small at this time with fish up to eleven inches. This is no big deal but not too bad for January.

The King salmon at Lake Oroville are on the bite with fish up to four pounds in the mix. Bass are also available but are hard to catch at this time.
We have heard there are some big striped bass being taken on the Sacramento River at this time. We could not get any location but learned the fish are near the City of Sacramento and are being caught on sardines from shore.

Ice fishing at Lake Davis is back in swing with good success. Fishing at this reservoir has continued to get better as time

goes by. The best bet is to fish with night crawlers or dough bait. We are told the best place is the lightening tree area. The annual Davis Lake trout derby is scheduled for February 1, 2020 with entry fees at \$20.00.

Sturgeon fishing always brings up the striped bass. All the bait soaking that takes place manages to drift down river and smell gets the stripers hungry as they go upstream looking for food.

Collins Lake, a popular spot for local anglers has slowed down con-

siderably last week due to the cold weather and rain. Expect this reservoir to explode with action when spring approaches, which believe it or not is really not that far away

Folks who have been fishing the Sacramento River for Striped Bass are talking around town about an early run this year in February. We shall see about this one as time goes by.

Closing Thought: *“Old fishing line could cost you a trophy fish so get with it and replace it”*

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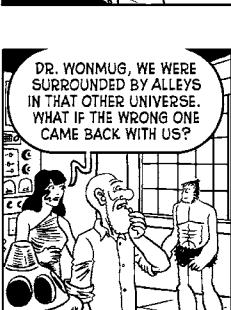
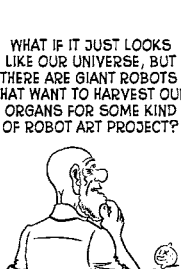
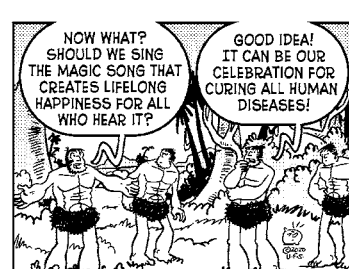
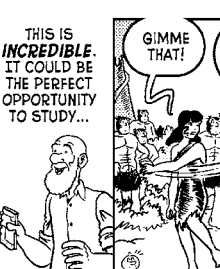

Leahy said, "When it (the campaign) went out it wasn't done the way I would have done it, but we (the supervisors) went along with it (the campaign)." The campaign was coordinated by County Administrator Robert Bendorf.

Leahy explained that he thought the campaign would make clear to the public that the monies would be dispersed proportionally for various departments and needs as a general fund tax going into the county coffers. It was pitched as a Public Safety measure instead to win over the voters.

For these reasons Leahy was the only supervisor voting against appealing Superior Court Judge Steven Berrier's ruling that Measure K violated Proposition 218's requirement that a "special tax" needs more than a 2/3s approval of voters to be victorious. Measure K passed with only 53%. Berrier agreed that Measure K was promoted as a Public Safety tax rather

than a General Fund tax.

The additional 1% tax continues taking about \$10,000 each month during the appeal from citizens, amounting to more than \$3.6 million so far that people would have had in their bank accounts if the county accepted Berrier's ruling. And, additional monies are coming from the people's tax dollars to pay a Nevada County law firm to counter Berrier's decision.

Leahy added, "Right now I believe it (Measure K) is dead." Leahy said there were other ways to fund govern-

ment rather than increase taxes and the Supervisors have proven that.

The County's Measure K appeal will likely not be heard until mid-2020 allowing the county to continue making \$10,000 a month off their deceptive ploy. From the very beginning Yuba County people have been hustled and scammed by a measure that now even if the citizens prevail in court all the money illegally taken by the county it keeps.

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The Olivehurst Public Utility District on June 20, 2019, August 15, 2019, and January 16, 2020 considered approval of an Ordinance Amending Existing Ordinance No. 209 adopted February 19, 2009 regulating the use of public sewers known as the Olivehurst Public Utility District Sewer Use Ordinance. Ordinance 209 and the rules and regulations contained therein govern sewer construction and disposal of sewage and drainage of buildings and connection to the sewerage works of the District. Ordinance 209 is intended to assure efficient operation and protection of public sewerage facilities, to protect the public health and safety, to provide for enforcement and penalties for violations, and to define responsibility for sanitary sewer maintenance. Ordinance 209 requires that all persons constructing, repairing or altering a side sewer or making a connection, directly or indirectly, with, or discharging wastewater to, any Public Sewer, or any other District owned Sewer, must provide to the District plans and specifications of the proposed construction work, obtain a Permit from the District and pay all District fees and connection charges as required, perform such construction in accordance with the applicable requirements of the “Standards and Specifications of the Olivehurst Public Utility District” for sanitary sewers, undergo an inspection by a District Inspector to ensure compliance with all requirements of the District, and provide to the District as-built plans of the completed work. Ordinance 209 also outlines various enforcement provisions. Amended Ordinance 209 clarifies the District’s ability to self-perform corrective work on various portions of its sewer system that have either not yet been dedicated or on which work has commenced but not been completed. With a rise in Inflow and Infiltration mostly in the newer areas of the District’s sewer system, Amended Ordinance 209 clarifies and confirms the ability of the District to take corrective action and seek reimbursement from the responsible Developer or Owner. Amended Ordinance 209 clarifies obligations of permit holders and ensures they are on notice from the outset of their commencement of work of their obligation to either complete their work through the dedication to the District or reimburse District staff for their work to do so. Amended Ordinance 209 passed unanimously on January 16, 2020, with a vote of 5-0 in favor of by Directors White, Carpenter, Burbank, Floe, and Griego.

and reasonable. Sure
there are some that just

burn, but for the most
part America is filled with
compassionate people.
So let's continue with to-
days rant.

What bugs me is when
people use the term "free
(fill in) _____".

The most common
thing that comes to my
mind is free healthcare
for all. "Single payer" is
a better description in
today's political environ-
ment but even that name
is an incorrect moniker.
Single payer may mean
the government but the
government gets its
money from all of us. A

payer funded".

Flashback a decade
and half ago and we were

Economy. That's tril-

costs from the influx of
that eye-popping amount
into the healthcare sec-
tor. Remember "where
government money
goes, so goes inflation".

improved. The legislation will require that savings from this temporary relief may only be used by Investor Owned Utilities (IOUs) to harden the grid and update decaying infrastructure. Also dur-

ing this time, and any proposed bonuses and salary increases for executives would be prohibited.

AB 1942 will appropriate \$330 million from the Greenhouse Gas Reduction Fund

for forest and fire prevention programs and projects that reduce greenhouse gas emissions caused by uncontrolled wildfires. Scott Stephens, a professor of fire science at the University of California, Berkeley estimates that 20% to 25% of the wildfire damage resulted from climate change, and "75% is the way we manage lands and develop our landscape."

The independent Legislative Analyst's Office (LAO) determined that forestry management is one of the most cost effective ways to reduce carbon emissions. In addition to the LAO, the San Francisco Chronicle recently opined this would be a better use of cap and trade funds.

California IOUs have already met their goals of reaching 33% renewable solar and wind energy and PG&E is already producing 85% of its power from renewable and carbon-free sources. The lawmakers noted that every dollar spent on the additional cost of renewable energy is one dollar that is not available to be spent on vegetation management, line insulation, undergrounding, and

The North State lawmakers noted that California is moving backward on its carbon reduction due to recent wildfires. Last year's fires generated 45 million metric tons of carbon - more than nine times California's combined reductions achieved in 2016 and 2017.

"California must get smarter about its climate goals. Century-old infrastructure, tinderbox forests and PSPS events are unacceptable. Renewable energy mandates that take away from addressing these issues while fires continue to burn are intolerable. With our plan, we can do better on carbon reduction and combating catastrophic fire," Gallagher concluded.

are aborted in spite of thousands of families waiting to adopt babies. CA performed 15.4% of all America’s abortions in 2017.

Drinking Water Improvements Coming to Wheatland

A more efficient water system that will improve the city of Wheatland’s drinking water supply is in the works with the help of a grant from Yuba Water Agency.

The \$700,000 grant, approved today by the agency board, provides funds for the city to replace its aging water distribution system equipment, including all of the water meters, water meter reading technology and associated software.

The current distribution system includes multiple brands of outdated and inefficient meters, and doesn’t allow the city to identify water losses or alert its customers in a timely manner when their water use is high, which can lead to significant waste and unnecessarily high water bills.

“This funding will directly benefit not just the city of Wheatland, but the approximately 3,700 people who live there, as well,” said Gary Bradford, Yuba Water Agency director and county supervisor for the district that includes Wheatland “Giving everyone the ability to better monitor their water usage and catch a leak before it’s a crisis will spare many families from the financial burden that comes with a water leak.”

Leveraging potential funding from the state, Yuba Water Agency’s grant will save Wheatland’s customers approximately \$1,273 per connection, which would otherwise be absorbed through rate increases.

Additionally, the antiquated equipment requires extra work, reducing efficiency for an already strained workforce. Wheatland staff reports that a recent, routine meter reading required them to open more than 350 of the 1,100 connections to ensure they were accurate and measuring appropriate customer water usage.

The new improvements will include remote-read meters for customers and updated software that will identify leaks automatically, allowing for improved water conservation and efficiency through constant monitoring, while also alleviating the need for employees to check the meters each month, saving staff time.

Yuba Water Agency has worked with Wheatland to develop this project, known as the Wheatland Comprehensive Drinking Water Project. The \$700,000 is the local match to leverage state grant funding through the California Department of Water Resources’ Integrated Regional Water Management grant program, which provides funding for multi-benefit regional water projects. To qualify for state funding, the grant application requires a 50 percent local match.

“We’ve been working on this grant for years,” said Wheatland City Manager Jim Goodwin. “This funding from Yuba Water Agency allows us to move forward with the water metering component of the project, which is crucial because we essentially have a failing system and need to make those improvements as quickly as we can for the benefit of our residents.”

Other aspects of the total project, estimated at \$1.4 million, include enhancements to the city’s current water storage.

Yuba Water Agency’s grant allows the deficiencies in the water meter reading system to be addressed right away, while strengthening the competitiveness for the remainder of the project to receive further funding from DWR.

Yuba Water is able to grant these funds to Wheatland because this project will help conserve water, and ensuring a sustainable water supply is a primary agency mission.

Grants for first-responders

Two local fire departments will be better equipped to respond to water-related emergencies along the Yuba River with the help of funding from Yuba Water Agency.

Marysville Fire Department - \$100,000

This \$100,000 grant will provide half of the funding needed to help the department purchase a small, “quick-attack” vehicle that is capable of accessing river bottom off-road terrain and roadways to patrol levees and support water-rescue efforts. Currently, existing vehicles, such as a traditional fire engine, cannot access this area.

“Right now, we don’t have a four-wheel-drive vehicle capable of doing anything near the river-bottom areas, so this vehicle will really provide us the opportunity to do a better, more efficient job,” said Marysville Fire Department Chief Ron Karlen. “We also anticipate staffing this truck 24-7, so it’s not going to be a resource that just sits. It will get a lot of use.”

The department is responsible for responding to emergencies along the waterways bordering Marysville, but oftentimes, has to wait for boat or aircraft assistance when dealing with incidents in certain areas because they are inaccessible to its current vehicles.

The new rig will be a four door, four-wheel-drive truck that can seat four personnel while traveling through rugged terrain, and will be equipped with various response equipment including:

- Tank, pump and hose for fire suppression
- Swift-water rescue equipment
- Light-weight extrication equipment
- High-powered lighting with infrared capability
- Small agriculture pump for evacuating water from flooded areas
- Tools for vegetation management

“This is a great example of Yuba Water helping the local community in a really tangible way, while leveraging other funding to make our dollars go even further,” said Mike Leahy, Yuba Water Agency director and county supervisor for the district that includes the city of Marysville.

Loma Rica/Browns Valley Community Services District - \$10,000

This grant will fund swift-water rescue equipment for the Loma Rica/Browns Valley Community Services District as part of Yuba Water Agency’s Bill Shaw Rescue Equipment and Training Grant Program.

The new gear, which includes dry suits and on- and off-shore rescue equipment, will be used by the district’s first-responders when conducting emergency rescues along the Yuba River and at New Bullards Bar Reservoir as part of its mutual aid commitments. The current equipment is outdated and in need of replacement.

The Bill Shaw Rescue Equipment and Training Grant Program, which was created in 2018, is designed for first-responder agencies in Yuba County and will cover the one-time costs of up to \$10,000 per applicant annually, associated with the purchase of rescue equipment and specialized personnel training. Since its inception, the program has supported 15 agencies with \$188,500 in grants.

Yuba Water Agency is able to help fund these two public safety grants because the funds will be used to provide emergency services for people recreating along the Yuba River and during high-water events.

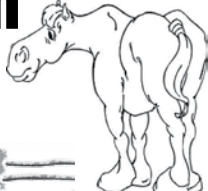
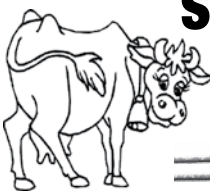

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Yuba Water Agency Adopts Groundwater Sustainability Plan

Marysville, Ca. Yuba County's groundwater subbasins have been sustainably managed for decades, and with 80 percent of Yuba's residents relying on groundwater as their sole source, it's critical that it remain sustainable for the long-term. With that in mind, Yuba Water Agency adopted an official groundwater sustainability plan, known as the Yuba Subbasins Water Management Plan.

The plan, developed in coordination with Cordua Irrigation District, the city of Marysville and many interested stakeholders, will guide the continued management and use of groundwater in Yuba County.

"The current sustainable conditions in this area are a testament to the success of locally-driven water management," said Yuba Water Agency Water

Resources Manager Scott Matyac. "This plan will ensure we remain sustainable into the future."

Historically, the south Yuba subbasin was over drafted until the early 1980s when Yuba River water was brought in to irrigate the farm lands. The basin is now fully recovered due to the combined efforts of Yuba Water and the South Yuba, Brophy, Dry Creek and Wheatland irrigation districts.

The 2014 Sustainable Groundwater Management Act established a statewide framework for the sustainable management of groundwater for the first time in California's history, and required the formation of groundwater sustainability agencies to prepare and submit plans that include measurable objectives and milestones to achieve sustainability.

Yuba Water, Cordua and

Marysville are the local groundwater sustainability agencies that worked together on the Yuba plan, which received a significant financial boost from the state, covering nearly \$900,000 of the \$1.2 million project cost. This is one of the first complete groundwater sustainability plans in California.

Because of the successful stakeholder collaboration and the current sustainability of the local groundwater supply, the plan is complete two years ahead of the deadline set by the state. This early submittal helps to ensure access to technical support and state grants to help with implementing the plan and making improvements to our groundwater management system.

"I am very happy that we've had such a collaborative effort in developing the plan," said Keith Davis, Cordua's chairman of the board. "The committee provided the opportunity for those involved to say what they needed, and because of that, this plan represents a very fine program to push forward with."

Because of the diverse nature of groundwater users, outreach was a critical component in the development of the plan. To achieve the greatest input from stakeholders, the Groundwater Sustainability Committee was formed. The committee involves 17 local districts and regional stakeholders, and is responsible for making recommendations regarding the development and implementation of the plan. The committee recently recommended adopting the plan.

Prior to full implementation, both Cordua and Marysville must adopt the plan, which they anticipate will be in the coming weeks. The plan will then be sent to the California Department of Water Resources for final review.

"The Groundwater Sustainability Plan will be presented to our council on February 4th and I am confident they will adopt it," said Marysville City Councilman Bill Simmons. "Working with the water agency and Cordua on this plan has been a positive experience and I look forward to continuing to work with them in the future."
