The Ninth Annual Nevada City Chinese Lunar New Year Festival and Parade welcomes the Year of the Rat, 4718, on Sunday, February 9, 2020, on Commercial Street and at the Miners Foundry Cultural Center from 12:00- 5:00 p.m. Chinese New Year festivals are unique in rural communities, and Community Asian Theatre of the Sierra, along with the Miners Foundry, are proud to present this family-friendly celebration, honoring the early Chinese Gold Rush pioneers and railroad workers of the Sierra. The mini-community parade begins on Commercial Street at 12:00 noon, near the giant Pelton wheel, at the intersections of Commercial,

Coyote, and Union streets, and ends at the Miners Foundry, for an afternoon of entertainment, food, and fun! Admission at the Foundry is free, and donations are gladly accepted.

America has been uniquely known as a cultural 'melting pot' where millions came to embrace the ideals of equal opportunity, freedom and liberty guaranteed by the Constitution. New ar-

Darwin's Favoured People

This month we acknowledge the birth of scientist Charles Darwin. Born February 12, 1809 (died April 19, 1882) Darwin proposed the theory that all creatures evolved from something else rather than being created by God as explained in the Book of Genesis.

Darwin's theory is called transmutation or the changing or transformation of one species into another species. This is not referring to changing from a finch of one color to another color, but rather a finch to a cat.

In other words, while in Biology at Marysville High School (California) and then at Cal State University Sacramento - Anthropology 1, it was taught that humans evolved or transmuted from primates or apes. This was not offered as a hypothesis along with other beliefs like Biblical Creation.

Therefore, it came across as fact though Darwin never purposed it as such. Students were taught what to think rather than provided information and how to process it.

In fact, Darwin said if a fossil link could not eventually be discovered connecting one species to another then his theory was false and should be given a decent burial. Instead, though no link has ever been found Darwin's transmutation is pounded into the fertile thinking of youngsters in every government school in the nation.

The teaching is so rigid that biology teachers have been fired for even offering the current understanding of many in the scientific community that there is evidence of 'Intelligent Design' (ID) in the earth and the universe. And no ID proponent ever dares mention the G-word as the Designer.

To understand the hardcore stance of government school evolution doctrine, it must be remembered that the entire system is based on a socialist and humanist construct that has declared the school room a God-free zone. In fact, students that are God-followers are often mocked, derided and cautioned by teachers about bringing Him up at school when students ask for evidence of evolution. This violates their Constitutional rights.

Since Darwin's death, there have been a number of science frauds desperate to save Darwin's theory leading to over a hundred years of teaching students nonsense. Professor Reiner Protsch von Zieten was a professor of Anthropology at Frankfurt University for 30 years before he was forced to resign. It was found that he falsified dates on many 'stone age' fossils which included a skull fragment named Hahnhofer's Man which supposedly linked humans and Neanderthals.

The Piltdown Man was a notorious hoax early in 20th century Great Britain, in which a medieval human skull was combined with the lower jaw of an orangutan and subsequently 'found' (was planted) in a gravel pit near the village of Piltdown, England. For decades Piltdown Man was hailed as the missing link' between man and ape-like species by charlatans of evolution.

However, Piltdown Man was exposed as a fraud only through later scientific testing and simple observation. The refusal of the discoverer to allow independent scrutiny of his claims enabled this fraud to live for over forty years.

Other examples of bad judgement or outright fraud to shore-up evolution have been the Nebraska Man, Java Man, Ocre Man, and Flores Man.

However, another clue to the mistaken thinking of Darwin, humanists of his time and socialists is in the original title of Darwin's famous book "On the Origin of Species by Means of Natural Selection, or the Preservation of Favoured Races in the Struggle for Life."

Though the title accurately portrays the racist mindset of many humanist intellectuals at the time the title was too toxic and needed to be cleaned-up to read "On the Origin of Species" in later printings. Darwin and his peers commonly considered there to be races and not just one human race. Further, they believed blacks and other minority peoples to be slower or less evolved.

This racist view is still a part of the Darwinist dogma that fits nicely with today's government education rubbish. This propaganda includes global warming, multiplicity of genders, endors-

This Market could just keep going

Deutsche Bank AG last week warned investors the stock market is pricing at "extreme levels" as investors drive the Dow to new highs once again. Up from the mid 17,000'S in 2016, the Dow now sits in the high 28,000 range and is not all that far from the major milestone of 30,000.

The multiples of ten thousand have only been reached twice before when the Dow surpassed 10,000 and then 20,000. Closing in on 30,000 is indeed a major milestone. Deutsche strategists Parag Thatte, Srineel Jalagani and Binky Chadha wrote January 10, 2020 "Equity positioning, like the market itself, has run far ahead of current growth, as investor's price in a global rebound". The market is "now in the 96th percentile on our consolidated measure, with a wide variety of metrics stretched".

In plain English, Deutsche is saying prices are very high historically speaking, and a variety of measuring metrics are all above their averages to the upside. The only time Deutsche's metrics have been stretched farther was in January of 2018, prior to a significant sell-off in the markets according to the Deutsche strategists.

They went on to note "investors are clearly overweight" at the highest levels since October 2018. October 1, 2018 brought the start of a severe correction lasting until December 24, 2018. It was the worst correction since the 2008/09 market crash and economic real estate implosion that preceded it which brought the world's financial system to its knees.

The S&P 500 has already gained 1.2% since January 1, 2020 pushing new records almost daily. That followed an eye-popping 29% gain in 2019, it best performance

since 2013. Despite geopolitical concerns and impeachment proceedings, the market seemingly is in an almost relentless upward trajectory.

Rumors of a soft patch caused minor gyrations in the market throughout 2019 yet the indexes eventually plowed ever higher.

Deutsche strategist Chadra had been the most bullish of top strategists tracked by Bloomberg and his prediction of an S&P at 3,265 compared to the actual level of 3,231 at the end of 2019 hit the mark almost exactly. Now Chadra is relatively bearish (negative on the markets) and is calling for an S&P level of 3,250. Not that the 3,250 level is catastrophic. Far from it. It sits about that level now. What he is saying is it won't end up higher 12 months from now and instead end up approximately where it sits now. Kind of slow grind to nowhere.

Now that we've got your attention, here are some caveats to keep in mind when taking the Deutsche Bank observation to heart and selling out your portfolio. No one can predict market movements with 100% accuracy and history is rife with analysts who got it right the first time around and were completely wrong on subsequent calls.

Even the smartest quants (math geniuses) employed by the largest financial firms more often than not disagree on their prognostications and I could show you 100 articles that would have you convinced the Dow is going to 35,000 and another 100 more articles which would have you quivering in fear of a Dow 10,000. The opinions are that varied.

If you need reasons to doubt the Deutsche warning, there are many. Unemployment is at decade lows, disposable incomes are rising, the employment market is tighter than it's been in years, many companies are reporting better than expected earnings, interest rates are historically in a very low range, the Federal Reserve is maintaining it accommodative monetary stance and 2020 is the fourth year in the election cycle. The fourth year is historically the second

best year of the four years in the cycle (2021 will be year one of this four year cycle).

Lastly there are a few old sayings on Wall Street that may calm nervous investors. From the CEO of Citibank during the real estate boom of the 2000's. "One day it will come to an end but as long as the music is playing, you have to keep dancing".

That and "markets can stay illogical much longer than you can stay liquid" meaning just because the market has been rising by a huge amount, doesn't mean it can't keep going. Remember there have been those predicting this market would crash ever since it began its recent historic rise in late 2016 and throughout other market super-rallies.

The bottom line parallels another old saying "it's not different this time". Better said "it's different every time". This means there is no rule that says this market can't keep running. At some point all markets go through corrections, some severe. But with many economic statistics being more positive than in decades, this market has many reasons it could just keep going. That said, having good diversification in one's holdings, not going too far out on a "stock limb" and having some sort of exit strategy might be prudent in the face of this historic rise.

Snow and rain is expected in the mountains but we who live in the Sacramento Valley are supposed to stay dry. We decided to contact our weather source for his prediction. He advised us to expect a dry February the first part of the month with storms dropping rain in the valley around president's day.

We certainly hope the old guy is on the money because rain will improve the fishing, both in local reservoirs, the Delta and rivers, especially for sturgeon fishing.

Once again stripers are being caught in the Sacramento River from Knights Landing to Sacramento. The fish are hanging out next to shore.

The weather turned cold last weekend due to a cold front coming down from Alaska. This really slowed down the fishing in local reservoirs. Collins Lake reported some success with rainbow trout with some big fish caught. Apparently the cold weather did not slow the kokanee bite at Bullard's Bar Reservoir. Fish were being caught up to

13 inches.

Folsom Lake has dropped and is on the low side for this time of year but there is still plenty of water for fishing. Reports tell us landlocked salmon and rainbow trout are hitting on spoons, spinners and small rapala lures.

The Department of Fish and Wildlife will be planting steelhead smolts (small minnows) this month in the

Feather River which will bring up the striped bass from down below.

Kudos goes out to Yuba City Angler George Seekin for his 65 inch sturgeon. George was fishing with salmon roe when the big one hit while fishing near Honker Bay in the Sacramento Delta Region.

Yuba County Public Health Hosts Clinic to Promote Oral Health for Preschoolers



Cedar Lane preschoolers were enthralled by the story of Clay the caveboy and his quest to find a secret sugar stash. Wouldn't we all like to happen upon such a find? Clay thought the same until the Sugarsaurus Rex guarding the sweets showed his painful tooth cavities. The presentation Thursday (Jan. 30) morning was part of Yuba County Public Health's goal of teaching local kids to take care of their smiles. The lively puppet show -- put on by Puppet Art Theater Company of Sacramento, thanks to a state grant -- engrained the message of brushing your teeth twice a day, visiting the dentist twice a year, and going easy on the sweets. "The goal is to get kids excited about oral health, and provide them oral health screenings and provide fluoride varnish," Yuba County Health Educator Annapreet Hayer, RDH (registered dental hygienist), said. "It's a good way to get information out there and get kids treatment if needed." After the 15-minute puppet show, the preschoolers broke into several groups: one with Hayer, where they learned how to brush teeth for two minutes on a dragon puppet. Another group, led by Program Aide Tarrah Tomlinson, dressed up as dentists in goggles, a mask and gown. There was another area where Public Health nursing staff checked kids' teeth and provided a fluoride varnish. Fluoride helps protect teeth and prevent tooth decay. "We want to show kids to not be so scared to visit the dentist," Hayer said. "We're signaling that the health of your mouth is important." The fluoride clinics began in mid-January and will run through the end of February, covering all preschools within Marysville Joint Unified School District. Yuba County Public Health has provided this program for the last several years.

labor both in America and throughout the world. Once the Civil War freed the slaves here then there was an offer of passage to Liberia, West Africa but few responded. Nearly all former slaves born and raised here now considered this country home.

Successive generations descending from immigrants referred to themselves as Americans, not Russian-Americans, Italian-Americans or any other hyphenated title. Even those who came here first, being incorrectly labelled ‘Indians’ by future arrivals, eventually called themselves Americans or Native Americans (a misnomer since they merely migrated here before the others).

During the 1960’s, the government forced integration, forbidding segregation of blacks from others whether in restaurants, bathrooms, housing, transportation, schools etc. However, after spending billions in enforcement efforts, liberals today beginning with university lefty intellectuals are undermining the idea of America as a melting pot and are igniting a movement to return to a nation of tribes now referred to as multiculturalism.

Segregation lives on. This February is Black History Month while of course there is no White History Month. There is Black Entertainment Television (BET) and BET Awards where only blacks perform and win. There is the NAACP (National Association for the Advancement of Colored People) and NAACP Image Awards where only Blacks compete and win.

Another example of our cultural rules, several years back a college intramural volleyball team called the “White Guys” was prohibited from campus competition for using the ‘provocative’ name. Of course, “Black Guys or Girls” would have worked just fine.

So, due to the left’s push for multiculturalism we return to segregation along with titles like African-American and Mexican-American where many of the minorities mock and snipe about the country they prosper in though no one is holding them here against their will. American multiculturalism is an evil that produces intolerance, restricted speech and expression, and leads to every type of oppression currently employed in repressive countries.

When President Obama spoke about ‘his people’ he was always referring to black-Americans rather than all Americans. Historically however, the President’s ‘people’ were all the citizens of the ‘United’ States of America not some divisive tribe or sub-group.

This Month In Your Garden

by Cecilia M. Rice

With February upon us, we still have one more month of bare root season to go. If you are wanting to plant bare root fruit trees there is still time and selections are still good. Bare Root Season is January and February.

Now for the other things that we need to do in February. One of the most necessary things to be done is the third and final dormant spraying in mid-February with a copper based fungicide. It is important to keep ahead of the fungal pests that might occur on fruits and nuts, as well as some vegetables and ornamentals. Rose are very susceptible to black spot, powdery mildew, and rust. Copper spray is well known for its use for curly leaf on peaches and nectarines. Once a fungal disease is started it is difficult to control because the spores produced are easily blown to neighboring plants that might become infected. Because of its variable uses, it is a good product to have on your shelf for gardening needs. You should mix it with horticultural oil or Neem Oil, to help the spray spread evenly and cling to the foliage. Neem Oil has many other good uses. It is an excellent insecticide as well as controlling some fungi, to a lesser extent than the copper spray.

February usually brings hints of spring with it. Buds for the spring blooms begin to form. I am always fasci-

nated by looking at those bare stems on the deciduous trees and shrubs and seeing the buds form for spring blooms. All of the subtle changes are telling us that things are awakening in the plant world, and that is the time to begin fertilizing most things. Wait to fertilize until the plants have their full set of leaves. The plants won't utilize fertilizer when they are bare of leaves. If they leaf out soon following the application of fertilizer, they will utilize any fertilizer that hasn't been washed away by rain or irrigation, but the usefulness of some has been lost. So- not too soon, but get on it when the signs of life show and give them a boost into spring. Use an appropriate fertilizer for the plants being fertilizes. There is a basic all purpose fertilizer that can be used on most things. It is often referred to as a "balanced" fertilizer since it has almost equal amounts of the three basic elements that are in moist formulas. Those three elements are N,P and K, or Nitrogen, Phosphorous and Potassium. They will frequently be seen on the front of fertilizer packages. Acid fertilizer is used on azaleas, camellias, rhododendron and gardenias, plus other things that do well in similar conditions. Other elements will have been added to the basic three to create the desired acidity. Citrus trees have a special fertilizer with nutrients

needed by that species. There is an abundance of formulas available to meet the needs of differing plants, there is also an abundance of plants that do well on the basic fertilizers.

All of the seasons have a beauty of their own. Seeing the seasons change has always been one of those things I enjoy. There are also many folks who would love to see it forever balmy and not have to put up with the cold or the hot weather.

Grasses are growing and weeds will be growing right along with them. Fertilize grasses with Weed and Feed to get rid of the weeds before they become a difficult pest in the yard. Weeds can be controlled quite well in flower beds, now before they have emerged, by covering the areas with 2" of mulch. That will also help with watering chores later by reducing the frequency of watering since evaporation will be slowed.

As the weather gets warmer, be on the lookout for slugs and snails. Irregular holes in leaves are a clue that they are out and about. They also leave a slightly shiny trail behind. Use snail bait to destroy them. I have had very good luck with Slug-go – it is granular and is sprinkled in the infested areas. It is safe around pets and wildlife. I never saw the snails, just their empty shells. Snails also like beer and will be attracted to a bowl of beer cradled in a depression in the ground and will drown when they fall into it. Of course, it has to be emptied and wastes a bit of beer. Aphids are also one of the early pests that you will encounter. They produce a sweet and sticky substance that is left on the leaves. Ants are attracted to that and will farm the aphids and that compounds the problem, so look for ants at the base of a plant infested with aphids and bait for or spray them. Spring is on the way – enjoy it.

Recently, this column exposed the foolishness of two proposed statewide bond measures: A \$15 billion school bond, which will be on the March 3 ballot, as well as a "climate resiliency" bond.

Both are horribly flawed for several reasons, not the least of which that it makes no sense for California to go further into debt when we have a large surplus.

But at the local level, taxpayers need to be aware of a recent resurgence in the use of pension obligation bonds, a risky financing method that fell out of favor during the recession but is now making a comeback.

Fortunately, there is more scrutiny on this form of debt financing than in years past, which may help to dissuade our elected leaders from making ill-advised decisions.

There is a technical definition of POBs set forth below but we prefer a definition that most people can understand: A POB is basically paying your Visa bill with your MasterCard.

Here's the technical definition: Pension obligation bonds (POBs) are bonds issued to fund, in whole or in part, the unfunded portion of public pension liabilities by the creation of new debt.

The use of POBs relies on an assumption that the bond proceeds, when invested with pension assets in higher-yielding assets, will be able to achieve a rate of return that is greater than the interest rate owed over the term of the bonds. Back in 2003, the state

of California attempted to float a statewide pension obligation bond without voter approval.

The Howard Jarvis Taxpayers Association sued to invalidate the bonds and prevailed in court.

For HJTA, the assumption of any long-term financial obligation by a government entity should be approved by those financially obligated for the repayment. That means the taxpayers.

More recently, others have questioned the return of POBs as a strategy to deal with unfunded pension obligations. State Sen. John Moorlach, R-Costa Mesa, and Orange County Treasurer-Tax Collector Shari Freidenrich, in an op-ed for the Los Angeles Times, sharply criticized a plan by the city of Huntington Beach to use POBs to paper over that city's growing obligations to CalPERS.

While many try to paint CalPERS as the bad actor — probably deserved in some cases — Huntington Beach's wounds are mostly self-inflicted: It made promises to the public employee unions that are not sustainable over the long term.

As Moorlach and Freidenrich argue, "converting a soft debt into a hard debt, with bondholders unwilling to make payment schedule adjustments, may come to haunt POB issuers in the future."

And it's not just fiscal watchdogs who are worried about the resurgence of POBs.

The Government Finance Officers Association (GFOA), an association of officials employed by government entities, has issued a stern warning: "POBs involve considerable investment risk. Failing to achieve the targeted rate of return burdens the issuer with both the debt service requirements of

the taxable bonds and the unfunded pension liabilities that remain unmet because the investment portfolio did not perform as anticipated. In recent years, local jurisdictions across the country have faced increased financial stress as a result of their reliance on POBs, demonstrating the significant risks associated with these instruments for both small and large governments."

The GFOA unequivocally states that local governments should not issue POBs.

The reasons for this recommendation include the fact that "the invested POB proceeds might fail to earn more than the interest rate owed over the term of the bonds, leading to increased overall liabilities for the government," and "issuing taxable debt to fund the pension liability increases the jurisdiction's bonded debt burden and potentially uses up debt capacity that could be used for other purposes."

Unfortunately, some municipalities are ignoring these warnings.

In addition to Huntington Beach, the city of Simi Valley is likewise pursuing a POB issuance and has filed a "validation action" in the courts to insulate the bond against future legal challenge.

Californians face enough risks from fires, floods, droughts and earthquakes.

There is no reason we should assume the man-made threat of risky bonds, especially at a time when we are being told that a recession is just around the corner.

If local elected leaders believe that pension obligation bonds are a good deal, they need to convince their citizens and get voter approval.

The district is paying \$310,000 a year in rent for an administration building on Plumas Street in Yuba City. The administration offices should be located on the Yuba College campus where they were located for many years!

• The district is paying its top four administrators a total of just under \$1 million. Nearly 20 employees are making \$200,000 or more, 75 receive \$150,000 a year and one hundred eighty-six make more than \$100,000 a year.

• The district has a pension debt of over \$52 million and an unfunded retiree healthcare debt of \$48 million – which continue to rise causing a hole in the district budget.

• The 31-item project list for Measure C, is extremely general in nature citing such things as "heating, ventilation and cooling systems, irrigation piping systems, maintenance issues, electrical systems and wiring, automotive, plumbing, sewer and drainage systems, decaying walls, old ceiling tiles and flooring, leaky roofs" and many others which should be taken care of by routine maintenance. The project list is very similar to the list provided for Measure Q approved by the voters in 2016.

• Measure C will cost property owners \$23 to \$25 per 100,000 dollars of assessed valuation. Rents and costs for goods and services will go up to cover the increased tax.

• Vote No on C. Don't put more debt on our citizens, children and grandchildren!

New Rule on Navigable Waters

New federal rules to protect navigable waters promise to provide the certainty farmers and ranchers need to maintain agricultural production and enhance the land under their care, the California Farm Bureau Federation says. CFBF President Jamie Johansson said today's release of the Navigable Waters Protection Rule by the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency and Army Corps of Engineers encourages farmers and

ranchers.

"You won't find a stronger ally than farmers and ranchers when it comes to protecting land and natural resources, because they depend on those resources to produce food and farm products," Johansson said. "The new rule promises clear guidelines to help farmers maintain and improve water quality while retaining the flexibility they need to manage their land."

The Navigable Waters

Protection Rule will replace the 2015 Waters of the United States rule that would have given federal agencies extensive authority to regulate routine farming activities.

"The old WOTUS rule generated only confusion and litigation," Johansson said. "We hope the new rule will lead to a more cooperative approach that sees farmers and ranchers as partners in protection of natural resources."

Desert vegetable harvest picks up momentum

Winter vegetable harvest in the California desert has picked up the pace after something of a slow start. Farmers say rains in late December and early January delayed planting and harvest in the Imperial Valley. Occasional cold weather has meant farmers had to wait until midmorning to begin their daily harvests. The desert valleys of California and Arizona produce most of the nation's lettuce, spinach and other vegetables during the winter.

Ranchers hope for rains to sustain pastures

Rainfall the next few weeks will make a big difference in how California cattle ranchers man-

age their herds through the spring. Ranchers say rainfall so far this winter has been adequate to keep pastures green, meaning enough grass for their cattle. But cool weather has meant the grass hasn't grown as fast as ranchers would prefer. In some cases, ranchers say they're buying hay just in case they need to provide supplemental feed for their herds.

Lack of employees slows orchard, vineyard work

In the orchards and vineyards of California, winter means it's time to prune fruit trees and grapevines. Farmers in many parts of the state say they're having trouble hiring enough people to do the work. One Central Valley peach farmer who used to hire

40 people to prune his trees says he could only hire eight this year. Mechanical pruners have become available for vineyards. Peach farmers say their crops generally need to be pruned and harvested by hand.

USDA predicts world-wide citrus production

Worldwide production of most citrus crops will likely decline in the current harvest year, according to the U.S. Department of Agriculture. A USDA report projected reduced global crops of oranges, tangerines and mandarins, and lemons and limes. But the report said worldwide grapefruit production could set a record high. USDA said orange harvests in the U.S. and China should increase, but a smaller crop in Brazil will bring global supplies down.
