

BVID Sicard Ditch Pipeline Project Receives Funding

A \$637,320 grant from the Yuba Water Agency provides funding to help Browns Valley Irrigation District complete project engineering and design, and the California Environmental Quality Act requirements needed to get the Sicard Ditch Pipeline project shovel-ready.

"This is a game changer for us," said Ryan McNally, Browns Valley Irrigation District general manager. "Not only will this increase water supply reliability, but it will also give us the ability to eventually serve several hundred additional parcels."

The Sicard Ditch Pipeline, when complete, will be nearly 10 miles long and will save the district approximately 4,000 acre-feet of water per year, which is equivalent to about four feet of water elevation at Collins Lake.

Once the first phases of the project are complete, Browns Valley Irrigation District will begin looking for external funding to leverage Yuba Water Agency's grant.



Msvl Emergencies Cost Users

In 2016, Marysville, CA., 12,000 plus in population and 3.6 sq. mi. in size, was going bankrupt following decades of businesses leaving the city. In spite of shouldering millions of dollars in devastating long-term real estate debt the city council determined to continue funding its own police and fire departments rather than contracting out for services.

On June 7, 2016 a majority of citizens voted to raise sales

taxes 1% for 10 years to bring in \$2 million plus annually to temporarily solve the short-fall caused by the bond debt, spiking unfunded pension liability and health premiums along with operating its own public safety services.

Since that time city hall has been looking for new revenue streams and to increase existing ones. One idea was to charge for public safety responses. It has begun.

On August 3, 2019, Marysville Fire Department (MFD) suppressed a garage fire at a duplex.

The owner's insurance company, Allstate, then received a bill from Fire Recovery USA, LLC, a Roseville third party billing service, for the (MFD) fire response. The bill was for 3 engines (\$455 per engine/hr), 1 fire truck (\$568 per truck/hr), and 1 command on scene (\$284/hr). The charge amounted to \$2,217.00/hr. for 2.25 hrs. for a total of \$4,988.25.

The duplex owner had never heard of such a charge though having been a property owner and taxpayer for decades with multiple Marysville properties. He was informed by MFD that it was a new program they were trying out. A call to Councilmember Bruce Buttacavoli got the charge reduced to \$500 which the insurance company agreed to assume.

During the 1970s, a new legal theory emerged that enabled the collection of fees for emergency services. Charging for these services had been limited by the "free public services doctrine" or the "municipal cost recovery rule." This doctrine stems from the notion that a governmental entity may not recover costs of public services incurred responding to an incident.

These costs were presumed to have already been borne by the public as a whole through taxation, and to allow the collec-

Why can Americans no longer build and maintain infrastructure like European and Asian countries? Its simple, America is in shambles due to environmental activists and labor unions.

Tiny Units For Emergency Homeless Shelter

Sutter County, Ca.

Twenty 10-foot by 16foot wooden prefabricated units have been ordered that will serve as the first general homeless population emergency shelter in Sutter County.

The units, which are expected to arrive and be assembled in mid-August, will house up to 40 homeless individuals who agree to utilize services provided by several organizations, with the goal of becoming permanently housed. The shelter will be established on county property at 1965 Live Oak Boulevard, behind the Sutter-Yuba Behavioral Health Services building.

The shelter is expected to open in September. County officials are finalizing discussions with the Salvation Army to provide management of the facility. The Salvation Army operates The Depot homeless shelter and drug treatment program in Marysville, and recently opened additional housing in Linda for individuals who were made homeless by the Camp Fire.

Those who access the emergency shelter will be

expected to stay no longer than 90 days and to be working toward the goal of acquiring transitional and permanent housing while utilizing the emergency shelter.

The shelter will be modeled on Yuba County's 14 Forward concept of tiny units coupled with access to services on 14th Street in Marysville. That program has received statewide recognition as an example of practical emergency shelter.

Sutter County has scheduled a community meeting at 6 p.m. on August 22 at the Sutter County Veteran's Hall, 1425 Veteran's Memorial Circle, Yuba City, to provide operational details of the emergency shelter.

Until recently, Sutter County has been under a federal court injunction blocking enforcement of an ordinance prohibiting camping on Sutter County property, including countyowned property along the Feather River. The injunction applied to a specific no-camping ordinance adopted by the Sutter County Board of Supervisors in 2017. The injunction was lifted after the Board repealed that specific ordinance, but an older ordinance also addressing where people can or can't camp remains in place.

Although the injunction has been lifted, local law enforcement agencies cannot cite or arrest individuals for sleeping on public property if there is no alternative location for them to sleep, according to a U.S. District Court of Appeals ruling in 2018. In essence, the court said, it is a violation of the U.S. Constitution for local government agencies to make homelessness a crime. While the court did not require local government agencies to provide shelter, it made it clear that in the absence of adequate shelter beds, local governments cannot remove homeless individuals from public rights of way.

Wednesday, August 7, the Sutter County Board of Supervisors met in special session at Yuba City Hall with the Yuba City Council for the second session of a workshop on homelessness. During the first session in late May, supervisors and council members heard presentations on the extent of homelessness, efforts to assist those homeless individuals who are seeking help, and the court rulings which prevent enforcement of the no-camping ordinance in Sutter County.

FISHIN' TALK

Now is the time to head to the ocean for those who enjoy this kind of sport. Halibut, salmon and rockfish are the name of the game at this time in San Francisco Bay. Just about any marina is scoring with party boats returning full of fish. Hot spots last week was out of Berkeley and Emeryville.

As predicted, the Barge Hole on the Sacramento River proved to be a good bet on the opening day and still continues to produce quality salmon.

It appears this time of year is the time to go after catfish. Just about anywhere this fish lives is producing fish at this time which includes Collins Lake. The cats are reported to be suckers for just about any bait thrown at them, including power bait and worms. Of course, the big ones like the stink baits and chicken guts.

Lake Tahoe is still putting out some nice mackinaw lake trout and mixed in is limits of kokanee land locked salmon. The trout are holding in water between 150 and 180 feet and are being caught jigging and trolling with live minnows. Kokanee are running from 13 to 15 inches and some lake trout up to 10 pounds have been reported.

We hear from Eagle Lake near Susanville. This natural lake is still producing some nice eagle lake trout at this time. In fact, the lake has been cooperating all year. The trout have moved deep

and are reported to be found in 25 to 40 feet of water. Drifting night crawlers is productive as well as lures which imitate the native fish in the lake such as the tule chub minnow. A good bet is always spoons and spinners in sliver color.

Ice House Reservoir

and Union Valley Reservoir, both located in El Dorado County, received planted trout last weekend. According to a good source we are told some big spawners were also dropped in Ice House Reservoir along with the

usual plant.

Englebright Reservoir located above Marysville is overrun with skiers, wave runners and so on. Best to stay away from the fishing for a while.

Bullard's Bar Reservoir is still a hot spot in the North State for kokanee salmon. Best bet for lots of action is at the dam. Be prepared to share this spot with lots of boats.

Closing thought: "No matter how long you have traveled in the wrong direction, you can always turn around."





Having both fire / rescue and an ambulance response is a redundancy created when firefighters unionized and wanted to justify higher salaries and benefits by adding medical responses to only fighting fires.

Buying a Bond or a Bond Fund.

Bonds are simply IOU's. You loan money to an entity and they give you an IOU for the most part. There are terms such as when you will get your money back, how you will get your money back, how much they might pay you in compensation for the loan (interest you will get) and any other special terms and conditions, of which there can be many.

Without going through all the specifics, just swallow the term IOU and you are well on your way to understanding at least one of the important parts of how bonds work and what they are.

There are a multitude of bonds available ranging from junk (from companies not at their healthiest), investment grade (have good financials), muni (IOUs from cities), and state and federal bonds to name a few. Bonds are usually rated by well-known rating companies for quality, have different payments terms and rates, possibly be insured, be able to be called away early, and have a variety of other terms and stipulations. Although I have cov-

ered bonds before in a variety of articles and radio shows, today's lesson is on the difference between buying a bond and buying a bond fund.

When an investor buys an individual bond, he essentially goes into contract with the borrower or "issuer" of the bond. It might be a company, a city, a state or some other entity. The buyer of the bond is the

lender who gives his money to the entity and the bond is in essence the contract.

Although the terms and conditions vary from bond to bond, the mechanism by which their price moves in the daily market is similar.

Suppose an investor buys a \$10,000 bond which matures in 5 years paying 5% annual interest. Although how and when the investor gets paid can vary, the \$10,000 price tag is printed on the bond and that number obviously being printed on the bond itself, won't change. If the investor holds the bond for the duration (5 years in this case) and the borrower doesn't default, the investor gets his \$5,000 back and receives his interest as well either along the way or at the end of the 5 years.

Now suppose the interest rates set by the Federal Reserve (nationwide rates they control to the banking system) are raised by a Federal Reserve decision. This will not affect this bond as far as the printed price on the bond nor the interest rate which it promised to pay. If the investor keeps the bond to the end of the maturity date (5 years from when it was purchased) nothing changes. However if the bond holder (the investor) decides to sell the bond early (before the 5 years maturity date) something does

Since the bond is paying a fixed rate of return (the interest rate known as the coupon rate) and that rate was established before rates were raised by the Federal Reserve. once the Fed raised the rates, all bonds with similar terms and maturity rates will likely pay more interest.

In other words, bond issuers (the borrowers) set what interest rate they will pay somewhat based on the interest rate the Feds have, so if the Feds raised the rates, the bond borrowers will also likely pay a higher rate.

That means the current 5 year bond is now paying less than a new bond would. Should the investor want to sell the bond early and since that bond is paying less than the new rates set in part by the Fed, in order to sell the bond the price will be lowered below the original price of \$10,000.

How much lower depends on how high the rates were raised by the Fed and how far out the maturity date of the bond is.

A bond fund on the other hand holds not just one bond but a basket full. A similar thing happens to a bond fund. Should rates rise, a bond fund will likely fall in price. Conversely if Fed rates fall, a bond fund price will likely rise. Ditto with an individual bond. Rates rise, bonds fall. Rates fall, bonds rise. Once again how much they rise and fall will depend on the length of the bond (or bond fund) maturity date and how much rates have moved overall.

The difference between the fund and the individual bond is the funds price will change daily and be seen daily by all investors. As for individual bonds, although an investor will see the \$10,000 printed on the bond and printed numbers don't change obviously, what he can actually sell the bond on any particular day will require an inquiry on the part of the investor to obtain the market value of the bond should he desire to sell it early.

Although the overall effect on bond funds versus individual bonds will essentially be similar, their price visibility is slightly different in the eyes of the average investor. Bond funds will be easy to value by looking at the price (much like a stock price) which will change daily. Individual bonds however will be slightly harder to value requiring an on-the-spot inquiry and a bit more knowledge as to how they are priced.

The Yuba-Sutter Trauma Intervention Program will be better able to support victims of crime and survivors of tragedy with the help of a grant from Yuba Water Agency.

The \$10,000 grant, approved today by the agency as part of the Bill Shaw Rescue Equipment and Training Grant Program, will allow the nonprofit organization to purchase necessary training and materials for its volunteers who provide direction and emotional support to victims. Each TIP volunteer receives 55 hours of training before their first response and participates in monthly training.

"It has been an honor to bring the Trauma Intervention Program to our community," said Lou Binninger, program director. "Being present in someone's tragedy is a

sacred experience. When TIP is involved, hurting people get better care here than elsewhere in America. We are grateful for all the community volunteers and contributions to support our mission."

The Yuba-Sutter TIP is a self-funded organization that was established in 1994 to support local law enforcement, hospital and ambulance services, and responds to all 911 requests with immediate on-scene support for victims of crime and survivors of tragedy. Since its creation, the organization has responded to more than 11,000 calls.

"These well-trained volunteers respond 24 hours a day, seven days a week to help victims of tragedy," said Yuba Water Agency Vice-Chairman Randy Fletcher. "They are first responders in every sense of the word."

Like all Bill Shaw grants, the agency is able to make these funds available because the first responders may be called upon to provide emergency support to the agency's facilities and staff, or to people recreating at its lakes or on the Yuba River.

Yuba Water's Bill Shaw Rescue Equipment and Training Grant Program, which was created in 2018, is designed for first-responder agencies in Yuba County and will cover the one-time costs of up to \$10,000 per applicant annually, associated with the purchase of rescue equipment and personnel specialized training. Since its inception, the program has supported 13 agencies with \$138,500 in grants.

Why Are Taxpayers Paying for Road Improvements to Accommodate Commercial Trucking Yards South of Yuba City?

While we need commercial trucking to bring goods to our community, is it the responsibility of the taxpayers to pay for road improvements to accommodate commercial truck yards in Sutter County?

A Little Background: Major concerns about the numerous commercial truck yards south of Yuba City have been raised for several years by residents and others in the south area. There are 13 existing truck yards and four potential yards on the east side of Highway 99 between Walnut Avenue and O'Banion Road. There are currently over 1200 trucks in existing yards producing an estimated 167 truck trips a day onto Highway 99.

Starting in 2016, residents and others in the area have expressed concern and frustration over a number of truck yard issues, including safety and environmental, to county officials. To address these concerns county supervisors established a Commercial Trucking Issues Ad-Hoc Committee on August 22, 2017.

While many of the concerns were addressed in a Zoning Code amendment passed by the board on June 11 of this year, there are still major concerns regarding safety and costs being borne by the taxpayers.

So far, the trucking

yard owners in the area have paid nothing to help resolve the safety issues. The costs to date include:

- A \$423,355 contract with an outside firm to study safety issues at Oswald Road and Highway 99. That study was authorized on October 9, 2018 and has not yet been completed.
- A \$50,000 cooperative agreement with Caltrans in January 2019 for a project study report.
- Installation of "No Parking" signs on Oswald Road at a cost of \$1200.
- Future improvements and paving on Highway 99 and county roads - costs unknown.
- · County staff time to work on this issue for the past several years.

And, it has been recently learned there is a potential county plan to route trucks down Railroad to Barry Road, then to the stop light at Barry Road and Highway 99. Barry School sits on the northeast corner and the fire house is located on the southeast corner of the intersection. Not only would this block firetrucks from responding to emergencies, the truck traffic would pose a real safety risk to the kids, parents and faculty at Barry School.

This entire truck situation presents two important questions:

- 1. Why are taxpayer funds being spent to accommodate trucking yards without any contribution from truck vard owners/operators?
- 2. Why is the county accepting applications for additional truck yards and making plans to reroute trucks to Barry Road, and possibly Bogue Road, prior to completion of the \$423,335 traffic study?

He also helped arrange grant funding for Live Oak's new Sheriff and Fire Station, along with \$500,000 for a water main expansion that is needed to provide adequate protection.

Ron advocated that the City of Yuba City write a panhandling ordinance to deal with aggressive panhandling by vagrants that has gone unchallenged for years.

The County recently completed a jail expansion project and is working on a plan to consolidate more than 20 existing county locations into only a handful, including renovation of the former commercial space at 850 Gray Avenue for Health and Human Services. Ron said this is important work that will save the County a great deal of money in the long

Youth who choose to exhibit an animal in the Nevada County Fair begin their journey as much as 12 months prior to the fair depending on the animal. The largest class of animals appears to be the swine division which takes a full day to complete. Exhibitors begin raising their animal in late

are weaned. While raising the animal can be fun, it is also hard work. The youth exhibitor must know all the ins and outs of raising their pig. They are required to keep strict records of how much the pigs eat, weight, special dietary issues and general health. It is a 24/7 job. However, these exhibitors will tell you it is all worth it when they

spring once the pigs get their swine into the arena. . If a youth exhibitor chooses this division of animal, it is a full day's work. Market class is done in the morning and Breeder and Showmanship are in the afternoon.

> Judging is done in three areas Market Class and Breeder Showmanship. During the Market portion the judges are looking at the "projected" market value of the animal. Exhibitors must know the best techniques for showing off their animals assets. Is it well-muscled, does it have extra fat, can it move easily and most of all will it provide a good vield at the butcher? During Showmanship, it is all about how well the swine and exhibitor work together. Judges look for animals that hold their head up, maneuver where the exhibitor is directing them, how confident the exhibitor is with their animal and their knowledge of animal care. Breeder Class looks at the pig's potential for breeding. The judge determines which animal would best be able to carry a little of 12-14 and still be able to move and take care of the young. First in each class earn the title of Grand Champion with second place being Grand Reserve. Competition can be grueling especially in the summer heat yet these young exhibitors push through and love what they are doing.

The final step is the auction on Sunday. Registered buyers bid on the animals at a price per pound amount. Most pigs will bring \$1500-\$2000 as a final price. Once the youth exhibitor had deducted the cost of raising the animal, they can determine their net profit. Money is often set aside to purchase their animal for the following
